Petty's influence lives on for local musicians

Still singing his praises a year after his death

With his stringy blond hair and distinctive voice, Tom Petty took Gainesville, then the world, by storm.

Petty, who died of an accidental drug overdose one year ago today in Santa Monica, California, left his mark all over rock music, including here in North Florida, where local musicians still pay homage to the legend.

Wally Germany, who plays guitar with the group Wally Germany and Friends, is a Petty fan who often covers some of his hits.

"Tom Petty had the formula, man. I think what the world lost was another great individual that brought people together in such a special way. I think everybody loved to hear his stuff."

Germany, 65, began playing guitar when he was 11 years old in 1964. Only three years younger than Petty, Germany said like Petty, was also heavily influenced by the Beatles.

He was a latecomer to the Petty camp. "I got into Tom Petty music within in the last 15 years," Germany said. "When he first started I was playing country music, but I got out of the music business. I became a Tom Petty fan after The Traveling Wilburys."

Petty's involvement with The Traveling Wilburys, where he sang with other musical giants such as Bob Dylan, Roy Orbison, Jeff Lynne and George Harrison, has united a group of fans who weren't necessarily rockers, but enjoyed the Wilburys' unique artistry.

"He actually grew up listening to the Beatles and

Motive murky in FW killing

More details emerge, but no word yet on what triggered deadly face-off at boat ramp.

As deputies continued investigating the shooting at a Three Rivers boat ramp over the weekend they say left one victim dead and another critically injured, a judge downgraded the charges against the suspected gunman and the survivor was reportedly awaiting surgery.

David Michael Scheel, 57, of Fort White, is accused of fatally shooting 26-year-old Joseph Sapp and critically wounding 27-year-old Joshua Brown

during an argument at the boat ramp on Santa Fe Drive late Saturday night. Scheel faces additional charges of discharging a firearm while under the influence of alcohol and felony property damage for a bullet that struck a witness' vehicle.

The two victims, both also Fort White residents, were lying near the ramp with obvious gunshot wounds when the Columbia County Sheriff's Office responded to a 10:45 p.m. 911 call about the disturbance, deputies say.

CCSO booked Scheel on charges of first-degree murder and attempted first-degree murder — but a Third Circuit judge on Monday found there was insufficient probable cause for those counts, according to a first appearance report. Probable cause does exist for second-degree murder charges, the judge found.

Florida has 12 amendments on the ballot this November, meaning civic-minded voters can easily spend hours researching each proposal, carefully analyzing the often-confusing language and going through the pros and cons.

Also on Monday, deputies were still interviewing people about the shooting and Brown was set to undergo surgery, said CCSO spokesperson Murray Smith.

Details about the kind of surgery and when it was scheduled were not available.

Brown was in critical condition when he was airlifted to a Gainesville hospital, according to a CCSO report.

Columbia County deputies — and a detective with the Alachua County Sheriff's Office who happened to be in the area — arrived to find Brown on his back and Sapp lying face down, not breathing or moving.

Scheel was inside a vehicle, lying between the back seat and driver's seat.

Brown yelled that he and his friend had been shot, pointing out Scheel as the attacker, according to the report.

A deputy treated Brown before medics took over.

Brown, who had a serious torso wound, complained that he couldn't feel his legs, according to CCSO.

Deputies detained Scheel, who claimed he was

only protecting himself, the arrest report shows.

Scheel had "superficial injuries" and was transported to a hospital, according to the report.

Sapp was pronounced dead on the scene.

Patrol deputies examined the area around the body, which was found near a white SUV with a bullet hole in the passenger door.

The SUV's owner, one of the three witnesses mentioned in the report, said she and her brother were sitting inside the vehicle when Scheel shot Sapp right beside it.

Near the body, deputies found a black Ruger semi-automatic handgun, numerous beer cans and other assorted items, according to the report.

There were two other vehicles nearby — Sapp and Brown drove to the scene separately, while Scheel arrived by golf cart.

The SUV's owner, her brother and his girlfriend told deputies they left and called 911 after they saw and heard the disturbance.

The male witness said he mistook the first gunshot for a truck backfiring, but then heard two more after Sapp and Brown started hitting Scheel, according to the report.

