FIRE FEES PASS 4-1

DePratter casts dissenting vote as 150-plus turn out to weigh in on rate hikes.

residential and industrial/warehouse properties outside city limits.

Single-family residential units under six acres will pay \$183.32 on their next tax bill for fire assessments, while industrial/warehouse properties will pay \$0.13 per square foot. Commercial, institutional and land over six acres all saw decreases.

The purposes of the rate increases, county officials said, are to maintain the county's ISO rating, cover the full cost of fire services, fairly reflect distribution of effort and extend coverage to 2,800 more properties that currently lack adequate fire protection.

Had these proposals failed to pass, county officials said properties would drop to a PC-10, meaning a large majority of insurance compa-

A tip from another local enforcement agency resulted in the arrest of a local man who now faces charges of possession of child pornography, according to Florida Department of Law Enforcement officials.



Socoy

Jose Socoy, 27, of Branford, was arrested by the Lafayette County Sheriff's Office Thursday in connection with an FDLE Tallahassee Regional Operations Center Cyber Crime Unit investigation. Socoy was is charged with 10 counts of possession of child pornography, records show.

"We cannot reveal investigative techniques, but FDLE agents received a tip from a detective with the Alachua County Sheriff's Office," said Gretl Plessinger, FDLE spokeswoman. "While the detective was investigating, he received information about Jose Socoy, but it was outside his jurisdiction. The Alachua County Sheriff's Office provided information to FDLE agents, who opened an investigation."

It's tourney time again

Sixty teams to hit town this weekend for youth baseball.

After a month's hiatus for construction projects at the Southside Sports Complex, the facility is set to host its first post-upgrade tournament this weekend.

Harvey Campbell, Columbia County Tourist Development Council director, said there were no tournaments at the facility in August, which was largely

because of the start of school.

The Southside Sports Complex is slated to host a youth baseball tournament this weekend. The tournament has a 60-team field of competitors and the tournament will run from Saturday to Sunday afternoon.

"The fields are ready," Campbell said. "We're taking two fields out of play — one girls softball and one boy's baseball — and those fields will continue to be phased with the infields reworked and sod to the outfields. Those fields will continue to be reworked until they're all done. We'll do them in incre-

ments to not negatively impact tournament play."

During the past four to five weeks concession stands with restrooms were added to several four-field quads. New underground infrastructure such as sewage and electrical services were also added. Roofs were placed on top of dugouts at the Girls Softball Complex, minor fence repairs made, and new bleachers were bolted in place at several fields.

However, now that a majority of the upgrade and renova-

'Let's feed our people first'

Nearly 2,000 people requested food service assistance from Catholic Charities Lake City branch last month, a number that Chief Operating Officer Suzanne Edwards said is unusually low.

To help combat hunger, Lake City Mayor Stephen Witt announced a proclamation Thursday at City Hall declaring September 'Hunger Action Month,' a community-wide food drive to support Catholic Charities Florida Gateway Food Bank. Nationally, the month holds the same title.

"Years ago, people knew their neighbors, so you would know if they were in trouble," Edwards said. "[This food drive] is going back to the basics. Let's feed our people first."

O'Brien man dies in single-vehicle crash

O'BRIEN—A local man died when his car struck a tree in rural Suwannee County Thursday afternoon, the Florida Highway Patrol reported.

Joseph Harold Sweeney, 53, of O'Brien was southbound on 121st Road, five miles northwest of O'Brien, when his 2002 Impala veered off the right shoulder at 2:50 p.m., according to an FHP news release.

Sweeney steered left, causing the car to cross the unpaved roadway and strike a large pine tree on the left shoulder, according to an FHP press release.

Crash damage "protruded heavily" into the driver's compartment, the release said.

Sweeney, who was not wearing a seat belt, was airlifted to Shands at Gainesville, where he died, FHP reported.

Underwood performs new football theme

NASHVILLE

Carrie Underwood has taken the handoff from Faith Hill to perform the musical introduction for NBC's "Sunday Night Football," but don't expect the two country superstars to sing it the same way.

Hill performed the song for the last five seasons before Underwood took over this year. The singer said she wanted to put her own style on "Waiting All Day for Sunday Night," the theme song based on Joan Jett's rock 'n' roll anthem "I Hate Myself for Loving You." Underwood's version debuts Sunday before the Dallas Cowboys host the New York Giants.

