Move over this Fourth

'Move Over' law saves lives, says man who lost his brother-in-law to crash.

A Lake City man is making a plea for everyone to obey Florida's move-over

law because it can save lives. His brother-in-law was one of those who might have been saved. The Lake City native, a St. Augustine tow truck driver, was killed

Saturday in St. Johns County on the side of Interstate 95 while assisting an elderly

The holiday weekend means more people on the road and more accidents, so it's especially important for drivers to follow Florida's move-over law and get out of the lane nearest stopped emergency vehicles, including tow trucks.

Donald Baker of Lake City, whose brother-in-law and best friend, Kit Irwin Tappen, 41, was killed, said slowing down to switch lanes will only take 30 seconds at the most, and that can save a life.

Prayers for Hayley

Embry-Riddle student injured in ATV accident.

Brilliant, driven and feisty are all words loved ones use to describe Hayley Lewis.

The 19-year-old Columbia County High School graduate, now a student at Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University, suffered serious injuries in an ATV

accident in Hamilton County around 10:20 p.m. Saturday. Lewis was lifelighted to UF Health Gainesville and became responsive Monday.

Patrol spokesperson, Lewis was driving a 2002 Yamaha Big Bear four-wheeler on Eight Mile Still Road when she lost control. The ATV, owned by her friend and passenger Michael J. Durkin, 19, started rotating clockwise on the gravel roadway, causing it to overturn and eject both riders.

Neither Lewis nor Durkin were wearing helmets.

Durkin was not injured in the accident. However, Lewis suffered head injuries and was airlifted out, Hisler-Pace said.

Lewis was unresponsive until Monday, but according to family

Property values up slightly in county

Modest growth indicates rise in construction.

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Columbia County property values are up two percent indicating a small rise in new construction.

Doyle Crews, Columbia County property appraiser, said the two percent bump means the market is starting to stabilize, with an increase in sales and construction of new homes and commercial businesses.

"Taxable values are slightly up overall due to the consumer price index at 1.5 percent, which affects most homestead properties which is mandated by law," said Jeff Hampton, Columbia County Assistant Property Appraiser and tax roll coordinator.

Under the Save Our Homes Amendment, passed in 1992, an annual increase in assessment cannot not exceed either three percent of the assessed value of the

Orphan back in Fla. after Ohio adoption failed

ST. PETERSBURG

After 16 years of floundering in foster care, after taking the pulpit at a St. Petersburg church last September asking someone — anyone — to adopt him, after his story was shared around the world and 10,000 people offered to help or take him home, Davion Only moved to Ohio in March to live with the parents who had promised to care for him forever and love him no matter what. The couple, a minister and his wife, flew Davion up to visit over spring break. They introduced him to their three children and took him to church. Davion came back to Florida just long enough to pack a small suitcase. Then he returned to Ohio, where his prospective parents

signed him up to play football — something he had always wanted to do.

"I got baptized!" he wrote April 20, from his new phone, on his new Facebook page.

The adoption could take place in 90 days, said Terri Durdaller, whose agency, Eckerd, oversees Tampa Bay's foster children. That would have meant that Davion could be adopted this month.

Instead, he is back in Pinellas County, at a therapeutic foster home, upset and embarrassed, unwilling to talk.

"There was an incident in Ohio," said Eckerd's director, Lorita Shirley. At one point, she said, things got physical between Davion and another child in the house, and with the dad. The family want-

ed him out.

On May 30, Davion's case manager flew to Ohio and brought him back to Florida.

"This has been a major setback for him," Shirley said. "Our goal now is to get him treatment."

Davion Navar Henry Only was born while his mom was in jail. He started searching for her last June, after he finished his first year in high school. She had died just a few weeks before.

That's when he knew, his counselors said, that she wasn't coming to get him. That's when he decided to find a family himself.

Davion said he was tired of sharing a group home with 12 teen boys, all with

problems. Tired of locked refrigerators and cameras recording everything. He wanted someone to support him. To believe in him.

Last summer, he went to the gym and lost 40 pounds. Last fall, he buckled down at school, started getting A's. He tried to control his temper, be the kind of kid someone would want.

"I'll take anyone," Davion said last September. "Old or young, dad or mom, black, white, purple. I don't care."

"I know God hasn't given up on me," he told the packed congregation at St. Mark Missionary Baptist Church. "So I'm not giving up either."

Disneyland Paris getting Ratatouille attraction

PARIS — A new attraction inspired by the Disney movie "Ratatouille" is scheduled to open July 10 at Disneyland Paris.

