Levy County Voters Busy Changing Parties Before July 16 to Vote in Republican Primary

Florida is a closed primary state and this year the Primary election is on August 4, 2012. The deadline to register to vote or change party affiliation is July 16.

If you wish to vote in the Primary Election, you must be a registered voter of the party for which the primary is being held. So, if you are a registered Republican you can only vote for a Republican candidate and if you are a registered Democrat you can only vote for the Democratic candidate.

In the non partisan (NP) races, voters of all party affiliations can vote for the non partisan candidate (these are the judicial and school board races).

According to Supervisor of Elections Connie Asbell's office, as of July 9 there have been 1,211 registered voters who have changed their party affiliation including 883 Democrats who have gone Republican. In Levy County there are now 24,962 registered voters with 11,186 Democrats, 9,578 Republicans, 2,890 No Party voters and 1,303 Other voters.

Even if you have changed your party affiliation in order to vote for a candidate of your choice in the Primary Election, once the General Election comes around you can vote for whomever you please no matter what the party affiliation.

If a local race has candidates that are only of one party – and – will have no opposition in the general election, then all voters, regardless of party affiliation may vote in the primary election for those candidates. In other words, if all the local candidates are Democrats then all Democrats, and all Republicans, and all minority party voters, and all NP voters can vote in that primary race.

But, if a race has all candidates but one that are of one party, as in our sheriff's race in Levy County, exception being the one non partisan candidate, then the non partisan candidate has no opponents in the primary and will not even be on the ballot in the Primary Election. That leaves only Republicans to vote for the Republican candidates in the primary. When it comes time for the general election, the non partisan candidate will be on the ballot with whoever won the Republican slot in the primary and voters in all parties will receive the same ballot and can vote for either one of the candidates.

If your strategy is to change party affiliation in order to vote for the candidate you want in the primary so you can vote for them in the General Election – the deadline for that change is July 16, 2012. You cannot make a party affiliation change at the polls and be able to vote as having changed your party. The change will not take effect until after the Primary Election.

Pick your poison, but before the deadline of Monday July 16.



Lower Suwannee Refuge Hires Four Youth Conservation Corps

For the next eight weeks, the students whose names were drawn out of a hat for the 2012 Youth Conservation Corps, will work with the professionals at the Lower Suwannee National Wildlife Refuge. Each year, students from the tri-county area apply to work alongside the forester, the rangers, heavy equipment operators, and the firefighters in order to get a taste of some of the best jobs the area has to offer. While earning money for their labor, they also are exposed to the hundreds of great careers the US Fish and Wildlife Service has to offer nationwide.

This year, a pair of cousins from Old Town, and two Chiefland students have been working across the Refuge maintaining recreation sites for visitors. Projects coming up will provide seating, a bulletin board, and informative signs for visitors to Shell Mound. They'll also add a front porch to the Refuge classroom, enhance Dennis Creek foot bridges, and help with kids' outdoor programs.

Joshua Roberts who has been volunteering at the Lower Suwannee NWR for nearly two years says, "I was shocked to find out that I was chosen and so far I love the job." Paying-it-

forward really paid-off for Joshua.

"It took two weeks for us to hear, so I thought I wasn't getting the job. I was surprised when Ranger Pam called with the offer," stated Elizabeth Okahara. She had first met the Ranger years ago at Whispering Winds School as a fourth grader and most recently at Chiefland High School's Career Day where she obtained the job application.

The Youth Conservation Corps has made several sightings of wildlife including bobcats, alligators, swallow-tailed kites, and barred owls. While preparing recreation sites for the rising waters of the oncoming storm last week, two

"This gets their foot in the door," says heavy equipment operator and crew boss, Jason Coates. "There are hundreds of US Fish and Wildlife Service entry jobs across the country available to bright graduates; we hope to aim these students in that direction."



