## Gilchrist deputies slain in restaurant

Were shot through front window while eating lunch.

Two Gilchrist County Sheriff's Deputies were eating a late lunch at a Chinese restaurant in Trenton when a gunman walked to the window, shot and killed them both, then returned to his vehicle and shot himself around 3 p.m. Thursday, sources at the scene said.

Dead are Sgt. Noel Ramirez and Deputy Taylor Lindsey.

The shooter was identified late Thursday as John Hubert Highnote, 59, of Bell. He is also dead.

No further information on Highnote was available Thursday.

Behind the crime scene tape, two bullet holes could be seen in the window of Ace China Restaurant.

Parked along the side of the building with a tarp over its driver side and a shattered driver side window sat an older model white Jeep.

"As fellow deputies responded to the scene, they found the shooter deceased outside the business," an initial press release from the Alachua County Sheriff's Office stated.

Witnesses said the shooter's body was still in the vehicle around 7 p.m., believed dead from a self-inflicted gunshot wound.

One bullet hole was visible in the driver side window.

"The only thing these men were guilty of was

## City narrows manager field to 13 — for now

Mayor: Lower-ranked candidates are still eligible.

The City Council has decided to move forward with background checks

and other necessary preliminary requirements as they consider choosing the next city manager from their aggregate list of the 13th highest ranked candidates.

However, Mayor Stephen Witt said that list will not bind the council and any one of the 54 appli-

cants that applied for the job could still be considered for the position.

When he asked whether the council wanted to add any other candidates for a background check during a special city council meeting Thursday night, council members did not suggest any names.

Instead they unanimously adopted a timeline for Michele Greene, City Human Resources Director, to contact the applicants, verify they're still interested in the position and verify the education and employment histories on their resumes.

City council members

plan to have two days of interviews during the week of June 4-8. The candidates that will be interviewed will be announced May 9, according to the suggested timeline.

The candidates that will be considered are: Joseph

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# BOCC cool to opioid lawsuit

Pharmacies are off-limits if Columbia County decides to file a lawsuit over the money it spent combating the opioid crisis, multiple county commissioners said Thursday evening.

Rod Smith of the Avera & Smith law firm, part of a larger coalition seeking to get local governments across the East Coast to pursue litigation over the opioid crisis, made a case for why the County Commission should sue drug manufacturers, distributors and local “pill mill” doctors to recover what taxpayers spent on law enforcement, health care, court costs and any other expenses.

“It’s a national problem, it’s a state problem, it’s a local problem,” Smith said.

Smith addressed concerns that he wants the county to sue local pharmacies.

“We’re not about the local drug store,” he said. “I want to make it very clear.”

Smith’s firm would work on contingency, taking

between 10 and 25 percent of the settlement or damages.

A single court in Cleveland is handling hundreds of federal lawsuits, and an influx of state-level litigation is probably coming down the pipeline, Smith said.

“The question is, are you going to be on board?” Smith asked commissioners.

Commissioner Ron Williams asked if the county can just target manufacturers and distributors, leaving local pharmacists and doctors out of it.

“Why don’t you just go directly at them?” Williams asked.

The county needs to name at least one local “bad actor” if it wants to take the case before a local judge and jury, which would be advantageous, Eric Romano of the Romano Law Group in West Palm Beach told the board.

“For example, a pill mill doctor,” Romano said.

The local doctor would most likely be someone who has been convicted

of an offense investigated by regulatory authorities, Romano said.

But the big fish would be the manufacturers and distributors.

Commissioner Rusty DePratter expressed concern that the litigation would indirectly affect local businesses.

“You don’t think this’ll trickle back down to them?” DePratter asked.

Romano said it’s possible a local pharmacy could be indirectly affected, but he’s never heard of such an occurrence.

DePratter said he won’t vote for a plan to sue local pharmacies.

“I don’t think that’s fair,” he said. “... We’re a small community here, I think I know half the pharmacists in town.”

The commission has the final say in who would be named as a target, said County Attorney Joel Foreman.