"We were definitely mindful — she had put her mark on it for so many years," Underwood said in a telephone interview. "We definitely wanted to go in and make sure we switched gears a little bit and made it sound more like me. And changed up the look and the feel just so it wasn't, you know, the same song with a different blonde up there singing it."

Besides the football theme song, the former "American Idol" champion spoke about expanding her acting experience by starring as Maria in NBC's live holiday production of "The Sound of Music," and also returning with Brad Paisley as co-hosts for the 47th annual Country Music Association Awards on Nov. 6 on ABC.

Hospital emerges from bankruptcy

WAUCHULA — A southwest Florida hospital that treats brain injuries has emerged from bankruptcy, nearly a year after a state investigation into reports of patient abuse and neglect at the facility.

The Florida Institute for Neurologic Rehabilitation Inc., and three affiliated corporations filed for bankruptcy in Tampa earlier this year. The hospital announced Thursday that a judge has approved its reorganization plan after the hospital said it improved its cash flow.

In January, reports revealed the hospital owed between \$3 million and \$30 million to 103 to 346 creditors.

500 baby turtles to be released

BOCA RATON — The U.S. Coast Guard is helping a marine scientist release more than 500 sea turtle hatchlings by hand off the coast of Boca Raton.

On Thursday, crewmembers from Coast Guard Station Fort Lauderdale will assist Melanie Stadler, a marine scientist with Gumbo Limbo Nature Center.

The hatchlings come from turtle nests from beaches throughout Florida, a primary nesting ground for loggerhead sea turtles. The turtles are being released as part of a program run by the marine center.

Noxious odor settles over Tampa

TAMPA — Officials are blaming a noxious odor that's settled over Tampa and the eastern portion of Hillsborough County on pesticides sprayed on

strawberry fields.

Tampa Fire Rescue and the Hillsborough County Health Department issued alerts Thursday morning, letting residents know that smell comes from a pesticide called Paladin. It contains dimethyl disulfide, which the Environmental Protection Agency has deemed the compound safe.

But that didn't stop people from holding their breath as they went about their business on Thursday.

Police find body of missing teen

MIAMI — Miami-Dade police said they've found the body of a missing teenager in a canal near the Florida Everglades.

Family members told police they had not heard from Jesus Trejo, 18, since Tuesday. He was last seen at a friend's house.

Investigators found his abandoned vehicle on Wednesday, parked on a roadway in southwest Miami-Dade County.

Late Wednesday, divers found a body in a nearby canal. Police have confirmed it is the missing teen.

Investigators said the case is currently being worked as a homicide.

No further information was immediately available.

Stein Mart August sales figure rises

JACKSONVILLE — Stein Mart Inc. said Thursday that August revenue at stores open at least a year rose 3.8 percent, driven by strong sales of linens, gifts and dresses.

Weaker categories were women's sportswear and special sizes and men's sportswear and jewelry.

The strongest regions during the four-week period ended Aug 31 were Florida and the Southeast, while the Midwest and California fared worse.

Total revenue for the month rose nearly 3.7 percent to \$83.3 million.

Fugitive found hiding in air vent



GAINESVILLE — A fugitive is back in jail after deputies found him hiding in a Gainesville apartment's air conditioning system.

Museum's back up and running

The 130-year-old house containing centuries of North Florida history and artifacts is opening its doors to the public once again.

The Lake City Columbia County Historical Museum reopened Thursday after being closed for much of the summer while minor repairs and contracting work were completed during one of the museum's slowest months of the year.

Volunteer archivist Margie Stanfield and museum treasurer Pat McAlhany spent much of Thursday afternoon sorting boxes of historical data donated by Joan Shelton Allen, a former Fort White resident.

"Joan was instrumental in getting the deed to a cemetery in

the Three Rivers Estates from the Seminole War era," Stanfield said, motioning toward a pile of boxes and folders in the corner. "She left a lot of notes and information on the pioneers of Fort White. We'll probably be going through this for months."

The information will be added to the museum's already extensive collection of historical data and geneological information.

Several new docents, or "informed volunteers" according to McAlhany, were hired to help introduce guests to the centuries of Columbia County history contained within the museum as well.

The museum, located on the corner of Hernando Avenue and Nassau Street, is open every Thursday and Saturday from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. Although admission is free, donations are encouraged.

nies would either hike their premiums or drop coverage altogether.

District 5 Commissioner Scarlet Frisina proposed levying the full assessment while charging property classes the same rates under the revised budget formula for the first year.

