The big winners, both OK'd for \$15,000, were the Olustee Festival in Lake City and a country music festival in White Springs, Party in the Pines.


Fourteen events and organizations were seeking funds totaling \$86,000 from the Columbia County Tourist Development Council.

## Cafe games going to court again

Both candidates for the Florida House District 10 race headed to the August ballot have an A rating from the NRA Political Victory Fund—one with a qualifier.

Republican Marc Vann of Lake City received an AQ, meaning he is a "pro-gun candidate whose rating is based solely on the candidate's responses to the NRA-PVF Candidate

Questionnaire and who does not have a voting record on Second Amendment issues." Chuck Brannan of Macclenny, also a Republican, received an A, meaning he is a "solidly pro-gun candidate. A candidate who has supported NRA positions on key votes in elective office or

# Tucker removed from ballot; judge questions his credibility

Signs will be posted at precincts saying votes for him won't count.

City Council District 10 candidate Clarence Tucker was disqualified from the race after failing to convince a judge that he meets residency requirements.

Tucker went before Third Circuit Judge Andrew Decker for an emergency hearing Wednesday morning at the Columbia County Courthouse to determine whether he satisfied the city charter, which requires permanent residency to be established in a district one year before qualifying to run for its council seat. Tucker told Decker he spends one or two nights a week at the address he listed on his candidacy paperwork, 923 Coldwater Avenue, but had no lease with the owner, no receipts for rent payments and claimed a homestead exemption on another property. The testimony from Tucker and his supposed housemate also didn't help convince Decker, who said the court did not find their statements about the casual arrangement "credible."

"It's always regrettable when a court has to make the decisions that it will make this morning to render a person ineligible to be on the ballot," Decker said as he made his ruling. "... And based on the substantial and competent evidence

presented, the court finds that you do not qualify as a resident of District 10 at 923 Coldwater."

The legal challenge was brought by Glenel Bowden, a former District 10 candidate who dropped out of the race to support Tucker's other opponent, Vanessa George.

Bowden's case centered on the testimony of Willie James Bradley, whose signature is on the lease for 923 Coldwater Avenue.

"He's been saying that

that the candidate stayed there sporadically. But in court, Bradley said he had switched his story because he feared the property owner, who explained to the Lake City Reporter that adding unauthorized tenants violated the lease.

"They put pressure on me," he told the judge.

Tucker backed up that narrative.

"His back got up against the wall, so that's why he turned," Tucker said. "She

would fall short of the city charter's one-year residency requirement.

Tucker told the judge Bradley was mistaken about the dates, saying he'd been staying at the property since February 2017 and paid rent in cash.

Bowden said the property owner inspected the home in October and found no traces of Tucker, citing the Lake City Reporter.

"There's nothing to indicate anyone lived [there] than the person on the lease," Bowden said.

Tucker is a partial owner of his mother's home at 1356 NE Washington St., which has a homestead exemption.

After the court heard from City Clerk Audrey Sikes about ministerial matters, Columbia County Supervisor of Elections Liz Horne testified that it was too late to strike Tucker's name from the physical ballot, and the only thing she could do would be to put signs at all relevant polling places stating votes for him will not count.

Tucker declined to cross-examine any witnesses and submitted no evidence to the court. He did not object to the evidence submitted by Bowden — which included a receipt for court documents received at the Washington Street address and the copy of the lease for the Coldwater Avenue home.

Bowden and Tucker could not be reached for comment after the hearing.

Bradley was a no-show in the courtroom, prompting a short recess as deputies secured him and brought him before the judge.

Bradley told the Lake City Reporter in June that Tucker didn't live there, backtracking on a claim he made one day prior

# Failed robbery, drugs land pair in local jail

After a foot pursuit, two men who reportedly put guns to a police informant's head were arrested Monday during a multi-jurisdictional drug task force sting operation.

Joseph Phillip Enriquez, 19, of NW Alaska Glen, Lake City, is charged with armed robbery, false imprisonment, possession of a weapon by a convicted felon, possession of burglary tools, resisting arrest without violence and tampering with a witness by preventing the witness to contact 911 in connec-

tion with the case. He was booked into the Columbia County Detention Center on \$292,000 bond.

Michael Anthony Berry, 19, of Derbyshire Road, Daytona, was charged with armed robbery, false imprisonment, resisting arrest with violence, battery on a law enforcement officer, possession of burglary tools and tampering with a witness by preventing the witness to contact with 911 in connection with the case. He was taken to jail on a \$300,000 bond.

