## County OKs city's withdrawal

Commissioners set Oct. 1 for ending city fire dispatching.

center effective Oct. 1 after the county commission approved the move at Thursday night's meeting. Also, Columbia County Fire Rescue will no longer respond to single-alarm fires inside Lake City's boundaries at the recommendation of city

fire officials. The commission approved city fire's removal from the county's Combined Communications Center, a dispatch center designed to bring all emergency dispatch together, after a string of emails between county and city officials,

capped by a letter to City Manager Wendell Johnson from County Manager Dale Williams.

Johnson wrote to county officials that recent conversations and general feedback left an impression that "there is little chance of collaboration for a successful combined communication system for all parties."

## Memorial to lost rangers dedicated

Family, coworkers salute two killed fighting forest fire.

Two river birch trees stand proudly in the front yard of the Suwannee Forestry Center, where they were recently planted living tributes to the two men who lost their lives battling the Blue Ribbon forest fire in 2011. Like guards at attention, they flank the new flagpole and memorial constructed to honor rangers Josh Burch and Brett Fulton.

Florida Forest Service firefighters and members of the Burch and Fulton families gathered Thursday at the forestry center

for the unveiling of the new structures and the dedication of a highway in their honor.

A stretch of State Road 6, from the Hamilton County line to Jasper, has been named Brett

Fulton and Josh Burch Memorial Highway by the state Legislature.

"Two years ago today, our world changed," said Sam LeNeave, center manager. "We miss — I miss — Brett. I miss Josh. There's not a day that goes by that I don't think about them. I put on my uniform, look around and I think: What if? Why?"

Florida Forest Service Director James Karels spoke about the dedication, service and sacrifice exhibited by both Burch and Fulton. They knew, Karels said, that when the fire alarm went off, they would respond to the call.

The Forest Service should honor their memory by providing safety to employees and to citizens.

"What we do is a dangerous job," LeNeave said. "The decisions we make and how we

## County tax rate will not go up

Commissioners vote to retain current millage.

The Columbia County Board of County Commissioners on Thursday set the maximum 2013-14 property tax rate at the same level as this year.

Property taxes in the county will be assessed at 8.0150 mills.

That would mean a homeowner with real estate worth \$100,000 pays \$801.50 in property taxes.

When the property tax rate is set, it can be decreased but not increased, County Manager Dale Williams said.

## Actor James Gandolfini dies in Italy

LOS ANGELES

James Gandolfini's lumbering, brutish mob boss with the tortured psyche will endure as one of TV's indelible characters. But his portrayal of criminal Tony Soprano in HBO's landmark drama series "The Sopranos" was just one facet of an actor who created a rich legacy of film and stage work in a life cut short.

Gandolfini, 51, who died Wednesday while vacationing in Rome, refused to be bound by his star-making role in the HBO series that brought him three Emmy Awards during its six-season run and helped change the landscape of television drama.

"He was a genius," said "Sopranos" creator David Chase. "Anyone who saw him even in the smallest of his performances knows that. He is one of the greatest actors of this or any time. A great deal of that genius resided in those sad eyes."

Dr. Claudio Modini, head of the emergency room at the Policlinic Umberto I hospital in Rome, said Gandolfini suffered a cardiac arrest and was pronounced dead at 11 p.m. Wednesday after resuscitation efforts in the ambulance and hospital failed.

Modini told The Associated Press that an autopsy would be performed starting 24 hours after the death, as required by law.

### Deen says she doesn't tolerate hate

SAVANNAH — Celebrity cook Paula Deen said while being questioned in a discrimination lawsuit that she has used racial slurs in the past but insisted she and her family do not tolerate prejudice.

The 66-year-old Food Network star and Savannah restaurant owner was

peppered with questions about her racial attitudes in a May 17 deposition by a lawyer for Lisa Jackson, a former manager of Uncle Bubba's Seafood and Oyster House. Deen and her brother, Bubba Hiers, own the restaurant. Jackson sued them last year, saying she was sexually harassed and worked in a hostile environment rife with innuendo and racial slurs.

According to a transcript of the deposition, filed Monday in U.S. District Court, an attorney for Jackson asked Deen if she has ever used the N-word.

"Yes, of course," Deen replied, though she added: "It's been a very long time."

"But that's just not a word that we use as time has gone on," Deen said. "Things have changed since the '60s in the South. And my children and my brother object to that word being used in any cruel or mean behavior. As well as I do."

William Franklin, Deen's attorney, said the celebrity was looking forward to her day in court.

"Contrary to media reports, Ms. Deen does not condone or find the use of racial epithets acceptable," he said in a statement.

Attorneys for Jackson did not immediately return phone calls Wednesday seeking comment.

### Zimmerman trial jury seated

SANFORD — A jury of six women, five of them white and the other a minority, was picked Thursday to decide the second-degree murder trial of George Zimmerman, a neighborhood watch volunteer who says he shot an unarmed black teenager, Trayvon Martin, in self-defense.

Prosecutors have said Zimmerman, 29, racially profiled the 17-year-old Martin as he walked back from a convenience store on Feb. 26, 2012, in the rain, wearing a dark hooded shirt. Zimmerman identifies himself as Hispanic.

The race and ethnicity of the minority chosen for the jury was not immediately available.

Prosecutors and defense attorneys chose the panel of six jurors after almost two weeks of jury selection. In Florida, 12 jurors are required only for criminal trials involving capital cases, when the death penalty is being considered.