Brown, the taller of the two victims, stumbled sideways and fell first, witnesses told deputies. Sapp then reportedly put his hands on Scheel while the two started fighting.

Scheel fired his gun several more times — the male witness remembered at least three or four additional shots, while his sister said she heard the firearm go off at least six times after Sapp tried to wrestle it away from Scheel.

The sister said a dog had jumped into her vehicle at some point, according to the report. She yelled at Scheel to stop shooting as he fired at one of the victims.

The second woman was sitting in a different vehicle parked in front of the SUV her boyfriend and his sister were inside.

After hearing the first gunshot, she opened the door and saw the two victims trying to grab the gun from a noticeably drunk Scheel, the report stated.

Scheel submitted to an interview with law enforcement at CCSO's operations center, but details were redacted in the report.

Scheel was then taken to the Columbia County Detention Facility with no bond.

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



Parking lot construction extended

The looks of the downtown area will change in the near future as progress continues with a parking lot just west of construction taking place on the Blanche Hotel. City officials extended a contract for construction of a public parking lot that was delayed earlier in the summer with hopes the lot will be completed in a few months' time.

During Monday night's city council meeting, city council members unanimously voted to extend the construction contract by an additional 120 days. The contract extension was added to Monday night's city council

agenda as a late entry.

Joe Helfenberger, city manager, said the contract was going to expire in a few weeks and needed to be extended. He noted there was originally a month's delay in getting the contract going by the state, as well as more than a month's worth of wet weather that also delayed the project.

"That caused significant delays in the project," he said. "We're asking for a 120-day extension. We're hoping to get it done a lot sooner, but I'm taking into account the holidays — dealing with Thanksgiving and Christmas — so we want to make sure it gets done with only one more extension."

The construction costs for the public parking lot, which will be locat-

ed across the street from the city's public safety building, will be paid through Community Development Block grant funds.

In addition to the parking lot contract extension, the city also agreed to retain Marks Gray, PA, to represent the city and city officials in the connection with a civil lawsuit, titled George, et al v. Jefferson.

"We making sure the city is defending council members when they act in their official capacity on city business, but not for them personally," Helfenberger said. "This isn't a personal protection, it's a protection that you're making city laws and doing city business for the benefit of the whole community."

ends up recording with George Harrison on that album," Germany said of Petty. "That would be an ultimate goal of mine to do something like that and that he got to do that I thought was amazing."

Germany said he often plays Petty's hit, "Into the Great Wide Open," not only because of the music, but because you can see some of Petty's life in it.

"Songs where he included U.S. Highway 41 kinds of brings it home," Germany said. "I liked his thought process — his stories. He was using parts of his boyhood, growing up in the lyrics of the songs."

Petty's genius wasn't based on hard-charging guitar riffs or special effects in concert, but rather the lyrics that he wrote — something that is recog-

nized by a new generation of musicians.

Kellen Vincent, 26, of the Kellen Vincent Band, is one of them.

Vincent, also of Lake City, learned about Petty from his father, a Gainesville native who attended college there.

"Of course, growing up we always listened to the anthems like "Free Falling," "I Won't Back Down" and all the huge songs," Vincent said. "Knowing he was a Gainesville native, and having a musical family, was certainly a big part of my childhood, listening to the radio with the folks."

Vincent said Petty's influence extends further than just his hits.

"It's just incredible that such a staple in music can come from just a little town," he said.

Vincent's favorite Petty album is "Breakdown."

"There's a few goldies off every record that

everybody really clings to," he said.

Vincent said he was drawn to Petty, not because of his unique voice or showmanship.

"He was certainly his own character, that's for sure" he said. "More than anything he was consistent, was always coming up with something new and he just had those songs that's in the background music of my life. It's not that he had that one particular factor that made him so special, it was just that he was an all-around special guy. He wrote all of that stuff and it's beyond what people do today. He was the real deal."

Vincent said when Petty died last year, the world lost something special.

The Putin-Netanyahu friendship

Vladimir Putin and Benjamin Netanyahu have had a strong personal relationship for years. And why not? The Russian president and the Israeli prime minister share certain similarities, though the comparison can't be taken very far.