According to Columbia County Sheriff's Office reports, a confidential source said he had been in contact the past two days with Joseph "JoJo" Enriquez, who was willing to sell him two guns and an "eight" of marijuana for \$440, and sent the police informant a picture of three firearms, two pistols and a long rifle with a wooden stock. During the arranged meeting the informant and

Enriquez began having a disagreement. Enriquez reportedly kept asking the informant to go into the basement at 344 NW DeSoto Street to finalize the sale of the guns, but the informant refused. At some point, Berry came out the basement of 344 NW DeSoto Street with a rifle and approached the informant. Enriquez also had a gun and the informant asked him to remove the magazine.

The suspects continued to try to get the informant into the basement. Enriquez and Berry both placed his guns to the informant's head as Berry demanded money.

The informant complied and gave them all his money and they then took the informant's cell phone, drivers license and bank card. The robbery took place next door to the DeSoto Street address, outside in the front



Brannan, who ultimately received the NRA's endorsement, said the grade demonstrates to voters the strength of his commitment to gun rights.

# Slots or not? Back to court for cafe games

case centered on games produced by Blue Sky Games and leased by Jacksonville-based Gator Coin II Inc., after a Tallahassee judge last year sided with gambling regulators who maintain that the games violate a Florida law banning slot machines in most parts of the state.

Proponents of the devices, known as “pre-reveal games,” contend that the machines are legal because the computer games include a “preview” feature that advises players of the outcome of the games.

In January, after raiding an Ellisville sweepstakes cafe, also known as an internet cafe, Siegmeister said the pre-reveal games could run afoul of broader gambling laws, regardless of whether they are classified as slot machines — which are specifically prohibited.

Originally, Siegmeister opted not to go after establishments with pre-reveal games, since their legality was a gray area.

“I took the position that I wasn’t going to holler foul unless I knew for sure or believed ethically that I had a good case to make that argument,” he said.

Instead, Siegmeister went after “fish tables” — games which resemble classic arcade games, but are heavily based on probability — because he believed there was a stronger case they violated anti-gambling laws.

After the January raid, Siegmeister announced his opinion on pre-reveal games had evolved.

“Most of those machines are probably gambling,” he said.

Critics of pre-reveal games, including the Department of Business and Professional Regulation, say the preview feature doesn’t matter because the “random number generator” used to create the games equates to the definition of slot machines, which are games of “chance,” under state law.

There’s nothing players can do to affect the outcome of the game, which fits the definition of slots, department attorney Daniel McGinn told a three-judge panel Tuesday.

But Bryan DeMaggio, a lawyer representing Gator Coin, argued that the element of “chance” was removed because players are advised whether they will win before playing. The “randomness” of the game is removed when the player knows the outcome, he said.

“He can walk away at any time. He doesn’t have to play,” DeMaggio said.

A key issue in the case involves whether the slot-machine law applies to

playing a single game or a series of games. While the outcome of the first game is revealed in advance, a player at the outset does not know the results of subsequent games.

Judge James Wolf repeatedly asked lawyers on both sides if the court should consider whether a single game or a series of games violates the law.

“I’m a simple kind of guy. It comes down to whether we can consider the entire course of the play or one particular game. Their argument is one particular game is not a game of chance because you know the outcome. ... What in the statute allows us to consider the entire course of play?” he asked, pointing out that the state law defines slot machines, in part, as a device whose outcome is “unpredictable by the user.”

The answer rests in the way the machines generate the games, which the state believes violates the law, said McGinn, whose department regulates gambling.

“From our perspective, it doesn’t matter whether it’s one game. It doesn’t mat-

ter whether it’s multiple games,” he said.

The appeal follows a decision last year by Leon County Circuit Judge John Cooper, who reversed himself after originally siding with the manufacturer and distributor of the machines.

Cooper changed his mind after the Seminole Tribe of Florida asked him to reconsider the decision. Blue Sky and Gator Coin sued the state after investigators with the Division of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms decided the games were effectively illegal slot machines and began confiscating the devices.

The Seminoles, who intervened in the case on the side of regulators, asked the Legislature to address the legality of the games or risk having the state lose millions of dollars in a revenue-sharing agreement that gives the tribe the exclusive rights to operate slots outside Broward and Miami-Dade counties.

But lawmakers earlier this year failed to approve any legislation that would remedy the dispute.

Gator Coin owners

Kathy Fanning and her son, Jonathan, said the machines are simply another form of entertainment — such as pool tables and jukeboxes — leased by bar owners who have alcohol licenses.

