Murder case may go to jury today

Stems from drive-by shooting 1 year back.

The murder trial stemming from a year-old drive-by shooting is set to conclude today.

The trial of 29-year-old Deron Marquis Matthews has been underway since Monday. Matthews was charged with first-degree murder after Lake City police officers say he shot Curtis Myers from a passing vehicle in October 2017.

Myers, 25 at the time, was pronounced dead at a local hospital.

The jury was chosen before lunch time Monday, and the trial continued later that day with witness testimonies.

At least one witness said he saw Matthews fire the gun.

Multiple witnesses said they couldn't identify the shooter, but recognized the shooter's car as belonging to Matthews.

Tuesday, the court mostly heard from experts. A Florida Department of Law Enforcement employee spoke about tracking Matthews' phone.

Another FDLE employee testi-

This weekend, a bygone way of life will be revived in the piney swamps of O'Leno State Park for the annual Alligator Warrior Festival.

Friday through Sunday, the early 1800s will be on display, including the day to day lives of the Seminole and Creek peoples as well as European settlers.

Gambling measure foes raise a bundle

FanDuel, DraftKings among major donors.

A political committee fighting a ballot measure that could make it harder to expand gambling raised \$970,000 in early October and has brought in nearly \$7 million since forming in July, according to a newly filed finance report.

The committee Citizens for the Truth About Amendment 3 had raised a total of \$6.94 million as of Oct. 5. The contributions early this month included \$750,000 from Gulfstream Park Racing Association and \$100,000 each from FanDuel Inc. and DraftKings Inc., according to the report posted on the state Division of Elections website.

The committee also spent \$1.367 million between Oct. 1 and Oct. 5, with most of the money going for advertising expenses. The committee is fighting a proposed constitutional amendment on the



Michael kills 16 in state

'Hallelujah!' A glimmer of hope as cellphone service returns to the Panhandle.

PANAMA CITY — Hurricane Michael killed at least 16 people in Florida, most of them in the coastal county that took a direct hit from the storm, state emergency authorities said Tuesday. That's in addition to at least 10 deaths elsewhere across the South.

The scope of the storm's fury became clear after desperate searches of the Florida Panhandle neighborhoods devastated by the most powerful hurricane to hit the continental U.S. in nearly 50 years.

The count of 16 dead was twice the number previously tallied by the AP.

Emergency authorities said 12 of the deaths were

in Bay County, where the storm slammed ashore with 155 mph winds and towering storm surge last Wednesday.

Bay County includes Mexico Beach, the ground-zero town of 1,000 people that was nearly obliterated, as well as Tyndall Air Force Base, Panama City and Lynn Haven, all heavily damaged.

Florida emergency authorities gave no details on how the victims died.

The AP's tally also includes 10 deaths in Virginia, Georgia and North Carolina.

Mexico Beach Mayor Al Cathey said two deaths were confirmed in his town, a man and a woman who did not evacuate and whose homes were destroyed.

Only one person remained missing in Mexico Beach, Cathey said, adding that authorities were almost certain that that person evacuated before Michael and simply hasn't been contacted.

Nearly 137,000 Florida customers remain without power in a region that stretches from the Gulf of Mexico to the Georgia border, according to numbers from state emergency management officials.

Meanwhile, a glimmer of hope emerged when cellphone service began to return to the stricken zone.

Cathey had a one-word exclamation when his Verizon phone started working for the first time in nearly a week: "Hallelujah!"

Verizon service also resumed in Panama City, where residents haven't been able to contact loved ones or call for help.

Gov. Rick Scott had been criticizing phone companies over what he called a slow restoration of service.

Sitting outside in the Panama City area, Christy Tanksley said the improvement in service was a relief.

"A lot of people didn't even know we had evacuated and come back," said Tanksley.

"I turned my phone on this morning and it started going crazy," she said. "There were all kinds of messages, Facebook notifications, emails and emergency alerts."

Many in Panhandle lack power

Energy companies tell the state it will be five more days.

PANAMA CITY — Six days after Hurricane Michael ripped through the Florida Panhandle, nearly 137,000 customers remain without power in an 11-county region that

stretches from the Gulf of Mexico to the Georgia border.

Michael slammed into the region on Oct. 10 and in the immediate aftermath as many as 400,000 customers in the state were without electricity.

Nearly a week later, most people living in small rural counties near the border

still do not have power, according to information compiled by state emergency management officials.

