FISHING FOR CLUES

Collector is on the trail of a former local lure maker.

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The Heddon wooden frog. Creek Chub. The Bullhead.

All are some of the most famous antique fishing lures ever made.

Most highly prized antique fishing lures were manufactured in the late 1800s and early 1900s.

In the early 1920s, in Frostproof, an Irish immigrant began carving the Flood Shinner. It is believed that the earliest Southern Lure was a copy of Flood's lure.

Apparently around 1929, a fishing lure company was based in Lake City — The Southern Lure Company.

Frank Carter, a fishing lure researcher, collector and author, has a few of the lures that were manufactured here, but he's never been able

to get any research completed about the Southern Lure Company.

Carter has been collecting antique fishing lures for more than 20 years and has thousands of them. His travels around the state to collect lures have also made him a de facto fishing lure historian.

His clientele is often composed of people in their late 80s to early 90s or people who found old fishing lures in tackle boxes at estate sales.

The crafty antique lure collector is in Lake City trying to dig up records about the Southern Lure Company.

He wants to know when the Southern Lure Company was founded, who started it, who worked there and when and where it was in business. He also wants to find out about the company's relationship, if it exists, to the Southern Bait Company.

Carter, a retired Florida Department of Law Enforcement Agent, has been to Lake City before: he worked on the case of Kimberly Ann Leach, Ted Bundy's last victim.

The first security director for the Florida Lottery, Carter is accustomed to verifying facts and following where the clues lead.

Carter is working on volume seven of a series of books, "Florida Lure Makers and Their Lures" that he and other collectors in the state have contributed to over the past few years.

"The ultimate goal of this is that we solve who was

City hopefuls hail from far and wide

Manager applicants come from as far away as Hawaii.

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Applicants from as far as Hawaii are interested in becoming Lake City's new city manager. Some have international experience, such as working with a municipal government in Africa. Others have military experience, such as gathering intelligence in the Global War on

Six of the applicants live in Lake City and 25 in Florida. Two White Springs town managers — one current, one former — applied as well.

Terror or serving as a strategic commander for NORAD.

But several of the resumes list work histories much closer to home.

Three of the 54 applicants are current or former city officials. They are David Kraus, the

county's safety director and grant writer, who is also in the running for the Lake Shore Hospital Authority executive director position; Nick Harwell, the city's former airport manager now working as an economic development official in Marianna; and Jesse Quillen, the previous Columbia County economic development director now working in the same capacity for Clarke County, Alabama.

Klaus is among six applicants who live in Lake City.

The others are Chiquita Dingle, director for a Gainesville-based business; Phillip Mobley, who is involved in faith-based organizations in Lake City and Jacksonville; Natalie Park, a former controller for both North Florida

Meth suspect: Not my pants

A Fort White man arrested on drug possession charges claimed he was not in the right pants the day a veteran sheriff's deputy felt meth "shards" in his back pocket, a CCSO report said.

John Michael Rohe, 54, was arrested over the weekend on two drug related charges, and found to be in possession of \$80 of meth he later admitted purchasing, the report said.

The arresting deputy was a self-described 32-plus year law enforcement officer, a member of the High Intensity Drug Trafficking Area Task Force with a history as a drug investigations supervisor and was trained in the "removal and disposal of methamphetamine laboratories."

The brief report detailed a futile back and

Regional Medical Center and Lake City Medical Center; Robert Schmidt, a former Coast Guard member with a history in the private sector as well; and Stacy Tebo, the current town manager for White Springs.

Tebo, who became the White Springs town manager in September 2015, is one of several applicants to boast experience in a neighboring municipality.

Her predecessor, William Lawrence, who held the job from July 2014 to June 2016, is also in the running.

Charles Williams, the current city manager for Jasper, lists Lake City City Attorney Fred Koberlein and Live Oak Mayor Garth "Sonny" Nobles as references in his resume.

Danielle Judd, who served as Alachua's assistant city manager from 2005 to 2010, has since moved on

to become the city manager for Green Cove Springs, but has her eye on the Lake City job.

She is one of 25 applicants who listed a Florida address.

Among the contenders with international work experience is Calvin Anderson, who from 2010 to 2013 worked as an auditor and risk management coordinator with the Ghanzi District Council in Botswana.

The list of current or former military members who applied for the job includes Craig Bennett, who from 2015 to 2017 was a strategic planner for U.S. Northern Command and NORAD in Colorado Springs.

Lawrence McNaul worked as a military intelligence captain from 1989 to 2015, during which time he went on three deployments to support the Global War on Terror.

The resume pool even includes a former state lawmaker — but not from

Florida. John Klimm served in the Massachusetts House of Representatives from 1991 to 1999.

