## Marshals nab suspect in store owner's killing

**Grandison captured without resistance in Harvey, La., home.**

U.S. Marshals arrested a man in Louisiana suspected of first-degree murder and armed robbery in Lake City last year.

Ernest Larry Grandison, formerly of 864 NW Thetis Place, was one of two suspects accused of the April, 2012 armed robbery and fatal shooting of Rajni Patel, police said.

According to the Lake City Police Department, around 1:36 p.m. Friday, April 27, 2012, police responded to an armed robbery at A&M Discount

Beverage on Duval Street only to find the suspects had fled. Patel, the store owner, had been shot.

According to reports, witnesses said Grandison, the alleged gunman, forced Patel's wife, Daxa Patel, behind the counter to get money. Rajni Patel was shot as he came out of a utility room closet, police said.

Police say Grandison's son-in-law and alleged accomplice, James

## Both could be sentenced to life

**Murder charges still pending from 2012 drug-related robbery.**

Two men suspected of murder were acquitted on drug trafficking charges but convicted of armed carjacking at a Columbia County courtroom Thursday.

La'Quanza D. Gee, of Live Oak, and Leonard S. Goodman, of Jacksonville, were found guilty of armed robbery during a drug deal turned robbery, according to State Attorney Jeff Seigmeister.

Gee and Goodman visited Carlos Lamar Williams, 31, in

Lake City on July 27, 2012, under the pretense of a drug deal involving half a pound of cocaine only to rob and murder Williams, authorities said.

As the duo fled, they carjacked an occupied vehicle at gunpoint.

Investigators determined that the occupants, a man and his nephew, did not have any connection to the night's events.

Gee's defense attorney Baya Harrison made closing arguments summarizing why the jury could not prove beyond reasonable doubt the drug trafficking charge.

"Investigators were not able to find discernible fingerprints on the bag of cocaine," Harrison said. He also referred to mechanical errors with LCPD's scales which put the trafficking charge into question.

According to the prosecution, the cocaine was divided into seven bags, each containing an

## Voight paid pittance for seminal role

NEW YORK

It was Jon Voight's portrayal of male prostitute Joe Buck in the 1969 film "Midnight Cowboy" that put him on the path to becoming an acting legend. Now he says he was paid a pittance for the part.

Voight says that he wanted the role so badly he told his agent, "I said, 'Tell them I'll do this part for nothing.'" The actor says to his surprise, "they took me at my word and they gave me minimum for 'Midnight Cowboy.'"

Voight spoke Wednesday as he was promoting his film "Getaway" co-starring Ethan Hawke and Selena Gomez that opens Aug. 30 and "Ray Donovan," the Showtime series he appears in opposite Liev Schreiber.

The Oscar- and Emmy-winning actor says the studio United Artists "even sent me a \$14.73 coffee shop charge," for meals his last day of shooting for the film in Texas. Voight also says he persuaded co-star Dustin Hoffman to try out for the role of Enrico "Ratso" Rizzo after the two became friends doing an off-Broadway show and that they auditioned for the movie together.

Looking back, Voight says, "It was the worst." But Voight says he had no regrets. "I knew what it meant. It was going to give me a career and I was right."

"Yes, Forest Hills, Queens, New York. We just can't believe you all came. This is amazing," keyboardist Ben Lovett said. "We were like, 'Are you sure you can invite 17,000 people to a tennis court?' It hasn't happened in a long time."

## AROUND FLORIDA

### State lacking in health insurance

FORT LAUDERDALE — Florida had the nation's second-highest rate of residents without health insurance with almost 1 out of 4 Floridians lacking it, according to new U.S. Census figures released Thursday.

Only Texas surpassed Florida's rate of 24.8 percent of residents under age 65 without health insurance in 2011, the most recent year figures are available, the Census said.

Although that figure was down slightly from 2010, when 25.3 percent of Floridians were without health insurance, the rate of uninsured residents has inched up since 2008, when just over 24 percent of Floridians were without health insurance.

The half-decade spike in uninsured residents comes as the Republican-controlled Legislature ruled earlier this year not to expand Medicaid coverage to an estimated 1.1 million low-income Floridians under the federal health law.

In an unusual alliance, Gov. Rick Scott, Senate Republicans, Democrats, Florida hospitals, health advocates and a diverse mix of business and labor groups all supported a bill that would have drawn down more than \$50 billion from the federal government over the next decade and allow Floridians to purchase private insurance. But leaders in the GOP-led Florida House refused to consider that proposal, saying they didn't want to take funds tied to President Barack Obama's health care overhaul.

Counties in south Florida with large numbers of farmworkers and

immigrants led the state in uninsured residents.

Three counties in northeast Florida had the lowest rate of uninsured residents: St. Johns County (15.4 percent); Clay County (17 percent); and Baker County (17.9 percent).

### Group hits Scott on environmental

TALLAHASSEE — Enforcement of the state's environmental laws has plummeted under Gov. Rick Scott and the private company attorney he picked to lead the Department of Environmental Protection, according to a report to be released Thursday by a group that represents government workers who work in environmental regulation.

