## Two guards injured at CCI

Occurred during 'use of force' incident with inmate.

Two Columbia Correctional Institution guards were injured during a "use-of-force" incident with an inmate Monday morning, according to DOC

Deputy Communications Director Misty Cash.

The incident occurred at 6:30 a.m. Monday and involved inmate Willie "Young Blood" Watts, 51, who is currently serving a life sentence for murder.

Cash said the two officers were being treated for non-life threatening injuries at a local medical facility.

However, she said she could not discuss the nature of their injuries, what happened during the "use-of-force" incident, what kind of force was used or whether Watts was injured.

"[Watts] will be evaluated, there will be disciplinary action. All of that is in the beginning stages," Cash said. "I can't go into detail...Because this is an open investigation, that's all the information we can provide."

## \$10,000 in fuel reported stolen

A Lake City man, who reportedly told authorities he gave people fuel in return for money or drugs, was arrested after he allegedly ran up a company fuel card bill totaling more than \$10,000 in a little over four weeks.

Ronald Gene Maddox, 43, 723 NW Ridgewood Ave., was charged with larceny in connection with the crime. He was booked into the Columbia County Detention Facility on \$10,000 bond.

According to Columbia County Sheriff's Office reports, on Monday Deputy Kevin Bailey met with a representative from Ameriseal Highway StripingoutofJacksonville, who told him that the St. Johns County Sheriff's Office is investigating a case where Maddox, an employee, had been using a company gas card for personal use.

## Bailey won't seek 3rd term

District Four county commissioner Stephen Bailey announced Tuesday he will not be seeking a third term, citing family as his primary reason



for vacating his seat on the board of county commissioners. "I'll have served eight years on the commission," Bailey said. "I've got three little girls [ages 13 months, six years and eight years old] and I'm ready to be able to spend more time with them as they're getting a little bit older."

Bailey was first elected in November 2006, taking over a vacated seat occupied by governor-appointed interim commissioner Bill Whitley—a seat sought by five other candidates that year.

"I took office at the point where there was no money and there were tons of cuts coming from every direction," Bailey said. "Now we are a very healthy county financially, ranked very high. We're an example folks use and look at as a model for a small community, and that's certainly a very good thing."

He said he was proud to be a part of a board that was able to bring water and sewage solutions to the Ellisville area, secure funding for

## Wildfire protection plan in the works

Local officials are working to develop an emergency plan that addresses wildfire emergencies in the area. For at least the next 10 months they will work to create the Columbia County Wildfire Protection Plan.

Doc Bloodworth, Florida Forest Service wildfire mitigation specialist and public information officer, said the plan is very similar to the local mitigation strategy. The Local Mitigation Strategy is a written plan that helps county officials identify ways to alleviate damage from floods, hurricanes, wild fires, earthquakes, sinkholes and other disasters.

While the local mitigation strategy addresses all hazardous, manmade and natural disasters, Bloodworth's plan focuses just on fires.

"Wildfire is considered in the LMS, but the Community Wildfire Protection Plan will give greater focus and enhance that portion of the LMS," Bloodworth said.

Every year in Florida, an average of 3,500 wildfires burn nearly 140,000 acres, with residential and commercial structures involved about 80 percent of the time.

The Wildfire Protection Plan will identify the communities at risk along with the values of properties and structures.

## Report: Man caught with animal, child porn

A Lake City man was arrested Monday after local deputies found in his possession photographs depicting sexual acts with animals and with children, CCSO reports.

John Thomas Clarke, 34, of 535

NW Moore Road, had a falling out with an unknown individual around Thanksgiving last year and was told to pack up his things and leave, according to the arrest report.

However, Clarke left many of his personal items after his move, prompting the individual to clean

out his room, the report said.

The person reported finding a collection of explicit photographs and sexual devices, including a cell

phone memory card, in Clarke's old room, according to the report.

Deputies found photos of minors in sexual circumstances and Clarke erotically engaging a black and white dog as well as himself, the report said.

