## Remains of Hernando County Woman Found in Levy County

On January 18 the Levy County Sheriff's Office responded to a wooded area east of Otter Creek off of SR 24 just 10 miles from the spot where UF student Christian Aguilar's body was found last year. A hunter located what appeared to be the remains of a decomposing human body. Detectives verified that the



remains were human.

Levy County have been working surrounding agencies identify the remains and late Sunday an autopsy was completed by the 8th Circuit Medical Examiners Office in Gainesville. The work of the Medical Examiner provided enough information for Detectives to compare to a missing person report filed in Hernando County on January 1, 2013. The remains were identified as a Deanna Lee Stires, an 18-year-old white female born September 20, 1994, from Brooksville. The Hernando County Clerk's Office criminal website shows a record of restraining order activity from April to December 2011 when the injunction was granted.

Detectives of the Hernando County Sheriff's Office and the Levy County Sheriff's Office are working together to determine the cause of death.

## Is Bingo with Lunch Too Spicy for Williston Seniors?

For five days a week, St. Barnabas Episcopal Church in Williston opened its doors for the Suwannee River Economic Council's program to feed hot nutritious meals to senior citizens. That is the mission of the SREC, meals and nutrition counseling, and they service seniors in need at program sites in nine counties.

The senior citizen group in Williston that frequented St. Barnabas' also embellished their visits with crafts, cards and Bingo activities on their own.

Last week, this group of gambling entrepreneurs received notice from the SREC that the council was no longer able to afford the utility payment for the use of the building for five days a week when, according to Janis Owen, Director of Client Services of SREC, the room was really only being used two days per week. The Williston Baptist Church will be taking over providing a two-day a week program and will not be charging any utility fees, said Owen.

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## Williston City Council Vice President Norm Fugate Resigns

At the January 8 council meeting for the city of Williston, Council President Jason Cason told the rest of the council members and attendees that he had a resignation letter from Vice President Norm Fugate.

Fugate has served on the council since elected in March of 2011 and as Vice President. Previously Fugate served as the city attorney for Williston for 15 years but resigned January 4, 2011 following a heated flurry of Williston politics which included council members and the then city manager Marcus Collins. Fugate moved on in the next election of March 2011 to the council seat.

At a previous meeting Fugate announced that he was going to resign after discovering that an opening for the city attorney for Cedar Key became available. Fugate now fills the Cedar Key attorney position, as well as the city attorney slots for Chiefland and Inglis. Fugate's ability to be at all the meetings became an issue with the decision being made to resign from the Williston City Council.

Below is the entire letter of resignation:

January 8, 2013

Fellow Councilmen and Mayor:

As I indicated at a Council meeting last month, I have decided to resign from the Williston City Council. As you are aware, soon after my election to the City Council back in 2011, an opportunity presented itself when the City of Cedar Key advertised for a City Attorney.



Unfortunately, I have been unable to attend all of the City Council meetings. I have, however, done my best to attend and give input at workshops and meetings regarding several important City issues, such as the refund of utility charges, wholesale power contract, City Manager selection, budget deliberations and union negotiations, most of which have now come to conclusion.

As I look at my upcoming meeting schedules, I see that I would only be able to attend one City Council meeting between now and the end of my term in April. I have therefore decided that now is the time to resign. We are within six months of the next election, so this will allow the Council to select a replacement to serve, without having to hold a special election.

### Statement on the Gun Press Conference

Washington, D.C., - Congressman Ted S. Yoho issued the following statement following President Obama's press conference on Wednesday:

"Following the President's remarks today, I am convinced more than ever that we must protect our 2nd Amendment rights. While I agree with President Obama's message that we must curb gun violence and protect our citizens, disregarding our Constitutional rights is the wrong way to go. Prior to signing 23 executive orders and pushing for unconstitutional legislation in Congress, I would encourage the President to enforce the laws already on the books."

"As a proud gun owner, I believe that our right to bear arms is a birthright and I will oppose any effort to infringe on our guaranteed

Constitutional rights."

