9-year-old Live Oak boy has been missing since early Wednesday.

LIVE OAK — Little Leo Walker has been missing

for more than 48 hours and law enforcement and civilians from the area continue to leave no stone unturned in their efforts

to find the special needs child who went missing Wednesday morning.

"The search continues," said Samantha Andrews, FDLE public information officer at the search

Killer may face death in 2nd trial

Arraigned in another murder after sentencing.

Keiyon'tre Kenshawn Merritt was sentenced to two consecutive life sentences for the murder and attempted armed robbery of Christopher Terrell McConell, but his attorney said that may be the least

of his worries right now.

Merritt, 21, was sentenced Thursday afternoon in circuit court by Third Circuit Judge Leandra Johnson.

On the heels of Merritt's sentencing hearing, he was arraigned on first-degree capital murder charges in the March 9, 2013, shooting death of Misty Dawn Harper.

Baya Harrison, Merritt's court-appointed attorney, said they were disappointed in the jury's verdict.

"...But it is what it is. We're going to appeal," he said, following the sentencing Thursday afternoon.

Robin Williams' wife: He had Parkinson's disease

LOS ANGELES — Robin Williams was in the early stages of Parkinson's disease and was sober at the time of his suicide, his wife said Thursday.

In a statement, Susan Schneider said that Williams, 63, was struggling with depression, anxiety and the Parkinson's diagnosis when he was found dead Monday in his Northern California home.

Schneider did not offer details on when the actor comedian had been diagnosed or his symptoms.

Williams' death shocked fans and friends alike, despite his candor about decades of struggle with substance abuse and mental health. With Parkinson's, Williams faced shouldering yet another challenge.

Parkinson's disease is an incurable nervous system disorder that involves a loss of brain cells controlling movement. Tremors, sometimes starting out in just one hand, are among the early symptoms.

It can also cause rigid, halting walking, slowed speech and sometimes dementia. Symptoms worsen over time and can often be treated with drugs.

Actor Michael J. Fox, who has long had the disease, is known for his efforts to fund research into it. Pop star Linda Ronstadt revealed in 2013 that she had Parkinson's and said the disease had robbed her of her ability to sing. Boxer Muhammad Ali, the late radio personality Casey Kasem and the late Pope John Paul II are among other well-known figures diagnosed with the disease.

Murder suspect testifies that he last saw Christian Aguilar alive

GAINESVILLE Taking the stand in his own murder trial on Thursday, Pedro Bravo said University of Florida student Christian Aguilar was still alive the last time he saw him.

Bravo took the stand shortly after the prosecution rested its murder case against him. He faces murder, kidnapping and other charges related to the slaying of Aguilar, 20, in September 2012. At many times smiling and looking at jurors while he described his own disturbing suicidal thoughts, the 20-year-old from Miami said he was "breaking apart piece by piece" when he and Aguilar got together to talk about Bravo's depression.

"I have scars both on my neck and wrists from near attempts in moments where I was pushed to the edge," he told jurors about his lifetime of suicidal thoughts.

Prosecutors have painted a picture of Bravo as a jealous ex-boyfriend who followed his ex, Erika Friman, to Gainesville to win her back, only to find she was dating Aguilar.

Bravo said he came to Gainesville seeking a fresh start.

"I wanted to go to Gainesville ... maybe a fresh start would help me erase everything in my slate," he said. "And at the

same time I wanted to see if I could get back together with Erika."

After learning that Friman and Aguilar, both of whom he had attended high school with in Miami, were dating, Bravo requested a meeting with Aguilar to talk it out.

Aguilar's remains were discovered weeks after the men's talk, buried in a shallow grave in a wooded area.

"I'm suicidal," Bravo said about why he wanted to talk to his friend, Aguilar. "It's not because of Erika but all these other things that are adding up."

Bravo and Aguilar went to a fast food restaurant and an electronics store before stopping for about two hours in a Wal-Mart parking lot.

Prosecutors say that's where Bravo used a strap to strangle Aguilar — Bravo said he and his friend got into a heated exchange.

Bravo said they left the Wal-Mart lot, but got into a physical fight while he was driving and he pulled over.

"He comes up and went for my head. I got mad and I pushed him ... I swept him off his feet," Bravo said. He said he fell on top of Aguilar and hit him in the face repeatedly.

"He didn't get up right away, but he was still moving."

Bravo said he left

Aguilar there on the ground, and never saw him again.

Later that night, he said he drank a bottle of Gatorade mixed with sleeping pills and pesticide in an effort to kill himself.

That Gatorade bottle with drug residue was found in his car, and prosecutors have suggested he used it to drug Aguilar before strangling him.

Bravo said the concoction made him vomit.

"I took it as a sign from God that maybe it's not supposed to happen this way," he said.

Bravo is scheduled to resume his testimony Thursday afternoon.

State to speed up several major road projects

TALLAHASSEE — Florida is speeding up six major road projects across the state.