Both are tough leaders who are not timid in advancing interests, their own and what they perceive to be their countries' national interests, and they don't worry overmuch about what the Davos globalists and certain international busybody organizations think. They're both popular at home.

But now the two nations are in quite a diplomatic snit, and Israeli-Russian relations are at their lowest state in more than a decade. The troubles began Sept. 17, when a Russian military plane was shot down off the Syrian coast. All 15 Russian soldiers and airmen aboard the plane were killed when their IL-20 surveillance plane crashed into the sea.

The loss of life and plane was a result of friendly (and incompetent) fire. The Syrians shot down by accident a plane of their closest current ally. The Syrian military has no greater friend than Russia. Through thick and thin — even when it looked like he was about to fall, the Kremlin continued to back Bashar Assad in the Syrian civil war.

With Russia's tacit permission, Israel, too, has intervened in the Syrian war — though at a greater remove. Israel has bombed Iran-backed Shiite militant groups with more than 200 air strikes. Israel and Russia have maintained close communications about how to avoid further accidents like the downing of the Russian plane.

But it's precisely because Israel has been so active in Syria that the plane was shot down in the first place, the Kremlin now says. "Using the Russian jet as a shield, the Israeli pilots put it in the fire of Syrian air defense systems," Defense Ministry spokesman Major Gen. Igor Konashenkov said.

The nub of their complaint is that just before the plane was shot down, four Israeli F-16s carried out an attack on Syrian targets. They gave the Russians only a minute's warning, and pushed the Russian surveillance plane into harm's way. The Syrian forces evidently thought they were responding to the Israeli planes when they opened fire on the Russian aircraft. Israel disputes that, and the details remain murky. "We reserve the right to take commensurate measures in response [to the shoot-down]," Gen. Konashenkov said.

Earlier this week, Russia did exactly that. The Putin government announced the transfer of a highly sophisticated air defense system to the Syrian regime, a transfer long opposed by Jerusalem. This is the S-300 ground-to-air missile system, easily hidden and capable of firing a missile up to a target 150 miles distant. "Transferring advanced weapons systems into irresponsible hands will increase the dangers in the region," the Israelis said.

What would further increase risks is a lasting rift between Russia and Israel. Both countries at present are a needed element of stability in an unstable region. Their co-operation against Islamic terrorism is a good thing, only to be encouraged. The risk of Messrs. Putin and Netanyahu sharing certain personality traits is that when they're going against each other things can get ugly in a hurry. Neither man is quick to blink. The rift is likely to grow wider before it narrows. The rift demonstrates once more that nations have no permanent friends, but permanent interests.

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

Logical contradictions

Concerning the accusation of attempted rape made by Christine Blasey Ford against Brett Kavanaugh, he has cleared his name. She points to witnesses in the room at the time, all of them have said nothing remotely like that ever took place, and yet we still heard Democratic calls for an FBI investigation. The wish apparently is that non-witnesses can convince everyone otherwise.

There's something almost insane about all of this, including the bizarre tales that have followed the first one, but our national confusion hardly ends with the struggle to whomp President Donald Trump's nominee for justice of the Supreme Court. For another matter of consequence and similar illogic, the progressive hope is that Democrats will win the House and Senate in the midterm elections and thwart the worst of Trump; that would more likely mean thwarting the best of him and aiding the worst.

Consider that a truly shiny moment for Trump and his Republican cohorts was passage of tax reform legislation taking a sluggish economy and inspiring it with life, liberty and a better chance for millions to pursue happiness.

We've had some of the lowest unemployment rates ever, a situation in which a stroll down Main Street shows as many "We're hiring" signs as invitations to come in and buy. Stagnant wages? Up-and-at-'em. Manufacturing, said by the Obama administration to have run out of human needs, is looking hard for skilled hands. Consumers are confident, small business are confident, family incomes are up, and the Democrats have had enough.

They said President Barack Obama did this invigorating thing and that the tax breaks were just

for the rich. But while the Obama plan had its pluses, the economy grew despite him, not because of him, and even then very slowly. The thing about tax cuts is not whether they might benefit some with fat

wallets, but whether they are for the overall good of the society, and they were. And if you really want unemployment lines circling around the block, go back to some of the highest corporate taxes in the world.