Current Lake City City Manager Wendell Johnson officially leaves office on June 1.

Man 'freaks out' on drug mix, cops say

Lake City police and fire personnel responded to a man in apparent medical distress on the corner SW Main and SW Nassau streets Tuesday evening.

A 20-something white male was lying flat under a palm tree at the entrance of Burger King around 6 p.m.

Store workers said he had been helped to the curbside across Main Street by another man.

Officer Jason Watts was among the first to reach him.

"I said, 'I'm officer Watts from the Lake City Police Department. Can tell me what's goin on,'" said Watts. "He said 'man I bought some marijuana from this guy and I smoked it and I found out it was K2.'"

He was treated by paramedics and

appeared responsive and lastly placed on a stretcher and put in an ambulance.

Watts said K2 had a presence in Lake City.

"A lot of patients that are just laying on the side of the road and

they're just passed out, normally it's that K2 stuff from my experiences," Watts said. "It speeds up their heart really, really fast and it just makes them feel like they're freaking out. It just makes them really anxious."

Southern Lures," Carter said, during a visit to the Lake City Reporter office Monday.

Carter has lure boxes and tackle that indicate the lures were manufactured in Lake City, but he's trying to verify the information.

He's trying to determine whether the lures were made by "jobbers," people that got the lures from bigger companies and copied and sold them locally, or whether it was a company here that actually created the lures.

Carter is asking that anyone with information about the Southern Lure Company contact him at (850) 574-9718 or e-mail him at fandl@comcast.net.

Larry Lee, a Columbia County resident who is also an antique fishing lure collector, is helping Carter as

the two research information for the latest book.

Lee is also a member of the Florida Antique Tackle Club, where he met Carter years ago as they both attended a meeting in Orlando.

"My interest is in Florida lures, but it's lures my family would fish with," Lee said. "I have some of those and some that I go back and try to go back buy and collect some of the old ones that we used to fish with."

Carter's preliminary findings have him hot on the trail of the possible location.

The search will take Carter through genealogy, city and building records, as well as a thorough search of old editions of the Lake City Reporter from the 1930's-1950's.

Carter said he was first introduced to the Southern Lure Company mystery more than 20 years ago. "I've been mostly

focused on Southern Lures that last two years," he said.

The one thing Carter knows is that the lures caught fish and back in the day, that made a difference.

Lee was one of nine kids and when his daddy fished, it made a difference whether they had meat for dinner that night.

"Early fishing lures in Florida, the people who fished with them, if they didn't catch fish, the family didn't eat meat that night," Carter said. "They may not eat anything that night. It was subsistence and survival fishing..."

"Almost every lure maker that I wrote about or researched, they knew that if the lure didn't catch fish, the fishermen wasn't coming back," he continued. "Today's fishing lures, since it's mostly sports fishing, I'm fully convinced the lures are designed more to catch fishermen, rather than catch the fish."

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Coffee shops to display cancer warning

When I think of acrylic, my mind goes to nail salons where they apply hard acrylic to your fingernails... it doesn't go to coffee or potato chips! But this compound is, in fact, almost always present in coffee and potato chips, as well as many other foods such as cereal, French fries, peanut butter... even prune juice.

Acrylamide levels are higher in things that are fried like French fries. Just like frying, toasting can produce acrylamide that's why dark toast is worse for you than light toast, as are well-down has browns, versus lightly browned ones... basically the darker (more cooked) areas on your food tend to have more acrylamide. Coffee is high in acrylamide and that's why coffee

shops are facing scrutiny now. I'd like a Vanilla Latte, double-shot, extra whipped cream, no acrylamide.

of California. I am confident this cancer-causing acrylamide problem won't even impact their sales...not even a dollar! Coffee lovers aren't going to run because we, as a nation, are fairly desensitized to toxins by now. Nobody cares if meat contains 28 different ingredients, aside from meat. Nobody cares if blueberry cereal doesn't have real blueberries in it, but rather purple goo. Nobody cares if French fries are fried in disgusting oil. These are the foods that are the highest in acrylamide, so you'll want to avoid or minimize these:

French fries and potato chips
Grains like pasta
Breakfast cereal
Darkly toasted bread or bagels

Certain cookies
Lightly roasted coffee beans
Peanut, almond or sunflower butter

How hearing loss affects stranded animals

GAINESVILLE — Several years ago, University of Florida aquatic animal veterinarian Michael Walsh, D.V.M., noticed a concerning pattern among some stranded dolphins after they had been rescued. Both of the dolphins returned to the beach again once they had been released back into the wild.

