Gun bill moving through Senate

Principals could appoint armed staff at schools.

TALLAHASSEE — Military veterans or retired law-enforcement officers with concealed weapons permits and special training could be designated to bring guns into elementary, middle and high schools under a proposal moving through the Florida Legislature.

The Senate Criminal Justice Committee approved the controversial proposal (SB 968) by a 5-2 vote on Monday over the objections of the Florida School Boards Association.

The measure is similar to one pushed by the National Rifle Association in the aftermath of the shooting at Sandy Hook Elementary School in Newtown, Conn. Adam Lanza fatally shot 20 students and six school staff.

Under the bill, principals and school superintendents could appoint staff members or volunteers who are military veterans with honorable discharges, active military or retired law enforcement officials as gun-toting "designees." They would be required to carry concealed weapons with them at all times on school property. The designees would have to undergo 40 hours of school-safety training and an additional 12 hours of special training annually.

LC man arrested for sexual assault

A Lake City man was placed behind bars after manipulating a female minor into a series of sexually explicit activities, C C S O reports.

Monday deputies arrested Kirk Lewis Neville, 36, of Lake City, following a roughly five-and-a-half month investigation into allegations that Neville had repeated sexual contact with a female minor between the ages of 12 to 15, according to heavily redacted offense reports.

An unnamed individual reading the victim's diary discovered an entry titled "we did it," and upon

'Fatal Vision' author Joe McGinniss dies at age 71

NEW YORK

Joe McGinniss wasn't one to let a story tell itself.

Whether insisting on the guilt of a murder suspect after seemingly befriending him or moving next door to Sarah Palin's house for a most unauthorized biography, McGinniss was unique in his determination to get the most inside information, in how publicly he burned bridges with his subjects and how memorably he placed himself in the narrative.

McGinniss, the adventurous and news-making author and reporter who skewered the marketing of Richard Nixon in "The Selling of the President 1968" and tracked his personal journey from sympathizer to scourge of convicted killer

Jeffrey MacDonald in the blockbuster "Fatal Vision," died Monday at age 71.

McGinniss, who announced last year that he had been diagnosed with inoperable prostate cancer, died from complications related to his disease. His attorney and longtime friend Dennis Holahan said he died at a hospital in Worcester, Mass. Optimistic almost to the end, he had for months posted regular updates on Facebook and Twitter, commenting on everything from foreign policy to his health.

Keith Richards' picture book out this fall

NEW YORK — Keith Richards is writing a children's book. He really is.

The Rolling Stone who came to define the adults-only lifestyle of rock has a deal with Little, Brown Books for Young Readers for a picture story called "Gus & Me: The Story of My Granddad and My First Guitar."

The publisher announced Tuesday that the book will come out this fall and will include illustrations by Richards' daughter, Theodora Richards. Barnaby Harris and Bill Shapiro are assisting with the writing.

"Gus" is Gus Dupree, Keith Richards' beloved musician-grandfather. In a statement issued by the publisher, Richards said the book was based on "one of those magical moments" he had with Dupree. Richards, 70, has five grandchildren of his own. His memoir "Life" was a million

seller published in 2010.

Bieber gets May 5 trial date in Florida case

MIAMI — A May 5 trial date was set Tuesday for Justin Bieber in the Florida case charging him with driving under the influence, resisting arrest and possessing an invalid driver's license.

Prosecutor Daniel Diaz-Balart also said at a brief hearing that no plea offer has been made for the 20-year-old pop singer, who has pleaded not guilty. Bieber's attorney, Roy Black, also said there was no plea deal on the table and none had been rejected.

Stolen puppy returned to store

PENSACOLA — An 8-week-old Yorkshire terrier named Lilly is safe and sound at a Pensacola Petland days after a woman smuggled it out of the store.

Surveillance video shows a woman who had asked to play with the 2-pound puppy last Wednesday walking out the door with it when an employee went to help another customer.

"It seemed like they had the intent of stealing the puppy from the start," store manager Scott Schmieder told the Pensacola News Journal. "They walked in, went straight to the puppies, got a puppy out, then left."

Employees believe someone in the open-air socialization area handed the puppy to the woman, who quickly left the store.

On Sunday afternoon, someone walked into the store and handed the missing puppy to a cashier. It wasn't clear whether the person who returned the dog is the unidentified woman who took it.

"I think they got pressured," Schmieder said. "There was so much media (coverage) on it that they got scared and brought it back."

Schmieder says the puppy, which is valued at \$2,000, is in good health.

