School budget outlook gloomy

District 'budgeting to survive,' board chairman declares.

A proposed budget for the Columbia County School

District's current fiscal year left school board members questioning how the district would shake off past financial troubles.

Bonnie Penner, the new district finance director, presented the estimated budget for this fiscal year at \$69,259,851, with ending expenditures still \$13,742 over revenues. Penner said she

plans to transfer a minimum of \$500,000 of federal funds to cover any discrepancies.

"This is budgeting to survive," said board chairman Steve Nelson. "I don't want to see a negative number on that bottom line."

According to Penner, the finance department is still work-

ing diligently to find additional savings. But as of right now, the district's financial situation is equivalent to living paycheck to paycheck, she added.

"It's an ongoing process," she said. "I think before I got here they made great headway in realizing that there were a lot of cuts that needed to be made."

Current cost-saving measures in personnel mean that the district is already ahead in terms of budget cuts. School Superintendent Terry Huddleston decided not to replace a group of teachers and teacher aids who retired or resigned.

Young da Vinci program gearing up

Art league, library join forces to provide art lessons for youngsters.

Area children will soon have the opportunity to explore their creative passion and find their artistic voices thanks to the Art League of North Florida's Young da Vinci program.

The free, three-day program will be Aug. 1 through 3 at the West Branch of the Columbia County Public Library on Hall of Fame Drive. Registration will be July 31 at

the library branch.

The series of hands-on classes gives children ages 10-14 a brief foundation in the visual art skills and techniques they'll need to develop their inner Rembrandt, O'Keeffe or Dalí. The classes will be taught by professional artists from the art league, who will guide students step by step through various media and techniques, as well as provide encouragement, support and ideas for the budding artists.

Wally Reichert, one of the founding members of the 8-year-old art league, started the da Vinci program back in 2010 for two reasons: He found Lake City's visual arts scene lacking, and he was upset that public schools cut funding to art, music, and other fine arts programs.

He argues that the ability to critically

interpret visual concepts and ideas is invaluable to a young person's future. He also believes the da Vinci program not only gives young children access to visual arts they might not have otherwise had, but also gives them an opportunity to express themselves and find confidence.

"I think there's art in everybody," he said. "It's just a matter of getting it out."

Day one of the program will focus on watercolor techniques taught by Reichert, including the tricky dynamics of transparency. Day two will focus on the styles of famous artists through history, with a particular emphasis on French impressionist legend Claude Monet and his approach to *plein air* landscape painting as taught by

Wet weather pattern has pluses, minuses

Rainfall, whether from brief afternoon showers, passing tropical storms or driving thunderstorms, is proving to be both a blessing and a curse for the area.

According to the Suwannee River Water Management District, in June the counties that make up the district received an average of 8.77 inches of rain, which is higher than the district's long-term average for this time of the year.

Vanessa Fultz, the district's communications

specialist, said June was the 14th wettest month since 1932.

Doc Bloodworth, wildfire mitigation specialist and public information officer with the state Forestry Service, said the rainfall has reduced the threat for wildfires.

He said wildfire danger level across the state is low, but at this time of the year there is a threat of lightning starting fires.

Bloodworth said the current conditions are also favorable for forest service personnel to conduct controlled burns to

Many mourn passing of 'Sam'

Ex-superintendent of schools praised for his heart of gold.

Grady Darrell Sam Mr. Markham or Daddy Markham — Lake City residents called the former Columbia County Schools superintendent by many different monikers, but what everyone recalls when they think of Grady D. "Sam" Markham was his generous heart of gold.

Markham, 76, passed away Saturday at Haven Hospice Care Center in Lake City as a result of medical complications from an injury suffered last year.

"Everybody's got a story about him," said his son, Samuel Markham. "He bought eyeglasses [for students], he bought jackets, he bought clothes, and he bought lunch — just anything. If he could help, he did, and he didn't go telling everybody that he did it."

Born May 3, 1937, in Columbia County, Sam Markham attended

Board cancels charter contract

The Columbia County School Board terminated a contract with the Greater Truevine Missionary Baptist Church and its proposed charter school Tuesday night.

