homes for disabled children and adults was arrested along with an employee Wednesday on charges related to child abuse.

Janice Harrell Summers, 63, of 760 SW Finley Little Road, was charged with failure to report suspected child abuse/abandon-

ment/neglect and destroying evidence, jail records show. Timothy Harold Herndon, 51, of 1801 SW

County Road 252B, was charged with cruelty toward a child, records show.

Sheriff: 'Honest mistake' in man's arrest

Offers apology; victim isn't sure of next move.

Columbia County Sheriff Mark Hunter on Wednesday apologized for the wrongful arrest of a man falsely accused of using a stolen credit card and called it "an honest mistake."

However, he said Detective Andrea Useche "got indicators that he was being deceptive" during an interview and believed the evidence pointed to his guilt.

He said she would not face disciplinary action.

"This is just so unfortunate and I really hate this took place," Hunter said. "I'm sorry that it took place to someone who's out here being productive in the com-

Driver had burning candle in cupholder

Blaze destroyed car, gas pumps, but no injuries reported.

A fire caused by a candle left burning in a car destroyed the vehicle and gas pumps at which

it was parked Wednesday. No one was hurt.

The car caught fire shortly after 3 p.m. at Spires Supermarket/IGA Express, 2681 NE Bascom Norris Drive.

According to preliminary reports from firefighters on the scene, an 18-year-old woman, who firefighters did not identify, had a candle lit and burning in the 2007

Ford Fusion's center console cupholder and went inside the store to buy gas without extinguishing the candle. She told firefighters when she returned to the car, her seat and purse were on fire and she returned to the store and called for help.

Columbia County Sheriff's deputies evacuated the store as firefighters doused the blaze.

Hunter under fire for tennis project

EDAB split on director's focus on complex.

EDAB members Stephen Douglas and Glen Owens said they don't think a tennis complex falls in the realm of economic development. Other board members, including chair Ron Williams, vice chair Jeff Simmons and Wendell Johnson, came to Hunter's defense, saying he isn't pursuing the tennis complex as an economic development project, but in his role as a private citizen.

Williams, Simmons and Johnson said that while Hunter is pursuing the project on his own time, a tennis complex does fall within the realm of economic development because of the jobs it creates.

Hunter has met twice with what he calls a "grassroots committee" to discuss building a tennis complex in Columbia County that would function as a place for local leagues to play and as a facility for the United States Tennis Association to host tournaments. Hunter said USTA, which recently built a new headquarters in Orlando, is interested in partnering with Columbia County to help build and use a tennis complex for preliminary tournament rounds.

Hunter said he's looking at building 16 courts and expects it to cost \$1-2 million.

FWC seeking to restore Alligator Lake

Alligator Lake is on the list of more than 90 bodies of water across the state the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission is seeking a permit to conduct restoration activities on within the next 15 years.

The FWC applied for a permit from the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers Jacksonville District to conduct restoration activities on 11 lakes and water bodies in the FWC's North Central Region.

Bruce Jagers, an FWC biological scientist in the Eustice office, said the work with the Corps is a public announcement for

a 15-year permit and there is no specific project listed for Alligator Lake.

"The purpose of that permit is for lakes we

normally work on a fairly routine basis," he said. "We do not have a specific project planned at the time concerning that per-

mit. We're just getting the permit in place and the methods approved."

He said they found tussocks blocking a boat

ramp or something of that nature, they would be able to work on a clean up project on fairly quick basis.

Jagers said other lakes in the area that have been included on the list for the North Central region are: Orange Lake, Lochloosa Lake and Newnans Lake.

"Alligator Lake is on the list because of the dense growth of vegetation that periodically we need to do some plant control work to keep access open at the boat ramps," he said. "That's what that 15-year permit is for."

The request is part of an overall initiative in which the FWC is working with the Corps to obtain

Suspect sought in police dog death

ST. AUGUSTINE

Authorities are looking for a man suspected of killing a St. Johns County Sheriff's Office dog after the animal chased him into the woods. Deputies were searching a wooded area Tuesday along Florida Highway 207 near St. Augustine for 26-year-old Brandon Allison after neighbors in the Twin Lakes subdivision reported a disturbance.

