School security a hot topic

Many law officers, educators attend Quincy conference.

TALLAHASSEE — With the Sandy Hook Elementary School shootings and a student kidnap-

ping in Alabama raising the fears of parents, school security has become a huge issue for public-safety officials and educators.

That was evident Tuesday as law enforcement officers, educators and emergency management officials from across North Florida gathered to discuss school security in rural counties — and to hear from police who

responded to the mass shooting at Newtown, Conn., and the abduction of a 5-year-old boy from an Alabama school bus.

Gadsden County Sheriff Morris Young said everyone at the second Rural County Summit could identify with their counterparts at the recent tragedies. As a measure of the interest, the summit drew 285 people, compared with

85 last year for a conference on hurricane preparedness.


“I sit back, just like you all, watching my television and thinking, ‘That could be Gadsden County,’” Young said. “Who would have ever thought Newtown would be a focal point for this United States on a traumatic situation?”

The conference was held at the

Florida Public Safety Institute, near the Gadsden County town of Quincy, and was organized by the Gadsden County Sheriff’s Office, U.S. Attorney Pamela Marsh, the North Florida Domestic Security Task Force and the Florida Division of Emergency Management.

Charter school given reprieve

Greater Truevine official claims requirements met.

The Vine Academy of the Arts received a reprieve at the Columbia County School Board meeting Tuesday night when board members decided to delay action on canceling the charter school’s contract with the district.

School Superintendent Terry Huddleston recommended terminating the contract with the Greater Truevine Missionary Baptist Church, whose officials plan to create a charter school on church property.

School district personnel said during the meeting that the charter school has yet to file any of the required paperwork to open the doors next month, but Pastor Antonio Carlisle told the school board that most of the paperwork was sent by the due date of July 1 via e-mail. Since the due date fell on the school district’s summer holiday, board members decided to table the

Mystery night at library for sleuths only

Participants will get to explore hidden corners of facility.

W as it Virginia Woolf in the children’s book section with the pen? Friends of the Columbia

County Library present “A Library Mystery” at 7 p.m. Saturday in the main library, 308 NW Columbia Ave.. Guests will get to join a night of fun, interactive sleuthing around the library, trying to uncover the mystery behind a missing item.

“It’s something we’ve been wanting to do for a while,” said Katrina Evans, assistant director of the library. “This is much more interactive than adult programs we’ve done in the past.” Only 25 adults will be allowed

to participate in the event. So, registration is required. Those who are interested should call Evans at (386) 758-1018 by Friday to register.

The library took the idea from a presentation by Santa Fe College at the Florida Library Association Annual Conference, but it is based on the classic idea of mystery dinner parties.

Evans said the adults-only night will take people to parts of the library they may have never been to and provides a fun way

to introduce them to the library’s services.

“Even regular library users can be very focused on specific things they use in the library without ever exploring the other options,” Evans said.

The night will start with a crime. The participants will divide into five teams to follow clues that will lead them to a lineup of five suspects — all literary figures — and then participants

Double murderer’s execution delayed for second time

STARKE — A former escort service owner who was scheduled to die by lethal injection at Florida State Prison received a stay of execution Tuesday.

Attorney Todd Scher said a Bradford County judge ordered a stay for Marshall Lee Gore, who was set to die on today. Scher said he filed a motion to halt the execution because he says his client is insane.

This isn’t the first time a judge has looked at whether Gore is mentally ill.

The 49-year-old was supposed to be executed on June 24, but the 11th Circuit

Court of Appeals halted the proceedings less than two hours before he was to have received a

lethal injection. A federal appeals court lifted the stay on June 28.

Gore was convicted of the March 11, 1988, killing of Robyn Novick, a 30-year-old exotic dancer whose naked body was found in a rural part of Miami-Dade County, partly covered by

The Columbia County School Board terminated former security guard Donald Jernigan during the board meeting Tuesday night.

Jernigan worked as a guard at Richardson Middle School until February, when he was suspended without pay after the Eighth Circuit State Attorney’s

Office charged him with introducing contraband into a state prison in Union County, where he worked as a corrections officer. He has not been convicted of the crime.

While most of the board voted in favor of Jernigan’s termination, board member Linard Johnson opposed the

Singer Randy Travis remains critical

NASHVILLE, Tenn.

Randy Travis remains in critical condition in a Texas hospital after doctors used a pump to stabilize his heart.

A news release from Travis' publicist on Tuesday says he underwent the procedure after checking into the hospital Sunday with viral cardiomyopathy, a heart condition caused by a virus.

