Modern-Day Cattle Rustlers Steal Local FFA Kids' Money

Local cattleman, Larry Lindsey, owner of Lindsey Cattle Company won the bid to purchase the cattle sold by the local FFA students at the Suwannee River Fair. Lindsey contracted with Ron Shepard to pick up and deliver the cows to United Producers Inc. in Illinois. The problem came when Shepard did not return with the monies given him by United Producers and meant for the local FFA kids. So Lindsey contacted his local attorney, Ray Earl Thomas, who in turn contacted the Levy County Sheriff's Office Investigator Jimmy Anderson on March 20, 2012.

Shepard picked up 146 cows from the Suwannee River Fairgrounds on March 21. He also had an additional 17 cows on the truck that Lindsey had purchased from the Okeechobee County Fair days

earlier.

Investigator Anderson discovered that Shepard had been in contact with the United Producers prior to his arrival and convinced them to write the check meant for the Levy County FFA kids to his personal business, Brookfield Cattle, which is owned by Shepard and his business partner, Jeremy Pierce. Shepard made the delivery of the cows and received a check from United Producers Inc. for \$200,000.21. However, he disappeared after taking possession of the check. His partner, Pierce, contacted Law Enforcement in Illinois to make a report of his missing business partner. Investigator Anderson aggressively investigated the entire transaction and found a video

Levy County Special Event Permits Being Changed

- Did You Know That?

For awhile now the Levy County Journal has been reporting on local business and local preference issues and especially the publishing of legal ads for Levy County which has for 70 years been the hallmark of this paper of record. Many of our readers have called commissioners asking questions and giving opinions as was mentioned at the BoCC meetings. We are all community members and it is important that the events of Levy County be duly noted by everyone to those that are making decisions for the county.

Next to this article is a display legal ad that was meant for everyone in Levy County concerning the changes the BoCC is making relating to Special Event Permits. We have been around this Special Event Permits mountain before so it is important to everyone in Levy County who wants to put on an event with the proper and legal blessing of the county commissioners, as it should be. The legal ad shown is an exercise for you to read and try to decipher what is going on. And you will not be able to. Purpose served.

Our question is this: Did you see this ad? This ad was placed by the BoCC through the county attorney in a Chiefland newspaper. If the content was intended only for Chiefland residents there would be no problem. But this is intended, and should be intended, for every resident of Levy County and therefore placed in the ONLY county-wide newspaper in Levy County and the ONLY county-wide newspaper with the reputation for publishing the legal notices for all of Levy County.

When questioned on the decision to publish this ad in a city newspaper, a Levy County Journal employee was told that it was due to pricing. But that pricing was at the expense of the rest of Levy County residents who do not read a Chiefland newspaper. If the ad had been placed in all three of the Landmark Media newspapers in Williston, Cedar Key and Chiefland, then it would have covered Levy County BUT the price would then have been three times the cost and more expensive than publishing in the Levy County Journal only.

Once again this points to having the legal notices for Levy County published in the only county-wide newspaper with the reputation for publishing legal notices thereby taking the guesswork out of finding items of legal concern to ALL the residents of Levy County. It is not 'expected' by the public to find county ads in city newspapers or websites. It is a reasonable expectation for anyone looking for county information to find it in a county-wide newspaper and website.

PEF Files Annual Nuclear Cost-Recovery Clause Projections with the Florida Public Service Commission

Progress Energy Florida has filed its annual nuclear cost-recovery clause (NCRC) projections with the Florida Public Service Commission (FPSC) for consideration for the 2013 billing cycle. In its filing, the utility provided updates on its proposed Levy County nuclear project and on a project to increase the capacity at the Crystal River Nuclear Plant. These updates include new estimated in-service dates and a revised cost estimate for the Levy County nuclear project and 2013 cost-recovery estimates for the capacity upgrade project.

Progress Energy Florida's currently planned nuclear investments include:

- Constructing two new, 1,100-megawatt (MW) nuclear reactors in Levy County, Fla.
- Increasing the output of the existing Crystal River Nuclear Plant in Citrus County, Fla.

