New water advocacy group starts

FLOW replacement begins by setting goals, objectives.

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Several members of the defunct Florida Leaders Organized for Water gathered at the Columbia

County Emergency Operations Center Wednesday to form a new group to protect the state's — and more importantly, North Florida's — water supply.

The group's mission is to determine whether a smaller group can effectively petition the Legislature on water quality and protection issues and to determine priorities and goals for a new water advo-

cacy group.

Helen Miller, mayor of White Springs; John Kuykendall, The Ichetucknee Partnership representative; Ron Williams, Columbia County commissioner; Dale Williams, Columbia County manager; Stacie Greco, Alachua County/Santa Fe Springs Working Group representative; Lee Pinkoson, Alachua County

commissioner; Annette Long, of Save Our Suwannee; Mark Logan, legal counsel, and David Kraus, Columbia County senior assistant, attended the meeting, which lasted close to 90 minutes.

To prevent some of the minutiae that hampered FLOW, the group first wanted to establish a set of objectives.

After a round-table discussion

and review of the FLOW history, the group developed several preliminary goals and objectives:

- Establish minimum flow levels and future minimum flow levels;
- Promote conservation to restore the aquifer;
- Address water quality and

Zimmerman verdict backlash could hurt

Calls for boycotts of Florida products, venues spreading.

TALLAHASSEE — Critics of the state's "stand your ground" law and Saturday's acquittal of George Zimmerman in the shooting death of teen Trayvon Martin hope to make Florida pay.

Their message as they implore state lawmakers to change the

law: Don't travel to Florida, and don't buy Florida oranges and other Sunshine State products.

The drumbeat of opposition has quickly grown on social media, while a group camps outside Gov. Rick Scott's office in the Capitol demanding action against the law that remains strongly supported by Florida's Republican leaders.

Meanwhile, negative perceptions of the state have been fostered on venues such as the faux news program, "The Daily Show," which has labeled Florida "the worst state." A sister

program, "The Colbert Report," added that Florida "apparently no longer has rules or laws."

Scott, while traveling to cable media outlets in the New York area Tuesday, expressed hope that boycotts don't work.

Business groups preferred to quietly wait to see how the public perception plays out rather than stoking the controversy by commenting.

An Orlando area hospitality expert said Wednesday that in looking at similarly proposed boycotts, such as the reaction in Arizona to its stringent 2010

immigration law, there may be little economic dent unless groups start to cancel long-planned conferences.

"Within the next couple of weeks, if any major conferences are canceled, then you start to worry," said Abraham Pizam, dean of the University of Central Florida's Rosen College of Hospitality Management.

In Arizona, opponents of the immigration law hoped their boycott would result in empty convention centers and sports

Springsteen dedicates song to Martin

NEW YORK

Bruce Springsteen dedicated his protest song "American Skin (41 Shots)" to teenager Trayvon Martin during a concert in Limerick, Ireland.

In a video posted online, the 63-year-old singer told the crowd Tuesday: "We'll send this as a letter back home for justice for Trayvon Martin" after noticing a fan's sign that read "American Skin (41 Shots)."

George Zimmerman was acquitted Saturday of second-degree murder and manslaughter charges in Martin's death. Zimmerman said he fired his gun in self-defense during a February 2012 confrontation with the 17-year-old in Sanford, Fla.

Lyrics in the song include "you can get killed just for living in your American skin." Springsteen wrote the song about the 1999 police shooting death of Guinean immigrant Amadou Diallo.

Coroner: 'Glee' actor died of overdose

VANCOUVER, British Columbia — "Glee" actor Cory Monteith, who had struggled for years with substance abuse and once said he was lucky to be alive, died of an overdose of heroin and alcohol, the British Columbia coroner's office said Tuesday.

"There is no evidence to suggest Mr. Monteith's death was anything other than a most tragic accident," the office said in a statement.

The 31-year-old was found dead in his Vancouver, British Columbia, hotel room Saturday after he didn't check out on time. He was believed to be alone when he died. Hotel video and electronic records indicate he returned to his room by himself

At a briefing Tuesday afternoon, police said they believe Monteith had been dead for several hours before he was found. They said the coroner's report didn't indicate the levels of heroin or alcohol in his system. They ruled out foul play.