Hoffman among thousands of addicts in US

Philip Seymour Hoffman suffered from a chronic medical condition that required ongoing treatment. An admitted drug addict who first sought professional help more than two decades ago, Hoffman apparently succumbed to his illness with an overdose despite a return to rehab last March.

A father of three with a thriving career, the Oscar winner died Sunday with a needle in his arm and baggies of what appeared to be heroin nearby. New York City medical examiners were conducting an autopsy on Hoffman's body Monday as investigators scrutinize evidence found in his apartment, including at least four dozen plastic packets, some confirmed to

have contained heroin.

His death, which came after a long period of sobriety that ended last year, "epitomizes the tragedy of drug addiction in our society," said Dr. Nora Volkow, director of the National Institute on Drug Abuse.

"Here you have an extraordinarily talented actor who had the resources, who had been in treatment, who obviously realized the problem of drugs and had been able to stay clean," she said, adding that Hoffman's case shows how devastating addiction can be.

Success has no more bearing on drug addiction than it does on heart failure, doctors say: Both can be fatal without consistent care. And while rehab may be

part of treatment, it's no antidote. Amy Winehouse and Cory Monteith had both been to rehab before eventually dying from overdoses.

"Addiction is a chronic, progressive illness. No one can be cured," said Dr. Akikur Reza Mohammad, a psychiatrist and addiction-medicine specialist who works as a professor at USC's Keck School of Medicine and is founding chief of Inspire Malibu Treatment Center. "If someone is suffering from addiction, they cannot relax at any time. The brain neurochemistry changes... so these people are prone to relapse."

The younger a person begins using drugs, the more likely he is to develop an addiction, Volkow said. Hoffman wasn't

specific about his poisons when he told CBS' "60 Minutes" in 2006 that he used "anything I could get my hands on" before cleaning up with rehab at age 22.

He said in interviews last year that he sought treatment for heroin addiction after 23 years of sobriety.

Addiction causes chemical changes in the brain that remain long after a person stops using the substance, said Volkow, who described the condition as "a chronic disease with a very long duration." Abstinence or substitute medication is often required to prevent the addict from losing control around his desired substance.

March trial date set for Bieber

MIAMI — A trial date has been set for Justin Bieber in Miami for his recent arrest on charges of driving under the influence, resisting arrest and driving with an invalid license.

A Miami-Dade County judge set trial for the three misdemeanors for March 3. Bieber's attorneys have already filed a written plea of not guilty. Initial trial dates are often delayed.

The 19-year-old pop star was arrested Jan. 23 in Miami Beach after what police called an illegal drag race between two exotic sports cars.

Breath tests showed Bieber's blood alcohol content below the .02 threshold for underage drivers. But police say a toxicology test detected the presence of marijuana and Xanax.

MIAMI — Authorities say a number of arrests are being made in a major home insurance fraud ring operating in South Florida.

Miami-Dade State Attorney Katherine Fernandez Rundle and state Chief Financial Officer Jeff Atwater were scheduled to discuss details of the case Tuesday afternoon. Authorities say the fraud ring caused millions of dollars in losses to insurance companies.

Much of the fraud involved arson-set fires at properties in the Miami area and elsewhere.

Law enforcement authorities in South Florida have recently been battling several kinds of insurance fraud, including staged auto accidents and faked personal injury cases.

"The Community Wildfire Protection plan will include projects that we need to implement in those areas with regard to defensible space for wildfires, looking at the ignitability of the structures and the assets in these areas next to the wildland/urban interface, also the hazardous fuel reductions that we do," Bloodworth said.

Defensible space for wildfires, a clean zone where fuels have been cleared, reduced or changed to act as a barrier between the advancing wildfire and the property to be protected.

Defensible space usually is a 30-foot-wide vegetation management zone around a structure, although fuels should be thinned beyond this first zone in high-risk areas.