The store is now considering changing policy so that customers can only play with animals in the open-air socialization area while an employee is present.





further review, discovered the victim was referring to an incident with Neville, the live-in boyfriend of another occupant in the victim's home, according to reports.

This individual also indicated the victim has "delayed learning issues" and "has the mind of a...child," according to reports.

Her entry allegedly contained detailed information about her having a "crush on him," deputies said.

The individual who discovered the diary then recalled an incident a month earlier when Neville was seen sitting in bed with the victim and "that the sheets were maybe thigh high on [him]," the report said.

The informant also said there were several incidents where Neville would be in the victim's room alone with the door closed and times Neville and the victim would be seen "kissing each other on the mouth," explaining she would do this because she "acts like a baby," according to the report.

During interviews with deputies and children's advocates, the victim said she "decided to ask [Neville] about how to have sex," and that he told her "it was OK but for her not to tell," the report said.

Based on interviews with the victim, investigators said Neville began periodically engaging the victim in a series of meetings on the pretext of teaching her various lessons pertaining to sexual anatomy and acts.

The reports describe Neville having physical contact with the victim, both with and without clothes, in multiple capacities during these meetings.

Neville allegedly used his cell phone to show the victim pornographic images as a "teaching aid," the report said.

When interviewed by deputies, Neville denied the allegations, but did say the victim spoke "with him about friends, boys and everyday life choices," adding that he tried to "explain sex...using a medical book," the report said.

Neville also admitted the girl may have seen him naked on a single occasion when he walked nude from the shower to a bedroom closet, and that she may have spied on him having sex with another person, the report said.

However, the victim was able to indicate a unique mark on Neville's body that would not be visible under the brief circumstances the suspect described. Another individual familiar with the suspect's anatomy described the same mark as well, and deputies confirmed it through visual inspection, the report said.

Investigators said they reviewed 41 pages of texts between Neville and the victim.

Deputies continued their investigation with assistance from the State Attorney's Office and arrested Neville on a warrant Monday.

Neville was booked into Columbia County Detention Facility on \$500,000 bond. He faces charges of sexual assault by custodian of a victim 12-18 years of age and a sexual offense with a victim 12-15 years of age.

comprised of eight hours of active shooter training and four hours of firearm-proficiency training.

2 charged in home invasion robbery

A Lake City drug dealer and his 16-year-old brother are behind bars after allegedly robbing a customer in the customer's own home, LCPD reports.

Lakarvee Morrow and Infinity Dunning, both 19, were waiting in Morrow's apartment on NW Archer Street for Jordan Miles Shaw, 20, and his brother Mikaiyah D. Johnson, 16, both of 883 SE Monroe Street, to arrive with marijuana for the two victims to pur-

chase and smoke around 11:30 p.m. Saturday, according to a Tuesday press release.

As all four individuals were engaging in small talk in the garage, Shaw became "very nervous and fidgety," drew a small caliber handgun and pointed it at Morrow, demanding \$12,000, the release said.

Shaw said someone told him Morrow had \$12,000 in cash and wanted it for himself, according to the release.

Morrow admitted to having a few hundred dollars inside, but nothing close to \$12,000. However, Shaw ushered him and Dunning inside at gunpoint, threatening to kill everyone in the residence, including the victim's sleeping grandmother, police said.

Morrow woke his grandmother and told her they needed to go to the bank to satisfy Shaw's

demands, but the grandmother refused to do so "at such a late hour," according to the release.

The entire time, Shaw stood behind the grandmother's recliner and threatened to shoot her in the head, the release said.

Police said the Morrow then retrieved an envelope with \$750 and gave it to Shaw.

The suspects and the victims reconvened in the garage, at which point Johnson took Shaw's gun, pointed it at the Morrow's forehead and demanded the rest of the money, the release said.

However, without any more cash left to steal, the suspects allegedly told Morrow they were "sparing his life tonight but would be back at tomorrow at 11:30 a.m. for the rest," police said.

Authorities visited Johnson in his home the next day, asking questions about his role in the robbery the night before, the

release said.

Johnson told police his brother said they were going to "score a lick (robbery) and get 12 stacks (\$12,000)," the release said.

Johnson was arrested and booked into Columbia County Detention Facility before being transferred to the Alachua Regional Juvenile Detention Center.

Shaw later turned himself in at the LCPD headquarters Sunday afternoon, police said. He was arrested and booked into Columbia County Detention Center on \$75,000 bond.