Allison was being tracked by sheriff's Cmdr. Chuck Mulligan and his K-9 Baron early in the morning when the dog sensed the suspect was close and took off.

Mulligan said he could hear noise from the woods and a man yelling.

When authorities got to the scene the dog was found floating dead in a swampy area nearby.

Mulligan says he believes Allison, who

is wanted on a separate felony warrant, drowned the dog.

Defense will be allowed to recreate theater shooting

DADE CITY — Attorneys for a former Tampa Police captain accused of shooting a man to death during an argument in a movie theater can recreate the crime scene for the jury at his second-degree murder trial.

Pasco County Judge Pat Siracusa ruled Wednesday that attorneys for 72-year-old Curtis Reeves can reconstruct the scene inside the Cobb CineBistro theater in Wesley Chapel.

Reeves is accused of killing 43-year-old Chad Oulson in January after the two became embroiled in an argument that

began over Oulson texting during movie previews before a showing of "Lone Survivor."

The trial will begin sometime in 2015.

Bear struck, killed by car along Panhandle road

FORT WALTON BEACH — A bear was struck and killed along a highway in Florida's Panhandle.

The Florida Highway patrol says the crash occurred Tuesday along State Road 189 near Fort Walton Beach.

Wildlife officials told The Northwest Florida Daily News the bear was a 195 pound female.

Spokesman Stan Kirkland says the numbers of bear-related calls in Okaloosa, Walton and Santa Rosa counties have

"really skyrocketed."

Feds crack down on farmworker abuses

JACKSONVILLE — Federal authorities say they've recently cracked down on farmworker abuses in central and North Florida.

The U.S. Department of Labor said Tuesday that it recently has won \$100,000 in back wages for almost 280 agricultural workers and imposed \$25,000 in penalties against farms and farm labor contractors.

The violations included failing to pay proper wages, providing substandard housing and transporting workers without sufficient vehicle insurance.

NEW YORK

Debbie Harry will perform at the 34th annual John Lennon charity tribute concert in New York City in December.

The announcement Wednesday by the non-profit Theatre Within came a day before what would have been Lennon's 74th birthday.

Other performers include Kate Pierson of the B-52s, Joan Osborne, Marshall Crenshaw and Ben E. King. The event will be held Dec. 5 at Symphony Space.

Yoko Ono said in a statement: "I share Theatre Within's belief that music and the performing arts have a special power to bring people together and inspire us to make a positive difference. It's beautiful that the Tribute continues to have such a powerful impact in John's memory."

Rock photographer Bob Gruen, who photographed Lennon during the years he lived in New York, will be honored with the first-ever John Lennon Real Love Award.

Proceeds will benefit Lennon and Ono's Spirit Foundation. Ticket prices are \$65, \$85 and \$105.

'7th Heaven' actress Sarah Goldberg dies

CHICAGO — Sarah Goldberg, who starred in the television series "7th Heaven" and the film "Jurassic Park III," has died. She was 40.

Goldberg died in her sleep of natural causes on Sept. 27 at her family's cabin in Wisconsin, her

mother Judy Goldberg told the Chicago Sun-Times. She said a heart ailment is suspected, although an autopsy failed to determine the exact cause of death.

"She went to sleep and didn't wake up," she said.

Goldberg's entertainment career started as a bumblebee in a Chicago City Ballet production of "Cinderella," her mother said, and gained momentum when she was asked to be an extra on the Julia Roberts movie "My Best Friend's Wedding." She got the role because her mother co-owned a company providing table linens for a set. A film staffer saw her helping arrange tablecloths and asked her to be in a scene, her mother said.

Goldberg went on to appear in television series including "90210," "Judging Amy," "The Beast," and "CSI: Crime

Scene Investigation."

In "7th Heaven" she played Jewish medical student Sarah Glass Camden who fell in love with the son of a Christian pastor.

"She wanted to go to medical school, and instead for three years she played a doctor on "7th Heaven," Judy Goldberg said of her daughter, who graduated from Amherst College in 1996 with a degree in microbiology, according to her IMDB biography.

Goldberg also played a college student looking for drugs in the Denzel Washington movie "Training Day."