The Democrats, who could change things as midterm victors with shut-down-the-government budget games, are more and more socialists these days. They don't get it that, without adjustments, Social Security, Medicare and Medicaid will be consuming all federal revenue in not so many years. What they want is more money spent on

all of these — in fact, Medicare for everyone — along with guaranteed jobs, free college, forgiving student loans, paid family leave and redone infrastructure. What you are talking about is tens of trillions of extra spending over the next decade and you won't get there with taxes that would only achieve equality of destitution.

The debt would kill us and Trump might not mind so much since he is already reluctant to do much about it or to touch Social Security. He is right to want to restructure infrastructure, but it ought to be done with public-private partnerships while killing other programs to pay for it. Meantime, Trump is working on another way to destroy the economy — his tariffs that are already raising prices, reducing exports and costing jobs, and, on this issue, many Democrats are with him, especially gung ho to get China to play fair.

Democrats have long been protectionist for the sake of union support and don't care that ratification of the Trans-Pacific Partnership would unite lots of Asia in ways that could effectively constrain China, especially with help from Europe. Overall, the American people would be better off with this trade deal, but, look, there are votes and there's the national good and we know what comes in second.

NCAA should allow hurricane relief game

The NCAA can't seem to get out of its own way.

A new rule has derailed any chance of the Missouri Tigers and Kansas Jayhawks playing an exhibition basketball game to aid victims of Hurricane Florence.

Last year, the two teams finally faced off after a years-long separation, delighting fans who never stopped missing the border rivalry and raising money to help victims of hurricanes in Texas, Florida and Puerto Rico. But now, limits on exhibition games are preventing a return engagement.

The NCAA should allow an annual charity exhibition between Mizzou and KU. The contest on middle ground is the ideal compromise for fans on either side still bruised by Missouri's exit to the Southeastern Conference. And it has the added benefit of helping a good cause.

A year ago, KU and Missouri played an exhibition at the Sprint Center that raised more than \$2 million. Many schools followed their lead and set up charity exhibitions of their own.

This year, in Kansas City at least, there will not be a repeat of the Showdown for Relief game. And

that is a disappointment. An annual charity game between the former conference rivals is a no-brainer. But the rule change prevents either team from playing a third exhibition game, benevolent effort or not.

A year ago, KU and Missouri played an exhibition at the Sprint Center that raised more than \$2 million. Many schools followed their lead and set up charity exhibitions of their own. This year there will not be a repeat of the Showdown for Relief.

KU could break its contract with one of two in-state schools on its exhibition schedule. Money from those games was included in KU's annual budget, though. And knocking Emporia State or Washburn off the schedule would be unfair to fans who already have purchased season tickets, Jayhawks coach Bill Self said.

Self's point brings us back to the baffling bureaucracy of the NCAA. Why wouldn't the organization

allow a third exhibition strictly for charity? Surely the money machine that is college sports could find a way to allow one game that doesn't turn a profit.

The NCAA's hypocrisy is clear, as the sports behemoth rakes in millions of dollars, earned from players who aren't paid for their services.

Self, who has been unwavering in his refusal to consider scheduling a regular-season KU-Mizzou game, said he would have considered playing the Tigers again with proceeds going to 2018 disaster relief.

We have to take the coach at his word.

"We can't do it," Self told The Star. "They wanted the consistency of two (exhibition) games max."

Here's a thought: All Division I teams should schedule a disaster relief fundraiser game, and tell the NCAA to pound sand, as one annoyed fan suggested. Surely the NCAA wouldn't punish its members for doing something for the betterment of the community.

FORT WHITE — Nothing was slowing down Stanley Maxwell on Monday night.

Not two-days rest and certainly not Providence's defense.

Fort White's running back piled up 168 yards on the ground and scored twice to lead the Indians to a 47-14 Region 1-3A win over Providence at Arrowhead Stadium. Maxwell's performance came just three days after he pummeled Williston for 202 yards.

It was a pivotal win for Fort White, which was one point behind Providence in the regional points standings as of last week. The Indians now head into a bye before facing two tough opponents in Union County and Dixie County.

