Econ chief choices down to 3

Businessman, state lawmaker, Sumter Co. official are finalists.

County Manager Dale Williams is on the cusp of hiring a new Economic Development Director, having narrowed down the pool to three applicants.

The final trio includes president of Hunter Printing and former School Board member Glenn Hunter, State Representative Elizabeth Porter, R-Lake City, and Sumter County Economic Development Coordinator Matthew Walsh.

print shop since January 1979. As president, he oversees budgets, job planning, personnel supervision and sales, according to his

application. He also occupied the District 5 seat for the Columbia County School Board, serving from 1988 to 2012 before resigning to run for superintendent. When asked what he liked least about the position, Hunter wrote, "The inability to be able to

work with other board members to plan as we do in private business due to the constraints of the Sunshine Laws." Hunter is also president/board member of the CARC and a member of the Rotary Club of Lake City, where he was named both Businessman of the Year and Community Volunteer of the Year.

Campbell era ends at TDC

County's first tourism chief calls it a career after 21 years on job.

From "Mr. Jiffy Junction" to the trailblazer of local tourism, Harvey Campbell leaves an indelible mark on the history of Columbia County.

Family, friends and colleagues Tuesday evening gathered at the Holiday Inn Hotel & Suites to commemorate the retirement of the county's first ever Executive Director of the Tourist Development Council.

Campbell was also an instrumental figure in many of the community's most recognized organizations, having served as a member of the Columbia County School Board, Commanding General of the Blue Grey Army and Sports Editor for the Lake City Reporter.

In addition, Campbell served on the Florida Tourism Commission, Board of Directors for Visit Florida, the Florida Association of Destination Marketing Organizations, Board of Directors for Florida State Parks and many other similar organizations.

"I hate to say someone is irreplaceable," said Commissioner Ron Williams, who came to know him many decades ago when Campbell operated a Jiffy Junction convenience store in the area. "[Harvey] wore many hats...It's going to be hard to find another person like him."

Williams and the rest of his fellow county commissioners arrived to pay homage to Campbell's work for the county.

"[Campbell] is a person of great integrity," County Manager Dale Williams said. "I can only echo what has been said...We appreciate everything you've done."

Through the TDC, Harvey became known as "Columbia County's #1 Cheerleader," using his "passion and vigor," hotelier Nick Patel said, to develop sports, environmental and cultural tourism in the area.

"Every drop of his blood was for Columbia County," Patel said. "I believe he even dreams about Columbia County when he sleeps at night...There is no individual I now who has more knowledge about Columbia County than Harvey."

Highlights of Campbell's career include his savvy marketing efforts to bring in thousands of visitors for the annual Battle

of Olustee Festivals and re-enactments — "He is the guy that put it on the map," said Mike Null, Director of Purchasing with

the school board. Campbell was also one of the leading figures to bring the Florida Sports Hall of Fame to Lake City in 1990, before state budget cuts by Governor Jeb Bush closed the facility in 2002.

"Harvey was the heart and soul of the Hall of Fame here and, to me, the heart and soul of Columbia County," said Joe DeSalvo, former Executive Sports Editor of the Tampa Tribune. "Everything he did was for the betterment of Columbia County. They will always be indebted to him."

Athletic activities, especially for the youth, held a special place in Campbell's heart.

"I'll remember him for one very important thing," Patel said. "He pushed for the Southside Sports Complex...[and] made sure it didn't get off track."

Although local government invested \$2 million in the complex's renovations, many of his colleagues attribute the area's

Mystery deepens in LCPD shooting

Slain motorist had not failed to report to sex offender registry.

Jimmy Eugene Barker, the Tennessee man shot and killed when he pointed a handgun at a Lake City Police Officer at a recent DUI checkpoint, was not on parole or probation and, contrary to reports from one Tennessee law enforcement agency, had not violated rules of the state's sex offender registry by failing to check in.