The NCRC filing is submitted each year in accordance with the Florida Renewable Technology and Energy Efficiency Act of 2006, which encourages the development of nuclear energy by allowing utilities to use a pay-as-you-go approach and recover prudent preconstruction and interest costs of new nuclear construction or expansion of existing nuclear plants. The statute helps reduce the overall cost of new nuclear projects and provides for annual review and approval by the Florida Public Service Commission.

Although states across the Southeast average about 24 percent natural gas generation, approximately 60 percent of Florida's electric capacity is currently powered by natural gas. Overdependence on any one fuel source can expose customers to potential fuel cost spikes and supply disruptions, and the FPSC has repeatedly cited the growing lack of fuel diversity in the state as a major strategic concern. Expanding utilities' nuclear generation capabilities helps balance the

generation fleet and reduces these risks.

If approved in its entirety, Progress Energy's total 2013 nuclear cost-recovery clause charge would be \$5.09 on a 1,000-kilowatt-hour (kWh) residential bill beginning with January 2013 billing (compared to \$2.86 in 2012). As a result of the previously announced, FPSC-approved rate settlement agreement between Progress Energy and consumer advocates, the portion of the NCRC charge related to the Levy County nuclear project will increase to \$3.45 on a 1,000-kWh residential bill in 2013 (compared to the 2012 rate of \$2.67) and will remain fixed through 2017. In addition, the utility has requested to adjust the Crystal River Nuclear Plant upgrade-related portion of the NCRC charge to \$1.64 on a 1,000-kWh residential bill in 2013 (compared to \$0.19 in 2012).

The Crystal River Nuclear Plant has been safely shut down since a delamination – or separation – was discovered within the wall of the plant's containment building during a scheduled maintenance outage in the fall of 2009. The company and outside experts are conducting a thorough and systematic engineering analysis and review and are assessing options to repair the containment building and return the plant to service in 2014.

Also included in the utility's filing are updates to the Levy County nuclear project schedule and cost. Due to lower-than-projected customer demand, the lingering economic slowdown, uncertainty regarding potential carbon regulation and current, low natural gas prices, the company is shifting the in-service date for the first Levy unit to 2024, with the second unit following 18 months later. The revised schedule is consistent with the approach the utility publicly discussed after announcing the recent rate settlement agreement. Although the scope and overnight

cost for the Levy County nuclear project – including land acquisition, related transmission work and other required investments – remain essentially unchanged, the shift in schedule will increase escalation and carrying costs and raise the total estimated project cost to between \$19 and \$24 billion.

On April 27, the Nuclear Regulatory Commission (NRC) issued the Final Environmental Impact Statement for the project. Based on its comprehensive review, the NRC has determined that there are no environmental impacts that would prevent the agency from issuing the combined operating license for the construction and operation of the proposed reactors. This is an important milestone for the project.

"The Levy County nuclear project continues to be the best long-term baseload generation option for Florida when evaluating cost, potential carbon regulation, fuel price volatility and the benefits of fuel diversification," said Dolan. "State-of-the-art nuclear power is important to reduce the carbon intensity and improve the fuel diversity of electric generation in Florida."

By maintaining a diverse mix of generation sources, utilities are better able to mitigate the impact of fossil fuel price volatility, enabling customers to benefit from short-term, downward-price fluctuations while realizing lower and more stable electric rates over time.

(The Florida Legislature enacted a law in 2006 to encourage the development of nuclear power by permitting cost recovery for some nuclear plant project costs during the construction process. The PSC then adopted a rule on how it evaluates those costs annually.)



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

Florida Commemorates Police Fallen Heroes with Candlelight Service

National Police Week, May 13 – 19, is a time for all the survivors, families, friends and coworkers of the officers killed in the line of duty to come together to remember and honor their loved ones, the husbands, wives, mothers, fathers, sisters, brothers, aunts, uncles and coworkers, those who we promise to never forget. In the words of Abraham Lincoln, "Any nation that does not honor its heroes will not long endure."
 In 2011 in Florida, there were 12 officers killed in the line of duty.
 On May 7, 2012, families, friends and coworkers of these Florida heroes will come together in Tallahassee, Florida and remember these fallen heroes. On May 6, 2012, a candlelight service will be held at the Capital where each and every family and law enforcement agency in Florida will be able to come and light a candle in remembrance of these fallen heroes.
 On May 15, 2012 thousands of people will travel to Washington, D.C., where 166, officers will be honored during National Police Week at the National Law Enforcement Officers Memorial and the National Peace Officers' Memorial Service.
 On July 30, 1988 Corporal David W. Moss became the only Williston Police Officer to be killed in the line of duty. The investigation showed Corporal Moss was shot and killed during

