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'Skunkie' raises stink with plan to relocate



Much-maligned exotic animal rescue wants to move to Lake Jeffery Rd.

Skunkie Acres, an animal rescue and zoo that shelters exotic animals, is hoping to move to a site off Lake Jeffery Road, but the proposal has drawn the ire of residents living near the new location.

Skunkie Acres wants to move to a 20.35-acre site off Lake Jeffery Road currently owned by James H. Johnson III.

Johnson is listed as the title holder and Barbara Haake is listed as Johnson's representative agent.

The documentation presented to the Board of Adjustment on July 28, indicates that the special exception is needed to have riding stables, wildlife rescue and exotic animals. A special exception can grant uses of property that may be an appropriate use within a zoning district depending on the size, location of the property, number, relationship to neighborhood and other various factors. Johnson has given consent to Bernard and Barbara Haake to have exotic animals and riding horses on his land in northern Columbia County. Documents bearing Johnson's signature indicate that Bernard and Barbara Haake are in the process of purchasing the property from Johnson.

Skunkie Acres representatives and people who opposed them moving to the Lake Jeffery Road site will present their cases at 7 p.m. Thursday at the Columbia County Board of Adjustment meeting, in the Columbia County School Board Auditorium, 372 W. Duval St.

Lisa Roberts, who lives near the new proposed Skunkie Acres site, said she and other area residents are opposed to Skunkie Acres relocating near them.

"We are adamantly opposed because the property is not conducive to moving animals on, also because of their prior history of citizen complaints where they're currently located," Roberts said. "I have a stack of complaints that have been filed

with the sheriff's department and other numerous agencies, clerk of circuit court, where they have been to county courts with complaints that have been filed against them. It just goes on and on with complaints against these individuals or the agency that they represent. We just don't want that type of problem in our neighborhood."

Skunkie Acres is a 501c3 not for profit animal rescue with horseback

riding and exotic animals. The facility is currently housed in the Columbia County-White Springs area on a 4.6-acre parcel of land.

Skunkie Acres, which was originally denied its special exception for its current Northwest Sophie Drive location by the county Board of Adjustment, appealed the decision to the county board

Charter school is dealt a final blow

Huddleston shuts door on group's attempt to reopen this school year.

There will be no new charter school opening this school year, Supt. Terry Huddleston said at Tuesday's school board meeting. Any charter applications turned in during this school year will be considered for the 2016-17 school year as charter deadlines set forth by state law mandate, Huddleston said.

After Shining Star Academy of the Arts was not granted a waiver of termination after it received two straight F's during the 2012-13 and 2013-14 school years, community members wrote a letter to the school district saying they wanted to open another charter school to take the place of Shining Star. That letter, written by retired Columbia County public school teacher Bernice Presley, said the charter school would be called the "Alfonso Levy Charter School."

The group pushing to open the replacement charter school asked the school board to waive deadlines set by state law about when charter applications need to be completed. According to state law, charter applications need to be turned in by Aug. 1 in order to

Shayne Morgan, Columbia County emergency management director, said as of Tuesday, four of the 14 roads listed in yesterday's paper remain closed with an addi-

tional two road closures at Southeast Tyre Road, from US 90 East to Southeast County Line Road, and at Southeast County Line Road, from US 90 East to State Road 100. The four roads that remained closed on Tuesday were Southwest Bishop Avenue, Northeast Greenfield Tower Road, Northeast Tripple Run and Northeast Cheshire Lane and Northwest Ogden Loop.

Morgan said the new road closures could be dirt roads

Black bear naps in condo complex

JACKSONVILLE

An injured black bear is recovering after it fell asleep outside a Jacksonville condominium complex and was shot with tranquilizers.

Wildlife officials said the male bear climbed a 7-foot fence into the courtyard of the ocean front condo on Tuesday. The roughly 3-year old bear, which weighs more than 300 pounds, then settled in for a nap. Officials told area newspapers that the bear seemed injured and may have been hit by a car earlier because he did not immediately react to the tranquilizer dart.

A group of residents crowded around the action, but authorities said the bear was not threatening.

State biologists took the bear away in a cage for treatment before they will release it back into the wild. The bear is expected to recover.

Missing inmate captured while riding his bicycle

LUTZ — Authorities have captured an escaped prisoner who went missing from the Pasco County area and has been on the run for about 24 hours.

