## Car-Jacker in Williston Crashes Truck and In Jail

Williston Police Officers received a report of a car-jacking at the Hilltop Motel located at 606 West Noble Avenue on Thursday April 11 at 6:15 p.m.

According to reports, Jaakri Devontae Middleton, 21, of 1441 SE 2 St., Gainesville and two other accomplices had approached a man and woman sitting in the truck. Middleton was armed and took the truck. The accomplices left separately.

As the officers were responding to meet with the victim they observed the stolen truck turning north on Main Street (SR-121). When officers attempted to stop the stolen truck, the suspect vehicle fled north on SR-121 towards Gainesville. Officers stopped pursuing the truck due to the reckless manner Middleton was driving and the bad weather at the time. Alachua County authorities were notified of the incident.

A short time later, Alachua County authorities were notified of a traffic crash on S.W. 62 Ave several miles north of SR-121 involving the stolen truck. The stolen truck hit another vehicle on S.W. 62 Ave which caused significant damage to both vehicles. No one in either vehicle was injured. Middleton had left the vehicle but Alachua County deputies did locate him and took him into custody without incident. The accomplices are still eluding police.

Williston Police officers responded to the crash scene interviewed the suspect and lodged charges against him and he was housed in the Alachua County Jail awaiting transfer to Levy County Jail. The investigation into the incident continues and more charges are pending.

Current charges are: Armed Car-Jacking, Grand Theft, Reckless Driving and Fleeing /Eluding Law Enforcement Officer

Levy County Department of Public Safety crew members Jerry Horton, Hunter Kline, Steve Severance and Mike Weekley participated in the 2013, Firefighter Combat Challenge in Tavares, Florida on Saturday, April 14. 
On Tuesday, Greg and the boys were out. They didn't get to finish their work as two of the boys jumped over the fence behind the building and our drama began.

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## Rep. Ted Yoho Co-Sponsors FARMER Act

Congressman Ted Yoho (FL-03) announced today that he is an original co-sponsor of the FARMER Act, introduced by Rep. Austin Scott of Georgia. The FARMER Act, officially called the Farmers and Ranchers Minimizing Estate Regulations Act, creates a provision allowing hardworking, generational-farming families to use a different method of valuation when faced with the death tax.

Congressman Yoho said, "Family farming is part of America's heritage, and it must be part of America's future. Farmers live with the uncertainty of the weather, the economy, and, unfortunately, our tax code. This bill allows our high-producing farming and ranching families



to carry on their legacy of feeding America."

Under this provision, farmers, ranchers, and their families will be provided needed relief from the burdensome death tax, which has been the direct cause of many family farms going out of business. The FARMER Act creates relief from a tax code so family farms and ranches may continue their work of feeding America.

Congressman Ted Yoho is serving his first term in Congress. After serving North Central Florida farmers as a large-animal veterinarian for 30 years, he is proud to represent them today as a Florida's only Member of the House Committee on Agriculture.



## Chiefland Truck Driver Could Get Life in Prison if Convicted



Raymond Cecil Barber, Jr, 58, of Chiefland, was arrested on April 7 for Capital Sexual Battery on a person less than 12 years of age. This case is punishable by life in prison if convicted.

A complaint was filed with the Levy County Sheriff's Office on March 16, 2013. The complaint alleged Raymond Barber had inappropriate sexual relations with a child who was 7 years old at the time. The investigation conducted by Sgt. Mike Narayan revealed that Barber, an over-the-road truck driver, was in the company of the young child during a trip he took 4 years ago. Barber admitted during an interview that he did abuse the child as was reported by the complainant. This investigation concluded on April 7, 2013 with Barber's arrest.

Barber is being held at the Levy County Jail on a bond of 1 million dollars.

OLD BRONSON GYM  
 April 16, 2013



About 4 years ago, we asked the Bronson Town Council if they would like to buy the old BHS gym for \$600,000. Sale would include the gym, the multi-purpose building behind the gym, the football field complete with lights (value \$100,000) and aluminum bleachers (value \$36,000) and eight acres of property. They would not have to put any money down and we would structure a type of lease that would be beneficial to both of us. They said that was interesting but preferred to build one at the recreational park. We replied that was fine and there will be no hard feelings.

From that point in time to this very day nothing could make the administration happier than the Town or any other entity taking ownership of the gym. Our primary responsibility is education of our students and we do this by keeping teachers employed and programs in place. With our shrinking budget we cannot afford to maintain and repair the gym for recreational use.

I would like to make a recommendation to the Board that we put the "Old Bronson Gym" up for sale at the price of \$200,000. This would be in, AS IS CONDITION.

Additionally, I am asking for permission from the Board to make the following offer to the Town of Bronson:

- 1) A lease of the gym for \$1 per year for five years.
- 2) At the end of five years the town will pay the Levy County School Board a sum of \$200,000 and the LCSB will provide the Town a clear Title to the gym and surrounding parking area.
- 3) If they would like to purchase the multi-purpose building that would be at an additional \$100,000.
- 4) This lease and sale would not include the football field, but we would pay for a survey.
- 5) The gym and multi-purpose building are transferred in AS IS CONDITION.
- 6) During the lease the Town would assume all responsibilities and privileges as would be conveyed with a transfer of ownership.
- 7) A jointly conducted semi-annual inspection during the lease should be held by the Town Council and the School Board.

If these terms are acceptable to the Town Council, a contract will be drawn up by the School Board attorney and signed by both parties. If the Town Council or any other entity wants to make a counter offer it will be presented to the Board for their consideration."

## Sexual Predator Alert

On April 8, 2013 Wesley K. Bratcher, 45, now of Williston, registered as a Sexual Predator with the Levy County Sheriff's Office. By Florida law Bratcher is required to notify law enforcement whenever he changes addresses.

