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'Monstrous' Michael looms

Hurricane's force expected to be felt here Wednesday.

Hurricane Michael will be more of a problem for Columbia County — not less — if the storm slows down before mid-week, the local emergency management chief said Monday.

If Michael gains speed between now and mid-week, the storm is more likely to keep west and stay farther away from the Lake City area, said Columbia County Emergency Management Director Shayne Morgan. If the storm slows down, it has a better chance of moving eastward on a more direct path toward this area.

"And impacting us," Morgan said. "We're kind of monitoring it right now. A lot of the impact that we face as Columbia County is going to depend on the exact path the storm takes."

For an example of the

Not so lucky this time, say deputies

A local man was let off without charges when Columbia County deputies say they found less than 20 grams of marijuana the last time they searched his vehicle, but he didn't get so lucky the next time.

Cary or Casy Ryan Duncan, 27, of Southwest Aloe Court, faces one count each of drug possession and possession of paraphernalia after deputies searched a suspiciously parked vehicle around 12:30 p.m. Sunday near a pond off Southwest Pinemount Road, according to a Columbia County Sheriff's Office report.

The report first lists Duncan's first name as Cary, but subsequently identifies him as Casy.

Duncan and a second person, whose name was

Exchange student back after 49 years

Argentinian woman visits local family she lived with in 1969.

Nearly half a century after an Argentinian exchange student spent her senior year at Columbia

High School she came back to Lake City, fulfilling a promise to visit her American "family" once she retired.

Mary Lee Doherty first came to Lake City during a time when soda fountains and ice cream parlors served young patrons in downtown pharmacies — July 1969.

She returned to Cordoba,

Argentina in July 1970.

Now she is back to visit her American "sisters" and stay for about a month with her American "mom," Betty Etheridge, in the same Forest Hills home she spent a year in nearly a half-century back ago.

"It was a dream come true. I

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Expect rain today, worse tomorrow as tropical storm conditions kick in

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As Hurricane Michael approached Monday afternoon, the National Weather Service's latest forecasts gave Columbia County a chance of showers and thunderstorms today, including a possible thunderstorm after noon.

But the worst of the storm is expected to hit the county Wednesday and con-

tinue into Thursday. Today's daytime forecast is cloudy, with a high near 83 degrees. East winds are expected to range from seven to 13 miles per hour. The chance of precipitation is 60 percent.

Tonight through early Wednesday morning, there is a 30 percent chance of showers and thunderstorms, mostly before 2 a.m. It's expected to be mostly cloudy during this

window, with a low around 74 degrees. East winds should be around 7 mph.

Tropical storm conditions are possible Wednesday, which has a slight chance of showers and thunderstorms. Some storms could produce heavy rain. During the day, the high should be near 89 degrees, with an 80 percent chance of precipitation.

At night, it should be cloudy. The low should be around 74 degrees, with a

60 percent chance of precipitation.

Shows are likely and a thunderstorm is possible Thursday. It should be cloudy during the day, with a high near 86 degrees and a 60 percent chance of precipitation.

Thursday night has a 30 percent chance of showers and thunderstorms. It should be mostly cloudy, with a low around 68 degrees.

damage a slow-moving storm can do, look no further than Tropical Storm Debby — which stalled over Columbia County in 2012 and drenched the area with 30 inches of rain, local officials estimated then.

The brunt of Michael's impact here is expected to be felt Wednesday and Thursday, Morgan said.

Based on a forecast from the National Weather Service in Jacksonville as of 8 a.m. Monday, Morgan said county residents can expect Michael to bring sustained tropical storm winds and hurricane-force gusts.

Columbia County Emergency Management released an update later Monday afternoon, saying the wind speed is estimated to be between 39 and 73 miles per hour, with initial winds anticipated to arrive early Wednesday morning.

Rain was expected to average two to three inches. "Fortunately, we've been in a dry spell. So we have that to our advantage,"

Morgan said. "We're hoping the rain just gets soaked up."

Morgan wouldn't say whether he expects Michael will be severe enough to cause extensive property damage or worse.

"Each storm has its own personality," he said. "I'm going to withhold comment on that until after the fact."