Martin's shooting death and the initial decision not to charge Zimmerman led to public outrage and demonstrations around the nation, with some accusing Sanford police of failing to thoroughly investigate the shooting.

The six jurors were culled from a pool of 40 jury candidates who made it into a second round of jury questioning.

OCALA — A teenager texted her father and called 911 when three men broke into her southern Marion County home while she was home alone.

The 15-year-old girl was in her bedroom about 11

p.m. Tuesday when she heard the men rummaging around.

The Ocala Star-Banner reports the teen told Marion County Sheriff's deputies the men barged into her bedroom, pushed her and demanded jewelry and money. One of the men pointed a handgun at the girl's face.

About that time, the girl's father drove up and confronted the burglars. Deputies say the men ran out the front door, past the girl's mother who was still sitting in the car.

The father chased the men, who fired two shots at him.

### Jury recommends death sentence

DEFUNIAK SPRINGS — Jurors have recommended death for a Panhandle man convicted of killing a teenage Georgia girl on vacation with her family.

A Walton County jury voted 12-0 on Thursday that 23-year-old Steven Cozzie should die. A judge

will make the final decision. Cozzie was convicted last week of first-degree murder, sexual battery, aggravated child abuse and kidnapping.

Authorities say 15-year-old Courtney Wilkes was found dead in Seagrove Beach a day after she went missing in June 2011. She and her family had been visiting from Lyons, Ga.

The Northwest Florida Daily News reports that witnesses connected Cozzie to Wilkes, and he was arrested shortly after her body was found.

### Homeowner shoots invader


JACKSONVILLE — Police say a Jacksonville man fatally shot one of several men who tried to break into his home.

# GOP defectors help Dems. defeat federal farm bill

A day after Gov. Rick Scott urged Congress to let states impose work requirements on people who seek food assistance, the U.S. House killed a wide-ranging farm bill that would have included the proposal. The vote was 234-195 against the bill, with 62 Republicans voting no.

Scott on Wednesday sent a letter to House Speaker John Boehner expressing support for an amendment offered by U.S. Rep. Steve Southerland, R-Panama City. The governor indicated Florida would like to require people who seek assistance through the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) to show that they are actively searching for work, similar to a requirement in the state's unemployment assistance program.

"U.S. Rep. Southerland's proposal recognizes the need to reform long-running government assistance programs to ensure their availability for future generations while allowing states to modernize and tailor

their administration of these federal programs," Scott wrote. Southerland's amendment was approved along almost straight party lines Thursday before the overall bill died.

U.S. Rep. Ted Yoho, R-Gainesville, was critical of colleagues who sided with Democrats in defeating the bill.

"I am extremely disappointed that some of my Republican colleagues did not recognize a conservative movement toward market-based policy and solid welfare reform when they saw it," he said. "I am also disappointed that my Democratic colleagues refused to vote to protect the future of SNAP by cutting out egregious waste.

"Today is a sad day not just for the agricultural base of this country, but for every single American who expects and deserves certainty and security in their food source," Yoho said.

# Two teenagers charged with burglary of vehicle

A pair of Lake City teenagers were arrested Wednesday night after a woman allegedly chased them out of her car.

burglary charges in Putnam County.

Robert Duke Walker, 19, and John S. Thomas, 48, were booked into the Columbia County Detention Facility. Bond was set at \$120,000 each.

Thomas was charged with seven burglary counts and five counts of larceny. Walker was charged with six counts of burglary and six counts of larceny.

According to Columbia County Sheriff's Office reports, on Aug. 22, several residential burglaries were reported in the southern part of the county. The initial investigation indicated the same suspects were responsible for all the burglaries.

All the residences were close to each other and the burglaries were all reported within a short period of time, Deputy Todd Green wrote.

Also, the suspects used

the same method of entry at all of the residences — each residence was found with a front or rear door kicked open.

Then around 12:15 a.m. Aug. 23, deputies responded to 20316 U.S. Highway 441 in reference to a residential alarm. When they arrived, they found that the home's rear door had been kicked open.

Deputies secured the residence and later spoke to the homeowner, who told them nothing appeared to be missing.

On Aug. 27, Green learned of two suspects who were arrested in Marion County, identified as Walker and Thomas, who allegedly were involved in several residential burglaries.

approach them are huge. They were firefighters, and they loved doing that."

Hollis Burch, Josh Burch's father, wore a green-and-yellow bracelet to the memorial service. Across the band, it read, "Godspeed" and listed the tractor number of both Burch and Fulton.

"The accident occurred on June 20, and that was Josh's tractor number also," Hollis Burch said. "He's missed greatly, I know that... I deal with it every day. It's an everyday thing. During the summer, he loved to fish. During the winter, he loved to hunt. So I'm carrying on those traditions."

Molly Burch still hasn't been out to see the road dedicated to her son, but says she will when she's ready. For her, her grandchildren keep her going each day. Josh's sons, 7-year-old Jacob and 11-year-old Jeremy, talk

about their dad all the time, remembering what they did with him and who he was.

Josh Burch would have

celebrated his birthday next month, but instead the family will be releasing balloons at his graveside.

"It's been two years. You just take what you get that day and make the best of it," Molly Burch said. "He's all around me. He's always all around me."