It will be the first ride at any Disney park based on the 2007 animated movie about a rat named Remy who is a gifted French chef.

The dark ride offers what the park describes as a "comical, rat's eye view" of Remy's world, beginning on the rooftops of Paris, continuing in "rat-mobiles" through a restaurant's cold storage area, and into a dining room overseen by an intimidating chef.

In French, the attraction is called Ratatouille: L'Aventure Totalement Toquee (toe-kay) de Remy. In English, it's Ratatouille: The Totally Zany Adventures of Remy.

The area includes a restaurant, Bistrot Chez Remy, and a boutique that opens at the end of the year.



members and friends, she has been improving every day. She has been taken out of ICU and is breathing on her own, they said.

Pulling for her

Crews, who coached Lewis on the first ever CHS Robotics Team 3556, has set up a GoFundMe fundraising account for her which raised over \$1,600 in just one day. The funds will help the Lewis family with medical and other related expenses.

Another one of Lewis' teachers, Tabatha McMahan, said people are doing everything they can to help Lewis because they know she would do the same for them.

"So many people are pulling together for Hayley," McMahan said. "She is the type to pull her weight and then some in case someone else can't, and that is what people are doing for her."

Lewis has been attending Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University in Daytona Beach on both academic and cross country scholarships since she graduated from CHS in 2013. She became interested in ERAU after she was chosen as a Sunshine State Scholar during her junior year.

One high school student who excels in STEM, which stands for science, technology, engineering and math, is chosen from each county to attend a program in Orlando. Lewis was allowed to bring one teacher who she felt had inspired her, and Crews said she was happy to attend.

"We went to the program and met the mechanical engineering professor running the Embry booth," she said. "Through that she made some connections and eventually really latched onto that school."

Crews said that because Lewis is interested in aerospace engineering, which is what she used to do at NASA, they instantly clicked over their mutual love of the subject.

"But on top of that I was able to mentor her, which was just as rewarding," she said.

Lifts others up

Lewis became one of the founding members of the Robotics Club at CHS during her sophomore year and continued to be a key member throughout high school, Crews said. She led the team as captain her senior year.

"Even after graduating, she still comes back to visit," Crews said. "She visited us for homecoming and at competition in Orlando. She stays involved."

Crews said Lewis has even been working at her husband's local office, Crews Engineering Services, over summer break. She has always been driven, she said.

McMahan, who taught Lewis' yearbook class, agreed that she is someone who knew how to overcome challenges to feel a sense of accomplishment.

"Although robotics is her first love, I think she still enjoyed yearbook" she said. "It's funny because she doesn't really see herself as a writer, but she surprised herself."

McMahan said Lewis was very instrumental to the production of the

Columbian as an editor during her senior year. Even with her heavy load of AP classes and extra-curriculars, she always found time to do things well, McMahan said.

"She was always so willing to help, giving full participation and always bringing levity to the table," she said. "Her work was always above the standard because she always tried a little bit harder."

McMahan said she is not surprised that Lewis was out on a four-wheeler. She is always up for adventure, she said.

"She's not only fun, but she's committed. She just has a sort of passion," McMahan said. "She pulls people up with her because of that passion."

Annabelle Blevins, 18, has been friends with Lewis since sophomore year and said she has definitely been lifted up by her.

"She's brilliant," she said. "I mean she got me through Algebra 2. She's just really freakin' smart."

Blevins and Lewis served on the Student Government Association together at CHS. Blevins said that Lewis always knows the perfect thing to say in any situation, and for that she is one of the best friends she has ever had.

"I know that if I am put with her, any task can get accomplished," she said. "A lot of people don't take a lot of pride in their work, but she does."

Independent

Chandler Douglas, 19, said Lewis has been his best friend since they met in robotics.

"I can talk about Hayley all day, she has helped me through so many things over the years," he said. "She is the smartest, best girl I know. She's the best person in the world."

Douglas remembers a time while staying in a hotel for a robotics competition, Lewis lost her necklace.

"We had decided earlier that night that because it was under 40 degrees outside and our hotel had a pool, that we were all going to go swimming," he said. "Everyone who saw thought we were crazy."

He said that after they had jumped out and ran back to their rooms, Hayley realized she had lost her necklace, so he went back down and jumped the locked pool gate to find it.

"I hurt my leg and she got so mad at me because she said she couldn't do it herself," Douglas said. "I mean she's definitely more athletic than me and everything, but that wasn't it. It was the fact that if she can do something by herself, she is going to want to do that."