But Gov. Rick Scott on Monday called Hurricane Michael a "monstrous" and potentially "deadly" storm.

"We've never seen a storm like this hit this (the Northwest) part of our state," Scott said after a briefing Monday afternoon at the Pasco County Emergency Operations Center in New Port Richey.

Michael has the potential to be the strongest storm in the region since Hurricane Eloise swept across Bay County in September 1975 with 110 mph winds.

Hurricane Opal carried 100 mph winds when it hit Pensacola Beach in October 1995. Hurricane Ivan made landfall near Gulf Shores, Ala., at 105 mph in September 2004. And Hurricane Dennis was at 105 mph when it hit Santa Rosa Island in July 2005.

As of Monday, local officials were expecting the county to activate its Emergency Operations

Center today. The Columbia County Commission called an emergency meeting for 11:15 a.m. today at the EOC building on Lake City Avenue.

The county had not yet released any updates about emergency shelters as of 6 p.m. Monday.

On Monday, county Public Works Director Kevin Kirby said he was organizing his staff into teams and assigning them zones to patrol and look for

damage.

"We put a firm plan together," Kirby said.

Hurricane Irma in September 2017 caused large-scale and long-lasting power outages, leaving neighborhoods without electricity for days or longer.

City Public Works Director Thomas Henry said he drove around town Monday, checking to make sure storm drains were clear.

"Making sure we're prepared," Henry said.

A few people have put tree limbs or bags of lawn clippings or other debris on the roads or near curbs, Henry said, which can wash into storm drains and clog them up.

"It'd be a big help if they wouldn't do that," he said.

The city has not yet discussed distributing sandbags, Henry said. Officials are keeping an eye on the storm to decide if that might be necessary.

"I got a bad feeling it's going to do that one course and turn to the east," he said. "And if it turns to the east, it's

The Friends of Music Series will present its second concert at 7:30 p.m. on Thursday at Covenant First Presbyterian Church, 421 White Avenue in Live Oak.

The concert will feature classical and flamenco guitarist, Silviu Ciulei. He will perform classical pieces by Satie, Debussy, Reinhardt and Giocosa, as well as some of his own flamenco compositions.

Admission is free and a reception follows where audience members may visit with the performer.

Silviu Octavian Ciulei was born in Constanta, Romania, and began musical studies at the age of six. By 13, he was gleaning numerous awards for his guitar playing.

In 2004, Ciulei was awarded a full scholarship to study guitar performance at Middle Tennessee State University. He is the MTSU School of Music's first full scholar and grant recipient. Upon graduation, he was awarded an Outstanding Achievement Award in Guitar Performance.

Since coming to the United States, Silviu has won an impressive collection of prizes. He is a world class performer. He is also an acclaimed flamenco guitarist. He studied in

Some of his performances have been at several festivals throughout the southeast, including the Florida Folk Festival.




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

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Cheek & Scott Premiere Healthcare Center coming

To be housed at former site of Columbia Bank on U.S. 90.

Cheek and Scott Drugs is hoping to add a whole new dimension to Columbia County's healthcare picture.

Monday, the local company held its official "brick breaking" ceremony at 4785 U.S. Highway 90. The site previously housed a branch of Columbia Bank.

"We went through a lot of preparation with Stephen Douglas with DMC construction and today begins a 13-week journey of renovating the old Columbia Bank building into the Cheek and Scott Premiere Healthcare Center," said Jeffrey Scott, president of Cheek and Scott Drugs Inc.

The current Cheek and Scott facility, located in Stone Gate Plaza, will move into the repurposed bank building. Scott said the tentative plan is to open in January 2019.

"The building will be used for our healthcare center," Scott said. "The excitement to us is that we want to provide functional medicine. In that we provide a traditional pharmacy, but also weight loss, essential oils and natural remedies, educational classes on diabetes and cooking."

The services provided and the number of employees will increase as a result.

"For us this is part of the joy of people enjoying treatment, instead of enduring treatment," Scott said. "We're extending services and we felt like this might be more convenient for our patients. We can introduce some state of the art things here."