In this scenario, property classes would pay about 25 percent less than the full amount with a \$1.4 million shortfall being taken out of the county's financial reserves.

District 1 and District 4 commissioners Ron Williams and Stephen Bailey were wary of Frisina's motion, calling it "not a good fiscal policy" that would "open up a can of worms," according to Bailey.

"If we lose that reserve money, we're doomed," Williams said, adding that he doesn't feel comfortable using reserves to cover expenses over \$10,000.

District 2 commissioner

Rusty DePratter favored Frisina's proposal, comparing it to his personal business staying afloat the last four years through contributions from his savings account.

"If I had to take money out of the county's savings account to help a few folks out, I would consider it," DePratter said. "I don't see any difference."

The motion failed, however, with only votes in favor from Frisina and DePratter.

A second motion adding an additional property class passed 5-0 and was added to the fire assessment legislation.

Properties deemed "multi-family residential," such as duplexes and condominiums, will pay \$82.49 per dwelling unit.

When brought to a final vote, however, the full fire assessment legislation passed 4-1 with DePratter as the sole dissenting vote.

"The process should've

started a few months earlier," he said after the meeting. "We needed more time to work out some different issues."

Just over 150 residents gathered to express their discontent with the rate increases during a public hearing.

"I've lived in Columbia County for 76 years," Harry Aubrey said. "If I wanted all this stuff, I would've lived down there across from Shands. It just feels like somebody trying to sell us a Cadillac with Volkswagen tires."

Commissioners acknowledge citizens' concern.

"I don't like the increase, but I understand it," Frisina said.

"It's a tough pill to swallow," Williams said. "But that's why I was elected, to make decisions not based on emotions or political threats, but for what I think is best for Columbia County."

A search warrant at Socoy's home, 1343 NE Mandarin Road, Branford, revealed numerous video files of child pornography, records show.

On Sept. 5, a search warrant was conducted at the home. At least 11 videos depicting children under the age of 18 engaged in sexual conduct

were reportedly discovered. The videos were discovered on a computer located at the residence.

While the search was under way, FDLE special agents interviewed Socoy and after being advised of his Miranda Rights in Spanish, Socoy admitted he downloaded videos con-

taining child pornography, officials said.

Socoy was booked into the Lafayette County Jail and will be prosecuted by the Office of the State Attorney, Third Judicial Circuit.

tion has been completed, the facility is slated to host three tournaments in the coming months. The largest tournament will be a girls softball tournament in October, where preliminary estimates show there will be 70-80 teams participating in the event.

Campbell said there are

11 tournaments left on the schedule for the remainder of the year.

The construction and upgrade work recently completed were part of Phase 1 construction at the facility. Four phases of upgrade and renovation work have been scheduled at the complex.

According to county reports, construction costs associated with Phase 1 is approximately \$871,904. The county will pay an estimated \$339,727 for the work while the Columbia County Tourist Development Council will contribute \$532,177.

The estimated costs of all

four phases of the project is \$2.9 million. The TDC will pay for \$1.7 million and the county will pay \$1.1 million.

The United States Department of Agriculture reported that 14.5 percent of American households remain food insecure, which means 1 in 6 homes had difficulty throughout the year providing enough food for all members of the family.

"A lot of the time, we take for granted how lucky we are to have the basic necessities," Witt said. "Unless we become aware, then things can go unnoticed and undone. Even though this is Hunger Awareness Month, people are hungry 12 months out of the year."

Locally, Catholic Charities — a partner of Feeding America — organized Feeding Neighbors, a local campaign to raise food and awareness. Edwards hopes the local spin encourages neighbors, Sunday School classes, charity organizations and more to support the cause.

Many times, school children go to bed having eaten only the meal provided to them by the Columbia County School

System, Edwards said. On the other hand, 54 percent of people who need food assistance are elderly, struggling to decide whether to buy groceries, medicine or pay rent.

"We're just asking people to think about their neighbors," Edwards added. "It's not a pretty or attractive subject, but it's our responsibility. Every neighborhood is being challenged today."

Catholic Charities Florida Gateway Food Bank asks for donations of non-perishable food, canned goods, cereals, dried goods and anything that does not have to be refrigerated. All donations are tax-deductible. Every Monday through Thursday morning, for two hours, Catholic Charities provides food assistance to local families who need it. This Thursday alone, the organization helped 27 families.