State transportation officials were able to speed up the projects because how much money state legislators set aside for roads in this year's budget.


One of the biggest projects is a \$255 million

project to widen Interstate 95 in Volusia County on the state's east coast. The project will be moved up to 2015. It had been scheduled to begin in 2020.





District gets wastewater plant update

LIVE OAK — State Rep. Elizabeth Porter, R-Lake City, was among more than 90 concerned area residents and public officials to attend a Suwannee River Water Management District meeting Tuesday to find out what's being done to resolve repeated spills from the Valdosta wastewater treatment during floods.

The spilled sewage affects the Withlacoochee and Suwannee rivers.

The water district invited the Florida Department of Environment Protection, the Florida Department of Health and the Georgia Department of Environmental Protection to discuss why the problem exists, how the health concerns are addressed and what is being done to take care of the problem.

Herschel T. Vinyard Jr., Secretary of FDEP, provided an overview of Florida's role in the wastewater spills and gave a brief history of the sewage spills of the wastewater treatment plant in Valdosta into the Withlacoochee River. He spoke about the gravity of the spills and the significance to Florida's communities. Secretary Vinyard introduced and recognized Judson H. Turner, Director of the GDEP for his responsiveness and sensitivity to the issue and its impact to Florida.

"We are neighbors and we take this seriously" said Director Turner as he appeared before the Governing Board. He stated that a new wastewater treatment plant has been approved for the City of Valdosta and is scheduled to be completed by December 31, 2015. The first phase of the project has begun and it addresses the pump station issues as well as rerouting water mains.

Porter said after the meeting she was hopeful things would improve soon.

"We should see some improvements even before the project is completed," she said, noting that parts of the wastewater operation could be moved into the new facility even before it's completed.

Report: Fake \$20, drugs found

A Lake City man was arrested for circulating counterfeit money Wednesday afternoon, Columbia County Sheriff's Office reports.

Robert Terry Browne, 29, of 1423 SE Lanvale St., was arrested at 4 p.m. Wednesday.

CCSO found a counterfeit \$20 bill after searching Browne's car for marijuana in the parking lot of the Sunoco Gas Station at the corner of North U.S. Highway 441 and Interstate 10, arrest reports say.

Octavious Larnard Dix, 40, of 267 NE Christie St., was also arrested in connection with the case.

CCSO reported to the Sunoco at the corner of North U.S. Highway 441 and Interstate 10 after receiving an anonymous call about a suspicious vehicle.

When CCSO Deputy Charles Vaughan reached the parking lot, he found a car matching the

caller's description with smoke coming from it.

When Vaughan pulled up next to the white vehicle, Browne exited from the passenger door and put out what he was smoking. Upon approaching the man, Vaughan saw that he had a broken joint in his hand, according to the reports.

Browne said he was the manager of the Sunoco and was just about to get off work, and that he was just smoking a joint to relax, reports say.

Dix reportedly walked up to Vaughan and asked him why he was near his car.

Vaughan then detained both Browne and Dix, according to the reports.

When Vaughan searched Browne's vehicle, he found two bags filled marijuana, marijuana residue and drug paraphernalia, the reports say.

A woman who had left the car earlier then returned and said that she was Browne's wife and wanted to drive away in the vehicle next to the one Browne had been in. She said she had to go to the bank to deposit the store's money but said she didn't work for the store, reports say.

Vaughan realized that a drug deal had just taken place, and while searching the car she wanted to drive away in, he reportedly found a bank bag with money.

There was a receipt in the bag for all of the money but \$1,200. The woman said she got the \$1,200 out of the store safe, which she said the owner allowed her to do, to bail her husband out of jail in case he went to jail, reports say.

CCSO determined that

together both bags of marijuana found in the car weighed 474 grams. According to the arrest reports, as CCSO counted the money from the money bag, Deputy Vaughan found a fake \$20 bill.

Both men were taken to Columbia County Detention Facility.

Browne was charged with passing counterfeited money, possession of marijuana with the intent to sell, manufacture or deliver it, possession of marijuana of more than 20 grams, possession of marijuana of less than 20 grams and possession or use of drug equipment. He has since been released on a \$20,000 bond.

Dix was charged with possession of marijuana with the intent to sell, manufacture or deliver it, possession of marijuana of more than 20 grams and possession or use of drug equipment, the reports say. Dix remains in jail as of press time on a \$16,000 bond.

command center. "We continue to follow leads. Our law enforcement partners are working tirelessly, but at this time the search continues."

Walker, 9, was last seen around 2 a.m. Wednesday morning in his Live Oak home on East Duval Street. He was wearing light blue shorts with darker pinstripes. He may have been wearing a light blue shirt. Walker has blond hair and blue eyes, is 4 feet 7 inches tall and weighs about 87 pounds. He is autistic and non-communicative.