Nancy Moseley, Fulton's mother, said people could look into her son's eyes and tell he was a good man. He loved the sun, to hunt and being outdoors.

"He believed in God," Moseley said. "While this selfish heart misses him, I know I'll see him again, and that helps."

Fulton had been married to his wife, Margaret, for 32 years after they met as teenagers on a CB radio chat. She continues her daily life by thinking about her children and grandchildren.

"It was like a nightmare," Margaret Fulton said. "It still is. Sometime when I get up in the morning, I think maybe it is a nightmare."

"The mayor and council have agreed that it is in the city's best interest for the city staff to move forward with independent dispatching services by the Lake City Dispatch Center for all our needs, to include fire dispatch," Johnson wrote.

Williams said in a memo to Johnson that he did not agree with many of his comments, but did find them insightful.

"Regardless, I regret that a true combined communication center was not achieved," Williams wrote.

County Commissioner Stephen Bailey called the loss of city fire from the county center "unfortunate."

"There's been a pile of money placed into the communications effort on behalf of the citizens of Columbia County," Bailey said. "... It's a shame that we have gotten to this point."

He said the communications center was on rocky ground from the beginning. In 2008, less than 30 days before city police dispatch was to be taken over by the county center, the city pulled out, Bailey said.

"And it has been a downhill spiral since then," he said. "... There's no other way to look at this than it's politically motivated for what the city is doing. Unfortunately, it's Columbia County residents who will be the ones who suffer from this."

Johnson said in a phone interview Thursday night that there was no political motivation behind the city's withdrawal from the county dispatch center.

"There's absolutely no political motivation from the city," Johnson said. "I share the same sentiments as the county manager. It's regretful that

it did not work out."

Commissioner Scarlet Frisina also regretted the loss of city fire.

"It is very sad that we are at the point where we are now," she said.

Commissioner Ron Williams said he doesn't understand why city and county officials couldn't work out their differences.

"If that's the path that our comrades on the other side of the aisle want to take, then I wish them the best of luck," he said. "But in the end, I believe, it's the citizens as a whole who lose, and that frustrates me with government."

The commission voted 5-0 to set Oct. 1 as the date when city fire will leave the combined center and when county Fire Rescue will no longer respond to single-alarm fires within city limits.

Reporter publisher. "We're honored to support the Chamber and be the title sponsor for the 10th straight year. We hope everyone will come out and celebrate freedom."

Decker said the children's area has been expanded for this year's event, offering more activities for the youngsters.

Other activities include games of Simon Says for the children with the adults in attendance.

"It's going to be a lot of fun things that we haven't been able to do in the past because of space restrictions," Decker said.

## Afghanistan's fraught transition

In a long-awaited milestone Tuesday, the U.S.-led NATO coalition forces formally turned over security in all 34 of Afghanistan's provinces to that nation's military and police units. The transition is fraught with uncertainty as Afghan President Hamid Karzai and the United States begin long-stalled peace talks with the Taliban. But after 12 long years of war and the combat deaths of more than 2,230 American service personnel, it is time for the Karzai administration to take responsibility and demonstrate it is capable of governing and protecting its citizens.

If numbers were the only guidepost in predicting success, Afghanistan's dramatic increase from having only 40,000 security personnel six years ago to 352,000 today would seem impressive. But when confronted by a committed Taliban, the motivation and training of the security forces — overseen by a notoriously corrupt government — remains an open question. It was not a hopeful sign that on the same day the security transfer occurred an insurgent assassination bomb attack killed three civilians.

By the end of 2014, 100,000 NATO coalition troops, including 66,000 American military personnel, are scheduled to leave Afghanistan. After so much personal and financial sacrifice for the United States, the withdrawal cannot come soon enough. Tuesday was an important day, as Karzai and his government assumed more responsibility for the future of Afghanistan. He does not have much time to demonstrate he is up to the job.

## Let's not argue!

Did you ever get ever get caught up in an argument? You may find yourself feeling trapped. You think you're right. You feel a need to win. You just can't let it go. You could end up saying harsh words that linger long after a silly little conflict. How about trying a better way?

What is arguing? An argument is a discussion with the purpose of convincing the other person that your way is right. (No, let's don't argue over the definition!)

Why do we feel a need to argue? Well, I don't think there are any good reasons. We usually end up with more negative feelings after we argue. We may be motivated by feelings of frustration, disappointment, sadness, resentment, jealousy, inadequacy, shame, or guilt. We may argue to get revenge, belittle, hurt, or triumph over someone. We may be looking for ways to boost our own self-esteem. If we don't resolve these bad feelings, they can turn into anger.

The way we handle the situation will depend on the relationship. Is the argument with an acquaintance, people in a work situation, or a close personal relationship? The way we handle the situation could build a positive, caring relationship, or make an enemy.

Depending on your goal for the outcome of the argument, it could go either way. If the relationship is important to you, and your goal is a happy life with growth, self-development and self-fulfillment, you'll want each person to feel a happy

successful outcome instead of bad feelings. Instead of arguing to win or to hurt another, or to force your own point of view, you can choose to see the situation as a challenge, and an opportunity to resolve your conflict in a positive way. Find the good side of the situation. Work on finding a solution that works for the good of both parties. Decide to have a friendly, cooperative, pleasant discussion. Lighten up. Create a "win/win" situation. What would be the best solution for all? Find a way for both parties to feel respected, appreciated, and good about themselves.