"I worked with two animals, one directly, that showed numerous behavioral problems while in rehab," said Walsh, a clinical associate professor of aquatic animal health at the UF College of Veterinary Medicine.

"We weren't able to test the first dolphin's hearing, but the second animal was tested at Mote Marine Laboratory and found to be

totally deaf. This suggested that the problem of adapting to new environments might be hearing-related and might be more common than we had initially thought," he said.

When Megan Strobel, D.V.M., then a first-year veterinary medical student at UF, went to Walsh, her faculty mentor, in 2013 to discuss a possible research project, he suggested that she might compare hearing capacity and behavior changes in wild and facility-housed dolphins. The result of their collaboration, which also involved numerous other individuals and organizations, was a study that appeared in December in the *Journal of Zoo and Wildlife Medicine*.

The study found that stranded animals with hear-

ing deficits showed markedly different behaviors than their counterparts with normal hearing and concluded that hearing assessments should be routinely administered as part of regular health examinations in all animals under human care.

Hearing is the primary sense of odontocete cetaceans, also known as toothed whales, which include dolphins, porpoises and all other whales possessing teeth. Currently, little empirical information on the relationship between odontocetes and hearing loss reaches those taking care of the animals, the researchers said.

Hearing loss in odontocetes can be caused by loud noises, parasites, trauma and medical issues such as infection, just as it can

in humans. But the loss of sonar capability, which relies on hearing, is especially difficult and traumatic for the wild individual, Strobel said.

"How often when you go

to the doctor do you have your hearing tested? You have to do that separately," Walsh said. "If we recognize that all animals will lose hearing over time, then putting technology such as

the auditory evoked potential test we used into their health exams as they get older will help everyone understand how their sensory systems are doing."

For animals that have grown up in facilities, the environment is known and their daily lives are somewhat predictable, Walsh said.

"But if you change the environment on a deaf animal, it's similar to changing the environment on a human individual," he said. "They have to give more effort to understanding the new environment and what it means."

The researchers felt it was important to educate caretakers about challenges the animals face in situations where hearing deficits in older animals or deafness may result in behavior that is misunderstood.

Concussions: Fast action means quicker recovery

GAINESVILLE — In the warrior ethos that permeates sports, athletes sometimes shake off injuries and stay in the game. It's considered a measure of toughness.

It also is the worst step a concussed athlete can take, according to UF Health researchers who have found that immediately getting medical care reduces concussion symptoms and ultimately gets the player back in action sooner.

An analysis of 506 sports-related concussions among college athletes in 18 sports found that those who ceased their activities once they were injured missed about three fewer days of competition than those who delayed reporting their injuries.

Prompt reporting also reduced concussion symptoms by two days and decreased the likelihood of missing more than two weeks of sport participation by 39 percent. The findings were published online March 20 in *The American Journal of Sports Medicine*.

While current guidelines call for athletes who suspect they have a concussion to immediately stop playing and get an evaluation, this and other studies have shown that as many as 60 percent of them don't disclose their injury or stop playing right away, for a multitude of reasons.

The findings make clear that athletes who "tough it out" are actually delaying their recoveries, said James R. Clugston, M.D., a UF associate professor of medicine and UF Athletic Association team physician.

"We've always had concerns about athletes hiding concussion symptoms. This

gives athletes greater incentive to be more frank in letting the sports medicine staff know that there may be something wrong. The sooner you tell us about concussion symptoms, the sooner you get back to your sport," he said.

To establish their findings, Clugston and his collaborators analyzed concussion data from August 2014 to September 2016 among athletes at 25 universities and military service academies involved in the National Collegiate Athletic Association and the Department of Defense's Concussion Assessment, Research and Education, or CARE, Consortium. After controlling for other factors in a statistical model, they found that lost competition time and the duration of concussion symptoms were directly related to when athletes stopped their activity.

"It's important to recognize and report concussion-related symptoms immediately. The faster you allow a medical team to make a diagnosis, the better your chances for a shorter recovery," said Breton M. Asken, a doctoral student and lead author of the paper.

The findings also apply to more than just football: Concussion-related data from college athletes in sports such as swimming, softball, tennis and field hockey were part of the study. Clugston said the findings also suggest it is important to have someone available during sport activities to whom athletes can report potential concussion issues.

"Coaches are getting better at recognizing concussion symptoms, but it's not fair to put it all on them. Athletes need someone like a certified athletic trainer to do an evaluation and decide whether or not they should be removed from competition," Asken said.

TODAY IN HISTORY

On this date:

In 1689, William III and Mary II were crowned as joint sovereigns of Britain.

In 1865, President Abraham Lincoln spoke to a crowd outside the White House, saying, "We meet this evening, not in sorrow, but in gladness of heart." (It was the last public address Lincoln would deliver.)