Last week we reported on a suspicious U-Haul truck found by Cpl. Fred Morris of the Williston Police Department on the 4th of July, 2012 behind Lane's Yardware at 19 E. Noble Ave. Cpl. Morris investigated further and discovered that thousands of dollars of power yard tools had been stolen from Lane's Yardware and were in the U-Haul that was also stolen from North Florida Monument and Mini-Storage at 710 SW 6 Ave. Once the culprits loaded up the truck with stolen goods they discovered it would not start and stole a 2003 Ford E-350 box truck from Maguire's Auto Repair at 240 E. Noble Ave. in order to flee with the stolen power tools.

On July 9, 2012, a police officer with the Hialeah Florida Police Department discovered the stolen box truck on East 7th Avenue in Hialeah, Florida. The truck was abandoned and did not have any of the stolen merchandise inside. The truck was processed by the Hialeah Police Department for fingerprints and DNA, and the results will be sent to the Williston Police Department for further processing.

The fingerprints that were recovered by Williston Police Department from the crime scene have been turned over to a fingerprint examiner for review and to be processed thru a national database in an attempt to identify the person(s) responsible.



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

The Numbers



Sporty Rey was not his real name, but it's a name close enough, and this is told true enough that some folks around Tampa will find the man familiar. He was a lean, clean-cut little fellow who drove a black '49 Buick with a front grill brandishing a big chrome smirk. Though the sedan was secondhand, it was immaculate and waxed to a shine as fine as the day he first drove it up to his red brick bungalow off Swan Avenue.

Appearances mattered to Sporty. He was smartly dressed, neatly pressed, and precise in knotting his tie. There was just enough flash to make neighbors wonder if he was really an insurance man. Maybe it was the cocky way he wore his panama hat. Maybe it was those two-toned shoes that raised suspicions that he might be a "wise guy," one of the Tampa underworld. Maybe he

was connected with Charlie Wall, dean of Tampa's crime bosses; some of Charlie's minions drove Buicks and dressed like that.

Wall, a Tampa native, had lorded over a rampant crime syndicate for decades. He operated out of Ybor, a working class Cuban neighborhood dominated by cigar workers. Wall bootlegged liquor, ran brothels and virtually monopolized the bolita games in the area. His organization was expansive, extending eventually into what was called the "Cracker Mafia," with operations spanning central Florida.

Then there were the Italian Mafiosi, the Trafficante family, steadily encroaching on Wall's Tampa turf. Days of reckoning and nights of retribution were already common in Tampa, where from 1928 to 1959 (known locally as the Era of Blood), more than 25 gangland figures were gunned down. Perhaps as many more became "food for the fishes."

So there were plenty of gangsters around Tampa in the early 1950s, but this Sporty Rey, he was an insurance man, and that's all he was. He was just a guy with a pencil thin mustache, a debit book, and a pretty wife shy to the point of being misperceived by the neighbors as conceited or snobbish. She wasn't. Sporty wasn't in the rackets either, at least not yet.

Weekdays Sporty would slide into his shiny Buick and disappear up Swan, turn on Nebraska and then go who knows where. Folks out in Temple Terrace and Brandon knew where. See, Sporty worked the small towns and mostly poorer neighborhoods in the area – the groves, the turpentine woods, some of the cattle ranches or sawmills. In the towns, he'd park up a narrow street in the shade and walk door-to-door collecting on small insurance policies he'd sold. Most were burial premiums, so maybe he collected a dollar or so a month at each stop. It was a volume business, and Sporty stayed on the move.

But there was an older black woman over in Brandon who was one of his favorites. A large, moon-faced woman with an easy laugh, she shared her deep, abiding faith whenever she spoke. Sipping a glass of sweet tea on her front porch was about as close to church as Sporty Rey ever got. They were friends. They never said so, but they were.

Her name was Emma Jakes. Emma was the first person Sporty informed that his wife had left him. On a recent spring morning, while a neighbor leaned into his push mower, Ilene Rey stood very erect out on her front porch in a black, sleeveless dress and a small suitcase at her feet. When the neighbor looked up again, she was gone. The roof of a yellow cab disappeared behind a line of hedge. There'd been no argument, no indiscretion discovered, and no note. At least that's what Sporty told Emma. Emma offered Sporty comfort while her own beloved husband lay gasping with each labored breath in the dark heat of the house behind them.