The publicist, Kirt Webster, says the peripheral left ventricular assist device was used to stabilize Travis' heart prior to a hospital transfer to Dallas.

Travis thanked fans in the news release "for their love and support during this time."

No other details about the 54-year-old Grammy winner's condition were available.

The Mayo Clinic website says the disease weakens and enlarges the heart muscle, making it harder for the heart to pump blood and carry it to the rest of the body. It can lead to heart failure

Elton John cancels show due to appendicitis

LONDON — Elton John has canceled a show in London's Hyde Park due to appendicitis that will require surgery.

A statement issued Tuesday by the musician's publicist said John was suffering from an inflamed appendix and surrounding abscess.

He has been advised by doctors to cancel his concerts while he undergoes a regime of antibiotics to treat the abscess. That will be followed by surgery in the next few weeks.

The statement said John fell ill during his recent European tour, but "is eager to be back on top form and return to play the remaining shows

Expert supports Zimmerman story

SANFORD — An expert on gunshot wounds hired by the defense testified Tuesday that George Zimmerman's account of how he fatally shot Trayvon Martin is consistent with the forensic evidence.

Dr. Vincent DiMaio said that the trajectory of the bullet and gun powder on Martin's body support Zimmerman's version that Martin was on top of him when Zimmerman fired his gun into Martin's chest.

The gun's muzzle was against Martin's clothing and it was anywhere from two to four inches from Martin's skin, he said.

"This is consistent with Mr. Zimmerman's account that Mr. Martin was over him, leaning forward at the time he was shot," said DiMaio, the former chief medical examiner in San Antonio.

The pathologist also said it was likely Martin was conscious for 10 to 15 seconds after the shooting as a reserve supply of oxygen ran out of his body, and during that time he could have moved his arms.

Zimmerman's account that he had placed Martin's arms out to his sides after the shooting contradicts a photo taken after the shooting that shows Martin's arms under his body. Defense attorneys contend Martin moved his arms.

DiMaio testified that lacerations to the back of Zimmerman's head were consistent with his head striking a concrete sidewalk. Later, when looking at photos of Zimmerman's injuries taken the night of the shooting, DiMaio identified six separate impacts to Zimmerman's face and head. He said a nose injury could have come from

Probe finds police at fault

MIAMI — The U.S. Justice Department has found for the second time in a decade that the Miami Police Department engaged in a pattern of excessive use of force in shootings of suspects, including seven black men fatally shot by officers over an eight-month period ending in 2011.

The department's Civil Rights Division released the findings of an 18-month investigation Tuesday and said it will seek a federal court order to ensure necessary department changes are made permanent and overseen by a judge. That did not happen following a 2002 civil rights probe that also found Miami officers used excessive force.

"We are disappointed to find that the problem is back," said Roy Austin, deputy assistant attorney general for civil rights.

The investigation began

in November 2011, shortly after the firing of former Police Chief Miguel Exposito amid an outcry from black community leaders about the shootings. Exposito had created specialized tactical squads that focused intensely on high-crime areas, but also increased the likelihood of violent confrontations.

Task force fights retail theft

MIAMI — Federal and Florida law enforcement officials said Tuesday they are creating the nation's first task force to tackle the growing problem of organized retail theft, which victimizes nearly every store nationwide and costs retailers some \$30 billion in losses each year.

Alysa D. Erichs, special agent in charge of U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement's Homeland Security Investigations office in Miami, said retail thievery has become a sophisticated and well-organized criminal enterprise.

Police: Man battles cops until forcibly subdued

A Hamilton County man who was shot twice with a Taser before he could be subdued, faces battery charges after he allegedly fought with six law enforcement officers who were trying to get him out of a Hamilton County Sheriff's Office vehicle for medical treatment.

Jared Cameron Deas, 38, of Jennings, was charged with battery on a law enforcement officer and resisting an officer with violence. He was booked into the Columbia County Detention Facility with no bond.

According to Lake City Police Department reports, two Hamilton County Sheriff's deputies reported they had Deas in a patrol car en route to Meridian Behavioral Healthcare on Southwest Michigan Street and needed LCPD assistance. Deas was being taken from Hamilton County to receive medical treatment at Meridian.

The deputies reported Deas could become volatile and become a safety issue.

Deas was not restrained by handcuffs and threatened officers when they asked him to get out of the patrol car. He also refused similar requests from a

health care employee and threatened the employee, the report said.

One of the Hamilton County deputies shot Deas with a Taser. After he was shot, Deas "tensed up, but then reached up and pulled the probes from his person and threw them at law enforcement," the report said.