In 1921, Iowa became the first state to impose a cigarette tax, at 2 cents a package.

In 1996, 7-year-old Jessica Dubroff, who'd hoped to become the youngest person to fly cross-country, was killed along with her father and flight instructor when her plane crashed after takeoff from Cheyenne, Wyoming.

This column may cost me my barber, but that's OK. It's a story that needs to be told.

Louise "Miss Wezzie" Huelskamp shuts me down hard every time I suggest a nice feature about all her charitable work for veterans and others, including cancer patients.

She wants to store her treasure in heaven, not on earth (see Matthew 6:19-20). I tell her not to hide her light under a bushel (Matthew 5:15-16), leaving us at impasse.

I chose to speak of her in this space, as her story cannot go untold.

There aren't many people like Wezzie.

She got her name 30 or so years ago when a young boy at a school where she volunteered couldn't pronounce "Miss Louise." He called her Wezzie (though he really meant Weezie) and it stuck, even the spelling.

She's been a hairstylist all her adult life and still does it a few days a week, though she doesn't need the money.

Besides, people come to Wezzie for a whole lot more than a haircut.

In her shop any given day you'll find only her closest friends — even if they didn't know who she was when they walked in.

Things become personal very early on, if that's how they want it.

One customer whose hair is just growing back after chemo will ask for advice in that regard and Wezzie kindly obliges. She knows

about cancer herself in the most personal way possible.

It's not unusual to see somebody grab a broom and start sweeping up hair before Wezzie has a chance to. She doesn't expect it but she doesn't object. These are her friends, and they do it because they want to.

She wants to store her treasure in heaven, not on earth (see Matthew 6:19-20). I tell her not to hide her light under a bushel (Matthew 5:15-16), leaving us at impasse.

Wezzie is beloved beyond measure in the veterans' community. It's not widely known, but she cuts veterans' hair for free every week at the VA.

Plus hundreds turned out for the Veterans Day event she sponsored last November at the fairgrounds, "Honoring Those Who

Served." She got help from the business community but paid a good portion of the tab out of her own pocket, which she didn't mind at all.

It's not all sweetness and light.

Wezzie is unrelenting in making known her views on issues of real importance to city and county taxpayers, especially when local officials have gone astray.

One such individual plopped himself down in her chair for a haircut one day even though he didn't appear to need one.

Wezzie saw right through him and ordered him out of her shop. All he really wanted was to stir up trouble, she said.

Wezzie is headstrong, and there exist folks who don't think highly of her.

But she brings people together more than drives them apart. She puts people together, you might say, and in more ways than one.

She is a great social matchmaker, always looking to help folks make new friends. When you visit her shop you always meet somebody new and interesting.

She puts folks together in a different way as well. I think her aim is to make them whole and give them peace, whatever their burden. I think sometimes she succeeds.

She is loud, funny and a friend to all who accept her as she is.

Lake City is lucky to have Wezzie.

Fear and loathing of John Bolton

If John Bolton frightens the nation's enemies half as much as he frightens Chicken Little and all the Democrats at home, all the strife, evil and deceit in the world will soon be history. Vladimir Putin and Kim Jong-un will lie down with the lion and not have to worry about being the midnight snack.

Mr. Bolton's critics call him blunt, impolite and a "reactive saber-rattler," and it's true that he does not speak in the dulcet tones and soft words Washington expects from the State Department types who think their job is to see how far weakness can go, to fritter away as many of the nation's advantages in the name of co-operation, penitence and national contrition.

He's a good match for Donald Trump. Neither man cultivates a flaccid front, either for himself or for the nation. Mr. Bolton once had the bad manners to write a book called "Surrender is Not an Option." The very title was an affront to every nation that aspires to be an enemy of the United States.

Bluster is an effective weapon in the hands of someone who knows how to use a weapon. Mr. Bolton, like the president, has never been interested in being polite to the imams in Tehran or to Rocket Man in Pyongyang. He has never been a fan of nation-building, particularly when it means dismantling the nation and everything about it, from its history, culture, even its religion. He's not a fan because it can't be done.

He told an interviewer in London

more than a decade ago, in the wake of the war in Iraq, that he didn't think democracy in Iraq, which is the best if not always the most efficient system of government, should be considered a relevant American interest. "I don't think there's an American interest in what kind of Iraq emerges from the present circumstance. I think the American interest is in making sure that no part of Iraq be used by terrorists against us."