The next month, Sporty got around to telling Emma he now had more than insurance to sell. Bolita tickets were stashed in his account book. Emma eyed Sporty with caution. Then she had a confession of her own. With her husband out of work and her own health failing, hard labor was impossible. She couldn't continue to make the insurance payment on her husband's policy. As for buying a bolita ticket, "Nobody really

wins but them bolita bankers," Emma sighed, "and the devil, he's the biggest banker of them all."

Months passed. Sporty never missed his regular visit with Emma. They talked. It was a game between them to forecast the next rain. It hadn't rained in a long time. They never again spoke of insurance or the numbers, though. And this was probably a good thing.

In the basic bolita game, 100 small numbered balls were placed into a bag and mixed thoroughly. Bets were taken on which number would be drawn. There were many variations on this theme and many different games. Bets were typically small and sometimes sold well in advance. Fact is, most games were rigged. Sometimes extra balls of a given number were included. Sometimes certain balls weren't in the bag at all. Some games cheated by including balls filled with lead that sank to the bottom of the bag, improving the odds on those numbers. Sometimes selected balls were iced beforehand, so they were cold and easy for the selector to find by touch. Anyway, there have always been as many tricks as games.

In Sporty's time, the biggest game was out of Cuba. Somewhere in Havana was a rack of one hundred ivory balls, each with a number laid sequentially in a mahogany rack. All the numbers were there to see. The balls were then gathered out of the rack and dropped into a black velvet bag. The bag was shaken vigorously and flung about until tossed finally to a "catcher," one of the onlookers. The catcher would isolate a single ball and, with the aid of a knife, slit the bag to extract the ball bearing the winning number.

Back across the Florida Straits, some five hundred miles away in a small cabin on a lake out in the orange groves, Sporty and a bespectacled associate, Ambrose Endecott, hovered around a short-wave radio. Endecott was a locally respected man with a large grove and small grocery on the highway, but he'd fallen on hard times and desperate measures. Together they listened to a broadcast of the Cuban National Lottery. The winning number would soon be announced, and Rey would translate. It was Endecott's task to check the "hit" or winning number against the tickets purchased for that game.

A bolita operation took four individuals, each performing a particular function: the "operator" or banker who financed the operation; the "writer" who sold the tickets; the "pick-up" man who brought the tickets in from the writers. He'd put them in a paper bag and drop them off at a designated spot made known to the "checker."

Each Saturday afternoon Endecott would retrieve the bag of tickets from above the false ceiling in the privy behind his store. On this hot August evening, Sporty and Endecott leaned toward the short wave listening for the winning numbers. The two men didn't know it, but elsewhere Charlie Wall's wife had just come home to find Charlie dead on the floor of their bedroom, his throat slashed, skull fractured and his face a bloody pulp.

As the short wave crackled, the door to the isolated cabin suddenly crashed in. Down in Havana the catcher had not made the slit in the bag before machine gun blasts riddled the interior of the cabin. Then it was quiet. Even the screeching of startled cranes rising from the lake outside went silent.

Some days later, a burly man with a crew cut ambled up the front steps of Emma Jakes' place. It was about the same time of day Sporty usually came by. Emma watched the stranger through the screened door. He was sweating profusely and mopping his bald head with a handkerchief. "Mrs. Jakes," he said, "I'm the fellow took Sporty Rey's place."

She remained secluded behind the screen door and didn't speak.

"I'm sorry for your loss, Mrs. Jakes. On your husband. I bring you his death benefit." He extended an envelope from his shirt pocket.

"I didn't pay that. Had to drop it," she replied softly.

"No'um it was paid in full, 100%, Mrs. Jakes. This here check is yours. This one, too," he said while extracting a second envelope from the same pocket.

"What would that be?" she asked with a tremulous voice.

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

Jobs Versus Net Jobs

One of the reasons for the popularity of political rhetoric is that everybody can be right, in terms of their own rhetoric, no matter how much the rhetoric of one side contradicts the rhetoric of the other side.