A Hillsborough County Sheriff’s deputy saw 27-year-old Jason Adams riding a bicycle Tuesday afternoon. The deputy asked for identification and Adams revealed himself. He was arrested without incident and booked into jail.

Pasco County Sheriff’s officials says Adams walked away after taking a bathroom break on Monday while working in the Lutz area north of Tampa. His blue striped prison uniform was later found.

According to the Department of Corrections website, Adams was sentenced to several years in prison last fall for burglary and grand theft charges.

Owner of small North Fla. home sent to prison

TALLAHASSEE — The owner of a north Florida adult care home is heading to prison.

Florida Attorney General Pam Bondi announced Monday that Priscilla Smith

Johnson from Williston was sentenced to more than eight years in prison.

Johnson was arrested last October on allegations of neglecting residents, failing to provide medical services for a resident’s wounds, and financially exploiting residents at her small family care home. She was also alleged to have restrained a disabled adult with handcuffs and causing wounds on a disabled adult.

Her home had about 10 residents.

Johnson reached an agreement where she pleaded guilty to aggravated abuse of a disabled adult along with false Imprisonment, neglect of a disabled adult and exploitation of a disabled adult.

Alabama cancels CeeLo Green appearance

MOBILE — A music festival in Mobile, Alabama, is canceling an appearance by singer CeeLo Green following his online comments about sexual assault.

Mobile Bayfest CEO Bobby Bostwick issued a statement Monday saying Green’s performance set for Oct. 4 is being called off. The statement says recent comments attributed to Green conflict with the beliefs and conscience of the music festival.

Green recently pleaded no contest to a felony charge of furnishing ecstasy to a woman during a 2012 dinner in Los Angeles.

After the plea, the former “Voice” coach posted a series of tweets, including one that read: “Women

who have really been raped REMEMBER!!!” Green later tweeted an apology.

Two other concerts have dropped Green,

and TBS is canceling the second season of Green’s reality show.

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


Fort White teen linked to vehicle break-ins, says CCSO

Arrested Monday, faces third degree burglary charge.

A Fort White teen who has been linked to a rash of vehicle burglaries in Columbia County faces charges of third degree burglary following her arrest Monday, according to the Columbia County Sheriff's Office.

Mindi Marie Swartzel, 18, 159 SW Poppy Glen, was booked into the Columbia County Detention Facility on \$50,000 bond and remained jailed at press time.

In a news release last week CCSO said they had investigated 44 vehicle burglaries throughout the county in the last 30 days. On Tuesday, Murray Smith, CCSO public information officer, said he believed the number could be even higher.

Smith said Tuesday that Swartzel was linked to the burglaries. She allegedly drove members of a local group called the "Squad" around so they could break into the vehicles. In one instance she reportedly drove an individual to Walmart to shoplift.

Swartzel said the "Squad" was not a gang but "thinks it might be now" because "everyone on the outside of the group is saying it is," according to the report.

Swartzel said "Squad" members called her multiple times asking her to give them a ride, according to the report. The report said Swartzel told deputies she would drop "Squad" members off to commit burglaries and would return about 45 minutes later to pick them up.

An unnamed individual reportedly told deputies Swartzel and other suspects committed burglaries in the neighborhood of Morning Glory Road, where they stole several purses, a GPS and other property from cars.

Branford couple injured in crash

Both were taken to UF Health Shands.

A Branford couple was seriously injured in a car accident on State Road 18 in Bradford County on Sunday, according to a Florida Highway Patrol news release.

Carl Smith, 71, and Roseanna Smith, 64, were traveling east on State Road 18 in a Dodge Ram when they approached a curve in the road, FHP said.

For reasons unknown, Carl Smith traveled into the west-bound lane and sideswiped the Ford Explorer of Jennifer Hazen, 28, the release said. Hazen's car to spun counter-clockwise and came to stop on the north shoulder facing south. Carl Smith's car rotated clockwise, overturned and slid on its passenger side facing south.

Hazen had no reported injuries but Carl and Roseanna Smith were transported to UF Health Shands Hospital with serious injuries, the release said.

All three were wearing their seat belts, according to FHP.

School finances looking up

After taking cost-cutting measures for the 2013-14 school year just to stay afloat, Columbia County school district's budget of \$87,036,235.46 for the 2014-15 fiscal year includes employee raises as well as a few new positions, all while raising the district's fund balance slightly, according to projections.

The district is able to add positions, give raises and increase the district's fund balance all at the same time because the amount of state funding it received went up, district finance director Bonnie Penner said. Attrition also helped the district do these things.