Wesley K. Bratcher was convicted in 2007 in Alachua County, Fla. for Lewd or lascivious molestation on a victim under 12 years by offender 18 or older; F.S. 800.04(5)(b) and Providing Obscene Material to a Minor F.S. 847.0133. Bratcher was just released from the Florida Department



of Corrections and has registered his address as: 21161 NE 35 Street, Williston, FL.

**OPENING PRAYER AND PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE TO THE FLAG**

President Cason called the meeting to order at 7:00 pm. Councilman Ross opened the meeting with prayer.

**ITEM – 1 – ADDITIONS, DELETIONS, CHANGES AND APPROVAL OF THE AGENDA**

President Cason advised that there has been discussion that Council will be swearing in 3 members. The next regular meeting is scheduled for April 2nd and another regular meeting two weeks later with the swearing in to be held on the Tuesday in between. There has been discussion about changing the meeting schedule. If that is something to be discussed, the members would need to declare the item an emergency and add it to the agenda. Mr. Koberlein suggested that the Council consider adding it to the agenda. Councilman Byrd asked if the swearing in could take place on the 2nd instead. City Clerk Taylor responded that it must take place as scheduled because it is dictated by Charter. Councilman Goodman moved to declare an emergency and add it to the agenda. Councilman Byrd seconded. On vote, the motion passed 5-0. President Cason advised that the item is placed as the first item of new business. There are no other additions. The agenda stands by general consent.

**ITEM – 2 – PRESENTATION OF THE MAYOR'S STUDENT OF THE MONTH AWARD**

A. MINUTES: MARCH 5, 2013 REGULAR CITY COUNCIL MEETING

 Councilman Goodman moved to approve the consent agenda. Councilman Byrd seconded. On vote, the motion passed unanimously, 5-0.

**ITEM – 4 – PUBLIC PARTICIPATION – None.**

**ITEM – 5 – OLD BUSINESS**

**A. RESOLUTION 2013-15: APPROVING AN APPOINTMENT TO FILL A VACANCY FOR THE CHAPTER 185 PENSION BOARD**

President Cason summarized the item as listed in the agenda cover. There was one application for the vacancy on the Chapter 185 Pension Board. The applicant was Matt Brooks. Councilman Byrd moved to approve Resolution 2013-15 appointing Matt Brooks to the Chapter 185 Pension Board. Councilman Screws seconded. Councilman Byrd noted that Mr. Brooks' status will meet all prerequisites of the vacancy including the City residency requirement. President Cason confirmed that City Attorney Koberlein had reviewed the appointment to ensure it satisfies all requirements. On vote, the motion passed unanimously 5-0.

**A. LEASE RENEWAL: RENEWAL OF THE FFA-LEVY COUNTY SCHOOL BOARD LEASE**

City Manager Lippmann detailed the item as listed in the agenda cover. He advised there was confusion about the correct property description of the land as listed in the lease. President Cason confirmed with City Manager Lippmann that the actual lease renewal document has not yet been prepared and will be prepared upon Council's approval. President Cason pointed out that the northerly yellow box shown in the aerial photo is part of the land lab. City Manager Lippmann advised that staff will make that correction. President Cason noted that Council is being asked to renew the lease with the legal description as presented and asking Mr. Koberlein to draft the lease renewal under the same terms with a 10 year extension for \$1.00. Councilman Byrd asked about the total acreage being leased. He pointed out that in the original lease the City appears to have leased 52 acres. City Manager Lippmann advised that there was a triangular piece going behind the property to the east which will not be included in the lease. The FFA/School Board will not be using that land. The only piece they wish to lease is the rectangular piece. Councilman Goodman moved to renew the lease for a 10 year period, incorporating the legal description as provided by staff. Councilman Byrd and Councilman Screws seconded. On vote, the motion passed unanimously, 5-0.

**B. INFORMATION: FERAL HOG REMOVAL**

City Manager Lippmann advised that the City received 1 bid on the Hog Hunting Lease. The bid met all requirements. The bidder is proposing \$1500 to the city and \$316 for the insurance. Staff proposes if it is the Council's intent, to approve the lease. Staff will brief the bidder with the airport supervisor regarding safety requirements. Councilman Ross confirmed that the three persons listed in the proposal are the individuals designated to assist the bidder. City Manager Lippmann noted that staff would require the Council President's signature and clearance by the City Attorney to proceed. President Cason noted this item was presented to Council for informational purposes only.

**ITEM – 6 – NEW BUSINESS**

**A. APRIL MEETING DATES**

President Cason advised that the regularly scheduled City

Council meetings are April 2nd and April 16th. There is another mandatory meeting on April 9th per charter to install new Council members. If the Council desires to change the first or second meeting day of the month to meet for two Tuesday meetings as opposed to three, the option is available. Councilman Goodman moved to reschedule the meeting on April 2nd to April 9th and have the regular meetings on April 9th and 16th. Councilman Byrd seconded. On vote, the motion passed unanimously 5-0.

**B. RESOLUTION 2013-13: APPROVING AN INTERLOCAL AGREEMENT WITH FDOT FOR THE CONSTRUCTION OF A TEST TRACK AT THE AIRPORT**

