

## 'Dragging' incident finally in the books

Despite initial claim, officer jumped in bed of pickup as it fled.

Ten months after a bungled traffic stop and more than two months after the ensuing disciplinary action — and following repeated requests for the material — details have been made public of the fallout for a Lake City Police Department Officer who was reportedly “dragged” by a moving vehicle last July, but was later discovered to have jumped into the bed of a fleeing pickup truck.

Officer Stuart Robinson received a written reprimand for failing to “display reasonable care in the performance of assigned and lawful duties and responsibilities,” according to a disciplinary report signed by LCPD Chief Argatha Gilmore Feb. 27.

On July 6, Robinson was assisting officer Arielle Peterson during a traffic stop at the intersection of U.S. Highway 90 and Sisters Welcome Road.

## Wheel flies off semi, crashes into E. Duval Street office

No one was hurt, says firm's owner.

A Lake City law office was damaged late Friday morning in what can only be described as a freak accident.

Attorney Teresa Morgan, owner of the Morgan Law Clinic on Duval Street in Lake City, was in her office at 11:45 a.m. when one of the wheels from an 18-wheel tractor trailer crashed through an office window, badly damaging the interior.

“There were two of us there at the time, myself and one of my employees,” Morgan said, adding that there were no clients present at the time.

No one was injured during the incident. Morgan said that her understanding was that the driver of the tractor trailer was heading west on US 90 (East Duval

## Body of missing woman found

Grief-stricken daughter: 'I can't put it into words.'

The story of a former Lake City resident has ended tragically in Illinois.

The body of Theresa “Terri” Cox, 56, was found Thursday evening in Springfield, Illinois, as reported by the State Journal Register, Springfield’s local newspaper. She had been reported missing on March 23, and her remains were identified by the Sangamon County Coroner’s Office on Friday. Toxicology tests are pending.

Sangamon County Coroner Cinda Edwards said by telephone that as of Saturday afternoon neither a cause nor manner of death had been determined.

“The toxicology will probably take three weeks or more to get back to us,” Edwards said.

Cox’s daughter, Lindsay Wiggins, also of Lake City, described her mother as “absolutely wonderful.”

“I just can’t put it into words,” she said. “She will really be missed.”

Family members said that, following a report made Thursday evening to police,

Cox’s body was found in a compost bin located in the backyard of Edward Hughes, whose home is located on Springfield’s west side. Family members were in the process of making funeral arrangements as of Friday afternoon, as reported by the SJR.

Cox relocated from Lake City to Springfield in March, due to her father, John Hall, being placed in hospice care, and planned to stay with her mother, Nancy Hall. Following a March 23 incident when Cox reportedly attempted to swallow an entire bottle of muscle relaxant pills, in front of relatives, she got away from them and escaped to a near-

## Bradley says ‘no’ to prison budget hole, ‘maybe’ to reforms

Sticking point remains healthcare for inmates.

TALLAHASSEE — Despite warnings that cuts to substance-abuse pro-

grams and transition services could result in more prisoners behind bars, the Senate appropriations chairman says lawmakers aren’t planning to plug a \$28 million budget gap at the Florida Department of Corrections until next year.

But budget chief Rob Bradley, who

represents Columbia County in the Florida Senate, indicated corrections health-care problems may spur lawmakers to consider criminal-justice reforms that have failed to gain traction in previous years.

Corrections Secretary Julie Jones announced last week she is slash-

ing contracts with nearly three dozen substance-abuse and re-entry providers — programs considered integral to reducing recidivism and helping inmates transition back into society — by at least 40 percent because the

Street) at the time. When the wheel came loose, the tire had to have hit the stop sign near her office, then flown across the parking lot through her office win-

dow. First responders at the scene estimated it had to have been flying through the air at at least 50 to 60 m.p.h.

Morgan said that the driver did not stop during the incident and his or her identity is unknown.

"My husband brought

the wheel home," she said. "The bolt holes were worn and the best we can determine is that the bolts came loose and the wheel came off.

Attempts to obtain additional details from the Lake City Police Department were unsuccessful as of

press time.

Morgan added that she is grateful no one was injured during the accident, and that anyone with information about what happened and who might have been responsible is encouraged to call 386-755-1977.

money is needed to cover the cost of a contract for prison health services.

Lawmakers will begin working after the November elections to prepare for the 2019 legislative session.

"What I would encourage our partners who are facing these cuts to do is to double-down on their efforts to find efficiencies and understand that, when we return in November, this is going to be something that many of us are eager to address," Bradley, R-Fleming Island, told The News Service of Florida on Thursday.

Jones said the cuts, which are already being implemented in time for the July 1 start of the new fiscal year, were necessary because lawmakers did not fully fund the corrections agency, which is running about \$80 million in the red.

The reductions were announced as Jones finalizes negotiations on a renewed contract with prison health-care company Centurion, hired by the secretary in 2016 in an emergency, no-bid agreement after one private vendor quit years before its contract was up and before she fired another vendor.

Contractors that provide substance-abuse and re-entry services to the prison system had hoped the Joint Legislative Budget Commission, a panel of House and Senate members with the power to make funding decisions when the Legislature is not in session, would steer additional funds to the Department of Corrections to avoid the program cuts.

"We're looking at all that stuff right now," House Speaker Richard Corcoran, R-Land O' Lakes, told reporters Wednesday when asked about the cuts.

Corcoran blamed the Senate for the corrections agency's financial woes, saying the House had proposed higher funding but agreed to the Senate position as part of budget negotiations. It's not unusual for the two chambers' early budget proposals to differ, and both the House and Senate eventually signed off on the final budget.

"It's got to be fixed and it will be fixed," Corcoran said of the Department of Corrections funding problems.

But contradicting Corcoran, Bradley said the corrections department — and the affected contractors — will have to live with in the \$2.4 billion budget lawmakers approved for the agency in March during the regular legislative session.