The paperwork submitted by the church for Vine Academy of the Arts did not meet requirements, according to assistant superintendent Narragansett Smith. The school's pupil progression plan did not mention current state requirements.

"Paperwork received this year was basically the same as last year," Smith said.

Vine Academy of the Arts was scheduled to open in August at 217 NE Kingston Lane, but it has yet

William, Kate, show off royal baby

LONDON

A beaming Prince William and his wife, Kate, emerged from a London hospital on Tuesday with their newborn baby boy, presenting the world with a first glimpse of the prince who is third in line to the British throne.

The royal couple, both 31, looked happy and relaxed as they waved at the crowds of journalists and onlookers gathered outside London's St. Mary's Hospital, posing for photographs and joking with reporters.

Kate, wearing a baby blue polka dot Jenny Packham dress, smiled and waved as she stepped out from the hospital doors with the future monarch in her arms.

"It's very emotional. It's such a special time. I think any parent will know what this feeling feels like," she told journalists.

Kate then gave the baby to her husband, who, cradling their child, said: "He's got her looks, thankfully. He's got a good pair of lungs on him, that's for sure."

William added: "He's a big boy. He's quite heavy," and laughed when a reporter asked him about the baby's hair.

"He's got way more than me, thank God," he said.

The couple also revealed that William has had a go at changing the infant's first diaper. "He's very good at it," Kate said.

on Monday night said the 27-year-old actress had started the fire in the driveway in Thousand Oaks, Ventura County sheriff's Capt. Don Aguilar said.

KABC-TV said the flames were fueled by gasoline.

Deputies determined that Bynes met the criteria for a mental health hold and took her into custody, where she can be held for 72 hours of observation, Aguilar said.

Passer-by Andrew Liverpool told KABC he found Bynes.

"It's dark, it's 8:45 and I just see her laying down, stomach up and her pant legs on fire, a trail of, you know, fire and gas, and I pull over," he said.

No charges were filed, and responding fire officials did not

administer any medical care, Aguilar said.

Hundreds attend police meeting

LAKELAND — More than 200 people attended a town hall meeting Monday night about the embattled Lakeland Police Department.

Residents told city leaders how they felt about the department's many issues: namely sex scandals, complaints about improper searches and botched criminal cases involving officers accused of altering sworn statements used in court.

Billy Townsend, who writes columns for a website, Lakeland Local, asked numerous questions, including whether there would be any leadership changes at City Hall.

"The culture thrived under this leadership," Townsend said. "Why does anyone think it will change under this leadership?"

The current sexual misconduct allegations were made public last month in a State Attorney's Office report that alleged dozens of consensual and multiple forced sexual encounters involving more than 20 officers and city workers. LPD has launched its own investigation, which city officials have estimated will take several more weeks to complete.

In addition, the department has been repeatedly criticized by State Attorney Jerry Hill. Since March 26, Hill has sent six letters to Police Chief Lisa Womack, including one for a widely publicized "bra-shaking" traffic stop search and another involving the sex-scandal debacle.

Three officers resigned before they were fired for their part in the scandal. Two others were fired and have said they will appeal Womack's decision to fire them.

Meanwhile, the co-

chairs of an advisory commission formed to help the department have resigned.

The FDLE is currently conducting a second criminal investigation of the department.

Jury awards \$1.2B in case

BARTOW — A Polk County jury has handed down a verdict in a nursing home negligence case totaling more than \$1.2 billion in damages.

The Lakeland Ledger reports that a jury spent a little more than an hour Monday before deciding to award \$220 million in damages and \$1 billion in punitive damages.

The lawsuit focused on the treatment of Arlene Townsend, who stayed at Auburndale Oaks Healthcare Center. The Lake Wales woman lived at the facility from 2004 until her death in 2007. She was 69. The lawsuit states Townsend repeatedly fell while at the nursing home and was not properly supervised.

Orlando cop shot during stop

ORLANDO — One of two men arrested following the shooting of an Orlando police officer during a traffic stop is facing charges.

Police say Demetrius Patterson will be charged with attempted murder of a law enforcement officer with a firearm and possession of a firearm by a convicted felon. The other man wasn't immediately charged.