But the foundation for the changes was a solid budget last year that raised the fund balance to the minimum required by the state. The budget cuts the district made for its 2013-14 fiscal year, including not filling six to eight vacant positions, helped the district recover from its financial crisis and helped it meet the state requirement that districts have three percent of their budgets in reserve at all times. The district ended the last fiscal year with a \$2,073,599 fund balance, which was just above three percent of its budget.

"The board has done a great job in helping us find areas where we can cut costs," Supt. Terry Huddleston said. "Those cuts made then really manifested this year."

Since last year's cuts were effective, the district is able to do things this year that were overdue like giving school nurses

and other non-instructional employees pay raises, he said.

Fourteen school nurses left during or at the end of the last school year, and most of them likely left because of the low pay, so the raises were necessary, Huddleston said.

"We need to retain our nurses," he said. "They're very important to the safety of our schools."

Other non-instructional employees received a three percent pay increase in this fiscal year, which began July 1. Their raises came after instructional staff received pay increases beginning in July 2013.

The district also created some new positions this year. It hired a third computer tech and created a new position called the assistant director of technology. Huddleston said the additional tech was necessary simply because of how many computers the district has. He said the district will probably send one of its techs to Fort White to maintain the computers at Columbia City Middle School and Fort White high, middle and elementary schools.

The position of assistant director of technology needed to be added in case the computer system shuts down because the technology director can't handle something like that alone, Huddleston said. Computers are vital to the district, so it's important that there are enough people to maintain them, he said.

Assistant Superintendent for curriculum, assessment, accountability, technology and professional development Kitty McElhaney is leaving at the end of October, and since she has multiple roles, three people,

instead of just one, are filling her position. But it won't cost the district any extra, Penner said. The three people replacing McElhaney will be coordinators, which receive less pay than assistant superintendents. Andy Giddens will be the coordinator of testing accountability and will be in charge of end-of-course exams, which are now required by the state for every high school class. He will be paid by state grants. Kay Dekle will be the coordinator of secondary education and state testing, and Beth Bullard, who currently works in the district grant office, will be the coordinator of elementary education.

The district also created a few new teaching positions for this school year, Huddleston said.

This 2014-15 fiscal year budget was approved by the school board at Tuesday's school board meeting.

According to the budget projections, the district will end the 2014-15 fiscal year with a \$2,137,291.64 fund balance, which is a slight increase over last year's fund balance. But it's still not as high as Huddleston would like, he said.

A healthy district should have five percent of its budget in reserves, Huddleston said.

"And in these days, we need even more," he said.

But before the district could focus on increasing its reserves, it needed to give those raises and make those new positions, Huddleston said.

Now, moving forward the district is focusing on using its resources to the best of its abilities to raise fund balances

in coming years, Penner said. The district is implementing a new computer system this year, which will help cut costs, she said. The reason it will help the district cut costs is because programmers aren't needed for it, Huddleston said.

Penner said the district is trying to do more things electronically to save on printing costs.

Another thing the district is doing to work on saving money is to look at how necessary a position is when one becomes vacant, Huddleston said. Instead of immediately filling a position when someone leaves or retires, the district is looking at whether the position actually needs to be refilled, he said.

The district is already trying to do this. An employee in the district finance office is leaving soon, and no one new will be hired for that position because the district has realized the finance department can run just as well with one less person, Penner said.

"We're counting our nickels and dimes, but we had to do some things to protect the district first," Huddleston said.

In addition to approving the district budget at Tuesday's school board meeting, the board also

- approved a millage rate of 7.132 mills for the 2014-15 fiscal year

- approved the student progression plan for 2014-15 school year

- approved the code of student conduct for the 2014-15 school year

be considered for the school year beginning the following August.

At Tuesday's meeting, Huddleston said the deadlines would not be waived. He said the Florida Department of Education charter school office has advised him that it would not be wise to waive deadlines for a charter that hasn't even turned in an application.

Before the meeting, Huddleston said Shining Star's closing date has not been set. But according to the 90-day closure order issued by the district, the school's last day has to be on or before Nov. 24. Huddleston said the district is still working with Shining Star to set the school's last day.

At Tuesday's meeting, Huddleston said that many

parents of Shining Star students have been misled about when the school's last day will be. He said Shining Star Principal Tony Buzzella sent one letter to parents saying the school's last day would be Nov. 24 but that when children got back from Thanksgiving break after that, the new Alfonso Levy Charter School would be open in its place. Huddleston said that's not true. Shining Star's last day has not been set yet, and there will be no new charter school opened this year.