The president's new national-security adviser served under Presidents Bush father and son, and his blunt style clashed with George W.'s idea of what the world could be, and Mr. Bolton's idea of what the world already is. Mr. Bolton thought George W. was insufficiently hawkish in dealing with North Korea. George W.'s idea, like that of Bill Clinton and Barack Obama, was to smother Rocket Man's father and the ghost of his grandfather under a mush of food and technology that would inspire gratitude and a rush of good feeling.

Reuel Marc Gerecht, a neo-conservative scholar at the Foundation for the Defense of Democracies and a onetime colleague of Mr. Bolton at the American Enterprise Institute, tells Tom Rogan of the Washington Examiner that Mr. Bolton "is not really interested in democracy," but in the binding of American sovereignty and security. Nothing is more important to the survival of the world's greatest and important democracy.

He describes the national-security adviser as "tenacious," and fond of "ruffling feathers." For that he has a singular talent. He seems particularly eager to work with Britain. Anglo-Saxons together, as the French grumble, and all that. He told a Fox News interviewer, who had suggested that the United States should distance itself from the aggressive British response to the Russian poisoning of a former spy and his daughter as they sat peaceably on a park bench, that no, Britain should get even tougher. Prime Minister Theresa May should expel not only the Russian ambassador but the entire diplomatic staff in London, shutter the embassy and close all the Russian consular offices in Britain.

That's pretty tough, though suggesting something and actually doing it are two different things. But bluster has its uses. Donald Trump's bluster against Rocket Man and the North Korean government, conducted over a period of weeks when the Democrats and the pundits exhausted the capital's inventory of smelling salts, was followed by Pyongyang's asking for tickets to the Olympics in South Korea and then for a meeting with President Trump.

That meeting has now been pushed off to June, and this gives the president and his new national-security adviser time to tune the piano. Neither man knows how to lead from behind. It should be interesting.

forth between Rohe and the deputy, with Rohe's effort to evade a search after the officer grew suspicious to the contents of his left rear jeans pocket.

"The defendant claimed the pants were not his and he didn't know it [meth] was there. His actions made

me believe otherwise," the deputy stated as probable cause.

The exchange occurred just after 11 a.m. Saturday when he spotted a blue Chevrolet HHR parked outside a motel off U.S. Highway 441 south, and recognized it from previous incidents, the report said.

The vehicle Rohe and two women were in was report-

edly known by the deputy to belong to a "methamphetamine suspect."

The report said he approached the driver's side of the vehicle and talked with women, noting Rohe was in the back seat.

He asked permission to search Rohe, and if he had weapons or drugs on him, the report said.

Rohe was compliant,

but according to the deputy he was too compliant when it came to insisting he hand the deputy his wallet, versus the deputy retrieve it.

"When I arrived at his left rear jeans pocket, he advised he would get it out. Referring to a wallet in that pocket. He removed it and I conducted a brief search of it. I was suspicious of this offer and felt

he did not want me to find something in that pocket. I felt he was attempting to negate the need for me to enter that pocket," his statement said.

It's where he reportedly found the substance that landed Rohe in Columbia County Sheriff's Office on \$6,000 bond.

"He attempted to go into that pocket with his hand. I grasped his hand to pre-

vent evidence tampering. I looked into the pocket and confirmed my belief," the report stated.

In the vehicle CCSO also reported finding a glass meth pipe, and one of the women was found in possession of a needle with a "broken plunger head."

At jail Rohe admitted purchasing the drugs for \$80, the report said.



Trump honors champion Crimson Tide at White House

President calls title game victory a 'win for the ages.'

WASHINGTON — President Donald Trump hailed the University of Alabama football team's "win for the ages" in their latest championship season.

Trump hosted Crimson Tide coach Nick Saban and his players at the White House on Tuesday to honor their fifth national title in nine years.

The president attended

the championship game in Atlanta, in which Alabama staged a second-half comeback to defeat Georgia 26-23 in overtime. Trump said backup quarterback Tua Tagovailoa's winning touchdown pass in overtime to fellow freshman DeVonta Smith after a sack "will go down as one of the most exciting finishes in college football history — of any sport."

Trump watched the Jan. 8 game from a private box overlooking the Alabama sideline. The president left the stadium during halftime as Georgia led Alabama 13-0.

Trump said Alabama's

triumph was "one of the greatest victories ever."

Attorney General Jeff Sessions, a former Alabama senator, was among those on the South Lawn for the team visit.

Trump praised Saban's "Process" for success and said the coach could "make a lot of money" if he were able to sell the formula.

"In the national championship game, you stuck to 'The Process,' even when it was looking pretty tough," the president said. "I was watching. I said, 'Coach, not looking too good.' Down 13-to-nothing at

Kansas, N.C. State mentioned in NCAA case

NEW YORK (AP) — Kansas and North Carolina State are the latest schools to be swept up in a bribery scandal involving college basketball.