a gunfight which resulted in the death of the suspect as well. David died within moments of being shot; doing the only thing he had ever wanted to do with his life. He made a positive difference in the lives of those he served and protected. That was his simple goal, to make the world a better place, and he did. In the words of Rev. Bill Owens, "Public service is not an easy profession. A public servant's time is invested in bettering lives. David Moss was not afraid to make that investment." On May 6 Corporal Moss will be remembered during the State of Florida candlelight vigil in Tallahassee.
 Support for fallen officers can be shown by tying a blue ribbon to your cars antenna during National Police Week. A limited amount of ribbons are available at the Williston Police Department.

Cessna Crashes in Fowlers Bluff

 from a bank in Illinois showing Pierce depositing the check meant for Levy County FFA kids into a second business account titled Brookport Cattle Company. Pierce had gotten the check from Shepard somehow.

Investigator Anderson also discovered other states had active investigations. Arkansas, Illinois, Missouri, Kentucky and Texas all wanted to speak to these men regarding the theft of cattle from their states.
 Investigator Anderson's diligent work and persistence led him to contact the FBI and the Florida Division of Agriculture and the joint investigation yielded more than ample evidence for Anderson to obtain warrants for both men.
 On April 19, 2012, Investigator Anderson met with 8th Circuit Judge David Glant and secured warrants to arrest Ron Shepard and Jeremy Pierce for Scheme to Defraud. Each warrant had a bond of \$1,000,000.00 (One MILLION dollars). Pierce turned himself in to authorities in Illinois but Shepard is still at large.

NRC, U.S. ARMY CORPS OF ENGINEERS ISSUE FINAL ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACT STATEMENT FOR NEW REACTORS AT LEVY COUNTY SITE

The Nuclear Regulatory Commission and the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACE), Jacksonville District, have completed the Final Environmental Impact Statement (FEIS) for the Combined Licenses (COL) for the proposed Levy County Units 1 and 2.

The NRC concludes in the FEIS that there are no environmental impacts that would preclude issuing the COLs for construction and operation of the proposed reactors at the site, near Crystal River, Fla. The USACE will use the information in the FEIS in making its federal permit decision in accordance with the Clean Water Act and Rivers and Harbors Act of 1899.

The NRC's publishing of the FEIS is only part of the overall Levy County COL review. The agency staff continues to compile its final safety evaluation report (SER), which will include recommendations from the NRC's Advisory Committee on Reactor Safeguards, an independent group of nuclear safety experts. The NRC's Atomic Safety and Licensing Board is currently conducting a proceeding on challenges to the staff's environmental review. The NRC's five Commissioners must also conduct a mandatory hearing regarding the application and the staff's review. All of these items must be completed before the NRC can reach a final decision on the COL application.

Progress Energy submitted a COL application July 30, 2008, seeking permission to construct and operate two AP1000 nuclear reactors at the Levy County site. The AP1000 is a Westinghouse 1,100 megawatt electric pressurized-water reactor design the NRC certified in December 2011.

The FEIS will be available on the NRC website. The NRC staff, in cooperation with USACE, gathered comments from the community near the site in December 2008 during the environmental scoping process. The agencies issued a draft EIS in August 2010 and met with the local community again in September 2010 for additional comments.

The three-volume FEIS is also available via the NRC's electronic document database, ADAMS, by entering accession numbers ML12100A063, ML12100A068 and ML12100A070 in the ADAMS search engine. In addition, a hardbound copy of the DEIS will be available for public inspection at four local libraries: 1) the Citrus County Coastal Region Library at 8619 West Crystal St. in Crystal River; 2) the Dunnellon Branch Library at 20351 Robinson Road in Dunnellon, Fla.; 3) the AF Knotts Public Library at 11 56th St. in Yankeetown, Fla.; and 4) the Bronson Public Library at 600 Gilbert St. in Bronson, Fla.



A Cynical Process

Labor unions, like the United Nations, are all too often judged by what they are envisioned as being -- not by what they actually are or what they actually do.

