Pat Summerall dies at 82

Area residents recall famed broadcaster who was born and raised here.

Lake City's own Pat Summerall passed away Tuesday of heart failure. He was 82 years old.

Summerall, famous for his deep, resonant voice, called 16 Super Bowls as the play-by-play announcer. He spent more than 40 years as the voice of the National Football League.

But before he was a nationally known broadcaster, Summerall was born and raised here in Lake City.

He loved to fish on the Suwannee River, but hated the sand gnats. He was all-conference in football, basketball and

tennis. He taught middle school English, and always remembered where he came from, according to friends and family.

One time, after a night when the gnats were like a buzzing cloud at the river, Summerall had had enough, Summerall's first cousin Mike Kennon said.

Summerall jumped out of the boat and hightailed it to his truck – wanting to leave the boat behind because the gnats were so bad, Kennon said.

"I told him to back the trailer up, and that if he wanted to give the boat away, I would take it," he said.

Hearing set for Sunday liquor

County commissioners to accept input on idea requested by restaurants.

Sunday sales of liquor could soon be a reality in Columbia County as the county commission will hold a public hearing on the issue at Thursday's meeting.

The meeting will be at the Columbia County School Board Administrative Complex Auditorium, 372 W. Duval St., starting at 5:30 p.m.

The proposed change to the county alcohol ordinance would allow restaurants and private clubs to sell liquor by the drink on Sundays. It would not extend the same privilege to other business that serve alcohol or allow sales of bottled liquor on Sundays.

Any change in the ordinance will have to be adopted by the Lake City City Council before it would take effect inside city limits, where the majority of the restaurants are located.

According to a survey by Harvey Campbell, director of the Tourist Development Council, some local restaurants said the ban hurts their bottom line. Many restaurant managers and owners said if the ban was lifted, they might have to hire more employees to handle the increase in business on Sundays.

Campbell conducted the survey after County Commissioner Ron Williams asked the TDC to compile information on the impact or benefit of changing the Sunday ban on alcohol sales.

Investigators piecing together evidence

Authorities still have no suspects nor clues to why marathon was targeted.

BOSTON — Federal agents zeroed in Tuesday on how the Boston Marathon bombing was carried out — with kitchen pressure cookers packed with explosives, nails and other lethal shrapnel — but said

they still didn't know who did it and why.

The FBI and other law enforcement agencies repeatedly pleaded for members of the public to come forward with photos, videos or anything suspicious they might have seen or heard.

"The range of suspects and motives remains wide open," Richard DesLauriers, FBI agent in charge in Boston, said at a news conference. He vowed to "go to the ends of the Earth to identify the subject or subjects who are responsible for this despicable crime."

President Barack Obama branded the

attack an act of terrorism but said officials don't know "whether it was planned and executed by a terrorist organization, foreign or domestic, or was the act of a malevolent individual."

Scores of victims of the Boston bombing remained in hospitals, many with grievous injuries, a day after the twin explosions near the marathon's finish line killed three people, wounded more than 170 and reawakened fears of terrorism. A 9-year-old girl and 10-year-old boy were among

Yoho supports bill to help farm families

Congressman Ted Yoho, R-Gainesville, announced he is an original co-sponsor of the Farmers and Ranchers Minimizing Estate Regulations Act, or FARMER Act, a bill that will grant some relief to farm families when they are dealing with a death.

The act, introduced by Rep. Austin Scott, R-Ga., creates a new method of evaluation for generational farms and their owners when the farm's taxpayer dies.

When the estate tax — also known as the "death tax" by some conservatives — is collected on the farm, current regulations allow for the farm's

Teachers unions sue state over evaluations

TALLAHASSEE — Teachers unions on Tuesday sued the state and three local school boards over performance evaluations that grade Florida's teachers on subjects and students they don't teach, which they called "arbitrary, irrational and unfair."

The suit, backed by the National Education Association and Florida Education Association, includes seven teachers from around the state as plaintiffs. The case was filed in federal court in Gainesville.

The complaint challenges the Student Success Act passed in 2011, claiming its evaluation system,

WASHINGTON (AP) — Alicia Keys says she wants to spark a global conversation about HIV, the virus that causes AIDS.

The Grammy Award-winning singer met with women who are part of an HIV program at United Medical Center in the nation's capital Monday to discuss their experiences with the virus, including the fear and stigma associated with the

disease.

Keys, who has also traveled to Africa and India to meet with women who have HIV, said she felt connected to the women there and here because "they looked like they could be my sister, or they could be my aunt, or they could be my cousin."

And now, she said, she wants to "bridge" the gap between domestic and international conversations about the virus.

Keys is working with the Kaiser Family Foundation for "Empowered," a campaign launched last month to educate women about HIV and provide grants to community-based projects that will do that.

Gambling study to cost \$400,000

TALLAHASSEE — The Florida Legislature is spending nearly \$400,000 for a New Jersey company to do a comprehensive study on gambling.

Legislative leaders have signed a contract with Spectrum Gaming Group to provide two detailed reports in July and October. The company will also rely on professors in Harvard and the University of Florida to help out.