"Food goes out as quickly as it comes in," Edwards said. "Neighbors Feeding Neighbors — it comes back to community."

Don't retreat from flood insurance reform

Congressional reforms to the National Flood Insurance program will cause hefty rates increases, and affected homeowners are demanding the changes be delayed or eliminated.

Some revisions may be justified to keep costs manageable and soften any blow to the economy.

But Congress should remain committed to an overhaul needed to rescue a federal program that was washing away tax dollars.

The reforms were adopted by Congress last year to address a \$20 billion deficit.

The National Flood Insurance Program demonstrated the pitfalls of government's good intentions. It was aimed at helping homeowners deal with natural disasters but ended up encouraging dangerous and destructive construction in flood-prone areas.

Taxpayers were forced to continually bail out residents living in hazardous areas, though the program was supposed to be funded by premiums collected from property owners.

A few years ago a USA Today investigation found 20,000 homes had collected federal insurance payments that exceeded the value of their homes.

Payoffs came with no flood-prevention requirements. Homeowners were covered even as they rebuilt in risky areas.

Congress' reforms were aimed at stopping the money drain and bringing some market discipline by having the insurance rates more accurately reflect the risks.

The transition ... will be difficult, and the government should be willing to make some adjustments.

... [O]wners of older homes in certain flood zones could see their insurance costs in the coming year increase from about \$2,500 to \$15,000, which would be unaffordable for many people.

But for most homeowners ... the increases will be 10 to 20 percent while second homes, commercial properties and homes that have had repeated flood claims will begin to experience 25 percent annual hikes.

The increases are a result of the program curtailing what were essentially federally subsidized insurance rates for older homes built before flood maps accurately reflected the financial risks...

U.S. Rep. C.W. Bill Young of Pinellas County warned the Federal Emergency Management Agency the changes could "devastate the fragile real estate market" in many beach communities. A House measure would delay the increases for a year.

FEMA Director Craig Fugate should carefully attend the economic consequences and determine whether delay or further concessions are appropriate. But there should be no retreating from a reformed flood program.

It is a financial disaster because the government takes risks that private insurance companies never would contemplate.

There is nothing wrong with Washington trying to soften the blow of these changes.

But if the nation is ever going to put its fiscal house in order, vigorous discipline will be required.

The National Flood Insurance Program should provide a safeguard for catastrophic flood events, not spare homeowners marketplace realities.




Richard "Rick" Keifer

The meaning of Gog and Magog – Part 1

we really believe it is the humble thing to say that we cannot do something?

When someone says that they admire how righteous we are, why do we try to down play being righteous? Why do we make comments that we are not as righteous as one might think? Are we afraid of being successful? Is there more honor in being

a "sinner" than in being "righteous"? Do we have more "pride" in being a failure than in being successful? Why do we seem to put more focus on our sins than on our acts of righteousness?

Pride, boasting and arrogance is never acceptable in the presence of God or humanity. Thinking we are better than the person with whom we associate is never socially acceptable. However, should the thought that we might be prideful, boastful or arrogant keep us from admitting that we are righteous people? Can we properly evaluate ourselves for who we truly are (Romans 12:3)?

When we are righteous we need to graciously admit that we have been righteous. In the same vein, we need to believe that we can be righteous people! We need to have the confidence

that we can do what God has commanded in His word. We need to have the full assurance that we can go to Heaven (1 John 5:13).

God wants us to be with Him for eternity. He has done everything possible to pave the way for us to go to Heaven. We need to have the attitude that we can succeed and that we will be in Heaven with Jesus and all the believers from every generation. You can do it! You can be a winner! You can succeed! I hope you think so!

The toughest thing in the world

Sometimes the toughest thing in the world to do...is nothing. Is it just me, or do you agree that toddlers aren't the only ones who have a difficult time being still? Recently, I came across a verse that quickly became a favorite... and a challenge: "The Lord will fight for you; you need only to be still." (Exodus 14:14) A little background will help us understand the context:

The story of Exodus, the second book of the Bible, begins with the children of Israel in bondage 400+ years, and crying out to God to deliver them. By way of a burning bush, God sends Moses to lead the way, and after a string of unpleasant plagues, Pharaoh relents and sends them on their way. Only

later, when Pharaoh looked around and realized that all his free labor was gone, did he recall his decision and set out with his entire army to bring the Israelites back to Egypt. By this time, the Israelites had traveled to the edge of the Red Sea. Exodus 14:10 says, "As Pharaoh approached, the Israelites looked up, and there were the Egyptians, marching after them. They were terrified..." Understandably, this was a stressful situation and Moses was in charge...and his instructions were to "BE STILL!"