President Obama constantly repeats how many millions of jobs have been created during his administration, while his critics constantly repeat how many millions of jobs have been lost during his administration. How can both of them be right -- or, at least, how can they both get away with what they are saying?

There are jobs and there are net jobs. This is true not only today but has been true in years past.

Back during the 1980s, when there were huge losses of jobs in the steel industry, the government restricted the importation of foreign steel. It has been estimated that this saved 5,000 jobs in the American steel industry.

But of course restriction of competition from lower-priced imported steel made steel more expensive to American producers of products containing steel. Therefore the price of these products rose, making them less in demand at these higher prices, causing losses of sales at home and in the world market.

The bottom line is that, while 5,000 jobs were saved in the American steel industry, 26,000 jobs were lost in American industries that produced products made of steel. On net balance, the country lost jobs by restricting the importation of steel.

None of this was peculiar to the steel industry. Restrictions on the importation of sugar are estimated to have cost three times as many jobs in the confection industry as they saved in the sugar industry. The artificially high price of sugar in the United States led some American producers of confections to relocate to Mexico and Canada, where the price of sugar is lower.

There is no free lunch in the job market, any more than there is anywhere else. The government can always create particular jobs or save particular jobs, but that does not mean that it is a net creation of jobs or a net saving of jobs.

The government can create a million jobs tomorrow, just by hiring that many people. But where does the government get the money to pay those people? From the private economy -- which loses the money that the government gains.

With less money in the private sector, the loss of jobs there can easily exceed the million jobs created in the government or in industries subsidized by the government. The Obama administration's creation of "green jobs" has turned out to cost far more money per job than the cost of creating a job in the private sector.

In addition to reducing jobs in the private sector by taking money out of the private sector to pay for government-subsidized jobs, the Obama administration has made businesses reluctant to hire because of the huge uncertainties it has created for businesses as regards the cost of adding employees. With thousands of regulations still being written to implement ObamaCare, no one knows how much this will add to the cost of hiring new employees.

In the face of this economic uncertainty, even businesses that have an increased demand for their products can meet that demand by working their existing employees overtime, instead of adding new employees. Many employers hire temporary workers, who are not legally entitled to benefits such as health insurance, and who will therefore not be affected by the cost of ObamaCare.

When President Obama boasts of the number of jobs created during his administration, the numbers he cites may be correct, but he doesn't count the other jobs that were lost during his administration. His critics cite the latter. Both can claim to be right because they are talking about different things.

What has been the net effect? During this administration, the proportion of the working age population that has a job has fallen to the lowest level in decades. The official unemployment rate does not count the millions of people who have simply given up looking for a job.

If everybody gave up looking for a job, the official unemployment rate would fall to zero. But that would hardly mean that the problem was solved or that the "stimulus" worked. Creating particular jobs does not mean a net increase in jobs.

IRS – the ObamaCare Agent of Change without Hope

Chief Justice Roberts Handed ObamaCare's Future to "We the People"

In his opinion Chief Justice Roberts stated "It is not our job to protect the people from the consequences of their political choices." Herein rests both the reason for and the solution to Roberts' unexpected ruling.

While now vilified by conservatives across America, Roberts may be not a goat but a hero. By siding with and then negotiating the best possible deal with the Court's liberals, Roberts has placed both Obama and ObamaCare in jeopardy – simultaneously.

With Roberts writing the majority opinion, the four liberal judges automatically agreed with him. They actually ruled that the ObamaCare mandate, relative to the Commerce Clause, is unconstitutional. Therefore, a state can decline to participate in ObamaCare, without penalty.

In summary, Roberts and his "team" of liberals ruled that the government cannot force citizens to purchase products or services under the Commerce Clause. And Roberts manipulated the liberal judges to

come clean and admit that ObamaCare must be funded by tax increases. Finally they supported states rights by limiting the federal government's power over the states.