### Statement on the Disaster Relief Appropriations Act

Washington, D.C., - Congressman Ted S. Yoho issued the following statement following Tuesday night's vote on HR 152 aka The Disaster Relief Appropriations Act:

"I strongly believe that we should provide support for all Hurricane Sandy victims. This is an incredibly important issue that demands immediate attention. We can't afford to wait to get the appropriate aid to Sandy victims any longer. It is our responsibility as elected Representatives to act in the best interest and welfare of our Nation's citizens which is why I am in support of responsible disaster aid for the victims of Hurricane Sandy. I am not however, in favor of bankrolling special interest federal

programs that have nothing to do with helping the victims of this terrible tragedy."

"It is unfortunate that so many well-intentioned but ill directed items were placed in the bill. I believe that most people would agree with me that the immediate need is getting aid to people on the ground - not funding for future projects. Projects such as the \$150 million for Regional Ocean Partnership grants, \$111 million in funding for a weather satellite data mitigation reserve fund and \$11 million for the FBI and DEA have no place in disaster relief. As elected Representatives, we must take responsible action. We must redirect discretionary money to offset the cost of the aid needed. A federal government of this size can and should sacrifice for the sake of its citizens."

The result will be a higher quality wildlife viewing experience to Refuge visitors. Night closures also simplify our law enforcement and emergency response efforts and costs. Special use permits can also be applied for by the public for activities that require access to the refuge during closed hours. Open hours will be longer during hunting seasons. In Dixie County, the Dixie Mainline and the Willey Locker Mainline, will remain open for through traffic. Shired Island will be open for boat traffic while refuge lands will be closed. 

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

## Cedar Key Man Killed in Hunting Incident

A Cedar Key man was killed in a hunting incident near Rosewood Saturday evening, according to Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) investigators. John Fredrick Alford, 63, was hunting hogs with a juvenile on private property off State Road 24 in Rosewood. The two hunters separated during the hunt, investigators said. The juvenile saw several hogs crossing a narrow road just west of his location. He shot one time at the hogs, using a 16-gauge shotgun, loaded with number 1 buckshot. Alford was approximately 220 feet from the shooter and was hit by the buckshot, investigators stated. He was transported to Shands Hospital in Gainesville. FWC continues to investigate the incident.

The Levy County Journal received numerous calls on the subject from seniors and concerned citizens so we spoke to Angela Neal who has been running the Williston program at St. Barnabas for the past 3 years. According to Neal, they have been feeding inside and outside meals made at the current facility five days a week with Wednesdays and Thursdays being the heavy days. And, Wednesdays and Thursdays are the Bingo days and have been since before Neal took over the position. Neal said with the new format the meals will be made at the SREC facility in Chiefland and transported to the Williston site which will only be open for two hours on the feeding days. The current program format includes being open five days a week and from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. on Wednesdays and Thursdays. Neal said the number of meals she is currently giving to seniors is 115 to 117 with 48 of those being delivered outside the facility per week.

the Bingo is very popular with the senior group but maybe a bit risky at one penny a game. Neal checked the Florida Statutes and said, "As long as the pot is no more than \$250 there is nothing illegal about playing Bingo." And once the program is moved, there will be no more Bingo. Suffice to say, the senior army is united in cause and very vociferous at having their status quo changed. Neal says that St. Barnabas did not stop the program; SREC delivered the message to her. Her hours will be shortened to eight hours per week also and she would have to commute to Chiefland from Williston, said Neal. But most of all she is concerned for all her senior children who call her "mom." The change has caused problems among the seniors and they do not want to move or stop their Bingo. Some are concerned with the new building facility as they would have to maneuver steps and stoops outside and inside the building to use the restroom facilities. Neal said St. Barnabas told her that SREC paid a utility fee for the time the building was open but no rent. SREC's Owen says they have nine counties with meals and facilities to take care of and they need to be fair to all their seniors that are served by the program. Owen also said they received no monies from any activities at the current Williston site and they are willing to negotiate with St. Barnabas over the situation.

