1930-2014  
**Former mayor's legacy one of service**

**F**ormer mayor of Lake City Wesley Raymond "Ray" Kirkland, who died at 84 Monday morning, left behind a legacy as a seasoned pilot, ambitious public servant and devoted father.

Kirkland was a prominent figure in Columbia County's public and private sectors, having worked his way to high-level positions such as the Chamber of Commerce's Executive Director, Public Relations Manager of Occidental Chemical Company (now PotashCorp-White Springs) and mayor of Lake City for nine years.

"His legacy was his political knowledge," said Mike Kennon, one of Kirkland's lifelong friends. "That's the one thing he was well-gifted in...He was real smart in that category. He was super friendly. I don't know how exactly to put it. He constantly stayed active."

Although raised in Olustee, Kirkland graduated from Columbia High School in 1947. He continued his education at both Florida Southern College and the University of Florida, earning a BS in Business with a major in marketing.

Kirkland joined the Air Force soon after, serving as a jet fighter pilot during the Korean War, and around this time married Lucile "Busy" Summers, with whom he had two daughters, Lisa O'Steen and Lynn Sullivan.

Following Summers' death in 2000, Kirkland married Mary Lou Bond and is grandfather to five.

Following his time in the Air Force, Kirkland continued his military service for roughly 30

## Flooding a concern after weekend rain

More than four inches of rain fell in Columbia County during the weekend on areas already saturated from rainfall earlier in the year, resulting in numerous puddles and flooding concerns.

"There's going to be pockets of water in low-lying areas because of the rain we had the last couple of days," said Shayne Morgan, Columbia County Emergency Management director, noting there have been no road closures. "The low-lying areas are going to have standing water because the ground was saturated and we've

been in a cycle where we're getting regular rain. The impact it's been having is that our river levels are a little bit higher than we've seen in the last couple of years."

According to information from the National Weather Service in Jacksonville, meteorologists there estimate 4-4.5 inches of rain fell in Columbia County over the weekend.

Morgan said the area has more than a one-inch rainfall surplus thus far this year. Estimates indicate the area has received 15.87 inches of rain in 2014. Through March in 2013, the area only had 13.72 inches.

## NORTH FLORIDA WORKING WATER GROUP Springs bill faces rough road

Members of the North Florida Water Working Group believe a \$378 million springs protection bill will run into more obstacles before it is passed into law.

Tuesday afternoon members of the group spent more than 30 minutes in a conference call with their lobbyist and attorney to check on the status of the proposed legislation.

"They gave an update on what took place in Tallahassee, getting the members' thoughts and [...]

making sure they understand we may not get a full water bill this year," said Ron Williams, North Florida Working Group chairman. "It's not because everyone doesn't want it, it's just the politics that someone who really wants to make sure they're the one that sponsors the bill on the House side."

Williams and several other members noted that the minimum flows and levels included in the bill had drawn opposition and there are concerns that requirement may get cut from the proposed legislation.

The minimum flows and levels are the minimum

amount of water needed for a body of water to remain healthy and sustain its ecosystem.

"We want to make sure the playing field is level when the springs protection bill is passed and [...] that all users help the recovery," Williams said. "You can't ask Columbia, Hamilton, Baker and Alachua counties to conserve water when the people using most of the water are not honoring the conservation measures themselves."

# Republicans go after Crist over billboards

**TALLAHASSEE** Republicans are saying former Gov. Charlie Crist and his law firm broke the state's campaign finance laws. The executive director of the Republican Party of Florida filed a complaint Tuesday with the state elections commission.

The complaint contends Crist got an illegal campaign contribution because his name and face were on billboards put up by the Morgan & Morgan law firm.

Crist joined the firm after he lost his 2010 bid for the U.S. Senate. His face was placed on billboards that urged people to wear their seat belt or not text while driving.

Crist jumped into the governor's race last November. Billboards with his face came down by early 2014.

An attorney working with Crist called the complaint "frivolous" and said the billboards had a legitimate purpose.

### Senate bans e-cigarette sales to minors

**TALLAHASSEE** — It would be illegal to give or sell electronic cigarettes to minors under a bill approved by the Florida Senate.

The bill passed unanimously Tuesday with no debate. It adds electronic cigarettes to the law that bans the sale of tobacco products to minors.

Electronic cigarettes are battery-powered devices that heat a liquid nicotine solution, creating vapor that users inhale.