According to information from the Knoxville News Sentinel, officials at the Blount County Sheriff's Office said Barker failed to report as scheduled to the Tennessee Sexual Offender Registry.

However, the Tennessee Sexual Offender Registry is administered by the Tennessee Bureau of Investigation, and TBI officials said Barker was in compliance.

"According to our online registry, Barker last reported on December 11, 2013 with an address in Louisville, Tenn.," Josh DeVine, TBI public information officer said by email Tuesday. "Barker was classified as a violent offender and was required to report quarterly. He was due to report by the end of March. If he had moved permanently to Florida or otherwise changed any of his identifying information, such as a phone number, he was required by law to report that in person within 48 hours."

Neysa Taylor, public information officer with the Tennessee Department of Corrections, said Barker's sentence for three rapes ended Sept. 23, 2009, and he was not on probation or parole when the incident in Lake City occurred.

"He's not ours," she said. Baker, 60, of Louisville, Tenn., was

School accountability bill headed to House floor

TALLAHASSEE — After years of confusion, a measure that would overhaul Florida's school grading system and get schools ready for new tests is headed to the House floor after receiving overwhelming approval at its final committee stop.

The House Education Appropriations Subcommittee approved the proposal (HB 7117) with a bipartisan, 11-2 vote on Monday. Modeled on a proposal by Education Commissioner Pam Stewart, the bill would streamline school grades and suspend punishment for school grades for one year while a new state assessment is rolled out.

The proposed changes come against

the backdrop of years of disorder within the school grading system, including repeated steps by the State Board of Education to prevent school districts from dropping more than one letter grade in the wake of changes to the school report card formula.

The plan adopted Monday would alter the grading formula and do away with penalties schools could currently receive

for the grades assigned in the 2014-15 school year. That move is in part an effort to make up for the state switching from the FCAT, now in use, to an exam crafted by the American Institutes for Research.

But some Democrats and educators have argued that a one year break is not long enough, especially since Stewart only selected AIR as the developer of the new test last week. Critics say a break of at least three years is needed.

"I think a one-year pause is still not going to be enough time... If we want this to be successful, we should not be rushing it," said Rep. Karen Castor Dentel, a Maitland Democrat who voted against the plan.

The Florida Education Association, the state's largest teachers union, also calls

for a longer phase-in, although President Andy Ford was largely conciliatory during remarks to the panel.

"A one-year hiatus is a good move," Ford said. "We don't think it's long enough, but it is a step in the right direction, and we appreciate it."

But Rep. Janet Adkins, the Fernandina Beach Republican who sponsored the bill, pushed back against a three-year transition.

"There's always this kind of desire by the institution to have a greater period (of) transition time," she said. "... I think what's in the best interest of our students is creating that sense of urgency. Now, we want to hold our schools harmless. We want to make sure that we've got a smooth transition period."

State may ban minors under 16 from marrying

TALLAHASSEE

Florida may make it illegal for anyone under the age of 16 to get married.

A bill is advancing through the Florida Legislature that prohibits minors 15 or younger from being able to get permission to marry. If approved Florida would join 13 other states that totally ban marriage for someone under 16.

Current law requires a minor who is 16 or 17 years old to get parental consent before marrying. But minors younger than that get married if they have a child or if the bride is pregnant.

Last year there were 9 marriages that included a minor under 16.

The House Healthy Families subcommittee voted in favor of the bill (HB 1279) Tuesday. It has one more stop before making it to the full House.

Consumer confidence rising, says UF study

GAINESVILLE — Florida's consumer confidence is rising.

The monthly University of Florida survey released Tuesday shows the state's consumer confidence was 81 in the month of March. That's on a scale of 2 to 150 benchmarked to 1966 at a value of 100.

This is three points higher than February. It is one of the highest consumer confidence rankings since the Great Recession. It has reached this same mark twice since December 2007.

Chris McCarty, director of the UF center that does the survey, says the increase was expected given relatively good economic news and that Congress budget deals have provided a level of certainty.