She said her company, founded in 1946, has warehouses full of the machines and is picking up even more devices weekly, as regulators continue to give notice to operators that particular machines may be illegal.

“The locations of course are concerned. They don’t want to lose their alcohol

license,” Kathy Fanning told reporters after Tuesday’s hearing.

The mother-and-son pair stressed that the machines they lease to small businesses can’t be found in “game rooms,” internet cafes or other questionable storefronts.

“We are strictly dealing with people that are in a licensed environment, that are in a controlled environment,” Kathy Fanning said.

DeMaggio told The News Service of Florida the judges understand the issues

involved in the case.

“They perceive the issues. I think ultimately it’s going to rise and fall on whether they consider it one game or a series of games,” he said after Tuesday’s arguments. “You don’t have to be a lawyer to have sat through that to realize that that’s arguably what the court is wrestling with. It’s our contention that it’s one game and one play. And if they reject that, we’re going to lose.”



## Justice is served — so far

The drama is over in District 10 — at least for now.

After hearing the evidence, a judge on Wednesday removed Clarence Tucker from the August 28 City Council ballot, ruling he did not live where he said he did.

Circuit Judge Andrew J. Decker III decided the case partly on the grounds that even Tucker's own witness — a man who claimed the candidate rented a room in his District 10 home — said Tucker had only been there for eight months or less, too short a time to satisfy city residency requirements.

But Decker went further.

He told Tucker that he found parts of his testimony lacking in credibility.

Tucker's truthfulness had already been put in question by the state attorney's office, which is investigating whether he lied on a sworn affidavit claiming residency in city limits. Decker's finding that he did not in fact live where he said, may add weight to that possible finding.

The state attorney's office should pursue this case to its legal conclusion and determine whether a crime was committed, either on the affidavit or in open court.

If perjury has occurred, it should be prosecuted.

The underlying issue here — the sanctity of the electoral process — is far too important to declare "no harm, no foul" and be done with it.

City elections, especially in District 10, have been marred by scandal before, and many of those who live there have come to wonder whether laws that are never enforced really mean anything.

There's more than Clarence Tucker's credibility at stake here. Once faith in the system is lost, we all pay the price, no matter where we lay our heads.



## Fact-checking starts with you

As news consumers, we're swamped with information. Whether we read newspapers, watch cable news, or get stories from Aunt Judy on Facebook, we must decide which information is trustworthy.

Advocacy journalism outlets including Fox News and MSNBC, ideological talk radio, and conspiracy websites like InfoWars make this difficult. Was Trump snookered by North Korea? Will his tariff war hurt the economy? How we answer that sort of questions may depend on where we get our news.

As the midterm elections approach, we must be prepared for another misinformation onslaught from Russia. Media organizations are taking steps to push back.

On July 6, the Washington Post reported that Twitter has purged 70 million fake and suspicious accounts since May to reduce the misinformation spread on its platform. Three days later, YouTube announced that it was giving \$25 million to support legitimate news organizations, flag misinformation, and highlight authoritative news sources.

Those actions reflect the emerging movement to help people become savvy news consumers. Media literacy organizations — such as the National Association for Media Literacy Education, the Center for Media Literacy, and the News Literacy Project — work to promote informed news consumption.

Dozens of fact-checking organizations call out falsehoods by politicians and others. They include such well-known outlets as FactCheck.org, the Washington Post's FactChecker, Snopes and PolitiFact. A report from Duke Reporters' Lab this year counted 149 fact-checking

projects in 53 countries. Recently in Rome, more than 200 fact checkers from 56 countries participated in the world's largest fact-checking conference.

The fake news fiasco of 2016 spurred public outrage and led to government action. According to

Media Literacy Now, several states introduced or continued consideration of media literacy legislation in 2017 and 2018. In 2017, Washington, Connecticut, Rhode Island, and New Mexico passed media literacy education laws. All states should enact similar measures.

Many universities now have media literacy majors and programs. The State University of New York at Stony Brook created the Center for News Literacy in 2007, which teaches undergraduate students to use critical thinking skills

to judge the credibility of news reports.

The website AllSides provides differing perspectives on major issues, sorting news stories from the left, right, and center. By fall, NewsGuard will be launched to fight fake news by providing users with reliability ratings and "nutrition labels" for 7,500 news and information websites.