"I felt pretty good," Maxwell said. "I had to come out and perform for my team. It feels good to get a win and we'll enjoy this bye week. You don't want to

Four plays later, Brayden Summers dove into the end zone for a 1-yard touchdown to extend the lead to 21-0. Fort White combined to rush for 348 yards.

"We knew they were small up front so we wanted to be physical," Fort White head coach Demetric

Garrett Dennis answered Summers's score with a 39-yard touchdown run to get Providence on the scoreboard but Fort White answered shortly before halftime. Maxwell and company drove 47 yards in nine plays, with quarterback Dylan Blair connecting with Rahman Paul for a 5-yard touchdown to take a 28-7 lead into the break.

TALLAHASSEE — Willie Taggart is no stranger to Miami-Florida State week. The lifelong Seminole fan grew up loving the rivalry.

And now he's going to really see what it's about.

The first-year Florida State coach will lead the Seminoles (3-2, 1-2 Atlantic Coast Conference) for the first time against the No. 17 Hurricanes (4-1, 1-0) on Saturday. Taggart still remembers what it was like to have a Saturday morning or afternoon game as a kid, then racing home to see the Seminoles and Hurricanes square off in a matchup that almost always had national championship implications.

"Soon as that game was over, we were all watching TV," Taggart said. "It's one heck of a rivalry. You'll see some big hits, some big plays, guys flying around. It's a game you don't necessarily have to get guys fired up for. They under-

The Florida College System Activities Association (FCSAA) Hall of Fame recently inducted Pensacola State College (PSC) Bill Hamilton. Hamilton is the eighth PSC administrator/faculty member to be recognized by the organization.

From his beginning as an assistant at Chipola State to a proud Pirate with an impressive record of 703 wins and 468 losses, Hamilton's feats do not end there.

Hamilton, who was born in Lake City, led the Pirates to their first ever state baseball championship in 2004.

Hamilton also was awarded the FCSAA Coach of the Year, NJCAA Region VIII Coach of the Year and the ABCA/Diamond Regional Coach of the Year for NJCAA Division I.

In 2008, Hamilton surpassed Coach Buddy Kisner as the All-Time Career Leader in wins at PSC with his 525th victory. This accomplishment was something that he was not striving to achieve.

Hall of Fame is not the only achievement he has received over the years. Hamilton was also inducted in the NJCAA Baseball Coaches Hall of Fame and the Pensacola Sports Association Hall of Fame. Huntingdon College also placed him in the Athletics Hall of Fame in 2017.

Even with all these awards, Hamilton is a very humble man who thinks highly of our community. "The community is great, great for fishing, and Pensacola produces top level talent," said Hamilton.

He expounded on how athletes from all over the world come here for the competition that one would

not get in Division I.

His analogy says it best: "I'm not a good tennis player; if I play Pete Sampras 100 times, I'll lose. But I'll get better to the point where he isn't hitting me with the 100-mile serve every time. I play my Grandma who can't move, I can beat her 100 times if I chose to. Would I get better? No, my skills would deteriorate."

the starting lineup, no one questions how important he is to the team. The run-first, old-school Jaguars built their entire scheme — offensive identity, really — around Fournette and his skillset.

"You put your whole offense around, you build it around a running, physical, downhill type of mentality," safety Tashaun Gipson said. "So when you lose that guy, who's one of the best at his position, it's tough. It's definitely tough."

T.J. Yeldon is expected to continue getting the bulk of the work during

Fournette's absence, with Corey Grant serving as a change-of-pace option.

Yeldon has 205 yards and a touchdown on 49 carries this season. He also has 14 receptions for 125 yards and two scores.

"I've got faith in anybody they put back there because we know they're going to run hard," reserve center/guard Tyler Shatley said. "You just hate to see somebody with so much talent not be able to showcase it. I know (Fournette)'s worked hard and has rehabbed hard in trying to get better. Injuries are part of the game, but you just hate to see somebody have to work through that and not be able to perform how they want to."

Quarterback Blake Bortles might be the biggest beneficiary, forced to carry

more of the offensive load. Bortles threw for a career-high 388 yards and two touchdowns against the Jets, giving him two games with at least 375 yards passing in the last three weeks.