Late Thursday afternoon authorities began draining a lake in Live Oak near Lee and Duval Streets.

"It's just a precautionary thing at this point," Andrews said. "There is no indication

Leo is in the lake."

Authorities believe Walker may have climbed out of a window at his home and left the residence.

"He went missing from his family's home," Andrews said. "His mother noticed him missing around 4 a.m. (Wednesday) and called 9-1-1 and the Live Oak Police Department responded immediately."

Andrews said more than a dozen different law enforcement agencies are participating in the search and as well as civilian volunteers who joined the search Thursday. Search teams were expected to scour the area until 8 p.m. Thursday in hopes of finding Walker.

Any civilian volunteers who would like to help in the effort to find Walker are asked to report to the Suwannee County Coliseum at 8 a.m. today.

The search area may be expanded with additional man-

power.

"The search area has been mainly focused around the residence — about a five mile radius around where Leo disappeared," she said. "As we con-

tinued to follow leads the search could take us throughout the entire city of Live Oak as well as surrounding Suwannee County."

Andrews said Walker has autism and a limited vocabulary and advised anyone who may contact him or remember they may have seen him to immediately call 9-1-1.

"We are going to continue the search until this case is resolved; until all the questions have been answered and we've found Leo," she said, noting authorities have a plan to continue the search throughout the weekend.

"What really concerns me even more is that (Merritt) is also indicted for another homicide and since he's been convicted of a capital felony now in this case, he is subject to the death penalty regarding this pending case. My primary focus over the next couple of months is preparing a defense for him regarding this pending capital death case related to the other homicide."

During court, Harrison requested the state announce within five days whether it would be seeking the death penalty against Merritt in the Harper case. Johnson and assistant state attorney John Durrett agreed the state would provide an answer within five days.

Merritt was convicted of felony murder, two counts of attempted armed robbery and one count of attempted felony murder Wednesday by a Columbia County jury that took less than three hours to reach the verdicts.

Sentencing was deferred to Thursday so that McConell's family could address the court and Merritt.

Both of McConell's parents, Jeanette and Willie McConell, addressed the court.

They walked up to the podium together and each gave brief and concise statements. Jeanette McConell spoke first.

"I just want justice done," she said. "That's all I want to say: I just want justice

done."

Willie McConell was equally brief in his address to the court and Merritt.

"I think if you're man enough to take a life, you're man enough to give up one," he said.

Pheobe Glover, Merritt's mother, sat in the back row of the gallery and was the only person who volunteered to speak on Merritt's behalf.

She first addressed the McConell family by offering her sympathy and condolences and then she addressed the court.

"Regardless of what's going on, you're still my child and I love you," she said, wiping away tears. "I'm going to be there for you. I raised a good child and I don't know what happened. I guess it was a choice of friends. I'm sorry..."

Johnson sentenced Merritt to life for the felony murder of McConell and 20 years for attempted robbery of McConell. The 20-year sentence will run concurrently with the life sentence.

Merritt was also sentenced to another life sentence for the attempted felony murder of Elijah Dunning, who was shot while sitting in the same vehicle. Merritt also received a minimum mandatory 20-year sentence on the attempted armed robbery charge against Dunning.

Following court, Glover personally addressed the McConell family once again offering words of condolence.

She and Jeanette McConell then hugged one another.

LCPD: Local man arrested for sexually assaulting 17-year-old

A Lake City man was arrested Tuesday for sexually assaulting a 17-year-old girl, according to a Lake City Police Department arrest report.

Michael Dwayne Byrd, 39, of 800 SE Church St., was booked into Columbia County Jail at 11:29 a.m. Tuesday for sexual assault to a victim more than 12 years old by coercing the victim by threat, force or violence likely to cause

injury and child neglect without great harm, the report says. He remained in jail as of press time on a \$60,000 bond.

On Tuesday, LCPD went to the Lake City Medical Center in response to a call about a drugged teen. According to the report, the girl told LCPD that she came to the hospital because she didn't feel well. At about 6 a.m. that day, Byrd came to her house, picked her up and drove her back to his home.

The victim said she and Byrd smoked marijuana together and that she snorted what she believed was cocaine, the report said. Byrd then brought her into a bedroom and

told her to take her clothes off, according to the report. The girl told LCPD Byrd then forced himself on her, even though she had told him "no."

The victim reportedly told police he made her walk home after he had sex with her. She said she took more drugs given to

her by Byrd until she felt sick and went to the hospital.

According to the report, when LCPD asked Byrd about the girl's allegations, he said he knew her but denied her version of events. Later, he reportedly said he had sold her drugs in the past.

Our endorsements for the Aug. 26 Columbia County primary election are the product of deliberations by the Lake City Reporter Editorial Board, which consists of Publisher Todd Wilson, Editor Robert Bridges and Controller Sue Brannon.

Joel Foreman County Attorney

Joel Foreman is our recommendation for County Attorney.