In May, Facebook announced plans to start a news literacy campaign by offering tips on how to detect fake news and by recruiting researchers to look for misinformation on its website. In early July, Poynter.org reported that the WikiProject will create news information boxes to help Google users judge the veracity of local news organizations.

All these measures are important, but without individual responsibility, they won't amount to much. Ultimately, the burden falls on all of us to be savvy news consumers and confirm the information in the messages that bombard us constantly. Don't believe everything Aunt Judy sends you on Facebook; verify it by checking several news sources. When you see misinformation, warn others.

Russian bots and trolls wanting to destabilize the United States, Macedonian teenagers seeking profits, and misleading memes will be in full force for the 2018 midterms. They will set out to dupe you. Will you be able to sort out the truth from misinformation?

## Why is this keychain illegal in Texas?

There's a not-so-new self-defense weapon that needs its own defenders in Texas. And you can count us in.

That's because it's pretty clear that Texas law discriminates against the pink kitty key chain, especially popular among women who carry it for protection when they're walking to their cars at night, or into a dark parking garage.

In Texas you can be thrown in the county jail for a year or be fined up to \$4,000 if you're caught with this 3-by-2 inch plastic item dangling from your steering column.

That's ridiculous when it's legal to openly carry a loaded handgun or long-bladed Bowie knife capable of fatally slicing and dicing an adversary.

The kitty keychain is illegal under section 46.05 of the Texas Penal Code, which puts it in the same category as illegal brass knuckles, which users slide onto their hands to cause greater damage when they throw a punch.

With the keychain you put your

fingers through the cat's eye openings, make a fist, and strike an attacker with the pointed cat's ears that protrude.

OK, sure, someone could lose it and use the kitty to attack and stick a neighbor in the heat of an argument. But that could happen with a dinner fork, too.

The kitty keychain is put in the same category as illegal brass knuckles, which users slide onto their hands to cause greater damage when they throw a punch.

The problem here could be that the key chain sells for \$5 online, instead of the \$500 it might cost for a 9-mm Glock. The kitty doesn't have a powerful, moneymaking lobby that contributes to lawmakers who in turn could peel back restrictions.

Perhaps there's no one in Austin demanding carrying rights for the kitty, because what's in it for them?

But consider what Irv Miller, president of the online company Self Defense and Security Products has to say. He sells the expensive stuff and the kitty, and says the key chain is his No. 1 seller by volume.

"It's very effective if used properly and quickly," he says. Making it illegal "denies women the right to carry something simple and effective if they choose not to carry a gun."

We're not saying the key chains are a women's-only weapon, but Miller says women are by far the biggest purchasers.

So ladies, your right to carry these little critters legally may depend on your making some noise in Austin. Better yet, the same lawmakers advocating for other self-defense weapons should recognize the hypocrisy of excluding this affordable security item.

State lawmakers, it's time to give the kitty key chain its due. That's our cat call.

yard while officers listened in. They were on scene within seconds, where they saw the suspects fleeing on foot.

Both suspects were armed with handguns as they fled. Berry ran around the





was one the groups to see its funding request cut. Representatives of the music festival were at the event to petition for the amount that doubled last year's grant.

"It's definitely a lot of money," said Nick Patel, TDC council member and local hotel owner. "Mind you, you guys have done a great job last year."

He said as a hotel they would have to make \$400,000 in hotel sales at 5 percent bed tax to generate \$20,000.

The \$15,000 approved for the event included a \$10,000 sponsorship and \$5,000 in shuttle fees to help pay for guest transport from Lake City hotels to the festival.

The founder of Lake City based Infinity Con, David Heringer, had requested \$2,000 to help with the event's sixth year in the county.

TDC Vice Chairman Tim Murphy came out against the proposal and later council member Patel said he didn't know enough about the event.

Ultimately, Heringer was allotted only \$1,000 on stipulation he provide attendance figures and hotel bookings generated by the event plus show how it was marketed.

Lastly, the \$1,500 request of the Annual Goodwill Games Basketball Tournament held at Richardson Community Center and Annie Mattox Park North Inc. was reduced to \$800 based on 2017 attendance rates.

The newcomer to receive \$5,000 in TDC funds was the Florida High School Rodeo.

"We had a few things that we added that were requesting for the year — one new event that came to ask for a bit of funding — but overall it was a pretty standard budget," said TDC Executive Director Paula Vann.

Two events held in Suwannee County at the Spirit of the Suwannee Music Park—the Suwannee River Jam and the Wane Festival — were approved for a total of \$8,500.