A rewritten federal indictment released Tuesday in New York alleges that an Adidas officials paid parents of athletes willing to commit to the schools.

Prosecutors say an Adidas representative agreed to pay \$90,000 to the family of a Kansas recruit and \$40,000 to a recruit at North Carolina State.

Prosecutors say money helped secure the players' commitments to play college basketball at the schools and ensured the North Carolina State recruit signed an Adidas sponsorship deal when he entered the NBA. He entered the draft last June.

In the Kansas case, the student-athlete made a surprise announcement last August to attend the school.

Miami's Larranaga agrees to 2-year extension

CORAL GABLES (AP) — Miami Hurricanes coach Jim Larranaga has agreed to a two-year contract extension through the 2023-24 season.

The 68-year-old Larranaga has a 161-79 record in seven seasons at Miami, including 75-49 in the Atlantic Coast Conference. He has led the Hurricanes to four NCAA Tournaments, including two trips to the Sweet 16.

The extension comes months after an FBI investigation into college basketball became public and raised questions about Larranaga's relationship with Adidas, which has a sponsorship deal with the school. Larranaga says he did nothing wrong.

NBA PLAYOFFS: Seeding

Spurs, Pelicans, Thunder all in; 1 spot left in West race

A look at the NBA playoff picture, with two days remaining in the regular season and now only one berth left to be decided:

THE SCENARIOS

The NBA says there are 56 possible seeding scenarios still in play going into the final two days of the regular season.

All but one of the 16 playoff spots have been clinched, with the Minnesota-Denver game on Wednesday deciding the final berth in the post-season. But going into Tuesday, the next-to-last day of the regular season, only five of the 16 seeds have been wrapped up.

The Portland-Utah winner on Wednesday will finish No. 3 in the Western Conference, but if the Jazz lose they could fall as far as No. 7 depending on the outcome of other games.

San Antonio, Oklahoma City and New Orleans could all be anywhere from fourth through eighth in the West. Minnesota would finish anywhere from fifth through eighth if it tops Denver, and the Nuggets — if they beat the Timberwolves — will be fifth, sixth or seventh.

Houston is No. 1 in the West, followed by Golden State at No. 2. The clinched East seeds are No. 1 Toronto, No. 2 Boston and No. 5 Indiana.

Philadelphia and Cleveland will be No. 3 and No. 4 in the East, in some order. Going into Tuesday, Milwaukee, Miami and Washington all could finish either sixth, seventh or eighth in the East.

WEST UPDATE

The playoffs start Wednesday.

Officially, that's not true. But the Denver at Minnesota game on Wednesday night may as well be considered a play-in game: Winner moves on, loser goes home.

Monday started with four spots available out West, and ended with only one still unclaimed. New Orleans, San Antonio and Oklahoma City all won to clinch their playoff berths — the Spurs doing so for the 21st consecutive year, tying Portland for the sec-

ond-longest run in NBA history and moving one shy of tying Philadelphia's league record (which started when the 76ers were the Syracuse Nationals).

The funny part about Monday's triple-clinchings is that nothing changed in the standings. The order of the top eight remains the same, going into the next-to-last day of the regular season.

It won't stay that way. Get ready for craziness. Oklahoma City can remain No. 7 in the West, but only if it loses to Memphis (and a lot of other things happen).

All we really know is this: Wednesday night will be great fun.

EAST UPDATE

Cleveland won the Central Division and locked Indiana into the No. 5 seed with a win at New York.

Milwaukee is now up to No. 6 in the East, flip-flopping spots with now-No. 7 Miami. The Bucks beat Orlando, while the Heat could get nothing going and got routed in the fourth quarter on the way to losing to the Thunder.

The Bucks wrap up No. 6 with a win at Philadelphia on Wednesday night. But the 76ers will go into the final day with a chance at the No. 3 spot, regardless of whether they win in Atlanta on Tuesday.



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NHL PLAYOFFS: Western Conference Preview

Change of the guard reflected out West

The Predators have the Presidents' Trophy, and the NHL-expansion Golden Knights carry the buzz entering the Western Conference playoffs, which have the potential of resembling nothing from the past.

So step aside Chicago, which missed the playoffs for the first time in nine years, and say bye to the Blues, whose six-year playoff run is over.

The changing of the West's guard begins at the top, where Nashville clinched its first Central Division title by running away with the league's best record. And then there's Vegas, which broke every measureable NHL expansion record for success by going 51-24-7 to win the Pacific Division.