The expensive study could be critical in determining what steps Florida takes in the next year regarding gambling. The Legislature last year rejected bills that would have authorized large resort casinos in South Florida.

This year legislators approved a measure that shut down storefront gambling operations known as Internet cafes in the wake of an ongoing scandal.

Florida also has a compact with The Seminole Tribe of Florida that gives the tribe exclusive gambling rights.

Texting ban passes Senate

TALLAHASSEE — Texting while driving could soon be illegal in Florida.

The Senate unanimously approved a bill (SB 52) Tuesday that would make texting while driving a secondary offense. That means police have to first stop drivers for an offense like speeding.

A first violation would be a \$30 fine plus court costs. A second or subsequent violation within five years would add three points to the driver's license and a \$60 fine.

Republican Sen. Nancy Detert said this is the fourth year she has sponsored a texting ban bill and that Florida is now one of only five states without a ban.

Detert told senators the bill will save lives, adding, "It's become an epidemic. It needs to stop and this is the way to stop it."

FAMU hazing plea entered

ORLANDO — A third band member charged with the hazing death of a Florida A&M drum major pleaded no contest Tuesday and agreed to testify against the remaining 11 defendants.

Caleb Jackson, 24, pleaded no contest to manslaughter and felony hazing. By pleading no contest, Jackson does not admit guilt but acknowledges prosecutors have enough evidence to convict him.

Jackson will be sentenced in the fall after giving testimony to prosecutors about what happened to drum major Robert Champion as he walked down a gauntlet of other band members who beat him with fists and mallets on a bus parked outside an Orlando hotel in November 2011. Champion collapsed and later died.

Circuit Judge Marc Lubet warned Jackson that he could face a maximum of 35 years in prison if he changed his mind and didn't cooperate.

"If you fully cooperate and continue to work with the state ... you may very well come out pretty good," Lubet said. "If you don't, you may very well come out really bad."

Jackson answered only "yes, sir" and "no, sir" to a series of questions from the judge about whether

he was entering the plea without coercion and whether he was aware he will be able to appeal any sentence.

Twice deported man accused

JACKSONVILLE — A man who officials say has been deported twice from the United States is accused of killing the 18-year-old mother of his child.

Police in Jacksonville say 26-year-old Jose Valle was arrested Saturday at his sister's house in West Palm Beach. Two days earlier, 18-year-old Rosa Garcia was found strangled in the Jacksonville apartment she shared with Valle.

News reports said Garcia's body was found by another of Valle's sisters who lives in Jacksonville.

The news reports said Valle was deported from California in 2009 and from Texas in 2011.

Doctor sentenced in pill mill case





LAKE MARY — A doctor has been sentenced to 25 years in prison and fined \$500,000 for trafficking in oxycodone and morphine.

Attorney General Pam Bondi says the sentence was imposed Monday by a Seminole County judge on Dr. Ronald Lynch. Lynch had previously been convicted of the drug trafficking charges. He worked at Integrative Medicine in Lake Mary.

Bondi says authorities acted on a tip by Walgreens Pharmacy in 2011. Lynch was investigated for writing prescriptions using a revoked Drug Enforcement Administration number.

Hill Brannon graduated high school with Summerall, but the friendship reached back to elementary school.

In first grade, Summerall, Brannon and friends Sam Oosterhoudt Sr. and Jack Rountree caused so much mischief, there wasn't a second-grade teacher in Lake City that would take all four of them in the same class, Brannon said.

Rountree and Brannon stayed together, while Oosterhoudt and Summerall went to a different class. The four stayed close throughout high school, Brannon said.

Summerall taught middle school even after he graduated and was drafted into the NFL.

Summerall played 10 NFL seasons from 1952 to 1961 with the Chicago Cardinals and New York Giants, but it was in his second career that he became a voice familiar to generations of sports fans, not only those of the NFL.

Long before broadcasting Super Bowl games, 16 for television and 10 more for radio — in fact, before there was even a Super Bowl — Summerall played a role in what is known in football circles as "The Greatest Game Ever Played," the 1958 NFL

championship. The Giants lost to the Baltimore Colts 23-17 in the NFL's first-ever overtime game.

Multi-million dollar contracts were nonexistent when Summerall played in the NFL, and he returned to Lake City to teach middle school English.

"He had to do that to make a living," Kennon said. "It was an entire different world."

Kennon said Summerall didn't tolerate back talk or inattentiveness in the classroom.

One time, a student fell asleep in class. Summerall went over to the student's desk, picked up the desk — with the student still in it — and tossed student and desk out of the classroom.

"That really got some attention," Kennon said.

Tim Kirby, sports editor for the Lake City Reporter, said Summerall would come home after the NFL season and play in the Lake City fast-pitch softball league. Summerall would also be found golfing at the Lake City County Club or playing cards at the Elks Lodge.

"He was like a regular guy, even though he was a professional football player," Kirby said.

Kirby said even after he went on to be the famous

CBS broadcaster, he would speak at charity events in Lake City.

Glenn Hunter said Summerall always wanted to help.

"If he could find a way to help somebody we would do it," Hunter said.