Planner Hall reviewed the item as detailed in the agenda cover. The test track would allow DOT to calibrate their test equipment. They are proposing to construct a small storage and maintenance garage. Key items in the agreement: the proposed term is 30 years, the current airport plan would not have to be drastically changed, the compensation to the airport would be the improvements and the interlocal agreement would serve as the lease. The City would continue to mow the area but one change is that it specifically states that FDOT is responsible for maintenance of the asphalt on the test track. Councilman Screws clarified with Planner Hall that the property is just off of HWY 41. Councilman Goodman asked if this test strip will be accessible to the public or fenced off. Planner Hall advised that it will be behind the fence and the traffic will be limited. Councilman Goodman verified that the hangar tenants will retain access to their hangars. Mr. Holzschuher of the FDOT explained that the FDOT needs a method to determine how smooth the roads are and is expanding to systems that will measure this that run 60 miles per hour. FDOT requires a facility and track that can certify and calibrate this equipment. Councilman Ross moved to approve Resolution 2013-13. Councilman Goodman seconded. President Cason read the Resolution title into the record. Councilman Byrd asked if the agreement had been approved at the state level and if Mr. Roland Luster is aware. Planner Hall advised that Mr. Roland was the person that directed Mr. Holzschuher to this airport. City Manager Lippmann confirmed with Mr. Holzschuher that the facility is expected to open the summer of 2014. President Cason confirmed with Mr. Holzschuher that FDOT has agreed to pay all costs. The City is allowing the company to use the area for this facility and the DOT is paying for everything. The City will receive the benefit of the improvements. Councilman Goodman confirmed the lease is for 30 years with a 30 year extension. There was a question as to whether the agreement will have any effect on the dirt runway or somehow make it inaccessible. Planner Hall advised that it should not have any impact because the testing track is far enough away from the taxiway. Mr. Holzschuher stated that the company would always notify the airport manager of any access issues during testing. Vice President Goodman requested clarification from Planner Hall. Planner Hall stated that there are a lot of things that can happen but confirmed the agreement will not interfere with access to the dirt runway. On vote, the motion passed unanimously, 5-0.

**C. DISCUSSION AND DIRECTION: REGARDING THE REQUEST OF MR. DAVE BIBBY RELATED TO IMPACT FEES**

President Cason inquired as to whether or not there was a representative present from the other restaurant involved in this issue. There was none. City Manager Lippmann advised that staff did inform those involved of the meeting time and place. President Cason stated he thought City Manager Lippmann had done a good job at reviewing the facts of the case noting that in his opinion, those facts presented are not disputed. He stated that the actions this Council takes are a result of the facts presented. The Council will move forward in the best interest of the City in a way that is fair and equitable to all. He stated he did not want the discussion to go into a "he said, she said" tangent. He wanted the members and those present to talk about and take actions on the facts. City Manager Lippmann reviewed the issue as noted in the agenda packet. The issue is that Mr. Bibby constructed and opened the Pypier Kub Restaurant as new construction. He was assessed water and sewer impact fees totaling nearly \$12,000. The other restaurant under discussion converted an existing facility that was a convenience store into a restaurant. They were told by the Building Official and the City Manager at the time that the building regardless of its use would not have any greater impact on the sewer and water system than it had previously. The owner of the other restaurant was not assessed impact fees. The Ordinance in effect at the time indicated that there should have been a calculation done by the City based on the new usage versus the previous usage. There was no calculation done. City Manager Lippmann stated that the facts presented indicate that there are two similar businesses; one has been charged impact fees and the other has not. The issue Mr. Bibby raises is one of equity between the two and he is seeking Council's action to rectify the situation. President Cason noted that the members and staff continue to call the other business, the other business. In fairness to all, Mr. Bibby is already on record. The other business that has been referred to was a convenience store that was closed and was dormant for some time and is now Melanie's Restaurant. President Cason confirms that the members and City Attorney have had an opportunity to review the options provided by City Manager Lippmann. Mr. Koberlein stated he was not sure that all those options are available from a legal standpoint but they do make common sense. President Cason reviewed that the options are to do nothing; this does not appear to be a viable option. Council can do nothing; do nothing to Mr. Bibby's status and charge full fees to Melanie's; forgive a portion of Mr. Bibby's fees; refund Mr. Bibby in full and do nothing to the other account; assess the true impact on the systems and adjust the fees accordingly. That practice differs from the fees put in place by the ordinance. Mr.

Koberlein explained that the general rule is that the City must enforce the laws and it must be done equally even if the impact of the law has an unequal result. He reviewed the section of the impact code related to replacement and additional demand. He stated that he believed that Melanie's Restaurant, based on the conversion, should be assessed the corresponding impact fee. The only other option is that all businesses that have paid an impact fee should have the same ruling applied. If the City refunds anyone, it must refund everyone. Apply the laws on the books equally even if the conclusion is a different amount or refund everyone's impact fee and do away with it. This should apply to all impact fees historically subject to this ordinance.

Councilman Goodman stated that one of the things he noticed was that Mr. Lippmann said the restaurant that was charged the fees had claimed to have put in a septic system. He asked if that issue was resolved. City Manager Lippmann stated that the resolution to that is that Mr. Bibby is on the sewer system and has not been charged through the City's billing system for monthly fees. The City would have to potentially make some adjustment related to that issue, as well. He has not paid a monthly bill for sewer. President Cason commented that issue is an administrative matter that needs to be handled administratively. Councilman Goodman asked City Attorney Koberlein if based on the fact that the city issued a certificate of occupancy to open their business, the City has grounds to retroactively assess the fees just because there was an error. The City issued a business certificate of occupancy. That meant that the City agreed the business could operate. Mr. Koberlein responded that the other issue is that the business and City should know the law that is on the books. If the City and business are aware it was an error, the business cannot be unjustly enriched by it. He concluded that the memo where this issue was brought provides the City grounds to act. It is unlikely that the business will be refunded the fees if it were to bring a case against the City.