Sen. Lizbeth Benacquisto called the

devices dangerous and said the bill she sponsored will keep children healthier.

### Body of former Gov. Askew honored at Capital

**TALLAHASSEE** — Gov. Rick Scott and other state officials lined the sidewalks around the old Capitol as a military honor guard carried the casket of former Governor Askew draped with an American flag up the steps just after 9:30 a.m.

Inside the old Capitol, a short receiving line of family stood on the second floor beside the casket with a single white flower laid on top.

**TALLAHASSEE** — Motorists in Florida will get a break in the fees they pay to renew their car registration, although many won't see the benefit until next year.


The Florida Senate on Tuesday unanimously approved a bill (SB 156) that would lower auto tag and registration fees by about \$25 a year for many motorists.



## British actress Dickson dies

LONDON — Clarissa Dickson Wright, a vivid and outspoken British television personality who found fame as half of the food-loving duo "Two Fat Ladies," has died at the age of 66.

Her agents, Heather Holden-Brown and Elly James, said Dickson Wright

died Saturday at Edinburgh's Royal Infirmary of an unspecified illness.

In "Two Fat Ladies," Dickson Wright and Jennifer Paterson traveled Britain in an old Triumph motorcycle and sidecar, cooking lavish meals inspired by local tradition and trading quips about life, love and food.

The program became a big international hit for the BBC and ran until Paterson died of cancer in 1999, aged 71.

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## NORTH FLORIDA ANIMAL RESCUE Ex-worker arrested for threats

**WELLBORN** — A former employee of North Florida Animal Rescue was behind bars after allegedly threatening workers there while armed,

the Suwannee County Sheriff's Office reports.

Todd William Mosely, 35, of Live Oak, made threatening remarks to former co-workers around 11:06 a.m.

Monday after the animal shelter fired him, according to the sheriff's office.

Mosely allegedly said "I'm coming after your ass" and returned from his vehicle with a handgun tucked inside his waistband.

Deputies said Mosely continued to pace the premises, threatening employees until they informed him law enforcement was on route.


Mosely returned the firearm to his vehicle and was arrested by deputies without further incident, according to the arrest report.

"Everything is fully

functional and everything is fine," said shelter manager Erin Clary, adding, "We laid off a couple people." However, she declined to comment further due to "pending litigation."

According to the shelter's website, Mosely was in charge of grounds and maintenance and "can be found tending to things on the property as well as helping feed and move the horses...for much-needed exercise and grass management."

Mosely faces six counts of aggravated assault with a deadly weapon, jail records show.



"The big difference is how dry the January was compared to this year's January," he said, noting the area received more than six inches of rain in January 2014, compared to less than an inch in January 2013. "That's saturated the ground and that's why the puddles are going to last a little bit longer than they did traditionally."

Morgan said the area has been fortunate because there haven't been any periods with strong, sustained high winds that pushed trees over in the wet soil.

There are also flood warnings for both the Suwannee and Santa Fe rivers.

At 2 p.m. Tuesday, the projections called for the Suwannee River to get up to 69.4 feet, which is lower than the river readings on Sunday and Monday. Flood stage on the Suwannee River is 77 feet.

On the Santa Fe River, where two areas are closely monitored, one is referred to the Santa Fe River at Fort White and it's expected to rise to 24.5 feet. Flood stage at that point in the river is 24 feet and the river is currently at 22.78 feet.

"There's still a little wiggle room before we actually hit the flood stage," Morgan said.

Morgan said, "This is the 'action' stage, where people that live and have interests along the river should be preparing themselves just in case the forecasts are wrong and the river goes up higher than what's been forecasted."

The Santa Fe River at Three Rivers Estate is the other monitoring station and it's currently at 16.99 feet and is projected rise to 19.6 feet. Flood stage at that particular river marker is 19 feet.

"We'll continue to watch the river forecasts and over the next couple of days we'll go and look at the Santa Fe in particular because the Suwannee River seems to be on a downward trend," Morgan said. "The Santa Fe around those areas, we'll be looking at it to make sure nothing is happening. Fortunately a lot of our folks that live down there have been through this drill before, so it's not anything new to them. They see the river rising before we even see the forecasts and they know to start getting prepared just in case things take an unexpected turn."

The unpredictable element in the mix is rainfall in Georgia and how it impacts area rivers.

"It's just not a case of how much rain we get here in Columbia County, but how much fell on the tributaries that feed into rivers as they flow down into Florida," Morgan said.

years with the National Guard, reaching the rank of Colonel.