Psychologists theorize that we argue in order to achieve the feelings we think we'll have after the situation is over. Decide that you want yourself and the other person to feel happy, satisfied, cooperative, and positive about the relationship, instead of ending up with hurt feelings, resentment, frustration, guilt, or anger. Winning an argument is almost always clouded by bad feelings. Even when you win, your satisfaction will be contaminated with unpleasant feelings like guilt. Is it

worth winning an argument at such a cost to the other? Wouldn't it be better if both parties felt better?

Communicate an understanding and appreciation for the other's ideas and opinions. Keep your goal in mind: Find agreement, mutual satisfaction, and maintaining a good relationship. I always say "It's nice to be important (or right) but it's more important to be nice."

So, here are some easy ways to turn arguments into cooperative problem solving:

- Listen. Do you think that God gave us two ears and one mouth, so we can listen twice as much as we talk?
- Don't take it personally. Don't get defensive. It takes two to fight. Your friend will pick up on your attitude of respect and appreciation and respond.
- Focus on the issues that you can agree on, not on your differences.
- Aim at a better relationship, not on winning.
- Stop defending your side of the argument. Look for agreement.

See an argument as an opportunity. It's a chance to practice caring, respect and appreciation, and to develop skills in interpersonal relations and problem solving. It's another step towards building a happier life for yourself and those around you.

## Refugee camp a troubled oasis

The Zaatari refugee camp sprawls across the featureless, colorless desert of northern Jordan, six miles from the border with Syria, a country torn limb from limb by civil war. Among the camp's 120,000 residents, the conventional wisdom had long been the same as in Washington, D.C.: Surely, the fall of Syrian dictator Bashar al-Assad is inevitable and imminent; once that happens, the displaced can go home.

But on June 5, Hezbollah fighters from Lebanon defeated Syrian rebel forces in the strategic city of Qusayr. "Now, the refugees are saying, 'The rebellion is not succeeding, we can't return, we will have to stay.' Psychologically and practically, this is a significant change."

Telling me this is Kilian Kleinschmidt, a burly 50-year-old Berliner, employed by the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees as the camp's senior field coordinator — the "mayor," he half-jokes. We are sitting in Kleinschmidt's office, a metal, prefab "caravan." He is an old pro who has run refugee camps in tough corners of the world before: Pakistan, the Congo and Somalia among them.

"It was better even in Mogadishu," he says. "There, at

least, I knew who were my friends and who were my enemies. Here, it's a 10,000-piece puzzle. This is an unhappy place. And it's a very dangerous place. There are some bad people here and they are holding everyone else hostage."

Among those bad people: thieves, vandals, counterfeiters, rapists, drug traffickers, smugglers, youth gangs, "mafias" and "revolutionaries." As to the last category, Kleinschmidt says: "I'm not yet equipped to map out their ideologies." But he has seen the flags of both the Free Syrian Army and Jabhat al-Nusra, an al-Qaida affiliate.

Jordan's total population is only about 6.4 million, which means if Zaatari were a city it would be the country's fifth largest. In fact, it is increasingly taking on urban characteristics. There are now streets lined with stalls offering everything from rotisserie chicken to ice cream to clothes to home appliances....

Kleinschmidt tells me one can also find brothels and gambling dens.

Yet Kleinschmidt does not seem overwhelmed. On the contrary, he is remarkably cheerful, and justifiably proud of the job he's doing: establishing an oasis in the desert — a troubled oasis, to be sure, but one in which lives are being saved.

If the refugees can't return to Syria anytime soon, Kleinschmidt will do what he can to improve their lives here. Among other things, he wants to give residents some responsibility for governing themselves and securing their "neighborhoods." More of them also need to work, he says, so they don't become dependent and idle, a combination that breeds trouble.

It's anyone's guess when the fighting in Syria will end. President Barack Obama has now promised to send arms to the rebels. No one is confident that such assistance will be sufficient to alter the trajectory of the conflict. And if Assad should emerge victorious — with Iranian, Hezbollah and Russian support — he may not welcome the refugees back with open arms. It's likely that the situation will get worse before it gets better. It's not unlikely that it will get worse before it gets worse.

## Fulfilling three promises to Abraham

After the death of his father and at the age of seventy-five, Abraham left Haran to a land that God said He would show him. If Abraham would go to this land, then God promised two things to him. Once Abraham got to the land, God made a third promise to him.

The two promises God made to Abraham while he was still in Haran was: "I will make you a great nation" (Genesis 12:2). In the process of making a great nation out of Abraham, God would also "bless" Abraham, make Abraham's "name great," and Abraham would be a "blessing." The second promise would be that from Abraham's seed "all the families of the earth shall be blessed" (Genesis 12:3).

Once Abraham got to the land God wanted to show him,

God made a third promise to Abraham, namely: "To you and your descendants I will give this land" (Genesis 12:7). This land was to extend "from the river of Egypt as far as the great river, the river Euphrates" (Genesis 15:18). Abraham would die before this land was given to his descendants, but the fourth generation from Abraham would be given the land (Genesis 15:15-16).

Fulfilling these three promises to Abraham gives purpose to the Old Testament. The middle section of Genesis tells us how God gave Abraham a son, named Isaac, and how this son became the father of Jacob. The concluding section shows how Jacob and his family arrived in Egypt.