Officer Jason Hajek pulled over a vehicle that was driving recklessly early Tuesday morning. Police say Patterson and the other man got out of the vehicle, and then Patterson shot Hajek. The men fled on foot but were arrested several hours later.





MARKHAM: Longtime local educator remembered for his generosity

Columbia High School, played football for the Tigers and worked at his father's restaurant, the Magnolia Barbecue.

Sam Markham acquired his nickname as a youth. He used to hang around a group of older boys, including the late Eugene "Cookie" Johnson. Johnson dubbed Grady D. Markham with the name "Sam," and it stuck.

The Mag, as people around town called it, was the place to go in Lake City to get barbecue and drinks, said Sam Markham's friend, Bill Wheeler. The restaurant used to be located across the road from Shirley's Restaurant on U.S. Highway 90. Glynnell Pressley, a longtime Lake City educator and local civil rights leader, was introduced to Markham at the Mag by Clarence Tucker in the days before segregation ended.

At that time, the restaurant featured a room upstairs for black customers, Pressley said. Every time Markham saw Pressley at the Mag, Markham would buy him lunch and sit down to talk.

Eventually, the Markham family sold the Mag, as Sam Markham chose teaching over the restaurant business.

In 1959, Markham graduated from the University of Florida with a bachelor's degree in education and experience in the UF ROTC program. After graduation, he served as a commissioned officer in the Army. He later earned a master's degree in school administration from UF.

When he returned to Lake City, he started his career in education at Lake City Junior High School. He taught math there for 10 years before taking time off on leave, then returned to education with a spot on the Columbia County School Board from 1972 until 1976. Current School Board member Keith Hudson now holds the seat Markham vacated.

"It's been a lifetime friendship," Hudson said. "It's a sad day for all of us, especially those who knew him and were so involved in public education in the county."

Markham taught Hudson in his junior high math class, which is where the two first became acquainted. According to Glenn Hunter, also a former Columbia County School Board member, Markham was very passionate about his teaching. He expected high standards from his students and believed in discipline. Hunter sat in Markham's eighth-grade Algebra 1 class at Lake City Junior High.

"I've known Sam Markham almost all my life," Hunter said. "He actually set me straight a couple times ... I believe he actually taught me how to be a good student. If we had more classrooms like that today, we would have no issues with students."

Those he touched remember fondly

Many Lake City Reporter readers posted comments on the newspaper's Facebook page about the passing of Sam Markham. Here is what some of our readers had to say:

Diane Crews McManus: (He) was the best boss and friend in the world ... Will never forget him and there will never be another man like him. When he was superintendent and Carol A. and I would go to his office he always had his Bible out and would read us a scripture, and it always was what we needed! Will see him in heaven!

Tammy Sowards: When I was in 5th grade at Five Points, I was hit in the mouth by a student swinging a paddle at PE. He took me to the dentist, paid for it out of his own pocket along with stopping at the store and getting me a bag of chips and soda. He truly was a caring man!

Linda Stephens Lathinghouse: Mr. Markham was a man that "shot straight from the hip", so to speak. You knew where he stood. I live in Alabama now and was shocked to hear of his death. I drove a school bus nearly 20 years for Columbia County. He was at Five Points Elem. where my boys attended, also superintendent when I drove. He cared so much for the good of the children! RIP Mr. Sam Markham.

Amanda Parrish Priest: I also remember having a parent conference where a student was in serious trouble and the parent was devastated they couldn't afford Christmas. Mr. Markham pulled out his wallet and gave the parent \$200 cash and said no child goes without Christmas in my school!

Donna McIntyre: His smile and his Panama Jack hat (that's what I called his hat).

Ann Thomas: When my daughter was in 3rd grade she was purposely pushed down by a boy at PE. Her arm was broken in the incident. Not knowing if we had medical insurance or the money to pay for her treatment, he immediately offered to pay for all of her medical care. Columbia County needs a Sam Markham sitting in the office of every school as well as the SCHOOL BOARD. I also saw him buy jackets one winter for a family of four children who would come to school with towels wrapped around their shoulders because their single mother couldn't afford to buy them one. This man was amazing and will be greatly missed. You will never see another Sam Markham walk the halls of Columbia County schools. Some of the adults in our community may not have always agreed with some of the things he did (or) said, but the children on his watch were always cared for, loved and left his school happy. RIP MR. MARKHAM! YOU WILL BE MISSED!