The Public Employees for Environmental Responsibility report says that since Scott took office and Secretary Herschel Vinyard took over DEP in 2011, enforcement has dropped by just about every measure. For example, DEP opened 1,587

cases in 2010 and 663 last year. Similar drops were shown in consent orders, which dropped from 1,249 in 2010 to 482 last year, as well as penalties assessed.

The report said the department essentially has become nonfunctional under Vinyard, who worked for a shipyard before Scott appointed him secretary.

### Sinkholes found at Tampa school



TAMPA — Students at Cambridge Christian School are getting an extra-long Labor Day weekend, thanks to a possible sinkhole on the Tampa campus.

# Siegmeister wants credit shared in capture of fugitive Grandison

State Attorney Jeff Siegmeister said he was frustrated with news releases from local law enforcement agencies about the capture of Ernest Larry Grandison on Thursday.

"I'm a little disappointed that there's people more concerned with taking credit than actually having spent the effort to catch Mr. Grandison," Siegmeister said.

Grandison, a suspect in the April 2012 murder of a local convenience store owner, was taken into custody by U.S. Marshals Thursday morning in Jefferson Parish, La.

A news release from the Lake City Police

Department said Investigator David Greear "spearheaded the investigation" with help from local, state and federal agencies.

"I want to commend Investigator David Greear for his tireless efforts and the numerous hours spent finding and developing leads that brought us to the successful capture today by the U.S. Marshal Service," LCPD Chief Argatha Gilmore said in the release.

Siegmeister said credit should go where it's due.

"I can assure you that Ryan Nydam of my office and Robbie Shotwell of FDLE have spent tens of hours chasing down where he might be," he said.

Nydam and Shotwell were

responsible for the bulk of the investigative work leading to Grandison's capture, according to Siegmeister.

"I don't want credit for myself," Siegmeister said. "But I want the efforts of Ryan and Robbie to not go unnoticed."

Investigator Craig Strickland, who wrote the LCPD release, said there was no intent to steal credit for the capture.

He said "spearheaded" was meant to refer only to LCPD's role in the investigation.

"If we started naming investigators from every agency, I'd leave someone out, and I wouldn't want to discredit another agency by not naming someone," he said.

A news release from the

Columbia County Sheriff's Office said an investigator with the state attorney's office contacted a sheriff's detective with information on Grandison's possible whereabouts.

"The detective, who is also a sworn task force officer for the U.S. Marshal Service, developed crucial intelligence" that led to Grandison's capture, the release said.

Siegmeister said the sheriff's office "assisted us in a number of ways," for which he was grateful.

"I'm very proud of the working relationship we have with the state attorney, FDLE and U.S. Marshals," Columbia County Sheriff Mark Hunter said. "Everyone worked hard to bring this to an end."

Leonard Johnson, fled on foot while Grandison unsuccessfully tried to carjack a vehicle in the parking lot then also fled on foot.

Grandison's daughter, Sheena Marie, was arrested earlier this year for her alleged role in the robbery. She drove the men to a location near the store minutes before they entered, police said.

Around 6:44 a.m. Thursday, Grandison was staying with a woman

in Harvey, La., when members of the U.S. Marshals' Gulf Coast Regional Fugitive Task Force arrested him without incident, according to Third Circuit State Attorney Jeff Siegmeister and Jackson Parish (La.) Sheriff's Office's public information officer Col. John N. Fortunato.

Siegmeister said he knew from multiple sources that Grandison had vowed not to be taken alive. However, he said, the marshals were able to

take him by surprise and he did not resist.

Johnson was arrested in Jacksonville weeks after the robbery.

Grandison is being held in Jefferson Parish Correctional Center without bond and faces extradition on charges of armed robbery and first-degree murder.

Local law enforcement officials were en route to Louisiana Thursday to interrogate him, Siegmeister said.

p.m.

Karen Parker, Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission public information coordinator, said the alligator that attacked Tennant has been euthanized.

"According to what investigators told me, Tennant was part of a dock building crew on Lake Jeffery that was constructing a 500-foot dock," Parker said. "He was in about 4-foot-deep water when an 8-foot, 3-inch, male alligator came up and bit him on the leg."

Another man who was working with Tennant was able to get him out of

the gator's grasp, get him in a canoe and get him back to shore."

Tennant was taken to the University of Florida Health Hospital in Gainesville and

was in surgery, Parker said.

"The first reports said he had an amputation below the knee, but fortunately that's not the case," she said. "It is a very severe bite, but he did not lose his leg."

Following the attack, the FWC quickly issued a nuisance permit for an alligator trapper to put the alligator down.

"The gator was euthanized," Parker said. "He was still hanging around the dock and two of our officers were able to dispatch the gator in a humane manner."

## SEWAGE: Pollution flowing into Suwannee River

Withlacoochee Rivers, resulted in a hydraulic overload at the Withlacoochee River Wastewater Treatment Plant on Aug. 22. The plant discharged approximately 12.1 million gallons of sewage into the Withlacoochee, which connects to the Suwannee near Ellaville.