An appropriation of \$437 million was about \$55 million short of what corrections officials estimated they will need for inmate health care, which includes pharmaceuticals, according to documents distributed by the agency last week.

"I think the budget that passed off the floor and was signed by the governor in March is the budget that's going to hold through the next fiscal year," Bradley said.

After the session ended, Jones and Centurion negotiated a 12-month agreement that resulted in the DOC having to spend an extra \$28 million on health care," he said.

Jones is trying to finalize a deal with Centurion, the only company that respond-

ed to an invitation to negotiate with the state for inmate health services. Former prison health-care vendors — such as Corizon Health, which in late 2015 notified the state that it was walking away three years early from a five-year, \$1.2 billion deal — have complained that they lost money on the contracts.

After ordering the cuts to the substance-abuse and reentry programs, Jones is shifting funds within the agency, something she is authorized to do when the Legislature is not in session.

That will ensure that the agency has the money for a new contract with Centurion, department spokeswoman Michelle Gladly told The News Service.

Because Jones intends to award the health-services contract later this month, "we need to continue moving forward with our plan to move the funding from the contracted-services category to the health-services category," Gladly said.

"We need to show that funding is there before we award a contract," she said. Bradley, a lawyer who formerly chaired the Senate Criminal and Civil Justice Appropriations Subcommittee, defended Jones's decision to cut the services, saying she runs the risk of federal intervention if the agency fails to fulfill its "constitutional duty to provide health care services" to inmates.

"That is an unacceptable outcome. The secretary is doing what she believes is necessary to comply with this constitutional mandate," he said.

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


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# 'I just know that it makes their day'

80 baskets for moms, kids in shelters.

If you had to start over with nothing, no one and nowhere to go, what would you need to survive day to day?

That was the question a church secretary asked congregation members collecting items for local women and their children seeking refuge in shelters on Mother's Day.

Janine Flegert is secretary of Lake City Church of Christ.

She learned about the effort from Randy Free, a member of the church and the 32-year owner of a local fencing company.

Free provided 100 pocket bibles for Mother's Day baskets after he saw a request for 80 in a social media post made by Lake City resident Susie Langston.

Langston was closing in on the final leg of her annual Mother's Day project which she conducts through her organization called God's Helping Hands.

She calls it a ministry, and its principle, much like Flegert's, was based on the Golden Rule.

"If it was Mother's Day and I was living in a shelter," Langston said. "It's a special holiday and they're in there with their children and we just wanted them to know that they're not forgotten that God loves them that they do matter in this community."

Free and Flegert were working on a side project filling bowls of necessities to go along with Langston's baskets of goodies for the moms and kids at two shelters.

They were destined for Vivid Visions of Live Oak and Another Way in Lake City.

Langston said her operation is now in its 20th year and 5th year in Lake City.

She said it was operated solely through contributions made from sources like Flegert, Free, church members and the dozens

of online contributors who send in items to her yearly projects from across the country.

Langston calls them "angels."

"It's the community, it's my church and its people from all over the U.S.," she said.

Other than Mother's Day, Langston said she gives backpacks of needed items for homeless and is currently working on a new project to provide them with bug spray.

Langston, 47, is from Tennessee but said she moved to Lake City about five years ago.

"I just know that it makes their day I know that they're happy that they're overjoyed," she said. "I just know from the directors and all that they're very appreciative. You're putting a smile on these ladies faces."

In 1846, the United States declared that a state of war already existed with Mexico.



## 'How sweet the sound ...'

This column was originally published on May 11, 2003.

I remember the day my mother led the church singing. It was awful — and it was beautiful. Awful because she had a screechy singing voice, like Edith Bunker on TV's "All in the Family." Beautiful because she had the compassion to lead the singing knowing she could not sing.

The scene was a little country church, possibly Prospect or Bethel of Bony Bluff. The occasion was a funeral attended by only a dozen or so mourners. I was the only child there.

In my memory, the service was short. Probably just a prayer, an obituary, a brief eulogy, and a short sermon.

The minister probably reminded us that human life is like grass — in time it withers; that human glory is like a flower — in time it fades. Then he probably expressed confidence, or hope, that the deceased was a child of God and would therefore endure forever.

The short sermon ended and the minister asked us to stand and sing a closing hymn. He announced that the deceased had made a deathbed request for "Amazing Grace" to be sung at his funeral.

The minister then asked that someone in our small congregation begin the song. He explained that he was not a song leader and had been unable to provide one.

"Will someone please lead us?"

he asked. Nobody made a sound. "Anyone at all," he said. Nobody moved. "Someone just help us get started," he pleaded. Everybody remained still and quiet.

There was a kind of doom in the air. We were facing a small crisis. Nobody was going to start the singing. Outside, the birds may have been singing but, inside, the minister heard only the sound he dreaded most: silence.

Then it happened. Head down, my shy mother, with her high-pitched screech, started singing, all alone.

"Uh uh maay-zingg grace, How sweet thu-uh sound..." That did it. That got us started. One by one, others joined in until everyone was singing. No piano, no organ. Just human voices quietly echoing throughout the small church.

There we stood, 12 or so tuneless souls, struggling to sing the best we could, but by the last stanza we were all united in singing the most beautiful verse in all hymndom.

"When we've been there ten-thou-

sand years, Bright shining as the sun, We've no less days to sing God's praise than when we first begun."

The song ended and we all remained standing. The minister paused, then looked silently out at us with love, tenderness, and gratitude. Maybe we were all thinking the same thing: "We did it. We sang the man's song for him. We did not let him go to his grave without his song."

And my shy, timid mother had led the singing to be sure we did it.