Eric Johnson, vice president and pharmacy manager of the Lake City Cheek and Scott location, said he is excited about the new facility.

"This is definitely the leading edge of healthcare, as far as a pharmacy is concerned," he said. "It's a lot, and when you put it all under one roof, it's pretty exciting."

redacted in the report, were found inside the vehicle.

They displayed "nervous behaviors" when a deputy approached, according to the report.

Duncan had an active arrest in Georgia for violation of probation on a driving charge, but it advised in-state pickup only with no extradition.

Duncan was previously stopped in August for an equipment violation. Deputies say they found less than 20 grams of marijuana in the vehicle that time, but no charges were filed.

After Duncan and the second occupant stepped out of the vehicle Sunday, a deputy saw small bits of marijuana on the second occupant's shirt, according to the report.

Duncan had a small plastic bag containing meth in his sock, which he claimed he was holding for a friend, according to the report.

The second occupant said he or she had just "rolled a blunt," but the deputy hadn't found it yet — then pointed out where it is.

Due to the cooperation, he or she will not face charges, according to the report.

Duncan was taken to jail without incident.

going to come to us."

Supt. Lex Carswell said he expected a decision on school closures would be made some time today. Parents will be contacted directly, and announcements will also be made through the newspaper, radio stations and social media, Carswell said.

As of Monday afternoon, storm predictions kept changing, he said.

"Some people are telling me it's not going to be that big of a deal, some people are telling me it's a real big deal," Carswell said.

Parts of the Suwannee Valley will start seeing an impact Tuesday evening, the Suwannee River Water Management District said Monday.

The district issued an emergency order for Alachua, Baker, Bradford, Columbia, Dixie, Franklin, Gilchrist, Hamilton, Jefferson, Lafayette, Levy, Madison, Suwannee, Taylor and Union counties.

"The order outlines response measures and eases regulatory guidelines to allow for the aid of emergency assistance to private citizens and local governmental entities," the announcement sates.

"Response measures include the use of pumps to move water across drainage basins, cleanup of drainage systems, repair of structures to prevent flooding and the creation of drainage systems to provide flood relief."

Gov. Rick Scott on Monday warned residents of the Panhandle and the Big Bend region to "seriously" plan for the impact of the rapidly develop-

ing Hurricane Michael, which is expected to reach Florida by mid-week with maximum sustained winds of 100 mph.

Scott said emergency officials are "doing everything they can to get everybody ready." But, as Michael is expected to bring storm surge, rains, flash flooding and tornadoes, Scott said the storm's northward speed through the Gulf of Mexico is different from hurricanes that have hit Florida the past couple of years.

Scott asked for President Donald Trump to declare a pre-landfall emergency for 35 counties, including Columbia and Suwannee.

As of Monday, Michael was expected to make landfall as a Category 3 hurricane in the Panhandle.

recognized both of them," said Doherty, referring to Etheridge and her daughter Nancy Westberry, who picked Doherty up from Jacksonville International Airport.

Doherty lived for a year with Etheridge and her daughters, Nancy, then a ninth-grader, and Tere Etheridge Hoechst. Tere was also a senior at CHS in the Class of '69.

"It was as though she had never been away," said Betty Etheridge, now 90.

A lifetime has passed since Doherty strolled the sidewalks of Lake City. One of her keepsakes from her time at CHS is a presidential physical fitness award signed by then President Richard M. Nixon, she said.

In the meantime, Doherty has been married, and has children and grandchildren. She taught English and Portuguese at high schools and universities in Cordoba City, and lived for nearly a decade in Brazil.

One of 10 students chosen for the American Field Service Exchange Student program, Doherty said the visit to Lake City was her first overseas trip — stopping

first in New York City before making her way south to Jacksonville 49 years ago.

"When I came down from the plane I said, 'Hi Mom,'" said Doherty. "That was my new family."

It was also how Doherty addressed Etheridge Monday at Etheridge Furniture off SW Main Boulevard.

"It was amazing, it was like a flash for me being there, you know," Doherty said.

She arrived in Jacksonville again on Sept. 16. Since then she's met with former instructors and classmates to take walks down a memory lane that has changed little.