Johnson faces charges of aggravated assault with a deadly weapon, larceny and armed robbery.

Shaw faces two charges of aggravated assault with a deadly weapon, possession of a firearm by a convicted felon, larceny and armed robbery.

School Board accepts \$224K gift from county

The School Board Tuesday formally accepted a \$224,250 contribution from the Columbia County Board of Commissioners for the construction of new sports facilities at Fort White High School.

The funds will go towards additions to the FWHS varsity and junior varsity locker rooms and improvements to existing field house and concession stand facilities.

Board chair Keith Hudson praised the cooperation between the two taxing authorities and fellow board member Linard Johnson commented on the positive effect extracurricular activities have on student performance.

"I know the county's gotten a little bit of flak for putting those kinds of funds toward our school district," Johnson said. "But listen — If you don't invest in your own community and your own students and your own children, who are?"

Per the agreement, the school district will handle all engineering, planning, building, permitting and other regulatory approvals regarding the facilities

and will hold responsibility for their maintenance.

In other business, the board:

- Heard an impassioned speech from Five Points Elementary Teacher of the Year Anthony Perry, who described himself and other educators as "keys" that open doors to children's futures;

- Invited the Five Points Elementary Chorus, hearing performances of "The Cup Song," featuring the musical embellishments of Solo Cup percussion, and "A Rum Sum Sum";

- Recognized Jill Hunter and the CHS Student Government Association for their work during the Florida Association of Student Councils gathering;

- Discussed the Differentiated Accountability program's progress with School Improvement Specialist Tom Lashley;

- Accepted a \$250 from Peoples State Bank in support of Richard Middle School athletic programs;

- Approved the purchase of 200 HP Chromebooks (laptops) totaling \$55,800;

The board will meet again on Tuesday, April 8 at 7:00 p.m. in the School Board Administrative Complex. There will be no second March meeting due to Spring Break.

LCPD warns of magazine subscription fraud scam

Magazine subscription fraud is on the rise in Columbia County, according to a news release from LCPD.

Police said they've received several complaints from members of the community over unknown individuals going door-to-door selling fraudulent magazine subscriptions.

"In one filed report, the victim was an elderly female who had a young white female with pink in her hair come to her door to sell her magazine subscriptions," the release said. "The female seller was invited inside the residence and...asked for a drink and also to use the restroom. While the homeowner was still in the kitchen, and distracted, the female suspect went into her purse and stole her cash."

Police say the fraud organizers recruit young people or people in need, encouraging them to go door-to-door and commit thefts once inside the property.

"We encourage all residents to avoid purchasing any door-to-door product from anyone who is not from the Lake City area or those without verifiable references," the release said. "Pressured sales and a lack of references or residence in the county should be immediate red flags."

According to the release, students from local schools are instructed not to go door-to-door.





Bill aims to hold Obama accountable

The Founders described the "long train of abuses" at the hands of a king that triggered the need for a change, in the form of a Declaration of Independence. Runaway governance is back, and President Obama is the conductor.

The Constitution set up peaceful mechanisms available today to deal with overreach that weren't available to the revolutionaries of 1776. Today's lawmakers must use these to brake Barack Obama's disregard for the Constitution before that "long train" grows longer.

The House could consider as early as this week the Enforce the Law Act, granting either the House or the Senate the explicit authority to file a lawsuit against the president for failing to carry out his constitutionally mandated duty to "take care that the laws be faithfully executed."

It directs such lawsuits to a three-judge panel of a federal district court with appeals going directly to the U.S. Supreme Court.

Rep. Trey Gowdy of South Carolina, the measure's Republican sponsor, blames Mr. Obama for the need to act. "This administration's disregard for the law," he says, "has reached an unprecedented level from a constitutional perspective. ... This bill ... will give Congress the authority to defend this branch of government as the Framers and our fellow citizens would expect."

Mr. Obama has governed with the reckless abandon of a community organizer determined that laws are made to be broken. With the stroke of his pen, he has redlined portions of immigration laws to prevent law enforcers from detaining young illegal aliens.

This de facto amnesty over time threatens to alter the common culture of the nation and saddle taxpayers with the unaffordable costs of an ever-expanding welfare state.

In the name of national security, the president decides who lives and who dies, killing American citizens without due process in drone strikes in foreign nations. Most of them may have deserved it, but that's not the way America does it....

Mr. Obama has blocked enforcement of portions of the nation's drug laws as his Justice Department makes "getting high" a new American way of life....