Joyce Spradley: Rest Mr. Markham, you deserve it. You will be missed by so many more people than you could ever have known. You were loved by so many young and old. No other will ever replace you or take over where you left off. As the song goes, go rest high on that mountain, your work here is done. I love you Mr. Markham.

Others also remembered Markham's presence in the classroom.

"He was a very, very good teacher," said Pat Arnold of Lake City. "The kids all liked him a lot, but he was tough."

At that time, Principal Philip Browning sat at the helm of Lake City Junior High. Everyone was scared of him, Arnold said, except Markham. People wanted their children to be in Markham's math classes, she added.

"He was always very helpful," Arnold said. "We had a great faculty at that time. Mr. Browning was a great principal, and we were all young."

More than anything,

Markham was known for his generosity, especially toward children.

"I remember when he was principal at Five Points Elementary," Pressley said. "No child went without lunch because they didn't have money. That's something unsung."

In 1980, Markham was appointed principal at Five Points. Wheeler said Markham paid for student lunches out of his own pocket for 24 years until he resigned as principal in 2004.

"I think he just loved the kids," said Samuel Markham. "He could make a difference in other people's lives... If you help a child, they will go on to help someone else."

But he was plenty demanding, of himself and

others.

During Markham's tenure as principal at Five Points, he reported required yearly goals to the Columbia County School District. Several of his planned improvements included: Try to let each student meet the principal, spend more time in classrooms and improve dress at school. To accomplish the goals, he decided to schedule walks through school and sit in the lunchroom line asking the names of the students. Markham planned to wear a suit and tie at least once a week.

"It wasn't just a job with him," Hudson said. "I would describe it as a way of life."

Markham became an inspiration to many people he encountered, including former Lake City resident Cordez King. After meeting Markham at a school board meeting, King quickly became good friends with him. The two went to lunch often, and talked on nearly a daily basis.

King said Markham told him he was going to make it in life the first time they met. Soon, King came to know Markham as "Pops," a mentor and guide. King now studies secondary education at Valencia College in Orlando, a decision largely inspired by his mentor.

"He referred to me as his son," King said. "It was an honor to be in his presence, to even know Mr. Markham — Pops. He will definitely be missed. Lake City has lost a legend."

...

After an initial, unsuccessful run for superintendent in 1976, Markham decided to try once again in 2004 after resigning as principal of Five Points. At

the time, Markham said he would make a positive contribution to the district he had worked in all his life.

He won, defeating Lex Carswell by less than 1 percent.

According to Hudson, Columbia County schools made steady gains under Markham.

"Academically, schools fared well during his tenure," he said.

For the 2007-08 school year, eight schools earned A-grades.

Under Markham the district recorded some of the highest FCAT scores it had ever seen, according to former school board member Hunter.

Hunter said Markham was also generous to teachers.

"Throughout 2004, 2005 and 2006, the state of Florida was busting at the seams, growing and developing..." Hunter said.

"So Florida was receiving extraordinary revenue, and it distributed some of that to the districts through the FEEP (Florida Education Finance Plan)."

The district was also active in building during that time, Hunter said.

During Markham's tenure, Pinemount Elementary School was built.

Markham's term as superintendent was also on occasion marked by controversy.

In 2007 it was discovered that a counterfeit Columbia High School diploma was generated and distributed from the board office. Markham saw the district through the investigation and when the facts were revealed, he made quick personnel changes.

Earlier that year, Markham used a pocketknife to destroy a portrait

of himself on the wall at Five Points Elementary, where he had once been principal. Markham apparently was frustrated with performance and morale at the school.

As a public figure, Markham was known for his straight-shooting demeanor — a man whose comments left no doubt his position on any issue. His appearance sometimes included a straw hat and overalls. The self-described country boy frequently chewed on cigars, donned fishing shirts in the office and sometimes wore Crocs with a coat and tie. Markham always said he cared nothing about putting on airs and trying to impress others. He said his complete focus was to see all Columbia County children have the opportunity for a quality education.