Foreman gets the nod because of his legal experience in governmental affairs as the county's conflict attorney. Whenever



the current county attorney steps aside because of a conflict of interest, Foreman serves the county as his designated replacement. In these instances, he functions as the county attorney. This experience has prepared him well for taking on the elected post.

Both candidates in this race are highly skilled, capable attorneys in their respective legal disciplines. But Foreman has distinguished himself as the candidate best positioned for local government service. He has served as town attorney of Glen St. Mary, as a code enforcement special magistrate, and as attorney for the economic development board in Columbia County. He also has served as forfeiture counsel to the Columbia County Sheriff's Office.

Foreman is the right candidate, in our view, to fill the shoes of the long-serving current county attorney, who chose not to seek re-election.

Marc Kazmierski County Commission District 2

It's time for a change in District 2. We think Kazmierski, the challenger in a two-candidate race, will bring a new perspective to county government, especially concerning

meeting procedures. He is rightly concerned to see commissioners spending huge sums of money — with no public discussion — on the consent agenda. Sometimes this money was already approved at a previous public meeting and what you're seeing is a simple procedural step. Sometimes it's not that simple. Kazmierski points out that matters of real substance are often buried in the consent agenda and approved with no debate whatsoever.

Kazmierski is a fiscal conservative who will look hard at any expenditure of taxpayer funds, and won't be afraid to say 'no' if it's questionable.

With at least two big-ticket items potentially on the horizon — an \$18 million proposed emergency radio system and a \$35 million jail — we need someone on the board to give careful thought to major expenditures that deserve more scrutiny.

Toby Witt County Commission District 4

Toby Witt is our recommendation for County Commission District 4.

Witt is a no-nonsense, stand-up candidate who knows the issues as well as most current commissioners.

But it is clear he is not the establishment's choice

for this seat. He is not afraid to ask questions and speak his mind.

Witt will think long and hard about spending taxpayers' money on huge projects that could put us in debt for decades.

Big expenditures could soon be in the works for the county to consider, including a proposed \$18 million emergency radio system and a \$35 million jail. Witt has serious ques-

tions about both. He also calls upon his experience running an emergency management firm

with statewide reach to offer common-sense alternatives.

Witt isn't opposed to spending money when it's necessary, but we feel confident he won't blindly buy into massive undertakings that might be accomplished another way or that we could simply do without until the county is better able to afford it.


Witt is articulate and capable of holding his own with anyone when it comes to matters of public policy. We believe he will follow what he sees as the right path.

Johnson, a three-term incumbent, is smart, polished and knows school board policy inside and out. Yet despite his long record of



service he is just as enthusiastic today about serving his constituents as when he first took office.

Johnson's experience and expertise will be

essential in helping the school district make the transition to the new Florida Standards in the post-FCAT age and all that entails.

The shining moment of Johnson's current term came during a school board meeting last fall when he led the way in negotiating the district's annual dual enrollment agreement with Florida Gateway College. Johnson researched his position carefully and argued with elegant force to help craft a compromise that suited the district well.

He was also instrumental in helping revise district policy on dual enrollment this year to ensure that highly motivated students can still obtain an associate's degree by the time they graduate high school, provided they put in the considerable effort required.

Johnson is a civics teacher who knows well the inner workings of local government, as well as the intricacies of local and state educational policy.


He has served the students, parents and teachers of this district well.


The incumbent in this race is completing his fourth term. To date, he has proven effective at little more than winning elections.



A Biblical perspective on the tragedy of suicide

The recent death of Robin Williams has brought the subject of suicide to center stage. Depressed and feeling alone, Williams apparently hanged himself.

Few of us are untouched by such tragedy. I have had family and friends who have ended their own lives, and there are those we hear about or read about. What was once a rare event seems to be happening more, and it makes one wonder. The subject itself stirs the emotions, especially when it affects someone we are close to, making it difficult to think about it clearly.

People take their own lives for different reasons. Some suffer from chronic, debilitating pain from injury or disease from which there is no remedy and they seek relief. Others feel they have failed those they love, or think they cannot face a sudden reversal of fortune. Some experience deep depression from failed relationships, chemical imbalances, and some depression is rooted in spiritual conflict.

There are some who say anyone who takes his or her own life is damned, but I am reticent to agree. Typically, suicide is a permanent solution to a temporary problem, but I can see where someone in the grip of profound pain, be it physical, emotional, or

spiritual, may be deceived and driven into thinking death is the only option.

The Scriptures record only a handful of instances of those who die by their own hand, and the subject is not addressed directly anywhere in the Bible. But that does not mean we are left completely in the dark.

While suicide is not an act of faith, and is a product of sin, it is not necessarily damnable, because we have a merciful and understanding God. Hell is not the default destination, but neither can we say heaven is assured to the one who takes his own life. So where does that leave us?