AROUND FLORIDA

Protest continues at state Capitol

TALLAHASSEE — Protesters upset with the verdict in the George Zimmerman trial are remaining at the Capitol even though Gov. Rick Scott has said no to their demands.

Scott has yet to set foot in the Capitol since a group of young protesters began occupying his office on Tuesday. The small group wants the governor to call a special session and ask legislators to change the state's self-defense laws.

During a Pensacola stop Scott said it was "great" that people were using their free-speech rights. But he would not say if he planned to meet with the protesters.

The governor also maintained his stance that there is no need to change Florida's "stand your ground" law.

Steven Pargett said protesters will "wait and wait" for their demands to be met.

Air Force drone crashes near road

TYNDALL AIR FORCE BASE — A remote stretch of highway was closed early Wednesday after an Air Force drone crashed.

Tyndall Air Force Base said the QF-4 drone crashed on takeoff early Wednesday. No one was injured.

The Air Force closed Highway 98 west of Panama City and east of Mexico Beach because of possible fires from the crash. Officials said the drone has a limited, 24-hour battery life and would be inactive after the battery depleted.

According to an Air Force fact sheet, the QF-4

is based on a modification of the F-4 Phantom fighter aircraft, which has been in use since the 1950s.

"The QF-4 is a remotely controlled target, which simulates enemy aircraft maneuvers," the Air Force Fact sheet says.

Kids in parking lot; mom charged

WEST PALM BEACH — A South Florida woman is facing charges after authorities say she left two young children alone in a parking lot while she attended a Lil Wayne concert.

The Palm Beach County Sheriff's Office reports that employees at the Cruzan Amphitheatre first spotted the children — ages 3 and 5 — around 7 p.m. Sunday. An employee eventually questioned the children, who said their mother had gone to the concert.

The Palm Beach Post reports that deputies

responded and caught up with 25-year-old Brittany Nicole Harris as she left the concert. Harris initially told deputies her cousin had brought the kids but later acknowledged that she left the children in the car.

Harris was charged with two counts of child neglect. She was later released on \$20,000 bail. Child welfare workers took the children.

Arrest made in double slaying

JACKSONVILLE — Police have charged a man they say killed two brothers in the parking lot of a Jacksonville restaurant.

Police said surveillance footage shows Matthew and Andrew Bohannon in a truck interacting with several people in another vehicle before they were fatally shot Sunday night outside the Golden Corral restaurant.





reduce pollution;

- Reduce withdrawals from the aquifer;
- Support water management districts to help them get proper funding;
- Support legislation that redefines the roles of water management districts;
- Support legislation to establish baseline data on area waterways;
- Support legislation to create a statewide water goal; and
- Create funding to help agriculture operations retrofit their flow systems.

"The purpose of today's meeting was to reorganize the effort to save the quality and quantity of life within our area," Commissioner Williams said. "We had a great first organizational meeting. We were able to accomplish something today that we didn't accomplish the whole while under the original FLOW: We came up with goals and objectives that we could all agree on."

Williams said Columbia County has close to \$500,000 for local water protection and quality issues.

Although it hasn't been decided whether this group will act as a unified body and a body with members from different entities for water advocacy, Williams said the group has developed one

agenda.

"Our agenda and goal is to work with and assist the state of Florida and our water management districts to protect the water of North Florida and Florida as a whole," he said. "It's important to have this group

because we will be the spokespersons for our constituents. We need someone to speak up and make sure that our legislators know that this water crisis is real and not in fantasy land."

A follow-up meeting has been scheduled for 3 p.m.

Wednesday, Aug. 24, at the county EOC.

"After our next meeting, we'll have a lobbyist come over and make sure our goals and objectives are something they can take to Tallahassee and lobby for," Williams said.

Sinkhole opens under roadway

A portion of Southwest Deputy J. Davis Lane was closed Wednesday afternoon when a sinkhole opened in the roadway near the intersection of County Road 252-B.