"Blake has a way of showing up when he needs to show up," Gipson said. "If you take away the (Tennessee) Titans game, when I don't think anyone played their best game, the offense just finds a way. And they've been doing it since the end of last season. They're taking opportunities of what the defenses will give them. That's paying big dividends for us. The best defense is the defense that's sitting on the sidelines. We did a lot of that in the first half Sunday."

"I'm not too worried about the offense."



But Blair and his receivers still struggled to find consistency in game number six, with Blair only completing eight of 21 attempts for 125 yards, though he did throw three touchdown passes.

"It was the receivers today," Jackson said. "They don't expect the ball to come to them so they come off fast and then they're like, 'oh he isn't going to throw it' and then all of a sudden they see the ball up in the air. Most of those throws are designed to go to somebody else but depending on how they're playing it (Blair) ends up going to a different guy. They've got to keep going and run hard every single time."

Blair, however, made throws when he needed to.

He converted a 4th-and-11 on Fort White's opening drive of the second half, hooking up with Paul for a 13-yard gain. That set up a 29-yard touchdown pass to Izaya Latham on the very next play to extend the Indians' lead to 33-7.

Fort White's defense pushed the lead further on the very next play when Gilligan let the ball slip out of his hands as he dropped back to pass. Multiple players missed the recovery before Derrick Roberson scooped it up and took it 24

yards for another score.

Gilligan had a 1-yard touchdown sneak on Providence's next drive but the Stallions struggled to consistently move the ball against Fort White's defense, tallying only 113 yards of total offense. The Indians also sacked Gilligan four times and Latham intercepted him once.

But even with the huge margin of victory, Jackson still expected more from the Indians.

"We should have never given them 14 points," Jackson said. "I'm happy that we won but not too particularly happy with how we played. If this was one of the tougher teams we were going to play, I would have been happy but not against this competition."

Fort White's final touchdown came from Blair, who hit Roberson in stride for a 34-yard score with 57 seconds left in the third quarter. Roberson caught three passes for 58 yards.

The Indians had a chance to score two more times in the fourth with their back-ups but turned the ball over twice on fumbles inside the Providence 25-yard line.

"This bye will be good to rest up," Jenkins said. "We're going to be anxious just waiting for (Union County) and Dixie because we want to put them away. It'll be nice to rest up after two back-to-back games and work on a few things and correct some mistakes."

on WQAM-AM in Miami. "It's more than an ACC game. It's a state pride game."

Jimbo Fisher and Larry Coker, both of whom won national championships, won their first games in the Miami-FSU series. Howard Schnellenberger, Jimmy Johnson and Dennis Erickson all won

national titles at Miami, but started 0-1 in the series against the Seminoles. Even Bowden, also a national champion and someone who has more wins than anyone who has ever coached at either school, dropped his debut against the Hurricanes — 47-0.

Saturday's outcome probably won't make or break Taggart's legacy at Florida State. It may, however, loom large over how his first season in Tallahassee winds up getting remembered.

Taggart has coached against Miami once, when his South Florida team lost 49-21 to the Hurricanes in September 2013. Richt and Taggart haven't faced off as coaches, put Taggart said Monday that the two have spoken a few times in the offseason at ACC meetings and on the phone.

Now as Florida State's coach, Taggart looks to win back the "state title," something the Seminoles claimed from 2013-16 with victories over Miami and

Florida.

"When it comes to winning the state championship, it starts with this game here," Taggart said. "Our guys understand the importance. I'm excited about it. This is why you signed up to come to a game like Florida State, to play in games like this."

Notes: Taggart said Monday that OL Derrick Kelly returned to practice and is day-to-day with a leg injury. The Seminoles have started five different offen-

sive-line combinations in their first five games and if Kelly can play Saturday it would give Florida State some much-needed stability. Meanwhile, Richt indicated that Miami S Jaquan Johnson (hamstring) and LB Shaquille Quarterman (ankle) could be ready to go this weekend, but said WR Ahmmon Richards needs more time. Richards has been sidelined since the Week 1 loss to LSU with what's been called a bone bruise in his knee.