Barney Bishop of the Florida Smart Justice Alliance delivered statistics on the opioid epidemic, saying 14 Florida residents

die from the drugs each day. Commissioner Everett Phillips asked if anyone in Columbia County has ever overdosed on an opioid.

Bishop said that will have to be researched if the county chooses to go forward with the lawsuit.

Phillips responded.

“You’re here to get money from somebody in Columbia County and you don’t know if anybody has overdosed or not?” he asked.

Williams said he understands the opioid crisis and agrees that drug manufacturers and distributors have misled the public and doctors about the dangers of the drugs.

“There is a need to punish those that have done that in Columbia County,” he said.

But Williams said local pharmacies and law-abiding doctors have to be left out of the lawsuit.

“That’s the only way I would even think about supporting it,” he said.

## \$8 million loan will go to cost of new jail

An \$8 million loan the county took out to finance a new administration headquarters will now instead go toward construction of a new jail.

Commissioners backed out of the administration building plan earlier in April, but had already secured the loan, leading to a vote Thursday to decide how to spend the money.

An architect from Gainesville-based firm Brame Heck Architects on Thursday evening presented the County Commission with an analysis of the various plans for a new administrative building on April 5, but the board unanimously chose to stay with the status quo — at least until construction of a new county jail is complete.

The county took out the loan from Chase Bank.

The firm hired by the county prepared a feasibility study for designs on Lake Jeffrey Road, Duval Place and Franklin Street for facilities ranging from 45,923 square feet to 52,269 square feet. The price tags range from \$8.5 million to \$13.6 million.

Commissioners ultimately decided to direct staff to renegotiate the county’s lease for a building on West U.S. Highway 90, which

accounts for most of its rent payments.

The county would save roughly \$280,000 per year in rent by having its own facility, County Manager Ben Scott told the Lake City Reporter in November.

About \$180,000 of that goes toward the West U.S. 90 building, which houses the Supervisor of Elections, Economic Development and Tourist Development Council.

Students with a bone to pick with school administration will have ample opportunity to dunk Principal Dennis Dotson, along with a local judge and a community nonprofit leader.

“For some reason these elementary kids love to do the dunk tank,” Decker said.

The Menestrellis are set to perform at 1:30 p.m. and 3:30 p.m., she said.

Previously WES PTO held a similar event in the fall.

“This event used to be held every fall [but] there’s so much going on,” Decker said.

She said their goal was to raise \$15,000 out of the \$25,000 the school needed to provide students with their own computers to work with daily.

“We’re trying to get a 1 to 1 student-computer ratio,” Decker said.

So far she said they’ve sold 170 wrist bands to the event and received about \$10,000 in sponsorship funding.

But with 768 students in what she said was the largest elementary school in the county, she said “We’re really hoping to get to the \$15,000 mark.”

## Capture fails; monkey euthanized

The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission euthanized a runaway monkey Thursday morning near a Lake City neighborhood after determining the primate posed too much of a public safety risk to attempt capture.

Around 10 a.m., an FWC wildlife investigator armed with a shotgun killed Leo, a snow macaque that had been on the loose in the area around Steedley Drive since Sunday afternoon, said agency spokesperson Karen Parker.

Leo escaped his enclosure at a private home with another snow macaque and two capuchin Monkeys during a storm, but FWC officers found the other three within hours.

For nearly four days, FWC officers tried to tranquilize or trap Leo, Parker said.

“They had exhausted all avenues,” she said. “They really went above and beyond trying to catch the monkey.”

FWC consulted the owner, who was concerned about the monkey being spotted in people’s yards, Parker said.

“It really was a public safety issue,” she said.



If Leo had run free for too long, he might have become feral.

“He was in an unusual situation,” she said. “He was probably frightened, there’s no telling how he could have reacted to that.”

The owner, who has all necessary permits to keep the monkey and passed an inspection with no violations in March, agreed that the Leo needed to be put down, Parker said.

“All of us were upset,” Parker said. “Nobody wanted to have that happen.”

mances at the University of Scranton, Wingate University, New York City's St. Thomas Episcopal Church and Cathedral Church of St. John the Divine, and the Hall of Philosophy in Mt. Gretna, Pa.