The road has just begun for Lewis and her family, who are asking for privacy as they process all that is in front of them. Support is appreciated in the form of donation or the sharing of the Hayley Lewis Recovery Fund, <http://www.gofundme.com/axsbp8>.

The family is also in the planning stages of a 5K benefit run, in honor of Hayley's love for running.

"This is very traumatic for the family," McMahan said. "But it is also difficult financially. We hope we can raise just a portion of the medical costs to help the Lewis family during this tough time."

"Just move over. That's all somebody's got to do," he said. "Just slow down and get out of the way. You just can't put enough emphasis on how if you slow down ... for a mile, that might put an extra five, 10 seconds on your day. And it could save somebody's life. It would actually save somebody's life. And I don't think people... understand there's just little things you can do, and I wouldn't be having to bury my best friend and my nephews' daddy and my sister's love. It's stupid. It's dumb how it easy it would have been to have prevented this."

Tappen was killed Saturday around 3 a.m. after a semi-truck's back wheels hit him when he was helping a couple who ran out of gas.

Tappen is only the most recent person to be killed because a driver didn't move over. In early May, south of Ocala on Interstate 75, an FHP trooper, a tow truck driver and another man were killed when a semi-truck ran into them on the side of the highway.

"I just want to make sure people are aware there's

innocent people dying because people aren't observing the law, and that law has to be observed," Baker said.

FHP Sergeant Tracy Hisler-Pace agrees: drivers have to move over.

"When you see people out working, you have got to slow down and move over if you can because they have families that love them, too," she said.

The move-over law first came into effect in 2002, she said, but as of July 1, Florida's move-over law doesn't just apply to emergency vehicles and tow trucks. The law was expanded to cover utility service vehicles and sanitary workers as well, Hisler-Pace said.

"That's very important because they (sanitary workers) are on the side of the road or in the road working, too," she said.

On June 27-29, highway patrols in six states including Florida focused on enforcing the move-over law. Troopers were instructed to give tickets to those who didn't follow the law.

Baker said through tears that he's happy FHP is working to better enforce the law, and that the law was strengthened. He said

it hopes it will save someone else's life.

"I'm sorry it took people dying, but that's all we want is for them to acknowledge it and try to improve on the law because if the law's working," he said as his voice cracked, "I wouldn't be burying my best friend."

If the driver who hit Tappen had just switched lanes none of this would've happened, he said.

"He left three beautiful kids behind," Baker said. "Because somebody just couldn't take a second to do what's right, now they've got to go the rest of their lives without their daddy."

To help the family through their financial struggles, a GoFundMe.com account has been set up under Kit Tappen's name.

Tappen worked hard to provide for his wife and three sons, Baker said.

"He was just a devoted man and a good father. Rain or shine, he was at work," Baker said. "I don't remember him going more than two weeks without a job. He was always on top of making sure his bills were paid, and his kids were comfortable."

When Tappen wasn't working, he was spending time with his children,

Baker said.

"They (Tappen's sons) loved St. Augustine because they were always going to the old jail and all the sightseeing stuff. He did that with his kids on the weekend," Baker said.

Sometimes, Tappen would even take one or two of his sons with him on towing jobs, he said.

"Like when he had to pick a car up in the parking lot and take it to South Florida to drop it off," Baker said.

Baker said it's hard to express how he feels. Tappen was his best friend. They played together as children and hung out as teens. Baker introduced Tappen to his sister, who became Tappen's wife.

"Everything I say comes out so angry because I am," he said. "I'm just mad. This is ridiculous."

Baker just wants people to know that a couple seconds will save a life.

"I just want to get it out there. I want people to understand how serious this is. It's not like you're asking them to stop and help," he said. "It's not like you're asking them to take any time out of their busy schedule. It only takes a couple seconds to slow down and move over."

property for the prior year, or the percentage change in the Consumer Price Index, whichever is lower.

The county taxable value is up about \$49,000,000, due to expiration of a tax abatement agreement for the Target Distribution Center and the 1.5 percent Save Our Homes increase.

The school taxable value is up about \$18,000,000, roughly .75 percent.

"The Target 5-year economic development exemption on Tangible Personal Property expired last year, which will increase the Columbia County Board of County Commissioner's value," Hampton said. "The increase in value is approximately \$43 million, which is approximately \$349,000 in taxes."

Crews said the funds represent new money that has been exempt through the tax abatement for the past five years, through an agreement by Target and Columbia County for the business to locate in Columbia County.