Stephen Foster Folk Culture Center State Park in Hamilton County got \$2,500 for the Florida Folk Festival.

Vann said they are regu-

larly approached with questions about providing funding for out-of-county events like Party in the Pines.

"We get that question quite often of, 'Hey they're in a different county why are you giving them money?'" Vann said. "But the people that are going to these events stay at our hotels because Hamilton County, Suwannee County, they don't have many hotels so they stay here and that's why we provide the shuttles."

Wednesday's allocations still have to be approved by the County Commission before they go into effect.

## Coaches don't want transfer rules leading to free agency

New rules makes it easier for players to be immediately eligible without a waiver.

ATLANTA — For all their talk about wanting what is best for players, SEC coaches draw the line at new rules pushing college football closer to free agency.

For those coaches, free agency for players ended on high school signing day.

The Southeastern Conference recently passed new rules making it easier

for players to transfer within the league and be immediately eligible without a waiver, either as graduates or when leaving a team hit with NCAA sanctions. Before the new rule, graduate transfers had to sit out a year when moving to a new SEC school.

Such coaches as Georgia's Kirby Smart and Florida's Dan Mullen worry the new rules could move the league closer to free agency if more freedoms to players are granted. They cringe at the idea players could be eventually empowered to seek transfers as soon as they drop on the depth chart or are asked to run extra laps.

"I've expressed my belief

in a guy who graduates from college being able to go where he wants to go," Smart said Tuesday at SEC Media Days. "I feel very strongly about that, but when you start talking about every year ... I've got to be honest with you, it's hard."

Smart said it would be especially tempting for freshmen, struggling to adjust to college life, to look elsewhere if it were easier for them to transfer.

"It's not easy your first year in college," Smart said. "It's one of the biggest adjustments you go through in life. So to be able to make it easy to leave, I think that's tough. I think it's a fine line. I want the players to be able to have



the freedom and rights, but it's tough. Put yourself in that situation when you come in there and you've been told how good you are your whole life and it's difficult to make that transition."

Smart's support for graduate transfers having immediate eligibility became well known when he successfully

CARNOUSTIE, Scotland — The eve of the British Open felt like cramming for a final exam, a multiple choice one with no obvious answers.

## UNC's Fedora causes stir with CTE comment

CHARLOTTE — North Carolina coach Larry Fedora said Wednesday he doesn't believe it's been proven that football causes the degenerative brain disease CTE and offered a passionate defense of a sport he believes is "under attack."

Fedora, during interviews at Atlantic Coast Conference preseason media days, described the sport as an integral part of American culture and said it is "safer right now than it's ever been," though he acknowledged the risk of

concussions in a sport featuring constant collisions.

It wasn't clear who Fedora was referring to in saying the game was under attack, with the seventh-year Tar Heels coach noting, for example, "it's more about people twisting data" to argue football is unsafe. He also said players should be educated on the risks of the game.

## Concussion payout could jump by \$400M

PHILADELPHIA — Lawyers representing former NFL players estimated Wednesday that payouts from the concussion settlement with the league will top \$1.4 billion, a \$400 million jump because of thousands more players filing claims.

The number of players who filed to be a part of the settlement is outpacing all previous estimates and could keep growing, the lawyers said in a federal court filing based on estimates from an actuary. The estimate accounts for players who have filed claims and those who have

officially given notice that they intend to file claims.

The actuary said participation rates are 21 percent higher than estimated when the settlement was reached. As of July 16, 499 claims totaling more than \$485 million had been approved, according to the filing.

The massive increase in estimated payout came the same day a judge denied a request from the league to appoint a special investigator to look into what the league said are extensive fraudulent claims against the settlement fund.

Judge Anita Brody wrote in her federal court ruling





That the league's attorneys had demonstrated that there is "sufficient evidence of probable fraud to warrant serious concern." But Brody said a special master and a claims administrator have effectively ferreted out those claims for now.

"The audit process is working effectively," Brody wrote in her deferral ruling, saying if the claims administrator or special master notify the court an investigator is needed, "the Court will rule on the motion at that time."

The league requested an investigator and cited in its May argument an independent study it said found more than 400 claims recommended for denial based on evidence of fraud by attorneys, doctors and former players attempting to cheat the program. The league has said those attempts to scam the \$1 billion settlement fund have slowed down the awarding of valid claims.

The settlement, which took effect January 2017, resolved thousands of lawsuits that accused the NFL of hiding what it knew about the risks of repeated concussions.