After God reveals to Abraham He is about to investigate the out-

cry from Sodom and Gomorrah, Abraham, possibly aware his nephew Lot and his family reside in Sodom, asks God, "Will You indeed sweep away the righteous with the wicked?" Abraham, employing a rhetorical question, assures God he knows He will do what is right. "Shall not the Judge of all the earth deal justly?"

The Judge of all the earth is the God who

knows the hearts of all men. Those who take their own lives have crossed into eternity, and there is nothing we can say or do to help or hurt them. Their fate

will not be determined by what you or I think, or believe, or do. They are now in the hands of the Holy One who fully understands all the factors involved in each decision and will do what is right for each.

I am comforted and confident in knowing He is the final Judge who will always do what is just.

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Helping your family handle back-to-school anxieties

Ready or not, the back-to-school bells are beginning to ring. The slower pace of summer comes to a close, and as parents, we face the task of preparing our children for the challenges of the upcoming year: buying new supplies, getting bedtimes back into practice and meeting the new teacher.

Thinking back to our own school days may remind us of something important that we too often overlook as parents: our kids may begin school with some real anxiety about what the year will hold. As adults, it can be easy to get caught up in "adult" problems such as work, paying bills, etc. and tend to brush off any fears our kids may have as unimportant or even silly.

To your children, these issues are as real as any

you may be facing. If your children seem less than thrilled about going back to school, ask some questions. Are you looking forward to seeing your friends? Are you nervous about how hard the work will be? What do you think about your new teacher? What do you hope will (or will not) happen this year?

Listen to how your children answer these and other questions, and

respond with encouragement.

Proverbs 12:25 gives great insight: "An anxious heart weighs a man down, but a kind word cheers him up." Helping your child bring their fears out into the open will not only make them less fearful, it will also help them understand how to deal with their feelings in a positive way.

Commit to "checking in" with your children on a regular basis, asking questions to draw out their feelings.

One great daily practice is intentional goodbyes and hellos. It works like this: every morning before your child heads off to school, encourage them about the day, no matter how stressful the morning has been or how hard it was to wake them up, make sure that you part ways on a positive note:

"I love you, have a great day!" or "I know you will do great on your test!"

It works the same way when you reunite at the end of the day; make sure to take a few moments to ask about the day, especially if their heart looks "weighed down."

Don't get discouraged if they don't open right up and talk. Give it time and practice. Keep asking and keep encouraging.

Our children have their own giants to face, and we want to make sure they know we are in their corner, because every heart matters.

Standing up as a vast army for God

Do you know well the story of the valley of dry bones from Ezekiel 37? I didn't until I recently listened to a sermon on it. But — wow — was I in awe of our God's prophetic nature and how he used Old Testament happenings to show us what life should be like today.

Let me explain. In Ezekiel 37, God leads the protagonist (Ezekiel) by the hand into a valley of dry bones — human bones. God asks the question, "Can these bones live?"

A resounding "YES" was heard from the audience in the recorded sermon. I could imagine the pastor smirking as he read the next verse.

The answer Ezekiel gives is not "yes" but, knowing God is all-powerful and most likely has a lesson up his sovereign sleeve, he instead answers, "Lord, you alone know."

In response to his answer, God tells Ezekiel to prophesy to the bones, saying, "Dry bones, hear the word of the Lord! This is what the Sovereign Lord says to these bones: I will make breath enter you, and you will come to life. I will attach tendons to you and make flesh come upon you and cover you with skin; I will put breath in you, and you will come to life. Then you will know that I am the Lord."

Even before he was done speaking, Ezekiel began to hear a clacking noise and a rattling sound. Bones began shaking on the dry valley ground, moving towards one another and joining up with other bones.

Imagine that sight. What once was just thousands of dry human bones were now connecting to form skeletons — the ankle bone connected to the leg bone, the leg bone connected to the knee bone. You know how it goes.

Not only that, but as the skeletons began to form, then tendons began to connect the bones to each other, and flesh appeared. Skin now covered the skeletons. A valley of death had formed into what looked like a valley of life.

The only catch? Ezekiel tells us in verse 8: "But there was no breath in them."

And here's where my eyes opened to the way God uses His scriptures.

Things in our life — friendships, our work, our marriage, our spiritual lives — can look like they are fully alive, but in all actuality be fully dead.

Without the breath — without the Spirit — we're dead men walking.

So what happened next? The Lord gave them breath. Verse 9 says, "Prophesy to the breath; prophesy, son of man, and say to it, This is what the Sovereign Lord says: Come, breath, from the four winds and breathe into these slain, that they may live."

When the Spirit of Life came on these dead piles of bone, death was turned into life. Destruction became resurrection. And decay became a vast army.

Read in verse 10: "So I prophesied as he commanded me, and breath entered them; they came to life and stood up on their feet — a vast army."

When we receive the Spirit of Life, the Spirit that gives us breath and awakens us from death to live, we stand up on our feet, just like the once-dry bones did.