Hunter said Summerall was instrumental to Hunter's success in business. Hunter managed Summerall's printing company more than 25 years ago.

One day, Summerall walked in with paperwork in hand. Summerall told Hunter that Hunter was going to buy the business.

"He told me, 'I'm going to make you an offer you can't refuse,'" Hunter said.

Kennon's mother and Summerall's mother were sisters, Kennon said. When they were both still girls, and neither Kennon nor Summerall was born, the two decided the first child either one had would be named Mike and the next would be Pat.

Well, on Kennon's birth certificate it says Floyd L. Kennon, and on Summerall's birth certificate it says George Allen Summerall Jr. No one knows Floyd or George, Kennon said.

But everyone knew Pat.

17 victims listed in critical condition.

Heightening jitters in Washington, where security already had been tightened after the bombing, a letter addressed to a senator and poisoned with ricin or a similarly toxic substance was intercepted at a mail facility outside the capital, lawmakers said.

There was no immediate indication the episode was related to the Boston attack. Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid said the letter was sent to Republican Sen. Roger Wicker of Mississippi.

Officials found that the bombs in Boston consisted of explosives put in ordinary, 1.6-gallon pressure

cookers, one with shards of metal and ball bearings, the other with nails, according to a person close to the investigation who spoke on condition of anonymity because the probe was still going on.

Both bombs were stuffed into black duffel bags and left on the ground, the person said.

Sal Napoli, owner of the Player's Club Seafood Bar and Grill, 2888 W. U.S. 90, said a conservative estimate on the impact of lifting the ban would be an additional 60 hours of employment his business could provide to workers, according to the survey.

Steve Godevas, a manager at Gondolier Italian Restaurant and Pizza, said the inability to sell liquor on Sundays costs the restaurant between 2 percent and 5 percent in total monthly sales. The restaurant, at 2281 W. U.S. 90, is close

to Interstate 75, and the manager said the restaurant would attract more customers on Sunday if it could sell liquor.

Lifting of the ban on Sunday liquor sales would result in Gondolier hiring additional bartenders and servers to meet increased sales demand, the memo said.

Brian Bickel, an owner of Texas Roadhouse, 3039 W. U.S. 90, said changing the ordinance to allow for Sunday liquor sales would result in an increase of about \$400 a week, and

the change would create between 40 and 80 hours of extra work for employees, according to the memo.

Bickel said the current loss of business is related to the "sports bar crowd" that goes to Gainesville because since alcohol sales are not allowed in the county, the memo said.

Another public hearing on changing the hours that alcohol can be sold is scheduled for the May 2 county commission meeting. That hearing will discuss extending the hours alcohol can be sold from 1 a.m. to 2 a.m.

partly based on scores from the high-stakes Florida Comprehensive Assessment Test, violates teachers' constitutional rights of due process and equal protection of laws. The evaluations are used to set performance-based salary schedules.

"None of the plaintiffs teaches math or reading in the grades that the FCAT is given," said Andy Ford, the Florida Education Association president. "This lawsuit highlights the absurdity of the current evaluation system."

In a statement, Florida

Education Commissioner Tony Bennett noted that current bills before the Legislature "would make improvements to the Student Success Act, including ensuring that teachers are evaluated only on the students and subjects they teach."

taxes to be based on the commercial value, such as how the property could be developed.

However, the bill Yoho supports would determine the land value based on its agricultural productivity or how the land is used. When the land is valued commercially, it pushes the tax rate up, said Kelley McNabb, public information officer for Yoho.

"Family farming is part of America's heritage, and it must be part of America's future," Yoho said. "Farmers live with the uncertainty of the weather, the economy, and, unfortunately, our tax code. This bill allows our high-producing farming and ranching families to carry on their legacy of feeding America."

According to McNabb,

agriculture is Florida's second largest industry, and part of goal behind the FARMER Act is to keep farms in business.

"It's a forward-looking bill," she said.

There is currently a plan in place to establish a permanent exemption indexed for inflation, but set at \$5.25 million for this year. After the set dollar amount, the

remainder of the estate is levied at 40 percent. Farmers may cap productivity to avoid potentially crossing over the exemption amount, McNabb said.

The FARMER Act also would raise the exemption to \$7 million.

Yoho doesn't want to see Columbia County farmers worried about overproducing, she said.

VA report dodges invasion of privacy

Most health care providers respect their obligation to respect the privacy of their patients. Then there is the Department of Veterans Affairs. That agency's inspector general played team ball recently by clearing Tampa's James A. Haley VA Medical Center of wrongdoing for placing a camera disguised as a smoke detector in the room of a brain-damaged veteran without telling his family. This is a clear violation of ethics even for an obtuse bureaucracy with no real sense of accountability. Congress should demand some answers.

A report by the VA inspector general released last week said the camera was "reasonable" because Haley officials suspected the family might have interfered with the nursing care provided to 81-year-old James Carnegie. That conclusion is not supported by the facts. Haley did not monitor the feed in real time. The arrangement was so sloppy that nearly a week's worth of video from the monthlong recording period was lost on the hard drive. And Haley did not instruct the staff what to do in the event a medical emergency showed up on the video. So how exactly could the monitor have contributed to patient care?