An 18-page draft of the Community Wildfire Protection Plan has been undertaken with help from the U.S. Forest Service and Florida Forest Service.

"We're looking a 10-month period where we can convene folks and get concurrence on the plan as we develop it," Bloodworth said. "Hopefully in October we can present it to the Columbia County Board of County Commissioners."

A subcommittee of the Local Mitigation Strategy Working Group was formed and tasked with working on the Community Wildlife Protection Plan. The subcommittee consists of representatives from the U.S. Forest Service, Florida Forest Service, Columbia County Fire Department, Lake City Fire Department and representatives from other first responder and public safety agencies.

The Community Wildfire Protection Plan that local, state and federal officials are working on is the first plan of this type for Columbia County to solely address wildfire.

"This would be new for Columbia County and it will be countywide," Bloodworth said. "The main impetus comes from the fact that we have so much National Forest in Columbia County."

There are 126 miles, 80,640 acres, of the Osceola National Forest in Columbia County.

Officials are using a history of Columbia County wildfires to identify specific areas which may be more hazardous than other areas.

Through the data a "level of concerns" list will be compiled, listing areas that are more susceptible to wildfire compared to other areas of the county.

"We can identify areas, not only geographically, but also in terms of jurisdictions and neighborhoods," Bloodworth said. "These homes are identified, we know where they are, where people live and we know where the fires historically occur. We have to a little more proactive as we try to inform folks of the risks and the things they can do to mitigate those risks."

Bloodworth said it's important to develop a Community Wildfire Protection Plan because it represents a collaborative approach to wildland fire protection and the identification of wildland fire risks and alternatives for wildfire mitigation.

he was born with a cleft lip. But UF Health Shands worked hard to ensure Owens received constant updates on her son's condition and acquired all the information she needed.

"It was hard, but the people at Shands were very, very supportive," she said.

### 'Very dedicated'

Between her dedication and her assistant manager Shauna Tyre's hard work, the single store raised \$4,196 — the highest amount raised out of all the S&S Food Stores.

From bake sales to raffles, the store employees constantly found new ways to raise money for Children's Miracle Network. Last year, they raised about \$700 at a "Jail and Bail" event, where they locked store employees and community members in jail. The "inmates" then raised money to bail themselves out.

"I don't think we could do it without the community," Owens said. "They are very dedicated. Every day, I see customers dropping their spare change into the bucket for the Children's Miracle Network."

Store 15 followed closely behind their sister store, raising \$3,988. As the third highest fundraiser, store 52 pulled in \$2,698. The Lake City community, home to 11 stores supervised by Patrick Nolan, pulled in the largest contribution for the S&S company at \$17,584.

"We just have tremendous support from the people who come into our stores," Nolan said. "It's through their charitable contributions that we are able to donate directly to Shands."

According to Scaff, the company bounced back in 2013 from a downturned local economy the year before — a result of

Tropical Storm Debby. S&S customers recovered from the county-wide flooding and started spending money again, he said. Because of the uptick, the company placed \$200,000 into the profit share plan.

"Everything is looking good," Scaff said. "We're just planning on another great year."

### 'A great company with good people'

Keith Brown, vice president of marketing and communications, announced S&S employees celebrating their five, 10, 15, 20, 25, 30 and 40-year anniversaries. Brown himself was recognized for his 40 years of service.

Brown also named the 2013 employees of the month — Shannon Wells in January, Ana Moore in February, Malinda Zamora in March, Thomas Klenk in April, Sherry Kennedy in May, Cody Arusa in June, Tracie Spradley in July, Mike Crews in August, Amy Davis in September, Debbie Malone in October, Matt Ginn in November and Kim Kinsey in December.

The company pulled its "Team Member of the Year" from the pool of top 2013 employees. Spradley, manager of store 37, earned the title.

"I never would have thought I would have won," she said.

Six years ago, Spradley started at S&S Food Stores as a cashier. Quickly, she progressed through the ranks. Within three years, she managed the whole store.