Florida's DOH urges residents and visitors to take precautions when in contact with the Withlacoochee River from the Georgia border to Ellaville and the Suwannee River to Branford. This area includes Dixie County, Gilchrist County, Hamilton County, Lafayette County, Levy County, Madison County and Suwannee County.

The recent incident is another in a long line of spills that have occurred since the start of the year. Other reports surfaced in July, March and February.

"We get an inflow of storm water into the wastewater system," said John Waite, the environmental manager for the City of Valdosta. "It puts more water into the plant than it can hold."

According to Waite, the discharge was not raw sewage but a mixture of storm-water and water moving through the plant's treatment process. The wastewater should not contain identifiable objects that could distinguish it as sewage.

However, the Florida Department of Health warns that water contaminated by wastewater presents health hazards to humans by possibly containing microbes that can cause gastro-intestinal diseases.

Lake City resident David Sherrod — who owns a house on the Suwannee River in Lafayette County — plans to spend his three-day weekend by the water.

He said he's concerned with the continued polluting of his river by the Valdosta plant, believing it will not stop leaking sewage into the area's water systems.

"Nowadays, with everything going on in the world, what could be in that water?" he said. "It could be anything."

People need to speak out to stop the problem, Sherrod added. He went to

visit the plant on Monday, but felt like the public relations team undermined the importance of the incident.

"I'll be at the Suwannee this weekend," Sherrod said. "But I won't be getting in the water."

## Flawed school grades don't serve public

The education insiders who gathered this week in Clearwater at the governor's invitation were right about continuing Florida's move to Common Core State Standards. But they failed to recommend solutions for the short term, showing little political appetite for reforming the flawed school accountability system that will be used until the new standards take hold. That's not fair to students or schools that will continue to be evaluated based on a system that's lost credibility even with a key member of the state Board of Education. Clinging to a flawed system and condoning so much collateral damage does not build public trust in public education.

The three-day K-12 summit was Republican Gov. Rick Scott's first major foray into the details of public education policy — though he failed to show up to kick it off, sending instead interim Education Commissioner Pam Stewart. In a room packed with county school superintendents, state lawmakers and educators, there was tacit agreement that Florida's accountability system has gone off track in the past two years as the state embraced more than 30 changes to the school grading formula. Some of those changes may have been warranted, but the result — combined with continued changes in the Florida Comprehensive Assessment Test — is a scheme so complex and mistrusted that for the second year the Board of Education had to tweak the final results.

That prompted Board of Education member Kathleen Shanahan of Tampa — former chief of staff to then-Gov. Jeb Bush, the architect of Florida's school accountability system — to propose, but to no avail, that the state forgo awarding school grades until changes could be made. Abolishing school grades remains a more rational solution than the status quo, where the state intends to hold schools "accountable" under a system that isn't accountable for its own flawed methodology.

Scott's education summit ended up tacitly embracing such dysfunction for another year when it sidestepped the issue, focusing more on how the accountability system would work starting in 2014-15, when the Common Core State Standards are fully implemented. That shouldn't be the final word.

The last round of school grades under the flawed scheme aren't due until next summer, giving plenty of time for Scott or lawmakers to issue a mea culpa and agree to take a break from assigning school grades until the new Common Core system is fully vetted and in place. Parents still would be able to find out how their children's schools are performing on standardized tests and other measures. But more importantly, parents, teachers and students could have renewed confidence that Florida leaders are more interested in fairly and accurately assessing schools than in propping up a legacy system that has lost credibility.

## In Obamacare defunding fight, GOP needs strategy

Yet again, congressional Republicans have backed themselves into a corner by believing the left's anti-GOP talking points — this time on Obamacare.

"Shutting down the government just because I'm for keeping it open? That's not an economic plan," President Barack Obama said in Florida last month.

"Defunding the Affordable Care Act is not achievable through shutting down the federal government," parroted Sen. Richard Burr, R-N.C.

As Republican senators Ted Cruz, Mike Lee, Rand Paul and Marco Rubio keep repeating, they aim to shut down nothing. They want a continuing resolution that funds the entire federal government, except for the new health-care reform law. If Obama signs such a measure, the Federal Aviation Administration will keep controlling jet traffic, and the FBI will keep tracking terrorists. But Obamacare's cash will evaporate, as well it should.

Conversely, if Obama vetoes such a budget bill, he — not Republicans — may jeopardize federal operations while ignoring the 54 percent of Americans who disapproved of Obamacare in the latest Rasmussen survey.

Republican lawmakers should stop quivering in fear of a president with a 44 percent Gallup job-approval rating....

First, Republicans control the House of Representatives, the birthplace of spending bills. They should exercise their constitutional power and immediately consider language that funds everything but Obamacare.

Second, Republicans should adopt the left's practice of giving bills delicious titles. How can they counter liberal claims that they

want to padlock Washington? Call their Obamacare-defunding vehicle the Keep Government Open Act of 2013.

Third, the House should pass this bill immediately after Congress reconvenes Sept. 10. This legislation then would define the public debate until Oct. 1. Democrats cannot accuse Republicans of closing the government if the GOP gives Senate Democrats and Obama nearly three weeks to respond to the House proposal.