"Flying was a great love of his," said O'Steen. "His mom always used to say he flew in his sleep and talked about controls."

Kirkland logged well over 5,000 in the air, mastering the controls of 24 different military and civilian aircraft.

"One time he was teaching a younger person how to fly a helicopter and they'd go on night missions," O'Steen said. "Sometimes he'd close his eyes and doze off. The student said, 'Major Kirkland, there's a tower coming up. What should I do?' He opened one eye and said 'miss it.'"

Friends and family said Kirkland was an avid outdoorsman as well, using his aviation skills in ways some hunters and fishermen might call an unfair advantage.

"He went to helicopter training and had to fly for

River environmental group, said it's good to know that Columbia County has a voice in Tallahassee and that they're bringing back information to the working group regarding the proposed legislation.

"As far as what's happening, Our Santa Fe River Group would really love to see a Springs Protection Bill take form and place this (session), but from what I'm hearing we might just have to wait a little while," she said.

County Manager Dale Williams said the conference call was important to get the update on the draft bill.

"The purpose of today's meeting was to understand where we are at and what our strategies may be."

so many hours a month," Kennon said. "He'd bring [a helicopter] over to Lake City and use it to scare up doves in the field...We'd also check to see how many cars

were parked at different [water] landings to see where the fish were biting. The military might not have liked it, but he was getting his hours in."

Kirkland's other daughter, Lynn Sullivan, said there were even rumors friends of his dared him to fly under Jacksonville's Fuller Warren Bridge.

Kirkland continued to use his abilities to develop Lake City's local economy after former Chamber of Commerce President Terry McDavid hired him to direct the chamber in 1971—during his tenure, the chamber reported a 40 percent increase in membership.

"He really took the chamber to a new level," O'Steen said. "He had a great rapport with the

chamber. Things were really starting to move."

He continued to establish himself in the community—local citizens voted him the Mayor of Lake City in 1996.

"While he was mayor, we worked together on a lot of projects having to do with beautification and such," said James Montgomery, who was chair of the county commission during Kirkland's tenure.

"That was a time when the city and the county really got along with each other."

The landscape of Lake DeSoto wouldn't be the same without Kirkland, Kennon and Montgomery said.

"When you look by the courthouse and see the [fountain in Lake DeSoto] spewing up water, that was his baby," Kennon said. "His desire was to build city hall right there the gazebo near Shands is so he could watch the water fountain."

Local citizens voted to

keep in the mayor's seat for two more terms, with Kirkland winning re-election in 2000 and 2004.

"I think they knew how much he truly loved Lake City," O'Steen said. "He just had a great love of the community. He was also really making headway with the League of Cities. He was able to work with in that system. It gave them [the League] more power to speak to the Legislature."

He resigned as mayor in 2005.

Kirkland's daughters remember him as a devoted and industrious father who always made time for his family.

"He had a great love of life and his family," O'Steen said. "He wasn't perfect, but you won't find many people as kind and giving as him...When I was in school and had a problem, he'd always say, 'Come home. We'll cook a steak and we'll talk about it...' He was the best man I ever met."

### Registry of Persons with Special Needs

According to Chapter 252.355 Florida Statutes, "in order to meet the special needs of persons who would need assistance during evacuations and sheltering because of physical, mental or sensory disabilities, each local emergency management agency in the state shall maintain a registry of persons with special needs located within the jurisdiction of the local agency."

This registration helps the local Emergency Management Agency to identify those persons in need of assistance and to plan for resource allocation to meet those needs. This program gives persons with special needs the option of preauthorizing emergency response personnel to enter their homes during search and rescue operations if necessary to assure their safety and welfare following disasters.

If you or someone you know has a special condition affecting eyesight, hearing, speech, walking, breathing or has an emotional condition and would need assistance during evacuations and sheltering, please contact your local emergency management agency. The level of care given in special needs shelters goes above the basic first aid care available to shelters open to the general population.

# Sunshine isn't just a press issue

**G**overnment officials depend on citizens for a lot of things. They depend on citizens to vote for them, of course, at election time. They depend on citizens to cough up the tax dollars that keep government operating. And they depend on citizens to not give a hoot about Sunshine laws, to not care about meetings held behind closed doors and records withheld from public scrutiny.