"Honestly, I have to give credit to Lisa, my supervisor. She saw something in me that I didn't see myself," Spradley said. "Without her, I know I wouldn't be where I'm at now."

Before Spradley started her job at S&S Food Stores, she was a stay-at-home mom raising her three boys. When they were old enough to watch them-

self, she sought a job to bring the family some extra income.

"I never would have thought when I went to work at S&S that I would love my job as much as I do," Spradley said. "I really enjoy my job. It's a great company with good people. ... I love it just as much today as I did when I started."

According to Spradley, a lot of her success comes from having a wonderful assistant manager and a great team. Now that she's manager, her job entails a little bit of everything — grocery orders, paper work, merchandising, cashiering, maintenance and more.

"I don't expect them to do anything I wouldn't do," she said. "I'll even scrub toilets."

### Promoted quickly

Spradley's supervisor Lisa Gandiana nominated the hard-working employee for the honor of "Employee of the Month."

"All the responsibility is on our store managers — the entire store, from the front door to the back door," Gandiana said. "[Spradley's] always risen up and taken the store as her own, even before she was a manager. So now that she is a manager, it's just multiplied."

Three years ago, Spradley was promoted to manager of store 37, which sits close to Interstate 10. The store draws a mixed crowd of interstate traffic, truck drivers and local shoppers. various road projects (such as Old Wire Road and Herlong Street), invest in Southside Recreational Complex improvements and the county's growing sports tourism industry, and maintain the county's fire safety rating and quality of service.

"I've thoroughly enjoyed it and appreciate the opportunity I was afforded to serve as county commissioner," he said. "But it's time to let someone else have the reigns."

Commissioner Bailey has served as the board chair twice and vice-chair twice. His eight-year tenure is second only to com-

missioner Ron Williams in terms of sitting board members.

"I'm not a fan of term limits, I don't believe in them," he said. "I believe the voters have the power of term limits. I think a person knows when they've contributed what they can to it."

In addition to spending more time with family, Bailey said he will continue to serve as the executive director of the CARC, a local nonprofit organization.

While he declined to give endorsements for future candidates, he did offer advice for his successor:

"Be in it for the right reasons, have a servant's heart and truly want to make Columbia County a better place to live and work."

# Senate sends \$100B farm bill to Obama

WASHINGTON — The sweeping farm bill that Congress sent to President Obama Tuesday has something for almost everyone, from the nation's 47 million food stamp recipients to Southern peanut growers, Midwest corn farmers and the maple syrup industry in the Northeast.

After years of setbacks, the Senate on Tuesday sent the nearly \$100 billion-a-year measure to President Barack Obama. The White House said the president will sign the bill on Friday in Michigan, the home state of Senate Agriculture Chairwoman Debbie Stabenow.

The Senate passed the bill 68-32 after House passage last week. The bill provides a financial cushion for farmers who face unpredictable weather and market conditions. It also provides subsidies for rural communities and environmentally-sensitive land. But the bulk of its cost is for the food stamp program, which aids 1 in 7 Americans. The bill would cut food stamps by \$800 million a year, or around 1 percent.

House Republicans had hoped to reduce the bill's costs even further, pointing to a booming agriculture sector in recent years and arguing that the now \$80 billion-a-year food stamp program has spiraled out of control. The House passed a bill in September that would have made a cut to food stamps that was five times more than the eventual cut.

Those partisan disagreements stalled the bill for more than two years, but conservatives were eventually outnumbered as the Democratic Senate, the White House and a still-powerful bipartisan coalition of farm-state lawmakers pushed to get the bill done.

The White House has been mostly quiet as Congress worked out its differences on the bill. But in a statement after the vote, Obama said the bill would reduce the deficit "without gutting the vital assistance programs millions of hardworking Americans count on to help put food on the table for their families."