The book of Exodus records how this nation, composed of the descendants of Abraham, was being mistreated by the

Egyptian government and how they came out of Egypt, received a law from God at Mount Sinai and began their journey to the "promised land." The book of Numbers gives us a lot of details about this journey. The book of Deuteronomy records Moses encouraging the people to be faithful to God while they live in the "promised land."

The book of Joshua tells us of how they conquered the land.

The book of Judges tells of the early form of government the nation had. The books of First and Second Samuel along with First Kings and First Chronicles tells us of the nation when they were united under the kingship of Saul, David and Solomon. Under the reign of Solomon, this nation rose to its highest glory as well as occupying all the land that God had promised to this nation.

After the death of Solomon, the nation is divided into a northern nation, called Israel; and a southern nation, called Judah. The book of Second Kings tells of some of the activities of the kings of Israel while Second Chronicles tells of some of the activities of the kings of Judah. The Old Testament prophets tell of God's efforts to get the two nations to turn from their idolatry and come back to

Him.

The New Testament tells us of how Jesus is the seed of Abraham through whom "all the nations would be blessed" (Galatians 3:16). This fulfilled God's third promise to Abraham.

Some estimate it took approximately 1,800 years for God to fulfill these three promises to Abraham. Think of the talents of God which went into keeping all three of these promises.

The Bible gives us reasons why we can trust God's promise to give heaven to those who are faithful to Him. Only a living and active God could fulfill these three promises to Abraham.

I am dating a guy who says that he loves me and wants to marry me one day. We have been together for about 3 years on and off. When we are "on" we are arguing, when we are "off" he calls and says that he wants to be with me. We argue because he flirts with and goes out with other girls this hurts my feelings. He calls and says, "What does it matter, I only love you?" I feel like I love him too,

but when I forgive him and we start going out again, it starts all over again. What am I doing wrong?

**Dear Confused,**  
First of all, I want to congratulate you in recognizing that there is something wrong in this scenario. A disturbing trend that I see in dating these days is not only the inclination to stay in an unhealthy relationship, but also to continue in the same pattern of behavior and expect different results.

According to their book, "Boundaries in Dating," authors Townsend and Cloud share how healthy choices while dating grow healthy relationships. A few of the benefits of dating they describe are:

— Dating gives people the opportunity to learn about themselves, others and relationships in a safe context.

— Dating provides a context to work through issues.

— Dating helps build relationship skills.

Based on these three benefits, let's consider your dating situation. What have you learned about yourself in the past three years while dating this guy? What have you learned about him? One thing you mentioned is that your feelings are hurt when your guy goes out and flirts with other girls while saying he loves you. It seems that you have learned that your idea of love and commitment and his are not the same.

Another issue is that there seems to be no context to work

through issues. When you agree to forgive your guy and things take the same path over and over, nothing changes and nothing is resolved. The Bible warns us against being "unequally yoked." (2 Corinthians 6:14) While this scripture speaks to believers and nonbelievers, it also gives the picture of two animals trying to pull a heavy load without being in agreement as to which way to go. Working through issues should lead to a resolution where you both agree. It seems that your resolution would involve him no longer flirting or seeing other girls and commit only to you. However, that may not be what he desires. If his resolution includes continuing to flirt with and date other girls, (whether he says so or simply does it) you will need to decide if that is something you are willing to live with or if it is time to end the relationship.

One last consideration: Dating should help us build healthy relationship skills. However, if we develop a destructive pattern of behavior by continuing in an

unhealthy relationship, those are the skills we will possess and take with us into marriage. If you are unhappy and frustrated with the way things are now, marriage will only compound those feelings. I would encourage you to express to your guy your need for change in the relationship. Give him a picture of how you would like things to change and what you are willing to do to make that possible. If he is up to the challenge, perhaps you both can work through the struggle. If he isn't, maybe the change you need is to begin building new relationship skills with a new guy.

He is listed as a "Faith's Hall Of Famer" along with many others in Hebrews 11. He was just a shepherd boy, one of eight sons, and certainly not the most impressive, although he was "handsome." The prophet Samuel had been called to come to the house of Jesse and anoint a king for Israel — not because he had killed a lion and a bear while caring for his sheep, not because he was the youngest of the brothers, but I am convinced it was because of his faith.

Faith in God is an unusual and powerful

thing, for it places the focus on the ability not of self but on the Almighty.

The writer of the Book of Hebrews said, "Now faith is confidence in what we hope for and assurance about what we do not see" (Hebrews 11:1). There are many who laugh and scoff at this faith, claiming it to be nothing more than an emotional crutch for the weak and stupid. How wrong they are. The fact is "without faith it is impossible to please God, because anyone who comes to him must believe that he exists and that he rewards those who earnestly seek him" (Hebrews 11:6). David

had faith, not that he wasn't a confident person. But this is not what stands out in his life. He believed and trusted in God and was not ashamed to speak it.

From this faith came a very special psalm. One day he wrote "The Lord is my shepherd. I lack nothing. He makes me lie

down in green pastures, he leads me beside quiet waters, He refreshes my soul. He guides me along the right paths for his name's sake. Even though I walk through the darkest valley, I will fear no evil, for you are with me; your rod and your staff, they comfort me. You prepare a table before me in the presence of my enemies. You anoint my head with oil; my cup overflows. Surely your goodness and love will follow me all the days of my life, and I will dwell in the house of the Lord forever." (Psalm 23)

How then did David deal with the giant named

Goliath? Was there some strategy to outflank, or outrun this giant? Was David's plan to somehow distract so the Israelite soldiers could secretly attack? No. Did David just "believe" and the giant would fall? No. For you see, faith is an active, motivating dynamic of the Christian's life. It is what comes by hearing and accepting the word of God as authoritative (Romans 10:17). Without this one dynamic, the stones are just stones, baptism, is just getting wet.