Several power companies have told the state that it will take at least another five days before the lights are back on in some of the communities raked by the deadly storm.

Victims struggle to find friends

In the aftermath of Hurricane Michael, Florida Panhandle residents are struggling to locate friends and loved ones who haven't been heard from, and it's unclear how many people are missing.

As President Donald Trump visited the devastation Monday, the death toll


from Michael's march from Florida to Virginia stood at 17, and the search for victims continued.

Since the storm, many people have been rescued. Emergency officials said that because of widespread cellphone outages, others could be safe and just haven't been able to tell friends or family.


Cities that were hit the hardest include Mexico Beach and Panama City, both in Florida. George Ruiz of Geaux Rescue, a nonprofit search-and-rescue operation, says authorities aren't allowing volunteer groups into either city.



of voters, would exempt the taxable value between \$100,00 and \$125,000 of homes that serve as the owner's primary residences, not counting school district taxes.

There are currently two homestead exemptions. The first covers the value of a homestead property for the first \$25,000, while the second applies to values between

\$50,000 and \$75,000.

Supporters of Amendment 1 include Florida House Speaker Richard Corcoran and Florida Senate President Joe Negron. Proponents say the measure will put more money back in the pockets of taxpayers and lead to more home purchases.

In Columbia County, 32.4 percent of homesteads will get the new exemption, and 21.1 percent will get the full \$25,000 exemption, according to a September report

from tax watchdog Florida TaxWatch. The collective savings would be roughly \$1.2 million here. But there's a catch, the report found.

"While voting for A1 will have surface appeal to some voters, Florida TaxWatch research shows that Floridians should vote against A1 for several reasons," the report states, "including the fact that A1 benefits only a small percentage of Floridians, it will inevitably lead to higher taxes for nearly everyone,

and it will further exacerbate the tax shift from homestead to non-homestead property."

Statewide, 43 percent of homesteads, 76 percent of all properties and 71 percent of families would not benefit from the change, the report found. Most taxpayers will probably be saddled with higher taxes as municipalities raise millage rates to make up the difference — on top of potentially higher sales taxes and other costs, according to the report.

"Everyone loves a tax cut, but Amendment 1 will only reduce property taxes for some, while most Floridians will face an increase in their taxes (or rents)," the report states.

Collectively, Florida's 67 counties stand to lose nearly \$645 million in tax revenue.

"Local governments are highly unlikely to allow that much revenue to disappear without moving to replace it, and therefore someone is going to have to pay for

that replacement," Florida TaxWatch wrote.

Owners of non-homestead properties, including businesses, and homestead properties not covered by the change could pay as much as \$67 more per \$100,000 of taxable value, according to the report.

"Amendment 1 is not real tax reform," Florida TaxWatch wrote, "it is a tax shift from those that already have the lowest property tax burden to those with the highest."

Nov. 6 ballot that would change the Florida Constitution and give voters the "exclusive right to decide whether to authorize casino gambling" in the state.

It would require voter approval of casino-style games in the future and effectively reduce the power of the Legislature and governor to decide gambling-related issues.

The measure, which appears on the ballot as Amendment 3, has been heavily backed by Disney Worldwide Services, Inc. and the Seminole Tribe of Florida.

Disney has been a long-time opponent of casino gambling in Florida, while the Seminole Tribe already operates lucrative casinos in the state.

fied about analyzing the crime scene, while a third spoke about fingerprints.

The Third Circuit's own investigator, Ryan Nydam, and a medical examiner also testified Tuesday.

A non-expert witness on Tuesday testified about an incident prior to the killing. The witness recounted how Matthews threatened him with a handgun in a field near the victim's home.

Closing arguments are set for today, and jury deliberations could begin before lunch unless Matthews changes his mind about testifying.

Oversight planned after improper university spending

After the University of Central Florida improperly paid for building projects, the university system's Board of Governors is moving forward with a plan that will require more oversight of so-called "carry-forward" funds that universities, unlike most state agencies, are allowed to accumulate.

Syd Kitson, chairman of the board's Budget and Finance

Committee, said Tuesday the university system had accumulated more than \$800 million in carry-forward funds as of August.

The funds have come under extra scrutiny after a state audit determined in August that UCF had improperly used \$38 million in state funding to construct a campus building. The school's use of

the accumulated operating funds was a direct violation of state policy that restricts that funding to activities like instruction, research, student services and maintenance. UCF last month said other projects also appeared to be improperly funded.