Many people, who do not look beyond the vision or the rhetoric to the reality, still think of labor unions as protectors of working people from their employers. And union bosses still employ that kind of rhetoric. However, someone once said, "When I speak I put on a mask, but when I act I must take it off."

That mask has been coming off, more and more, especially during the Obama administration, and what is revealed underneath is very ugly, very cynical and very dangerous.

First there was the grossly misnamed "Employee Free Choice Act" that the administration tried to push through Congress. What it would have destroyed was precisely what it claimed to be promoting -- a free choice by workers as to whether or not they wanted to join a labor union.

Ever since the National Labor Relations Act of 1935, workers have been able to express their free choice of joining or not joining a labor union in a federally conducted election with a secret ballot.

As workers in the private sector have, over the years, increasingly voted to reject joining labor unions, union bosses have sought to replace secret ballots with signed documents -- signed in the presence of union organizers and under the pressures, harassments or implicit threats of those organizers.

Now that the Obama administration has appointed a majority of the members of the National Labor Relations Board, the NLRB leadership has imposed new requirements that employers supply union organizers with the names and home addresses of every employee. Nor do employees have a right to decline to have this personal information given out to union organizers, under NLRB rules.

In other words, union organizers will now have the legal right to pressure, harass or intimidate workers on the job or in their own homes, in order to get them to sign up with the union. Among the consequences of not signing up is union reprisal on the job if the union

wins the election. But physical threats and actions are by no means off the table, as many people who get in the way of unions have learned.

Workers who do not want to join a union will now have to decide how much harassment of themselves and their family they are going to have to put up with, if they don't knuckle under.

In the past, unions had to make the case to workers that it was in their best interests to join. Meanwhile, employers would make their case to the same workers that it was in their best interest to vote against joining.

When the unions began losing those elections, they decided to change the rules. And after Barack Obama was elected President of the United States, with large financial support from labor unions, the rules were in fact changed by Obama's NLRB.

As if to make the outcome of workers' "choices" more of a foregone conclusion, the time period between the announcement of an election and the election itself has been shortened by the NLRB.

In other words, the union can spend months, or whatever amount of time it takes, for them to prepare and implement an organizing campaign beforehand -- and then suddenly announce a deadline date for the decision on having or not having a union. The union organizers can launch their full-court press before the employers have time to organize a comparable counter-argument or the workers have time to weigh their decision, while being pressured.

The last thing this process is concerned about is a free choice for workers. The first thing it is concerned about is getting a captive group of union members, whose compulsory dues provide a large sum of money to be spent at the discretion of union bosses, to provide those bosses with both personal perks and political power to wield, on the basis of their ability to pick and choose where to make campaign contributions from the union members' dues.

Union elections do not recur like other elections. They are like some Third World elections: "One man, one vote -- one time." And getting a recognized union unrecognized is an uphill struggle.

But, so long as many people refuse to see the union for what it is, or the Obama administration for what it is, this cynical and corrupt process can continue.

Bank of America Drops Firearms Dealer's Bank Accounts

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Bank of America reportedly ended its 12-year relationship with stock and firearm maker McMillan Group International.

According to a statement on McMillan's Facebook page, the company's director of operations, Kelly McMillan, was told on April 20 that Bank of America no longer wished to do business with McMillan due to its firearm manufacturing operations.

"Today Mr. Ray Fox, Senior Vice President, Market Manager, Business Banking, Global Commercial Banking came to my office," McMillan wrote. "He scheduled the meeting as an 'account analysis' meeting in order to evaluate the two lines of credit we have with them.

He spent 5 minutes talking about how McMillan has changed in the last 5 years and [has] become more of a firearms manufacturer than a supplier of accessories.

"At this point I interrupted him and asked 'Can I possibly save you some time so that you don't waste your breath? What you are going to tell me is that because we are in the firearms manufacturing business you no longer [want] my business.'"

According to McMillan, Fox responded, "That is correct." McMillan then asked if the decision to end their banking relationship was political, and, according to McMillan, Fox confirmed that it was. At that point McMillan ended the meeting.