The 2014 total adjusted market value is \$4,132,402,978 — down from the 2013 total adjusted market value of \$4,144,213,591 — mostly

due to depreciation and a drop in land value.

Crews said the Columbia County Property Appraiser's office certified the preliminary tax roll to the Department of Revenue on Tuesday.

Once the preliminary tax roll is approved and the taxing authorities return their proposed millage rates, the appraisers office will send out the proposed tax notices in mid-August. Taxpayers can then review values, exemptions and question taxing authorities about how tax dollars are being spent.

ANOTHER VIEW

Obama right to look outside VA

Robert McDonald wasn't on anyone's radar as President Obama searched for someone to take command of the troubled U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs. He hasn't worked for the VA, hasn't managed a large government bureaucracy and has contributed over the years to Republican candidates, including Mitt Romney in 2012. He is a former Army captain. All of those are good reasons to think the president has chosen wisely. By tapping McDonald, Obama has looked outside the VA and beyond partisan politics for someone who brings a fresh perspective with a veteran's sensibility.

McDonald ran the world's largest household products maker, Procter & Gamble Co., for several years and served on the boards of other large corporations, such as Xerox and United States Steel. At Procter & Gamble he oversaw 120,000 employees working in 200 plants around the world. The company served more than 5 billion customers. Those are private-sector management challenges that rival the vast VA health care system and its 300,000 employees and nearly 9 million enrollees. Granted, selling soap and managing health care are far different enterprises. But McDonald represents the management change the VA desperately needs. Nominating another military insider would have signaled business as usual. And that's unacceptable.

A recent report by Obama's deputy chief of staff identified "significant and chronic system failures" at the VA and described a "corrosive" management culture marked by an "inability to effectively manage or communicate." The VA's former secretary, Eric Shinseki, resigned in May amid the growing scandal over excessive wait times for patients at VA hospitals and reports that administrators may have manipulated the scheduling records to qualify for bonuses. In congressional testimony last month, VA officials revealed that every one of the 470 top executives at the VA received good evaluations in recent years, with many getting bonuses averaging \$9,000.

Those are the same executives presiding over the outrageous conduct exposed in government reports and congressional hearings.

Veterans who can't be seen by a doctor in a timely manner should be allowed to see a private physician at the VA's expense.

McDonald distinguished himself at West Point and served in the 82nd Airborne Division before leaving the military for a business career. His work at Procter & Gamble involved managing brands before moving up the ranks and taking over as CEO, a job that ended when investors complained about the company's sluggish performance under his leadership. He'll likely be asked about the circumstances of his sudden retirement during confirmation hearings before Congress.

Although Obama was slow to respond to the VA mess, he looks to have assigned this critical repair job to a capable leader with the fresh perspective needed to fix the VA's management systems and burnish its badly damaged brand.

Political emails unrelenting

Perhaps, like mine, your inbox is being flooded with emails from Barack Obama, Joe Biden and Michelle Obama.

President Obama usually says "hey" or "Ann" or "So, Ann." Biden says "Here's the thing, Ann." And Mrs. Obama (Michelle) says "Hi" or "Hi, Ann."

Obama wants to thank me in person by telling me to enter a contest to travel to Austin, where, presumably, he will be waiting to meet me although we live just a couple of miles apart in Washington. I'm not sure why he wants to thank me. He doesn't say.

But this is the amazing part. He only wants me to contribute \$3 to be eligible for a free flight and hotel room in Texas and handshakes.

Michelle is more practical. She wants me to give \$10 to have a chance at this opportunity. Unlike regulated contests, however, my friends Barack, Michelle and Joe don't tell me what the chances are of winning.

Obviously, political columnists may not participate in such giveaways, let alone contribute to politicians. So if the goal of the emails is to make me give money to Democrats, that email deluge is having no effect.

It's the same thing from Republicans, although they want me to give more — much more. Hundreds of dollars. Thousands of dollars. Hundreds of millions of dollars. (I am on these email lists by mistake because somehow Republicans are not taking advantage of the personal information out there for free which might indicate that anything in that range is highly

implausible.)