Councilman Ross inquired as to how many other businesses were affected by the impact fee Ordinance. City Manager Lippmann stated he was unsure as to a total but noted the Ordinance came into effect in April of 2007. He stated that staff can go back and search the records to determine what the full fiscal impact would be. President Cason stated that he thought Mr. Bibby had an extremely valid argument. He explained that if he were in Mr. Bibby's situation, he would take similar action. If Council chooses to table this issue and consider a cost risk analysis, part of the analysis needs to be the defense of a claim by Mr. Bibby against the City. Councilman Goodman noted that what City Attorney Koberlein said is if the

City opens the door with Mr. Bibby, it would create a myriad of other doors for other businesses. Councilman Goodman recalled that City Attorney Koberlein had stated that if the City takes the fees from one business, it is obligated to remove them from others; otherwise it would disproportionately cause income loss to other business. This could result in law suits. He concluded that he would like to see that number before making a decision so that he will know what risk he is placing on the citizens. He added that he thought it was unfortunate that this happened to Mr. Bibby. President Cason stated that he wished to clarify the two options; bill the one business or refund all impact fees to all businesses. He then asked what costs would be related to either action. He advised that he would like some more information. He asked if similar incidents have occurred elsewhere where there is case law that would provide Council with guidance as to a possible finding one way or the other.

City Attorney Koberlein stated the question when does the City become liable or culpable for not administering the laws correctly, noting he has had a difficult time basing the determination as to whether it was an oversight or not. Councilman Ross commented that the Ordinance has been in effect since 2007 and that is quite a while with nothing being done. President Cason noted that Mr. Bibby's requests

## Fact-Free Crusades

Amid all the heated, emotional advocacy of gun control, have you ever heard even one person present convincing hard evidence that tighter gun control laws have in fact reduced murders?

Think about all the states, communities within states, as well as foreign countries, that have either tight gun control laws or loose or non-existent gun control laws. With so many variations and so many sources of evidence available, surely there would be some compelling evidence somewhere if tighter gun control laws actually reduced the murder rate.

And if tighter gun control laws don't actually reduce the murder rate, then why are we being stampeded toward such laws after every shooting that gets media attention?

Have the media outlets that you follow ever mentioned that some studies have produced evidence that murder rates tend to be higher in places with tight gun control laws?

The dirty little secret is that gun control laws do not actually control guns. They disarm law-abiding citizens, making them more vulnerable to criminals, who remain armed in disregard of such laws.

In England, armed crimes skyrocketed as legal gun ownership almost vanished under increasingly severe gun control laws in the late 20th century. (See the book "Guns and Violence" by Joyce Lee Malcolm.) But gun control has become one of those fact-free crusades, based on assumptions, emotions and rhetoric.

What almost no one talks about is that guns are used to defend lives as well as to take lives. In fact, many of the horrific killings that we see in the media were brought to an end when someone else with a gun showed up and put a stop to the slaughter.

The Cato Institute estimates upwards of 100,000 defensive uses of guns per year. Preventing law-abiding citizens from defending themselves can cost far more lives than are lost in the shooting episodes that the media publicize. The lives saved by guns are no less precious, just because the media pay no attention to them.

Many people who have never fired a gun in their lives, and never faced life-threatening dangers, nevertheless feel qualified to impose legal restrictions that can be fatal to others.

And politicians eager to "do something" that gets them publicity know that the votes of the ignorant and the gullible are still votes.

Virtually nothing that is being proposed in current gun control legislation is likely to reduce murder rates.

Restricting the magazine capacity available to law-abiding citizens will not restrict the magazine capacity of people who are not law-abiding citizens. Such restrictions just mean that the law-abiding citizen is likely to run out of ammunition first.

Someone would have to be an incredible sharpshooter to fend off three home invaders with just seven shots at moving targets. But seven is the magic number of bullets allowed in a magazine under New York State's new gun control laws.

People who support such laws seem to blithely assume that they are limiting the damage that can be done by criminals or the mentally ill -- as if criminals or mad men care about such laws.

Banning so-called "assault weapons" is a farce, as well as a fraud, because there is no concrete definition of an assault weapon. That is why so many guns have to be specified by name in such bans -- and the ones specified to be banned are typically no more dangerous than others that are not specified.

Some people may think that "assault weapons" means automatic weapons. But automatic weapons were banned decades ago. Banning ugly-looking "assault weapons" may have aesthetic benefits, but it does not reduce the dangers to human life in the slightest. You are just as dead when killed by a very plain-looking gun.

One of the dangerous inconsistencies of many, if not most, gun control crusaders is that those who are most zealous to get guns out of the hands of law-abiding citizens are often not nearly as concerned about keeping violent criminals behind bars.

Leniency toward criminals has long been part of the pattern of gun control zealots on both sides of the Atlantic. When the insatiable desire to crack down on law-abiding citizens with guns is combined with an attitude of leniency toward criminals, it can hardly be surprising when tighter gun control laws are accompanied by rising rates of crime, including murders.

## An Election Reform Actually Focused on Democracy

I'm an independent voter. There are over 2.8 million voters like me in Florida. We can't vote in Florida primary elections unless we join a major party. Florida and eighteen other states have closed primary elections where only members of a political party may vote. Even "open" primaries require you to choose a party ballot. National polls show that 40% of the electorate self identifies as independent or no party affiliation.

Washington State and California have adopted the Top 2 Open Primary. Top 2 is voter focused not party focused. All candidates appear on a single ballot and all registered voters are allowed to participate and choose candidates regardless of party affiliation or no party affiliation. The Top 2 vote-getters in each race then compete in the general election. We have a playoff system in sports where teams compete to play in the championship game. In Indiana, the smallest high schools compete with the biggest high schools to play in the basketball championship game. Why not in politics?

Why change our election system to Top 2? First, those 2.8 Million independent voters would have a voice in Florida primary elections. Top 2 would apply to congressional, state, and local races. Second, all voters, including those registered with major or minor parties, can choose the best candidate regardless of political party or no party affiliation. Let fresh ideas determine results, not party affiliation or extreme ideologies. Third, candidates would have to listen to views of all voters, not just their party base. Fourth, Top 2 will encourage potential candidates to run for office based on their principles and positions not those dictated by party affiliation. Fifth, Top 2 preserves party rights to hold caucuses, conventions or even primaries (party financed and run). Sixth, Top 2 can eliminate game playing like

crossover voting that can happen in other primary types.