As a parent, can't you relate? How many times have you yelled, "Everybody just be still a minute and let me think!" Several of my aunts were telling family stories recently and shared with me that my grand-

ma was terrified of thunder and lightning, so anytime a storm blew in, she made everyone in the house go lie down on their bed. Perhaps this is hereditary because when my kids were small, if we were driving in the car in bad weather, I required them to be still! One of my boys even told his friend riding with us one day, "You have to be still,

because my mom can't drive in bad weather!" Nothing like a little fear to bring about compliance!

Being still doesn't seem to come natural for most of us...we are doers. I like to solve problems and get answers and check off my to-do list. Don't you? Yet there are times that being still is much more productive. Psalm 46:10 tells us to "Be still, and know that I am God; I will be exalted among the nations, I will be exalted in the earth." In this verse, the purpose of being still is to contemplate the power and might of God. These words will serve us well in our daily life of difficult decisions, difficult responsibilities, and difficult relationships. When everything you try seems to make the problem messier and bigger, "Be

still, and know that He is God." It is interesting that in Exodus 14:15, God immediately said to Moses "...tell the Israelites to move on." Once we get still, He will let us know when to move forward...because every heart matters!

Head of Southern Baptist school marks 20 years

LOUISVILLE, Ky. — For the last 20 years, Albert Mohler has led the flagship school of the Southern Baptist Convention, restoring it to more conservative principals even though it meant purging faculty who were out of step with his beliefs.

He expressed satisfaction with the transformation as he recently welcomed a new crop of students to the Louisville campus of stately brick buildings and perfectly manicured lawns. Donations, enrollment and the school's budget have grown dramatically since Mohler took the helm, and there's no sign of him leaving.

"I'm going to do it until they pry my cold, dead fingers," he said, making light of his two decades at the school. "There's a right time for everything. But I'm 53 and I fully intend to be here for my adult life. I'm not going anywhere else. This is where the Lord's called me and planted me."

Mohler took over as president of Southern Baptist Theological Seminary in 1993, when he was just 33. He is married and has two children.

When he speaks, it's often rapid fire, with vigor and emotion. He talks

about the seminary's current prosperity as a sign of God's blessing on the institution because it rejected liberal trends in society. He returned it to more conservative social ideas, such as the submission of women to their husbands, and a more strict interpretation of the Bible, such as the literal belief in Adam and Eve.

Mohler has risen to become an intellectual leader among conservative evangelicals and a well-known personality through his blog, books and television appearances.

But his personal growth and the seminary's is in contrast to the Southern Baptist denomination as a whole. Although still the nation's largest Protestant denomination, with a declared membership of 16 million people, the SBC does not wield the same political influence it did when President George W. Bush addressed the group's annual meetings.

And while the SBC's return to a conservative theology at first coincided with growth, in 2012 the denomination saw its sixth straight year of declining membership.

When Mohler took over as president, the massive upheaval known as the conservative resurgence was well under way in the SBC, but even 14 years later,

Southern still employed professors who held theological positions Mohler and others considered to be wrong.

For instance, some professors believed parts of the Bible were metaphorical, according to Nancy Ammerman, professor of sociology of religion at Boston University and author of "Baptist Battles." They might believe that God created the Earth but used evolutionary mechanisms to explain it. They didn't believe the six-day creation in Genesis literally referred to six, 24-hour days, she said.

One of the biggest conflicts was the role of women, both in the church and at home. The conservatives believe women should submit to their husbands and not teach men in the church or become pastors.

Bill Leonard, a professor of church history and Baptist studies at Wake Forest University, taught at Southern until 1992. He was Mohler's church history teacher at Southern.

Leonard said he knew he would be forced out after conservatives became a majority of the board of trustees in 1991, so he left on his own accord.

"It's less painful now," he said. "I would never have gotten to Wake Forest, which is the joy of my life,

if I hadn't been forced to leave. But it was painful at the time, extremely painful, because we loved that place."

Leonard said Southern is doing quite well, but he attributes much of the success to Mohler's strong personality and ability to recruit students and donors.

"While Southern Seminary seems healthy and thriving, the denomination that supports it is not," he said. "That's the gorilla in the sanctuary."