The revelation about the UCF spending prompted the Board of Governors to call for all 12 uni-

versities to review their funding of building projects over the last decade, while UCF is conducting its own investigation of the improperly used funds.

Incoming House Speaker Jose Oliva, R-Miami Lakes, is also leading a legislative panel that will review the issue.

and ruptured his pancreas, Vasco said. He said American forces claimed a one-sided victory and that numerous Indian casualties were carried away in retreat.

Whatever happened, this weekend a full blown battle will commemorate the incident as soldiers in full dress and Seminole actors battle it out for their rightful claim to the swamp.

Vasco said that under Andrew Jackson, America reneged on the 1823 Treaty of Moultrie Creek and declared all Native Americans in the Southeast had to take the Trail of

Tears to Arkansas and Oklahoma.

"They were trying to drive the Seminoles out," Vasco said, and added the Seminole reply: "Enough is enough." They refused to go.

The battle to be re-enacted over the weekend helped secure a permanent presence of forces here. "It kept roughly 200 soldiers in this part of the state instead," Vasco said.

A fort was established on what is now O'Leno State Park, and formed a network that later established towns Fort White and High Springs, he said.

Over the weekend kids can set out on a scavenger hunt to bring prizes back home, while adults learn why Florida was the most dreaded assignment of any U.S. soldier.

"This was not the most favorite assignment of any soldier," Vasco

said. "This was the worse place to send anybody."

The weekend event will focus on the 1800-1859 period.

"In addition to the re-enactment, the event is a festival that celebrates native American and immigrant American cultures with music and dancing, living-history camps, demonstrators of historic skills, traders, craftspeople, and food vendors," said information from its website, alligatorfest.org.

The park is located at 410 SE Oleno Park Road, off US Highway 41 north.

Costs to attend are \$5 per vehicle with 2-8 occupants, \$4 for single occupant vehicles or \$2 for pedestrians and bicyclists.

The event was started in the mid 1990s and was nearing its 18th year.

Elizabeth Warren the Bill Buckner pariah of politics

Elizabeth Warren, who took the puzzling step of announcing her DNA test results showing she was less Native American than most European Americans, has now come under fire from the Cherokee Nation.

And how rightly so.

Warren has become to politics what Bill Buckner has been to Red Sox fans for decades — a pariah.

Buckner, for those with memories of 1986, became a Boston outcast when he let a dribbler go through his legs at the first base line in Game 6 of the World Series against the New York Mets.

Warren?

She's a more recent convert.

Her DNA, as Breitbart noted, showed she could be anywhere from 1/64 to 1/1024 Mexican, Peruvian or Colombian. Say what?

"Buried in the Boston Globe story [on Warren] is this bombshell: 'To make up for the dearth of Native American DNA, [the DNA tester] used samples from Mexico, Peru, and Colombia to stand in for Native American,'" Breitbart wrote.

That's eye-opening on two counts.

First, as Cherokee Nation Secretary of State Chuck Hoskin Jr. blasted in a widely reported statement: "Using a DNA test to lay claim to any connection to the Cherokee Nation or any tribal nation, even vaguely, is inappropriate and wrong. It makes a mockery out of DNA test and its legitimate uses, while also dishonoring legitimate tribal governments and their citizens whose ancestors are well documented and whose heritage is proven. Senator Warren is undermining tribal interests with her continued claims of tribal heritage."

Ouch.

But if that weren't enough to shame, shame, shame the Democratic senator, there's this, from Harvard University and 23andMe, in a study conducted in 2014: European Americans, on average, test in at 0.18 percent Native American. That means Warren, who tests in between 0.09 percent to 1.5 percent, is less Native American than many other Americans.

Go figure.

But the Warren-Buckner analogy is this: "Former Red Sox Bill Buckner always lives with his World Series error," wrote the Boston Herald, in May of 2016.

And this: "30 years ago today, Bill Buckner's error extended the Red Sox curse," Fox Sports wrote in November 2016.

And this, from a "This Day In History" page of History: "Buckner lets ground ball roll through his legs: In the wee hours of the morning on October 26, 1986, Red Sox first baseman Bill Buckner lets an easy ground ball dribble between his legs and roll down the right-field line. It was just a routine fielding error, but it was a disaster for the Boston Red Sox: It was the 10th inning of the sixth game of the World Series; the game was tied; and, thanks to Buckner's mistake, the runner on third had time to score, winning the game for the Mets."