# Do Gun Control Laws Control Guns?

The gun control controversy is only the latest of many issues to be debated almost solely in terms of fixed preconceptions, with little or no examination of hard facts.

Media discussions of gun control are dominated by two factors: the National Rifle Association and the Second Amendment. But the over-riding factual question is whether gun control laws actually reduce gun crimes in general or murder rates in particular.

If, as gun control advocates claim, gun control laws really do control guns and save lives, there is nothing to prevent repealing the Second Amendment, any more than there was anything to prevent repealing the Eighteenth Amendment that created Prohibition.

But, if the hard facts show that gun control laws do not actually control guns, but instead lead to more armed robberies and higher murder rates after law-abiding citizens are disarmed, then gun control laws would be a bad idea, even if there were no Second Amendment and no National Rifle Association.

The central issue boils down to the question: What are the facts? Yet there are many zealots who seem utterly unconcerned about facts or about their own lack of knowledge of facts.

There are people who have never fired a shot in their life who do not hesitate to declare how many bullets should be the limit to put into a firearm's clip or magazine. Some say ten bullets but New York state's recent gun control law specifies seven.

Virtually all gun control advocates say that 30 bullets in a magazine is far too many for self-defense or hunting -- even if they have never gone hunting and never had to defend themselves with a gun. This uninformed and self-righteous dogmatism is what makes the gun control debate so futile and so polarizing.

Anyone who faces three home invaders, jeopardizing himself or his family, might find 30 bullets barely adequate. After all, not every bullet hits, even at close range, and not every hit incapacitates. You can get killed by a wounded man.

These plain life-and-death realities have been ignored for years by people who go ballistic

when they hear about how many shots were fired by the police in some encounter with a criminal. As someone who once taught pistol shooting in the Marine Corps, I am not the least bit surprised by the number of shots fired. I have seen people miss a stationary target at close range, even in the safety and calm of a pistol range.

We cannot expect everybody to know that. But we can expect them to know that they don't know -- and to stop spouting off about life-and-death issues when they don't have the facts.

The central question as to whether gun control laws save lives or cost lives has generated many factual studies over the years. But these studies have been like the proverbial tree that falls in an empty forest, and has been heard by no one -- certainly not by zealots who have made up their minds and don't want to be confused by the facts.

Most factual studies show no reduction in gun crimes, including murder, under gun control laws. A significant number of studies show higher rates of murder and other gun crimes under gun control laws.

How can this be? It seems obvious to some gun control zealots that, if no one had guns, there would be fewer armed robberies and fewer people shot to death.

But nothing is easier than to disarm peaceful, law-abiding people. And nothing is harder than to disarm people who are neither -- especially in a country with hundreds of millions of guns already out there, that are not going to rust away for centuries.

When it was legal to buy a shotgun in London in the middle of the 20th century, there were very few armed robberies there. But, after British gun control zealots managed over the years to disarm virtually the entire law-abiding population, armed robberies became literally a hundred times more common. And murder rates rose.

One can cherry-pick the factual studies, or cite some studies that have subsequently been discredited, but the great bulk of the studies show that gun control laws do not in fact control guns. On net balance, they do not save lives but cost lives.

Gun control laws allow some people to vent their emotions, politicians to grandstand and self-righteous people to "make a statement" -- but all at the cost of other people's lives.

In true teleprompter form, King Barry delivered his royal decree on gun control. It is amazing to me the blind ignorance that so infects Washington DC. The framers of this nation made THEIR position very clear on gun ownership and the DUTY of a free people to keep and bear arms.

George Mason (American Patriot, antifederalist statesman and a delegate from Virginia to the U.S. Constitutional Convention): "When the resolution of ENSLAVING America was formed in Great Britain, the British Parliament was advised to disarm the people, that it was the best and most effectual way to ENSLAVE them; but that they SHOULD NOT DO IT OPENLY, but WEAKEN them and let them SINK GRADUALLY..."