"His [Fox's] statement was that Bank of America had to assess the risk of doing business with a firearms manufacturer," McMillan said Monday during an

Conservative Consumers: Stand Your Ground

Who is Rashad Robinson? And why has his fringe, race-baiting organization been able to pressure several major corporations into abandoning a pro-limited-government legislative association -- all for a few cheap social-justice brownie points?

Conservative consumers need to get informed, get active and stand their ground against free speech-squelching progressive activists who have demonized the American Legislative Exchange Council. This isn't just a battle over ALEC. It's a war against the left's shakedown artists taking aim at our freedoms of speech and association.

ALEC, as I reported last week, is the four-decade-old policy organization of state legislators and like-minded business people who believe in "the Jeffersonian principles of free markets, limited government, federalism, and individual liberty." They are under fire from a longstanding network of liberal groups -- tied to the Democratic Party -- that are unhappy with effective conservative opposition at the state and federal legislative levels.

Anti-ALEC hypocrites seized on the Trayvon Martin shooting case in Florida to blame ALEC and Republican lawmakers for their advocacy of Stand Your Ground self-defense legislation - even though the case does not implicate the policy and ALEC followed Florida's lead on the legislation. Moreover, eight of the 15 states that have adopted such policies were helmed by Democratic governors at the time of passage.

Robinson is spearheading the anti-ALEC campaign, along with Soros-backed Progress Now and a MoveOn.org/Big Labor political action committee, the Progressive Change Campaign Committee (PCCC). While they claim to oppose black "voter suppression" by working to undermine anti-voter fraud bills backed by ALEC, Color of Change's true agenda is to chill and suppress pro-capitalist, pro-Second Amendment, pro-low taxes and pro-law enforcement lobbying and legislating in the political marketplace.

Robinson is in charge of "Color of Change," a radical activist group founded by disgraced 9/11 Truther, anti-police agitator, Occupy movement promoter and former Obama green jobs czar Van Jones. The group used Hurricane Katrina to condemn America as institutionally racist. Most shamefully, Jones and his fledgling group helped perpetuate director Spike Lee and Nation of Islam leader Louis Farrakhan's wild conspiracy theories about government-engineered black genocide in New Orleans.

Before taking over Jones' demagogue duties, Robinson previously lobbied for felon voting rights at the left-wing Soros family-backed Fair Vote. The group has repeatedly fought common-sense efforts to rein in voter fraud. Unsurprisingly, Robinson is close to the community organizer in chief's administration. While media director at gay rights group GLAAD, Robinson traveled to Serbia in 2010 to officially represent the U.S. at a gay pride festival. He was invited by the

Obama State Department, which sponsored the trip.

Robinson claims that his group has "more than 800,000 members" and "is the nation's largest online civil rights group." The numbers, however, don't add up. The Color of Change Twitter account has fewer than 14,600 followers. Robinson himself, acclaimed by leftists as a new media guru, has a measly 1,400 followers after three years on the premiere social networking platform.

But the foot soldiers of radical organizer Saul Alinsky know how to conjure up facades and false narratives. Over the past several weeks, Robinson has released a series of press releases claiming mass victories in the Color of Change campaign to boycott ALEC. The bulletins are being dutifully regurgitated by sympathetic journalists such as National Public Radio's Peter Overby -- a former staffer at the anti-ALEC group Common Cause, a fact that he failed to disclose to radio listeners in at least two recent hit pieces on ALEC.

Color of Change's corporate appeasers include McDonald's, Wendy's, Mars Inc., Coca-Cola, PepsiCo, Kraft Foods, Intuit, Blue Cross and Blue Shield Association, Reed Elsevier (owner of LexisNexis), American Traffic Solutions and Arizona Public Service. This week, Robinson also claimed that Yum Brands and Procter and Gamble had dropped their memberships as a result of "hundreds" of Color of Change phone calls.


On Tuesday, I called Procter and Gamble and asked them how many phone calls they received. Company spokeswoman Christine Wever refused to answer. I asked whether the company had met at any time over the past year with Color of Change or any other protest group regarding their specific complaints about ALEC. Wever refused to answer.

I also called the media office at Yum Brands several times with the same questions. No response by end of business Tuesday.

It's not enough for conservative consumers to avoid cowardly businesses that cave to Van Jones and company. Beating back the anti-ALEC mob means getting ahead of them. Color of Change and its "hundreds" of callers are now pressuring State Farm and Johnson and Johnson to join the spineless herd and cut ties to ALEC.