The deputy got another Taser cartridge and shot Deas again, but Deas again pulled the probes and threw them, the report said.

Deas was bleeding from his right hand and began rubbing the blood on his face, arms and chest. He continued to refuse to exit the police car and urinated on himself while in the car, the report said.

The deputy suggested using pepper spray to force Deas from the car. A police officer opened the car's back door and sprayed Deas and asked him if he was going to comply.

Deas refused, verbally threatened the officers and then removed his shirt and belt, while continuing to rub blood on his upper body and head. He then wrapped his belt around his right hand, leaving part

of the belt loose in order to use it as a weapon, the report said. He also rubbed the loose end of the belt in his blood.

Police sprayed more pepper spray on Deas, but he refused to exit the patrol car.

One of the police officers got a ballistic shield and tried to push Deas toward the rear driver-side passenger door where other officers were waiting.

Deas swung the belt and struck a police officer numerous times, transferring his blood to the officer, the report said. When one of the deputies and the officer tried to push Deas from the car with the shield again, he hit them with his belt and fist.

Police officers called an emergency medical technician and requested additional help from the Columbia County Sheriff's Office to extract Deas from the car, the report said.

Two Columbia County Sheriff's deputies arrived, and three of the officers pulled Deas from the vehicle.

Deas then swung his fists and belt violently. He finally was taken to the ground by several of the officers and restrained in handcuffs and leg irons. He was taken to jail in a Columbia County Sheriff's Office van.

item until assistant superintendent Narragansett Smith could check her files today.

"My concern is there was a year delay but then everything comes in on the day it's due," Huddleston said. "It concerns me that it comes down to the wire here. ... Our experience with the other charters is that the paperwork comes in way in advance."

Vine Academy of the Arts, 217 NE Kingston Lane, is supposed to open in August. Truevine started the charter process three years ago, filing the application before August 2011. They expected to open in August 2012, but had to push the opening back a year.

It's been a year, said assistant superintendent Lex Carswell.

Belmont Academy Charter School submitted its application at the same time as Truevine, and it also filed an amendment to open a year later than expected, Carswell said. It is opening in August with 291 enrolled students.

"We weren't aware that they were expecting us

to turn in the information prior to the due date," Carlisle said. "Our interpretation from the conversation that I had personally was that all our stuff was pushed back a year since we signed the extension. Therefore the stuff that was due July 1, 2012, would then become due July 1, 2013, since we signed the extension in August."

Board members Linard Johnson and Keith Hudson suggested tabling the item until the district had the chance to figure out whether the emails had been received.

Carlisle said he was ready to turn in the paperwork during a May 9 meeting with the district, but the meeting was canceled by the district employees. He said he also planned to get the charter school's board members fingerprinted at the same time.

According to Mike Null, the district's director of purchasing, fingerprinting should have been done a year ago, when the governing board started meeting.

According to a letter

drafted by Smith, the charter school has not corrected numerous deficiencies that constitute a noncompliance with the contract.

"To date, the school has failed to meet generally accepted standards of fiscal management, facility readiness, personnel requirements and insurance requirements, among other material issues," the letter states.

Vine Academy of the Arts still doesn't have a building in place with a certificate of occupancy, which was due by the July 1 deadline.

According to Carlisle, the building has to be on site to acquire the certificate.

"We don't go through the tremendous tasks that we've had to go through the past couple years to get the school simply to see the contract terminated," he said. "Of course we want to see the school continue to grow. We want to be able to educate young people."

Thirty students already have enrolled to begin classes at Vine Academy in August, Carlisle said.

Lt. Christopher Vanghelle of the Newtown Police Department and Lt. Paul Vance of the Connecticut State Police discussed the Sandy Hook shootings in strategy sessions that were closed to the public. They met with reporters, and Vanghelle, one of the first on the scene after Adam Lanza opened fire, praised the quick response at the elementary school.

"Just us arriving there when we did made that shooter stop and take his own life, which saved hundreds of other lives," Vanghelle said.

But he acknowledged he could never have prepared for Dec. 14, 2012, when 20 children and six school staff members died.

"What I saw isn't something anybody can ever prepare themselves for or anybody could ever forget.

It's nothing you can ever describe or imagine," he said.

Yet Newtown is recovering, Vanghelle said, due to its resiliency.

"Especially from the parents," he added. "They're really a source of strength. ... In my darkest days, I look towards those who have really lost, the victims, and see how strong they are, and that helps the rest of us keep going."