"Everything was recognizable" Doherty

said. "I was glad. The only thing I insisted on was going downtown."

Etheridge was glad to oblige, but on condition that Doherty start her walk closer to downtown than Doherty wanted.

"She wanted to walk from my house," Etheridge said.

They settled on the VA Hospital.

"We're not used to taking the car that much," Doherty said, adding Cordoba City, as Argentina's second largest city, was heavily congested with traffic.

Now Doherty has about two weeks left to soak in the sights and relive old times before returning to the hilly region of Argentina she calls home.

Dems need a good party cleansing

Democrats, at one time, at one President John F. Kennedy time, for instance, may have been able to make a sensible case for serving as a party that puts its people first, its country at the forefront, and its compass fixed directly on helping the downtrodden and forgotten of society.

But those days are long gone. Look at the Democratic Party Platform of 1960, versus the Democratic Party Platform of 2016.

On civil defense, the 1960 circa Dems were adamant, a “strong and effective civil defense is an essential element.”

On far-left ideologies, to include communism, the Democrats of decades gone by wrote, “To the rules of the Communist World: ... We believe your Communist ideology to be sterile, unsound, and doomed to failure. We believe that your children will reject the intellectual prison in which you seek to confine them, and that ultimately they will choose the eternal principles of freedom.”

The times, they have changed.

The party of Barack Obama, the part of Hillary Clinton, the Democratic Party of 2016 brought forth an altogether different kind of platform.

Section One reads, “Raise Incomes and Restore Economic Security for the Middle Class.”

Section Two: “Create Good-Paying Jobs.”

Section Three: “Fight for Economic Fairness and Against Inequality.”

And Section Four: “Bring Americans Together and Remove Barriers to Opportunities,” followed by the subheads of “Guaranteeing Civil Rights,” “Guaranteeing Women’s Rights,” “Guaranteeing Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual and Transgender Rights,” and “Guaranteeing Rights for People with Disabilities.”

It’s not until page 40 of the platform the Democrats of 2016 get around to addressing national defense, the military and the war on terrorism — and then only in the most globally minded, social justice of manners.

“Democrats welcome and honor all Americans who want to serve and will continue to fight for their equal rights and recognition,” the platform’s “A Strong Military” section read. “We are proud of the repeal of Don’t Ask, Don’t Tell and we commit ourselves to insuring fair treatment for LGBT veterans.”

What a switch a few decades brings.

While good for Republicans — and both polls and anecdotal evidence certainly show that even the more independent voters around the nation detest how Kavanaugh’s been treated by the left — this far-left shift of the Democrats leading to tuggery in the streets is damaging to America as a whole, in the long-term.

Simply put: A country run by chaos rather than law and order is a country slated to crumble. Even Democrats running high on political ambition ought to see the sense of returning to more constitutional times and adopting more measured, Founding Father-type principles.

Democrats, for the good of the nation, need to scrub the radical elements from their midst and get back on board with putting America first. It’s not just a campaign slogan, courtesy of President Donald Trump; putting America first is a basic constitutional principle that Democrats of yesteryear seemed to understand.

Today’s Democratic Party should revisit some of their past platforms and revise accordingly.

Is #MeToo itself a threat?

Watch out, stay calm, don’t go the way of the French Revolution that replaced tyrants with worse tyrants, chopping off innocent heads by way of self-righteous evil. That’s what some might want to say to the #MeToo movement as it besmirched its truly noble objectives by some telling us that Brett Kavanaugh was guilty until he impossibly proves he isn’t, that women never lie, that masculinity is toxic and that trusting old, white men is swimming with the sharks.

Sexual assault is obviously an abomination that must be fought, and it was impossible not to sympathize with Kavanaugh’s accuser, Christine Blasey Ford, as she testified at a Senate hearing on national TV. She was clearly troubled, emotionally wrought, almost surely a victim of some horror at some time. But her story bounces all over the place and has no corroboration at all. None. Among those she said were at a party where attempted rape occurred was a best friend who gently says, well, no, she was never there, and there is almost unquestionably nothing there in some of the yarns of others who have lined up behind Dr. Ford.