The actress sometimes was credited under the stage name Sarah Danielle Madison.

Goldberg was born in 1974 in Springfield, where her father worked as a lawyer.



permits for routine restoration work in 94 lakes and water bodies throughout Florida.

According to information from the FWC, the agency is seeking a permit that would authorize all of its routine mechanical aquatic plant maintenance activities related to habitat restoration and navigation maintenance within these water bodies for a period of 15 years.

The proposed maintenance techniques include mechanical harvesting and shredding of aquatic vegetation and use of earth-moving and tilling equipment on vegetated areas during dry conditions.

Jaggers said work on Alligator Lake may include

exotic plant species work to reduce the amount of China fennel, China Berry and Japanese Climbing Ferns.

"All of those species are category one plants and they have the potential to out compete native plants and even change ecosystem functions," Jaggers said. "By keeping those under control that benefits the native habitat and creates benefits for fish and wildlife."

Officials said the proposed restoration activities would improve habitat for fish and wildlife and provide outdoor opportunities for boating, angling and wildlife viewing.

bail less than an hour after their arrests.

Dogwood Group Home at 4310 SW Pinemount Road, Open Arms Group Home at 170 SW Ma Glen St., Open Heart Group Home at 1580 E Duval St. and Summers Group Home at 353 SW Greenridge Lane, were issued a 30-day no-cause termination order and had until Oct. 11 to relocate their residents, according to Melanie Etters, communications director at the state Agency for Persons with Disabilities.

Etters said the group homes weren't meeting the agency's expectations and confirmed on Wednesday that all 33 residents had been relocated and the group

homes were no long operational.

Shelley Stroud, an investigator at the Department of Children and Families, contacted CCSO on August 15 after she received a tip that the Dogwood Group Home had an employee that struck a special-needs child with a belt multiple times, the report said.

An anonymous employee filmed an incident of alleged abuse with a cell phone off a surveillance camera inside the group home, and Stroud said the video was later sent to the DCF. The report said the video showed a large white male swinging what looked like a belt multiple times at a young white male.

As of press time, the arrest report was incomplete and sheriff's officials had not released

information relating to the charges against Summers.

Stroud said in the report that she would have to interview each employee and child. More law enforcement arrived on the scene, where there were four children and two employees found in the group home. Contact was made with Summers at that time, the report said.

Information was turned over to law enforcement and will be continued to be investigated, according to the report.

Summers was booked into the Columbia County Jail at 11:49 a.m. Wednesday on \$20,000 bail and was released by noon, according to online arrest records. Summers was jailed on \$10,000 bond at 12:50 p.m. and was released at 1:35 p.m.



A few things you might have missed

National Newspaper Week continues through Saturday, and we thought it an apt time to point out a few of the stories we've brought you in recent months that you wouldn't have known about except for your hometown paper.

Back in May we combed through the minutes of meetings of the Suwannee Valley Transit Authority in order to confirm an SVTA board member's claim that more than \$100,000 in comp time for the two top executives of the agency had been formally approved. The phantom authorization was nowhere to be found. A state audit of the agency is ongoing, as is a criminal probe by the state police.

In June we broke a story about the city removing a large stand of trees on private property, then denying the work had ever been authorized.

That same month we shone some light on the continuing struggles of North Florida Animal Rescue in Wellborn. The no-kill shelter began life with an endowment of almost \$3 million, courtesy a Lake City woman, but within three years had nearly gone broke.

In May we reported on Sunshine Law violations by the school district in withholding word of punishments meted out to employees at Pinemont Elementary School over failure to report a student's claims of sexual assault.

And last November, we did more than just report on the garbage-strewn mess that was Lake Montgomery. We did something about it. One of our reporters coordinated with city and state game commission officials to broker a deal for them to clean the lake up — or at least get a good start on it.

Those are only a few of the big headlines from the last few months. Equally important is what we do every day: tell the story of your life and ours in words and pictures.

Sports, school events, club news and more. The bigger papers would consider the stories we cover too small to matter. We know better. It is important to you, which makes it important to us.

Besides, it's our home too.