And this has been done without creating a civil war. The Democrats are happily declaring victory in the Supreme Court battle, not understanding what really has been done.

Neither opinion shows even a shred of respect for the government's legal acumen in their briefs, nor do either in any way suggest ObamaCare is anything other than bad policy.

On balance, the decision is a victory for constitutionally limited government. And it drags progressives out from behind their pretense of compassion and virtue, focusing Americans on cost and tax realities rather than the illusion of "free benefits".

What is now left for ObamaCare going forward is either total repeal or a series of unrelenting problems, countless lawsuits, and in fact mass confusion. We're going to have a number of states, perhaps half, opting out of ObamaCare – so any idea of a "national" health-care program is dead.

Even if the Democrats miraculously prevail in November, they will face a

COMPUTER TIPS

Can't Get On The Internet?

Just a quick reminder! A few weeks ago we wrote about a Trojan virus called DNSChanger and let you know about the possibility of not being able to get onto the internet as of July 9th if your computer is infected. This is because in 2007 cybercriminals released a virus that, once infected, would redirect your computer to a server under their control. These servers would push web ads, resulting in millions of dollars going to the cybercriminals. Last year the FBI was successful in arresting the individuals responsible and seized over 100 servers used by these criminals, effectively breaking up the crime ring. Due to the number of people infected, the criminals' servers were kept online so as to not disrupt the web activities of those infected. However, the FBI set a date of July 9th, 2012 to turn off the servers. And if your computer is still infected, you may now not be able to connect to the internet (as of July 9th).

So July 9th has come and gone! What do I do now if I cannot get onto the internet??? If you cannot connect, you may be infected by the DNS Changer. Many service providers are notifying their customers about this and are creating help pages that will help you detect and clean up DNS Changer from your system. Below is a partial list with links to their information. If you do not see your provider on the list, you can always call your Internet Service Provider for their assistance.

completely impossible mishmash of constant and hopeless budget and tax increase battles, with all aspects of ObamaCare funding. In the dissenting opinion, Justice Kennedy says the remainder of what the court has redefined as a series of taxes with no mandate, and with states free to “do their own thing”, is completely unworkable. Kennedy adds that the ONLY logical thing now would be for Congress to start over, with a clean sheet of paper. It's impossible to envision a House or Senate Committee trying to figure out how to fix and then fund what's left. ObamaCare is headed for the trash-bin of history, one way or the other.


Many are complaining about how preposterous, absurd, illogical and ludicrous the Roberts opinion is. But in truth it was


Finally Roberts has passed the chess board to the American voters, to make one final move and declare “check-mate” on November 6th.

Study of Nutrient Recycling on Local Farm Could Protect and Save Water

Suwannee Farms, an agriculture operation that produces cattle, vegetables, and forage crops in Suwannee County, is dedicated to reducing nutrient losses to the environment while conserving water in the process.

The farm is participating in a three-year study to determine the effects of nutrient recycling on its operation. The study is evaluating nutrient imports to the farm – such as manure, feed and fertilizer – and nutrient exports – such as crop products and beef that leave the farm, atmospheric loss, and nutrients that might leach into groundwater. Soil, crops, and water are analyzed for nutrient concentrations – all to determine how efficiently those nutrients are being utilized on the farm and the potential for nutrients to be lost to the environment.

The study was initiated in 2009 by the Suwannee River partnership (SRP) and is being led by the University of Florida /Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences (UF/IFAS). Funding is provided by the Suwannee River Water Management District (District), UF/IFAS, the Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services (FDACS), the Florida Department of Environmental Protection (DEP), and Suwannee Farms.

Now in its final year, the study will determine the effects of best management practices (BMPs) currently used on the farm and how these practices could expand to improve nutrient management.

"This study is a positive step toward improving nutrient management and protecting water quality," said Hugh Thomas, SRP coordinator. "It also has the added benefit of conserving water."

Building nutrients and organic matter in soils allows the soils to hold moisture which conserves irrigation water. Improved irrigation management conserves water and protects water quality. The goal is to keep the right amount of water in the root zone, which is vital to reducing nutrient losses to the environment.