And when we stand up on our feet, we don't stand for ourselves.

Dry bones became a vast army for the Lord.

What is dead in our lives — once given life from the Spirit — can, too, become a vast army for the Lord.

Marriages can be strengthened, friendships can be mended, our souls can be refreshed as we stand together and prepare to battle for the Lord.

lot of walking."

The roughly 15 students Couey and O'Hearn showed around are only a few of CHS's incoming freshmen. The other members of student government showed around the rest of the students at orientation.

This year's freshmen class has 541 students, roughly 50 more than typical CHS freshmen classes, Jonathan Jordan, the assistant principal of guidance, said. Most of the school's previous freshmen classes have had 475-500 students, he said.

Tosha Feagle, who's son Braxton is one of the incoming freshmen, said she remembers always hearing that his grade was a big class, starting around the time he was in third grade.

"I always remember hearing about 'the third grade bunch,'" she said.

But she doesn't know the reason for the larger class.

Braxton Feagle said he isn't nervous about the size of the school.

"I'm nervous for him," Tosha Feagle said.

Even though she attended CHS herself, she said the sheer size of the school now makes her anxious.

Nick Jerome, a 15-year-old incoming CHS freshman, also said the size of the school makes him nervous.

"It's so big," he said. "I can't even imagine going to college."

Savannah Johnson, 14, said her biggest fear is getting lost, but her tour guides, O'Hearn and Couey, assured her and her new classmates they'll quickly learn the layout of the school.

While Johnson's a bit nervous for the first day, overall, she's excited about starting high school.

"The people are more

mature," she said.

The overall number of students attending CHS this year is much larger than normal as well, Jordan said. Last August, CHS had 1,775 students when the school year started. This year, current enrollment is at 1,964 and is still going up as students continue to transfer in. By the beginning of September, CHS could have as many as 2,000 students, he said. The higher enrollment is due to a large number of transfer students this year. The school has had an influx of students from Hamilton County after high schools there received poor school

grades, he said.

On Thursday at 10 a.m., freshmen and their parents filled the auditorium, with more than 500 people in attendance, to listen to Principal Todd Widergren and the school's assistant principals speak. From 6-7:30 p.m. Thursday was the upperclassmen parent and student orientation.

At the freshman orientation, Widergren told the students that their pasts don't matter. When they walk in the door early Monday morning, they'll have a chance to start over. Teachers won't know if they've gotten in trouble or struggled in classes before. "This is a brand new day for you," he said. "The sky is the limit."

But what goes along with the new freedoms of high school is a lot of responsibility and choice, Widergren told the students and their parents. "Everything you do from day one counts," he said.

The grades students get in high school will affect whether they can go to college, which colleges they'll get into and what jobs they'll get after graduation, Widergren said.

He also encouraged students to be thoughtful about the friends they make because who you hang out with will influ-

ence you, he said.

He also talked about the school's relatively new cell phone policy, which started last August. Students are allowed to use their phones and listen to music with one earbud in during lunch and in between classes. Cell phone use during class is determined by individual teachers. While students won't ever be allowed to ever use their phones for texting, social media or games during class, they may be allowed to use them for educational purposes, he said.

Chester Nordmeyer, CHS's 2-D art teacher, said he'll let students use their phones to look up pictures for art projects. If everybody is looking through magazines for images and a student is looking for something that's not in a magazine, that student can use his or her phone to find it, he said.

Widergren said he, along with the teachers and other administrators, came up with this policy last year to allow students to have more freedom, and it worked well.

"Instead of keeping students from their cell phones, we're finding ways to allow students to use them in beneficial ways,"

By charter the County Attorney cannot make policy decisions, but he can be a voice for the voters as he advises the county commissioners and staff.

I have served local government units for nearly my entire legal career. I have been a town attorney, a special magistrate for code enforcement, a code enforcement board attorney, an economic development board attorney, and have served as counsel to our cur-

rent sheriff. I understand the interplay of government, the people who run that government, and the voters that must be served well by their government. Most importantly, I have served for the last three years as conflict counsel to our current elected county attorney right here in Columbia County. That means whenever the county attorney could not handle something due to conflict, the county assigned that work to me. So while I have not been elected to the position, I am the only candidate seeking the position who actually has served in the capacity of the Columbia County attorney.

In what way are you better qualified than your opponent to serve as county attorney?







We need to improve our retention of high quality teachers. If we provide reasons for good teachers to stay in our schools and community, they will remain and help our system improve and provide peer modeling for other teachers. Those quality teachers will stay if we provide monetary rewards that recognize exemplary performance with financial incentives at the individual, grade

or school level; non-monetary forms of recognition that can be formal or informal recognition of achievements will increase job satisfaction and retention of all teachers; teacher leadership development programs that allow exemplary teachers to remain in the classroom but with additional responsibilities, recognition and compensation; provide assistance in monitoring their work load and identifying areas that could conserve their time to help prevent those teachers from leaving due to work and home life imbalances; and provide career growth opportunities.