NFL study demands action

The National Football League has bigger trouble than the disgusting domestic violence cases dominating headlines this fall. In September, it quietly released a study that revealed one-third of its players — one third — can expect to suffer long-term cognitive problems, including dementia, after retiring.

And this was a study commissioned by the league.

Listen up, you 46 players on the San Francisco 49ers' current active roster: Fifteen of you are toast.

Yet the NFL seems to shrug it off. The league's future should be at stake. What other career path carries a high danger of dementia? Outside of tobacco, it's hard to

think of another industry that's as insidiously dangerous.

Fans, meanwhile, don't dwell on the details: Sure, it's a risky game, but hey, did you see the hit that linebacker put on the quarterback? Awesome! Have another beer.

If the NFL can't find a way to make football safer, then lawmakers should step in. Professional players are not known for saving and investing responsibly so they can care for themselves when their brains turn to mush. This will in part be a public cost — particularly for kids who get knocked silly in school and never make the big bucks.

Parents should be reassessing their kids' participation in Pop

Warner and high school football. The risk of serious effects from concussions is higher to young players whose bodies and brains are not fully developed. And while some coaches are wonderful, others fail to balance kids' health with the win-at-all-costs spirit of sports today.

The benefits of football as it's now played are not worth the risk to young players. If they reach the point of a professional offer, as adults, they may decide the money is worth a one in three chance of dementia. But is that a choice you want to make for your child?

munity. And that's the last thing we want to do is to arrest someone who is innocent. But we will learn from it and be better from it and move forward from it."

Nelson Ernest Ward, 60, was arrested Friday after buying a cell phone from Walmart in June with what sheriff's investigators claimed was a stolen credit card. Hours after his arrest, Ward's bank confirmed the phone was bought with his own debit card and he was released.

The real culprit used a stolen credit card to buy the same model phone, for \$363.03, at Walmart 43 seconds after Ward was shown doing so on store surveillance video.

Investigators mistook Ward for the thief.

"The odds against someone buying the same identical item with a stolen credit card within 43 seconds of what the other person bought are probably astronomical," Hunter said.

Hunter said he spoke with Nelson Ward over the phone and apologized.

Ward's son told him on video of him buying the phone Facebook page. Thursday that surveillance had been posted on the CCSO "Someone had called me and

told me my dad was on Facebook on the crime watchers page. I didn't believe them at first and sure enough, it was my dad. They were offering a reward and everything," said Brandon Ward, 22.

Nelson Ward said he knew he hadn't done anything wrong, but called the sheriff's office right away.

Useche asked him if he had purchased a phone from Walmart and if it was him in the video. Nelson Ward answered yes to both questions.

Then when Useche asked Nelson Ward if he had used a stolen credit card to buy the phone, he replied no but Useche said she did not believe him.

Nelson Ward was arrested on Friday at 9:31 a.m., and released about four hours later when his bank confirmed his version of events.

He has since hired local attorney Melissa Olin "to clean up their mess," he said, but is not sure if he will pursue a legal remedy against CCSO.

"I'm a grown man, and it's hard to make me cry," he said. "But I was so embarrassed that I cried for three days. I've never been called a thief."

After the meeting, he said he would like to see the courts built near Southside Sports Complex, which is the softball center that has generated a lot of commerce for the county because of the travel teams that play there.

Owens said he thinks it's a good project but one for the Tourist Development Council, not the EDD.

Hunter told board members that he's not coming to them for funding for the tennis courts and isn't pursuing the project in his work capacity. However, Hunter told the Lake City Reporter in early September that he was pursuing developing a tennis complex in his official capacity as the economic development director.

Hunter said he and his committee have already looked into funding sources, including USTA grants and state grants that the city and county recreation departments can apply for. Those grants he has looked at are for between \$500,000-700,000, he said.

If all the preliminary plans work out, Hunter said he would then take the project to the TDC. Following the meeting, he said he doesn't expect to ever ask the EDAB for funding.

However, Douglas said by spending time on the project, Hunter is not focusing on his responsibilities as the economic development director to create jobs.

Hunter said he only spends a short amount of time during the day sending emails and making phone calls in regards to the tennis facility though. He previously told the Lake City Reporter that most of the work on the tennis project is done after 6 p.m.