As we left the little church that day, the words of that powerful, magnificent hymn rang in my young soul. "Amazing grace!" The overwhelming wonder of God's loving mercy toward humankind. "How sweet the sound!" So true. But that day I had also discovered another mighty sweet sound: My mother's singing voice. The memory would forever more be sweet music to my ears.

My mother, Ida Belle English Williams. Born on a remote farm near Fargo, Georgia, and, equipped with just a third grade education, she endured an early life of incredible hardship but she always retained a sweetness of spirit and a love of people. Life span: 78 years, eight months, 26 days.

Of all those days we shared, the one I remember best is the day she led the church singing. In memoriam, Happy Mother's Day, Mama.

## Trump may be right about Iran deal

So, so many are quick to say President Donald Trump made a horrible error in withdrawing from the 2015 Iranian nuclear accord, and some doubts are understandable even as the definitive harumph is nonsense.

The fact is, Trump kept pushing Iran to exhibit peaceful intent, it did not and we are therefore in a situation where its continuing evil is ever more a real peril even if unseen by those who do not want to see.

Iran has been moving ahead to build nuclear weapons. Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu demonstrated as much with 100,000 hidden Iranian documents that Israel found. Critics yawn, but some of those showed Iranian determination to roll ahead with its weaponizing ambition, if at a slower pace.

The deal from the start never said hey, stop everything. It just said doing as much as you were. It let Iran keep its nuclear infrastructure and keep enriching uranium if not by as much. It said Iran could still shoot off those ballistic missiles, obviously meant to transport nukes someday.

All of these appeasement nods would somehow work out, the Barack Obama team said, because we would build better relations with Iran over time and we've got a good inspection regime. According to deal supporters, Iran has majestically lived up to every promise.

False, false and false. Instead of geniality, what we've received from Iran is threats to wipe out Israel, the harassment of the U.S. military to the point of taking hostages and a bloody, terroristic presence in the

Middle East meant to say Iran would soon be in murderous control. The Iranians have at least a day to prepare for any inspection and inspectors are denied any access at all to particularly suspect military bases that Britain, France and Germany agree should be looked at.

As for compliance with the deal, consider some 32 illicit efforts to get foreign technology that have nuclear weaponry implications, at least as reported by a German intelligence agency.

President Barack Obama said the only alternative to the weak-kneed deal was war, and some Trump critics have said his abandonment of the deal could send Iran scurrying to get its nukes, something that would now take about a year as compared to maybe three months before the deal. The thing is, some of the other six countries involved in this are making billions through trade with Iran, and for that reason and others, want to keep their part of the deal intact.

So does Iran because, instead of taking returned billions and putting them into its economy, it put them

into military buildup and support of terrorism. The economy is collapsing, strikes are happening, outright rebellion could be in the offing and the regime could be in peril without that trade. Because of a return of U.S. financial sanctions, none of this will be nearly as profitable on either side as before, however, and Iran may just finally decide that it had better heed some of what Trump wants.

Consider that the Obama deal was comparable to President Bill Clinton's nuke deal with North Korea — all talk, little action — and then consider how Trump's tough stance is just maybe working with North Korea. Ponder how North Koreans recently released three American prisoners as a prelude to talks while the Iranians released no American prisoners until Obama provided a ransom that he and confused supporters said was not a ransom.

Some good has come out of the Iranian deal, such as Iran sending Russia much of its super-enriched uranium while getting all kinds of natural uranium back, but it was Obama who facilitated the U.S. departure. Contrary to the Constitution which he promised to "preserve, protect and defend," he did not get a required treaty that the Senate would have to ratify, but a deal Trump could easily break.

But just maybe improve, too.

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# Crime Stoppers marks 10 years of service

About a year ago, a pair of armed robbers stormed into a local internet cafe and robbed the establishment.

Not only did the robbers take all the cash they could find, but they also shot the two security guards at the business.

By the time authorities arrived at the scene, the robbers were long gone with the loot and security guards could provide little to no information about the suspects.

However, days later, authorities were able to arrest the two suspects.

The major break in the case came from tips provided through the Columbia County Crime Stoppers program.

The Columbia County Crime Stoppers program celebrated its 10th Anniversary Saturday with an event at Darby Pavilion.

Crime Stoppers is a program where people can provide law enforcement with information anonymously for a possible monetary reward. The program is funded through criminal fines from the Crime Stoppers Trust Fund, local fundraising and donations.

Cindy Innocenti, Columbia County Crime Stoppers program director and treasurer, said during the organization's inception, the tips the organization has received and arrests made, more than \$43,000 worth of drugs have been seized and taken off the local streets.

Columbia County Crimes Stoppers has received more than 1,800 tips in 10 years and more than \$22,000 worth of property has been recovered with the aid of the program.

"Out of all those tips we've received, it lead to 118 people being arrested," Innocenti said. "Of the 118 arrested, 49



were fugitives."

During its 10 years Columbia County Crimes Stoppers has approved more than \$25,000 worth of rewards.

"We've only paid out \$9,800 because people don't claim the reward," Innocenti said. "They just want to do the right thing and report stuff anonymously."

Charlie Carlson, Columbia County Crime Stoppers chairperson, said the program helps the county by getting information authorities wouldn't get through ordinary channels.

"It's important to have

Crime Stoppers because with out it there would probably be a lot more crime in the area," he said.

Columbia County Sheriff's Deputy Sgt. Clint Dicks, law enforcement coordinator for Columbia County Crime Stoppers, said the bigger tips for the area has been information about drugs.

"Crime Stoppers is a great tool to have," he said. "A lot of people don't want to give information, get involved or go to court or put themselves in danger. This is a great tool they report stuff to us to keep them out of danger and reports."

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# 'Dragging' case ends in reprimand

The driver, Breon Antoine Pope, 30, had active warrants for violation of probation and possession of a controlled substance. Pope tried to flee in his Ford F-150 when the officers tried to apprehend him.