Shayne Morgan, Columbia County emergency management director, said the sinkhole appeared to be about 2 feet wide and about 8 feet deep.

"We called the Columbia County Public Works Department, and the Columbia County Sheriff's Office responded and had two deputies on scene when I got there," he said.

A Lake City Water Department crew also responded to check the hole. County public works department employees put barricades around the site until they could fill the sinkhole with asphalt millings.

"If for some reason this hole is truly a sinkhole and they have to take the millings out, it's much easier to take millings out than taking concrete out," Morgan said.

Morgan received a call about 12:35 p.m. from the county communications center informing him about the sinkhole. He said he was told several calls had been made to first responders reporting the hole.

Officials are not certain what caused the sinkhole to appear.

Columbia County public works department leaders will make a decision on whether an engineer will be brought in to study the hole and its possible cause, Morgan said.

"Generally what happens is they put the millings in the sinkhole in hopes of that settling it," he said.

Barricades remained around the affected area Wednesday afternoon.

City woman, 71, charged with illegal drugs sale

A Lake City woman was arrested for allegedly selling drugs after Columbia County Sheriff's deputies received evidence that she was dealing out of her apartment.

Barbara Murphy, 71, 200 SE Sundial Place Apt. 127, was arrested Tuesday on one count of selling a controlled substance. She was booked into the Columbia County Detention Facility in lieu of a \$25,000 bond.

On March 25, CCSO deputies conducted an undercover narcotics

investigation in which an unnamed informant met with Murphy at her apartment

and bought four tablets of Lortab for \$30, according to the arrest affidavit.

Lortab is a prescription pain-killer, a combination of acetaminophen and hydrocodone.

The four pills were turned over to deputies by the informant. A video of the deal also was placed into evidence.

accreditation during Wednesday's tourist development council meeting at the Westside Library branch.

An official announcement from DMAI was slated for Wednesday afternoon during the closing general session at the organization's 2013 Annual Convention in Orlando.

Campbell said initially he was skeptical whether to apply for the accreditation because of the rigorous process involved.

There are 55 mandatory standards and 29 voluntary standards

that must be addressed on the application. The application was several hundred pages. To get the accreditation renewed the application must be resubmitted once every nine years.

The county council originally filed its application a year ago, and because of deficiencies, several revisions had to be done. The committee said the application still needed work and local officials sent more information.

"I guess the third time is the charm," Campbell joked.

The county council is one of only

150 tourism agencies worldwide to have earned the accreditation, he said.

"We're the smallest that has ever earned this," Campbell said. "I think it reflects favorably on the professionalism of the tourism bureau in Columbia County."

While no funds come with the accreditation, Campbell said when applying for grants, the accreditation gives instant credibility, and probably gets the agency extra points when applying for competitive grants.

School grading system needs serious work

When one of Florida's staunchest defenders of school accountability says the state needs to throw out its formula for grading schools, lawmakers should pay attention. The state Board of Education on Tuesday narrowly approved another round of changes to the A+ Plan school grading formula to ensure that no school's 2012-13 grade drops by more than one letter grade this year from last. But the decision came about only after a surreal discussion that suggested more allegiance to a bureaucratic construct than real accountability. The best hope now is that lawmakers and education officials will do a better job as they build a new accountability formula starting in 2014-15 based on Common Core State Standards exams.

It would have been unthinkable a few years ago for Kathleen Shanahan of Tampa, a former chief of staff to then-Gov. Jeb Bush, to say the A+ system had become invalid. But that's what she said Tuesday, suggesting the state would be better off just not giving grades for a year as the board considered for a second time delaying the impact of tougher FCAT passage scores. "We've overcomplicated the model, and I don't think it's a statistically valid model" anymore, she said.


But four of the other six board members embraced new Education Commissioner Tony Bennett's recommendation to tweak the formula once again to ensure that no school's grade dropped precipitously. Some of the state's most respected superintendents had warned that the ratcheting up of FCAT passage scores threatened to penalize even schools that were seeing improvements in student performance. In other words, their grades could have dropped even as their scores rose.