David said to the Philistine, "I come against you in the name of the Lord Almighty, the God

of the armies of Israel, whom you have defied. This day the Lord will deliver you into my hands. The whole world will know that there is a God in Israel. All those gathered here will know that it is not by sword or spear that the Lord saves; for the battle is the Lord's, and he will give all of you into our hands."

# Christian group apologizes to gays

The head of a leading Christian ministry dedicated to helping gays repress their sexual urges through prayer has apologized to the gay community and says he now wants to devote his efforts to reconciliation.

Alan Chambers of Exodus International tells The Associated Press Thursday that the church has "waged the culture war, and it's time to put the weapons down."

He said Exodus — whose work infuriated may gay-rights activists — will be closing down. He and his allies will be forming a new ministry seeking to open a conversation among those who've been on opposite sides in the debate over gay rights.

He says they want "to see bridges built" and "want peace to be at the forefront of anything we do in the future."

Chambers, in a statement posted Thursday on Exodus International's website, said the group wants to apologize to the gay community "for years of undue suffering and judgment at the hands of the organization and the church as a whole."

Chambers also made an apology in a speech to his ministry's annual conference, saying, "We've hurt people."

Exodus International, which is based in Orlando, was founded 37 years ago and claimed 260 member ministries around the U.S. and internationally. For decades, it offered to help conflicted Christians rid themselves of unwanted homosexual inclinations through counseling and

prayer, infuriating gay rights activists in the process.

Exodus had seen its influence wane in recent years as mainstream associations representing psychiatrists and psychologists rejected its approach. However, the idea that gays could be "converted" to heterosexuality through prayer persists among some evangelicals and fundamentalists.

The announcement that Exodus would close was not a total surprise. Last year, Chambers — who is married to a woman but has spoken openly about his own sexual attraction to men — said he was trying to distance his ministry from the idea that gays' sexual orientation can be permanently changed or "cured."

In his statement Thursday, Chambers said the board of Exodus had decided to close it and form a new ministry, which he referred to as [reducefear.org](http://reducefear.org).

"Our goals are to reduce fear and come alongside churches to become safe, welcoming, and mutually transforming communities," he said.

Gay rights activists welcomed Chambers' apology, while reiterating their belief that Exodus had caused great damage.

"This is a welcome first step in honestly addressing the harm the organization and its leaders have caused," said Sharon Groves, director of the Human Rights Campaign's religion and faith program. "Now we need them to take the next step of leadership and persuade all other religious-based institutions that they got it wrong."

## Heat repeat as NBA champions

MIAMI — LeBron James had 37 points and 12 rebounds and the Miami Heat repeated as champions with a 95-88 victory over the San Antonio Spurs in Game 7 of the NBA Finals on Thursday night.

Dwyane Wade added 23 points and 10 rebounds and Shane Battier scored 18 points on 6-for-8 shooting from 3-point range for Miami. James made 5 of 10 3s, all the while hounding Spurs star Tony Parker on defense to make the Heat the first back-to-back champs since the Lakers in 2009-10.

Tim Duncan had 24 points and 12 rebounds for the Spurs, who were trying to become the first road team to win a finals Game 7 since Washington in 1978. Kawhi Leonard added 19 points and 16 rebounds.

Mario Chalmers scored 14 for Miami.

Parker had 10 points on 3-for-12 shooting and four assists, and Manu Ginobili scored 18 points for the Spurs. San Antonio lost for the first time in five finals appearances.

The Heat led just 72-

71 going into the fourth quarter after a buzzer-beating 3-pointer by Chalmers. Battier hit his fifth 3 of the night and Chalmers scored on a layup for a 79-75 lead with 7:30 to play, but the proud Spurs never faded.

The Spurs missed seven of their first 10 shots and turned the ball over five times in the first seven minutes of the fourth quarter, with the heart-breaking loss in Game 6 finally taking its toll.

Duncan's turnover led to Battier's sixth 3-pointer, a corner dagger that gave Miami an 88-82 lead with 3:21 to go. The delirious

Heat crowd leapt to its feet, sensing another Larry O'Brien trophy presentation in South Beach and they didn't sit down for the rest of a thrilling finish.

Leonard's 3 made it 90-88, but Duncan missed a putback and James knocked down a 19-foot jumper with 27.9 seconds to go, sealing the victory as the fans chanted along to the White Stripes' "Seven Nation Army," a trademark celebration at American Airlines Arena.

Confetti rained down the court, and James was surrounded by teammates and clicking cameras after a tour-de-force finish.

# Woods out with elbow injury until British Open

In little more than a month, Tiger Woods went from being tough to beat to having a tough time even playing.

Woods said Wednesday that soreness in his left elbow would keep him from defending his title next week in the AT&T National at Congressional, and that he would not compete again until the British Open next month at Muirfield.

This is the sixth straight year that injury has kept him from either playing a tournament or finishing one.

The culprit this time is a strain in his left elbow. The problem first became apparent during the opening round of the U.S. Open last week at Merion, when he was flexing his left wrist or dangling his arm behind his back after shots out of the thick, punishing rough.