Pastors: Original plea deal in warning shot case

JACKSONVILLE — Pastors are calling for the Jacksonville State Attorney's Office to offer the original plea deal to a woman who received a lengthy sentence for firing what she claims was a warning shot during a fight with her estranged husband.

Marissa Alexander, 33, rejected a deal that would have sent her to three years in prison. She was later convicted and sentenced to 20 years on charges that she fired a gun at Rico Gray and two of his children. She called it a warning shot.

The conviction was overturned and she's scheduled for a July 28 trial.

"Given that she's been granted a chance at a retrial, she should have the chance at a redo," the Rev. Mark Griffin of Wayman Ministries told area newspapers.

Defense attorney Bruce Zimet has previously said that his client would listen to all offers. She could face 60 years in prison if convicted again.

Group wants Legislature to study family issues

TALLAHASSEE — The Florida Family Policy Council is giving lawmakers a report showing the decline of two-parent families and marriage in Florida in hopes it will begin a conversation on what the state can do to strengthen families.

The group wants the Legislature to consider forming a commission to look at what government can do to preserve families.

Council President John Stemberger estimated that fragmented families costs the state \$1.9 billion a year.

The Lake City Police Department's new assistant chief, Gerald "Jerry" Butler Jr. and four other officers began work Monday.

Along with Butler, other officers sworn in were: Officer Jason Herrera, Officer Tony McCloud, Officer Jason O'Neal and Officer Matthew Waddington.

Department officials said the four were selected through an exhaustive application process over the last few months.

The new officers also began a 12-week Field Training and

Elizabeth Porter serves in the District 10 seat in the Florida House of Representatives. First elected to the Legislature in 2010, she served on the County Commission from 2004 to 2008.

In the interim, Porter worked as a Client Relations Specialist with Bailey Bishop and Lane, Inc., a land surveying company that is no longer in

business.

When asked what she disliked about the county and legislative seats, she replied, "the slow pace of government."

In the House, she serves as the Vice Chair of the Economic Development and Tourism Subcommittee and the Education Committee.

Matthew Walsh

Matthew Walsh serves as the Economic Development Coordinator for the Sumter County Board of County

Commissioners, a seat he's held since February 2013.

Prior, he worked as a Partner/Vice President of Operations at Precision Playgrounds, Inc., General Manager of freight management company AVI Cargo, Inc., and Vice President of North American Sales with The Bestol Group, LTD. based in Beijing, China.

Walsh wrote he disliked "the politics of consensus in government" during his time serving the Sumter County BOCC.

According to his resume, Walsh says he has "extensive creative senior-level experience" in international manufacturing, logistics, supply chain management and other related business facets.

The county has been searching for a new Economic Development Director since former director Jesse Quillen resigned in February 2014.

Williams said he plans to conduct interviews this week with the aid of his staff.

stopped Friday, March 14, shortly before midnight at a Lake City Police Department checkpoint in the 1400 block of US 90 West, across from the Florida Highway Patrol office.

As LCPD Officer Mike Lee approached the vehicle, Barker reportedly drew a handgun and pointed it out the window at him. Lee grabbed the gun with his left hand and then pulled his service revolver with his right, shooting Barker, who died at the scene.

Lee suffered minor injuries to his left hand.

Barker served time in a Tennessee prison for rapes committed in 1997, 1998, and 1999.

Marian O'Briant, Blount County Sheriff's Office public information officer, said Barker was on the sex offender registry in Tennessee, but she is uncertain why he was on the registry.

"He registered here from somewhere else [in Tennessee]," she said. "He did not commit the actual crime here. Whenever he moved to this area he had to register as a sex offender, but I don't know what his original crime was."

Barker also had a brush with Tennessee authorities within the past six months, O'Briant said.

"He had a DUI in September 2013," she said, noting he was charged by the Alcoa Police Department with the infraction. She said she did not know whether he was out of jail on bail from that arrest when the incident in Lake City occurred.