After he lost his bid for re-election in 2008 to Michael Millikin, Markham resigned in the fall before the end of his term. He attempted a comeback in 2012, but lost in the primary election for superintendent.

Hunter, a school board member for 24 years, ran alongside Markham in 2012.

According to Hunter, the two enjoyed the time spent together during the campaign. After Markham taught Hunter in middle school and then worked as a principal in the district when Hunter sat on the school board, it was ironic the two would end up in the same race for superintendent, Hunter said.

"When [the election] was over, it was fond memories and a great experience," Hunter said.

Needed for visiting sports teams: A code of conduct

Visiting athletes and their families pump millions into the local economy when attending baseball and softball tournaments at Southside Recreation Complex.

"Sports tourism" looks like at least one important element of our long-term plan for bringing folks here to visit.

While here, they eat at our restaurants, fill up at our pumps and stay in our hotels.

But as Tourist Development Council head Harvey Campbell said in a story in our Sunday edition, very few things come free.

According to local hotel owners and managers, the problem centers mostly around unattended youngsters who get bored, then rowdy, in between tournament appearances.

Some fire fastballs through plate-glass windows.

That's the sort of thing that can happen when kids are cooped up with no real room to play. It's the kind of accident you can't really help but expect on occasion.

But some throw rocks at cars in the parking lot and some kick in connecting doors to adjoining rooms.

That's not acceptable.

Nor is it acceptable for mom or dad to leave the kids unattended in the first place, inviting such behavior.

Of course, in some cases mom and dad are themselves the problem.

Local police have been called on more than one occasion to deal with drunken "baseball moms" as well as unruly dads.

The TDC has broached the idea of a code of conduct for kids – and their parents – during sports tourneys.

We think that's a fine idea.

Talk to tournament promoters with experience in this area and see what has worked elsewhere. It is likely to work here as well.

Sports tourism is something we want to promote and encourage. The vast majority of our sports visitors are excellent guests we'd like to see return again and again.

However, we've got to get the unruly kids – along with their unruly parents – under control before we go too much further with this experiment.

The TDC needs to act quickly to remedy this problem.

Detroit's bankruptcy a test case?

How and if Detroit pulls itself out of bankruptcy is important to the rest of the country because, if successful, Detroit will be the template for rescuing other U.S. cities teetering on the edge of insolvency.

This year the Pew Research Center released a survey that showed 61 of the nation's largest cities had \$217 billion in unfunded pension and health-care liabilities; in other words, they don't have the money on hand to pay for those liabilities when they come due.

In the current climate, it's unlikely that the federal government will come to their rescue, although some kind of federal assistance ultimately may be inevitable. And most states, even if they wanted to, are in no position to help and, indeed, some of them have critical fiscal problems of their own. Pew estimates that state pension plans were under-

funded by \$1.4 trillion in 2010.

To oversimplify, many cities made a devil's bargain with their municipal employees: Instead of healthy raises that would have to be paid for immediately, they promised benefits down the road – such as early retirement, extensive medical benefits and generous pensions. The problem of how to pay for all this was left to a changing cast of elected politicians....

[Detroit] faces a cumulative long-term debt as high as \$20 billion and a current budget shortfall of \$300 million. The dwindling population plus 10,000 active public workers are supporting 18,000 retirees, whose pension obligations are underfunded by about \$3.5 billion....

Maybe Kevyn Orr, the turnaround artist installed as Detroit's emergency manager and whose decision it was to file for bankrupt-

cy, can work some kind of fiscal magic. And even bankruptcy may be only a measure to buy time.

As the Detroit Free Press points out, political decisions, like restructuring city government, are outside the court's purview: "And debt might be wiped away, but the underlying issues of things like poor governance and management, or of a shrinking population and tax base, won't be."