That's right; Buckner got his own History internet page, his own "day that will live in infamy" moment. Wait for it, wait for it. Warren's well on her way to the same.

She's making history with her DNA snafu. And not in a good way. In a Billy Buckner, get out Boston and never return, do not pass go, do not collect \$200 kind of way.

Warren's political future, to put it bluntly, has been affixed with the asterisk of the outcast.

Dems' Senate chances fading

The Democrats' chances of netting at least two Senate seats always seemed like a long shot. But a month ago, the stars looked to be aligning for Democrats. Today, those stars tell a different story.

With Republican challenger Kevin Cramer opening up a clear margin over incumbent Heidi Heitkamp, the North Dakota Senate race looks all but over now, according to multiple insiders. That means Democrats will need to swipe at least three GOP seats to take back the Senate — an outcome that currently appears somewhere between unlikely and impossible.

Democratic prospects have also faded over the past couple of weeks in two important states, Tennessee and Arizona. And in Nevada, a state that went for Hillary Clinton two years ago, Republican incumbent Dean Heller is running even or slightly ahead of Democratic challenger Jacky Rosen. In Texas, where Democratic enthusiasm for Democratic challenger Beto O'Rourke is off the charts, incumbent Ted Cruz continues to hold a clear and consistent advantage, with no sign that Lone Star state voters are going to fire him.

To make matters worse for Democrats, Republicans continue to threaten Democratic incumbents in four other states with Senate races — Missouri, Indiana, Florida and Montana. (Four other states that Donald Trump carried in 2016 — Michigan, Ohio, Pennsylvania and Wisconsin — are not competitive.)

The Democratic scenario for capturing the Senate always depended on swiping at least two — and probably three — Republican seats. That is now not happening.

It's possible that events over the next few weeks will change that arithmetic, but for now, Republican net Senate gains seem more likely than Democratic gains.

This year's Senate results are crucial, in part, because they will

help determine the parties' Senate prospects for the 2020 election. A GOP gain of two or three Senate seats this cycle will make it very difficult for Democrats to win the Senate in 2020, when two vulnerable Democratic Senate seats are up — in Alabama and New Hampshire — and four vulnerable GOP seats are up — in Colorado, Iowa, Maine and North Carolina.

The Democratic scenario for capturing the Senate always depended on swiping at least two — and probably three — Republican seats. That is now not happening.

While the Senate outlook is increasingly bright for Republicans, the House looks almost guaranteed to flip to the Democrats next month. Republican strategists I talked with recently privately predicted Democratic House gains ranging from 25 seats to 50 seats.

The GOP's problem in the House is the same as the Democrats' problem in the Senate — the map.

Republicans sitting in upscale suburban districts — incumbents

like Virginia's Barbara Comstock, California's Mimi Walters and Colorado's Mike Coffman — are counting down their final days in office, and "tribalism" is even endangering popular Republican incumbents in Democratic districts, like California's David Valadao.

While some GOP strategists say they see suburban men who have been on the sidelines returning to the Republican column, others say there has been only a slight bump for the GOP in recent weeks.

One Republican observer said he thought as many as 20 or 21 of the 25 Republican districts that went for Hillary Clinton last year could well flip to the Democrats, producing a large Democratic House wave.

Another Republican who believes the landscape is improving for his party agrees that the House will flip because there are simply too many strong, well-funded Democratic challengers in upscale districts.

For months, it has looked as if Democrats would capture the House and Republicans would retain the Senate. That remains the likely outcomes because there are essentially two different elections going on — one, in the Senate, in mostly pro-Trump, conservative, rural states and one, in the House, in upscale, diverse, suburban congressional districts.

One of those groups of voters is electing the Senate, while the other group is electing the House. Given the deep division in the country and the very different outlooks of pro-Trump and anti-Trump voters, that should not come as a shock to anyone.

Both parties will try to improve their prospects in the final few weeks of the campaign. With Democratic voters and particularly better educated women engaged and energetic, it is up to GOP strategists to make sure their voters turn out.

Common diabetes drug slows age-related vision loss

GAINESVILLE — A common and affordable Type 2 diabetes drug may someday have a new use in fighting vision loss, say University of Florida Health researchers who tested it in mouse models and found it slowed the loss of photoreceptors in the eye that lead to blindness.