Nevertheless, when you turn on the TV or read an op-ed piece, there’s almost always a #MeToo feminist saying a victim is a victim if she says she is a victim, that evidence is no more necessary than a bulldozer to lift a toothpick and that we must presume the guilt of the guy no matter what the filthy liar says.

Tell that to Gregory Counts and VanDyke Perry, two men accused

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of kidnapping and rape by a woman who this year admitted she made it up after DNA tests proved as much. The thing is that Counts, arrested at age 19, had already spent 26 years in prison, and Perry, arrested at 21, had spent 11 years in prison. According to The New York Times, the woman’s testimony was inconsistent to begin with, and guess what. This kind of thing is not all that unusual, and meanwhile we have college campuses at which a male student can be expelled and have his life ruined without the refuge of due process if a female student has at him.

While long denied equal rights, women in America seem to have been stronger than women almost anyplace else in the world. Alexis de Tocqueville, the great French philosopher who wrote about America in the early 19th century, is quoted as saying an American woman “thinks for herself, speaks with freedom ... is full of reliance on her own strength,” is neither timid nor ignorant, is happily bold and “is always mistress of herself.”

Women did ultimately pursue their rights, too, did get the vote, still lost out in other arenas but

kept pushing on to the point where now, as one example of advancement, they outnumber men in our colleges and universities. One thing they fought for in the 20th century was sexual equality with men. That gave us the sexual revolution, where many old norms were shoved aside, leading to freer sex — “hookup culture” on campuses — and to more male abuse. And so women tried to save themselves.

While people have said the #MeToo movement is unlike anything before it, it isn’t. There was a less flamboyant but still meaningful version in the 1990s, especially coming down on bosses taking advantage of employees until President Bill Clinton was exposed as a leader of the Casanova pack. Then many liberal feminists put politics before their central cause and defended his outrages, often asking critics, “Haven’t you ever lied about sex?” Interestingly, one analysis I ran across says the new #MeToo movement arose because his wife was defeated in her race for president by a man with Clintonesque depravities.

With the public shaming of so many celebrities and others, the movement has probably already lessened threats to women, and that’s good. But zealotry isn’t good. It can breed assorted bigotries and lead to different kinds of abuses, societal unfairness, indecency, to a figurative guillotine that may not literally cut off heads but can cut off fundamental human rights for those ghastly creatures called men.

It’s not ‘distracted driving,’ it’s selfish driving

You are on your way to work and waiting at a red light behind two other cars at an intersection. The light turns green, but the car at the front of the line just sits there, not moving. After 8 to 10 seconds, those behind the first car begin blowing their horns. Only then does the first car move. Meanwhile four other cars that have pulled up behind you can’t reach the intersection before the light turns red again.

Shortly afterward you get on an interstate that leads into the city and your place of employment. Traffic is heavy but moving along at the speed limit of 55 mph. Then you come upon a car in the left lane that is going at least 20 mph under the speed limit. It crawls along even though it is at least 15 empty car lengths behind the next car in that lane. Other cars coming up to this car in the fast lane try to move over to the right lane to get by it. Meanwhile the driver in this car is looking down at his lap much of the time, glancing up at the windshield every five seconds or so to check on the car in front of him.

These are but two examples of what has been labeled “distracted driving.” However, the expression “distracted driving” is only a euphemism for “selfish driving.” In each case the driver’s attention is not pulled away by something outside his immediate control, such as a sudden flash of lightning, an ambulance siren, an accident sitting on the left shoulder or a toddler crying

in the back seat. No, in each case the driver deliberately chooses to look down and focus on his device, where he is texting and checking e-mails, even though doing this obstructs other drivers and increases the risk of an accident.

So-called “distracted driving” is just one example of a pervasive problem on our roads today, namely disregard for the rights of others, including their safety. This disregard manifests itself in road rage incidents, tailgating, drivers who abruptly cut in front of cars in the next lane with little space between the two, and drivers who purchase loud turbo mufflers that purposely disturb the peace with ear-splitting howling that assaults the personal space of anyone within two to three blocks of the car (e.g. pedestrians, shoppers), including residents of homes near that street or highway.