No. Sunshine laws, or open-government laws, enable everyone to be better informed about what their representatives are doing, empowering them to play an active role in government at all levels. Sunshine laws help keep public officials honest, make government more responsive and sometimes reveal abuses of power.

Florida legislators know all of this, and last year they approved several bills that were friendly to open government and open records. Gov. Rick Scott signed one, for instance, ensuring the public's right to speak at public meetings.

Another step toward openness was a package of ethics reforms championed by Senate President Don Gaetz, R-Niceville. Among other things, it required that lawmakers' financial disclosure forms be posted online in a searchable database. This makes government more transparent.

And Gov. Scott was right to veto a bill that would have let members of Florida's Child Abuse Death Review Committee conduct off-the-record, unrecorded conversations about their work. He said it's important to keep precise records. Indeed it is.

Despite last year's accomplishments, the current legislative session includes the usual menu of proposals to increase government secrecy. One of them would ban the release of criminal suspects' booking photos, or mug shots. These photos now are part of the public record. They should stay that way.

Another bill before the Legislature would restrict the public's right to know the names of candidates for top jobs in public universities and colleges.

And so on. Without Sunshine laws and a public demanding candor, elected officials and government bureaucrats drift inexorably back into the shadows.

The shadows are not where city councils, county commissions, the Legislature and Congress should operate. That's why Sunshine Week, which continues through Saturday, reminds Americans to push back against official secrecy. Government openness is a cornerstone of our nation.

## Spreading a love for reading and writing

**I**t was an offer I wouldn't refuse. My husband is a newspaper editor. For Read Across America Day (March 3), the newspaper where he works signed up to send volunteers to read to school children.

"I signed you up, too," he told me. "You can go with me."

And so I did. We arrived at Wendell P. Williams Elementary School in Las Vegas, and were escorted to separate classrooms. The plan was easy: We would each read for 20 minutes in two classrooms, one after the other.

My first assignment was with Ms. Kirkbride's third graders. They were just finishing a math game. It was "Crazy Hair Day" at the school and Ms. Kirkbride was wearing a bushy green wig.

But it wasn't the wig that held her students' interest. It was her energy, enthusiasm and obvious love for learning. And, OK, who would dare cross a woman wearing a bushy green wig?

She offered me a choice of books. I picked "Coyote and the Laughing Butterflies" by Harriet Peck Taylor. It's a Native American folktale about a lazy coyote and a sneaky bunch of butterflies. Somehow it made me think of my family.

I sat on a sofa and the children sat on the floor around my feet with their sweet, shining faces upturned and hopeful.

I wish you could've seen them.

I felt like the Queen of Reading. If you've ever read to a child, I bet you've felt it, too.

They knew the story, but hung on the words the way little ears (and big ones, too) always love to

hang a good story well told.

When it ended (with a feast) we talked for a while. Their eyes turned to saucers when I told them I live on the edge of the city by the open desert and often hear coyotes near my house.

I didn't want to leave. But they had other things to do, other stories to explore. And it was time for my next assignment.

Mr. Richardson and his fifth-graders were hard at work when I arrived. Two of my children are teachers. I know that while teachers always appreciate volunteers, they still have a lot of ground they need to cover.

But Mr. Richardson welcomed me graciously with his smile and his students followed in kind.

I decided to read something from a book that I wrote some years ago. But first I told them a few things about my family.

— My stepfather left school as a boy to go to work to support his family after his father died. He never learned to read or write, but vowed his children would not suffer the same handicap.

— My brother, from birth, was totally blind. He learned to read Braille at the state school for the deaf and the blind, not with his

eyes, but with his fingers.

— My grandmother taught me to read before I started school. But never in my wildest dreams did I ever imagine I'd grow up to earn my living as a writer.

They listened intently as I told them all that. Then I showed them my book and read this:

"We read and write to know and to be known. It has been that way a very long time and I expect it always will."

"It works like this: You take thoughts and feelings from your mind and heart and even from your soul, and fashion them into words. That is called language."

"You put the words on paper or a computer screen, using symbols and marks that you trust to carry your meaning. That is called writing."

"Then someone who's never seen your face or heard your voice will see your symbols and marks and recognize them as words. That is called reading."

"Sometimes, unpredictably, the words hold the power to recreate the writer's thoughts and feelings in the mind and the heart and even in the soul of the reader. That is called a miracle."

Some do it for love. Some do it for money. And some of us, if we're lucky, get to do it for the students at Wendell P. Williams Elementary School in Las Vegas.

And truly, that is a miracle.