During Mohler's tenure, enrollment has grown to 4,366 last year from less than 3,000. The seminary's budget has more than doubled, from \$16 million when he took over to \$38 million. The seminary's endowment has risen from \$50 million to \$83 million. New buildings have been built on campus and others have been renovated.

Mohler recognizes both the SBC and the seminary are no longer within the mainstream on many issues, perhaps most nota-

bly on gay rights. While not addressing any one issue directly, Mohler called on students to stand for what they believe is right.

The temptation is to stay silent, to avoid offending some in society, he said.

"To fail to say something, or to be silent in a time of trouble, is sin," he said at a recent convocation on campus.

In an interview, Mohler acknowledged the personal toll that accompanied the seminary's transformation. Professors had to find new jobs and families had to move, but he's at peace with the overhaul.

"I know that it was right, and there's no regret in doing what I know was right," he said. "But there is a sober reality and recognition that the personal costs were very high."

Messages in tongues said down among Pentecostals

LOS ANGELES — At Three Crosses Church, Pastor Ken Walters urges his parishioners to join him in song and scripture. The charismatic 58-year-old extends his arms skyward and belts out melodies praising God.

While the small Assemblies of God congregation goes through all the traditional trappings of a Pentecostal service, there is one notable absence: speaking in tongues, a defining trait of the faith.

The 40-member church is among many nationwide that are reducing or cutting out speaking in tongues as they become more popular and move to the mainstream. It's a shift that has unsettled some more traditional Pentecostals who say the practice is at the heart of a movement that evolved out of an interracial revival and remains a spontaneous way for the poor and dispossessed to have a direct line to God.

They question the wisdom of placing less emphasis on a tenet that has defined Pentecostalism for more than a century.





Tigers take down Trojans

Columbia High wins battle of top five teams, 28-14.

TALLAHASSEE — The last time Columbia High defeated Lincoln High, Bill Clinton was president.

Columbia made a statement in Thursday night's showdown of top five teams with a 28-14 win at Gene Cox Stadium. The victory ended the 14-year drought in convincing fashion, but it did come with a price.

The Tigers lost Trey Marshall to an internal injury early in the first quarter and the senior was rushed to a hospital for emergency surgery.

"I'm not sure the extent of the injury yet, for all I know it is internal bleeding," Columbia head coach Brian Allen said. "I'm headed there after we leave to check on him."

Marshall began the game with a 90-yard return for a touchdown, but a block in the back would start Columbia at its own 28 and the the Tigers stalled.

Lincoln attempted a 40-yard field goal on its first possession, but the attempt sailed wide right.

Lonnie Underwood sprinted for 57 yards on the

first touch of Columbia's following drive and completed the possession with a five-yard touchdown run.

Lincoln matched the score two possessions later with a 32-yard touchdown run from Matthew Donaldson to tie the game

at 7-7 with 2:58 remaining in the first quarter.

A fake-punt pass from Underwood to Bryan Williams for 16 yards kept Columbia's following drive alive. Underwood put Columbia back on top with a score from 20 yards out.

Lincoln would match it with an 80-yard pass from Darius Harvey to John Burt with 11:44 remaining in the second quarter.

The Tigers had a pair of turnovers to save scoring drives before the half. Roger Cray picked off a

pass inside the five and Terry Calloway recovered a fumble to leave the score tied entering halftime.

Columbia began the second half with a fourth-down stop at it's 30. The Tigers then marched 70 yards in four plays to take the lead.

Austin Harper recovered a fumble for the Tigers on Lincoln's next drive to set up Underwood's fourth touchdown of the game. This time he rushed in from five yards for a 28-14 lead with 4:25 remaining in the third quarter.

Lincoln's final chance came with a first-and-goal situation at Columbia's 10-yard line with 3:28 remaining in the game.

Zedric Woods ended the Trojans' chances with a sack on fourth down to seal the game.

"You look at last week when he has 14 tackles and four tackles for losses and he comes back this week and plays even better," Allen said. "He's only a junior, but if he continues to play determined on every down, he's a BCS player."

Allen wouldn't call this his biggest win as Tigers' head coach, but he did say it was pretty close.

"This is why we work so hard and coach so hard," he told the team. "That's what makes these wins so gratifying. This win took everyone."

Chase contenders: Some rise to the top, some have disappointing runs, at Atlanta Motor Speedway

As often is the case since NASCAR instituted the Chase for the Sprint Cup, when it comes to crunch time, the cream rises to the top.