An avid composer, Ficarrri has seen his music performed across the country. His Suite No. 1 for Organ was premiered by organist David Ball this year and featured on WQED, Pittsburgh's classical music radio station. In addition, Ficarrri's May the Lord Bless You and Keep You for choir, violin, and organ received several performances in New York City last spring. Many of his compositions and arrangements have arisen in service of musical collaboration—these include his original organ and piano duet arrangements of music by Rachmaninoff, Shostakovich, and Guilment, prepared for performance with pianist Anna Han, and Ficarrri's Sonata for Piano and Oboe, written for Pittsburgh Symphony Orchestra principal oboe player Cynthia DeAlmeida,

The grief is likely personal for every soul there.

It is hard for a town this small to sustain such a loss. Pray for the families tonight, and for everyone else in Gilchrist County as well.



TODAY IN HISTORY

On this date:

In 1861, Col. Robert E. Lee resigned his commission in the United States Army. (Lee went on to command the Army of Northern Virginia, and eventually became general-in-chief of the Confederate forces.)

In 1863, President Abraham Lincoln signed a proclamation admitting West Virginia to the Union, effective in 60 days (on June 20, 1863).

In 1912, Boston's Fenway Park hosted its first professional baseball game while Navin Field (Tiger Stadium) opened in Detroit. (The Red Sox defeated the New York Highlanders 7-6 in 11 innings; the Tigers beat the Cleveland Naps 6-5 in 11 innings.)

In 1914, the Ludlow Massacre took place when the Colorado National Guard opened fire on a tent colony of striking miners; about 20 (accounts vary) strikers, women and children died.

In 1945, during World War II, allied forces took control of the German cities of Nuremberg and Stuttgart.

In 1968, Pierre Elliott Trudeau was sworn in as prime minister of Canada.

In 1972, Apollo 16's lunar module, carrying astronauts John W. Young and Charles M. Duke Jr., landed on the moon.

In 1988, gunmen who'd hijacked a Kuwait Airways jumbo jet were allowed safe passage out of Algeria under an agreement that freed the remaining 31 hostages and ended a 15-day siege in which two passengers were slain.

In 1999, the Columbine High School massacre took place in Colorado as two students, Eric Harris and Dylan Klebold, shot and killed 12 classmates and one teacher before taking their own lives.

In 2005, President George W. Bush signed a bill making it harder for debt-ridden people to wipe clean their financial slates by declaring bankruptcy.

In 2010, an explosion on the Deepwater Horizon oil platform, leased by BP, killed 11 workers and caused a blow-out that began spewing an estimated 200 million gallons of crude into the Gulf of Mexico. (The well was finally capped nearly three months later, on July 15.)

**F**riedrich Wilhelm "Fred" Zinn flew with the French forces in World War I, then as a captain in the U.S. Army when we entered the war. He was one of the first aerial photographers for reconnaissance and military intelligence. Wounded twice in action, his mission became to find, identify, and bring back missing soldiers to our country, and to their families. He's credited with the idea: "Leave no man behind!"

Another more recent guiding principle in combat: "I've got your back!" Soldiers become dedicated to the idea of taking care of your brother, fellow man — or woman. ## Calm under pressure, pilot saved lives

**A** century after airplanes first took to the skies, the concept of flying confounds. Even though air travel is routine, leaving earth to float in an engine-powered tube still feels — at some level, to most commercial air passengers — mysterious or scary.

Any sense of terror is misplaced. Flying is safer than driving.

Yet mistrust helps explain our fascination with flight, and our dread of air accidents. On Tuesday, a Southwest Airlines 737 headed from New York to Dallas experienced a cataclysmic engine failure, forcing it to divert to Philadelphia. One passenger died, but the captain, a former Navy fighter pilot named Tammie Jo Shults, landed the plane, saving all else aboard.

If this had been a bus that blew an engine, resulting in a single fatality, would cable news networks have interrupted their programming? Would you have read about the hero at the controls? Doubt it. There's no suspense in highway travel. People expect to reach their destination. They don't typically buckle up and say a prayer.