## Sen. Feinstein is right to go public on CIA probe

**A**mericans need to listen to Senate Intelligence Committee Chairwoman Dianne Feinstein, who took to the Senate floor last week to publicly accuse the CIA of secretly poking around and lifting material from committee computers. If true, the remarkable allegations, which are now under Department of Justice review, means the CIA violated the Constitution and federal law against domestic spying.

Feinstein is no Edward Snowden, the nomadic former National Security Agency analyst who dumped reams of sensitive documents into cyberspace with little regard for the consequences. In fact, Feinstein has drawn Snowden's criticism for defending controversial intelligence-gathering activities.

On intelligence matters, she has considerable street cred. That's why her public allegations are a defining moment for whether Congress in the post-9/11 era can effectively oversee the nation's intelligence

agencies. If the CIA can circumvent the law and stonewall with impunity, heaven help the rest of us. Feinstein is right to push for the truth and CIA accountability.

Feinstein says CIA Director John Brennan conceded that the agency poked into the committee's computers, but only to determine how Senate staffers received documents that he argued they weren't authorized to have. Feinstein says that's a cover story to a cover-up. According to her, the CIA removed from committee computers internal CIA reports that cast the agency's post-9/11 interrogation tactics in a harsh and negative light. Brennan is pushing back. "As far as the allegations of CIA hacking into Senate computers – nothing could be further from the truth. We wouldn't do that," he says....

Equally distressing is that the committee's separate voluminous report on the CIA's post-9/11 "enhanced interrogation" program – the document at the center of this fight – remains out of public view.

The CIA says the report is error-filled; Feinstein says the agency is stalling to avoid embarrassment and legal entanglements....

The CIA has the right to contest the committee's report or work with Senate staffers to determine whether certain sensitive information should remain behind closed doors. It does not have the right to secretly meddle with the Oversight Committee's work product, in effect trampling on the constitutional line between the executive and legislative branches. Congress cannot perform its constitutional duty of overseeing the executive branch when the CIA covertly thwarts investigations.

The administration should move quickly to declassify and release as much as possible of all reports related to the detention program. The public has a right to know, and the Senate has an obligation to do its job without executive branch interference.

# 60 high school students set to graduate FGC with college degrees in May

This May, 60 students will graduate from Florida Gateway College with an associate degree or certificate, nearly a month before they graduate from high school.

Thanks to the state of Florida's Dual Enrollment program, this is an opportunity that is afforded to students in FGC's five-county service district, as well as students throughout the state.

The Dual Enrollment program at Florida Gateway College began in 1998, offering local secondary students the opportunity to take postsecondary coursework and simultaneously earn credit toward high school completion and college credits – at no additional cost to parents.

This allows students to graduate from college earlier – sometimes before their high school graduation – and reduce the amount of cost and time attending a university.

In the state of Florida, more than 50,000 students annually participate in the Dual Enrollment program. According to the U.S. Department of Education, college credit earned prior to high school graduation reduces the average time-to-degree and increases the likelihood of graduation for the students who participate in these programs.

There is also evidence that dual enrollment increases academic performance and educational attainment. For example, nearly one-third of the members of Florida Gateway College's Phi Theta Kappa honor society chapter, Xi Phi, are current Dual Enrollment students.

Currently, there are 778 Dual Enrollment students enrolled at FGC for the spring semester. These students come from the college's five-county service district – Columbia, Baker, Gilchrist, Union, and Dixie – as well as some students from Suwannee County.

That number could continue to grow as more parents are discovering the opportunities that Dual Enrollment provides students.

"This is an opportunity that we want parents and students to know about as soon as possible, so they can begin working to meet their goals," said Linda Williams, FGC's Dual Enrollment coordinator.

As the statute regarding the dual enrollment program states, all students in grades 10-12 are eligible to take Dual Enrollment courses, but students must meet certain criteria to be qualified:


- Be enrolled as a student in a Florida public or nonpublic secondary school, or in a home school education program;

- Have a 3.0 unweighted high school grade point average to enroll in college credit courses, or a 2.0 high school unweighted GPA to enroll in career Dual Enrollment courses;

- Take a college placement test specified in Rule 6A-10.0315, Florida Administrative Code, and meet any additional eligibility criteria specified by the postsecondary institution in the Dual Enrollment Articulation Agreement; and

- Cannot be scheduled to graduate prior to the completion of the Dual Enrollment course.