Messages from the president, vice president and first lady warn that because Obama's name won't be on the ballot in November, many Democrats may not be motivated to vote or give money. In that case, they note with alarm, Republicans will have enormous amounts of money to fund their candidates and take over the Senate. Joe in particular is worried that the Koch brothers, those astoundingly rich guys (think \$1 billion) in Kansas who loathe Obama and everything he stands for, will control the outcome of the autumn election by giving conservative candidates millions of dollars. On the other hand, Bill and Hillary Clinton helped raise between \$2 billion and \$3 billion for politics and their causes in the past two decades, according to The Wall Street Journal. Republicans worry that if Hilary runs for president in 2016 she'll have a built-in money advantage. (The two Bush presidents raised \$2.9 billion, so presumably if Jeb runs, they'd help.)

The 2012 presidential election cost \$2 billion. It will cost much more in 2016.

This year the Supreme Court weighed in again on the perennial issue of campaign finance, a subject guaranteed to make eyes glaze over

but which is incredibly important. The rulings are changing our country, helping to make Washington gridlock permanent.

The Court has ruled that just about anything goes when it comes to raising money for candidates. Them what has can give. Special interest groups may raise millions and hide the names of the donors.

Seven times the high court headed by Justice John Roberts has ruled by five-to-four votes to weaken laws designed to prevent the rich from controlling democracy. The court this year had an unusual number of unanimous decisions but not on campaign finance.

The latest decision struck down the cap on contributions a donor may give to federal candidates, causing a lot of people to worry that this opens the door to more corruption. Politicians definitely respond to the money that elects them.

Oddly, fewer Americans are checking that little box on their tax returns that gives \$3 of the taxes they owe (not an additional \$3) to help fund the presidential election. If candidates take it, their fundraising is restricted. But candidates know they can rake in more dollars by refusing to take pro-rated money from the public fund.

So, fellow voters, expect more political emails in your inbox. How about \$3 giving you a chance to meet the president in his home state of Hawaii or \$5,000 to watch House Speaker John Boehner play golf in Cincinnati?

Needed: Online users' bill of rights

Creepy doesn't begin to describe Facebook's 2012 psychological experiment on 700,000 of its unwitting users. Any attempt to manipulate the emotional state of consumers is unconscionable. It reflects poorly on the entire tech community, confirming privacy activists' worst fears.

This public relations disaster, coming on the heels of the NSA spying revelations, reasserts the pressing need for Silicon Valley to produce an online users' bill of rights. The alternative is an inevitable downward spiral of confidence in tech companies and their products. Could government regulation be far behind?

Social media and software companies have been hiding behind user agreements to excuse blatant invasions of privacy. Facebook's data use agreement is nearly as long as the Book of Revelations and about as comprehensible. To sum it up: In the event of anything short of an apocalypse, Facebook is covered.

And if anyone out there claims to carefully read all the terms and con-

ditions for a web site before clicking "Accept" to join it — get out the salt shaker.

The basis for an online bill of rights must be full transparency. Social media users should not have to go through a 8,000 words of legalese to know what they're agreeing to.

It would help to have a shorthand summary of a user agreement in plain language. If something jumps out at users, they can read the whole thing. The Federal Trade Commission should look at requiring this, along the lines of the Food and Drug Administration labels that summarize the ingredients of food products.

The summary should include who will have access to a user's data and how it can be used. Are photographs shared? Are online purchases recorded? Are lists of acquaintances compiled? Are political or religious affiliations shared? Are online searches tracked? These are all yes or no answers. Details can be a click away.

At a minimum, users should have

access to an annual report of the material being collected and what individuals or businesses have purchased any personal information. They should be able to opt out of having their personal data sold for any purpose.

Companies such as Facebook and Google contribute enormously to Silicon Valley's economy, creating services used by hundreds of millions of people a day. They've made billions by mining the data they collect from those users and selling it to companies that profit further from it.

Good for them. But they owe their customers basic honesty. And they shouldn't play mind games with the people from whom they profit.

The European Union is ahead of the United States in protecting personal information.

Silicon Valley should take the initiative to offer Americans the same protections. If it doesn't, the industry's reputation will continue to unravel. And companies won't be able to blame NSA snoops for it.



The real issue is not about women's rights or even religious liberty, at its heart is the simple issue of what it means to be a free people served by a just government. Citizens are granted certain rights, but those rights are not necessarily to be secured at another citizen's expense.

Hobby Lobby will enjoy a "religious preference," but why should every other business be denied their basic freedom to negotiate in a free market the terms and conditions of their employees' service? When the government tells one group of citizens they must pay for

and provide a service to another group of citizens that is not freedom; it's socialism. This is not a denial of a woman's right to contraceptions, it is about whether the government is being just, or fair to each citizen, when it forces one group of citizens to pay for the rights of other citizens. Hooray for Hobby Lobby, but what about the rest of our citizens that are having their freedoms raped?