Flying is different because passengers give up control. They don't know what's going on in the cockpit. They can't see much out the window. They are helpless hostages in a science experiment, with nerves on edge because the perceived margin

of error is so small. Any mishap at takeoff, landing or cruising altitude could be fatal. Could be — but probably won't be. While flying may be stressful, and turbulence terrifying, boarding a plane is not inherently dangerous. Before the Southwest incident, the last fatal accident involving a U.S. airline occurred in February 2009.

All was normal on Southwest Flight 1380 until one of its two engines blew apart, spewing shrapnel into the fuselage and a window. The cabin decompressed and a passenger was nearly sucked out of the plane.

Statistically, traveling by car is far more dangerous. Fortune magazine crunched the data this way: Over their lifetimes, Americans have a 1 in 114 chance of dying in a car crash, while the odds of dying in the air, including private flights, are 1 in 9,821. You are also more likely to drown in a pool than die in a plane. There have been several recent plane crashes overseas, but 2017 was the safest year on record globally for commercial air travel, according to a Dutch consulting firm.

All was normal on Southwest Flight 1380 until one of its two engines blew apart, spewing shrapnel into the fuselage and a window. The cabin decompressed and a passenger was nearly sucked out of the plane. Oxygen masks deployed. Those aboard feared for their lives.

A Boeing 737 can fly on a single engine. Shults notified air traffic control. If you want to know who kept calm and focused, it was Capt. Shults, the country's new favorite airline pilot. Here she is declaring an in-flight emergency: Southwest 1380 has an engine fire. Descending. And here she is on approach to Philly: We have part of the aircraft missing so we're going to have to slow down a bit. The controllers, by contrast, sounded frazzled. When changing frequencies, she signed off with a convivial "Good day."

Safety officials, the airline and manufacturers will determine what went wrong with Flight 1380's engine. There will be a meticulous investigation. The result will be a safer industry. You may never fly with Shults, but you are sure to get the next-best thing: a different well-trained pilot in an industry obsessed with safety. So relax and enjoy the flight.

wanting to protect you and me. They just wanted to go get something to eat and they just wanted to do their job," said Gilchrist Sheriff Robert "Bobby" Schultz in an emotional late evening press conference.

Limited information was available from law enforcement officials at the scene of the shooting at the intersection of State Road 26, or Wade and SE 11th Streets.

A main thoroughfare of Trenton was closed down for blocks as the Florida Highway Patrol directed traffic on a detour.

"Today at approximately 3 p.m. the Gilchrist County Sheriff's Office received a 911 call about deputies being down in a local restaurant. Deputies arrived on the scene along with a Trenton public safety officer and they did find two of our deputies deceased," Schultz said.

Schultz said he had just returned from notifying the families of Ramirez, 29, a seven-year law enforcement veteran, and Lindsey, 25, three years with GCSO.

He said he wanted to keep the information at the initial press release focused on the deputies and not the gunman.

He said this was partially to remember Ramirez and Lindsey and to allow the Florida Department of Law Enforcement to investigate.

"I knew both of them personally and I can sit here in front of all of you and tell you that I loved them, that they were loved," Schultz said.

Going through the events that occurred Schultz said, "I was contacted by my communications officer and it was just surreal after doing this for 26 years you know you're just one call away from something tragic like that. ... I got here as fast as I could."

He deferred questions about the murders to Florida Department of Law Enforcement, which was actively investigating the scene of the shooting that had occurred only hours earlier.

He said they had no reason to believe there was more than one shooter.

"What do you expect happens when you demonize law enforcement to the extent that its been demonized," Schultz said. "The world's full of cowards and the world's full of heroes. We need to highlight the heroes and what they gave."

Three men standing across the street at an intersection all said they had lived in the town more than 10 years.

"It doesn't happen here," said Jared Pitts. "I used to be a police officer there I worked with the guys in there."

A worker at the Subway restaurant down street from Ace China Restaurant, where the shooting occurred, said she was on shift when the shooting happened.

Tavia Stecz said her boyfriend works with the GCSO and he was keeping her updated on the shooting that had just happened less than a quarter of a mile from her.