The National Security Agency's wholesale spying on Americans prompted Sen. Rand Paul of Kentucky to sue the president on behalf of hundreds of millions of Americans whose private phone and Internet records have been seized in the name of security.

The suit is largely symbolic, since the president can consume years slow-walking his defense through the courts ... before his presidency ends.

Mr. Gowdy's legislation would place such lawsuits before the courts before the White House could bury them.

Other presidents have looked the other way to avoid enforcing a law, but none before Mr. Obama have announced a goal of "fundamentally transforming" the nation. After more than five years in office, the president is well down the track toward his destination.

Passage of the Enforce the Law Act would be largely symbolic, considering it wouldn't get past Harry Reid or Mr. Obama, but it sends the message to voters in November. If they want to stop the runaway train, here's a way for them to do it.

Then came the pitch, accompanied by a catchy tap routine:

"Yummy, yummy, yummy, they're so good in your tummy."

I don't recall the exact words, but they weren't all that important.

This little girl, no more than 7 or 8, was working hard to get my business, and wasn't about to take no for an answer.

Her smile was part showmanship, part salesmanship.

Naturally, I bought several boxes.

The annual Girl Scout cookie campaign, which began in Lake City last weekend and continues through Sunday, is something to celebrate, whether you care all that much for the cookies or not.

In more ways than one, it is a true American tradition.

The girls have a little fun and learn grown-up skills in the process.

But mostly, they learn to get what

they want by working for it.

By selling cookies they get an object lesson in the very basis of our economy: the exchange of goods and services for currency.

It is an old lesson — Girl Scouts have been selling cookies since 1933 — but one that hasn't outlived its worth.

The girls, especially years later, often call those lessons invaluable.

Once it was common for youth groups to follow the Girl Scouts' example.

Some still do, selling candy or washing cars to raise money for trips or other special projects.

Many, however, take a more direct approach to fundraising these days.

Simply put, they have resorted to begging — milling about in front of store entrances, holding out plastic

canisters in hopes that passers-by will help fill them with cash.

It is something we aren't that used to seeing in America.

Understand, I'm not talking about Salvation Army bell-ringers, the DAV, folks raising funds for Jerry's Kids, or countless kindred spirits of all ages. Charity has a valued place in our culture, and God bless those who give. We know full well how great the need is here.

And that's my whole point.

Traditionally in our culture, charity goes to folks in real need, not those seeking money for some pet project, or perhaps because our schools are short on cash for extracurricular activities.

Sending the kids out to panhandle isn't the answer.

It certainly doesn't teach them the values we would hope they'd hold dear as adults.

The fault is not with the youngsters, but with their leaders, who haven't taken it upon themselves to show them a better way.

It's time for them to try.

career. Later she earned a doctorate of music at the University of Miami.

She says she was never comfortable playing Western music in Japan, where the emphasis is on imitating the teacher. It took her a while before she became accustomed to the freedom of expression in the American schools before she felt able to play according to her own musical instincts and to develop her own personal style.

On a concert tour of Poland in 1987, she met members of the Warsaw Wind Quintet, and returned a year later to play with them and other leading chamber ensembles. She is probably the only Japanese pianist to play regularly with Eastern and Central European orchestras.

Taking time from her

position as director of keyboard studies at Clayton State University in Atlanta, Ga., Otaki is now a veteran of numerous concert tours. A Washington Post critic remarked that her performance there was "a tribute to chamber playing of the highest order."

Composer Paul Mack Somers studied composition at Ithaca College Conservatory. His compositions include theatrical works, several commissioned works, pieces he has written for his wife, and many others.

He is currently composing a work for violin, viola, cello, and harp. He has lectured at Lincoln Center, and as Director of Adult Education for the Bay-Atlantic Symphony in southern New Jersey, he lectures monthly on various musical topics in four countries. Somers currently lives near Mauritius, N.J.

The concert on March 22 in Live Oak is presented by The Friends of Music Concert Series. Admission is free and open to the public, and a reception will follow the concert.

Memory enhancing supplements

Dear Pharmacist,
Recently I saw a major network news program about researchers looking for drugs to prevent Alzheimer's. The doctors interviewed held out so little hope and it really upset me that they didn't suggest diet and exercise. Both my parents had dementia. I'm scared of it happening to me. — A.F., Chicago, Illinois

Alzheimer's preventives. Seriously. Researchers have published 1,000 scientific studies on the antioxidant and anti-inflammatory properties of curcumin. A recent Japanese study showed symptom improvement who supplemented with turmeric capsules for one year. Two participants who had severe cases were even able to recognize family members by the study's conclusion.