"I was examined after I returned home from the U.S. Open, and the doctors determined I have a left elbow strain," Woods said on his website. "I have been advised to take a few

weeks off, rest and undergo treatment. I'll be ready to go for the British Open, and I'm looking forward to playing at Muirfield."

His injury is a blow to the AT&T National, which benefits the Tiger Woods Foundation. This will be the third time since it began in 2007 that Woods has missed the tournament because of injury — knee surgery in 2008, his left Achilles tendon in 2011 and an elbow injury this year.

"Any time you have Tiger in the field, it certainly adds to it a lot," tournament director Greg McLaughlin said. "But we have a very nice field this year and we look forward to a great AT&T National."

Woods was not specific about when or how the latest injury happened. He first showed signs of being hurt after hitting shots in the rough during the rain-delayed opening round at Merion, though he told a USGA official it was "fine" when he left the course Thursday evening.

After finishing the first round Friday morning, he said only that the reason he grimaced after shots out of the rough was because of

"pain" and that he felt it on a few shots. That afternoon, he revealed that he first hurt his elbow at The Players Championship, but he declined to say which round or on what kind of shot. Woods won The Players Championship on May 12 for the first time in 12 years. It was his fourth PGA Tour win of the season.

Woods picked up those four in just eight starts worldwide, and the win at Sawgrass was his third victory in his last four tournaments. The exception was the Masters, where he tied for fourth, four shots out of a playoff.

But the last two tournaments have produced a surprising outcome.

At the Memorial, where Woods was a five-time winner and the defending champion, he had the worst nine-hole score of his career with a 44 on the back nine that led to a 79 in the third round. He tied for 65th and finished 20 shots behind, his largest deficit for a full-field event. At Merion, he wound up with a 13-over 293, his highest score ever for the U.S. Open and tied for his highest 72-hole score in any major.

## Greg Biffle dominates Quicken Loans 400 to score milestone 1,000th NASCAR win for Ford Motor Co.

Greg Biffle scored a dominating win in the Quicken Loans 400 at Michigan International Speedway to secure a milestone 1,000th NASCAR victory for Ford Motor Company.

Biffle, who led a race-high 48 laps, including the final 32, seemed as happy for Ford as he was for himself.

"I am just super-excited for Ford," he said, adding that he and his fellow Blue Oval drivers spent the past week visiting Ford facilities, checking out cars from the past as well as previewing passenger cars of the future.

"It's really exciting to see all that and all the racing heritage, and to be able to be a part of that with the 1,000th win," he said. "I think I contributed over 50 of those, which is a small number compared to 1,000, but still sure excited to be the number 1,000."

Biffle has 55 major NASCAR victories between the Sprint Cup, Nationwide and Camping World Truck Series. He has 19 Cup wins, 20 in Nationwide and 16 in the Truck Series.

His car owner, Jack Roush, now operating as Roush Fenway Racing, has about

a third of Ford's victories, with 313 wins, including 131 in Cup, 132 in Nationwide and 50 in Trucks.

The Wood Brothers are next, with 98.

Ford's first win came in the first-ever race of the series now known as Sprint Cup. After apparent winner Glenn Dunaway's Ford was disqualified for modifications to the rear springs, Jim Roper, driving a Lincoln, was awarded the win.

Lincoln drivers contributed three more victories, and another Ford nameplate, Mercury, had 96.

The first NASCAR victory for the Ford nameplate came at Dayton Speedway in Ohio on June 25, 1950, when Jimmy Florian, a 27-year-old mechanic from Cleveland, outdueled the top NASCAR stars of the day. His car was powered by a flathead Ford engine, one considered to be inferior to the Oldsmobile and Plymouth powerplants of that era.

Florian also made history by becoming the first driver in the series now known as Sprint Cup to win a race while driving without a shirt — his way of dealing with the hot, muggy conditions.

Photos from that day show Florian wearing a pair of white pants, driving goggles and a helmet.

Florian had a spectacular start to his brief, 26-race Cup career. In his first five races, he had a win, a pole, three top-five finishes and didn't finish worse than eighth.

He continued to race short tracks until he was 70, and he died in 1999.

Across the top three NASCAR divisions, 124 different drivers have won at least

one race for Ford, which has not shown great speed so far this Sprint Cup season.

Biffle's Michigan win was his first of 2013 and just the third for Ford in 15 races, the other two coming at Phoenix with Carl Edwards and at Talladega with David Ragan. Biffle said he sees better days ahead for his No. 16 team as well as the rest of the Ford contingent.

"It's been well documented that we feel like we've been a little bit behind this season," he said. "We've been gaining on it. We've probably gotten a little more than we deserved the past two weeks with a second [at Pocono] and a win, but we certainly have gotten much, much better, and it looks like we're well on our way to getting some speed back in these cars, and continue to work on them and figure them out and get them to be just a little bit better yet."

Biffle's task at Michigan was made a bit easier by an uncharacteristically bad day for the four-car team from Hendrick Motorsports. Jimmie Johnson, Jeff Gordon and Kasey Kahne wrecked, and Dale Earnhardt Jr. blew an engine.

## Keselowski sets off controversy with remarks about information sharing among teams

No matter whether it's in a kindergarten class or the corporate world, it's hard to keep a secret. Reigning Sprint Cup champion Brad Keselowski set off a mini-storm of controversy last week with his comments about sharing information among NASCAR teammates and trying to keep that information secret.