Add in the talent-laden Winnipeg Jets, making their franchise's third playoff appearance, and youth-filled Colorado Avalanche, who clinched their second berth in eight years, and it results in three of four first-time postseason matchups: Nashville versus Colorado, Vegas versus Los Angeles and Winnipeg facing Minnesota.

The fourth matchup has Anaheim facing San Jose for only the second time after the Ducks eliminated the Sharks in six games during a 2009 first-round series.

Of the eight teams, only three have won the Stanley Cup (Colorado, Anaheim and Los Angeles), while two have never won a playoff game (Vegas and Winnipeg, formerly Atlanta).

The weight of expectations falls mostly on the

Predators, who won't be underestimated a year after the eighth-seeded team's surge to the Final ended in a six-game loss to Pittsburgh. It was a run Nashville began against Chicago in becoming the first team to sweep a No. 1 seed in the opening round since the current playoff format was set in 1994.

"I think our guys are well aware of what went on last year," Predators coach Peter Laviolette said. "For me, this group is looking down the tunnel at something, and all that other stuff is noise."

That's not to say Laviolette didn't play the "everyone's picking Chicago" card as motivation a year ago.

"I might have used it," he said with a wink. The Avalanche know their history, with forward Gabriel Landeskog listing how several No. 8 seeds have made deep playoff runs, including the 2012 Cup champion Kings.

"Anything can happen in the playoffs. That's kind of the mindset we've had," Landeskog said of the Avalanche, who enjoyed a 47-point turnaround after finishing last a year ago. "This is a big accomplishment to make after such a tough season. We're not done."

PREDATORS vs AVALANCHE

Nashville finished seventh in the league with 261 goals without any player scoring 30. The Predators' balanced attack is fueled by a group of speedy, play-making defensemen who combined for a league-best 206 points (56 goals, 150 assists). Pekka Rinne went 42-13-4 to finish third in victories, and his 2.31 goals-against average was

third among goalies playing 40 or more games.

Though Nashville has won 10 straight against Colorado, beware of the Presidents' Trophy curse. Of the 31 teams to finish first since 1986 when the trophy was established, only eight have won the Cup, the last being Chicago in 2013.

Nathan MacKinnon entered the MVP discussion by leading Colorado with 97 points, including a league-leading 12 game-winning goals. Colorado tied with Arizona with the youngest roster at 25.8 years old.

GOLDEN KNIGHTS vs KINGS

A Golden Knights team put together with other teams' discards spent the season using a "why not us?" mantra in setting expansion-team records for most wins (51), home wins (29), road wins (22) and longest point streak (10-0-2). Vegas features six 20-goal-scorers, including trade-deadline addition Tomas Tatar.

The Golden Knights closed the season 6-3-2, with the regulation losses coming against non-playoff teams: Arizona, Edmonton and Calgary. Marc Andre-Fleury went 29-13-4, but allowed six goals on 18 shots in a season-ending 7-1 loss at Calgary.

The defensive-minded Kings allowed a league-low 202 goals and had the league's best penalty-killing unit. Jonathan Quick's 2.40 goals-against average was sixth among goalies appearing in 40 games

JETS vs WILD

The Jets closed their most successful season in

both victories and points on a 20-5-1 run, including winning the final nine home games. Winnipeg is still searching for its first playoff victory after being swept in two previous appearances: by Anaheim in 2015, and by the Rangers in 2007, when Jets were based in Atlanta.

Paul Stastny's trade-deadline addition provided the NHL's second-best offense with six 50-plus point producers. Third-year goalie Connor Hellebuyck went 44-11-9, and broke the single-season record for victories by U.S.-born goalies set by Tom Barrasso.

The Wild limp into their sixth straight playoff appearance with defenseman Ryan Suter (broken right ankle) and Jared Spurgeon (torn right hamstring) sidelined, though Spurgeon is expected back from a 17-game absence in this series. Eric Staal's 76 points (42 goals, 34 assists) were third-most in team history

DUCKS vs SHARKS

The Ducks earned home-ice advantage with a 3-0 season-ending win over Arizona, coupled with the Sharks' season-ending 6-3 loss to Minnesota. Anaheim went 25-10-4 since the bye break, and is 14-1-2 at home since Jan. 23. Goalie John Gibson went 21-7-3 in his final 31 decisions, but missed the final week and is listed day to day with an upper body injury.

The Sharks went 19-13-3 over their final 35 games since Joe Thornton was sidelined with a knee injury. Martin Jones allowed five goals on 19 shots against Minnesota, and is 1-4 in his past five while allowing 17 goals.

Stamkos eyes return for 1st round vs Devils

TAMPA — Steven Stamkos is back on the ice, eager to lead the Tampa Bay Lightning into the NHL playoffs.