In March 2008 the US Supreme Court, in a 7-2 decision, declared the Washington State Top 2 Open Primary constitutional overturning a prior Ninth Circuit Court decision. Justice Clarence Thomas, writing for the majority said, "Overturning Washington's Top 2 plan would have been an 'extraordinary and precipitous nullification of the will of the people.'"

Critics contend that parties will lose influence in elections. Data from Washington State elections suggest otherwise. Over 80 percent of general elections featured races between Republicans and Democrats or unopposed Republicans or Democrats. Critics suggest that races could become single party races. Data from Washington State show that less than 9 percent of Top 2 races were single party competitions. Critics suggest that General Elections will feature fewer choices. The point of Top 2 is to increase choice by allowing all voters access to all candidates on a single primary ballot. With only 2 candidates in a general election, the voters are ensured that the winner is favored by a majority of voters.

There is no question that running for office is tough. Top 2 Open Primaries won't solve all election problems BUT Top 2 gives all voters equal access to all candidates. It's time to think outside the box. Florida Independent Voting [FIVOrg.Com] is leading a state-wide effort to place a Top 2 Open Primary constitutional amendment on the 2014 ballot. ## Immigration Sophistry

Most laws are meant to stop people from doing something, and to penalize those who disregard those laws. More generally, laws are meant to protect the society from the law breakers.

But our immigration laws are different. Here the whole focus is on the "plight" of those who have broken the laws, and on what can be done to lift the stigma and ease the pressures they feel, so that they can "come out of the shadows" and "normalize" their lives.

Merely using the word "illegal" to describe their breaking the law is considered to be a sign of mean-spiritedness, if not racism. The Associated Press refuses to let their reporters refer to people who sneaked across the border into this country, in violation of American immigration laws, as "illegal immigrants."

On the other hand, if an ordinary American citizen breaks a law, no one cares if he has to live in fear for years -- "in the shadows," as it were -- worrying that his illegal act will be discovered and punished. No one bothers to come up with euphemisms to keep from calling what he did illegal.

No cities announce that they will provide "sanctuary," so that American shoplifters, or even jay-walkers, will be protected from the law. But, in some places, illegal immigrants are treated almost as if they were in a witness protection program.

What is even more remarkable about this special treatment is that you are not supposed to think about it as special treatment. When a new immigration law is proposed that simply overlooks violations of the old law, that is not supposed to be called "amnesty" -- even though the word "amnesty" has the same root as "amnesia." It is all about forgetting.

Why is it not supposed to be called "amnesty"? Because illegal immigrants must "earn" their citizenship. But if an ordinary American citizen gets a traffic ticket, the law is not going to just forget about it, no matter what good deeds he does afterwards. People who come here perfectly legally have to earn their citizenship. Why is earning citizenship some special reason for ignoring the illegality of others?

Impressive feats of sophistry have become the norm in discussions of illegal immigration.

For example, we are told that there is no way that the government can find all the

people who are in the country illegally and deport them. Does anyone imagine that the government can find all the embezzlers, drunk drivers or bank robbers in the country? And does anyone think that this is a reason why the government should stop trying to enforce laws against embezzlement, drunk driving or bank robbery? Or let embezzlers, drunk drivers and bank robbers "come out of the shadows" and "normalize" their lives?

Even if the government does not lift a finger to find illegal immigrants, many will come to the attention of law enforcement officials because of their violations of other laws. But, even then, there is no assurance that they will be deported -- and certainly not in "sanctuary" cities.

Why are there immigration laws in the first place? For the benefit of the American people -- not for the benefit of people in other countries who want to come here.

But political and media elites treat the American people as if they are the problem -- a problem to be circumvented with sophistry and pious promises about border security that have not been kept in all these years since the last amnesty, decades ago.

Making an irreversible decision to add millions of people -- and their dissimilar cultures -- permanently to the American body politic is something that should take months of careful examination and discussion, both inside and outside of Congress. But it is likely to get less time than you would take to decide whether to buy a house, or perhaps even a car.

What should American immigration policy be? It doesn't matter what any of us think that policy should be if the borders are not secure, because whoever wants to come across that border will come across anyway, in defiance of whatever the policy might be.

If legal benefits are conferred on illegal immigrants before the border is secured, we may as well give up any pretense that we have an immigration policy, because benefits conferred are never going to be taken back, no matter how porous the border remains.

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# Summer Time Shouldn't be Hungry Time

## Help Feed Hungry Kids through USDA's Summer Food Service Program

In the midst of winter/spring, it can be easy to forget those long, hot days of June, July, and August. Even so, now is the time to start applying and planning to feed hungry children when the school year ends.

More than 21 million children in the country receive free and reduced price meals during the school year, but when summer rolls around, only about 1 in 10 of those kids (3 million) get free meals through federal summer feeding programs. Clearly, there is a gap that needs filling.

Enter USDA's Summer Food Service Program. Kids are at higher risk of going hungry during the summer months, and we are working to fill that void. USDA alone, however, cannot accomplish the important work of feeding our low-income kids. You and your organizations have an important role to play.

Faith-based, community and private non-profit organizations are pivotal in the lives of needy children. And schools, churches, recreation centers, playgrounds, parks, and camps are all eligible and encouraged to serve summer meals in neighborhoods with a high percentage of low-income families. These locations, by their very nature, offer safe and familiar environments and are places children gather when school is out.

But feeding hungry young people requires commitment. Sponsors must provide a capable

staff, managerial skills and food service capabilities. Sponsors may provide their own meals, purchase meals through an agreement with an area school, or contract for meals with a food vendor.