Studies conducted by the National Safety Council and the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration since 2010 have shown that those who text while driving are at between 8 and 23 times greater risk of having an accident. This is not surprising. It takes an average of five seconds to read or send a text while driving, and at 55 mph a car travels 100 yards in five seconds, the entire length of a football field. As a result, in 2015, nearly 400,000 people nationwide were injured in crashes involving a distracted driver, and nearly 3,500 of them were killed.

Lower speed limit not a panacea

for traffic deaths

Nonetheless, even with frequent messages in the media on the dangers of “distracted driving,” laws prohibiting texting while driving are not taken seriously and are not strictly enforced. Indeed, the internet communication resources that are now standard equipment on the dashboard of many new cars in 2018 cater to a driver’s restless craving for an endless stream of digital stimuli throughout the day, even when behind the wheel. Safe, responsible driving is of secondary importance to the immediate gratification afforded by the on-board internet access portals in cars today.

The widespread indifference to this problem resembles perceptions of drunken driving 50 years ago. Driving while intoxicated did not carry the same legal risks as is the case today, risks such as the likely revocation of one’s license, stiff fines, even detention and incarceration. This was before the advent of Mothers Against Drunk Driving in 1980 and their successful national campaign to reform and strengthen drunk driving laws and their enforcement. A similar transformation is needed with respect to “distracted driving.” We are on a slippery slope. Unless we stop and reverse the trend toward increased digital addiction behind the wheel, one shudders to think what the new norm will be for driver behavior in five years.

Online registration takes a few minutes. The address is www.registertovoteflorida.gov. Applicants need to enter information from either a Florida driver's license or Florida ID card, as well as the last four digits of their Social Security number.

In-person registration is done through the local election office.

To register by mail, eligible voters can print out and complete the National Voter Registration Form, which must be sent to their local election office.

Just the beginning

Twenty three long years have past since a basketball team took the floor at Florida Gateway College, leaving fans to wonder if the once-heralded program would ever come back. Their wishes have finally been answered – the wait is over.

The Timberwolves are set to begin their first campaign since 1995, with their first exhibition game coming against Edward Waters this weekend. FGC players have used the last couple months to get acclimated and familiar with college life. With official practices starting last week, the Timberwolves are in full-go for the season.

“We’re still trying to get this transition down,” FGC coach Charles Ruise said. “There’s things that they did in high school that, at the college level, you’re not going to be able to get away with. Now it’s more about paying attention to detail, executing and doing the things it takes to adjust to this level.”

Despite its first season in decades, FGC hopes to make some noise early on with the help of three former Columbia Tigers in big-man Jamel Jackson, David Morse and guard Trey Miller, who was the last addition to the 2018-2019 recruiting class.

Jackson, Morse and Miller will be backed up by nine other freshman standouts in Kenny Brown Jr. (Palmetto), Diamond Smith (Gainesville), Jaiden Lee (Miami-Southridge), Elexpe Johnson (Wakulla), Bryan O’Boyle (North Port), Jermaine Graham (Manatee), Caleb Johnson (Central), Tay Cobb (Melbourne Central) and Nathaniel Henderson (Miami-Norland).

Ruise, a former guard at FGC, took over the reins at his alma mater in June after the school parted ways with ex-coach Kevin Fields. Ruise has worked quickly as he tries to imple-

Machado helps L.A. overpower Atlanta

ATLANTA — When the Los Angeles Dodgers bolstered their already power-packed lineup with slugging shortstop Manny Machado, this is just what they had in mind.

Plenty of long balls. Another deep run in the postseason.

Next stop, the NL Championship Series for the third year in a row.

Machado drove in four runs — three of them with a seventh-inning shot into the left-field seats — and the Dodgers finished off the Atlanta Braves with a 6-2 victory Monday in the NL Division Series.

“There are so many expectations put on him,” Dodgers manager Dave Roberts said. “We have a lot of good players, but I can’t say enough about his focus and preparedness.”

Los Angeles took the best-of-five series 3-1 and advanced to face the Brewers. Game 1 is Friday night in Milwaukee.