If the purpose was patient care, why did Haley decide to conceal the camera under false pretenses in the first place, then mislead the public by falsely claiming that the family had authorized the camera and that the video feed was not being recorded? The inspector general's office, in its report, tries to sidestep these questions by dancing around the chronology. "The patient's family was aware of the camera when it was activated" in June 2012, the report wrote. But so what? The family was "aware" because it was irate after being told about the camera by a maintenance worker and was threatening to call a lawyer. The point is not that the family was "aware" but that the camera was installed without its knowledge and consent and that the videotaping occurred over the family's protests.

Haley declined to comment on the report. That may be just as well, given that its conflicting stories on the case have destroyed its credibility. That's why agencies have an inspector general, but in this case the in-house watchdog helped whitewash the trouble. The report noted that hidden cameras have been used by the VA in the past when criminal activity was suspected. Yet no crimes were alleged here.

This report is nothing more than a drive-by attempt to bury a scandal and paint the family as such a pain to the staff that it warranted violating the patient's privacy. Sen. Bill Nelson and other members of Congress who have expressed concerns about the case should demand that the VA come back and offer serious answers.


The 'Jackie Robinson' of Big Ten basketball

The new Jackie Robinson biopic "42" serves to remind us that there was a time not long ago when black athletes faced the most horrific, demeaning experiences in their determination to overcome the senseless prejudice that pervaded American sports at nearly all levels.

For youngsters today used to African-American superstars, it must be hard to believe decisions once were made to exclude some of the greatest talent available based simply on their race. Fortunately, there were among those who run baseball, and for that matter other sports, people who regarded this travesty as not only an injustice but also a stupid business model.

Branch Rickey, general manager of the Brooklyn Dodgers, certainly was preeminent among those, gambling that the pervasive racism that had marred his sport — which, by the way, had been aided and abetted by baseball commissioner Kennesaw Mountain Landis — could be overcome quickly with the inevitable success of the right player. Nothing trumps base motives quicker than winning. Rickey decided on Robinson, an educated young man who was multitalented in several sports and who had the character and toughness to survive.

But the same commitments were making their way to the forefront of other sports about the same time. Major college basketball in 1947, when Rickey and Robinson were assaulting the unfair policies of the national pastime, was nearly as white as baseball. The Big Ten, a citadel of basketball, had not one single black on its teams. No one among the league's athletic directors or coaches or presidents was

willing to challenge an unspoken agreement to keep it that way. That is, until a bright young man with many of the same qualities as Robinson appeared on the scene.

William Leon Garrett had led his southern Indiana high school to the coveted state basketball championship, become Mr. Basketball of Indiana (one of the first) and was a talented high hurdler and baseball player. Most important, perhaps, Garrett was an excellent student who had shown the capacity to deal with the racial taunts, slurs and injustices that often greeted him by just making opponents pay with losses. Indiana University President Herman Wells and his noted coach, Branch McCracken, encouraged by insurance genius Nate Kaufman, decided the time had come to break the barrier.

So at the beginning of the 1948-49 season, Garrett trotted onto the floor of the IU field house to become the "Jackie Robinson" of Big Ten basketball and about the only player of his race among the major conferences.

He was greeted by catcalls and other forms of derision, and some fans threw corn on the floor as a sign of their feelings. That was followed by southern schools' refusal to play the Hoosiers and slights up and down the basketball landscape, including hotel and other accommodations when traveling — all handled

by Garrett with a grace his detractors didn't possess.

But Rickey's predictions had been correct about the impact of success. Three years after Garrett's first game — and after he'd been recognized with all-Big Ten and the ultimate all-American honors — the shortest center in the league had become the biggest man on the floor wherever he played. The most important recognition came in his final game at home. He received a standing ovation that lasted a full 12 minutes. The officiating team halted the game because the din was so thunderous the whistle couldn't be heard. He was the third black drafted by the NBA, but Uncle Sam's draft interfered.

It took very little time after Garrett for African-American youngsters to begin playing for the Big Ten schools. Other major leagues and schools were slower to react. But just as in baseball, the wall had been breached. You can read about this in Tom Graham and Rachel Graham Cody's 2006 book, "Getting Open."

All this is hard to imagine, given the nature of today's athletics, especially basketball, which African-Americans so thoroughly dominate. But the games and players we admire are not truly the thing. It's the legacy the pioneers like Garrett and Robinson left us all — the sense of rightness.

During the recent NCAA tournament, a new class was named for the national Basketball Hall of Fame in Springfield, Mass. Once again, Garrett has been overlooked. It seems 1948 has come full circle. Indiana University should do something about that.

Time to think about Joe v. Hillary

In a saner world, April 2013 would be way too early to talk about an election that isn't to take place until November 2016. But this is America, and we've never let common sense or lack of actual facts stop us from juicy political speculation.

Normally in a two-term presidency, the line of succession would be quite clear: It would be the vice president, especially if, as with Joe Biden, the No. 2 had been hard-working and willing to undertake difficult and sensitive political missions. His boisterous personality has made up for the more aloof, restrained President Barack Obama. It's felt that the departing president owes the vice president his active support, although it seems to be more honored in the breach: Clinton-Gore, Johnson-Humphrey, Eisenhower-Nixon.