If you don't want to be a sponsor but still want to be involved, your organization can be a summer feeding site. There are sponsors in your area who can work with you to feed the children in your community. And don't forget to register your summer feeding sites for the National Hunger Hotline at 1-866-3-Hungry or 1-877-8-HAMBRE.

The most successful summer programs offer activities for kids. Children are much more likely to come out for a meal when there is an activity to keep them there. It can include anything from sports, tutoring and arts and crafts, to other creative activities with community partners. Developing partnerships with other community organizations is often the key to being able to offer great activities.

# Bombs Explode at Boston Marathon to Kill 3 and Injure Over 140

Families and friends were lined up and down the streets watching the competitors of the Boston Marathon on Monday April 15 when two bombs exploded about 10 seconds apart and about 100 yards apart at 2:50 p.m. Boston's Copley Square became a finish line never to be forgotten as competitors and watching crowds alike ran for their lives.

Three lives were taken including an 8-year-old boy, Martin Richard, who was there to celebrate with his father who was running in the race. More than 140 people were injured as a result of the exploding bombs containing shards of metal and ball bearings very reminiscent of the methods used by militants in the mid east.

One report stated that the explosives were contained in 6-liter pressure cookers and hidden in black duffel bags on the ground.

The FBI took charge of the investigation asking for any

videos, audios or still images that spectators might have taken during the event. The FBI also served a warrant on an unknown person of interest in the Boston town of Revere carrying out bags and boxes of items from the apartment.

Florida Governor Rick Scott stated: "Our hearts and prayers go out to the people of Boston. I've asked the Florida Division of Emergency Management to be on standby to provide any assistance needed to help first responders on the ground in Boston. The Florida Department of Law Enforcement also stands ready to provide any support services needed. As a husband, father and grandfather, today's events remind us all of how fragile life is and how important it is for us to keep our communities safe. Tonight, our state stands in support of all those impacted by the Boston bombings. We hope those responsible are swiftly brought to justice - and peace and safety is quickly restored."



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## COMPUTER TIPS

### Protect Yourself from Identity Theft

Computers are used for many different types of things these days. Businesses rely on them, students depend on them to get through school, and the majority of homes have at least one computer for keeping in touch with friends and family and for other things such as personal banking. 
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
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#### Last Week's Crossword

have previously been brushed aside but this Council is trying to resolve the issue fairly. However the Council needs more information. Planner Hall advised, as to overall effect, the City has \$99,000 in the impact fee accounts. This is total since the Ordinance has been in effect from April 2007. City Manager Lippmann advised that staff will go through the impact fee accounts and come up with a specific number for Council so the members will know exactly how much money it will be dealing with on this issue. If there is anything associated with residential development, staff will consider that separately. Vice President Goodman confirmed that staff will provide the amount of fees and how many businesses have been affected. Councilman Screws questioned that refunding everyone the money would put an end to the potential law suits. City Attorney Koberlein stated that it should, noting that no one would have much standing to argue for damages. Councilman Byrd stated when Council put this impact fee on the books it was to accomplish a goal. Everyone knows Williston's history of changing out City Manager and had one that made a mistake on this issue. He stated that when he goes out around the City, he would like to be able to tell people that the City made a mistake and Council is fixing it. He stated that Council needs to do away with the impact fee, refund everyone the monies and apologize to Mr. Bibby. He stated that he thought impact fees used properly are a good thing. President Cason responded that he believed they were used properly except in one instance. There was an Ordinance that called for the payment of impact fees. There was one out of many that fell through the cracks. He stated he wants know can the City bill that customer and expect to be paid or can the City expect a law suit. \$100,000 as a down payment on a half million dollar water and sewer expansion project is a sizeable benefit for the rate payers. Councilman Goodman stated that the members may not think it is relative, but he could see this business probably closing its doors if it has to pay this fee. Maybe the members are not allowed to consider that but the City is losing businesses already. He stated he would hate to see it happen. The impact fees stopped Mr. Bibby from being able to employ another person and it has been a real burden to his business. He stated he thought this other business will close down. He advised that that is part of the equation and he does not know the right answer. However, he would like to have more information before making a final determination. He concluded that his position must be based on what is best for the citizens of Williston.

City Manager Lippmann clarified that the impact fees for Melanie's would actually be more than they were with Mr. Bibby. Councilman Screws noted that in the agenda packet the information stated that the City Manager and Public Works Director and Building Official determined in their collective opinion there would be no impact on the water and sewer systems based on usage. Councilman Goodman stated that he understands that a 2 inch line only carries so much water but a 2 inch line does not push water all day.

President Cason observed that everyone has stated their opinion but the members could make a motion to give all the money back. There is no motion and if Council takes no action, staff will gather more information and it will be on the next agenda for the Council's consideration. Councilman Byrd stated that the staff could provide all the information it wants and it will boil down to someone under Council's control made a mistake and it is the Council's responsibility to fix it. He stated his belief that the audience is likely thinking that the City administration is trying to think of ways to get out of this. He concluded that he wants this fixed. Councilman Screws stated that he can assure everyone he is not looking for a loop hole. Councilman Ross noted that the City had to refund citizens on the utilities and it was quite a bit of money but the City got it done. Councilman Goodman noted that his concern is that the members do not have the numbers. He would have no problem giving back all the impact fees but before he votes on the issue, he would like to know how many businesses and how much money. That is why he is requesting Council consider tabling this to give the members that information. There was discussion on the figures. City Manager Lippmann clarified that there is a portion of the funding that is commercial versus residential. Mr. Koberlein stated he was referring to commercial. Planner Hall advised that the impact fee applies to all residential and commercial development. Councilman Byrd stated he had no problem tabling

it if the members need those numbers. President Cason stated he needed Mr. Bloom to tell him how that is going to impact the budget going forward. He asked how it would be returned. The Council needs to know all those facts before the members vote on it. If there is no more discussion by Council then by consent, the members will direct staff to prepare the economic and legal impact and bring it back to the next council meeting.