Barack Obama: "Require universal background checks for all firearm sales. Reinstate and strengthen the ban on assault weapons. Limit ammunition magazines to 10 rounds. Ban possession of armor-piercing ammunition by anyone other than the military and law enforcement. Eliminate restrictions

## Anti-American Asians Don't Speak for Me

Martial arts movie legend Jackie Chan deserves a rhetorical roundhouse kick to the mouth. So does his pal PSY, the Korean rapper whose "Gangnam Style" music video has racked up more than a billion views worldwide. Both men have raked in big bucks from Western fans while trashing the very freedoms and cultures that made them superstars.

Last week, The Washington Post spotlighted a recent interview Chan did with Chinese TV in which he accused America of being "the most corrupt country in the world." The Hong Kong-born Chan also admitted proudly that he is a propagandist for the Communist Chinese government. He openly advised his fellow countrymen to speak with forked tongues when addressing foreign press: "We know our country has many problems. We (can) talk about it when the door is closed. To outsiders, (we should say) "our country is the best."

Translation: Rampant sex-selection abortions? Shhh. Jailing political dissidents? La, la, la, can't hear you! Systemic religious persecution? State-sanctioned censorship? Continued brutality against Tiananmen Square protesters and Tibetans? Nothing to see here, move along, and down with America!

Turns out that behind the jovial cinematic persona, Chan is an unrepentant champion of authoritarian rule. Despite making a living as an entertainer and "humanitarian," Chan suffers a severe allergic reaction to freedom of speech and freedom of thought. In a separate interview last month with China's Southern People Weekly, he complained that Hong Kong had become a city of too many protests. "There should be regulations on what can and cannot be protested," Chan declared.

Earlier in 2009, Chan echoed Chinese Communist leaders in asserting that Chinese people "need to be controlled" because "if we are not being controlled, we'll just do what we want." God forbid!

This contempt for freedom of expression comes from an international box-office mogul who has topped the Forbes China Celebrity 100 list and has an estimated net worth of more than \$130 million. Even more damning, Chan's own personal history is defined by the turmoil of Mao's Cultural Revolution. As the 2003 documentary "Traces of a Dragon" recounted, Chan's father and mother both fled China for Hong Kong to escape Communist rule. They left behind their original spouses and four children between them.

Instead of condemning the regime that wrought havoc on his family and imposed suffering and death on millions of innocents, Chan is China's most prominent mainstream

apologist. Meanwhile, moviegoers in the "most corrupt country in the world" continue to help make Chan a wealthy man. This summer, his latest movie, "Chinese Zodiac," will hit U.S. theaters. Sylvester Stallone has invited him to co-star in the next installment of "The Expendables." And Chan is working on another Hollywood project involving his popular "Police Story" series.


Will American consumers allow themselves to be punched in the gut by this trash-talking action star? If the embrace of Chan's new pal PSY is any indication, the answer is yes. The Korean "Gangnam Style" performer once urged listeners to "kill those (expletive deleted) Yankees ... kill their daughters, mothers, daughters-in-law and fathers."

Called out on the hate lyrics, he issued a hasty apology before performing for the president and his family last month. Instead of rejection, PSY continues to be courted by the American entertainment industry. He'll be working with Justin Bieber's producer and will make an appearance in a high-profile ad for pistachios during the Super Bowl.

At a Hong Kong awards show last month, Chan and PSY met for the first time. It was a mutual admiration society. "You are the legend," Chan said to PSY as a young audience cheered on. "One day you can make your dream come up. All the young people, never give up. One day your dream may come true, just like him. So proud of you."

"Yankees" -- especially those whose parents came to the United States from all parts of Asia seeking freedom from tyranny -- should shun these exploitative peas in an anti-American pod. They don't speak for me.

that force the ATF to authorize importation of certain firearms because of their age." Translation: Let's make them sink gradually.

Noah Webster: "The supreme power in America cannot enforce unjust laws by the sword; because the WHOLE BODY of the people are armed, and constitute a force superior to any band of regular troops... 