It covers retired players who develop Lou Gehrig's disease, dementia or other neurological problems believed to be caused by concussions suffered during their pro

careers, with awards as high as \$5 million for the most serious cases.

Attorneys for the league had cited practices such as doctors seeing players for evaluation not in clinical settings, but in hotel rooms, law offices or other places. They also cited a doctor who said she spent seven to 12 hours evaluating each patient, but approved sometimes as many as eight patients a day.

A lawyer for several plaintiffs said Wednesday that he and others representing the players supported Brody's decision. "Since the NFL filed its motion more than three months ago, the claims process has continued to accelerate and the current audit process is working effectively," said Chris Seeger, co-lead counsel for the retired players. "We will not allow a small number of potentially fraudulent claims to be used as an excuse by the NFL to deny payment to legitimately injured former players."

In their May arguments, Seeger and other attorneys noted that the instances of fraudulent claims would be cut dramatically after the most recent rules for claims went into effect, including a list of approved physicians to determine eligibility.

Brody warned in her ruling that she expects the process to ensure valid claims are promptly paid.

this dry since Hoylake in 2006, when Woods hit only one driver all week and captured the Open for the third time. This might not be much different.

"It's just hard to keep the ball in play," he said. "It's going to be an interesting test to see which clubs we're going to be using off the tees, and a lot of it is dependent on which way the wind blows. So the whole idea of these practice rounds is just to get a good feel for what I'm going to do, and then adjust accordingly."

Others are coming to a different conclusion. Because while the links are as fast as ever, the rough is too thin, too wispy to wreak havoc. Dustin Johnson, the No. 1 player in the world, figures he'll hit driver about half the time on the 15 holes that are not par 3s. Two-time U.S. Open champion Brooks Koepka also is bullish on the big stick, saying the driver will come out on about eight or nine holes.

Defending champion Jordan Spieth was considering his options on the final day of practice. On the 415-yard fourth hole, with a bunker on the right side of a dogleg left and another bunker farther out on the left side, he hit a fade over the right bunker. The other option is a long iron that splits the bunker.

And then Spieth had another idea.

"Aim for the 4?" he asked his caddie, Michael Greller. He then motioned to the gallery about 60 yards off the tee to scoot back a bit, and Spieth blasted a shot over their heads toward a yellow patch of rough that separates the right side of the fourth green from the 15th tee. There's not enough deep grass to get into trouble.

The answers will start arriving on Thursday when the 147th edition of the British Open — and the eighth edition at Carnoustie — gets started.

"I think there's not going to be one player in this field that has a game plan on Wednesday night and is going to stick to that game plan the whole way around for 72 holes," Rory McIlroy said. "It's just not going to happen with wind conditions, with pins. You start to feel a little bit more comfortable with a few shots, and you might start to take some on."

"Because the golf course is playing so firm and fast ... there's some guys that will see it completely different than the way I see it, and vice versa," he said. "It's going to be really interesting to see how it all plays out."

Sandy Lyle of Scotland, who won the Open in 1985, gets it start with the opening tee shot Thursday morning. Spieth, who will try to become the fifth player in the last 50 years to win back-to-back in the British Open, plays in the morning side of the draw.

Among those playing in the afternoon are Woods, back at the Open for the first time since 2015, and Koepka, who will try to become the first player since Woods in that momentous summer of 2000 to win golf's two oldest championships.

Carnoustie is regarded as the toughest of the links in any conditions, though it rarely sees this kind of yellow-and-brown conditions. The ball still rolls on brittle ground into the wind. Put the breeze at their backs, and some holes will have no more than a wedge into the greens.

game of football, that it's been proven that the game of football causes CTE," Fedora said. "But that's been put out there. We don't really know yet."

"Are there the chances for concussions in the game of football? Yeah, we all have common sense, right? Yeah, there are. When you have two people running into each other or multiple people running into each other, there is a chance of a concussion. But again, I'm going to say, the game is safer than it's ever been in the history of the game."

Known to cause violent moods, depression, dementia and other cognitive difficulties, CTE has been linked to the head repeated hits to the head endured by football and hockey players, boxers and members of the military. The NFL's billion-dollar concussion settlement included payouts for a qualifying diagnosis of CTE.

North Carolina is home to a noted center researching sports-related brain injuries and Fedora's comments caused a stir at the ACC event, which opened two days of sessions with the league's seven Coastal Division teams. He returned nearly two hours later to speak with a handful of reporters.

"I'm not sure that anything is proven that foot-