Chairman Tim Murphy and Commissioner Bucky Nash focused on asking questions and gathering information, rather than sharing their views.

Carl Allison, owner of Baya Pharmacy, spoke out against the plan, calling it a "scheme to make money."

"I just don't think this has anything to do with helping the opioid problem," he said.

Strictly speaking, Allison is right, Bishop told the Lake City Reporter after the meeting.

The lawsuit would be about recovering what the taxpayers spent combating the epidemic, not curbing it, Bishop said.

There was no action item related to the proposal, but Foreman encouraged Murphy to place it on an agenda for a vote in the near future.

Helfenberger, Dannielle Judd, Glenn Irby, Danny Lucas, John Klimm, Charles Hammond, David Kraus, Vince Akhimie, William Healy, Lyndon Bonner, Nick Harwell, Michael Brillhart and Jim McCroskey.

City officials did not indicate how many candidates they plan to interview for the position.

During the meeting, public comments were made by two citizens who indicated all the candidate rankings should have been returned at the same time. Rankings

from three council members were turned in Monday, while the other two council members turned their lists in later.

"It definitely created a taint to the process," said Glenel Bowden, who noted the lists of the three candidates appeared in the Lake City Reporter the following day. He said seeing the lists could have possibly influenced the other two council members.

Slyvester Warren, who also addressed the council, said it appeared that there was a Sunshine Law violation and he wanted the council to redo their rankings of the city manager candidates.

Melinda Moses said she had her ranked candidate list available at Monday's meeting, but she kept the list to do more research when she learned all council members were not returning their lists at the meeting.

Greene said although the council had the aggregate list of their ranked candidates, the list does not preclude the council from selecting any applicant for further consideration, though council members choose not to and decided to consider the top ranked 13 for the position.

"This is a temporary list that we're going to examine and do background checks

on and hopefully narrow the list down to do interviews," Witt said following the meeting. "It may not be a final list. It will be what-

ever we decide to do between now and the time we hire. We're still working on it.

"We told Ms. Greene to do the background checks on the 13 candidates and we hope that's going to be our final 13 candidates."

Witt said when the council reconvenes, if council members do not like that

list of candidates, they could potentially start over.

"But that's very highly unlikely," he said.

The top 13 candidates were ranked in those positions based on the each of the council member's opinions, job criteria experience and their resumes.

In the meantime, the process is expected to slow down as the top-ranked 13 are notified and background checks and vetting takes place.

"This is a preliminary background check, not in-depth," Greene said. "We'll have a more intensive background check done when we get down to our last two candidates,

which is what we did last time."

The council also named Grayson Cason as the interim city manager.

Cason has worked as the city's assistant city manager for years, but with Wendell Johnson deciding to leave April 30, Cason will take on the city manager's duties.

"Per city policy, Mr. Johnson will be paid out his leave time by our city policy effective for April 30," Greene said, noting Johnson is on leave for the remainder of this week, but expected to return next week. "He's not on an extended leave, but April 30 will be his final day."

version.

But what many believe is normal sex is abnormal when defined by God's intended purpose for sex in Genesis.

As is the case with all sins, sexual sins, whatever form they take, can be forgiven when one recognizes their sin, and repents, and turns in faith to Jesus Christ for forgiveness. But unbridled sexual passions and practices undermine the stability of the home, the foundational unit of any society, and thereby threaten the very existence of our culture.

Sexual immorality is a greater threat to our national security within, than a nuclear war from without.


## Jaguars unveil 'no-nonsense' uniforms, helmets for 2018

## Armstrong settles \$100M lawsuit with US gov.

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Lance Armstrong has reached a \$5 million settlement with the federal government in a whistleblower lawsuit that could have sought \$100 million in damages from the cyclist who was stripped of his record seven Tour de France victories after admitting he used performance-enhancing drugs throughout much of his career.

The deal announced Thursday came as the two sides prepared for a trial that was scheduled to start May 7 in Washington. Armstrong's former U.S. Postal Service teammate Floyd Landis filed the original lawsuit in 2010 and is eligible for up to 25 percent of the settlement.