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


# WES Students Garner Art, Essay Awards

27th Annual Hoggetowne Medieval Faire begins January 27th

The tradition of excellence continues at Williston Elementary School! Linda Piper, coordinator of the 27th Annual Hoggetowne Medieval Faire, recently notified WES principal Marla Hiers that 15 students had placed in the Student Art and Essay Contest. "We were so excited to learn that, once more, our WES students had excelled, doing something that was fun and educational at the same time," said Hiers.

Art entries could be either two-dimensional such as paintings or drawings or three-dimensional such as swords, shields and catapults. The essay topics ranged from King Arthur to medieval medicines and disease to a "create your own" category. The Faire's theme this year is "In the days of Camelot."

Second and 3rd graders are judged as one group while 4th and 5th graders are judged separately. In the essay category, 5th grader Tyler Roberts (Punch and Judy) and 4th grader Trinity Peacock (medicine and disease during the Middle Ages) both placed 2nd. Placing 1st in the 2-D category was 5th grader Riley Battle (colored drawing of a medieval church). Taking home 2nd place awards were 5th graders Katlynn Karwan (drawing of a dragon) and 4th grader Adam Sistrunk (colored drawing of the Robinson coat of arms).

Seemingly the most popular category, 3-D art, had the most winners; 11 students received awards: 1st place, 5th grader Everett Warren (battering ram); 1st place, 4th grader Taylor McDaniel (diorama of the Lady of the Lake story); 2nd place, 3rd grader Bailey Francis (bow and quiver with arrows); 2nd place, 4th grader Anthony Griffith (bejeweled coat of arms); 2nd place, 4th grader Maclayne McGowan (medieval stables); 2nd place, 5th grader Tyler Roberts (Punch and Judy puppet show); 3rd place, 3rd grader Regan Sapp (castle); 3rd place 5th grader Shannon Rockett (king's goblet); 3rd place, 3rd grader Hannah Piatt (castle); 3rd place 5th grader Cameron Cuomo (trebuchet with an explanation); and 3rd place 4th grader Carter Boyd (papier maché knight's helmet). Students could enter both the essay contest and one category of art if they wanted.

The students from grades 3-5 who won received two guest passes for free admission to the Faire on Saturday, January 26th, for a special ceremony at the Royal Court where the King and Queen of Hoggetowne will present them with certificates and a Faire t-shirt.

The winners' entries are on display at the headquarters of the Alachua County Library in downtown Gainesville through January 23rd. All the students who submitted entries are in the Enhanced Learning Program (ELP) and were fulfilling a requirement of their teacher, Lisa Posteraro. Each received a certificate of participation from the City of Gainesville's Department of Parks, Recreation and Cultural Affairs as well as complimentary coupons from Domino's.

"After all, our field trips are primarily educational," said Posteraro. "And they also have fun learning about the thousand-year era called 'The Middle Ages.'" This year's Faire is held over two weekends, January 26-27 and February 1-3, at the Alachua County Fairgrounds.



## Tracking Down the Past

*Bronson Speedway history to headline UF student's project*

Grad school at age 45 has been the most challenging and exciting adventure I've taken in my 30 year-long career in journalism. I knew in 9th grade that I wanted to be a photojournalist. So I picked up the camera my uncle gave me and haven't set my gear down since.

Somehow, I landed in the middle of Bronson Speedway on Saturday nights during the past two seasons. Before and after the action started, I would visit drivers in the pits, sit with fans in the stands and listen to their stories about growing up and racing at the track built and opened by Ed Harris in 1976.

Now, it's time to finalize my education and produce a giant project that proves that I know what I'm doing. After some snooping in the basement full of records at the Levy County Courthouse, I discovered that Bronson Speedway has been sold 11 times and has been owned or rented by at least 20 people.

As a result, the photos and memories of the track have been scattered, stored away or lost in the shuffle. The track office has a drawer with a handful of photos and newspaper clippings covering events and happenings. They reveal some of the activity that happened both on and off the track. That's all there is at my fingertips.