## The new face of Obamacare?

Obamacare isn't popular, and nobody knows it better than President Obama. In an interview with Bill O'Reilly of Fox News, Mr. Obama danced around the question of why he hasn't fired Health and Human Services Secretary Kathleen Sebelius, the face of the fiasco.

The president may have found a new cheerleader for Obamacare in Dr. Vivek Murthy, an English-born, Boston-based physician nominated to become surgeon general. His chief qualification appears to be that in 2008 he founded Doctors for Obama — now called Doctors for America. Doctors for America is a physicians association linked by umbilical cord to Obamacare.

The Senate Health, Education, Labor and Pensions Committee will decide whether to recommend that the 36-year-old Dr. Murthy will get the position.

We can expect the majority Democrats to shift the discussion to the nominee, educated at both Harvard and Yale, having helped start a rural health program in Sringeri, India, and an AIDS program for young people in both India and the United States. Dr. Murthy's roots are in India.

The last thing committee Democrats want to hear are the concerns of a former surgeon general with bipartisan bona fides, who warned the White House against nominating such a "relatively inexperienced and untested physician" who shouldn't be considered for the post so early in his career.

Dr. Richard H. Carmona served for four years as surgeon general in the administration of a Republican, President George W. Bush, and then ran for the U.S. Senate from Arizona as a Democrat, losing in 2012 to Sen. Jeff Flake, a Republican.

In a letter to President Obama, Dr. Carmona wrote that a nominee without substantial public health experience or work in the U.S. Public Health Service Commissioned Corps would be at a "distinct disadvantage in credibility, knowledge, and depth and breadth of experience when attempting to address complex public health issues."

The surgeon general may not have to be an advocate for public health. He may be assigned to attack-dog duties. Dr. Carmona went out of his way to endear himself to Democrats after leaving the office by criticizing the Bush administration for suppressing scientific findings that conflicted with the administration's ideological agenda.

There's every likelihood that the founder of an Obama campaign booster club won't resist being a shill for the administration's health care takeover.

Dr. Murthy has even hinted that the surgeon general's office might be a bully pulpit to promote gun control as a "health" issue. "Signs of progress," he tweeted last April, "we got 20 votes in the Senate in favor of gun-violence legislation that we wouldn't have had a year ago. Have faith."

A fight over the nomination is unlikely. With Senate Democrats having blown up confirmation rules, Mr. Obama's most controversial nominees can get through the Senate with a mere 51 votes.

Several red-state Democratic incumbent senators up for re-election in November would be wise to consider whether to distance themselves from the new face of Obamacare in the interests of their own survival.



I grabbed what I needed and dashed to the check-out stand. Lines were long, except at the 15-items-or-less counter, where only one customer was ahead of me: A man with just one item, a small jar of some kind of salve. He slammed it on the counter.

"I bought this yesterday," he told her, "and didn't get points. I want you to give me the points."

I hate points. I'm never sure how to use them. Apparently, if you save them up, you can get 10 cents off a gallon of gas under a full moon at a Speedy Mart 40 miles across town, if your membership card will scan at the pump, which mine will not.

I hate those cards. I can never find them when I need them. Then I have to get dirty looks for holding up the line while I paw through my purse for something that will give me a discount that everybody ought to get anyway.

But back to the man and his points. The clerk smiled and said, "Sorry, sir, you need to take that to customer service."

"No," he said. "You do it." So she spent five minutes punching in numbers to refund, and then re-ringing, the sale.

Meanwhile, the man ranted a blue streak on his cell phone to some poor soul (his wife?) about the audacity of the store, the ineptitude of its employees and the general unfairness of life.

"Here you go, sir," the clerk said. "I gave you the points."

He studied the receipt. "I had more points before. What did you do with them?"

I started to offer him all the points that I never use, but a manager showed up to escort him to customer service.

When I told the clerk I admired her graciousness, she laughed. "Goes with the job," she said.

Driving home, I thought about her answer. It made me wonder. Is it really our "job" to offer grace to someone who is being so completely ungracious?