Huddleston said Buzzella sent out another letter to parents saying the school's last day would be Oct. 15, which is also untrue.

The school district is holding a meeting Tuesday at 7 p.m. at Pinemount Elementary School for Shining Star parents to get information on enrolling their children into other schools.

that washed out or other damages from the rain over the weekend.

"Even if it rained tonight, it would make a light impact compared to what was seen over the weekend," Morgan said.

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Local first responders, firefighters and law enforcement will be honored during the Never Forget 9/11 Commemorative Ceremony to remember fallen heroes on Thursday at 10 a.m. located at the First Baptist Church.

"It's great that we're able to host the ceremony. It's a real privilege to be a church in a downtown setting that brings together our city as a family," said Rev. Robert Bass, who will open the ceremony.

Having served in the military, Bass said the events of 9/11 are a horrible tragedy, but also a reminder to constantly stay alert.

Weigh bonus criteria carefully

As part of the Columbia County Economic Development Director's compensation package, there is the promise of bonus potential of up to \$10,000 per year for meeting certain benchmarks related to economic growth in the county.

County commissioners must review and approve the specific criteria, which have not yet been established, before the arrangement can go into effect.

Here is our take on how incentive pay for the econ chief should be — and for how it ought not be — structured.

First, a bonus package for a public employee should be designed with an eye toward benefiting the taxpayer, not the job holder. The goal here is to get things done and make the county grow. A bonus check is just a way to make that happen.

Certain very specific tasks should be laid out, with the understanding that accomplishing these will be met with financial reward. Only if these benchmarks are met is the reward given.

We simply want to be sure this "bonus" arrangement doesn't turn into a back-door raise.

As for the criteria themselves, they should be heavy on accomplishment and light on personal edification. We are told that training — continuing education, if you will — may be one of the criteria on which the director's bonus will be based.

We see the value of education in this setting and elsewhere. However, an econ chief is not paid for his accomplishments in the classroom. Training should not be part of the bonus structure.

This is basically a sales position and incentives should be given for results, pure and simple — not for attending seminars.

Finally, we would ask commissioners to keep in mind this is not a \$10,000 stipend, to be taken for granted each year. It is a bonus, and must be earned anew every time. Also, as was made clear at the time of hiring, \$10,000 is the maximum amount to be awarded. It is not automatic and does not have to be paid in full. Based on accomplishments, a director might merit partial remittance.

We want our county to grow and prosper. We also want the economic development director to be properly compensated, but in a manner that rewards tangible success and fairly protects taxpayers' money.

2. California's Monterey Peninsula is a place of incredible beauty and diversity. It was my home for 35 years, the place where I raised my children, worked for a newspaper and lost my first husband to cancer.

It is still home to two of my children and their families. Where to eat? Take your pick. Vegas has countless restaurants all competing to be the best. My favorite Vegas restaurant is my kitchen after my husband gets take-out. My favorite Vegas view is the sunset from our backyard. My favorite Vegas thing to do is to watch that sunset with him.

Beauty truly is in the eye of the beholder. Blind all his life, my brother has his own way of seeing things. The day of our mother's funeral, I drove to his place to pick him up for the service.

"Hey, Sister," he said grinning, "you look mighty pretty."

I laughed. "How can you tell?"

"I heard your highheels," he said, "clicking up the walk."

Best compliment I ever had.

Faces and places look better through the eyes of love. Happy trails to you wherever you may roam. Hope you sit back, enjoy the ride and send me a postcard.

of commissioners and was granted a special exception in 2007.

Since then complaints have been filed with local, state and federal officials regarding the animals, as well as complaints filed with the Columbia County environmental health department about animal waste odors, excessive flies, excessive noise from dogs barking, and horse waste draining onto a neighbor's property. After Skunkie Acres was notified of the complaints, health department records show all the issues were rectified.

"We will be moving our livestock, exotic animals and poultry to our new location..." Barbara Haake said in documents filed

with the Board of Adjustment. "We plan to move a home onto the property, place western-style fencing along the roadway and to also landscape the property therefore increasing the property value of the acreage and neighborhood. Our pasture area will be towards the back of the property and the number of horses estimated will be from 10-25..."