Also attending the conference were school and law-enforcement officials from Dale County, Ala., where 65-year-old Jimmie Lee Dykes killed a school bus driver and took a child hostage last January.

The days-long standoff ended with law enforcement officers storming a bunker where Dykes was holed up, killing him and rescuing the boy, which Marsh called a miracle.

State Sen. Bill Montford, D-Tallahassee, said the tragedies sparked discussion about school safety by lawmakers during the 2013 legislative session.

"All kinds of ideas floated up," he said. "One — and it's coming back next session — which I did not support, was to let teachers arm themselves and bring the guns to school. I said, 'No way.'"

Montford, a former schools superintendent and principal, said children are more aware of school tragedies than in the past because today they're "constantly bombarded with media."

"And so, it's even more important today than ever before that we take every step we can to ensure that our students feel safe, they know they're safe and, in fact, they are safe," he said.

will have to narrow the list down to one suspect, based on an information sheet provided by the library.

According to Evans, the library does various other programs throughout the year. Currently, they are

in the middle of the "Dig into Reading" children's summer program, as well as weekly story time sessions. Beginning in September, the library staff has planned various adult programs specifically related to Florida and the Viva Florida 500 history initiative.

As with "A Library Mystery," Evans said the goal of any event at the library is always to draw new people through the library doors.

a blue tarpaulin. Gore was also sentenced to die for the slaying in January 1988 of Susan Roark, whose body was found a few months later in Columbia County in northern Florida.

In addition to the two death sentences, Gore was given seven life sentences plus another 110 years in a case involving the attempted murder of a third woman.

The woman, an exotic

dancer, testified during the trial for the Novick killing that she was beaten with a rock; choked, raped and stabbed; and left near the spot where Novick's body was found. The woman was attacked two days after Novick disappeared. Novick had been stabbed and strangled.

Gore's attorneys argued before that he is mentally ill. One previous lawyer claimed Gore was "men-

tally deranged" and not responsible for his actions. But several judges concluded he was using a claim of mental illness to manipulate the judicial process.

When asked by a judge in the Novick case if he felt competent to proceed he replied, "I'm absolutely competent. I'm absolutely lucid." He had frequent verbal outbursts during the trial, laughed out loud and even howled.

action. Johnson said he found issue with terminating an employee who currently has pending charges directly related to the termination.

School Superintendent Terry Huddleston said, "[Jernigan's] case is still in the court system, but there's enough information there for us to move forward with a recommendation for termination."

Lake City resident Glynnell Presley spoke on Jernigan's behalf. He said that he felt there was unfairness, discrimination and a violation of constitutional rights in the way the school board handled Jernigan's termination.

"Mr. Jernigan is entitled to due process," Presley said. "You appear to be denying him this process. In other words, he is guilty before the trial."

Presley added that two white school district

employees were allowed to continue to work after facing criminal charges, but Jernigan was terminated after 26 years with the school district.

School Board attorney Guy Norris said there are no other district employees currently working who have been charged with five felony counts specifically related to employment as a security officer, which is what Jernigan's position is with the district. Norris also told the board it should approve the recommendation unless they found good cause not to, as the superintendent is in charge of hiring and firing.

Huddleston said he was unaware of any other employees still with the district who had faced similar issues as Jernigan.

"I'm not aware of anybody that's been treated differently like that," he said. "You can't even

compare an instructor — coach, teacher, whoever — that was charged with DUI with this. You have to take every situation on merit."

Jernigan admitted to resigning from the Department of Corrections after 20 years, but said the move was because the DOC wanted him to work morning hours when he was not available. He said he resigned before he was charged with taking contraband into the prison, but was an employee at the time he allegedly committed the crime.

"Anybody can get all of the information you want, but how do you know they aren't lies?" Jernigan said. "They are lies based on an inmate's story."

Jernigan said he plans to file an appeal with the school district in regards to how his termination was handled.

Advice to DCF: Heal thyself

Something is horribly wrong with the Florida Department of Children & Families' investigative process. Four children have died in the past two months alone. Their troubled parents all were known to DCF. But all four tots died while in the custody of supposed caretakers.

In each instance, DCF had the chance to remove the child from potential danger. Instead, the agency's overarching priority of keeping families together (too often without adequate resources or supervision) is putting kids in harm's way. Since May, Bryan Osceola, Antwan Hope, Fernando Barahona and Ezra Raphael have paid with their lives.

DCF Secretary David Wilkins acknowledges that mistakes were made in some of those cases. But where's the urgency to stop returning children to abusive households? Why does this keep happening? The problems lie within DCF itself. Its investigator training lacks accountability, the quality of investigators' work and their judgment-making ability remains hampered by Mr. Wilkins' top-down rigidity.