Robinson "spontaneously" ran after the vehicle and jumped in the bed of the truck.

During the ensuing pursuit, Robinson was ejected from the vehicle and suf-

to weigh the risk of immediately capturing a suspect against the possibility of trying to detain them in the future, according to the report.

Robinson agreed that boarding a moving vehicle was "not a prudent decision," the report states.

Robinson and Peterson were conducting a DUI investigation on the stopped vehicle.

The footage shows the truck slowing down at an intersection about a mile into the pursuit. Robinson exited the vehicle off camera.

After the chase, Pope was taken to Lake Shore Hospital and later booked into Columbia County Detention Facility on charges of aggravated fleeing and eluding, aggravated battery on a law enforce-

ment officer, driving on a suspended license and violation of probation.

Robinson was flown directly from the scene to UF Health Shands in Gainesville.

That night, LCPD told the Lake City Reporter Robinson was "dragged" by the truck for nearly a mile.

News of the reported dragging spread across social media, sparking widespread concern from the community — until dashcam footage surfaced in late July and contradicted the claim.

Following the incident, Peterson claimed the fleeing truck ran over her foot as it sped away from the scene, but the footage shows she was standing 2 to 3 feet away from the vehicle as it sped off.

After questioned about the inconsistency, LCPD suggested an "adrenaline bump" made Peterson mistakenly believe the truck ran over her foot.

ferred "serious injuries," according to a Dec. 11 report from Lt. John Miles.

After the incident, the Lake City Reporter submitted a public records request for all documents about "possible disciplinary action taken or considered against Stuart Robinson of LCPD."

After numerous follow-up requests, city officials in April produced documents pertaining to a separate, unrelated incident, but documents related to the July 6 traffic stop were not made available until Friday.

When Miles interviewed Robinson about the traffic stop, Robinson said he had "no independent recollection of the incident," according to Miles' Dec. 11 report.

"Officer Robinson did not remember jumping in to the bed of the fleeing pickup truck and could only surmise that it was a split second decision that he made in an attempt to apprehend the suspect," Miles wrote.

Miles advised Robinson

### UF softball captures school's 4th SEC title

No. 1 seed Florida defeated No. 3 seed South Carolina 3-1 to win its fourth SEC Softball Tournament title and first since 2013.

Florida is the first team since 2014 to win both the SEC regular-season and tournament championships in the same year.

"I think it comes down to our seniors," said Florida head coach Tim Walton.

"The four seniors we have, have been the rock and our foundation. They had never won the SEC Tournament championship and they put that on their list of things they wanted to accomplish. I give them a lot of credit for buying in and working really hard and making this special."

SEC Player of the Year Amanda Lorenz came up clutch by blasting her 10th home run of the season in the third to give Florida a 3-1 advantage. Lorenz is the third player in conference history to win Player of the Year and tournament Most Valuable Player in the same season and the first one since 2001.

### Shelnutt's bomb seals 5th straight ACC title

Trailing 4-1 entering the bottom of the seventh, No. 10 Florida State (47-10) scored four runs, including a three-run, walk-off home run from Anna Shelnutt to earn a 5-4 victory over Pitt (33-18-1) to win the 2018 ACC Championship.

Sydney Sherrill started the seventh-inning rally with a leadoff single up the middle, and walks to Zoe Casas and Elizabeth Mason loaded the bases with one out in the inning. Cali Harrod made it a 4-2 game on an RBI groundout, setting the stage for Shelnutt's two-out, walk-off home run for the 5-4 win.

The Seminoles trailed in every game of the 2018 ACC Softball Championship and increased their winning streak in the tournament to 15 consecutive games as Florida State clinched its 16th conference championship in program history and fifth in a row.

Sherrill, Shelnutt and Meghan King earned a spot on the 2018 ACC All-Tournament Team, with Sherrill being named Tournament MVP.

# Tiger Woods shoots 65 at Players

PGA star shot his lowest score ever at The Players

PONTE VEDRA BEACH — Tiger Woods turned in his best round of the season and his lowest score ever at The Players Championship.

It sky-rocketed him up the leaderboard, and he stayed there.

Woods shot a 7-under 65 in the third round Saturday, besting his previous low score on the Stadium Course by a stroke.

He honed in his iron shots, fine-tuned his putter and was so hot through 12 holes that it looked as if he might

challenge the Stadium Course record at TPC Sawgrass.

"I wish I could repeat it more often, but honestly it was just a better start," Woods said. "I got off to a much better-quality start."

Woods took advantage of warm temperatures, soft greens and little wind by making birdies at three of the first four holes. He drained putts of 15, 5, 10 and 17 feet, regaining a scoring touch that eluded him last week at the Wells Fargo Championship and in the opening two rounds in Ponte Vedra Beach.

"Eventually I was going to put all the pieces together and today, for the most part, I did that," he said. "I hit a lot of good, quality shots. I hit some



shots in the correct spots, which was nice. I hit probably three of the best long irons I've hit all week."

Woods will be paired with Jordan Spieth for the final round Sunday and will start the day 11 shots behind Webb Simpson.

No one has ever overcome such a deficit to win on the PGA Tour.

Maldonado followed it up with a two-run bomb in the fifth. The ball landed in nearly the same spot as Schwarz's and gave Florida its first lead of the game at 3-1.

With the bases loaded and no outs in the sixth, Reese launched a grand slam over the right field scoreboard opening the Gator lead up to six runs. It was the first grand slam of his collegiate career and the third grand slam by UF this season.

Florida wasn't done in the sixth. With two outs and a runner on, India curved one around the left field foul pole to make it a 9-1 game. The Gators have now scored 71 runs in the six inning this season, which is 23 more than any other inning.