Until now, municipal bankruptcies have been relatively rare – Stockton and San Bernardino, Calif., being recent exceptions. But Detroit Mayor David Bing, who not surprisingly will not seek a second term, insists more than 100 major cities are struggling with problems like Detroit's. "We may be one of the first ... but we absolutely will not be the last," he said. And, alas, he's almost certainly right.

reduce the amount of fuels in forested areas. He said the area has been in a moderate to low wildfire risk since March.

Gina Busscher, state Department of Transportation District 2 spokeswoman, said this summer's rainfall has had an adverse impact on construction projects.

FDOT only has one major project under construction in Columbia County, widening of U.S. 90 on the west side of town.

"The rainfall has impacted us to the point where we've had to grant the contractor 17 additional days because of rain," Busscher said. "... That's about 10 percent of the time that's elapsed for that job that has been impacted by rain."

In addition, Busscher said, "We've had to bring in pumps to pump out water," she said. "They're working on drainage right

now and it's hard to dig and place the drainage pipes when you've got 3 feet of water standing in the hole."

In June, rainfall levels recorded at the Florida Forestry Office indicated 13.59 inches of rain fell in the area. In June 2012, the rainfall station recorded 23.5 inches, with most coming from Tropical Storm Debby at the end of the month.

So far this month, the area has received more rainfall than last July. In July 2012, 7.5 inches of rain was recorded at the rain gauge at the Suwannee Forestry Center in Lake City. For July 2013, the area has received 7.52 inches, with seven days remaining in the month.

January had the lowest rainfall in 2013 thus far, just 1.2 inches.

The average rainfall per month this year is 6.79 inches.

BUDGET: District finances remain very tight

It's estimated that those cuts saved the district \$2.3 million dollars, during a process when it was determined \$2.8 million would be needed to break even this fiscal year. The transfer of federal funds should cover the remaining amount, Penner said.

The proposed budget doesn't seem to allow any areas for cushion, said board member Keith Hudson. In the past, the district dipped into reserves when it overspent the budget, but this year, the savings account seems to be running dry.

During the budget workshop,

Penner said the most recent estimate on the unassigned fund balance for the 2012-13 year dropped to \$430,409. Previously, district officials believed the number to be about \$668,124, which would have been a small increase from the 2011-12 school year.

The current unassigned fund balance falls way below the minimum of 3 percent of the budget, as required by the state Department of Education.

In previous budget meetings, Huddleston said the district has overspent by an average of \$1 million

a year for the past five years. Last year's budget ended with revenues falling \$2.2 million short. To cover the deficit, the district pulled from other funds.

Penner said she believes the overspending occurred because of two issues. For some reason, the budget did not take into account the \$1.3 million owed to Shining Star Academy, as well as a change in the way the phone bills were paid.

"We didn't get this way overnight, and it's just going to take some time to get better," Huddleston said.

to meet numerous requirements needed to open the doors, school district officials said.

The church started the charter process three years ago. They expected to open in August 2012, but had to push the opening date back by one year.

According to a letter drafted by Smith, the charter school still has not corrected numerous deficiencies that constitute noncompliance with the contract.

"To date, the school has failed to meet generally accepted standards of

fiscal management, facility readiness, personnel requirements and insurance requirements, among other material issues," the letter states.

Greater Truevine Pastor Antonio Carlisle was at the board meeting. He said he did not expect the district

to terminate the contract. He plans to file an appeal.

"We thought they would give us the chance to speak, like they did last time," he said.

Although Carlisle suspected reasons behind the termination, he did not want to voice them.

When Markham started teaching in Columbia County, he also taught adult education courses in math, earning a paycheck he called "his boating money," son Samuel Markham said.

Fishing remained a hobby of Markham's for 30 years until he became superintendent in 2004. After being elected superintendent, Markham no longer had as much time and his fishing days dwindled.

Roger Little fished alongside Markham for about 30 years—through hurricanes, ice storms and tornadoes. Once, Little and Markham competed in a tournament at Fowlers Bluff, located at the mouth of the Suwannee River. According to Little, the day was so cold the eyes on the rod kept freezing as he reeled in his line. For most, the fish just weren't biting.