However, if you put any stock in the polls and if you're talking about an event that's still more than three years off, the heir apparent is not Biden. It is Hillary Clinton.

Both Biden and Clinton are typically noncommittal about 2016: too soon to even think about it, no plans

to run; we'll talk about it when the time comes. These are the usual political disclaimers that no one believes. New Jersey Gov. Chris Christie, in response to whether he would run in 2012, said, "What do I gotta do, kill myself to show you that I don't want to do this?" And the next question was: What about 2016?

Vice President Biden has all the advantages of incumbency, including Air Force Two and the freedom to draw up a speaking schedule that will take him anywhere he wants to go.

Clinton is a free agent now that she has resigned as perhaps the United States' best-known and most traveled secretary of state, a job she took after finishing second

to Obama in the 2008 presidential race. She proved loyal and indefatigable in that job, much like Biden as veep.

Clinton has the advantage of retaining the loyalty of her 2008 campaign team and its formidable fund-raising apparatus. And she has her husband, former President Bill Clinton, who when he is good is very, very good and but with the occasional lamentable tendency to occasionally run off the rails.

An early test will come in Virginia's 2013 gubernatorial election when the Clintons' longtime friend, fundraiser and adviser, in a campaign loaded with former Clintonites, faces off against the state's extremely conservative attorney general.

The Hillary camp cautions that this is not a training camp for 2016 and that the press should not read anything into the results or draw conclusions about the Democratic presidential races. But of course they will. And unlike now they'll have something to go on.

'Voice of football' set standard for sportscasters

Summerall style admired by other broadcasters.

DALLAS — Pat Summerall was the calm alongside John Madden's storm.

Over four decades, Summerall described some of the biggest games in America in his deep, resonant voice. Simple, spare, he delivered the details on 16 Super Bowls, the Masters and the U.S. Open tennis tournament with a simple, understated style that was the perfect complement for the "booms!" and "bangs!" of Madden, his football partner for the last half of the NFL player-turned-broadcaster's career.

Summerall died Tuesday at age 82 of cardiac arrest, said University of Texas Southwestern Medical Center spokesman Jeff Carlton, speaking on behalf of Summerall's wife, Cheri. "Pat was my broadcast-

ing partner for a long time, but more than that he was my friend for all of these years," Madden said in a statement. "Pat Summerall is the voice of football and

always will be."

His final play-by-play words beside Madden were succinct, of course, as he called the game-ending field goal of the Super

Bowl for Fox on Feb. 3, 2002, when New England beat St. Louis 20-17.

"It's right down the pipe. Adam Vinatieri. No time on the clock. And the Patriots

have won Super Bowl XXXVI. Unbelievable," Summerall said.

Sparse, exciting, perfect. A flawless summation without distracting from the reaction viewers could see on the screen.

At the end of their final broadcast together, Madden described Summerall as "a treasure" and the "spirit of the National Football League" in a tribute to the partner that complemented the boisterous former Oakland Raiders coach so well.

As former teammate and broadcaster Frank Gifford put it in an accompanying video tribute: "America is very comfortable with Pat Summerall."

Summerall played 10 NFL seasons from 1952 to 1961 with the Chicago Cardinals and New York Giants, but it was in his second career that he became a voice familiar to generations of sports fans, not only those of the NFL.

"Pat was a friend of nearly 40 years," CBS Sports broadcaster Verne Lundquist said. "He was a

master of restraint in his commentary, an example for all of us. He was also one of the great storytellers who ever spoke into a microphone."

Summerall started doing NFL games for CBS in 1964, and became a play-by-play guy 10 years later. He was also part of coverage of the PGA Tour, including the Masters from 1968-94, and U.S. Open tennis.

When CBS lost its NFL deal after the 1993 season, Summerall switched to Fox to keep calling NFL games with Madden. Summerall had hoped to keep working with CBS for other events like the Masters, but network executives saw it otherwise. At the time, CBS Sports anchor Jim Nantz said he was "very saddened" that Summerall didn't get to leave CBS under his own terms.

"Pat Summerall was a hero to me," Nantz said Tuesday. "I treasured the gift of friendship that I had with him."

As of press time, funeral arrangements had not been announced.

Police: Carjacking try suspect claims TV stars told him to do it

A Lake City man was arrested Sunday night after he allegedly tried to get into a woman's car while she was stopped at a red light. The man reportedly told police he thought the stars from the A&E reality series "Storage Wars" told him to get into the car.

Michael Vincent Conley, 43, 141 SE Sprig Court, was charged with attempted carjacking without a firearm or weapon. He was booked into the Columbia County Detention Facility in lieu of \$25,000 bond.

According to Lake City Police Department reports, about 11:42 p.m. Sunday, officers were dispatched to the area of U.S. 90 and Bascom Norris Drive in reference to a suspicious person who was trying to enter a woman's vehicle.

Officer Staci Brownfield reported that when she arrived at the scene, she found Conley hiding behind

the traffic signal box on the northwest side of the intersection.