### Noles Move 20 Games over .500 with DH Sweep

TALLAHASSEE — No. 13 Florida State (36-16) swept a doubleheader against Mount St. Mary's (20-28) Saturday, winning game one 10-0 and game two 8-2. Cal Raleigh hit home runs in both games and Reese Albert had five RBI on the day. On the mound, FSU struck out 20 batters and allowed just two runs in the two seven-inning games.

"We had exceptional pitching performances from Andrew Karp," head coach Mike Martin said. "He pitched beautifully. Just dominated the other club. CJ Van Eyk gave us exactly what we need, which was five good innings."

"The big thing about today — we got after it, played hard, played the game right. Always difficult to win two ball games. Now we have to come out tomorrow and play well."

# NHL Lightning eye bounce-back performance against Caps

BRANDON — Jon Cooper is confident the Tampa Bay Lightning will be fine.

Experience tells the coach and his players they shouldn't be overly concerned about losing the opening game of the Eastern Conference finals at home.

The way the Washington Capitals are playing, though, it could be more difficult to rebound from a shabby performance this time.

Game 2 is Sunday night, and Cooper expects the Atlantic Division winners to be at their best.

"It's unfortunate how we played a couple of these Game 1s in the last couple of rounds, (and) dug ourselves a small hole this series," the coach said after a workout Saturday at the team's suburban practice facility.

"I guess the positive side is we've been here before, so we've seen this. But we

can't keep playing with fire and dropping these Game 1s, which we've done. All of a sudden you've thrown home ice advantage back at them. Now you've put pressure on yourself. You got to go win games on the road, which you have to do anyway in the playoffs, but your margin for error gets smaller and smaller. We're really going to need a good effort (Sunday)."

The Capitals won the opener 4-2, ending an eight-game playoff losing skid to Tampa Bay dating to the 2003 postseason.

Alex Ovechkin, T.J. Oshie, Jay Beagle and Lars Eller scored for Washington, while rejuvenated goaltender Braden Holtby stopped 19 shots to help the Caps improve to 6-1 on the road this postseason.

The Lightning didn't take solace in breaking through for a pair of third-period goals.

"We dissected the game a little bit," Cooper said. "There were so many good things we've done in two

rounds of hockey that I think if you bottled up all the bad things in those first 10 games it would be about half of what we did in that one game last night."

"You fueled the fire of a good team, and that's what Washington is. I thought a lot of their opportunities we just handed to them, and a lot of our opportunities were stomped out just by our not sticking to our plan of what's worked."

The Capitals, in the conference finals for the first time in the Ovechkin era, said they can't afford a drop-off in performance.

Beating two-time defending Stanley Cup champion Pittsburgh gave them the series.

Coach Barry Trotz, mindful that Tampa Bay lost Game 1 of its second-round series 6-2 to Boston only to strom back and win four straight games, reiterated it won't be easy to build off the Caps' success in the opener.

"You get a little bit of

confidence, obviously," Trotz said at the team hotel Saturday. "At the same time we've got to realize Tampa Bay is going to have some desperation in their game. And, we better have some desperation in our game."

Andrei Vasilevskiy, Tampa Bay's All-Star goaltender, yielded four goals on 25 shots in two periods after entering the series with an 8-2 record, 2.20 goals-against average and .927 save percentage through two rounds.

The Lightning are confident they'll play better in front of him in Game 2. The Caps expect the goaltender to bounce back, too.

"One thing you got to remember, this is not the NCAA basketball tournament, it's not one and done," Cooper said. "It's the best of seven, so you get a chance to make some adjustments to improve your game and really get a look at the other team. ... It's hard to play flawless hockey all the way through."

# Simpson stretches Players lead to 7 shots

PONTE VEDRA BEACH, — Webb Simpson isn't aware of the records he has tied or broken at The Players Championship. He saw that Tiger Woods and Jordan Spieth each made a big charge before he teed off Saturday, and it didn't rattle him at all.

"I think it helped me a little bit continue to think about making birdies," he said.

Simpson had a plan and didn't back off until he holed an 18-foot par on the final hole for a 4-under 68. He stretched his lead to a record seven shots, tied Greg Norman's 54-hole score at The Players that had not been touched in 24 years and left himself one more round to capture the richest prize in golf.

Simpson started with an 8-foot birdie. He holed a 100-foot bunker shot for eagle.

And that island green on the par-3 17th that ruined his bid for the record score at the TPC Sawgrass the previous day? With a front pin in the bowl, he hit sand wedge and listened to thousands of fans surrounding the green cheer as the ball trickled down the slope to 3 feet for birdie.

It added to a 19-under 197, the score Norman had after three rounds in 1994 on a rain-softened course.

And the 32-year-old Simpson has history on his side: No one has ever lost a seven-shot lead in the final round in PGA Tour history.

"All those things that have happened, I'd love to know them if I win tomorrow," Simpson said. "But I'm trying not to dwell there. I'm trying to just look forward, do what I always do on a Saturday night of a golf tournament and get ready tomorrow morning. And that's kind of where I'm at."

Danny Lee was leading the

B-Flight with a bogey-free round of 70, but with birdies only on the two par 5s on the back nine. He will be in the final round.

"Just got to keep my hat down and play my own game and ... I don't know, where is he at?" Lee asked. Told that Simpson was 19 under, Lee digested that and responded, "That's an impressive three rounds, I think. It's going very, very well for him."

Woods had his best round on the Stadium Course with a 65 despite playing the final six holes in 1 over. Spieth made two bogeys in his round of 65 as both charged up the leaderboard in the morning with big crowds and loud cheers.

They went from a tie for 68th to a tie for ninth. But they made up only three shots on Simpson and were 11 shots behind.

Dustin Johnson at least improved his chances of staying for No. 1 with four birdies over his final 10 holes for a 69.

Nonetheless, Woods likes how his game is coming together.