Craig Strickland, Lake City Police Department public information officer, said there were no warrants for Barker's arrest when stopped Friday.

Since Barker was not wanted for any crimes, it remains unclear why he pulled a gun on a police officer. Results of toxicology tests to determine if he was driving under the influence have not been made public.

Another possibility is that, as a convicted felon, he was in unlawful possession of a gun, which officers might have located during the routine stop.

Strickland said Barker and his brother were "running on fumes" with little to no money and fuel for their vehicle, per statements from Barker's brother.

"They were out of cash and didn't even think they would make it to Wal-Mart," Strickland said.

Local authorities are uncertain whether Barker and his brother had access to more cash.

The case is being investigated by the Florida Department of Law Enforcement, which declined comment citing the ongoing investigation.

CCSO: City man faces sexual assault charges

A Lake City man was behind bars after using a pillow as a weapon during a physical and sexual assault on a woman, CCSO reports.

William B. Brinkley, 53, returned with the victim to her home around 4:30 a.m. Sunday and began drinking alcoholic beverages, according to the arrest report.

Brinkley allegedly became belligerent and, after the victim asked him to leave, punched a hole in the wall and kicked her bedroom door open, the report said.

Brinkley then began sexually assaulting the victim on her own bed, the report said.

The victim fought back, screaming and scratching, but was unable to prevent Brinkley from proceeding further, the report said.

Brinkley then placed a blue and white pillow over her face and began punching her through it, according to the report.

The suspect eventually fled the scene in a red Dodge pickup truck, the report said.

"[The victim] was located at the residence fully nude and covered in blood," deputies said.

Deputies then arrived at Brinkley's residence and noted the hood of his truck was "very warm to [the] touch as if it was recently driven," the report said.

Brinkley did not answer the door, prompting deputies to make a forced entry through the rear door "due to the nature of the crime (forcible felony)," the report said.

Deputies said Brinkley was in a bedroom "acting asleep" and told authorities he had been at his home since 9:00 p.m. the previous night, according to the report.

"Once at jail, [the arresting deputy] observed several fresh scratches located on [Brinkley's] chest and arms," the report said.

However, Brinkley claimed he received the wounds several weeks ago when he was "playing around in the yard" with another individual, deputies said.

Deputies said they could not locate the blue and white pillow allegedly used in the incident.

Brinkley was booked into Columbia County Detention Facility on \$55,000 bond. He faces a charge of domestic battery by strangulation and sexual assault with a weapon.

National Guard, Scott back emergency concealed carry

TALLAHASSEE — A measure backed by the National Rifle Association that would allow people to conceal a firearm without a license during an emergency now has the open support of Gov. Rick Scott and the Florida National Guard but is still on hold in the Senate.

St. Petersburg Republican Sen. Jeff Brandes on Tuesday for the second time delayed a vote on his bill (296), now seemingly stalled in the Senate Military and Veterans Affairs, Space, and Domestic Security Committee.

"Clearly we're going to continue to work with law enforcement and the agencies involved to come up with a better product," Brandes said Tuesday after again postponing a vote on the measure.

The bill could still

advance because the committee may hold up to two more meetings, Chairman Thad Altman, R-Melbourne said.

Scott and the National Guard this week came out in support of the plan after NRA lobbyist Marion Hammer took issue with objections to the bill expressed by the chief lawyer for the Florida Department of Military Affairs. The agency is overseen by Scott, who is seeking re-election this year.

Hammer said she questioned the governor's aides about comments made by Capt. Terrence Gorman, general counsel for the military agency, at a March 19 meeting.

"I'm not interested in bringing law enforcement on board. This is about law-abiding people being able to protect themselves in a time of emergency," Hammer told reporters after the vote was postponed on

Tuesday. "It is not about the convenience of law enforcement."

Two N.Y. campers lose their lives in Suwannee River

WHITE SPRINGS — The bodies of two upstate New York residents camping at a state park here were found in the Suwannee River, according to Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission officials.