Bennett rejected Shanahan's suggestion that the state just take a year off from issuing grades, saying state law required them. Then he added, apparently not meaning to be ironic: "I believe as a purist on accountability that taking a break from accountability is very simply bad policy," Bennett said.

That sentiment is only valid if the accountability is actually transparent and consistent, something no one in Tallahassee even tries to argue anymore. So school grades that will be released this month may have little correlation to reality. Unfortunately, they will have real impacts on each school's funding and teacher bonuses.

The school grading system needs some accountability of its own. Until the state comes up with a meaningful, rational system of school grades, an A won't be an A, and the system itself will continue to earn a failing grade. You could give it an F.

Young Muslims put forth messages of hope

A month ago, State Department spokeswoman Jen Psaki was asked whether the Taliban is a terrorist organization. The question appeared to stump her. "Well, I'm not sure how they are defined at this particular moment," she told reporters.

So how refreshing was it to hear Malala Yousafzai, a 16-year-old Pakistani girl, speaking from a U.N. podium last week, unequivocally and forthrightly denouncing the Taliban as terrorist and, for good measure, calling into question the courage and intelligence of its members?

"They are afraid of women," she said. "And I remember that there was a boy in our school who was asked by a journalist, 'Why are the Taliban against education?' He answered very simply by pointing to his book, he said, 'A Talib doesn't know what is written inside this book.'"

It was a Talib, you'll recall, who last year shot Yousafzai in the head as she was riding a bus home from school in northwest Pakistan. She barely survived, then endured surgery and months of hospitalization and recovery. A Taliban spokesman called the attack "a warning to all youngsters in the area that they would be targeted if they followed her example."

Members of the Taliban oppose education for girls based on their reading of Islamic scripture. Yousafzai rejects such fundamentalism, as she made clear in her U.N. remarks. Indeed, she went out of her way to provoke Salafi Muslims — those who seek to replicate Islam as it existed in the seventh century — by saying she had learned "compassion" from "Mohammed, the prophet of mercy," then immediately noting that she had been inspired also by "Jesus Christ and Lord Buddha," as well as Mahatma Gandhi, Martin

Luther King Jr., Nelson Mandela and Mohammed Ali Jinnah.

The last of these figures was the founding father of Pakistan, a man of moderation and tolerance. Four years ago, lecturing on terrorism at a university in Karachi, I asked the audience whether Pakistanis still aspire to build the kind of nation Jinnah envisioned. One student threw his shoe at me. (Others apologized for his behavior.)

Yousafzai concluded her remarks with a call for "a glorious struggle against illiteracy, poverty and terrorism," not quite the struggle — "jihad" would be the Arabic word — the Taliban has in mind.

Nor should we expect Yousafzai to be praised by Sheikh Yousuf Al-Qaradawi, the Muslim Brotherhood preacher featured on Al Jazeera, the TV station owned by Qatar's rulers.

Qaradawi has called for the killing of Americans in Iraq. He promotes suicide bombings against Israelis. Most recently, he issued a fatwa declaring the Egyptian military's removal of President Mohammed Morsi a violation of sharia, Islamic law.

Here's where it gets interesting: The sheikh's 42-year-old son, Abd Al-Rahman Al-Qaradawi, published a response in an Egyptian newspaper titled, "Sorry, Father, Morsi Has No Legitimacy."

Calling himself a "revolutionary" who went to Tahrir Square in 2011 to oppose the dictatorship of Hosni Mubarak, and then again last month to oppose the authoritarianism of

Morsi, he wrote: "I did not engage in demanding to implement the shari'a, and I did not think I had the right to impose the shari'a on anyone. Moreover, I engaged in encouraging the people to be free men, since freedom and shari'a are equal in my eyes ... It is time for this nation to complete the difficult (mission) and separate religion and state, so that we know when the ones who are speaking are clerics or statesmen!"

Don't misunderstand: I am neither inferring nor implying that young Qaradawi is a Jeffersonian democrat. I am suggesting that a less predictable, more provocative and perhaps even productive debate may be beginning to take shape in the Middle East.