He pointed to his tee shot at the 242-yard, par-3 eighth, which landed a little more than 30 feet from the hole; his second shot at the par-5 ninth, which stopped on the fringe from nearly 270 yards out; and his towering approach shot at the par-5 11th, which carried two bunkers and part of a pond before landing on the putting surface and leaving him a lengthy eagle putt.

His only complaint was not keeping it rolling. He cooled off down the stretch, making five pars and a bogey over the final six holes.

He pushed his drive into thick rough at the difficult par-4 14th and ended up with his lone bogey of the day. He had a chance to get it back two holes later, but lipped out a 10-footer following a stellar bunker shot.

"To be 8-under there through 12, realistically I probably could have got a couple more out of it and got to 10 (under) for the day," he said. "But I'll take it."

He hit 11 of 14 fairways and 15 of 18 greens in regulation.

But the biggest different was his putting. He needed just 27 putts, his fewest of the week. A day after making just one putt longer than 6 feet, he missed only

one inside 13 feet in the third round.

"It was nice. I made some putts today. That was basically the difference," he said. "I've hit quality irons before and I was able

to convert today and got rolling early. This golf course, as humid as it is right now, these greens are going to be holding all day and I knew that going in and I knew I had to be a little bit more aggressive in there and put the ball in these sections, and I was able to do that."

Woods started the day tied for 69th, but moved into fifth after getting to

9 under at No. 12. His jump was the talk of the course, and the already huge gallery following his every move really started growing at the turn. By the time Woods and playing partner Mackenzie Hughes got to 16, the frenzied crowd was dozens deep and craning for a glimpse of golf's biggest star.

Spieth matched Woods for the best score in the third round. They were at 8-under 208.

Woods figured his stay near the top of the leaderboard would be a short one, but the wind picked up in the afternoon and no one matched the low score of the day.

"It's nice to kind of somewhat be up there," he said.



# Get a kayak and catch more fish

Kayak fishing is all the rage right now, and it's for good reason. Kayaks are much cheaper than traditional gas burners.

Kayak, the timeless watercraft invented over 500 years ago by a people with very few natural resources. A Wikipedia search confirmed the common knowledge that Kayaks were invented by the Inuit Eskimos living in the subarctic circle. Early explorers to the North American continent discovered Eskimos using Kayaks made of Seal skins stretched around a simple wooden frame. The little boats were lightweight, extremely maneuverable and could transport a decent payload. Now hundreds of years later, we're still using Kayaks. Although the modern Kayak uses roto molded plastic for their construction instead of Seal skins, the design is still very much the same.

A few weeks ago, Kenney Scott showed me some pictures of largemouth bass he and his sons, Shayne Scott and Brandon Scott, caught at Alligator Lake. I didn't count the fish in the picture (it was on his phone) but it was at least 20. My initial thought was Alligator Lake must be experiencing a fish explosion. Alligator Lake gets intense fishing pressure, day in and day out, all year long. We know fish are there, but they have seen crankbaits, plastic worms, spinner baits, top water, spoons and every sort of lure ever created. These are very educated fish. I thought catching a nice "mess" of fish at Alligator Lake just not possible. Alligator Lake is why I am a saltwater fisherman. Kenney explained, "we use Kayaks... they make all of the difference."

So I asked Kenney when his "next fishing trip to Alligator Lake was?" He said "next Sunday." I then asked if I could meet up with him and his sons to get a picture or two and see how they did. Kenney is not the least secretive about where he fishes or what lures he uses. As he put it, "I fish public areas where anyone can go." So we made plans to meet at noon. I arrived at the Alligator Lake boat ramp (the one closest to the High School) a few hours early to check things out. Walking out on the fishing pier I could not see any Kayaks. While I waited on him, two other fishermen came in and said, they could hear fish hitting,

but they caught nothing. I was thinking probably a tough morning for fishing.

Soon I could see three Kayaks paddling their way back to the boat ramp. When they got close, I asked if they caught any fish. Kenney responded with "oh yeah, we caught some." Kenney said they threw several fish back and only kept what they needed for a fish fry. Two of the group had five bass and one had four. The largest fish was 2 1/2 lbs. but most were in the 1 1/2 lb. range. Kenney shared they caught the fish "on plastic worms." He noted "any lure will work but since there is so much algae and brush, we had to use a lure that is weed less."

I told Kenney about the anglers in the bass boat (this was a pro style boat) and how they caught nothing. Kenney explained "it's always like that." He added, many times "we're right next to them catching fish and watch them get nothing." Kenney elaborated, "Kayaks make us successful." He stated, "Kayaks are very quiet, we have no trolling motor running... but most importantly fish can't see us." When sitting in a Kayak, the profile above the waterline is about three feet high. On a bass boat, the angler is six or seven feet. Kenney feels this is what makes the difference.

The Kayaks were Shayne Scott's idea. Kenney and his two sons have always fished together.

They have had fishing boats

through the years and still have a power boat. This was just something new to try. Since they didn't know how the experiment would turn out, they bought inexpensive Kayaks at Walmart. They have owned the Kayaks for just about a year. The little boats have held up very well. One did have a seam open up but it was easily repaired with a special epoxy made for plastic. From watching TV, they saw how other Kayaks were outfitted. Now their boats are outfitted the same way with fishing rod holders, landing net holders, a basket in back for supplies and a foot rest. The boats weigh about 50 lbs. and are easy to transport in the back of a pickup truck. They've fished several lakes in our area and one of the next lakes they want to fish is Sampson Lake in Starke.

For anyone desiring to get into Kayaking, Kenney has the following advice. Select the Kayak based on your weight. The Kayaks they use are 10 ft. models and can support up to 250 lbs. Kenney said Kayaks are very stable and none of the three have ever rolled one over. But to comply with Coast Guard regulations require each person must have a life jacket, whistle, and anchor. If a trolling motor is mounted on the Kayak, then it must be titled, have registration numbers, and a sticker. For this reason, Kenney and his sons use paddles only. Sometimes an ancient low tech approach works better. Good fishing.