"We are happy that any Dual Enrollment students who meet the statutory eligibility requirements – grades 10-12 – are allowed to participate in this wonderful program," Williams

said.

While open to all students in grades 10-12, many students and parents should begin considering and preparing for dual enrollment as early as middle school, she said.

"We work very closely with all of our district guidance counselors and those guidance counselors are the ones who determine whether their students are eligible for this program," Williams said. "We also ask the parents to evaluate the readiness of their son or daughter. We rely on both the parents and guidance counselors to determine readiness; not just academically, but also socially and emotionally because of the increased rigor of these courses."

Shonglee Ho, who is scheduled to graduate from Columbia High School in June, began attending FGC as a sophomore in high school. She said she has come to appreciate the opportunity afforded to her through the program.

"Through the years I've been doing this – since the end of 2006 – there are very few students who I can say did not need to be in this program," she said. "There may be a few students who are slow getting started their first semester, but it doesn't take them long to see what it takes to be successful. We really do have extremely high-achieving students in our program."

"I've always known that I wanted to go into the medical field, but, I had no idea how I would even begin my journey to get there," she said. "FGC has allowed me to complete a large portion of the classes I'll need for my degree in biology, given me the tools, resources, and know-how to steer myself in the right direction in college, as well as prepared me to tackle higher-level courses at whatever major university I choose to attend. Did I mention, all at no monetary cost to me."

Brandon Williams, a Columbia County home education student who is also dual enrolled at FGC, said Dual Enrollment is a great introduction to college life.

"The program enables me to pursue an Associates degree while still attending high school," he said. "It would be impossible for me to keep up with both my high school and college workload, but some

of the classes I take at FGC also satisfy the requirements for high school graduation. The credits from the Associate in Arts degree that I'm pursuing are also transferable, so I can continue my education at another institution."

Students who graduate from the Dual Enrollment program with an AA degree are also guaranteed admission to a Florida public university, Linda Williams said.

"Through the years I've been doing this – since the end of 2006 – there are very few students who I can say did not need to be in this program," she said. "There may be a few students who are slow getting started their first semester, but it doesn't take them long to see what it takes to be successful. We really do have extremely high-achieving students in our program."

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

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# Keeping up with colon health

Dear Pharmacist,  
I had to get a colonoscopy last month, and fortunately, everything is okay but it made me worry about colon cancer. My doctor recommended a stool softener and laxative for me if it gets bad. What else do you suggest for colon health? — P.C., Ocala, Florida

**Answer:** Definitely clean yourself out. I'm not recommending gastric lavage, I'm thinking simple solutions like drinking more water, eating more fiber and taking probiotics and enzymes. The following dietary supplements act like a sponge binding bile acids and toxins in your intestine to form an insoluble complex that you excrete. Think of these as a rescue remedy, not for chronic daily use because they will latch on to your medicine and supplements: Bentonite clay, activated charcoal and psyllium husk. You'd pick only one, not all. The bentonite and charcoal can be extremely constipating so be careful, and ask your doctor if they're okay.

This may sound weird but your colon is connected to your head and your gut is often referred to as your "second brain." That's why avoiding various food groups improves mood and migraines. Colonics are an option. Gun shy about these? I don't blame you, most colonic practitioners use an intimidating speculum, but the newer, thinner nozzles are more comfortable. That's what I'm told by my friend, Francis Gonzalez, ND, an I-ACT certified colon hydrotherapist instructor and founder of Fluid Water Therapy

in New York. I-ACT stands for "International Association for Colon Hydrotherapy."

Colonics improve lower intestinal health, especially if you eat lots of dairy, meat, white flour, processed, refined foods, milk chocolate, coffee or alcohol. For some reason, after a while, these foods encrust the intestines with a sludge made up of thick mucus, fecal material, and other trapped debris. The sludge promotes the growth of pathogens adding to the intestinal mess. If you have any chronic illness, I urge you to consider internal pollution, not just environmental pollution! Digestive enzymes and probiotics can help, and they are more effective after colonic therapy.

Colonics (and gentle enemas) help remove toxins from your intestine, reduce bloating and relieve constipation. Colonics help remove rotting material like meat that gets stuck in your intestinal tract. Warming up to the idea? Be warned that many colonics are performed by untrained personnel using

unregulated, home-made systems referred to as "Woods Gravity" method. Dr. Gonzalez provided some bare minimum criteria that your colon therapist should meet:

- \* Be certified and trained by the International Association for Colon Hydrotherapy (I-ACT) and/or the National Board for Colon Hydrotherapy (NBCHT)

- \* Only utilize FDA-registered Class II medical devices to conduct the therapy.