This early vote also will put House Democrats on the record. Do they stand with Americans who face rising premiums and are losing their insurance, even if they like it, or do they stand with Obama, who illegally has decreed exemptions and delays to keep Obamacare wheezing along?

Fourth, with news cameras present, House Republicans should march this physical bill across the U.S. Capitol. Speaker John Boehner, R-Ohio, should declare: "We hereby deliver this measure to the Democratic Senate to complete the people's work and keep America's government open."

Fifth, while the Senate debates this Bill, House Hearings throughout September should showcase Obamacare's victims. These might include Americans who now work part time, as their employers confront Obamacare's rising costs.

Medical-device manufacturers should detail how Obamacare's fresh tax is unplugging new treatments. Teamsters President Jimmy Hoffa Jr. should explain why he wrote that Obamacare would "destroy the foundation of the 40-hour work week that is the backbone of the American middle class."

If public pressure prods enough Democrats to join Republicans in defunding Obamacare, perhaps Obama himself will accept this for one year.

Failing that, the GOP fallback position may be to place the program's funds in escrow in exchange for a one-year implementation delay.

Some Republicans simply would let Obamacare rip. Once functioning, they argue, Obamacare's costs will explode as its "benefits" collapse. The rebellious American people then will demand to have Obamacare's fangs dislodged from their necks.

But how? Repealing Obamacare post-implementation still will require congressional approval and Obama's signature. If that, essentially, is the battle Republicans would wage later, why not sooner?

"The problem with defunding is that on Jan. 1 Obamacare still will be the law," Rep. Duncan D. Hunter, R-Calif., told constituents in Fallbrook, Calif., last week. "That's why we need to repeal it."

But defunding vs. repeal is no either-or proposition. It's both: If a hostile tank prepares to roll into town and unleash doom, go look for anti-tank grenades. Meanwhile, drain its fuel.

# Testimony concludes in vehicular homicide trial

## Local man being tried after two died in accident.

State and defense attorneys rested their cases in the Jerry James Jackson Jr. vehicular homicide case Thursday afternoon. Closing arguments are set to begin 9 a.m. today in Columbia County Courthouse Courtroom 4.

Jackson, 36, is facing two counts of vehicular homicide and failing to render aid or provide information and is also charged with driving while license suspended or revoked (second offense) in connection with a fatal wreck that occurred Oct. 7, 2010. Christopher James Ratliff, a front seat passenger in Jackson's vehicle, and Ricky J. Groover, driver of the other vehicle, were killed.

Thursday the state with Roberta Getzan serving as prosecutor, sent four people to the witness stand and played a digital audio recording of an interview with Jackson by Florida Highway Patrol troopers the day after the accident.

Defense attorney Ralph Deas countered with one witness, an emergency room nurse, who said Jackson appeared incoherent to her before he was questioned by authorities, calling into question the validity of his answers.

The day's most compelling testimony came after lunch, when Florida Highway Patrol Master

Cpl. Harry Kin Weaver returned to the witness stand for the third time, and let the court listen to Jackson's interview.

The audio lasted nearly 30 minutes and featured Weaver and Florida Highway Patrol Cpl. Rodney Howard questioning Jackson.

Jackson told how he purchased the Jeep Cherokee, put a license plate on it from his father's truck and had no insurance.

Jackson said he's was going about 75 mph when the crash occurred, but he told authorities he thought it was a 55 mph speed zone. He said neither he nor Ratliff were wearing seat belts and Groover's vehicle just pulled out in front of them.

"I tried to dodge him," Jackson said. "I either got thrown (from the vehicle) or fell out..."

Jackson said his vehicle was carrying a container with about five gallons of gasoline behind Ratliff's seat.

"I told him, 'Get out dog, get out,'" Jackson said on the tape, noting he tried to get Ratliff to exit, but the vehicle was on fire and he couldn't get to him.

Jackson told authorities that he ran to the ditch and lay there until he woke up around 9 the next morning, "in the bushes in the ditch."

Jackson said he didn't see EMS, law enforcement or firefighters that night, but crawled out the ditch the next morning and used branches as crutches to make his way to the Chevron Service Station

where he called his mother and asked her to pick him up around 1 p.m. on Oct. 8.

He told authorities that he didn't have any mechanical issues with the truck and that the brakes and steering worked.

Jackson said he didn't have time to hit the brakes to avoid the crash.

"He (Groover) pulled right out, just that split second," he said on the recording, noting he didn't think he would have been able to avoid the crash if he were traveling the speed limit. "He (Groover) pulled straight out in front of us."

When Deas cross-examined Weaver, he questioned him about the law requiring wrecks be reported by the involved motorists and he asked Weaver if he recalled telling Jackson about other witnesses who saw him the night before crash. Weaver said he did not tell Jackson about other witness statements, but after hearing the recording and reading the transcript, Weaver said his previous answer was incorrect. Deas said Jackson was not required to report the wreck that night because he was in no condition to do so.