## Sea turtle nesting begins in May on many beaches

May is the beginning of sea turtle nesting season on many of Florida's sandy beaches. Beachfront property owners and beach visitors can help nesting turtles and hatchlings by turning off or shielding lights that are visible from the beach at night.

"People's efforts to keep our beaches as dark as possible at night, without affecting human safety, can make a tremendous difference for nesting sea turtles," said Robbin Trindell, head of the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) sea turtle management program. "Female sea turtles and their hatchlings can be disturbed or confused by artificial light, whether it comes from a house, a flashlight or a cellphone camera."

Sea turtle nesting is starting now on beaches from the Gulf coast, including northwest Florida, to the state's northeast Atlantic coast and from Miami-Dade County south to the Keys. Nesting began earlier in March along Florida's southeast Atlantic coast from Brevard County south to Broward County.

Florida is a critically important destination for nesting sea turtles. More loggerhead turtles nest here than anywhere

else in the continental United States, with nearly 97,000 loggerhead nests counted statewide during the 2017 nesting season. Leatherback and green sea turtles also nest in significant numbers in Florida.

What are the basics of being sea turtle-friendly? It's a sea turtle night, turn off the light - After sundown, turn off any lights not necessary for human safety. Use long wavelength amber LED lamps for lights that must stay lit and shield lights so they are not visible from

the beach. Remember to close shades or curtains.

Sea turtles get lost in the light - On the beach at night, don't take flash photos or use bright cell-phones or flashlights.

Sea turtles are protected and must be respected - Stay back and give sea turtles space if you see one on the beach at night. Don't touch a nesting turtle because it may leave the beach without nesting if disturbed. Remember, it is illegal to harm or disturb nesting sea turtles, their nests, eggs or hatchlings.




**THUNDER AND LIGHTING:** Fort White is losing a star running back in soon-to-be graduate Jacquez Pelham but

Smith also threw touchdowns to Jaden Williams and T.J. Jones, who caught a deflection off the hands of Marquez Bell and walked into the end zone. The Gold team was made up of the first team offense/second team defense while the Purple squad consisted of the second team offense/first team defense.

Multiple players on the first-team defense made an impact in the game in addition to Williams. Brandon Scott had two deflections, including one that led to Williams' interception, and the defensive line combined for three sacks.

"Our defense is pretty good. I'm not going to lie," Fulton said. "We battle every day in practice, getting each other better and everybody is getting better as a whole."

Smith found himself under pressure a lot throughout the night, forcing him to scramble outside the pocket. The rising junior rushed for 46 yards on 17 carries.

Columbia's offensive line has been its biggest question mark this spring and it didn't show the strides head coach Brian Allen wanted to see under the lights. There are only four guys competing for three new starting spots and Allen believes those four need more competition behind them to make them better.

That means incoming freshmen this summer may have an opportunity to win a starting job up front.

"There aren't enough that are pushing the ones that are in front to keep their position so that's one of the biggest things we're going to be looking for going into the summer, is who is going to be willing to compete for those jobs because at the end of the day the best kids are going to play," Allen said. "If you're not one of them, you're going to be in the game. There's still growth that has to take place there. You're able to see it from the sideline or wherever you're at. We have guys running free from not understanding what's going on or lack of effort. There are still instances of too much of that going on."

Columbia also had issues snapping the ball, especially on special teams.

The first long snap of the night went over the punter's head and into the end zone, which surely would have led to a safety in a real game. There were also a few other instances where the ball two-hopped to the punter in addition to a couple of low snaps on extra points, one of which forced the kicker to get up and run with the ball.

A botched snap on a field goal attempt cost Columbia in its 36-33 regional quarter-final loss to Lincoln in overtime last season. Allen isn't going to let that happen again and he plans to find someone who can snap the ball consistently this summer, even if he currently isn't on the roster.

"We're going to find one or turn someone into one and that may just be somebody's in to the varsity, is that they can snap the ball," Allen said. "That could be a sophomore coming up. We're going to have those woes fixed because there won't be a situation where that's going to cost us a football game."

Purple quarterback and Smith's backup Ty Weinger threw two touchdowns to receiver Diamonte Jones, who caught three passes for 52 yards. Dominique Jones also rushed for 79 yards on six carries for the second-team offense.

Overall, Allen was pleased with both his offense and defense. He's excited to see what they can do next Friday against Bartram Trail.

"The defense has constantly improved this year. They've got all of the talent over there that's needed, it's just understanding all the time what's going on in the scheme. But I thought they played extremely tonight at times," Allen said. "Offensively, at times, we operated the offense like the machine it's supposed to operate."



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


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# SVEC announces return of capital credits to members

LIVE OAK - Suwannee Valley Electric Cooperative (SVEC) announced today that its board of trustees has elected to retire approximately \$775,000 in capital credits to be returned to members this year. This retirement brings the total amount of capital credits retired over the life of the cooperative to about \$13.5 million.

SVEC is a not-for-profit member-owned business that operates at cost. Revenues above the cost of doing business are allocated to the members annually in the form of capital credits.

SVEC's board of trustees can vote to retire capital credits if the financial condition of the cooperative will not be impaired. The decision to retire capital credits again this year was made in light of the continued financial strength and sound management of the co-op.

Active members who were also members at any time from 1987 through 2012 can expect to receive a capital credit retirement this year. Members with a retirement of \$5 or more will receive a check. A retirement of less than \$5 will be applied as a reduction to the bill the member receives in May for their April electricity use. If the member with a retirement of less than \$5 has a

MyChoice Prepay account, the retirement will be applied as a credit to that account.