The body of Grace C. Maynard, 73, of Auburn, N.Y., was discovered Friday at 9:20 a.m. floating in the river downstream from the Highway 51 bridge. The body of her husband, James J. Maynard, 74, also from Auburn, N.Y., was found Sunday floating approximately 1.6 miles upstream from Dowling Park, FWC officials said.

Mrs. Maynard was found wearing a life jacket but had no identification. About 3 miles upstream, officers discovered a floating cooler with a man's wallet inside. The wallet's identification belonged to James Maynard.

The Maynards' truck was found at the Gibson Park boat ramp outside of Jasper. Grace Maynard was identified after officers found the registration and checked her New York driver's license photo.

The Maynards were registered guests at the Stephen Foster Folk Culture Center State Park campground.

According to investigators, the Maynards launched a small vessel from Gibson Park. Somewhere on the Suwannee River between Gibson Park and Hwy 51 "something happened, causing the Maynards to enter the water," according to an FWC news release. Officials from the FWC, Lafayette County Sheriff's Office and Suwannee County Sheriff's Office searched for James Maynard over the weekend.

FWC officials are continuing the investigation.

Major changes ahead for charter-school bill

TALLAHASSEE — A dramatically narrowed version of legislation aimed at helping charter schools get started and expand was approved by the Senate Education Committee on Tuesday.

Changes approved by the committee opened up broad differences between the bill (SB 1528) and its House counterpart, but appeared to clear the way for a bipartisan, 7-1 vote to move the legislation forward.

Originally, the bill would have required school districts and charter schools to use a standardized contract developed by the Florida Department of Education. Also, it would have removed some limits on the ability of charter operators whose schools do well on state report cards to establish new schools, though it would have restricted where those new facilities could be located.

The new Senate version would instead require the DOE to forward any case where negotiations between a charter operator and a district are deadlocked to an administrative law judge. The judge would have 30 days to rule on the case.

Under the amendment, charter schools would also only be allowed to expel students for violations of the schools' codes of conduct — addressing concerns by Sen. Bill Montford, D-Tallahassee, that some of the schools might be trying to get rid of students who struggle academically.

Supporters of the legislation say districts sometimes drag their feet to try to delay or prevent the opening of charter schools.

"I believe the Senate is pretty much in agreement that we liked an approach that accommodated the charter schools' concern — which is a very legitimate concern — but we had a different solution to that problem," said Senate Education Chairman John Legg, R-Lutz.

He also said the standardized charter school agreement, which DOE was required to craft under a bill that was approved last year, would still be useful as "a template" for judges to consider.

The compromise was backed at Tuesday's meeting by groups that have supported the charter school legislation, as well as organizations that had been more skeptical of the proposal.

When smoke gets in the EPA's eyes

Nothing chases the chill of a cold winter's night like pulling a chair up close to a wood-burning stove. The Environmental Protection Agency, which lives in mortal dread that somewhere, someone is enjoying life, wants to eliminate wood-burning stoves. President Obama has agreed to impose a tax on coziness, with new regulations proposed by his Environmental Protection Agency.

These new rules would reduce the maximum airborne particulate emissions for new stoves by 80 percent to 4.5 grams per hour initially, and crank down the allowable level further to 1.3 grams after five years. Achieving these targets will add between \$300 and \$500 to the cost of a stove, prompting fears that working-class folk who typically burn wood to save money won't be able to afford to do so. A period of public comment on the proposed standards ends May 5.

"There's not a stove in the United States that can pass the test right now," Reg Kelly, founder of Earth Outdoor Furnaces, told a hearing of the Missouri House of Representatives. "This is the death knell of wood burning." The legislature in the Show Me State considered a measure that would bar state environmental officials from regulating wood stoves.