Coming off a tense victory in Game 3, the Baby Braves grabbed the lead on pinch-hitter Kurt Suzuki’s two-run single in the fourth.

But David Freese, the 2011 World Series MVP with St. Louis, came through again in the postseason. He delivered a pinch-hit single in the sixth off Brad Brach, driving home Cody Bellinger and Yasiel Puig for a 3-2 lead.

Machado finished off Atlanta in the seventh, launching a 1-2 pitch from rookie Chad Sobotka over the Dodgers’ bullpen — his team’s eighth homer of the series. A free-agent-to-be acquired from Baltimore in July, Machado also had a run-scoring double in the first.

He had only three hits in the series, but two of them were homers, along with six RBIs.

“I’m just sitting here enjoying everything, enjoying the ride,” Machado said.

Ryan Madson (1-0) earned the win by getting the final two outs in the fifth to escape a bases-loaded jam. The Braves’ final gasp came in the eighth, when Lucas Duda’s drive into the second deck in right drifted foul with two on against Kenta Maeda. Duda flied out to end the inning, and Atlanta went down quietly in the ninth.

The Dodgers celebrated briefly and posed for pictures in the middle of SunTrust Park, but

Panthers goalie Luongo out 2-4 weeks with knee injury

SUNRISE (AP) — Florida Panthers goaltender Roberto Luongo will miss two to four weeks with a sprained medial collateral ligament in his right knee. Coach Bob Boughner announced the injury Monday, adding Luongo will not need surgery. The Panthers placed Luongo on injured reserve Sunday after he left their season opener Saturday night. Luongo started 33 games for Florida last season and went 18-11-2 with a 2.47 goals-against average and .929 save percentage. He missed more than two months with a groin injury last season. The 39-year-old is signed through the 2021-22 season at a salary cap hit of \$5.3 million. Florida recalled goalie Michael Hutchinson from Springfield of the American Hockey League and will lean on James Reimer in Luongo's absence. Boughner says the Panthers are confident in Reimer because of his starting experience in the NHL.

Neck injury ends playing career of Miami WR Ahmmon Richards

CORAL GABLES, Fla. (AP) — Miami wide receiver Ahmmon Richards' career is effectively over because of a disabling neck injury that will make playing football a too high-risk proposition for him going forward. Miami announced the news Sunday, without revealing the exact nature of the injury or how it happened. The announcement came one day after the 16th-ranked Hurricanes rallied to win their annual rivalry game with Florida State. Richards spent that game on the sideline, jumping and celebrating with teammates as Miami pulled off its biggest comeback win since 2003. That will be his role going forward. Richards' career ends with 74 catches for 1,382 yards and six touchdowns. "I'm extremely appreciative of the university's athletic training and medical staffs for diagnosing this injury, and to the football coaches and staff for always putting my health first," Richards said.



they have much bigger goals. Los Angeles is seeking its first World Series title since 1988.

"We all know that there's a lot more work to be done," Robert said. "We have eight more wins to go."

Atlanta's return to the postseason for the first time since 2013 yielded a familiar result.

The Braves have lost nine straight playoff appearances, their last victory coming 17 long years ago against a team that is no longer in the National League. Since a sweep of Houston Astros in the 2001 NL Division Series, October has been a month of misery for the Braves.

Getting back to the playoffs ahead of schedule after a massive rebuild, Atlanta simply didn't have the experience, depth or power to stick with the power-packed Dodgers. Los Angeles had a franchise-record 235 homers during the regular season and hit eight more against the Braves, accounting for 14 of its 20 runs.

"They're a very powerful team,"

Braves manager Brian Snitker said. "It's what they've done all year is hit home runs. We're not built like that yet."

Los Angeles also benefited from some shaky Atlanta defense during its go-ahead inning. Puig kept the sixth going with a pop down the line off Jonny Venters (0-1) that fell between second baseman Ozzie Albies and right

fielder Nick Markakis.

Puig stole second without drawing a throw and came home when backup shortstop Charlie Culberson failed to knock down Freese's sharp grounder up the middle. A super sub during the regular season, Culberson had to start in the playoffs because of an injury to regular Dansby Swanson.