The community-based-care organizations (CBC) responsible for securing the services to help kids who have been removed from high-risk situations say that Mr. Wilkins has instead targeted them, threatening to terminate contracts and doing some heavy-handed meddling — a "my way or the highway" approach.

Mr. Wilkins [said] the accusations are baseless. He will roll out a new accountability system this week, he says.

Yet he is forcing CBCs to include a "bait and switch" clause in their contracts that in effect gives him veto power over the hiring of top CBC executives. Mr. Wilkins said this provision is intended to prevent local groups from identifying one person but then introducing someone else as the top officer after the contract is signed. It's curious that Mr. Wilkins could not cite ... any instances of this happening. He should drop this useless quest for control...


The community-based-care model first was implemented by Gov. Lawton Chiles in the 1990s and honed under Gov. Jeb Bush. In the early years, a few CBCs were dismissed due to inept management, but these were the exceptions. When the organizations were under threat from the Legislature, Mr. Bush wrote:

"There is no 'one size fits all' solution for families in crisis. Communities, like children, are diverse and have different needs. ... Community-based care has always been about local ownership, community input, transparency, accountability and solution-oriented responsiveness. Tallahassee-based care does not work. ... We've been down this road before — remember another tragedy: the disappearance, and likely death of Rilya Wilson?"

Now add to Rilya's name Bryan Osceola, roasted to death before his first birthday because his mother, who had a drinking problem, left him locked in a car; Antwan Hope, 4, found dead while on an unsupervised visit with his mentally ill mom, who had tried to smother him before; Fernando Barahona, 1, who was found dead in Cape Coral, two weeks after DCF was informed that he had sustained skull fractures; and Ezra Raphael, 2, brutally belt-whipped to death by his prostitute mother's boyfriend.

Mr. Wilkins can't keep blaming others for his agency's failings. Gov. Rick Scott, who recently praised the DCF secretary, must stop excusing mediocrity and put children's welfare first.

The wonders of Yosemite

His first trip to Yosemite National Park was the summer he turned 3. I have an old photo of a woolly-headed little boy, grinning ear to ear, standing in the river with his arms stretched wide as if to say, "Look! God made this place just for me!"

Nate was my baby, the youngest of my three. Every summer, when my husband took a break from teaching, we would strap the kids in the van and pack a week's worth of groceries and camping gear around them. Then we'd drive four hours from our home on the coast to spend a week camping in the park.

That week meant a lot to each of us, for different reasons.

For my husband, a fourth-generation Californian, it was the continuation of a tradition that had started in his family long before he was born. Outside of a classroom or a gym or a baseball field, Yosemite was his favorite place on Earth.

For my oldest, it was a chance to chase lizards and catch frogs.

For my daughter, it was a time to read and work on her tan.

For me, it was a place of renewal. The granite faces of the mountains, the quiet rush of the river, the familiar whisper of the wind in the redwoods, were like a tonic that made me feel new.

It did that for all of us, really, but especially for Nate. Like his dad, Yosemite was his favorite place, the place he felt most free.

After the kids began going off to college, it was tough to get everyone together. But we kept the

Yosemite tradition as best we could, even in the years my husband was battling cancer.

The summer after he died, the boys and I camped (without their sister, who was working), using the reservation their dad had made for us the year before.

Nate was just out of high school, unsure about college or plans for his future. I was sitting by the river watching the light play on Half Dome when he came back from a hike and told me that he had stopped in the park office and gotten a job.

We drove home the next day, packed up his things, then drove back to Yosemite. I left him waving goodbye in front of a tent cabin that would be his home for the next year. He began cleaning campground bathrooms and ended up running the ski shop.

In that year, he grew up. He came home from Yosemite the man his dad knew he would be.

Now he teaches third grade at the school where he once tried to smuggle his blankie into his first day of kindergarten.

Nate is also a husband and the father of two little boys, who are

both named for his dad.

Randy is almost 3, with woolly red curls. Wiley is 6 months old, with toes like his nana's.

This morning, Randy called me from Yosemite.

"Hi, Nana," he said.

He was staying in a cabin with his parents and his brother (in a place that sounded like "Yosinamee") and he wanted to tell me that he and his daddy had gone out last night with flashlights looking for a bear!

My heart skipped a beat. Then his dad took the phone to explain. They found a bear in the camp store. It cost \$8.

Randy doesn't know, of course, that he and his brother are keeping a tradition that began before they were born.