Besides the new rules on residential wood-burning, there are other draconian federal regulations to deal with. Last year, the EPA imposed standards reducing allowable particles in the air from a tiny 15 micrograms per cubic meter to a miniscule 12 micrograms. By comparison, a lighted cigarette in a closed automobile pumps out 3,000-4,000 micrograms of particulate matter per cubic meter. The rule isn't about improving actual air quality, but about Washington asserting control over what sort of businesses can operate and what sort of products Americans can buy.

For many, a wood-burning stove isn't a luxury, but a necessity to warm the house. The U.S. Energy Information Administration reported last week that between 2005 and 2012, the number of U.S. homes in which wood fires served as the main heating source jumped from 1.9 million to 2.5 million. The largest increase occurred in New England and the Middle Atlantic states, where the number of homes relying primarily on wood for warmth rose 50 percent. Another 9 million dwellings across the country use wood as a secondary heating fuel.

A wealthy Bostonian who wants to buy a new wood stove for his weekend cabin in the Berkshires can simply write a bigger check and scrawl on the notation line, "the price of progress." For the checkout clerk who scans groceries in town and can't afford the high cost of heating oil (at \$4 a gallon), the new rules might mean he'll have to keep stoking old smoky to keep the kids warm.

An assistant administrator for the Office of Air and Radiation reaped a whirlwind of scorn in 2011 when she told a congressional hearing that the dust kicked up by farmers' tractors falls within the category of particulate matter, and is thus something the agency is entitled to regulate.

Staying out of trouble with the EPA's air regulators requires the adoption of the hiker's ethic of "leave no trace." If Americans sneeze or otherwise stir up a bit of dust, they'll pay for it.

Sometimes life turns in a circle like a beacon to show you something old in a new light.

Yesterday I flew from my home in Las Vegas to the Monterey Peninsula in California, where I raised my children. Two of them still live here, teaching school and raising families of their own.

I visit as often as I can. But playing with the little people (ages 3, 2 and 1) doesn't leave much time to spend with their parents. The parents don't seem to mind. But I do. I miss them. So I said, on this visit, I'd like some time alone with each of the grownups. That raised a few eyebrows, but nobody balked.

I guess if your mama or mama-in-law asks for time, you either say yes or try to think of a good excuse. They don't have to make excuses. Four adults, full calendars, jobs, kids, lives. It's like trying to herd snakes.

But if you don't get what you didn't ask for, there's no one to blame but yourself. So I asked.

And that's how I got to spend an evening with my daughter. Her husband took the night off from work to stay home with their 2-year-old. And she and I went to a restaurant near the house where we used to live.

I wish you could've seen us. She looked great. I looked like her mother, but that's a look I'll gladly take any time.

In the years after her dad died, going out to dinner together became a ritual for us. She was still in college but came home most weekends to make me get off my

Sometimes, to move on in life, we go through the motions until the feelings return, like stirring coals to rekindle a flame.

She made me stir the coals, my daughter. I'm remarried now, living 500 miles away, and she is married with a 2-year-old.

I can't recall the last time we had an evening alone together. Yet, we've never been closer.

Watching her face shine as she talked over dinner, I saw both the beautiful young woman that she's become, and the little girl that she will always be to me.

She mentioned a mutual friend, a woman my age, who has long been a "mama-figure" for her. And for a moment, I felt an old stab of jealousy mixed with gratitude that I've always felt for women she looks up to.

Growing up, she was forever talking about some teacher or the mother of one of her friends that she admired for being extra kind or classy or cool.

She had excellent taste. They were all women I admired, too.

That didn't mean I had to like them. Actually, I did like them. I

knew her admiration for them had nothing to do with me. But I still felt somehow slighted. Just a little. Like a beauty pageant contestant who shows up at the swimsuit competition in a polka dot swimsuit with a big tacky bow and the other contestants are all wearing string bikinis.

I started to tell my daughter that (she likes a good analogy) when suddenly I remembered my ill-fated "mamas" column. I wrote it years ago as a tribute to all the women who encouraged me and helped me to grow up.

It was a good column. Most people liked it. Except my mother, who said, "You need more mamas. I'm not enough!"