Thomas said over watering pushes fertilizer past the root zone. Under watering stresses the crop and doesn't allow fertilizer to be utilized. But application of the right amount of water helps the crop take up fertilizer, which results in the protection of water quality and a productive yield for the farmer.

Once the study is complete, the findings will be used to provide nutrient management recommendations to dairy and other confined-animal operations.

"This research could have far-reaching effects," said Thomas. "The data will be used to improve BMPs state-wide and possibly around the nation."

Thomas said the study is expected to be finalized sometime next year.

The first class will be offered at the Easton Newberry Sports Complex in Newberry, during the second annual Easton Foundations Hunting Expo, Aug. 25, starting at 8 a.m.

People attending the Bowhunter Jamboree at the Citrus Wildlife Management Area, near Inverness, will have a chance to complete the bowhunting course field day Sept. 1 from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Both courses will be conducted using the new online, distance-learning format. A bowhunting enthusiast may now access the program on the National Bowhunter Education Foundation website: NBEF.org. Enter through the Florida portal after selecting "Courses" and complete the online classroom topics before attending a shortened, interactive field day.

Tickets to the Bowhunter Jamboree range from \$20 (youth) to \$50 (families) and include a one-year membership in the Florida Bowhunters Council, sponsor of the event. The course is offered by the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission's (FWC) Hunter Safety Section and the Florida Bowhunters Council.

"While these courses do not satisfy the hunter education requirements for Florida, they are well worth taking," said Steve Robbins, FWC Hunter Safety coordinator in Lake City.

Participants can expect to learn all aspects of bowhunting, including:

- History of bowhunting;
- Safe and responsible bowhunting;
- Know your bow and arrow;
- Preparing for the hunt;
- Shot placement and game recovery;
- Use of elevated stands and other techniques;
- Outdoor preparedness.

Participants must bring their own equipment, including bow and arrows. At the jamboree, they should bring a lawn chair for their comfort.

Students can register for either course in advance by calling the FWC's North Central Regional Office at 386/754-1654 or by visiting MyFWC.com/HunterSafety and selecting "Bowhunter." Students of all ages may participate.



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
Log Cabin Quilters

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

Restrictions on Zone 4 of Suwannee River Lifted

When Suwannee River floodwaters at Wilcox fell below 9 feet Sunday, the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) deactivated boating restrictions in Zone 4.

Zone 4 is the section from the County Road 340 Bridge at Rock Bluff to one mile below the Fowler Bluff boat ramp. This 51-mile segment falls under the boating restrictions as long as the Suwannee is at 9 feet or more at the Wilcox gauge, where flood stage is 11 feet.

The FWC activated restrictions in this zone July 4. "We verified with the Suwannee River Water Management District that the water level has fallen below the required 9 feet at Wilcox," said Capt. Martin Redmond, area supervisor at the FWC's Lake City office.

"Even though the restrictions have been lifted on this zone, we highly recommend people avoid boating on the Suwannee and Santa Fe rivers until normal conditions and water levels return. There are many navigational hazards along the rivers at this time," Redmond said.

Dangers include floating debris, submerged navigational hazards and extremely strong currents on these rivers. There is also the potential for public safety issues and the increased possibility of property damage from vessel wakes, the captain explained.

"FWC officers are patrolling the rivers and continuing to assist local communities to help people dealing with the aftermath of Tropical Storm Debby," Redmond said.

Zone 5 on the Santa Fe River remains an idle-speed, no-wake zone. It was activated June 29. FWC officers are still

enforcing that zone. This zone is a 32-mile segment from River Rise in O'Leno State Park west to the confluence of the Suwannee River. It was activated when the Santa Fe River reached 17 feet on the Three Rivers gauge, where flood stage is 19 feet. That zone remains in effect.

An idle-speed, no-wake restriction means a vessel must proceed at a speed no greater than what is required to maintain steerageway and headway in that river zone. At no time is any vessel required to proceed so slowly that the operator is unable to control it or anything it may be towing.