Brownfield reported, "Conley was sweating profusely and appeared to be under the influence of some form of narcotic. Mr. Conley's hands were shaking, (he) had a visible rapid pulse in his neck along with constricted pupils."

Emergency medical personnel were called to evaluate Conley and he was medically cleared.

The victim told authorities while she was sitting in her vehicle at the intersection of U.S. 90 and Bascom Norris waiting to turn, and she saw Conley run from the area of Tire Mart across U.S. 90.

She said he approached her car and repeatedly tried to open both doors on the passenger side of the vehicle. The woman told

police she was in fear for her life and property, and she called 911 for help and screamed at Conley to stop and leave her alone.

She said he fled across U.S. 90 and she kept an eye on him until police arrived.

When authorities interviewed Conley, he reportedly told them he thought the stars from the A&E reality series "Storage Wars," Brandi Passante and Jarrod Schulz, were trying to pick him up after losing them in traffic.

Conley told police he parked his vehicle at Tire Mart and thought he heard Passante yelling for him to get into the car. Conley told Brownfield he met the two reality stars about 10 a.m. that day while he was walking outside his mobile home park. He said he was hired by the two to unload a storage shed and to help them open up thrift shop.

Police were unable to verify Passante and Schulz had a working relationship with Conley.

Elections supervisor penalties in bill

TALLAHASSEE — Elections supervisors would be called out by the secretary of state for not doing their jobs and have a portion of their pay docked under a provision added to an elections bill Tuesday.

The Senate made several changes to an elections bill the House passed on the first day of the legislative session, including language that would allow the secretary of state to send a notice of non-compliance to elections supervisors if they don't report results on time or fail to follow other legal requirements.

Elections supervisors could also have \$2,000 in special qualification pay withheld.

The amendment was proposed by Republican Sen. Miguel Diaz de la Portilla of Miami, who has criticized the way his county's election supervisor, Penelope

Townsley, handled the 2012 election. Miami-Dade County had early voting lines as long as five hours and the last ballots weren't cast on Election Day until more than six hours after polls closed.

"It's not about removal from office, only the governor can do that," Diaz de la Portilla said. "All this does is it allows the secretary of state to have perhaps a little bit more clout in dealing with the supervisors."

But Democrats criticized the idea. Sen. Darren Soto, D-Kissimmee, said Diaz de la Portilla came up with the proposal out of frustration for his local supervisor and that the rest of the state shouldn't be punished.

Others disapproved of allowing an official appointed by the governor to be able to punish an official who has been elected by citizens. Of Florida's 67 counties, only Miami-Dade has an appointed elections supervisor.

Overhaul could overwhelm addiction services

230K Floridians could be eligible starting in 2014.

MIAMI — More than 230,000 Floridians would be newly eligible for substance abuse treatment under the federal health overhaul and that number nearly doubles if the state also expands Medicaid, according to research by The Associated Press. While experts are encouraged by the increased access to services, some worry the demand will burden an already strapped industry.

"There's going to be a period of stress but in no way does it deter us from fully supporting the full expansion," said Bob Sharpe, president of the Florida Council for Community Mental Health.

Currently only 1 cent of every health care dollar in the United States goes toward addiction, and few alcoholics and drug addicts receive treatment. Many experts say one of the biggest barriers has been a lack of health insurance, but that will change under the Affordable Care Act and more Floridians will likely get coverage through some type of alternative to Medicaid expansion and tens of thousands may be eligible for federal subsidies to purchase their own private insurance through the state's online health

exchange in less than a year.

More than 1.3 million Floridians, or 9 percent of the state population, need substance abuse treatment, although only about 112,000 are actually receiving that help. But 231,392 Floridians could get treatment under the federal health law and more than 408,000 could get treatment if the state opts for some type of Medicaid expansion, according to an AP analysis of government data.

Florida lawmakers are still deciding how they will implement the federal health law. Legislators

have shot down any plans that would expand straight Medicaid coverage, but a proposal is gaining traction in the Senate that would use tens of billions of federal dollars to give roughly 1.1 million residents vouchers to purchase private insurance.

However, Republican House leaders have been adamant about not accepting funds tied to the Affordable Care Act and have proposed a less ambitious plan that would cover about 115,000 residents using state money.

That uncertainty has made it difficult for substance abuse and mental

health officials to take action and make decisions about issues like how many new beds they might need. Roughly 95 percent of the 7,000 beds at Florida substance abuse facilities are occupied, according to AP's research.

Instead, substance abuse facilities are still mostly in the planning phase, said Sharpe.

"They're not out there hiring new professionals, they don't have new sites being developed but they know it's a real problem if these things come to pass," he said.

Part of their efforts will include ramping up recruit-

ment for workers, including going after professionals who have moved into other industries and retaining workers who are contemplating retirement.

The industry has a high turnover rate and struggles to pay competitive salaries, but Sharpe said he hoped the new health law and funding streams will allow agencies to adjust salaries so they can retain more experienced staff.