He has no idea what it means to his daddy to show him all the natural wonders that he first saw when he was Randy's age.

He can't begin to understand how proud his granddad would be to see his boy — a grown man with little boys of his own — in that hallowed place, hunting with a flashlight for bears.

He's much too little to fathom such fine, unfathomable things.

But he will. Soon enough. Absolutely. One day he will know, as I do, that God made this world just for us.

Maybe next summer, Lord willing, his nana can go bear-hunting with him.

Statue of Liberty reopens. After you.

Every American who's able to should visit the Statue of Liberty and climb up to the crown — once. More about that later.

The great lady that dominates New York Harbor has had a run of bad luck lately. After a year of being closed for a year for repairs — she may be a great lady, but she's also an old lady — the statue reopened last Oct. 28, the 126th anniversary of her dedication. Then Superstorm Sandy hit on Oct. 29 and the statue closed again, not because of damage to the structure, but because Sandy flooded 75 percent of Liberty Island with a 13-foot storm surge.

The statue was undamaged, thanks to the intricate internal supporting ironwork designed by Alexandre-Gustave Eiffel, architect of the Eiffel Tower, which, it should be noted, is also still standing.

Water never touched the statue, but the storm tore out the island's utilities, power supply, docks and walkways. The National Park Service worked heroically to get the island in shape to reopen for the July Fourth holiday. The public responded in kind by snapping up all the tickets to climb to the crown and all but same-day tickets to climb to the top of the base.

That was a clear signal to people whose hobby is not finding long lines and standing in them to come back another time. As Sandy showed, the statue isn't going anywhere, and, believe me, you will stand in line.

I have been to the statue four times. Once by myself, because I had some time to kill and had promised myself a martini later as a reward for my plucky patriotism, and once with each of our three children.

The first thing you have to know is that the statue is tall, about 305 vertical feet. The second thing you have to know is that it's all stairs. Well, mostly stairs. You're eased into it by the stairs that climb through the base and the pedestal, wide government-issue stairs of the kind you find in major federal buildings.

Then there are the stairs in the statue itself, 354 of them. They begin as more or less normal metal stairs, but then morph into a narrow, ever-tightening and -narrowing spiral staircase, more like a flattened ladder, protected by a knee-high banister.

This allows for an almost-unobstructed view straight down through the center of the statue, which allows your imagination free rein to envision your body bouncing from truss to truss because of the pushy school kids behind you.

On a hot, sticky day, with the

stairs packed with school outings, the smell of ripe, sweating adolescents is overpowering — it's not their fault; it's the combination of age and lack of ventilation — and you have the feeling that if you did slip, the heat and viscosity of the sweat-soaked air is such that you will be borne up to the crown rather than fall to an ignominious death in the inside of Lady Liberty's sandals.

The Park Service, to its credit, posts plenty of warnings about the steepness and strenuousness of the climb, and the real difficulty of getting you down if you have a heart attack or simply freeze on the spiral staircase. But being patriotic Americans, we regard any government concern about our welfare with the greatest suspicion.

In time, it dawns on you that the worst place to see a windowless statue is from the inside. There are windows — small ones, smeared to opacity by small hands — at the very top, the goal of your climb. You can see very little.

The best view is from the top of the pedestal. It's easy to get to and easy to get down from, and while the rest of your party is toiling its way upward through the statue's innards, you are comfortably ensconced on a ground-level Park Service bench with a book and the prospect of a martini once back in Manhattan.

Visit the statue your way; then do it mine. No need to thank me.



Spine injuries from jet crash unusual

Many survivors of Saturday's plane crash in San Francisco have a surprising pattern of spine injuries that a doctor says shows how violently they were shaken despite wearing seat belts.

So far, two people are unable to move their legs — doctors don't yet know if the damage is permanent

— and several others have needed surgery to stabilize their spines so they can move, said Dr. Geoffrey Manley, neurosurgery chief at San Francisco General Hospital who is overseeing their care.

Among the worst injuries are crushed vertebrae that compress the spinal cord, and ligaments so stretched and torn that they can't hold neck and back joints in place, Manley said in an

interview Monday.

That 305 of the 307 passengers and crew of the Asiana jet survived the crash is remarkable, and a testimony to improvements in airline safety in recent years. More than 180 people went to hospitals with injuries, but only a small number were critically injured.

Still, Manley said even among those who suffered mild spine trauma, he is

struck by a pattern that shows how their upper bodies were flung forward and then backward over the lap belts that kept them in their seats and undoubtedly saved their lives.