The Suwannee and Santa Fe rivers are divided into five flood zones. The other three zones are:

- **Zone 1** is from the U.S. 90 Bridge at Ellaville south to the State Road 51 Bridge at Luraville. This 39-mile segment becomes an idle-speed, no-wake zone when the Suwannee River is at 47 feet or more, as indicated on the Ellaville gauge, where flood stage is 54 feet.
- **Zone 2** stretches from the S.R. 51 Bridge at Luraville to Little River Spring. This 18-mile segment becomes an idle-speed, no-wake zone when the Suwannee River is at 26 feet or more at the Branford gauge, where flood stage is 29 feet.
- **Zone 3** runs from Little River Spring to the County Road 340 Bridge at Rock Bluff. This 23-mile segment is an idle-speed, no-wake zone as long as the Suwannee River is at 24 feet or more at the Branford gauge.

Are You Ready to Take a Leap of Faith?

Huge crowds waited anxiously out in the fields. Dozens of world dignitaries had assembled along this dusty old Mississippi turn row. The President himself was standing to salute as I rode a wheelie past him on my new Honda XR75 motorcycle. Never before had such an event taken place out behind my grandpa's barn. Over by the grain bins the reporters crowded Miss America for her comments. "Don't do it Guy," she pleaded and wiped a tear from her eye. It was too late. I had already found the plywood to make the take off ramp. Shortly thereafter I was rolling a 55 gallon drum out of the barn when my little brother Heath pierced my day dream. "Whacha doing?" he asked with his big snuggle toothed grin. "Get outta here punk," I shouted, and pretended to lunge at him. He fell back. (I could do that then. I was thirteen and he was seven.) As usual, he popped up quicker than a Bozo punching bag and asked, "Can I help?" "You might as well," I fumed, "Miss America's done gone now!"

As great daredevils are apt to do, I made some last minute ramp adjustments. I took a few dry test runs to carefully calculate the precise speed I would need to clear the barrel. Finally, when I could think of no other suspense builders, I readied for my approach. This was the moment the world had waited for. I flipped the lid down on my helmet and gave one last wave to the crowd. Heath waved back. I revved that poor little engine for all it was worth, and then pattered off carefully.

I must've been topping out at over 10 mph when I hit that ramp. I made it all the way to the top- actually cleared the barrel somehow. Sliding to a stop I let the dust clear, threw the bike over, and stood there with both arms raised... basking in the glow. Heath came rushing over. "I'm his hero," I thought. "My turn... My turn..." He cried.

After I'd gotten 20 or 30 jumps under my belt I finally decided to give in to Heath's non-stop begging. Of course, to make sure I maintained my distance records I gave him strict orders to stay in first gear. The first indication he hadn't been listening was when he went plum around front of the house to start his approach. I couldn't see him, but then I heard him coming; cranking it down and winding it out every gear. He blazed around the corner doing at least fifty. I was screaming and flagging my arms wildly, but he only had one thing on his mind, and he hit that ramp as fast as that Honda would go.

I'm not sure what the world motorcycle jumping record is, but I can tell you, I was the lone witness to it that day. Heath was probably still on the way up when he set it! He jumped clean over the whole back yard and landed with a thud just short of the cotton fields. Somehow he managed to hold on, although his legs were flapping along behind like sheets in the wind, and that knobby back tire was working his business over something fierce. He zoomed into those freshly plowed rows at full speed, each bump causing him to goose the throttle more. He was half way across the field before he finally bogged down. By the time I got there he was back on his feet. He forced a muddy half grin and muttered, "Your turn."

I guess you could say little Heath had been so anxious to mount up with wings like eagles that he'd forgotten to wait upon the Lord! That can sure make for some bumpy landings, especially with regards to sharing your Christian faith. I should know. I still hear from a host of family members who like to testify how my initial approach came in just a little too fast right after I got saved. However, there's a ditch on both sides of that road. We can't just sit around calculating and procrastinating either. If we're waiting on the ramp to be set up perfectly we'll probably never jump. As Christians we must be willing to flip the lid down on our helmet of salvation and pop the clutch when the Lord gives us the nod. Just remember, without the Holy Spirit in your witnessing, you're just flying off into left field.