"In Florida, we've had sort of a rolling crisis for years in terms of uninsured folks with substance abuse issues or mental health treatment. There really isn't sufficient money in the system to treat folks as comprehensively as would be helpful," said Dr. Jay Reeve, the CEO of the Apalachee Center in Tallahassee, which provides substance abuse and mental health treatment to about 6,000 people a year in eight counties, including many rural areas.

Regardless of what path the state chooses to use in implementing the Affordable Care Act, Reeve says it will only help the system.

He doesn't predict an influx of new patients in the system, arguing that the state is already treating many of them through various community and welfare programs. Experts say the new system will push addiction treatment from being marginal part of the health care system out of church basements and into the mainstream of medical care.

Reeve hopes for a dramatic change in the type

of treatment paid for by Medicaid or private insurers, which he said both only cover "a fairly narrow range of services."

It has been six decades since doctors concluded that addiction was a disease that could be treated, but today the condition still dwells on the fringes of the medical community. Professionals say they welcome the chance to treat more individuals, but worry the Medicaid and private insurers haven't caught up with science of addiction and often aren't willing to pay comprehensive services.

"One of the great challenges that I think Florida faces with this is that we've always had some trouble as a state taking addiction seriously as medical illness," said Reeve.

Addiction, like mental illness, requires so-called "wrap-around services" that don't just treat the addiction, but deal with a host of other issues that may include everything from psychiatric care to education and job training. But if insurers don't expand the services they are willing to pay for, experts worry some addicts will only get bare bone services or none at all.

"Otherwise a whole lot of folks receiving substance abuse treatment now are just going to fall through the cracks," said Reeve. "If they don't fit into the right pool there's not going to be any more money to treat them unless we don't start recognizing that we're talking about a serious medical illness here."

Lawmakers say FDA fell short in policing pharmacy

Agency says its policing power is too unclear.

WASHINGTON — House lawmakers said Tuesday that the Food and Drug Administration had numerous opportunities over nearly a decade to stop the Massachusetts pharmacy responsible for a deadly meningitis outbreak that has killed more than 50 Americans.

Republicans and Democrats took turns chastising the FDA for not being aggressive enough in going after compounding pharmacies like the New England Compounding Center, the specialty pharmacy which produced tainted pain injections that have sickened more than 700 people and killed 53 others.

In the second hearing on the outbreak, FDA Commissioner Margaret Hamburg reiterated that her agency needs clearer authority to go after compounding pharmacies, which have challenged the FDA's authority in court since the 1990s.

Hamburg said her agency is working to crack down on compounding pharmacies, despite legal challenges.

"I wish we had been more aggressive, and I can assure you that we are being more aggressive now," Hamburg told lawmakers.

The wave of fungal meningitis infections was first identified in September and grew into one of the deadliest medication-related outbreaks in U.S. history. The NECC halted operations in October and faces over 100 lawsuits in federal court.

But more than half a year later, lawmakers in Washington continue to debate who should be held accountable for the out-

break and whether it could have been prevented.

Republicans said Tuesday that the FDA should have shut down the NECC based on complaints from doctors, patients, hospitals and state pharmacy regulators. The FDA first inspected the NECC in 2002 and issued a warning letter in 2006 over the pharmacy's production of copies of manufactured drugs without patient prescriptions. Between 2007 and 2012 the FDA continued to receive complaints about the company from anonymous whistleblowers and state pharmacy regulators, according to internal documents released by the committee.

"Ten years of warning signs, alarm bells, and flashing red lights were deliberately ignored," said Rep. Tim Murphy, R-Pa., who chairs the House Energy and Commerce Subcommittee on Oversight and Investigations. Murphy and other Republicans pointed to correspondence in thousands of pages of FDA documents turned

over to the committee.

Democrats agreed that the FDA should have been more aggressive, but also supported the agency's

argument that outdated laws and conflicting court decisions have hamstrung federal efforts at policing pharmacies.

"These documents show us that the FDA has been grappling with a law that is broken, and we need to help fix that law and keep the American public safe," said Rep. Diana DeGette, D-Colo., the subcommittee's ranking member.

Compounding pharmacies mix customized medications based on doctors' prescriptions, and have traditionally been overseen by state pharmacy boards. But in recent years, the FDA has tried to police larger compounders like the NECC, which operate more like manufacturers by mass producing drugs and shipping them across state lines.

Last week the FDA completed a wave of inspections targeting about 30 compounding pharmacies with a history of complaints or problems. Inspectors reported finding a host of potential safety hazards, including rust and mold in supposedly sterile rooms.

Republicans charged that this "flurry of well-publicized activity" only proves

that FDA has the ability to shut down pharmacies like the NECC.

"No law has changed. The only change is the FDA decided to act," Murphy said.

Republicans pressured Hamburg to explain a 2011 FDA decision to suspend routine inspections of compounding pharmacies, including the NECC. Hamburg said agency lawyers recommended the halt in enforcement due to legal questions about the agency's authority to police compounding pharmacies. Hamburg told lawmakers she was unaware of the policy at the time.

"I regret that I was not more fully aware," Hamburg said.

Congressional Democrats acknowledged that the FDA did not act quickly enough, but placed the blame on a complicated legal landscape.