Mr. Bibby stated he wanted to go on the record stating that his fight is not with Melanie's, it is with the City. It is not his fault, it is the City's fault. He does not have a problem paying what he owes but when something falls through the cracks it comes up three years later that he did not pay sewer fees. The solution is simple. The money has been collected over 6 years. It will cost \$100,000 in engineering to increase capacity. The City is at 43% and it will take 50 years to get to 57%. Do away with the impact fees and give back the \$99,000. It is no secret who paid it. Send them a check and be done with it. He stated he struggles to make those payments. It just takes a motion a second and three votes to do away with it. It is a very simple thing. Vote it down.

D. ORDINANCE 630: EXTENDING THE IMPACT FEE MORATORIUM

President Cason provided background on the moratorium. What is before Council is an ordinance that would put into place the previous moratorium. This moratorium would suspend impact fees for one calendar year. There will not be a period of break and will be retroactive to the 20th upon 2nd reading. Staff was directed at the workshop to prepare an ordinance to extend the moratorium on impact fees so it could look at alternatives to impact fees. Mr. Koberlein read the title on first reading of Ordinance 630. Councilman Ross moved to approve Ordinance 630 on first reading. Councilman Byrd seconded. Vice President Goodman noted that the extension was for a one year period. He recalled he had made the commitment that if it was for 1 year he would vote for it. Therefore, he will be supporting this ordinance. He added that, for the record, he wanted to make it clear that he is supporting this ordinance as a means to work within the Council that his preference is for a complete abolishment of impact fees. He is only supporting this because he failed to get a complete abolishment of the fees earlier. President Cason stated that in the workshop he was adamantly opposed to extending this impact fee a full year but wanted to limit it to the fiscal year to force Council to address it in the budget process. He was opposed to a one year moratorium but he will support it. His hope is that Council will deal with this issue before the beginning of next year's budget so this is not an issue perpetually. Mr. Bibby stated that the City has had this moratorium for a year. He asked how many permits were issued in that one year. He provided Council the answer noting that none were issued. He stated that he wants an abolishment of the impact fee. He requested Council just vote the Ordinance down and give everyone their money back. On vote, the motion to approve Ordinance 560 extending the moratorium passed 5-0.

President Cason and Vice President Goodman invited Mr. Bibby to attend the workshop.

E. RESOLUTION 2013-11: DESIGNATING JULY 3RD FOR THE 2013 WILLISTON INDEPENDENCE DAY CELEBRATION

City Clerk Taylor reviewed the item as listed in the agenda cover. Councilman Byrd moved to approve Resolution 2013-11. Vice President Goodman and Councilman Screws seconded. Councilman Byrd commented that he is glad the City has finally legalized this through Resolution because he has done this for 32 years without a resolution. On vote, the motion passed 5-0.

F. RESOLUTION 2013-12: APPROVING BIDS FOR THE CRA PAVILLON EXPANSION CONTRACT

Planner Hall reviewed the item as described in the agenda cover. He provided a summary of the bids received. The CRA recommended because of the cost that the City move forward with the pavilion only. The CRA held a public hearing on that issue. The CRA determined there was information missing from the Hauffman bid. With this information added, it was still the lowest bid. Because Hauffman altered their bid after the deadline, there is potential for a bid protest. He spoke with the next highest bidder who advised that if the Hauffman bid was still lower after the information was added and calculated into it, they would not protest. Planner Hall reviewed the options. If there is a protest staff will recommend to rebid the project. At

this point staff recommends the bid be approved. Vice President Goodman noted that he reviewed this carefully and would like to commend the CRA for their work. It is unfortunate that both projects could not be done but he agreed that the pavilion project will have more impact on the community. Vice President Goodman voiced his support for the CRA recommendation. Dr. Schwiebert stated he was stunned by how high the bids came in. It was more than double what was expected. The CRA members were heartbroken because they were really looking forward to making a real statement downtown. He concluded that this recommendation is a good compromise and stated the CRA appreciates Council's support.

Councilman Byrd verified that the recommendation has been reviewed by the City Attorney. Councilman Byrd moved to approve resolution 2013-12. Councilman Screws seconded. Planner Hall noted that the CRA was recommending to go with the alternate as well on the roofing. On vote, the motion was approved 5-0.

G. RESOLUTION 2013-14: APPROVING THE PROJECT APPLICATION SUBMISSION FOR THE TRANSPORTATION ALTERNATIVES PROGRAM

Planner Hall reviewed the item as detailed in the agenda cover. This project would upgrade the culverts in the area to improve capacity for storm water. The City could get grants sooner but this would be something guaranteed to be 100% funded. Vice President Goodman noted that the item refers to an alternative type of transportation but everything Planner Hall has described seems to come under vegetation management on rights of way. This talks about trails and sidewalks etc. Planner Hall confirmed the City could use the grant for that if sidewalks with curbing were constructed, that is considered alternative transportation. The culverts would play a key part in managing the storm water. Vice President Goodman confirmed that 2nd avenue is a county road. Planner Hall stated that the County takes care of the pavement and the City deals with the storm water on the side. President Cason asked if there was any chance this item would cost the City any money. Planner Hall clarified that the application is not the formal agreement. If there is an agreement, and the project will cost the City, the project will come back to Council for approval. President Cason clarified this is just approval to submit the application. Councilman Screws moved to approve Resolution 2012-14. Councilman Byrd seconded. President Cason read the title of Resolution 2013-14 into the record. On vote, the motion passed 5-0.