But anyway- Lift up your eyes and remember those huge crowds; the ones cheering for you from above, and those that are in the fields white to harvest. Don't be scared to make that great leap of faith. (Instead, you must worship Christ as Lord of your life. And if you are asked about your Christian hope, always be ready to explain it. 1 Peter 3:15 NLT)

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Boating Statistics Now Available from 2011

Sixty-seven people lost their lives in Florida last year in boating accidents, and there have already been 28 deaths so far this year, according to the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC), which has released its 2011 Boating Accident Statistical Report.

The FWC is responsible for reviewing, analyzing and compiling boating accident data for the state. Its statistical report details boating accidents and their causes.

"The frequency of boating accidents in Florida and their causes would probably shock most people," said Investigator Andy Bickel, of the FWC's Division of Law Enforcement.

"We want to reduce the number of accidents, injuries and deaths on Florida waters," Bickel said.

Drowning is the leading cause of death in boating accidents, statistics show.

"There's an easy fix. Wear a life jacket," Bickel said. "There are several styles of life jackets available to boaters that won't interfere with your boating experience and may save your life."

Today's boaters can choose from several models of light and comfortable, inflatable belt-pack and over-the-shoulder life jackets (PFD – personal floating device) that can be worn while fishing or enjoying the sun, and they do not interfere with boating activities.

Accidents can occur without warning, and if for some reason someone ends up in the water, quite often it's too late to put on a life jacket.

"The leading type of accident continues to be boaters colliding with other boats or objects," Bickel said. "With the number of boaters in our beautiful state, it's important to pay close attention to everything that's going on around your boat."


Statistics repeatedly show that boaters who have taken a basic boating safety class are less likely to be involved in a serious boating accident.

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MANICOTTI

- 12 Manicotti Tubes
- Meat Tomato Sauce (See Note)

- Filling:
- 1 pound ground beef
 - 1 10 ounce package of chopped spinach, cooked, drained and pressed dry
 - 2 cups Ricotta cheese
 - 2 eggs, beaten
 - 2 tablespoons chopped scallions (optional)
 - 1/4 cup breadcrumbs
 - 1 tsp. garlic powder
 - 1 tsp. salt
 - 1/2 tsp. pepper
 - 1 tsp. oregano
 - 1/4 tsp. nutmeg

Cream Sauce:

- 4 tablespoons butter
- 3 cups milk
- 3/4 tsp. salt
- 1/2 tsp. pepper

In a saucepan, melt the butter and stir in the flour. Remove from the heat and pour in the milk, whisking until smooth. Place back on low heat. Cook and stir until thick. Add salt and pepper. Pour the cream sauce over the manicotti tubes and let set for about 5 minutes. Spoon meat tomato sauce over the cream sauce.

Bake at 350 degrees uncovered for about 30 minutes or until bubbling.

Note: A spaghetti sauce recipe was in a previous issue and after serving spaghetti one night the leftover sauce is used to make this dish. If unseasoned jar sauce is used, cook and crumble one pound of ground beef with 1 medium chopped onion, add 2 1/2 tsp. oregano, 1/2 tsp. thyme, 1/4 tsp. red pepper flakes, 2 tsp. garlic powder and 1 bay leaf. Simmer over low heat. Cool before spooning onto the cream sauce.

If two dishes are used this Manicotti freezes well. Cover the uncooked dish with wax or plastic wrap, then again with aluminum foil. If a lid is available, it can be placed over the aluminum foil for added protection.

Cook and crumble the ground beef in a large skillet. Pour off excess fat. In a mixing bowl combine the meat, spinach, cheese and bread crumbs.

In a small bowl combine all the seasonings. Mix with the meat mixture. Lightly butter a 13x9 baking dish or two smaller dishes. Prepare the manicotti tubes according to the package directions. When cool, fill and place in a single layer into the prepared dish.

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