Deas then questioned Jackson's state of mind during the interview, asked Weaver whether he followed up on Jackson's statements that Groover's truck pulled out in front of him and also questioned Jackson's literacy because Jackson told Weaver he had trouble spelling.

"Why would you not follow up on his leads," Deas asked Weaver.

Deas continued the line

of questioning when he brought the defense's only witness, Brittany Selph, to the stand.

Selph, who was working as an emergency room nurse the day that Jackson came in with injuries from the wreck, testified that he was in a lot of pain and the doctor told her to give him Loratab.

"He was answering questions and falling asleep during triage," she said, noting she woke him up by speaking to him.

Following Selph's testimony, Deas spoke to Jackson for several minutes, but Jackson said it was his decision not to get on the witness stand.

The day's testimony began with Robert "Bob" Hampson, a former Columbia County EMS worker, taking the stand. Hampson told the court what his duties were during a multi-vehicle crash and explained what his duties were during the fatal crash.

Hampson's ambulance was the first at the crash scene and he and his partner attempted to render aid to Groover. Hampson read information from his patient care report as he described his actions that

night.

"I tried to get to the vehicle on fire, but the fire was too hot," he said, noting he looked around the area to make sure no one had been thrown or ejected from the vehicles. "The only two people I could see were the two people in the full-sized pickup truck."

He said the impact was on the driver's side of the Groover vehicle and prevented first responders from getting into the driver's side of the vehicle.

"Mr. Groover couldn't get out, so I did my patient care in the truck," Hampson said. "He was very anxious and wanted to get out the truck."

Hampson said he called a helicopter to the scene because his examination indicated Groover needed to be taken to a trauma center, while a second EMS unit worked on Groover's wife.

Hampson was also working the day after the wreck when he was called to a McCall Terrace address and met Jackson.

He said Jackson was complaining of pain in the lower back, right knee, right leg and a sore neck and he examined Jackson before

taking him to Shands Lake Shore Hospital.

Hampson said Jackson told him he was in a wreck the night before.

"I did not observe the accident, I just know what Mr. Jackson told me," he said. "He (Jackson) said he was driving about 55 mph and a Winnebago pulled out in front of me."

Jesse Quinton Brett, Jackson's cousin, said he was riding in the ill-fated vehicle with Jackson and Ratliff the day before the crash and was there when they went to the Stop and Go gas station in Five Points and bought gas, cigarettes and that Ratliff put about five gallons of gas in a container that was placed in the vehicle.

Howard was also recalled to the witness stand and testified about the questions he asked Jackson during Jackson's interview in the hospital.

Deas filed motion for a judgment of acquittal after the state rested its case and before Selph testified on the grounds that Jackson's speeds were not excessive enough to be considered as reckless, however, Judge Julian Collins denied the motion.

average of 24 grams of cocaine. In Florida, drug trafficking charges for cocaine start at 28 grams. Harrison also cited technical errors LCPD experienced with their scales that may have displayed the drug's weight incorrectly.

"It's just not there," Harrison said, referring to irrefutable proof.

While the duo are sus-

pected of murdering Williams in the process, the murder charge was severed from Thursday morning's trial.

"We're trying to negotiate with one or both of them to settle the homicide," Siegmeister said. "In all likelihood, based on the seriousness of what they're facing, we probably won't try the homicide."

Siegmeister said it was

important for the family to have closure but that Gee will already receive a mandatory life sentence because he is a convicted felon.

Although he has no criminal record, Goodman could get up to life for his role in the carjacking. Siegmeister said he was not inclined to spend more tax money trying the homicide.

ter what others think, he must stand up for Jesus. He will not entangle himself with the affairs of this life, that he may please those around him. He stays on course for the Lord.

Verses 5-10 tell us he is strict. Verse 5 says if one competes in athletics, he has to compete according to the rules. If he does

not obey the rules he will be disqualified. In verse 7, Paul says to Timothy, "Consider what I say." The Greek word for consider means "to perceive with the mind." The Lord is who gives understanding. Verse 10 says a good soldier will "endure all things for the sake of the elect."

It is a war and the Devil's army will come at you from every side. The good soldier has rules, but the Devil's soldiers do not. Verse 11-13 tell us that the good soldier is secure: "If we die with Him, we will live with Him, if we endure, we will reign with Him."

He is of sound faith because he does what verse 15 tells him to do: "Be diligent to present yourself approved to God, a

worker who does not need to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth." He shuns the things of the world that have no benefit or cause confusion.

A good soldier knows his commander and chief is the Lord Jesus Christ. Verse 19b says, "The Lord knows who are His" (soldiers), and "Let everyone who names the name of Christ depart from iniquity."

The question must be asked. Which army are you in? One army leads to eternal life, the other to eternal damnation. Join the Lord's army before it is too late.

## Hymenaeus

In both of his personal letters to Timothy, Paul warns his "true child in the faith" about Hymenaeus. He is used by Paul to illustrate certain unfavorable characteristics of a Christian.