I'll say it again: Silence is complicity. Speak now or surrender your ground.

interview on NRA News.

After McMillan made public the details of his meeting with Bank of America, news of the banking giant's alleged anti-gun policy went viral on the Internet. In response, Bank of America posted a somewhat cryptic statement on its Facebook page on Sunday, never once mentioning McMillan, the word "firearms," or the firearms industry:

"We want to let you know that we hear your comments and questions regarding one of our customers. While we cannot discuss the details of any individual client we work with, we can assure you the allegations being made here are completely false. Bank of America does not have a policy that prohibits us from banking clients in this industry. In fact, we have numerous, longstanding customers in the industry.

"We are also extremely proud of our support of the US military and reject any assertion to the contrary. We count as clients many companies that provide for our nation's defense. We employ thousands of veterans, Guardsmen, and Reservists, and plan to increase our hiring this year."

Despite Bank of America's denial of McMillan's claims, this is not the first time that Bank of America has been accused of refusing to do business with gun companies. In 2010, NRA-ILA received information from a few members detailing problems firearm-related businesses were having with Bank of America. Those complaints indicated that Bank of America had adopted a policy of denying banking services to businesses associated with firearms. NRA-ILA staff contacted Bank of America's corporate leadership at that time and asked them to provide specific information regarding their policies.

In a conversation with Bank of America Senior Vice President Douglas K. Bland, NRA-ILA was assured that there was no such anti-gun policy.

In fact, Bland provided NRA-ILA with a written statement of their policy, which, at that time, stated, "Bank of America does not have a corporate-wide policy to deny banking services solely on the applicant's involvement in the firearms industry."

Still, McMillan stands by his assertion that Bank of America terminated their relationship because of his company's line of business.

"The statement we [McMillan] posted was an accurate account of the events that transpired late last week. McMillan Group has been in good standing with B of A and a loyal customer for the past 12 years. We were told that we must finalize all of our accounts because we manufacture firearms.

"McMillan cannot speak for Bank of America's company wide policies, but we can speak out about our personal experiences.

"We [McMillan] kindly suggest that if Corporate Bank of America has no policy against conducting business with firearms manufactures, then they should communicate these policies with their regional Vice Presidents and other management."

While Bank of America maintains that it does not have an anti-gun policy, Kelly McMillan's personal experience suggests otherwise. "If they don't have [an anti-gun] policy, why did they tell me it was because I was in the firearms manufacturing business?" asked McMillan on NRA News.

Meanwhile, McMillan said he has begun looking for a firearms-friendly bank (Bank of America has given the company six months to find a new bank) and is exploring the possibility of no longer accepting Bank of America credits cards as forms of payment.

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
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

become more motivated. Everything that I do they can do as well, they just have to set a goal and be motivated enough to accomplish it."


While not all teenage girls think wearing military uniforms, putting their hair in a bun or marching is "cool", the young ladies of Manatee Division prove that it can be both "chic" and

Otter Creek WTP Has Levels of Disinfection By-Products Above Drinking Water Standards

What happened? Our water system recently violated a drinking water standard. Although this is not an emergency, as our customers, you have a right to know what happened, what you should do, and what we are doing to correct this situation.

We routinely monitor for the presence of drinking water contaminants. Testing results we received from samples taken March 14, 2012 show that our system exceeds the standards, or maximum contaminant levels (MCL), for Disinfection By-Products (DBPs), which includes Total Trihalomethanes (TTHMs) and Haloacetic Acids [Five] (HAA5s). The standard for TTHMs is 80 micrograms per liter (µg/L) and the average level of TTHMs over the last year was 151.4 µg/L. The standard for HAA5s is 60 µg/L, the average level of HAA5s over the last year was 77.3 µg/L.

What should I do? Some people who drink water containing TTHMs in excess of the MCL over many years may experience problems with their liver, kidneys, or central nervous system,

and may have an increased risk of getting cancer. Some people who drink water containing HAA5s in excess of the MCL over many years may have an increased risk of getting cancer.

Any customers who are concerned about their exposure to DBPs may choose alternative sources of water for ingestion. What does this mean? This is not an immediate risk. If it had been, you would have been notified immediately.