ITEM - 7 - PUBLIC PARTICIPATION

Mr. Bibby stated that when he received the permit to build the restaurant, City Hall called and said he had to bring a check for \$750 because of a land zone change to change zoning from industrial to a restaurant. Two weeks later they called and asked for another \$200 for a site plan for the Police Chief and Fire Chief. Three months later his engineer called and advised that the City Manager instructed him to do engineering on a lift station that will cost \$80,000. That lift station never happened because the utility director told the City Manager he didn't need a lift station. The City didn't have to pay \$80,000 for the lift station but Mr. Bibby stated he did have to pay \$5,000 for engineering. When someone comes into City hall and says that they are going to build a business, they should be given a manual that includes all the costs. He stated he would like the Council to direct the City Manager to develop a booklet that will have a fee schedule for developers. President Cason noted that Mr. Lippmann is trying to make that part of City Hall more accessible and improve the process. City Manager Lippmann advised that what Mr. Bibby is describing is already a goal of his to accomplish. President Cason stated that recently an individual bought a house in town and came to City Hall for services but was told they could not help him until he owned the property. All that the customer wanted to do was obtain power, water and sewer services but he was told to come back when he could prove ownership. What the customer should have been told was welcome to Williston and he should have been given a fee schedule and been able to begin the process as much possible prior to ownership.

ITEM - 8 - ANNOUNCEMENTS

City Manager Lippmann advised that the Levy County Fair will be at the fairgrounds April 11th - 14th.

Councilman Ross asked if there was any more being done on the safety incentives program. City Manager Lippmann confirmed that he has the calculations and they will be coming to Council in the future.

President Cason noted that each Council member was provided with a copy of a performance review. Mr. Lippmann's contract calls for a performance review prior to the 1st of May. He stated he needed those completed by the meeting on April 9th. He stated that he would have them compiled for the April 16th meeting.

ITEM - 9 - ADJOURNMENT

Councilman Byrd moved to adjourn. The meeting was adjourned at 8:54 pm.


Well, a cow came by me and I went after her. I had my horse in the wind trying to get ahead

First of all, in the over twenty years that Lancaster has been coming out to help us, we have never had any escape or even an attempt. The two boys, who had never been here before, jumped over the fence and took off running.

Within minutes, Lt. Kevin Bailey and Sgt. Carl Loy of Lancaster Youth Facility were in pursuit. The two men were out for an unscheduled visit so were able to begin looking for the boys immediately. Gregg secured the rest of the boys and we (the Museum ladies) sat on the porch to watch.

The first Levy County Sheriff's Department vehicle was at the scene in less than 5 minutes. Keep in mind that we're five miles away from Chiefland and 10 miles from Bronson. Cars kept coming including from the Chiefland Police Department. Over on Hwy 129, more vehicles were arriving. Within 45 minutes the two boys were captured near Quincy Farms on CR 320. The bloodhound unit from the Cross City Correctional facility came to the Museum

after the capture to see if they could track the route the boys took through the fields to Quincy Farms.

We would like to thank all the agencies involved in the capture for the two boys – agencies from Gilchrist, Dixie, Levy, and Taylor Counties as well as Chiefland Police Department. Ironically I was just asking Lt Bailey and Sgt Loy what do we do in the event of an emergency and Greg was unable to be of assistance. We now know that help is really only minutes away. We hope that this incident does not harm the relationship we have with Lancaster. We know the boys are well screened before they get in the work release program but stupid can happen. Thanks Lancaster for all your help.

## National Child Abuse Prevention Month

Even though things were really bad at his house, Brandon was shocked and terrified when people came and took him away from his family. They told him they needed to place him somewhere safe. They took him to an aunt's house - he had never met his aunt, and she lived in a neighborhood he didn't know. They told him he would be put in a new school, which frightened him, because he had already missed weeks of school, was behind and wouldn't know anyone. His sister was taken to another place; he missed her and was scared that he would never see her again. And he is sure it is his fault.

These children come into the child welfare system due to neglect, abuse and/or abandonment. The system cannot always give the thorough, detailed attention each of these children need and deserve. "Through no fault of their own, some children are separated from their everything that is familiar to them because parents can't or won't take care of them," said Michael Whiting the Guardian ad Litem supervising Child Advocate Coordinator for Levy and Gilchrist Counties. "It's a nightmare for them, and they should not be alone in this process."

Enter the Guardian ad Litem Program. The court appoints a Guardian ad Litem volunteer to represent the best interests of children who come into the court system. The Guardian is someone who can help them understand what

is going on, answer questions, and help ensure the children don't get lost in the system. The program depends heavily on volunteers who are appointed by their judicial circuit.

Volunteers visit the children to make sure they are safe and gather information for the court about the progress of the children and parents. Sarah McIntosh from Archer believes "The outcomes of cases often change because of the Guardian's investigative work. Facts are uncovered so the court gets the full story and the right decisions can be made to significantly improve the outcome for the children".

Lynn Deen, recruiter and volunteer for the program says, "The power of what our volunteers do is that the Guardian's information goes directly to the judge. There are no therapists, teachers, doctors or other service providers in court. The only way the judge gets their information is through the social worker and the Guardian volunteer".

Deen also notes, "People from all walks of life volunteer. We have staff, legal support and mentors to help them. We welcome retirees but also have a large number of working people". Jennifer Whiting from Bell has been a Guardian since 2004 and works. Whiting states "Child visits are flexible and most information gathering is done through phone calls and emails which can be made around a work schedule."

It doesn't take much time to make a profound difference - about 10 hours a month. Training is based on a national 30 hour course and is offered every two months in Chiefland. Barbara Conway from Chiefland has been a child advocate since 1987. She states that "The Guardian staff in Levy County is wonderful. They provide a tremendous support system with good guidance and are always there to help and answer questions."

Volunteers commit to at least one year because they want to be the constant for the child and the court. McIntosh says "I want to be a positive influence on the children and give them hope". Conway notes, "I want to be sure these children are safe and find a permanent home. I get a lot of enjoyment from the children. 