If elected, what will you do to help improve the performance of underachieving schools and students in the district?

Regardless of the contributing factors causing low performance,

sometimes we completely overlook the role that quality instruction plays in determining the amount of learning that takes place for all students in our classrooms. There is growing and convincing research that emphasizes the important role that factors such as time on task, opportunities to practice skills, providing quality feedback, and administering meaningful assessments of student work have on student outcomes. As a teacher and coach, I know there is no substitute for intensive, relentless instruction and practice. We may need more targeted interventions to help improve the performance of a specific set of students who are being left behind but we also need to relentlessly push to improve teacher content knowledge and upgrade the technology in the schools to improve classroom learning and the interaction be-

tween teachers and students.



The Florida Reading Initiative (FRI) and Read 180 have not been enough to compensate for the lack of reading that many children are not doing to improve their reading skills.

Accountability by the State is only measured by tests that many

of our students have not been adequately prepared to pass. Many of the tests are beyond the reading level of many of our children.

Common Core, Florida Standards or whatever you want to call it is being pushed down our children throats with our children having no way to digest them. It's similar to giving a baby adult food. It's simply not the right thing to do.







Under Florida Statute 101.031, each registered voter in this state has the right to:

- Vote and have his or her vote accurately counted.
- Cast a vote if he or she is in line at the official closing of the polls in that county.
- Ask for and receive assistance in voting.
- Receive up to two replacement ballots if he or she makes a mistake prior to the ballot being cast.
- An explanation if his or her registration or identity is in question.
- If his or her registration or identity is in question, cast a provisional ballot.
- Written instructions to use when voting, and, upon request, oral instructions in voting from elections officers.
- Vote free from coercion or intimidation by elections officers or any other person.
- Vote on a voting system that is in working condition and that will allow votes to be accurately cast.

Each registered voter in this state should:

- Familiarize himself or herself with the candidates and issues.
- Maintain with the office of the supervisor of elections a current address.
- Know the location of his or her polling place and its hours of operation.
- Bring proper identification to the polling station.
- Familiarize himself or herself with the operation of the voting equipment in his or her precinct.
- Treat precinct workers with courtesy.
- Respect the privacy of other voters.
- Report any problems or violation of election laws to the Supervisor of Elections.
- Ask questions, if needed.
- Make sure that his or her completed ballot is correct before leaving the polling station.

Feds to monitor state election law changes

TALLAHASSEE—Gov. Rick Scott's office and campaign are attacking as "blatantly political" a letter from U.S. Attorney General Eric Holder announcing that the Justice Department is monitoring changes to Florida's election laws.

Holder wrote to Scott last month expressing concerns about elections laws and procedures that "have restricted voter participation and limited access."

Holder added he was "deeply disturbed" at the "barriers to voting" that have been added during Scott's tenure and urged the governor to "re-evaluate laws and procedures that make it harder for citizens to register and to vote."

John Tupps, a spokesman for Scott, said in an email Friday that "this is a blatantly political letter."

Tupps directed media inquiries to Scott's gubernatorial campaign for additional comment.

In the letter, Holder described as "troubling" a 2013 directive from Florida Secretary of State Ken Detzner that absentee ballots could only be collected at supervisor's offices. Also, the letter pointed to

Detzner's rejection this year of a request to use the University of Florida's student union as an early voting location, and a policy outlined in April by an assistant county attorney in Miami-Dade County that voters couldn't use restrooms at polling sites in the South Florida county.

"Whether or not these changes would ultimately be found to violate specific federal laws, they represent a troubling series of efforts to limit citizens' ability to exercise the franchise," Holder wrote.

Holder also pointed to a controversial attempt to "purge" non-citizens from the voter rolls before the 2012 elections and to a 2011 law that reduced the length of the early-voting period. That law, which has since been altered, was blamed for helping create long lines at some polling places in 2012.

The Orlando Sentinel determined the law kept at least 201,000 Floridians from casting votes.

"I am pleased that last year you signed legislation that restored early voting days," Holder wrote. "However, I have grave concerns that there remains a troubling pattern in your state of measures that make it more difficult, not easier, for Floridians to vote."

A spokeswoman for Detzner deferred comment to Scott, noting the letter was addressed to him.

Scott's campaign manager Melissa Sellers, in a statement Friday, said the White House is trying to bolster the efforts of Democratic challenger Charlie Crist.

"Attorney General Eric Holder's letter is just more politics from President Obama --- as the White House desperately tries to prop up the sagging campaign of their candidate, Charlie Crist," Sellers said in her statement. "It isn't surprising that the same President who used the IRS to persecute his political opponents is now using his attorney general to try the same tactic." Sellers pointed in her statement toward Holder's Justice Department pre-clearing the voting changes in 2011 and to the 2013 law that corrected "inefficiencies" in the 2011 law.