Inactive members who no longer purchase electricity from SVEC will receive a check. The minimum amount is \$5.00. If the amount is less than \$5.00, that amount will be combined with any future capital credit retirements and paid out to the inactive member when the total amount is \$5.00 or more.

"It is important for both active and inactive members to maintain a current valid address on file with SVEC, so that we can return their retirements to them," says SVEC Director of Member Services John Robinson. "In accordance with the co-op's bylaws, we set aside unclaimed retired capital credits for three years. In the fourth year, if it is still unclaimed, a retired capital credit is considered "abandoned" and is distributed to active members."

SVEC maintains a searchable list of active and inactive members with unclaimed capital credits on its website, svec-coop.com.

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### Ask the Fool

#### Temper That Trading

Q I'm thinking of investing in some volatile stocks.

Would it be effective to sell them after they go up a bit and then buy them again after they drop, holding them for a few weeks or months at a time? — S.L., Pleasanton, California

A That's risky. For best results when trying to build wealth through the stock market, aim to hang on for many years, not weeks. Remember, legendary investor Warren Buffett has said his favorite holding period is "forever," and that he would be fine if the stock market opened for trading only once a year.

Some stocks will rise relentlessly for a stretch, and if you exited them, you could lose out on a lot of gains while waiting on the sidelines for a dip in price. Also, frequent trading will rack up lots of trading commissions. Even if you're paying just \$5 per trade, trading 20 times a month will cost you \$1,200 a year.

Meanwhile, while gains from stocks held more than a year get a lower tax rate (15 percent for most of us), shorter-term gains are taxed at your ordinary income rate, which could top 30 percent. It's better to invest in companies you believe in, aiming to hang on for years. Otherwise, you're just guessing.

Q I want to invest in fast-growing stocks that are priced below \$10 per share. Where should I start? — J.C., Gainesville, Florida

A Don't focus on a stock's price. A \$5 stock can be worth 50 cents (and may fall to that soon), while a \$200 stock can be a bargain that will triple in value over several years. Seek healthy, profitable companies trading for less than their shares are worth, and be patient.

### Fool's School

#### When Too Much Is Bad

One way that many investors set up their portfolios for trouble is by keeping too many of their dollars in too few investments.

That can happen if you've accumulated gobs of shares of stock in the company you work for. Yes, it's great when you can purchase it at a discount and when you can easily dollar-cost average, regularly buying more shares, no matter the price, in order to build a big stake over time. You probably know more about your employer than any other company, too, which gives you an edge.

Too much of a good thing is still too much, though. Just think of Enron: When it imploded, it wiped out many employees' savings. Remember that you already depend on your employer for all or most of your income. It's risky to depend on it for the bulk of your investments, too.

You might also invest too

heavily in an industry you know very well, especially if you expect great growth from it. It is indeed good to understand your holdings very well, but even if you have great confidence in them, they can disappoint you. Plenty of great companies have surprised many people, going out of business or declaring bankruptcy.

Finally, you might end up too concentrated in one or a few holdings if they grow in value much faster than your other holdings — with, for example, one company going from representing about 5 percent of your portfolio to making up 20 percent of it. That's risky, as it leaves you vulnerable if disaster strikes.

Companies do sometimes fail. They may end up in scandals. Great technologies become obsolete (think of typewriters and VCRs). Excellent managements give way to mediocre managements. Competitors show up and grab market share.

When it comes to your hard-earned dollars in stocks, don't put too many eggs in too few baskets. A good rule of thumb is to try not to let any holding make up more than 5 percent of your overall net worth.

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### My Dumbest Investment

#### Apple Regrets

My dumbest investment was Apple — yes, one of the world's most valuable companies. I bought shares of it back when they were trading in the teens, held for several years while the stock moved sideways, and then sold when the stock moved into the \$20s.

I had originally bought into the company after my wife gave me an iPod for my birthday — I was so impressed that I thought it would change the world. The shares have split 7-for-1 since then, too. D'oh! — R., online

**The Fool Responds:** Lots of investors have regretted selling their shares of Apple over the years. The company may seem untouchable now, with its recent market value north of \$800 billion, but it didn't always look that way.

Apple was struggling in the 1990s, losing money and with low market share for its computers. The 1997 return of Steve Jobs (who had been ousted in 1985), along with the introduction of the iMac and the iPod in 1998 and 2001, respectively, marked a turnaround. Following the 2007 debut of the iPhone, things really took off.

Since Apple went public on Dec. 12, 1980, its stock has soared more than 42,000 percent. Yet even today, investors don't fully agree on how well it will perform from here. You can ignore the stock splits, though: They do increase your number of shares, but they decrease the share price proportionately.

### The Motley Fool Take

#### Booking Profits

In 1998, a travel website called Priceline.com debuted, featuring a "Name Your Own Price" service. While many dot-com era startups never reached profitability and failed, Priceline prospered.

Today, it has rebranded itself Booking Holdings (Nasdaq: BKNG), which includes not just Priceline.com but also the Asia-based travel site Agoda, KAYAK, Rentalcars.com, restaurant reservation site OpenTable, and its biggest brand (and smartest purchase), Booking.com.

The business of online travel and accommodations searching and booking has grown huge, and Booking is the world leader — with 2017 revenue of \$12.68 billion, up 18 percent over 2016. Management expects its double-digit growth trajectory to continue.

Consolidation within the industry has put a huge portion of the overall online travel business in the hands of just a few companies. Booking Holdings does face challenges, as rising competition has led some to fear that hurdles to further revenue gains could prove difficult to overcome. Yet through smart acquisitions, the company has been able to answer past competitive threats.

With solid economic conditions across much of the globe and a rising interest in travel, the outlook for the industry is bright, and Booking Holdings has established itself as a key growth leader. It's likely to hold on to that role for years to come and deserves consideration for a berth in your long-term portfolio. (The Motley Fool owns shares of and has recommended Booking Holdings.)

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