The finishing order of Sunday night's AdvoCare 500 at Atlanta Motor Speedway, the next-to-last race before the start of the championship-deciding, 10-race Chase, found eight Chase contenders in the top 10.

Kyle Busch, who seized the lead with a strong restart with 33 laps to go, scored his fourth win of the season, while Joey Logano continued his two-month hot streak with a runner-up run that saw him come from behind both early and late in the 500-mile race.

Since finishing 40th at New Hampshire Motor Speedway on July 14, Logano hasn't finished worse than eighth and has risen from 18th in the points standings to eighth.

He said that assuming he holds on to his Chase spot through Saturday night's race at Richmond, he considers himself one of the favorites to take the title.

"I feel like, with three straight top-fives right now, we have a really good shot at it," Logano said. "This team is super strong, and it looks like we're hitting our stride at the right time, right here."

Martin Truex Jr. finished third despite severe pain from a broken wrist suffered the week before at Bristol Motor Speedway, while fellow Chase contenders Kurt Busch and Ryan Newman completed the top five.

Jeff Gordon was sixth, Dale Earnhardt Jr. eighth and Kevin Harvick ninth, with only seventh-finishing Juan Pablo Montoya and 10th-place Brian Vickers joining the Chasers in the top 10 at Atlanta.

Kyle Busch secured his spot in the Chase, joining Jimmie Johnson, Clint Bowyer, Kevin Harvick, Carl Edwards and Matt Kenseth. He said that just like his win at Atlanta, winning his first Sprint Cup championship will be an uphill climb. But he's encouraged by his team's rebound from a

bad start to win the AdvoCare 500 and cruise into the Chase just a year after he missed the cut for the championship run. "What I'm most proud of [from Atlanta] is not necessarily what I did, but just what these [crew] guys were able to do," he said. "It all comes full circle sometimes, but we were in a whole different situation 365 days ago and not being able to make the Chase, and [Sunday] was a night where we needed to prove to ourselves that we're championship contenders."

Three drivers who entered Atlanta with their Chase berths secure had disappointing runs, as Jimmie Johnson was involved in a pit road incident on his first stop and struggled to a 28th-place finish, which followed finishes of 36th at Bristol and 40th at Michigan. Clint Bowyer blew an engine while leading and finished 39th, and Carl Edwards, who led 68 laps in the early going, faded to 18th at the end.

Edwards said that contact with Gordon doomed his chances of winning at Atlanta, where he got his first Cup win. He and Gordon discussed the incident after the race but didn't come to any agreement about what happened.

"[Gordon] wasn't very happy with our conversation, but at the end of the day, I feel like he was the aggressor," Edwards said. "The bigger picture for us is we had a

pretty bad night."

Gordon said that Edwards caused most of the trouble after the first run-in between the two of them, which he said was partially his fault.

"[Edwards] decided that he was going to get me back, I guess, every other time I was around him all night," Gordon said.

Kasey Kahne, who will be in the Chase at least as a wild card entry, was involved in the same pit-road incident as Johnson, lost 31 laps while his car was being repaired, and finished 36th.

Dale Earnhardt Jr., Greg Biffle and Kurt Busch head to Richmond in the top 10 but not assured of Chase berths, while Newman and Truex are 14th and 15th, respectively, in the standings with a win apiece, giving them chances to secure wild card Chase berths.

Defending Cup champion Brad Keselowski will need a dramatic turn of events at Richmond to even have a chance to try to defend his title. He blew an engine after leading 31 laps, finished 35th and dropped four spots in the standings to 15th, 28 points out of the top 10.

Keselowski said that to say he's frustrated with his season is an understatement, but he said it's not because his cars aren't fast. "We ran up front, and we continue to show that we at least have the pieces of what it takes every week to be a title threat and to be in the Chase," he said. "But we just haven't put together all those pieces every week, and that's what it takes."

Ganassi betting on Kyle Larson's talent over his seat time in appointing him driver of No. 42 Chevrolet in 2014

Sprint Cup team owner Chip Ganassi has a track record of taking chances when he hires race drivers, and that was the case again as he's picked the relatively inexperienced Kyle Larson as the new driver of his No. 42 Chevrolet beginning next year.