So, I decided to create the *Bronson Speedway History Project* as my final assignment. I plan to spend the next year filling in the gaps in the timeline and in the process I hope to discover hidden stories, images and videos. My goal is to meet the people who make up the heart of what this track

has brought not only to Bronson but to the State of Florida and beyond.

I'll be interviewing photographers, flagmen, concession staff, crew, fans, sponsors, drivers and more. Each week I will pose a question to readers or offer up my latest discovery.

Bronson Lube Owner and racer Robbie Cooper reminded me that we are already losing some of the people and memories of Bronson Speedway. Time is of the essence, as they say.



- **Organic initiative**--helps producers install conservation practices on USDA certified organic operations or those working toward organic certification.
- **Seasonal high tunnel initiative**--helps producers install high tunnels designed to extend the growing season, increase productivity, keep plants at a steady temperature and conserve water and energy.
- **On-farm energy initiative**--helps producers conserve energy on their operations.
- **Longleaf pine initiative**--helps private landowners improve the sustainability and profitability of Longleaf pine forest ecosystems.

They can then apply for conservation technical assistance and possible cost-share funding opportunities. Applications

must be filed no later than March 15, 2013, to be eligible for this year's funding.

Although applications are accepted on a continuous basis, the March 15 date has been set to make FY 2013 funding decisions for these special initiatives. Producers may continue to apply for all funded programs throughout the year.



### Stuffed Pork Chops

4 thick pork chops (about 1 1/2 inch thick)

#### Stuffing:

3/4 cup soft bread crumbs  
2 1/2 tablespoons minced onion  
1 1/2 tablespoon minced celery  
pinch of dried sage (or a good pinch of poultry seasoning)  
Salt and pepper to taste  
up to 3-4 Tablespoons chicken broth just to moisten, with additional broth for basting

Preheat the oven to 325°F.

For the stuffing: Mix the bread crumbs, onion, celery, sage (or poultry seasoning), salt and pepper in a small bowl. Add only enough chicken broth to make the mixture moist, but not wet.

Cut a slit into the fatty side of each chop to form a pocket. Evenly divide the stuffing between each chop and stuff the pockets with the bread mixture. If you need to secure the outside of the pork chop, pin with a toothpick.

Spray 9x13 cooking dish and place pork chops. Cook for 50-60 minutes. Baste with chicken broth every 20 minutes to insure moistness. Serve with or without gravy per preference.

#### Gravy

1 cup vegetable broth  
1/2 cup flour  
1 1/2 cups milk  
1/2 cup water

Whisk 1/2 cup flour and cook, whisking constantly for 2 minutes until browned and smooth in skillet. Remove skillet from the heat and gradually whisk in the 1 1/2 cups milk and water. Return the skillet to medium-low

heat and simmer, stirring constantly, for 5 minutes. Mixture should be well blended but will not be thickened as it will thicken during baking. Serve over chops.

### Dreamy Banana Cake

3 cups all-purpose flour  
2 cups sugar  
1 teaspoon soda  
1 teaspoon salt  
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon  
1/2 cup chopped pecans  
3 eggs, beaten  
1 cup oil  
1 1/2 teaspoons vanilla extract  
1 teaspoon banana extract (can substitute butter flavoring)  
1 can (8oz) crushed pineapple  
2 cups smashed over-ripe bananas

Combine dry ingredients in large bowl. Add eggs and oil, stirring till all dry ingredients are moistened. DO NOT BEAT. Stir in vanilla, banana or butter extract, pineapple, 1/2 cup pecans and bananas.

Spoon batter into 3 well greased and floured 9 inch cake pans. Bake at 350 for 25-30 minutes. Cool in pans for 10 minutes.

#### Icing:

Cream cheese (16oz)  
2 sticks margarine or butter  
2 lbs. Powdered sugar  
2 teaspoons vanilla  
1 teaspoon banana/butter extract  
Combine cream cheese and margarine (softened). Add powdered sugar. Beat until light and fluffy. Stir in vanilla, and extract. Save any extra icing for up to 2 weeks in refrigerator.

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