"The new 2013 law added more early voting locations, more early voting days and shortened the length of the ballot," Sellers said. "Perhaps the attorney general is against these reforms and he wants to turn back the clock to the days of less early voting time and less early voting locations in a bizarre attempt to help Charlie Crist. But, Governor Scott has worked to make Florida elections more efficient, convenient and accessible to all voters."

Voter Registration Information

Who Can Register and Vote

(Section 97.041, Fla. Stat.)

You must be:

- At least 18 years of age,
- A citizen of the United States of America, and
- A legal resident of Florida and of the county where you intend to vote.

You can pre-register on or after your 16th birthday and may vote in any election held on or after your 18th birthday.

Persons Not Entitled to Register or Vote

(Section 97.041, Fla. Stat.)

You cannot register or vote if you are:

- Adjudicated mentally incapacitated with respect to voting unless that right has been restored.
- A convicted felon unless your right to vote has been restored.
- Not a citizen of the United States of America. (A lawful permanent resident cannot register or vote in Florida.)

How to Register to Vote

(Section 97.053, Fla. Stat.)

You must complete a voter registration application. Voter registration applications are available:

- Online. Download and print the application form directly from the website for the local Supervisor of Elections' office or for the Division of Elections' at: <http://election.dos.state.fl.us/pdf/webappform.pdf>.
- At any of the following locations:
 1. Any local Supervisor of Elections' office
 2. Any voter registration agency (i.e., office that provides public assistance,, office that serves persons with disabilities, center of independent living, armed forces recruitment office, and public library)
 3. Any office that issues driver licenses (some tax collector's offices issue

driver licenses). You may also submit your voter registration information electronically at the same time as you get a new or renewed license. The electronic information will be forwarded to the Supervisor of Elections for processing.

4. The Division of Elections

5. Fishing and hunting license shops.

Once completed, mail or deliver the form to a Supervisor of Elections' office, the Division of Elections, or any voter registration agency. 6 REV OCT 2013

What is Required for New Registration

(Section 97.053, Fla. Stat.)

You must complete the following fields for a new registration:

- Your name.
- Your legal residence address.
- Your date of birth.
- Your valid Florida driver license number or Florida identification card number. If you have not been issued either of these numbers, provide the last four digits of your Social Security number. If you have not been issued that number either, then you must indicate "none" in the field asking for this information.
- An affirmation or a mark in the check box affirming that you are a citizen of the United States of America.
- An affirmation or a mark in the check box affirming that you have not been convicted of a felony or that, if convicted, you have had your civil rights restored.
- An affirmation or a mark in the check box affirming that you have not been adjudicated mentally incapacitated with respect to voting or that, if adjudicated, you have had your right to vote restored.

• Your signature. By signing or marking the registration application, you swear or affirm under penalty of false oath

that the information contained in the registration application is true. (A power of attorney is not accepted. No one other than the voter may sign or mark his or her own voter registration application.)

Note: A party affiliation is not required for a new registration. However, if you do not designate a political party affiliation, you will be registered without party affiliation (i.e., no party affiliation (NPA)).

When Can You Register

(Sections 97.053, 97.055 and 97.0555, Fla. Stat.)

You can apply at any time either by mail or in person. However, if you want to vote in an upcoming election, the deadline to register is the 29th day before that election. See "Late Registration" exception under Section "Military and Overseas Voters". Otherwise, new voter registrations will be accepted after the deadline to register for an election, but only for the purpose of subsequent elections. Your registration date will be the date your new voter registration application is postmarked or hand delivered to:

- Any county Supervisor of Elections' office,
- The Division of Elections,
- An office that issues driver's licenses (examiner's or tax collector's office, or
- Any voter registration agency (i.e., any office that provides public assistance, any office that serves persons with disabilities, any center for independent living, any armed forces recruitment office, or any public library).

If your application is complete and

you are qualified as a voter, a voter information card will be mailed to you.

When Can You Update a Registration Record

(Section 97.055, Fla. Stat.)

You can make changes or updates (e.g., name, address, signature, political party affiliation, etc.) to your record at any time with one exception - a political party change for a primary election must be made by the registration deadline or it will not become effective until after the primary election. 7 REV OCT 2013

First-Time Voters Who Register by Mail

(Section 97.0535, Fla. Stat.)

If you register by mail, are a first-time voter in the State and have not been issued a Florida driver license number, Florida identification number, or a Social Security number, special identification requirements apply. You must provide one of the following forms of identification in order to register: Form containing your name and photo

Or, a copy of a current and valid:

- United States passport,
 - Debit or credit card,
 - Military identification,
 - Student identification,
 - Retirement center identification,
 - Neighborhood association identification,
- or
- Public assistance Identification.
 - Utility bill
 - Bank statement
 - Government check or paycheck,
- or
- Other government document containing your name and current residence address.