Which brings me to a video that has gone viral — an interview with Ali Ahmed, a 12-year-old Egyptian first-grader, who explains succinctly why millions of his countrymen have refused to do as the Muslim Brotherhood commands. "We didn't get rid of a military regime to replace it with a fascist theocracy," he says. The puzzled interviewer asks him to define that term. He does so without skipping a beat: "A fascist theocracy is when you manipulate the religion and enforce extremist regulations in the name of religion — even though the religion doesn't command that." He adds that women "are half of the society. How come there are only seven ladies in the Constituent Assembly, six of whom are Islamists?"

Wouldn't you like to hear this young man also speaking at the U.N.? Wouldn't you like to hire him as a State Department spokesman?

Edward Snowden will mark his one-month anniversary next Tuesday of being an uninvited and, as Putin has made clear, unwanted guest of the transit lounge of Moscow's Sheremetyevo International Airport.

Putin blamed the fact that Russia is stuck with Snowden, perhaps indefinitely, on the U.S., and for a change in the Kremlin's reflexive "blame America first" default position, he has a point.

After Snowden, an NSA contract employee who stunned even Americans with his revelations of the breadth and depth of the agency's electronic spying, fled ... the U.S. revoked his passport, without which Snowden cannot travel.

Three Latin American countries — Venezuela, Bolivia and Nicaragua — have offered him asylum, but with

a catch: He has to get there first. The U.S. has used its immense diplomatic clout to make it as difficult as possible for him to travel because U.S. authorities want him back here.

Russia has refused to extradite him to the United States on the quite-plausible grounds we wouldn't do the same if the situation were reversed. But Putin has made ... clear he wants Snowden gone.

Putin does not want a renegade U.S. spy distracting from two upcoming visits by President Barack Obama to Russia....

But Snowden formally asked the Russians this week for asylum. According to The Daily Beast and CNN, Putin has said that Snowden can stay if he ceases all political activities, which Putin says Snowden refused to commit to, and that he "stop his work aimed at harming our American partners."

Snowden told Russian officials that he had no intention of hurting U.S. interests, and in almost the same breath, said he was afraid of being tortured and executed if

returned to the U.S., a declaration that hardly burnishes America's image.

"I've said all I knew, and I will not harm the United States in the future," Snowden reportedly assured a Russian lawyer helping him win asylum.

But the Guardian's Glenn Greenwald, who has been acting as something of Snowden's publicity impresario, said that as precautionary insurance he has stashed some of his papers with certain news organizations.

"The U.S. government should be on their knees every day praying that nothing happens to Snowden, because if something happens, all information will be revealed, and that would be their worst nightmare," Greenwald told The Guardian.

Actually, an even worse nightmare might be being trapped indefinitely in an airport transit lounge.

venues. While a few musicians and business groups stayed out of the state, the Associated Press estimated that by the end of 2010 the state had taken a \$145 million hit.

The Center for American Progress, a Washington, D.C.-based liberal policy group, projected that Arizona's convention business was down \$45 million in the first four months after the law was enacted.

"If you have a beef with the 'stand your ground' law, there are 19 other states that have the law as well," Pizam said.

But in the court of public opinion, the beef right now is with Florida.

Music legend Stevie Wonder says he will boycott Florida until the state abolishes the controversial law that allows a person to use force, "including deadly force if he or she reasonably believes it is necessary to do so to prevent death or great bodily harm to himself or herself." Wonder has also called for fans to support his boycott.

During an NAACP convention in Orlando on Wednesday, Martin Luther King III, the eldest son of slain civil-rights leader Martin Luther King Jr.

proposed a boycott of Florida orange juice.

Zimmerman was found not guilty Saturday by a six-woman jury in the racially charged case. Zimmerman, 29, claimed self-defense in the February 2012 death of Martin, 17.

While Zimmerman's attorney didn't raise the stand-your-ground law as a defense, the jury instructions advised that Zimmerman could be acquitted if they deemed he was not doing anything illegal and "he had no duty to retreat and had the right to stand his ground and meet force with force."

Rivera gets MVP award, as AL wins All-Star Game.

NEW YORK — The great ones get the stage to themselves.