Rep. Henry Waxman, D-Calif., and other Democrats said Congress should pass be working to clarify FDA's authority.



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UN puts spotlight on 'stunted' kids

Malnutrition affects 1 in 4 kids across the world.

DUBLIN — The United Nations Children's Fund says more than a quarter of children under the age of 5 worldwide are permanently "stunted" from malnutrition, leaving them physically and intellectually weak and representing a scandalous waste of human potential.

Anthony Lake, executive director of UNICEF since 2010, said organized provision of vitamins and clean water and a focus from birth on breastfeeding could have helped these 165 million children achieve normal brain and body development. But their lack of proper nutrition means instead they will suffer increased vulnerability to illness and early death.

"Stunting is the least understood, least recognized and least acted upon crisis. It is a hidden crisis for these children," said Lake, a veteran U.S. diplomat who was national security adviser to President Bill Clinton in the 1990s.

Lake said the failure to give children enough Vitamin A, iron and folic acid when developing in the womb, and a balanced

diet with clean drinking water in the first 2 years of life, doomed most of them to being anchors on their impoverished societies.

"Stunted doesn't mean simply short," Lake told The Associated Press in an interview. "The child's brain never properly develops. Irrevocably. That's it. You can't fix it later. You can fix being underweight. You can't fix being stunted after age 2."

Lake was in Dublin to unveil the findings in a

report at a global conference focused on combating hunger and malnutrition. He showed slides of CAT scans of stunted children's brains, with weaker cell and nerve development.

"What this means is, for the remainder of that child's life, irrevocably the child will learn less in school, will earn less later, is more vulnerable to disease," he said. "This is a tragic violation of that child's life, but it's also a tremendous strain on that society."

The U.N. report found that 24 countries with the highest levels of stunted children were concentrated in sub-Saharan Africa and South Asia. More than half of those under age 5 in Timor-Leste, Burundi, Niger and Madagascar suffered from stunting. The country with the largest number of stunted children was India with 61.7 million, or 48 percent of all Indians under age 5.

Lake said the problem of stunted child develop-

ment was growing in Syria because of its civil war and widespread disruption to medical care, schools and family life. Even before the onset of war, the report found, Syria's stunting rate for its children was 28 percent.

When asked what part of the world most needed attention, Lake said he could offer only "a sad litany of how many spots there are."

But he said in every country where stunting was identified as a major

problem, UNICEF officials were working with local aid agencies and the government. He said even Syria and North Korea permitted U.N. and local officials to distribute the water, vitamins and education to expectant mothers.

"I've never had any (country) push back," he said. "There's a natural reluctance among all governments to say: 'Yes we have a problem that we could have fixed quicker.' So you're always going to get a little bit of denial. But I've never heard of a country that said: 'No, we're not going to deal with it.'"

Lake noted that ensuring ideal growth during the key first 2 years of life didn't just mean eating a lot.

"People too often assume if you get enough food to eat, you're getting enough nutrition to head off malnutrition or stunting. The fact is you can eat lots of food and not get enough nutrients," he said, noting that India suffered no food shortages yet produced 38 percent of the world's stunted children.

He said women in the Third World particularly needed to focus on breast feeding for the child's first six months because exposing the child to local tainted water supplies could mean diarrhea, one of the greatest killers in poor countries.

New bird flu still puzzling

BEIJING — A new case of bird flu in China's capital, a 4-year-old boy who displayed no symptoms, is adding to the unknowns about the latest outbreak that has caused 63 confirmed cases and 14 deaths, health officials said Monday.

The boy, who tested positive for the H7N9 virus, is considered a carrier of the strain and has been placed under observation to see if he develops symptoms, health authorities said. Medical teams found the boy in a check of people who had contact with a 7-year-old girl, who was confirmed as Beijing's first case of H7N9 over the weekend: a neighbor of the boy bought chicken from the girl's family.

Beijing Health Bureau deputy director Zhong Dongpo said that, as puzzling as the case is, the boy adds another data point to medical experts' limited understanding of H7N9.

"This is very meaningful because it shows that the disease caused by this virus has a wide scope. It's not only limited to critical symptoms. There can also be slight cases, and even those who don't feel any abnormality at all. So we need to understand this disease in a rational and scientific way," Zhong said at a news briefing.

The H7N9 strain was not previously known to infect humans before cases turned up in China this winter, and Zhong and other medical experts said no evidence exists that the virus can be passed from one person to another. Close contact with infected birds is a likely source of transmis-

sion. Making the virus hard to detect is that infected poultry display slight or no symptoms, unlike the H5N1 strain which kills birds and raged across the region in the middle of the last decade.

The appearance of cases with mild or no symptoms in humans could make tracing even more difficult, but may also mean that many people infected do not get seriously ill and recover quickly, mak-

ing the virus is less deadly than it appears.

Most of the cases have occurred in eastern China. In recent days, with hospitals and health officials on alert, cases have turned up in Beijing and the populous central province of Henan. The confirmed death toll from the virus ticked up by one Monday, a 77-year-old woman in Jiangsu, while three more cases were confirmed.