Moses wrote, "Justice, and only justice, you shall pursue, that you may live and possess the land," Deuteronomy 16:20. The sole purpose of govern-

ment is to protect its citizens from injustice. Government cannot accomplish justice when it grants a right to one citizen at the expense of another.

This was not about women's rights or religious freedom; it was about simple freedom and justice. But an attack on freedom anywhere is an attack on freedom everywhere, including religious freedom. I fear those who are shouting hallelujah today, may be howling tomorrow.

I'd also prayed that she would "have peace" about her current circumstances and "feel prepared" for her upcoming teaching job in Iowa.

While these were all legitimate prayers, they did seem to be prayers of "comfort" and not prayers of waging war against the powers of darkness.

But then darkness hit. She'd spent the past 18

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months distancing herself from God out of anger and not dealing with the hurt she'd experienced.

Just last month when she'd surrendered her anger and cried out for help, Satan thought it was time to step it up a little bit, too.

There's a terrifying comfort when Satan decides to assign demons to work in your life.

It's terrifying because Satan hates you and has nothing but the worst in mind for you. He hates us and he's a million times stronger than we are.

It's comforting because the demons are hot on your tail only because you're on fire for God. Satan doesn't like when we surrender ourselves to the Lord of the Lords.

So that's what happened with my friend. Darkness struck her life, just when she began looking

for the Light again.

Her mom called me in tears, scared for her daughter. And I boldly proclaimed the truth to her that no matter how frightening the times may seem, my friend is purchased by the blood of Christ and washed clean — Satan can't really touch her.

Sure, just like he did to Job, Satan can destroy her material, earthly world. But he can't touch her soul.

Jesus tells us in Matthew 21:8, "Do not fear those who kill the body but cannot kill the soul."



DEAR ABBY: Two years ago I was involved in an unhealthy relationship for me and my children. Despite what everyone said, I gave him the benefit of the doubt. He ended up assaulting me and my kids.

For two months I struggled with depression, and I admit I wasn't the responsible parent I should have been. Child Protective Services took the children. I hold myself accountable for my actions and my failure.

My parents are angry with me because of poor choices I made in the past and treat me like the black sheep of the family. Granted, my mother, brother and I all have issues stemming from the past, but I'm tired of playing the guilt card, tired of playing the victim and tired of not having my family back me up at a time when I need their support to regain custody of my kids.

I miss my family and what good times we did have. How do I even begin to put the pieces back together on a very broken family? — **THE BLACK SHEEP**

DEAR BLACK SHEEP: Fixing your broken family is something all of you must be willing to work on together, or it won't be successful. Because your mother and brother are unwilling, what you need to do is start fixing yourSELF.

Regaining custody will depend upon your ability to establish your independence, support your children and yourself financially, and start counseling to deal with your issues so you won't get into another destructive, abusive relationship. It will take work and time, but if you can do it — and I think you can — your mother and brother

will respect you for it. And you will be stronger and healthier because you will no longer be so needy.

DEAR ABBY: I have been dating "Gene" for three years, living together for a year and a half. We're both divorced and love each other very much.

Our biggest problem is, he doesn't keep a "normal" schedule. Gene eats at odd hours, exercises at the strangest times and will stay awake 'til the wee hours of the morning, then crash for a day or so. He seems unfazed by this wackiness. He's responsible, holds a good job and comes from a terrific family, but his habits are taking a toll on me.

There are days when I want him home for dinner, or I want to cuddle with him. I want a normal schedule. This is tricky because I have accepted his lifestyle and now the brakes have come on for me. Gene doesn't understand my sudden change of attitude, and frankly, neither do I.

Because he seems to thrive on the schedule he's living on, the adjustment may be very difficult for him.

DEAR ABBY: I have a friend whose son was involved in a shooting which ended in a death in her house. Should I send food, flowers and a nice note in the mail or stand back and not intrude? I sent a text asking if she was OK and if I could do anything for her family, but I don't know what else to do. We are more than acquaintances but less than great friends. — **UNSURE IN PENNSYLVANIA**

DEAR UNSURE: If the funeral has been held, your friend does not need flowers. At a time like this, she could use some moral support. Call her and tell her you would like to bring some food over and ask what she may need. Then bring it to her, and be ready to listen if she wants to talk. Your presence and your caring will be meaningful, because when a tragedy like this happens, people don't know what to say, which isolates the person who is grieving.