In Paul's first letter to Timothy, he says that Hymenaeus has "rejected" the faith and "suffered shipwreck in regard to [his] faith" (1 Timothy 1:19). In this same letter, Paul said he had "delivered [Hymenaeus] over to Satan, so that [he] may be taught not to blaspheme" (1:20).

In the second letter, Paul says that the "talk" of Hymenaeus had "spread like gangrene" (2 Timothy 2:17) and that he had "gone astray from the truth." Not only had he gone astray but he was upsetting "the faith of some" (2:18).

One of the first unfavorable

characteristics illustrated by Hymenaeus is that he made "shipwreck of [his] faith." Using this metaphor, Paul is saying that the faith of Hymenaeus has been totally destroyed; it has sunk. He has departed from the doctrine of Christ.

A second unfavorable characteristic of Hymenaeus was that he was trying to destroy the faith of those with whom he associated. The things which he was speaking to other people, namely, "worldly and empty chatter" was leading them to "further ungodliness" (2 Timothy 2:16).

A third unfavorable characteristic of Hymenaeus was that he thought he was a faithful Christian when Paul, an apostle with authority from God to make judgments on people's faithfulness, said that he was not. Paul said that he "delivered [Hymenaeus] over to Satan so

that he might be taught not to blaspheme" (1 Timothy 1:20). Using a quote from somewhere, Paul says, "Let everyone who names the name of the Lord abstain from wickedness" (2 Timothy 2:19).

A fourth unfavorable characteristic of Hymenaeus was that he thought what he was teaching other people was correct. He and other people were "saying that the resurrection has

already taken place" but Paul said that they were wrong.

Hymenaeus gives us a very good example of how a Christian can go astray; how they can leave the faith. He serves as a good example of how people can lead others astray and thus destroy their faith. Just because someone becomes a Christian does not mean that they are always going to be faithful to the Lord. Just because at one time they believe the truth about a subject taught by either the Lord Himself or the apostles does not mean that he will always believe the truth about that subject.

When someone around us is acting like Hymenaeus, we need to follow Paul's instructions to Timothy. We need to work with this individual in correcting his false teaching and his evil influence on others. However, if he

will not repent, then we need to "turn him over to Satan" so that he can learn some things. We never need to stop loving our brother, but if he has "gone astray" and will not return, then we must stop associating ourselves with him for his good.

The Bible contains not only good examples for us to follow but also bad examples that we need to avoid. May we not be like Hymenaeus, but rather be like Timothy "handling accurately the word of God" (1 Timothy 2:15), every day working to save ourselves as well as those who will listen to us (1 Timothy 4:16).

# God provides wisdom when needed

**W**ouldn't it be great if we could fix other people? Since we are all prone to try this, you (like me) have discovered that trying to change somebody is a lot like spitting in the wind. It doesn't work, and it can get real messy!

In fact, we are even limited in our own ability to produce lasting change in ourselves. So why on earth do we ever think we can change someone else?

The boundary of power makes clear what we have power over and where we have no power. It is critical for us to understand that we have no power over the attitudes and actions of other people. We cannot make them more mature or responsible. We also cannot change another person's character or stop their bad habits, no matter how obvious it is to us that they need to.

What we do have is the power

to influence others. Webster's dictionary defines "influence" as "power of producing an effect without force or a direct command." Think about some things that we often do to try and get someone to change: repeat ourselves over and over (better known as nagging), criticize, scream and yell, bully, threaten, withdraw and give the silent treatment. Now think about those who influence you. Would someone doing these things make you want to listen and cooperate? Me neither.

We all are more likely to respond to someone who is not trying to "fix us," even if we know they don't approve of our choices or behavior. Instead we can draw a boundary by saying something like, "Your irresponsible behavior (be specific) is causing problems in our relationship. Is there some way I can help you? I love you, but if this behavior continues our relationship will suffer (explain

how). It is your choice." This allows the "offender" to be aware of the problem and to understand the consequences if they continue their irresponsible behavior. This may mean not being included in certain activities or a distancing in the relationships. It also gives the freedom to choose to change the behavior with the benefit of being reconnected to the relationship.

The problem is that we spend so much time and effort trying to change someone with ways

that hurt our influence with them, that we actually lose what we did have power over to start with.

The most important part of the boundary of power is gaining wisdom, so that we don't spend time and energy where we have no power and keep our influence where we do. The very familiar "Serenity Prayer" offers a great explanation:

"God, grant me the serenity (calm and without worry, stress or disturbance)

to accept the things I cannot change (have no power over), the courage (the ability to face danger, difficulty, uncertainty, or pain without being overcome by fear or being detoured from a chosen course of action)

to change the things I can (that I do have power over), and the wisdom to know the difference.

The Bible tells us in James

1:5 that "If anyone lacks wisdom, they should ask God, who gives generously to all without finding fault, and it will be given to him."

This means that we can bring our problems to God and ask the question: Do I have power to change something in this situation, and if I do, where?

When we do, He will generously give us wisdom without blaming and finding fault.

Why would God do this? He wants us to have strong, healthy relationships ... because our hearts do matter.