The injuries are somewhat reminiscent of the days before shoulder belts in cars, although much more severe, said Dr. David Okonkwo of the University of Pittsburgh Medical Center.

enemas per week, you may experience electrolyte imbalances. Restoring your electrolytes is crucial, as coffee is a potent drug mucker of minerals.

While the controversial cancer specialist Dr. Max Gerson suggested up to six per day, I think that is way too much for the average person. Doing a coffee enema weekly (even daily for awhile) is probably okay for most, but always follow your doctor's recommendation.

The recipe for a coffee enema is different from the beverage. Warrants: Hernandez 'argumentative' with cops

Former Patriot slammed door in authorities' face.

ATTLEBORO, Mass. — Former New England Patriots tight end Aaron Hernandez was "argumentative" and slammed the door on police during their first encounter following his friend's death, according to court records.

Hernandez was later accused of orchestrating the man's death in an industrial park near Hernandez's home.

According to an affidavit attached to search war-

rants unsealed Tuesday, Hernandez approached police after he noticed them parked outside his North Attleboro home on June 17, the day Odin Lloyd's body was found.

Police said they asked him about an SUV he had rented. Hernandez told them he rented it for Lloyd and had last seen him in Boston the day before, the documents said.

The affidavit then said Hernandez became argumentative, asked "what's with all the questions?" and locked the door of his house behind him.

He then returned with his attorney's business card, and didn't respond when police told him they were investigating a death.

"Mr. Hernandez slammed the door and relocked it behind him," the records read. "Mr. Hernandez did not ask officers whose death was being investigated. Mr. Hernandez's demeanor did not indicate any concern for the death of any person."

Hernandez came out about 10 minutes later and agreed to be questioned at a police station, according to the documents.

Hernandez is being held without bail after pleading not guilty to murder in the killing of Lloyd, whose bullet-ridden body was found in an industrial area near Hernandez's North Attleborough home.

Puig might make All-Star game fun again

Bruce Bochy wasn't willing to go with the small sampling size and make Yasiel Puig an All-Star, though he might have been tempted to change his mind after watching the rookie sensation do a little bit of everything in helping the Dodgers to win Sunday in San Francisco.

The Giants' manager wasn't going to leave someone who has played like an All-Star the whole season off the National League squad just to put Puig on it, and that's OK. But Puig is one of the five finalists that fans can still vote on, and that's a vote Puig should win in a landslide to get a spot on the team.

Hopefully, that will make Tim McCarver happy, too. The Fox announcer seemed even more insufferable than usual over the weekend in San Francisco when he said an All-Star can't be minted in just five weeks, but that if the fans really want the Dodgers' right fielder on the team he won't avert his eyes when Puig is at the plate.

Make the All-Star game fun and interesting? Well, OK, but only if the fans insist.

That there has been an ongoing debate in recent days over Puig's selection is probably a good thing for a game that seems to have lost its appeal to all but the hard-core baseball fan. There's little special about the All-Star game anymore, as evidenced by the fact it has lost half its television audience in the last 20 years.

But fans are talking about Puig, the Cuban who may well be the truest five-tool player to come into baseball in recent times. They will tune in just to watch him,

and they may buy tickets to see him in person the next time the Dodgers are in town.

He's not going to save the All-Star game because the game itself is such an anachronism. Players like making the team and earning the bonuses that often go with it, but even Bud Selig's ill-suited attempt to make it relevant by giving the winning league home field advantage in the World Series didn't move the engagement needle among fans.

There was once a time when the All-Star game was really something special. Fans were eager to compare leagues and, aside from spring training and the World Series, the Midsummer Classic was the only place to do it.

Ernie Banks might get his only chance to bat against Whitey Ford. Pete Rose could show Ray Fosse and the rest of the American League how baseball was played in the National League. And Carl Hubbell could introduce his screwball to the American League in spectacular fashion, striking out Babe Ruth, Lou Gehrig and three other future Hall of Famers in a row in 1934 with a pitch none of them had seen before.

But with the greed of baseball owners knowing no bounds, there's now interleague play every day of the season. There are so few distinctions between the leagues anymore that even the first appearance by the Dodgers at Yankee Stadium for the first time in 32 years last month barely drew a mention outside New York.

Want to see Justin Verlander face Bryce Harper? Just wait two weeks after the All-Star break and the Washington Nationals

will be in Detroit.

Clayton Kershaw against Robinson Cano? The Yankees will play at Dodger Stadium late in July, and there are plenty of tickets available.