Seeking millions spent sponsoring Armstrong's powerhouse teams, the government joined the lawsuit against Armstrong in 2013 after his televised confession to using steroids and other performance-enhancing drugs and methods. Armstrong had already retired, but the confession shattered the legacy of one of the most popular sports figures in the world.

## Giants release receiver Brandon Marshall

EAST RUTHERFORD, N.J. (AP) — The New York Giants have released veteran wide receiver Brandon Marshall.

General manager Dave Gettleman confirmed the move on Thursday during his pre-draft news conference. He says the 34-year-old Marshall failed his physical.

After signing a two-year, \$12 million contract as a free agent a little more than a year ago, Marshall played in five games last season. He was hurt against the Los Angeles Chargers in early October and had season-ending surgery to stabilize his ankle.

## Freney to retire as member of Colts

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — Defensive end Dwight Freney will retire as a member of the Indianapolis Colts on Monday.

Team officials made the announcement Thursday.

Freney was a seven-time Pro Bowler, a three-time first-team All-Pro selection and played in three Super Bowls. He won his only title with the Colts following the 2006 season.

The speed rusher was best known for his trademark spin, a move defensive coaches chided and offensive linemen feared.

Freney was Indy's first-round draft pick in 2002 and stayed through 2012. He is second in Colts' history with 107½ sacks, trailing only Robert Mathis.

He also played with San Diego, Arizona, Atlanta, Seattle and Detroit and is tied for No. 17 in league history with 125½ sacks.

## Reds fire manager Price after 3-15 start to 2018

CINCINNATI (AP) — The Reds' worst start since the Great Depression prompted a quick hook for Bryan Price.

Cincinnati fired its fifth-year manager on Thursday because of a 3-15 start, the first managerial change in the major leagues this season. The Reds hadn't changed managers so early in a season since Tony Perez was fired after 44 games in 1993.

It's the first time since 2002 that a manager has been fired in April, according to ESPN.

## Fulmer signs new deal running through 2021

KNOXVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — Tennessee chancellor Beverly Davenport announced Thursday that Phillip Fulmer has signed a contract that runs through Dec. 31, 2021. The move comes less than five months after Fulmer took over as athletic director amid a tumultuous football coaching search.

Fulmer will receive \$300,000 in annual base compensation plus \$600,000 supplemental pay for personal appearances and media services as well as a \$40,000 expense allowance. He also gets a \$100,000 retention bonus each year. The contract remains in effect through the end of the deal, which could enable him to end up making about \$1 million annually.

inadvertently put up life-size posters of current players wearing the uniforms.

"Obviously that was on (Tom) Coughlin time," said team president Mark Lamping, referring to Coughlin's longtime rule that being on time means being early.

"Your kids get up on Christmas morning and they see those gifts under the tree, you're as excited and surprised as the kids, right?" Lamping added. "We had a lot of people work hard on the uniform unveiling, so channel your young child. We know what's coming, but let's act surprised and excited."

The Nike Vapor Untouchable uniforms feature much cleaner lines, which some might consider plain. They have three jersey and pants options — black, white and teal. The all-teal combination, including matching socks, can only be worn during Thursday night games.

The high-gloss black helmets replace the two-tone widely

mocked the past five years.

"I know the two-tone helmets weren't popular," said Khan, who admittedly failed when he opted for an "edgy" helmet design in 2013.

The 71-year-old Coughlin, the team's executive vice president for football operations, played a leading role in designing the new, throwback look. He said he wanted to see a return to tradition.

The Jacksonville Jaguars announced Thursday they plan to be the first NFL team to have a dog park inside the stadium.

The 2,000-square-foot area, operated by Pet Paradise, will open this fall in the south end zone and feature artificial turf, a pool and palm trees.

Fans can leave their dogs there to go watch the game. Or they can stay in the park with their dogs during the game.

"People are just taking their pets everywhere now," said Fernando Acosta-Rua, president and CEO of Pet Paradise. "Pets are just becoming more and more part of the family, so it's a natural extension to be able to take them wherever you're going."

Pet Paradise is based in Jacksonville and has 34 resorts across the country.

Acosta-Rua says more details, including cost, will be released in the coming weeks.