Mariano Rivera was held in the bullpen out in right-center field until Neil Diamond had sung the final words of "Sweet Caroline" in the middle of the eighth inning during Tuesday night's All-Star game.

Then the opening notes of Metallica's "Enter Sandman"

— his Yankee Stadium theme song — rang out over the public-address system as the greatest reliever of all-time jogged toward the mound.

The record crowd of 45,186 gathered at Citi Field rose and cheered, knowing this was a moment people will remember much more than the American League's 3-0 victory.

Quiet, reserved and understated during nearly a quarter-century in a sport that took him from Panama to the pantheon of pin-striped pitchers, Rivera was being honored with that rarest of baseball tributes — a solo bow.

As he reached the brown circle in the center of the green diamond, Rivera realized he was the only person on the field.

Sinatra. Springsteen. The Mick — Jagger and Mantle. They all got to stand in the spotlight alone. And now it was Rivera's turn.

He took off his cap, waved it to all sides of the ballpark. He touched his hat to his heart.

His AL teammates stood by the third-base dugout rail and applauded, just like the fans. So did his NL opponents on the first-base

Last year: Els overcame a six-shot deficit in the final round with a 2-under 68, though he needed a lot of help — and Adam Scott provided it in the final hole at Royal Lytham & St. Annes. Scott was four shots ahead with four holes to play. Els made a 15-foot birdie putt on the last hole. Scott closed with four straight bogeys, driving into a fairway bunker on the 18th and missing a 7-foot par putt that would have forced a playoff. Els finished at 7-under 273 and joined some exclusive company by becoming the sixth player to win both the British Open and U.S. Open multiple times. The others were Walter Hagen, Bobby Jones, Jack Nicklaus, Lee Trevino and Tiger Woods.

Last time at Muirfield: Ernie Els won his first British Open, recovering from a double bogey on the 16th hole to join a four-man playoff with Thomas Levet, Stuart Appleby and Steve Elkington. Appleby and Elkington were eliminated after the four-hole playoff, and Els beat Levet in the first sudden-death situation in the British Open with a par on the 18th hole. Tiger Woods' bid for the Grand Slam ended Saturday when he shot 81 during a two-hour wind and rain storm.

Open champions at Muirfield: Harold Hilton (1892), Harry Vardon (1896), James Braid (1901, 1906), Ted Ray (1912), Walter Hagen (1929), Alfred Perry (1935), Henry Cotton (1948), Gary Player (1959), Jack Nicklaus (1966), Lee Trevino (1972), Tom Watson (1980), Nick Faldo (1987, 1992), Ernie Els (2002).

The course: Muirfield is considered by many to be the purest and fairest of

all the links in the Open rotation. The outward nine runs in a clockwise direction on the perimeter of the property, while the inward nine goes mainly in a counter-clockwise rotation in the middle. Players are most likely to face the wind in every direction during the round. Muirfield is home of "The Honourable Company of Edinburgh Golfers," which in 1744 established 13 "Rules of Golf." The company moved in 1891 to Muirfield, which was designed by Old Tom Morris and revised in 1922 by Harry Colt.

Tiger Tales: Tiger Woods now has gone five full years since he last won a major championship. He has not competed since he finished 12 shots behind at the U.S. Open.

Key statistic: Every winner of the British Open at Muirfield after World War II is in the World Golf Hall of Fame.

Noteworthy: The British Open is the only major that has not had a winner from the top 10 in the world ranking over the last five years.

Quoteworthy: "For some reason, great players play great there." — Lee Trevino on Muirfield.

side. With no other players in fair territory, he finally started tossing his warmup pitches to catcher Salvador Perez.

Like Ted Williams at Boston's Fenway Park in 1999 and Cal Ripken Jr. at Seattle's Safeco Field two years later, one man transcended all the rest of the gathered talent.

"You're supposed to know your team is behind you," Rivera said. "I didn't know what to do. Just keep throwing the ball, I guess, because it was so weird."

And then, after a 90-second standing ovation, eight AL position players came on the field. Normalcy resumed. Rivera threw 16 pitches — all cutters — and retired the side down in order the way he has so many times before.

Rivera has never allowed an earned run in nine All-Star innings.