In choosing Larson, a 21-year-old racer who has just 24 Nationwide Series career starts and six more in the Camping World Truck Series, Ganassi is betting that the youngster's immense talent will overcome his lack of seat time in vehicles similar to the ones he'll drive on the Sprint Cup circuit. Larson has a win and a second-place finish in Trucks this season and six top-five finishes in the Nationwide Series, but he's a regular winner on short-track circuits.

And in teaming up with Ganassi, Larson, who has been under contract with the veteran team owner since last year, also is gambling that Ganassi, who hasn't won a Cup race since 2010, can deliver him a car capable of continuing his upward career climb.

Fellow racer Ryan Newman said that while Larson is short on NASCAR starts, his experience in sprint cars and other forms of motorsports has him prepared to take over the car now driven by Juan Pablo Montoya.

"I think Kyle has definitely proven across the board he can drive absolutely anything — anywhere, anytime," Newman said, adding that the real tests will come off the track. "I think the biggest challenge he's going to have ahead of him is not what happens outside of this [media] room, it's what happens inside of this room — the media part of it; the publicity part of it," Newman said.

For his part, Larson said he's up to the challenges. He said his sprint car experience will help him transition from the

Nationwide cars he's now driving to the more powerful Cup cars.

"With my sprint car background, they're 1,400-pound cars with 900-horsepower engines," he said. "I'm used to having way too much horsepower. I think that will translate well to the Cup cars."

Larson said that even if there are some unknowns as far as moving up to the Cup series so quickly, he wouldn't do it any other way.

"These opportunities don't come about very often," he said. "You never know when you have another shot like this. You have to capitalize on it and do the best you can."

Ganassi, who also fields the No. 1 Chevrolet driven by Jamie McMurray, said he believes his team can give Larson cars capable of continuing his career climb.

"I think our cars have shown they can run in the top five, top 10 on a pretty regular basis this season," he said, adding that he's not expecting Larson to take him to Victory Lane immediately. "I think Kyle is the kind of driver, when he sees an opportunity in front of him, he takes it. If that means it's a win — hey, great. There's no pressure for him to win his first year out."

Chase Elliott becomes youngest winner in Truck Series history with victory on road course at CTMP

Chase Elliott, the 17-year-old son of Sprint Cup veteran Bill Elliott, scored a dramatic — and controversial — victory in Sunday's Camping World Truck Series race on the road course at Canadian Tire Motorsport Park in Bowmanville, Ontario.

Elliott, who became the youngest driver ever to win a major NASCAR race, grabbed the lead just yards from the finish line after contact with race leader Ty Dillon — contact that sent Dillon crashing into the retaining barrier.

Elliott motored away to score his first Truck win in just his sixth career start.

"We only have so many shots to win these things. I really hate to win them like that; I really do," Elliott said in his Victory Lane interview. "That's not how I race, and that's never been how I've raced before."

"I had a shot. I was up next to Ty and I knew he was going to try and chop me off. I tried to make up the difference ...

"Sometimes you've got to do what you've got to do to get to Victory Lane."

Elliott said an angry Dillon, who finished 17th and is third in series points, 63 behind leader Matt Crafton, leaned in his window after the race and told him there would be payback, most likely this week at Iowa Speedway.

"He just told me I was better than that, and we're probably going to have some problems next week at Iowa, so we'll have to play it by ear when we get there," Elliott said.

Allmendinger to return to Sprint Cup full-time in 2014

A.J. Allmendinger, whose racing career appeared to be in great jeopardy when he failed a drug test in July 2012 and lost his ride with Penske Racing, will return to the Sprint Cup circuit full-time next season as driver of the No. 47 Toyota, the same car he's been driving on a limited basis this season.

He said during a press conference at Atlanta that the one-car JTG-Daugherty Racing team suits him fine.

"Everybody's got such good family values," he said. "It's been great for me to be a part of the race team so far. It's a good, little race team ... I feel like we can really build this race team and make it stronger."

Allmendinger has made four starts already in the car this season, with a best finish of 10th at Watkins Glen.

The hiring of Allmendinger means that the car's longtime driver, Bobby Labonte, will be looking for a new ride in the future. He was set to drive the No. 51 Phoenix Racing Chevrolet this weekend at AMS, but broke three ribs in a bicycling accident last week. He was set to share the No. 47 with Allmendinger in the remaining races this year, but whether he'll return to the car is uncertain.

Allmendinger said he won't be a part of pushing Labonte out of the car.

"That's not my decision, and I'm not going to push for that either," he said.