Keselowski met with reporters following an appearance with Ford Motor Co. employees at Dearborn, Mich., and was asked about Ford's one-team approach, which involves sharing technical information between Ford's NASCAR teams — Penske Racing, Roush Fenway Racing, Wood Brothers Racing and Front Row Motorsports.

"There are little things you can do," Keselowski said. "What keeps it from going too far is the fact that Hendrick and Gibbs have this nasty little habit of going to other teams and outbidding other people and taking those employees and stealing our information, and, when that happens, that puts walls up between the camps, because you are giving up more than one piece of information. You are giving up two companies' information and trying to protect yourself against that; it forces you to put up walls."

He went on to say that Joe Gibbs Racing lured Roush's former aero director, and Hendrick Motorsports took three employees from Keselowski's championship team of a

year ago.

The next day, both Gibbs and Hendrick issued strong statements taking issue with Keselowski's comments.

"Clearly those comments are misguided and irresponsible," team owner Joe Gibbs said. "Brad's candor is well-documented, but he would do well to only speak to subjects on which he is properly informed."

The statement went on to say that the

employee Gibbs hired was not working in NASCAR at the time he was hired by Gibbs.

Team owner Rick Hendrick's statement also said that Keselowski was "misinformed."

"The truth is that we hired one tire changer, who was a backup for Penske and whose contract was up," Hendrick said. "We also brought over one mechanic from their Nationwide program and, when the Penske engine shop was closing, added a few of those people. What Brad left out was that his organization also hired one of our tire changers."

Roush Fenway Racing's Greg Biffle was asked about the issue during his media session at Michigan, and he said Keselowski has a valid point.

Biffle said the sharing of information among allied teams has its drawbacks because that information has a way of migrating to the opposing camps.

He said Roush prefers to promote from within his company to keep information in-house, but the knowledge base can be quickly expanded by bringing in someone with experience elsewhere.

"Sometimes you can leapfrog your learning curve by hiring somebody that already knows or may have more information," he said. "A lot of times that will jump-start you on whatever you're working on. It doesn't matter whether it's racing or something else."

Carl Edwards forced to break into his own rental car

Just before he made his pole-winning run on Friday at Michigan International Speedway, Carl Edwards had a motoring experience he'd just as soon forget.

He drove down the road from the track to take an exercise run, and that's when the adventure began.

"As soon as I shut the door on the rental car, I realized I locked the keys in it," he said. "I realized I had about an hour and 20 minutes to get back to the track before qualifying."

He called his publicist to come pick him up, and they stopped by a used car lot for assistance getting back into Edwards' car. "The guy came out with a crowbar and some coat hangers, and so we went and broke into this car," Edwards said. "We got the keys and made it back. It was good. It kept my mind off the stress of qualifying."

## Jason Leffler's death a reminder that racing will never be a completely safe sport

Jason Leffler's death last week in a sprint car crash jarred the racing world, reminding those who may have been lulled into a sense of security that auto racing likely will never be a completely safe sport.

News reports indicate that Leffler died from blunt force trauma to his neck when his car crashed during a heat race at Bridgeport Speedway in New Jersey.

During the regular press conferences at Michigan International Speedway, drivers were asked about Leffler and about the safety of racing at short tracks, many of which do not have the SAFER barriers and other safety features NASCAR has added in recent years.

Tony Stewart, who races sprint cars regularly and owns a dirt track, said racing is dangerous, but drivers are willing to risk the consequences because they love what they do.

"I was just shocked to hear what had happened [to Leffler], and obviously it's just a reminder of how dangerous our sport is," Stewart said. "We have had a lot of safety innovations over the last 15 years since I have been in Cup. It's just proof that we will never get to the stage where everybody is immune to getting hurt in a race car."

"That is just the scenario that we are in and there isn't anybody that gets behind the wheel that doesn't understand that going into it, and Jason was that way as well."

Stewart also pointed out that racing isn't alone in its inherent dangers.

"There will be more people that die in car crashes today than die in race cars today," he said.

Stewart said the type of race car Leffler was driving or the kind of track he was racing on shouldn't be faulted. He said he drives sprint cars and considers them to be as safe as possible. Stewart won a sprint car race at

Sheboygan County Fair Park in Plymouth, Wis., on the night before the Quicken Loans 400 at Michigan.

"We have a full containment seat and we do everything we can do with the race car to make it as safe as possible," Stewart said. "It wasn't the fact that it was a sprint car. It was the fact that it was an accident and something went wrong and we lost Jason because of it."

Stewart also said the short tracks aren't a major problem.

"I think things are the best they've ever been at this point," he said. "There are facilities that need some work, and there are facilities that put a lot of effort into it."

"Am I scared to go to any race track or feel concerned of not feeling safe at a race track? No."

"The safety standards weren't what caused the problem."

For Stewart, the bigger issue was that he had lost a friend and fellow lover of racing in all forms.

"When [Leffler] moved from California to Indiana to start racing USAC full-time, he moved in with me and lived with us for a little under a year," Stewart said. "I got to see a lot of things, and he was just a lot of fun."

"He was a racer and didn't care what he raced, where he raced, when he raced. All he wanted to do was to drive a race car. It was fun to have a roommate like that who had the same passion and desire that I had."