I could never understand why my mother never understood what I meant. But last night with my daughter, I saw it.

It's simple, really. Mothers and daughters want the same thing: To be the number one woman in each other's hearts.

Beyond that, we want to be surrounded by the kind of women who build us up and cheer us on and make us better.

We want to look good and feel good, no matter what, in a tacky swimsuit or a string bikini.

I'm thankful for the "mamas" who've made a difference in my life and especially for those who still do so for my daughter.

But just so you know? I'm her only mama. And she will always be my number-one girl.

Rejection slip has rocker Nugent hot as a firecracker

Even in deepest East Texas, one city is wary of rocker-turned-campaigner Ted Nugent.

Nugent called Longview, Texas, Mayor Jay Dean "racist," "clueless" and "dishonest" Saturday, after the city paid \$16,000 to ditch the idea of Nugent headlining the city 4th of July Fireworks and Freedom Celebration.

Nugent, a maniacal 1970s guitarist in the news lately as a campaigner for Texas Republicans and for calling President Barack Obama a "subhuman mongrel," defended his show as family-friendly for "positive-energy Americans."

Nugent's New York agency had agreed on the date, but the city paid a cancellation fee because "we're a diverse community and we're trying to find a group or act that people throughout the community feel good about," Dean said by phone Friday.

"Not a lot of people know who Ted is," Dean said. "Younger people here don't know him."

Nugent, 65, a former Detroit rocker turned Texas rancher, campaigned last month for Texas Attorney General Greg Abbott, the Republican gubernatorial nominee, and is co-chairman of

Republican Sid Miller's campaign for state agriculture commissioner.

Longview spokesman Shawn Hara said city officials never formally secured the date but paid the \$16,000 to settle any implied contract. No headline act has been chosen, he said.

"I hear from reliable sources that the mayor is a racist and was offended that my band performs mostly African-American-influenced music," Nugent wrote, reprising a familiar defense of rock....

"Sounds like a sad case of anti-Texas in Texas," he wrote. "Everyone knows of Uncle Ted is the ultimate Independence Day rockout with the ultimate all-American, soul music, rockin' soundtrack of defiance, liberty and freedom. We shall carry on. We are the good guys. Clueless, dishon-

est people like the mayor are the bad guys."

County Democratic Chairman Jim Cogar said most residents didn't know that Nugent was being considered.

"I don't think Ted Nugent is appropriate for Longview, and I don't think Ted Nugent is appropriate for America," Cogar said.

Nugent is making appearances and raising money for Miller "every day" going into the May 27 Republican Party runoff, Miller's spokesman said.

Miller's opponent is Republican Tommy Merritt of Longview.

"I guarantee you, that's what this is about," Smith said.

Merritt's spokesman, Mark Sanders, laughed and said his candidate didn't know that Nugent was considered.

Through Sanders, Merritt sent a reply: "I stand by the city not having him. I'm just sorry it's going to cost them \$16,000 to do the right thing."

Call it the price of freedom.

UF launches healthy lifestyle program for Columbia County

No-cost program to offer eating and activity advice to growing children.

GAINESVILLE — This spring, researchers at the University of Florida will begin a study examining a healthy lifestyle program for young children and their parents in Columbia County.

The Healthy Kids Program is designed to help parents and children ages 3 to 7 who are at the higher end of the growth chart improve diet, increase physical activity and modify the home environment in order to promote healthy lifestyles. The no-cost program helps families work together to learn how to manage real-life problems and make gradual changes.

"Rates of childhood and adult obesity are higher in rural areas compared to urban areas," said David Janicke, Ph.D., the study leader and an associate professor of clinical and health psychology at the UF College of Public Health and Health Professions. "While many young children who are at the higher end of the growth curve do grow out of their extra weight, we are beginning to see more and more children who do not. Young children who continue to be at the higher end of the growth curve are at greater risk for long-term obesity, as well as associated health problems such as Type 2 diabetes."