I've been asking myself that question for days now, and the answer keeps coming up "yes." Not because, like the clerk, I get paid to be gracious. But because grace is a gift I've been given countless times with just one condition: That I give it back.

I have no idea why the point man behaved as he did. I know nothing about him or what was going on his life.

Years ago, when my first husband was battling cancer, I lost patience for lots of stuff.

The December before he died, a friend came to stay with him so I could do some Christmas shopping. I promised to hurry back. In line at Macy's, I heard a woman complaining that she always had to buy her own gifts because her husband never gave her anything she liked.

I bit my lip so hard I tasted blood. Then a man cut in line to ask the clerk a question and I lost it. I heard myself yell, "Hey, buddy! There's a line here!"

Every head in the store turned to stare at me. I was mortified. I wanted to crawl under the counter and hide. Just when I thought it couldn't get worse, I burst into tears. And the woman who'd complained about her husband said, "It's OK, honey," and handed me a tissue.

No one that day could have known why I behaved as I did. I certainly didn't. But somehow it seemed they agreed, God bless them, to give me a little break.

I wish I'd done the same for the man who wanted his points.

Everybody needs a break once in a while. We don't have to know the reasons. We just have to remember that sooner or later, it will be our turn, yours or mine, to need a little grace.

Not to worry. It will probably be me.

## Florida's beer wars

There's a classic David vs. Goliath battle brewing in the Florida Legislature over beer. When it comes to a head, lawmakers should side with consumers by supporting competitive markets.

Like most states, Florida's alcohol beverage laws reflect a time when there were limited choices of beers and people were more loyal to brands than to types of brews. The production and distribution of lagers and ales were controlled by a relative few large companies.

In recent years, though, so-called "craft beers" have proliferated as consumers seek more diversity in their suds. These are small-batch beverages with offbeat tastes, often heavier on hops, malt or barley than traditional, mass-market beers. Many are sold in specialty shops, high-end liquor stores and pubs and bistros.

As demand for their products increases, these microbreweries are seeking new ways to reach the public. But they are running up against a three-tiered legal framework of manufacturers, distributors and retailers that makes it difficult for the little guys to penetrate the market.

Bills in the Legislature seek to modernize that structure. One would allow beer to be sold onsite in 64-ounce containers, called "growlers," in addition to the current legal sizes of 32 and 128 ounces. The 64-ounce growler is the most popular size for craft beer enthusiasts and is legal in 47 other states.

The other measure would allow retailers, such as supermarkets, to offer free beer tastings, much the way they do with wine. That would allow microbreweries to promote their products.

Those seem simple enough. But the growler bill, which failed last year, is again stalled in committee. The tasting bill passed the Senate Regulatory Affairs Committee last week, but has an uncertain future.

Although Anheuser-Busch has opposed the growler bill, opposition isn't limited to large beer manufacturers. Distributors also don't want to give the little guys an exception to the middle tier of the regulatory system.

According to the Tallahassee Democrat, Mitch Rubin, a lobbyist representing Florida's beer distributors, told the Regulated Industries Committee last week that beer and

wine tastings should be treated differently because wine tastings tend to be "more subdued" affairs. Stores promoting free beer samples, he said, could create a "party atmosphere" on their property that could ultimately hurt the industry. He said that if the law gets changed to allow public tastings, there should be tighter regulations.

That reasoning falls flat. It shouldn't be the state's job to tell retailers how to promote the products they sell, or to protect an industry's image. If beer tastings become rambunctious, the stores will have to suffer the public relations consequences, and perhaps answer to local law enforcement.

There's too much turf-protecting gumming up the works, with lobbyists (shockingly!) using political influence to rig the rules in their favor. The state ultimately needs to reform the alcohol laws — which were created when government feared post-Prohibition-era mobsters would monopolize the booze supply — to reflect the modern marketplace, and to ensure that everyone has equal access.