Even though the tournament ended at 4 p.m., many finished by about 2 p.m. because of the conditions. But not Markham. As the day wore on, Little said people kept asking if someone should go look for Markham, but he brushed them off. When the tournament ended, Markham pulled up in cotton pants, a thin sweater, a cap and a cigar hanging from his lips.

Markham caught two of the three fish caught that day.

"I've always said if I needed someone to go on a survival journey, I'd take Sam," Little said. "Sam was always a real good fisherman. I've seen days he wouldn't stop to eat. He'd just fish all day."

The Gateway Bassmasters Club paved the way for Markham's entrance into competitive fishing. When the club formed in the early 1970s by 10 local anglers, it began having monthly meetings and bass tournaments at the local lakes. The first tournament was held at Lake Geneva in Keystone Heights, and it was the first competitive fishing experience Markham had.

Hunter fished alongside Markham during the days of the Bassmasters Club.

"I believe that he thought he was the best fisherman, even if he didn't always come in with the biggest fish," Hunter said. "But he never stopped trying."

After Markham won the lottery in the early 1990s, Stratos Boat Company representatives learned Markham fished out of a Stratos boat for a period of time. Company officials flew him to Tennessee for an advertisement where Markham appeared to have a chauffeur drive

him to a lake in a limousine, towing a Stratos boat. Markham then appeared in the January 1992 edition of Bassmaster Magazine.

"The rumor is that he won the lottery twice, but he actually won it once," Little said.

Little rode with Markham to Tallahassee to pick up the winnings after Markham won Fantasy Five. When they arrived, Little said he asked Markham where his ticket was, and Markham pulled a folded chewing tobacco bag from his shoe. He had folded the ticket inside the bag.

...

In his retirement, Markham began whittling sticks into walking canes. According to Roger Little Jr., Markham would go out to the trees on his property, select a limb and begin crafting the cane from scratch. He made hundreds of them, and even sold some at the Olustee Festival in February.

If Markham saw someone eyeing one of his canes, he wouldn't hesitate to hand it over, Roger Little Jr. said. He didn't do it for the money.

A piece of river-worn driftwood washed onto the shores of Hunter's property in Fort White. Hunter took it to Markham, who

used it to carve a walking cane. Hunter said he will keep forever.

"He was one of the most dedicated, lovable men I knew," said David Monroe, a longtime friend of Markham's. Monroe lost his father 20 years ago, and said Markham was the next man in line to take his father's place. He saw Markham an estimated three to four times a week for the entire 30 years he knew Markham.

"I'm going to miss him," he said. "I miss him now."

Markham is survived by his wife of 50 years, Carroll Markham; his daughter, Belinda Markham Wood of Ocala; his son, Samuel Markham of Gainesville; four grandchildren; three cousins and his long-time friend Monroe.

Visitation will be from 5 p.m. to 8 p.m. today at Dees-Parrish Family Funeral Home, 458 South Marion Avenue in Lake City. Funeral services will be at 2 p.m. Thursday at Hopeful Baptist Church, 289 SE Hopeful Drive.

FDA cracks down on illegal diabetes remedies

W A S H I N G T O N — The Food and Drug Administration is cracking down on more than a dozen companies that market illegal treatments for diabetes, ranging from bogus dietary supplements to prescription drugs sold online without a prescription.

All of the products aim to cash in on the country's diabetes epidemic, which affects nearly 26 million Americans. Regulators worry that consumers who buy such unapproved products could put off getting legitimate medical care, which could exacerbate heart disease, kidney failure and other deadly complications.

The FDA sent warning letters to 15 companies, both in the U.S. and abroad, ordering them to stop selling diabetes treatments which violate U.S. drug laws.

Three of the products targeted are marketed as "natural" supplements, but actually contain unlisted pharmaceutical ingredients. For example, Diexi, which is sold as a traditional Indian "herbal formula," actually contains metfor-

min, the most common prescription drug used to treat diabetes. The product is sold by Amrutam Life Care, of Surat, India.

"Consumers should exercise caution before using products claiming to be herbal or all-natural alternatives to FDA-approved prescription drugs," the agency said in a statement Tuesday. "These products should be considered unsafe and should not be used."