- \* Only use disposable rectal nozzles that have been sterilized.

- \* Use colon hydrotherapy equipment installed with back-flow prevention valves so that fecal matter from one patient can't contaminate another (heaven forbid!).

- \* Can ensure that the water that is used to cleanse the patient's intestinal tract is properly purified to eliminate any water-borne microorganisms.

# Assisted living facilities face new scrutiny

The measure passed unanimously Tuesday.

It also requires the creation of a website where people can post public comments about individual facilities. The bill still faces a House vote.

Assisted living facilities in Florida provide intermediate care with limited supervision of residents.

# Yoga by Numbers: Accessible for all ages

Combine Twister, paint-by-numbers and the ancient Hindu practice of breath control, meditation and poses, and you get Yoga by Numbers.

The approach — complete with a numbered mat — was designed by a Boston woman whose own health scare inspired her to put yoga in reach for people with physical limitations, tight schedules or other roadblocks to traditional practice.

The oversized yoga mat is dotted with big, numbered circles that look like the target in a rifle scope. The accompanying DVD gives true yoga beginners — those who wouldn't know an up-dog from a Chihuahua — a step-by-step roadmap to learn the poses at their own pace.

Elizabeth Morrow was an athlete, a skier and soccer player who, two years ago, found herself hospital-

ized with a right lung full of blood clots, the lower lobe completely collapsed. When she was strong enough to start exercising again, she found even the easiest of yoga classes too taxing. She didn't have the stamina for an hour, couldn't hold the poses the way the instructor wanted.

So, the 32-year-old started thinking of ways to make it easier, more convenient and even more fundamental than the myriad DVDs already on the market.

"I was thinking about a paint-by-number kit where you don't need to be Picasso or van Gogh, you just follow what they tell you and you'll come out with something," she said. "I just wanted something that felt really accessible and doable for people. The image of the mat just popped into my head: 'Wow, I can do yoga by numbers as well.'"

The DVD tells users exactly which circle to put their hands and feet in and

allows for advancement to more challenging poses.

Yoga by Numbers has been compared to Twister, the popular game with giant colored circles, spinning wheel and crazy, cross-limbed poses. But Morrow's cool with that, even when it comes from critics.

"I think it's awesome when they have that reaction because to me, that means they get it and they know how to use it," said Morrow, a certified yoga instructor.

Morrow has sold to people who live far from a yoga studio, those with tight schedules who need to squeeze in practice whenever they can, and people with health conditions. The National Institutes of Health's National Center for Complementary and Alternative Medicine reports that recent studies of people with chronic low-back pain suggest yoga can help reduce pain and improve function.

Other research shows regular practice might reduce heart rate, blood pressure and stress and may help relieve anxiety and depression.

"People who are older are using it because the DVD really focuses you on not contorting yourself into Cirque du Soleil-style acrobatics," Morrow said. She demonstrated the mat recently at her parent's house in Bow, N.H., about an hour north of Boston.

Morrow patented the idea and sells the mats, made in the U.S. from sustainable rubber, for \$119.95 including DVD and carry strap. She started selling on The Grommet, a website that launches undiscovered products, then had a successful, online crowd-sourced campaign to raise more start-up funds.

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

## Gators look to end NCAA heartbreak

GAINESVILLE — Florida already has cut down nets twice this season. The Gators have won a school-record 26 consecutive games, became the first team in Southeastern Conference history to go 18-0 in the regular season, won the league tournament and earned the overall top seed in the NCAA tournament for the second time.

No doubt, coach Billy Donovan's team has accomplished a lot.

The Gators (32-2) aren't satisfied, either.

The No. 1 seed in the South Region enters the NCAA tournament with an all-or-nothing mentality,

knowing it needs six more wins to solidify a spot in program and college basketball lore. Anything short would be another disappointment for a senior-laden team that lost in a regional final the last three years.

"A lot of heartbreak," leading scorer Casey Prather said. "But I feel like that's one of the things that make this team so special, because we know how to battle through and persevere through obstacles."

Even though Prather and fellow senior starters Scottie Wilbekin, Will Yeguete and Patric Young weren't the core of the team like they are now, they still vividly remember the feeling of falling just short of the Final Four the last three years.