At least there's still some intrigue about Puig, who found his way out of Cuba and into the major leagues when the Dodgers signed him to a \$42 million contract. Not even the Dodgers were sure what they had in Puig, but it didn't take long watching him run crazily around the bases or swing at anything close to the plate to figure out that he is an electric and immensely talented player.

His numbers alone should get him in the game, particularly the .409 average he had after getting two hits in Monday night's game in Arizona. Yes, he's had only 132 official at-bats, but Harper won a starting outfield job on the NL squad with less than 200 at-bats himself after being injured for several weeks this season.

Even Bochy was finding it hard to leave Puig out of the mix completely. He's as old school as they get, but having Puig on the second chance ballot of five players pretty much ensures he'll have him in uniform next week at Citi Field in New York.

The Dodgers are hosting All-Star voting parties this week for both Puig and Adrian Gonzalez, who is also one of the last five for the final spot. Gonzalez has had a strong first half for the Dodgers, but even he understands his place on the ballot.

"I'm voting for Puig," Gonzalez said.

Baseball fans will, too, and that's a good thing. It just might make the game interesting enough to watch.

the evidence against him is circumstantial and that Hernandez is anxious to clear his name.

Eight search warrants were unsealed Tuesday after news organizations sought access to the records. A judge had granted the media requests on Monday.

The search warrants reveal the breadth of the investigation, with authorities scouring through everything from Hernandez's house to the contents of his team locker, which the Patriots had emptied into a container.

The records also detailed a discussion police had with Hernandez's girlfriend,

Shayanna Jenkins, after she dropped him off at the police station.

Police said they pulled her over and she immediately burst into tears when she heard Lloyd was dead. She later told them she had last seen him two days earlier, according to the documents.

She also said she had been out to a Father's Day dinner with Hernandez on June 16, but they returned home early and she went to bed. She said Hernandez was away that night and she didn't know who he was with.

The records said Jenkins then received a call from Hernandez, who told her

his agent had advised him to tell her not to speak to police.

Also Tuesday, a man who faces a gun charge in the case agreed to remain in jail until a hearing next month.


Carlos Ortiz, 27, appeared in Attleboro District Court, where a hearing to determine if he is a danger to the community was scheduled for Aug. 14. If Ortiz is determined to be dangerous, he can be held without bail for 90 days.

Ortiz is from Hernandez's hometown of Bristol, Conn., and was with Hernandez when they picked up Lloyd the night he was killed.







STORMS & OUTAGES

Long before a storm or hurricane threatens, SVEC stands ready to respond. When the storm hits, our employees roll up their sleeves and go to work to restore power interrupted by the storm's fury.

Customers who lose power should contact SVEC. When the call is answered, the location of the outage is recorded automatically by SVEC automated outage-reporting system. Customers can also speak directly to a company representative if available. SVEC brings in additional employees to respond to customer calls during major storms, and it has dramatically increased the number of incoming telephone lines for its outage-reporting system. But customers may experience busy signals and longer-than-normal waits during times of high call volumes.



Here are a few tips to follow for your safety:

- If someone in your home is dependent on medical equipment requiring electricity, make arrangements in advance for an alternative power source for emergencies.
- If rising water threatens your home, turn off the power at the circuit breaker panel or fuse box before water enters your home. Have an electrician inspect your system before turning the power back on after flooding.
- Never replace a fuse or touch a circuit breaker with wet hands, or while standing on a wet or damp surface.
- If you see a downed power line, call SVEC to report its location.
- Avoid driving over downed power lines. Avoid puddles near downed power lines.
- Plug only individual appliances into portable generators. Never connect a generator to wall outlets, building wiring or your home's electrical system.
- If you require transportation assistance during an evacuation, register in advance with the Civil Defense and Office of Emergency Management in your county.

- To prepare for outages, it is wise to have plenty of fresh batteries for flashlights and radios.
- If you have a gasoline-powered electric generator, use it in well-ventilated areas and only plug in individual appliances. Never connect a generator to a wall outlet of your home or building's electrical system since that can cause damage to your equipment and can be a life-threatening danger to your family, neighbors and repair crews. Be sure to have adequate fuel for your generator and manage consumption by running it for only a few hours at a time.
- Prepare a list of essential items you would need in case you are evacuated from your home and have them readily available. Some of these items could include medications, insulin, contact lenses/supplies, extra eyeglasses and denture needs.

If your power goes out, wait at least five minutes before reporting it to SVEC office in order to give our automatic equipment time to restore power.

Listen to your local radio and TV stations for weather updates and information from SVEC.