His plan is spoken of by Old Testament prophets throughout Israel's history. In a phrase His plan essentially was, "Someone is coming." Then it became "Someone is here." Finally (and even now it is) "Someone is coming again."

This someone is Jesus! Paul says, "In reading this, then, you will be able to understand my insight into the mystery of Christ, which was not made known to people in other generations as it has now

been revealed by the Spirit to God's holy apostles and prophets. # Top teams to tangle

## Columbia High and Gainesville High ready to rumble in 'The Jungle'

Two years and two times the Tigers have tasted a bitter defeat against Gainesville High under head football coach Brian Allen.

It was the lone blemish on last year's record for Columbia High before the Tigers ran the table for the rest of the regular season.

Columbia would have faced Gainesville for a chance to make it to the Class 6A State Championship had it not been for a loss in the panhandle to Navarre High.

It's the reason the Tigers had this game circled on their calendar since the pre-season.

Columbia's quest for a state championship in 2013 begins at 7:30 p.m. tonight with a chance for redemption against the school that has plagued the Tigers for two years, but this time, it's at home.

A couple of questionable calls at Citizen's Field in Gainesville were the difference for the Hurricanes last year.

Tony James had an apparent fumble in the fourth quarter, but the referees ruled that his knee was down before the ball came free.

Columbia would again hold on fourth down, but a defensive holding penalty again extended the drive for the Hurricanes.

With the game still tied at 14-14, the Hurricanes got a third do-over with an offside penalty allowing Alex Halloway to kick the game-winning field goal from 27-yards away.

But that was two different teams. Gainesville came into that game as the state's second-ranked team, while Columbia was No. 5 in Class 6A.

This year, both teams replace a host of seniors including 23 for the Tigers, but each team still shares state aspirations.

The key for both teams could be the offensive line where both must replace a host of starters. Columbia returns only Deonte Crumitie and Milla Chasteen, so Allen expects that to be a key for the Tigers.

"Up front is one of our key areas as long as we can have the quarterback making sound play calls," Allen said.

Gainesville likes to blitz, so the Tigers must make the right adjustments to allow running back Lonnie Underwood to reach the open field.

"We should be able to run successfully," Allen said. "We had success at FCA up the middle and on the edge."

But Allen also said the Tigers must play better this week defensively despite not giving up a point against

Trinity Christian Academy in the kickoff classic.

"Defensively, we have to do better in coverage," Allen said. "We can have a sack here and there, but if the coverage isn't sound behind it, we're in trouble. We have to have everyone

going the right way on our stunts and not running into each other. We should be better on defense."

Allen said the key will be to make James one dimensional in the run game and the Tigers will come out on top.

"If we can force them to run east and west and not between the tackles, we should be all right," Allen said. "He isn't a pounder like (Raphael) Webb. If we can force that, we absolutely should be fine."

## Matt Kenseth emerges from mid-season doldrums to claim victory in IRWIN Tools Night Race at Bristol Motor Speedway

As NASCAR's Sprint Cup Series drivers head into the toughest 12 weeks of the season, some drivers, like Matt Kenseth and Joey Logano, are hot, while others, like five-time champion Jimmie Johnson, are not.

Kenseth emerged from some mid-season doldrums to score a strong win at Bristol Motor Speedway Saturday night, giving him five wins for the season, which translates to 15 bonus points when the standings are reset after the Sept. 7 race at Richmond International Raceway.

Johnson, on the other hand, has the series points lead heading into Sunday night's AdvoCare 500 at Atlanta Motor Speedway, but he's had a rough month. Since his runner-up finish at Indianapolis Motor Speedway on July 28, he's seen his points lead over second place drop from 75 to 18. In the past two weeks he's had finishes of 40th and 36th, due to a blown engine at Michigan and a crash at Bristol.

For Kenseth, in his first season at Joe Gibbs Racing, his Bristol performance — especially holding off Kasey Kahne at the end even though Kahne had fresher tires — has him feeling a sense of momentum heading into the final two weeks of the regular season and on into the Chase.

"I think this [Bristol] weekend was huge for us," Kenseth said. "Even if we would have run second and got beat at the end ... at least for me, it would have been a very encouraging weekend. It would have been a shot in our arm, like man, we had all our speed back."

"Hopefully that gives you momentum. The next 12 weeks are the most important 12 weeks of the season, so I feel like: Approach every race the same. Go out with the idea of trying to qualify the best you can and prepare like you're going to go try to win the race."

For Johnson, it was another missed chance to get some mojo of his own going as he heads into the Chase. His points position has him locked into a Chase berth, but winning the regular season offers no reward

come Chase time, as all 12 Chase drivers start with the same number of points, plus three bonus points for each regular season win for the top 10.

"This racing stuff happens," Johnson said. "Luckily, we had a big points lead that we can kind of deal with right now. We certainly want to clean things up and have some great finishes rolling into the Chase. We'll keep after it, and be back again next week."

But he said the most important thing is what happens during the Chase.

"Once the Chase starts, it is its own animal. So we'll just wait and see what happens during those 10 [races]," he said.