Back in 2008, researchers in India published a paper reviewing the major research done on curcumin as a treatment for Alzheimer's. They noted

that curcumin apparently has the ability to help a component of the immune system (macrophages) clear away amyloid plaques from the brain. They concluded, "...based on the main findings above, curcumin will lead to a promising treatment for Alzheimer's." What they're saying is that, in time, someone will turn it into a drug. Then it will take years to study the new drug on animals and people before it's brought to market for a hefty price. Well, duh! The take home point is that turmeric and curcumin supplements are readily available, affordable and worth a try. Since supplements are hard to absorb, you can eat the spice. It's popular in curry dishes. Sprinkle it on everything like I do because it's good for heart disease, arthritis and breast health.

Other food items you should add to your shopping list are colorful fruits and vegetables, with a special emphasis on blue and purple, which indicates the presence of anthocyanins,

a pigment that scientists are looking at as a possible Alzheimer's preventive. In fact, I suggest eating blueberries several times a week. Other memory boosting supplements include citicoline, phosphatidylcholine and Acetyl L-carnitine. What else can you do? There's a tight association with memory loss and damage from popular foods so I often recommend either a "Paleo" Diet or Doug Kaufmann's "Phase One" Diet. You could read about the dangers of gluten in the new book, *Grain Brain* by Dr. David Perlmutter. I would absolutely include at least 2 teaspoons of organic coconut oil in your diet each day. Get plenty of exercise to turn on life-extension genes and increase production of memory molecules. I'm glad to hear your mind and emotional health are a priority, none of us should take it for granted.

UF moves up in list of top medical schools

GAINESVILLE — For the second year in a row, the University of Florida College of Medicine has risen three spots in U.S. News & World Report's latest rankings of the nation's top research medical schools.

UF is ranked No. 42, up from No. 45 in 2013, according to the publication's annual "Best Graduate Schools" rankings, which were released Tuesday. Among public medical schools, UF now ranks No. 17 nationally and is the highest-ranked medical school in the state of Florida.

"Our goal is to provide the best medical education possible to our students, who are poised to become the next generation of physicians and scientists. We take this responsibility very seriously, and accomplishments such as this reflect the dedication of our faculty and staff toward all of our missions," said Michael L. Good, M.D., dean of the UF College of Medicine.

Each year, U.S. News & World Report ranks the nation's accredited medical schools based on factors such as National Institutes of Health research funding, GPA and the MCAT scores of incoming medical students, faculty-to-student ratios and peer assessments from leaders of other medical schools. When all of these parameters are considered, the publication compiles a list of the top medical schools in the country.

"Over the past several years, our medical school has attracted national attention for recruiting superb scientists and clinician-investigators, along with our substantial increase in NIH funding at a time of flat funding nationally and building a new medical education facility that embraces small group learning, interprofessional education and novel simulation methods," said David S. Guzick, M.D., Ph.D., senior vice president for health affairs and president of UF Health.

Factors that likely contributed to UF's rise in the rankings during the past two years include increased competitiveness for medical school applicants associated with the college's recent medical curriculum revisions and national recognition of UF's quality, safety and clinical programs, said Joseph C. Fantone, M.D., senior associate dean for educational affairs in the College of Medicine.

Stephen P. Sugrue, Ph.D., senior associate dean for research affairs, noted that it was a difficult and challenging year for research funding in all U.S. medical schools, yet the UF College of Medicine experienced an increase in base funding from the National Institutes of Health for the fourth consecutive year. These increases have resulted in a cumulative 37 percent increase in NIH funding between 2009 and 2013.

Hospital settles Medicare lawsuit

ORLANDO — A Florida hospital has agreed to pay \$85 million to settle a Medicare fraud whistle-blower lawsuit.

Halifax Hospital Medical Center of the Daytona Beach area reached the

agreement with federal authorities Monday.

The hospital's director of physician services filed a whistle-blower lawsuit in 2009, accusing the facility of filing false Medicare claims and paying doctors improperly. The Justice Department intervened on some allega-

tions two years later.

Under the terms of the settlement, Halifax Hospital isn't admitting liability. It admits that it violated a law prohibiting physicians from making referrals for health services if they have a financial interest.

The whistle-blower in

the case will receive just under a quarter of the settlement amount, or about \$20.8 million.

The hospital also is entering into a corporate-integrity agreement with the federal government.