What is being done? This is what we are doing to lower our DBPs levels: We are flushing the system. We are reducing the chlorine residual to help reduce DBPs. We are increasing sampling for DBPs. We will inform you when additional samples show levels of DBPs below the MCLs. We have an engineer evaluating the situation. He will be making a recommendation in the coming weeks. There are several options available to us.



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Innovations in Watering Techniques Saves Florida Water

Water is the most significant challenge facing Florida. Not only is there a limited amount of water, but Florida is consuming it rapidly. In 2010, Floridians used 6.9 billion gallons of fresh water per day. By 2030, Florida is expected to use 8.2 billion gallons per day, a 19 percent increase over a 20-year period.

Since 1999, the Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services has worked with the industry to help producers implement Best Management Practices (BMPs). BMPs are designed to protect water quality by reducing the runoff and leaching of nutrients into Florida's surface and ground waters and to enhance water conservation. More than 7 million acres of Florida agricultural lands are enrolled in BMP programs with 826,840 acres enrolled in programs during the last year alone.

As part of this effort, the department's Mobile Irrigation Lab (MIL) program provides site-specific expertise in analyzing irrigation systems and educating residential, commercial and agricultural property owners on how to improve water conservation

and use. Over seven years, MILs have conducted more than 4,000 evaluations and more than 1,000 follow-up visits on a total of 158,867 acres of farm land. As a result of implementing MIL recommendations, agriculture has saved nearly 8 billion gallons of water with approximately 1 billion gallons of water saved in just the last year.

Florida Ag Commissioner Adam Putnam visited farms in the Hastings area as part of a Tri-County tour of agricultural operations implementing Best Management Practices (BMP) to conserve and protect Florida's water resources. During his visit, Commissioner Putnam reviewed BMP plots and discussed new techniques for fertilizer banding, drip irrigation and tile drainage.

SPAGHETTI SAUCE

- In a small bowl add the following:
- 1/2 tsp. ground pepper
- 1 1/2 tsp. salt
- 3 tsp. oregano
- 1/2 tsp. thyme
- 1/4 tsp. crushed red pepper flakes
- 1 bay leaf
- 2 cloves minced garlic
- Set aside.
- 1 lb ground beef
- 1 large onion
- 1 Tbl. olive oil

- In a heavy skillet heat the oil and crumble the ground beef, browning lightly while breaking it up into pieces. Add the onion and cook until the meat is browned and the onion transparent. Pour off the fat and transfer the contents into a large pot.
- Turn the heat on low and add:
- 1 - 2 lb 3 oz can drained tomatoes - reserve liquid
- 4 - 8 oz cans tomato sauce
- 1 - 6 oz can tomato paste

- Keep the heat on low and when the sauce begins to simmer add the seasonings. Cook uncovered for 1 1/2 hours stirring occasionally. If it gets too dry add some of the reserved tomato liquid. Skim any fat from top. Half an hour before done stir in 1 tsp. sugar and 1 tablespoon olive oil which will round out the taste. If the canned tomatoes are sour you may find it necessary to increase the amount of sugar to taste.

GARLIC BREAD

- 1/2 cup butter
- 2 cloves garlic, minced
- 1/4 tsp. each salt, pepper
- 1 cup Parmesan cheese (optional)

Beat all ingredients together until smooth and well blended. Spread on bread slices. Place bread on cookie sheet and place in the oven under the broiler. Watch carefully as the bread will brown quickly. Serve immediately.

FRENCH VANILLA ICE CREAM CREAM

- 2 cups heavy cream
- 2 cups half and half
- 3/4 cups sugar
- 4 egg yolks
- 1 Tbl. vanilla extract
- In a heavy medium saucepan combine cream, half and half and sugar. Cook on medium heat stirring with a whisk until sugar dissolves.

For the smoothest ice cream beat egg yolks until very light. Gradually pour one cup of hot milk into yolks then return mixture to the saucepan. This tempers the yolks. Reduce heat to medium low and cook to 160 degrees. Do Not Boil.

Strain the custard and partially cover. Cool at room temperature. Stir in vanilla and refrigerate overnight. At the same time, place the canister from your ice cream maker into the coldest part of your freezer, the bottom back shelf. Follow the instructions on your ice cream maker to churn.

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