Of course, he was selected the All-Star MVP.

After the game, still smiling, sometimes laughing, Rivera spoke in the interview room as his family stood behind him.

"It was tough. It was special," an emotional Rivera said. "Seeing the fans sharing and both teams standing out of the dugout, managers, coaches, players — priceless."

Rivera and nine other pitchers combined on a three-hitter, with Chris Sale getting the win.


"It's been a privilege," Rivera said to the crowd, speaking on the field after the game. "You guys almost made me cry."

Muirfield produces worthy champs

GULLANE, Scotland — From behind the 18th green, Paul Azinger stared out toward a golf course where he nearly won a major title, where so many greats of the game have carved their names on the claret jug.

Sure, it's a classic links layout — right by the sea, filled with inexplicable humps in the fairways, terrifying bunkers stuck in the strangest of spots and knee-high grass ready to punish a wayward shot.

But Muirfield is different. There are all those quirky elements that make it worthy of a British Open. There's just — uhhh, how should we put this? — not TOO many of them.

"It's not a luck-fest out there," Azinger said, as the world's top golfers arrived en masse to prepare for the third major of the season. "If you make the ball do what you want it to do, you'll play well."

Maybe that's the reason the roster of winners looks more like a who's who of the sport.

Harry Vardon. Walter Hagen. Gary Player. Jack Nicklaus. Lee Trevino. Tom Watson. Nick Faldo. Ernie Els.

And let's not forget Harold Hilton, James Braid and Henry Cotton.

Of the 13 players to win the Open at this course east of Edinburgh, 11 are enshrined in the World Golf Hall of Fame (and you can make a pretty strong case that another, Ted Ray, should be).

Not a stiff in the bunch.

"That's not a fluke," Faldo said. "You have to have a good mind game. You have to know where you're going to land it, where the next

bounce is and where the run is."

And, of course, have the ability to pull it off.

Faldo recalled his second victory at Muirfield in 1992, with Fanny Sunesson on the bag.

"That's what we worked out so well," he said, "where to land the ball 20 yards short of the green, which way it would kick, and obviously where it would stop. That's part of the calculations. But you've got to land the ball from A to B first. And that has to be a solid shot. If that's a mis-hit, the ball doesn't react close to what you intend. You look at all those guys, we all hit it pretty darn solid in our era."

At the other eight courses in the Open rotation, that's not always the case.

A crazy bounce here. An unexpected roll there. Suddenly, the door is open for an improbable winner.

Muirfield is more straightforward, with few blind shots, and the way it's laid out — with two loops of nine holes running in opposite directions — evens out the devilish breezes, assuming they don't suddenly change directions during the course of a round.

"It's not going to bad luck you to death," said Azinger, who made that assessment even though he bogeyed the final two holes of the 1987 Open and lost to Faldo by a single stroke. "It's a terrific course."

Given what has happened here before, this would seem the most appropriate spot for Tiger Woods, ranked No. 1 in the world, to end the longest major-less drought of his career.

If Woods falters again, Muirfield will likely produce a worthy champion.

That's just the way it goes at this place.

The Open returns to Muirfield

Muirfield Golf Course on the east coast of Scotland has previously hosted The British Open Championship 15 times, most recently in 2002 when reigning 2012 Champion, Ernie Els, lifted the Claret Jug.

1 Par 4 Yards 447
Considered one of the toughest opening holes on a Scottish links for the British Open. Played into a prevailing wind, the tee shot should take on the bunkers down the left side to have the best angle into the green. The green is protected by bunkers on both sides, with a smaller bunker front and to the right.

2 Par 4 Yards 364
The shortest par 4 at Muirfield could be reached off the tee in the right conditions, but the penalty is severe. Along with a collection of four pot bunkers short and right of the green, a stone wall that is out-of-bounds runs down the left side and comes within 15 feet of the green.

3 Par 4 Yards 377
The fairway narrows severely at about 290 yards off the tee and is guarded by bunkers, thus most players will opt for a long iron or a hybrid off the tee. The view of a green that is 40 yards long is partially blocked by a dune on the right, and the bunkers to the right have been moved closer to the green.