The Healthy Kids team includes physicians, nurses, nutritionists, behavioral health psychologists and an exercise physiologist. The study is a joint effort between researchers at UF Health, UF/IFAS Extension and the UF/IFAS Columbia County Extension Service. The project is supported by a grant from the National Institute of Diabetes and Digestive and Kidney Diseases.

"We have received a number of requests from families and physicians regarding programs to help establish healthy eating and activity habits for young children," Janicke said. "Unfortunately, easily accessible options for this type of treatment are hard to find in rural settings. This study can benefit families in rural

areas by providing a local option to help establish healthier eating and activity patterns for children who may be at greater risk for becoming overweight or obese in the future."

Healthy Kids is a four-month program that aims to help children and parents work together to establish behaviors that can promote healthy weight and lifelong health. Parents will receive information to help them navigate consumer marketing practices that may challenge parents' efforts to make healthy choices for their families. They will learn strategies to help support and motivate their children to try new foods and to be more physically active. Children and parents also will sample healthy

foods during meetings and participate in games and other activities.

During the first two months of the program, participants will attend group meetings once a week and then will meet biweekly for the last two months. Families also will be followed for six months after the group meetings end to assess the long-term impact of the program. Half the families will begin the program soon after enrolling and the other half of participating families will start the program 10 months after registering.

The Healthy Kids Program is available to families who live in Columbia County with children between the ages of 3 and 7 who are at the higher end of the growth curve (above the 85th percentile for weight and height). All meetings will be held at the UF/IFAS Columbia County Extension Service Office, 971 W. Duval St., Suite 170, Lake City. Families will be given \$10 per session for travel costs.

Team members are currently screening interested participants. Families interested in signing up for the program or who have questions should call the Healthy Kids office toll-free at 1-866-673-9623. 4 tips that could save your life

Dear Pharmacist:
I take 4 different medications now. Lately, I've had stomach pain, insomnia, headaches and dizziness. I am sure it's related to my medicine. What should I do, stop everything? — L.E., Seattle, Washington

Answer: While I do believe in "drug holidays" I don't think you should ever undertake those without your physician's approval and supervision. If you stop certain medications suddenly that are supposed to be weaned off slowly, it could cause seizures or major withdrawal problems. If you're fed up and insist on stopping everything, you must do it properly, and with supervision by your doctors.

When beginning a medication, or new dietary supplement, it's ideal to keep a little notepad handy to track progress. Doing this allows you to pinpoint which medication triggers a side effect. I believe all side effects are caused by the drug nutrient depletion, something I call the drug mugger effect. Unfortunately the side effects are often misdiagnosed and labeled a "symptom" thus giving you some new disease.

By restoring nutrients stolen by your medicine, you can avoid these new "symptoms." That's important, because nutrient deficiencies look just like diseases. For example, a diagnosis of "restless legs syndrome" could be tied to your cholesterol medicine stealing vitamin D and CoQ10. Your depression diagnosis may just be related to your acid blocker, which suppresses your ability to make neurotransmitters by mugging your body of probiotics and methylcobalamin (a form of B12). I've been a pharmacist for

24 years, so here are some of my ninja secrets to help you minimize side effects and interactions:

1. Go to the same pharmacy each time. There is a computer record of your medication profile that automatically screens for interactions. If you chase coupons and stray, the new pharmacy will not have the rest of your medication profile and you're more apt to experience an interaction.

2. Take your medication at the same time each day. If you take your blood pressure pill at different times of the day, you will experience more highs and lows in your blood stream, and the swinging blood levels causes dizziness, nausea and faintness.


3. Consider the drug mugging effect. If you take 1 or 2 medications, and suddenly need more medications for brand new symptoms, it's probably related to drug number 1 or 2 ripping you off! You have to fix the nutrient depletions, not layer on more medications.

4. Ask both your doctor and pharmacist point blank, "Will this new medication interact with anything I'm taking." This is particularly important if you go to more than one physician.