A list of permanent animals for Skunkie Acres includes: 10 skunks, a guinea, a red-tailed hawk, a barred owl, a white tail deer, an alligator, a ring-tailed lemur, two bob cats, a white-nosed coatimundi and two domestic raccoons and 19 horses.

Wildlife rehabilitated animals slated to be released included seven skunks, seven opossums and one coyote.

Wilhelm Haake has been a

neighbor to the Skunkie Acres site since 2007, when it first opened.

He said he is not related to Skunkie Acres owners Bernard and Barbara Haake, but he'll be happy to see them leave the area.

"I'm glad he's moving out of our neighborhood," he said. "I feel sorry for the people he's moving next to, but I'm glad he's moving out of here. It's supposed to be an animal rescue and he's moving to a wetland. How is that going to help the animals. The horses' hooves can rot. They have to have dry land, they are not like alligators, they can't live in that type of environment."

Roberts said the primary concern is Skunkie Acres is proposing to relocate to a property that's classified as a wetland.

"The piece of property is a little over 20 acres and there

is only 1.5 acres that's located in an upland area," she said. "The remainder of the property is wetlands. That's already been reviewed by the Suwannee River Water Management District, I don't know how they intend to move exotic animals and horses on those wetlands."

She said there are also health concerns for the animals as well as concerns about the animals getting loose.

Roberts said a traffic study performed by the county engineer showed 23,385 vehicles traveled on Lake Jeffery Road within a 12-day period. The study showed that only 2,974 vehicles travel on Sophie Drive, their current location, in a 12-day period.

"There are others on Lake Jeffery Road who have asked me to represent them," she said.

"They asked me to compile this information and I'll be at the meeting on behalf of the community."

Roberts also said a petition is being circulated against Skunkie Acres moving to the Lake Jeffery Road site and will be presented at the meeting. She was unaware how many signatures the petition contains.

Karen Parker, of Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission, said the agency will continue to monitor Skunkie Acres to make sure they are in compliance with state laws.

"If the county board of adjustment approves the move to the new area, FWC will continue the captive wildlife inspections of the new facility," Parker said. "If the move isn't approved, FWC will continue the inspections at the old facility."

Hunter outlines econ plans

Potential suitors' identities secret under state law.

While Glenn Hunter, Columbia County Economic Development director, has been working with the United States Tennis Association on a project to possibly construct a local tennis complex, he said he's also been working on other projects over the course of the last five months.

Hunter said he's worked with the Department of Economic Opportunity in Tallahassee on leads provided by the state on what facilities are available in Columbia County for companies hoping to locate in Florida.

"We've submitted (requests surveys) back to the state because they try to pre-qualify every area based on what companies are looking at," said Hunter, who started work as economic development director in early May.

In addition, he said several companies do their own demographic work and the Columbia County Economic Development department has worked directly with several companies who have made contact locally.


"For the most part they are actually looking at Columbia County and it's probably got as much to do with the logistical position we are in in the state relating to our interstates and railways," he said.

He said a strong candidate, which he did not name due to confidentiality agreements, has postponed its decision on locating in the area until the end of 2015, because they are building a distribution center in Ohio.

Hunter said the local economic development department has been working with a Canadian company for the last four months that's shown a strong interest in the area.

"I can't release any information on that client. However, with the requirements of that company there are two or three factors that are very unique to the company and we're working on trying to satisfy them that we can meet the criteria that they need here," he said. "We have everything they need here from the manufacturing, packaging and distribution for that company. We're just continuing to work it on a day-by-day basis, keeping the conversation open with them and hoping we can attract them to Columbia County."

tingent of children and adults he says are driving to Gainesville to play at various tennis facilities.

"There is a lot of interest in the high schools, with young adults and with seniors to establish a permanent, single facility here, so we could host tournaments and bring people into the community," he said. "What really sparked the greatest interest in this was the USTA moving its national headquarters to Orlando and spending \$60 million developing 100 courts. We look at that and think, here's an opportunity for us here in North Florida to build a facility where we can host preliminaries for tournaments to be held in Orlando."

Hunter estimates constructing the facility would cost \$1 million-\$1.5 million. He said he and what he called a "grassroots" committee, whose members he didn't name, are trying to secure

grants from a variety of sources to reduce the costs. The facility would encompass a clubhouse, courts, concessions building and tennis pro shop.

"We're in the initial conceptual phase of determining the viability of building a facility like this," he said. "We're going through the process now to do the due diligence to determine the need and all the aspects of putting it together."