The five-time All-Star missed the last three games of the regular season with a lower-body injury. He returned to practice this week and hopes to be ready Thursday for the start of a first-round series against the New Jersey Devils.

"It was obviously tough," said Stamkos, who watched the Lightning go 2-0-1 down the stretch to hold off the Boston Bruins for the Atlantic Division title and No. 1 seed in the Eastern Conference.

"You want to be in those games. But the more important games are now, and I just want to make sure I feel as good as possible heading into the playoffs," the team's second-leading scorer added. "Hopefully it keeps progressing and

I can feel good come Thursday."

Stamkos, a two-time Rocket Richard Trophy winner, rebounded from missing most of last season with a knee injury to bolster the NHL's most prolific offense with 27 goals and a career-high 59 assists for 86 points in 78 games.

The 28-year-old center anticipates a tough matchup against the young Devils, who won all three regular-season meetings between the teams.

"It doesn't really matter where you finish (in the standings) any more. All these other teams are their own different animals come playoff time," Stamkos said. "It's a fresh start once you get into the playoffs. Regular season is regular season. We all know that."

Stamkos' health figures as a key to the series. He missed 65 games after under-

going surgery to repair a lateral meniscus tear in his right knee last season, when the Lightning narrowly missed the playoffs. Two years ago, a blood clot discovered near his collarbone sidelined the center from late in the regular season until Game 7 of the Eastern Conference Finals, when Tampa Bay lost to eventual Stanley Cup champion Pittsburgh.

The Lightning didn't practice Tuesday, but coach Jon Cooper said the team remained hopeful of having Stamkos back for Game 1 against the Devils.

Stamkos is optimistic, too, though with his history of injuries in recent seasons he has no illusions about being completely healthy when he returns.

"Listen, my body will never be 100 percent, regardless, going through the stuff I've been through," the No. 1 overall pick from the 2008 draft said. "So there's no point asking about percentages."

Venus, Serena Williams join Billie Jean King equal pay push

A day before playing in the 2005 final at the All England Club, Venus Williams addressed a meeting of the Grand Slam Board, urging Wimbledon and the French Open to offer equal pay to male and female players.

"I said: 'All of our hearts beat the same. When your eyes are closed, you really can't tell, next to you, who's a man and who's a woman.' And (I asked them) to think about their daughters and their wives and sisters. How would they like them to be treated?" Williams

recalled. "Sometimes, we lose track of, and don't even realize, our own bias and our own prejudice. And we have to confront ourselves."

The following afternoon, she won one of her seven major singles championships. About 1½ years later, Wimbledon announced it would, indeed, offer the same prize money to men and women in all rounds of the tournament, and the French Open soon followed suit, eliminating the pay gap at the four majors.

Now, Williams and her sister, Serena, are adding their names and voices to the push for equal pay

across all types of jobs that the Billie Jean King Leadership Initiative (BJKLI) is championing.

The two current tennis stars are joining the advisory board of the group founded by the former player, and Tuesday's announcement was timed to coincide with Equal Pay Day, which approximates how far into a new year a woman must work to earn what a man made by the previous Dec. 31.

"Venus, in particular, helped us get equal prize money in the majors. She was amazing. She really got Wimbledon to make the big step," King said in a telephone interview.

"Venus has always had the courage to step up. And Serena's the same way. They step up. I mean, Serena is not afraid to say whatever is on her mind."

Added King: "They've been through a lot themselves, so they totally understand what's going on. The two of them have transcended sports. The BJKLI is not about sports. It's about every industry. To try to get equal pay for equal work, and that means across the board, from CEOs down to entry level."

Her group was formed in 2014, and other advisory board members include 2003 U.S. Open champion Andy Roddick,

former NBA player Jason Collins, singer Elton John and CNN's Christiane Amanpour.

It was a pretty easy sell for King to add the Williams siblings, owners of a combined 30 Grand Slam singles titles, along with another 14 they've won together in doubles.

"We always put our hands up for Billie. We love her. She has a tremendous history, not just in women's tennis, but in leading rights for people, in general, no matter who they were," Venus Williams said. "Billie could be at the point in her life now where she could say, 'Hey, I'm going to sit back

and enjoy my life.' But she's still working hard for others. And that's a prime example for every single person. Your work on this earth never ends, as long as there is inequality."

King, for her part, looks at the Williams sisters as among those who can carry on the work she started decades ago.

"I am in my 70s, so I am looking to younger people to take up the mill as I phase out over time," King said. "I've got energy right now, so we're teeing everything up so we're in great shape for the legacy of the BJKLI, because I want it to have a life after I'm out of here."