4 Par 3 Yards 226
This par 3 has been extended by 46 yards since 1992. The tee shot played to a plateau green is 40 yards deep and protected by pot bunkers and hollows on both sides. Anything short is likely to run down a slope into the bunker. The course turns clockwise to the east at this point.

5 Par 5 Yards 559
The first par 5 starts with a tee shot at a slight angle to a fairway over five pot bunkers on the right side, with two more on the left side if the shot runs too hard and too safe toward the left. The green should be reached in two by most players, although it will be key to avoid bunkers on both sides of the green.

6 Par 4 Yards 461
The drive has to cope with a crosswind to a hidden fairway, followed by an approach toward a green that is protected by three bunkers and has Archerfield Wood as a backdrop. New hollows short and left of the green make the flag look closer than it is. The bunker right of the green has been moved slightly to the left.

7 Par 4 Yards 184
The hole is uphill and typically into the wind. The slopes on the putting surface are not as severe as the fourth hole, but a slightly inaccurate shot can feed down the slope to the left and into any of the three bunkers, or to the right into the lone bunker.

8 Par 4 Yards 441
The tee shot requires a carry of 290 yards to clear a cluster of bunkers in a fairway that bends to the right. Players might opt for less club off the tee to stay short, leaving a long shot over cross bunkers to a green that falls off at the back and left.

9 Par 5 Yards 554
A new tee extends this hole nearly 50 yards, which also brings out-of-bounds to the left into play. The drive should be placed between a deep bunker on the left and a new bunker 270 yards on the right in the landing area. The green is close to out-of-bounds left and has a cluster of pot bunkers to the right.

10 Par 4 Yards 469
Back nine routing is inside the outer loop of the front nine and runs opposite and counter-clockwise. A fairway bunker has been added 290 yards right of the fairway which has been shifted, with bunkers moved to the left. Green is flat and partially hidden, with bunkers on both sides.

11 Par 4 Yards 387
The tee shot is blind over the crest of a hill to a fairway that has been lightened by an additional bunker, some 320 yards out down the right side. The left bunker has been moved to 270 yards from the tee. The approach is to a small, heart-shaped green protected by pot bunkers and with sharp contours.

12 Par 4 Yards 379
Only one bunker is down the left side, with the other replaced by a grassy hollow. The bunker on the right has been moved slightly closer to the landing area. The second shot has to avoid a group of five pot bunkers to the right.

13 Par 3 Yards 190
The feature on this hole is the green that is 46 yards deep and not more than 15 yards wide at any point and fall away on both sides toward three deep bunkers on the right and two of the left. Ernie Els found one of them on the left in 2002 and played a remarkable shot to save par.

14 Par 4 Yards 475
This typically plays into the wind, making the longest par 4 at Muirfield even tougher. A new tee makes the hole 30 yards longer than 2002, and the fairway narrows at about 300 yards out. The bunker to the right of the green has been lengthened toward the front of the putting surface.

15 Par 4 Yards 448
The hole has been lengthened by about 30 yards and has a tight landing area protected by deep bunkers on both sides of a fairway that bends to the right. The green is known as a camel's back because of the contours. The first bunker left of the green has been filled in, and other bunkers have been moved closer to the putting surface.

16 Par 3 Yards 186
Middle of the green is always a good play on this final par 3 where tee shots can fall off the side of the green toward bunkers. Lee Trevino held a bunker shot on his way to winning in 1972. Ernie Els made double bogey and had to rally just to get into a playoff.

17 Par 5 Yards 575
The last par 5 will play about 30 yards longer for this year's Open, though the long hitters should have no trouble reaching in two provided they avoid the five bunkers in the corner of this dogleg. A group of cross bunkers is situated about 100 yards short of the green. The green is set back into the dunes and protected by a narrow entrance with bunkers on both sides.

18 Par 4 Yards 470
One of the stronger closing holes in the British Open became about 20 yards longer since the last Open. Three bunkers cut into the landing area on both sides, while the green is guarded by bunkers short and on both sides. The island bunker to the right of the green has been altered to widen the sand area and reduce the chance of an unplayable lie.