Logano also appears to be gaining steam at a good time. He followed up his Michigan win with a powerful run at Bristol, where he bounced back from an early crash and drove his patched-up Ford to a fifth-place finish.

## Greg Biffle maintains wait-and-see approach toward Gen-6 car and new tire compound at Atlanta Motor Speedway

Last year when Greg Biffle arrived at Atlanta Motor Speedway for the AdvoCare 500, he was the series points leader and assured of a berth in the Chase for the Sprint Cup. But a lot has changed in a year's time, including the characteristics of the cars and tires that will be run at Atlanta this year.

Biffle is one of the drivers on the Chase bubble, counting on a strong run at AMS to propel them into the 10-race, championship-deciding Chase, which begins after the Sept. 7 race at Richmond International Raceway. He's ninth in the standings, with one win, but just 17 points ahead of 11th-place Brad Keselowski with two more races, including Atlanta, to run before the start of the Chase.

Adding drama to the AMS event is the fact that the race is the first at the track for NASCAR's new Generation 6 race car, and Goodyear has developed a right-side tire that has two tread compounds to help drivers deal with AMS' worn asphalt, which has been in place since 1997.

"So much is different from last year," said Biffle, who finished ninth in Saturday's IRWIN Tools Night race at Bristol Motor Speedway. "These Gen-6 cars are all different. We're continuing to build new cars all the time and learning more and more about them. The reality is that

every week, the car is evolving. Every week we're coming out with the latest stuff or a little change here and there."

Biffle said he's heard good reports from his fellow drivers who tested the new AMS tire compound, but he's taking a wait-and-see attitude about it.

"You never know until you get there and you get on the tire and the track gets rubbered in," he said. "I'm looking forward to see how it holds up."

Although his only win at AMS came in 2003 in a Nationwide Series race, and in a Chevrolet, he said the track is among his favorites.

"It's a fun race track," he said. "I like that place. We haven't had as much success there as we've had at other mile-and-a-half tracks, but that could change with this Gen-6 car and the things we're doing with it."

Another question heading into the AMS race is which drivers and teams are hot and which are not as we approach the final two races of the regular season. Biffle said that's something that changes from week to week.

"It's not like anybody's on fire," he said. "A lot of it is due to this new car. For the next few years, we'll still be learning it."

## Dale Jarrett remembers his great car and big win at Atlanta Motor Speedway in 1997

Many race drivers tend to remember the races that got away more than the ones they won, but ESPN commentator Dale Jarrett said his only win at Atlanta Motor Speedway stands out much more than the five times he was runner-up, including a stretch of three consecutive second-place finishes.

Jarrett's big win came in the spring of 1997, in the final race on the old true-oval configuration before it was transformed into the quad-oval it is today. He was driving the No. 88 Ford for Robert Yates Racing and led a whopping 253 of the 328 laps that day.

"I remember what a great car I had," Jarrett said. "We were pretty much dominant throughout the day."

"I enjoyed racing at that track so many other times, but this was the first time I had a car that I felt like, 'OK, I can drive this race track the way I've always wanted to, just attack it.'"

"And I was able to do that. Things were perfect all day long."

Like many other aspects of his career, Jarrett's win at Atlanta had parallels to the victory his father, Ned Jarrett, scored at Atlanta back in 1964.

Dale Jarrett was there to witness his father's win, and Ned Jarrett watched his son win from atop the spotters' stand since his contract with CBS prevented him from participating in the ABC broadcast that day.

Ned Jarrett's win in the Dixie 400 was his only one at Atlanta, and like his son's win, it came in a race where another driver had a horrendous, wall-cracking crash. In Ned Jarrett's win, Doug Cooper knocked out a section of guardrail and 30 supporting posts, causing a caution period of 47 laps. In Dale's win, it was Steve Grissom knocking a hole in the backstretch wall, necessitating a red-flag period for repairs.

Sometimes, even now, he gets a chance to partially relive those on-track memories when he turns laps at the wheel of a Dale Jarrett Racing Adventure car.

"Even times that I get to drive a school car now, I enjoy it," he said. "It brings back fun memories."

Kurt Busch is headed to Stewart-Haas Racing, beginning in 2014. Busch told reporters on Monday that he's signed on to join team co-owner Tony Stewart, Kevin Harvick and Danica Patrick.

Busch currently drives the No. 78 Chevrolet for Furniture Row Racing and is 12th in the Sprint Cup standings, well within reach of a berth for the Chase.

Joe Garone, general manager of Furniture Row Racing, said in a team release that he expects his team to continue its strong run despite the impending departure of Busch, a former Cup champion and 24-time winner on NASCAR's elite circuit.

"Right now, the main focus for Kurt and the team is to qualify for the Chase and contend for the 2013 championship," Garone said. "Furniture Row Racing's technical and engineering programs, along with a talented road crew, have made great strides this season, which have been evident with the consistently fast race cars that we have brought to the track week in and week out. We, along with our technical alliance with Richard Childress Racing, are deeply committed to continuing the work in progress."

Garone said his team is in the process of searching for a driver for 2014 and beyond.