Metformin is given to patients with diabetes to reduce the amount of sugar in the blood by instructing muscles and other cells to use glucose for energy. Now, researchers know the drug also stimulates metabolism in the eye's retinal cells. That added energy production ultimately makes these cells less susceptible to age-related macular degeneration, a common eye disorder.

"It allows these cells in the retina to be harder and more resistant to damage," said John D. Ash, Ph.D., an ophthalmology researcher in the UF College of Medicine.

The findings were published Sept. 24 in the Proceedings of the National Academy of Sciences.

Age-related macular degeneration, or AMD, causes a progressive loss of central vision. It affects more than 10 million people in the United States and is the leading cause of vision loss in older adults, according to the Foundation Fighting Blindness. Currently, there is no cure for AMD. The current treatment — a mix of vitamins and antioxidants — has moderate beneficial effects in certain patients, a 2011 study by other researchers found.

The new findings are particularly encouraging because metformin is an economical, widely used medication with few significant side effects, Ash said. Because it is an existing medication, testing its vision-protecting effects in humans could happen sooner than if it were a new drug, he added.

Ash said he focused on metformin because it can prompt cells to gather and use glucose, a simple sugar, as an energy source. Photoreceptors and their supporting cells in the retina

are energy hungry, so keeping them fully powered up can reduce DNA damage and reduce the damaging effects of oxygen being metabolized. Metformin produces its beneficial eye effects by activating a protective enzyme known as adenosine monophosphate-activated protein kinase, or AMPK, the researchers found.

To establish their findings, the researchers tested metformin in three different mouse models of retinal degeneration. The drug was able to protect photoreceptors from light damage and delay degeneration of the light-sensitive rod and cone cells in the retina. It also made the supporting cells that nourish retinal visual cells more resistant to damage, they found. After eight weeks, metformin-treated mice retained more than 50 percent of cone cell activity, whereas untreated mice did not respond to light flashes

used as visual cues.

The drug also performed well in tests that mimicked the cell-damaging effect that occurs when oxygen is metabolized. That process, known as oxidative stress, creates a risk of early macular degeneration. Mice treated with metformin retained 50 to 90 percent of their retinal-sup-

port cells, the researchers found. Overall, the drug delivered a 30 percent

increase in the lifespan of photoreceptors.

Ash said metformin is not likely a magic bullet for AMD, partly because the disease's effects in human aren't fully reproducible in mice. Still, his research suggests that the drug has the potential to reduce vision loss in patients with AMD. Metformin could prevent patients from progressing from early to advanced stages of macular degeneration, he theorized.

"For someone who's 80 years old and going blind, maybe this drug gives them another 10 years of vision," he said.

Researchers hope metformin's status as a common, established medica-

tion can expedite testing in humans as a potential sight-saving treatment.

"It's a safe drug that people take on a daily basis. It deserves a clinical trial to see if we can delay age-related macular degeneration in people," Ash said.

Funding for the study was provided by Research to Prevent Blindness, the Foundation Fighting Blindness and the National Eye Institute.

Football players were among the student-athletes who loaded up 54 trucks with 40,000 cases of water and 28,000 boxes of food to help those in need along the coast.

While some players and their families are continue to feel the impact of Hurricane Michael, the Seminoles (3-3, 1-3 ACC) were able to use the time off to rest football bumps and bruises and getting ready for the Demon Deacons (3-3, 0-2).

The Seminoles offensive line, which has been comprised of six different starting combinations due to injury, really benefited from the time off. However, Taggart said there is no timetable for







"It helped me a lot," Minshew said of the break. "Any time you get a little break and get to go home and go see your family, you just feel rejuvenated. You come back just ready to work."

Florida State has plenty of work to do in the second half of the season. The Seminoles are looking to extend their streak of playing in bowl games to a 36th season but also face a daunting schedule.

The last six games on Florida State's schedule are the toughest in the FBS, according to the NCAA. Florida State will face four Top 25 teams — No. 3 Clemson, No. 4 Notre Dame, No. 11 Florida and No. 16 NC State — and those programs have a combined 24-1 record.

Florida State hasn't beaten a ranked team since it knocked off No. 6 Michigan in the 2016 Orange Bowl. The road ahead won't be easy, but Taggart hopes the Seminoles learned from letting a 20-point, second-half lead slip away in a loss to then-No. 17 Miami.