Hunter, an avid tennis fan and player, said an application was sent to USTA and USTA responded, indicating they were interested in what the county is considering.

"They also provide architectural and engineering design and do the planning at their costs and they award grants from the national foundation for facilities to be built," he said. "We're looking for some matching grants from USTA and to work

with in a partnership to make our facility one of their jewels in North Florida."

The plan for Columbia County is to have a 16-20 court facility with the ability to offer play seven days a week and host tournaments at all levels of play. The facility would include courts for seniors and handicapped players. The facility's playing surfaces would be asphalt and clay.

Hunter said for the plan to be successful, the facility would need to be built near the Southside Recreation Complex. He said placing the facility next to Southside Recreation Complex will benefit the grant application process because the complex provides other recreational opportunities and resources.

"The first, most important function would be that it's a benefit to the quality of life for the people in Columbia County, where-

by we would be able to offer professional training for our young people to develop," he said. "Tennis is a sport you can play your whole life. The USTA sanctions leagues and you can play competitively up until you're in your 80s to 90s. We believe this facility will attract many leagues over in Gainesville to come up here and play, that will be good for our restaurants and businesses."

Hunter said to make the concept work, they'll also need to be able to attract overnight tournaments and players from out of the state.

"The Florida Sports Foundation is very keen on bringing tournaments in from out of the state and they will help fund some projects for that," he said.

Hunter's committee, which is separate from the Economic Development Advisory Board, has been formed and has held two

meetings as they look to make the concept a reality, he said. Jeff Simmons, co-chairman of the EDAB, said he knew nothing about Hunter's group.

Hunter said city and county officials have also been informed about the concept and plans are to start a community tennis association.

"We're hoping to attract 200-300 members into the organization and once we get all our cost estimates then we'll start seeking all the final funding it will take to put it into place," he said.

Hunter, who noted they've been working on the project 2-3 months, said there is no timeline associated with the project and the "grassroots" committee has been meeting on a monthly basis.

"We're hoping in the future to even bring professional tennis tournaments here," he said. "If we do everything right here, we'll be a connector to USTA."

Eight things to know about copper

Last year, another friend (a medical doctor) also mentioned copper's association with cancer, especially hormonal types. How could something so integral to our body be so bad I wondered?

I researched it. Just like I suspected, copper is essential to good health. We don't need a lot of copper, but certain healthy amounts are vital and essential to our health and well-being. It's all about balance.

Copper is required for the formation of about 50 enzymes and it's needed for our transporters, which shuttle hormones and neurotransmitters all over your body. Copper protects the lining of blood vessels and myelin. It supports energy production. Did you hear that? Energy! How many of you suffer with chronic fatigue? If you have iron deficiency anemia that doesn't respond to iron supplementation, and you're ferritin remains suppressed, you might be copper deficient. You need iron to make hemoglobin,

the main component of red blood cells and you cannot absorb iron without copper. Long story short, copper deficiency is sometimes at the heart of resistant iron deficiency anemia. An "RBC copper" blood test can reveal this.

Symptoms of copper deficiency include pale skin, gray hair, skin lesions or dryness, dizziness, weakness, poor immunity, shortness of breath and malabsorption issues. Low copper is associated with low white blood cells, leukemia and other blood irregularities. Here's what else you should know:

1. Zinc supplements lower copper levels. If you've been consuming zinc supplements for a long time then you might be copper deficient, and vice versa. Ask your doctor about the zinc to copper ratio, but it's about ten to one.
2. Elevated copper

can cause neurological problems, possibly schizophrenia, phobias and panic attacks however the research isn't clear. This is a good time to teach you that some of you make large amounts of "pyrroles." In excess, pyrroles irreversibly latch onto zinc and vitamin B6 and take it out of the body via urine. Once zinc is depleted, copper levels rise. So is it the copper that causes the problem, or the high pyrroles? If you love someone with

a mental illness, you can have their pyrroles measured with a simple urine test.

3. Copper is needed to make melanin so deficiencies are often seen in people with premature grey hair.
4. Cardiac arrhythmias can result from low copper status.
5. Copper helps you make elastin and collagen and these are components of bone and connective tissues. Copper may be useful for osteoporosis.

6. Resveratrol supplements are drug muggers of copper.
7. Copper can help you manage cholesterol.
8. Copper is part of a transport system in your body that protects the inner lining of your blood vessels. Deficiencies will make your vessels lose elasticity and rupture easily.



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