Other products include genuine dietary supplements that make unproven claims to treat or prevent

diabetes. For example, Diabetes Daily Care is a capsule-based supplement containing cinnamon extract and other herbs. Its manufacturer, Nature's Health Supply Inc., claims it "safely and effectively improves sugar metabolism."

Under U.S. law, only FDA-approved medicines are permitted to make claims for treating or preventing disease.

Other companies targeted by the FDA run online pharmacies that sell prescription drugs for diabetes without a prescrip-

tion. The FDA issued a warning letter to www.bestcheapestmedsonline.com for marketing unapproved versions of diabetes drugs like Januvia, from Merck & Co. Inc.

The FDA warns patients against buying prescription medications on the Internet. Only 3 percent of online pharmacies actually comply with all U.S. pharmacy laws, according to a review by the National Association of Boards of Pharmacy.

People with diabetes are unable to properly break down carbohydrates,

either because their bodies do not produce enough insulin or because they've become resistant to the hormone, which controls blood sugar levels. These patients face higher risks of heart attacks, kidney problems, blindness and other serious complications.


Many diabetics require multiple drugs to control their blood sugar levels.

The U.S. market for prescription diabetes drugs is the largest in the world, with sales of \$22 billion last year. Sales have ballooned more than 60 percent in the last four years from \$13.6 billion in 2008, according

to health data firm, IMS Health.

The FDA said it has not received any reports of injury or illness connected with the products, but is taking action as a precautionary measure.

The FDA sent the warning letters to the companies last week, but posted them online Tuesday morning. The letters give each company 15 business days to reply and explain how they will come into compliance with U.S. law. FDA warning letters are not legally binding, but the agency can take companies to court if they are ignored.





Braun busted

NEW YORK — Ryan Braun stood on a spring training field and proclaimed he was innocent of using banned testosterone.

"I would bet my life," he said back then, "that this substance never entered my body at any point."

Seventeen months later, he accepted a 65-game suspension from baseball and admitted, "I am not perfect. I realize now that I have made some mistakes. I am willing to accept the consequences of those actions."

The 2011 National League MVP was suspended without pay for the rest of the season and the postseason Monday, the start of sanctions involving players reportedly tied to a Florida clinic accused of distributing performance-enhancing drugs.

Attention quickly turned to who's next? Will Alex Rodriguez or any of the other players tied in media reports to the Biogenesis of America clinic get disciplined and, if so, when?

Braun, a five-time All-Star, accepted a penalty 15 games longer than the one he avoided last year when an arbitrator overturned his positive test for elevated testosterone because the urine sample had been improperly handled.

More than a dozen players were targeted by MLB following a report by Miami New Times in January revealing relationships between Biogenesis and major leaguers. When Yahoo Sports reported in February that Braun's name was listed in Biogenesis' record, Braun said his lawyer had retained clinic owner Anthony Bosch as a consultant. Braun issued a

statement that said "I have nothing to hide."

MLB Commissioner Bud Selig announced Braun's penalty, citing the outfielder for unspecified "violations" of both baseball's drug program and labor contract. Braun's ban will cost him about \$3 million of his \$8.5 million salary.

With the Brewers in last place in the NL Central, they aren't likely to have any playoff games for him to miss.

"I wish to apologize to anyone I may have disappointed," Braun said. "I am glad to have this matter behind me once and for all, and I cannot wait to get back to the game I love."

Under the agreement reached by MLB and the players' association the specifics of Braun's admission were not made public.

A person familiar with the deal, speaking on condition of anonymity because no statements were authorized, said 50 games of the penalty were connected to Biogenesis. The additional

15 games stemmed from Braun's actions during the grievance that overturned his positive test from October 2011. The suspension will count as a first violation of the drug program, the person said.

Union head Michael Weiner said last week that arbitration hearings for players contesting suspensions likely would not start until September, which would delay any penalty until next season. But he also indicated the union would urge players to make a deal and get a suspension over with if there was strong evidence of guilt.

Negotiations over penalties for other players haven't begun, according to a second person familiar with the probe, also speaking on condition of anonymity because no statements were authorized.

Rodriguez acknowledged using PEDs while with Texas from 2001-03, but has denied taking them since.