Williams said Hunter is working on the project on his own time and should be praised for it.

"So what he does on his spare time, it does not negate his ability to do the other things," he said. "He should be commended for it. This board does not say you shouldn't work on anything on your own time because you solely have to put your extra time on economic development."

Hunter said the only reason he added a discussion about the tennis complex to the agenda is because it has been discussed so much publicly.

"The reason I put it on the agenda is because it affected your director publicly, and I wanted to make sure that each of you understood my commitment 110 percent to economic development, and theoretically this is economic development at some level because this will bring jobs and drive things," Hunter said.

"This is another tool for us. If we have a complex like this when we bring industry in here to look at our community, and they begin looking at our downtown, and they look at our sports facilities, and they look at all the options and avenues they have to enhance their families living here, this is one more positive tool. And I have to tell you a lot of executives do play tennis and their wives play tennis, and they look for leagues. Right now, we have no opportunity in that particular area."

Douglas said he agrees that the project has economic implications, but it's not an economic development.

"A tennis complex, it's an economic enhancement," he said. "It brings forth money, but it has nothing to do with jobs and job creation."

However, Johnson, Williams and Simmons all said it does fall within the realm of economic development because the tennis complex will create jobs. If tennis players come to Columbia County to play tournaments, they'll have to eat and sleep here, which will create more hotel, motel and restaurant jobs. The complex will also have to be staffed, which will create jobs, Williams said.

Williams said he's basing that assumption on what sports tourism at the Southside Complex has done for Columbia County in terms of economic growth.

Douglas said he's concerned that Hunter is not focused on industry and manufacturing, which is what economic development is all about, as described in the EDD's mission statement.

However, Williams said EDD has changed in the past 10 years and is no longer all about industry. He said in recent years the board has dealt with retail, something it wouldn't have touched a decade ago. Now, EDD is all about jobs no matter what kind of jobs they are, he said.

"We're no longer the type of board that this board

was 10 years ago. No matter what we do our main focus is bringing jobs to Columbia County through no matter what means that is," Williams said. "If it's a \$100,000 job or a \$20,000 a year job when a person don't have a job, \$20,000 working a tennis court and they can feed their family means just as much to them as that \$100,000 job working at a manufacturing company. What has been done here got blown out of proportion for no reason."

After the meeting, Hunter told the Lake City Reporter that the newspaper's scrutiny of the project has brought it undue criticism.

Johnson said tourism is economic development.

"There's no question about that," he said.

Douglas said he feels like Hunter hasn't made his vision for EDD known to the board.

"I don't believe you've engaged this board and allowed us to participate. We don't know your vision.

We don't know your priority," he said. "I still want you in industrial manufacturing. I think we're losing that sight. I'm not sure where we're going with this."

Douglas then asked Hunter to share his mission for economic development.

Simmons read county ordinance 2012-1, which talks about the purpose of economic development.

The ordinance reads,

"Whereas there is a need to enhance economic activity in Columbia County by attracting diverse economic activity, including manufacturing, distribution, retail and all other activities conducive to economic promotion in order to achieve a more diversified economic base to minimize the vulnerability of local economy to economic fluctuation. And whereas in order to improve the prosperity and welfare of Columbia County and increase the purchasing power and opportunities for gainful employment of its inhabitants,

it is necessary and in the public interest to facilitate and encourage from time to time the economic development of Columbia County through non-recurring economic development incentives whereas the county desires to assist with the expansion and preservation of new and existing local businesses to the fullest extent possible pursuant to the laws of the state of Florida."

Simmons said under this definition he believes the tennis complex is economic development.

He also read the first paragraph of the EDD's mission statement, which is found on its website. It reads, "To foster a strong

local economy and vibrant community by promoting a favorable business environment to attract capital investment and employment opportunities."

Williams said a tennis complex that will bring tournaments is within this definition.

However, he omitted the next paragraph of the mission statement, which reads, "In fulfilling this mission, the EDD will work with new businesses to provide assistance for location or expansion within Columbia County. The EDD also works with existing businesses to develop additional employment opportunities for the residents of Columbia County."
