## Drug Bust at Bronson Motel – Again



Last March 6 the Levy County Sheriff's Office Drug Task Force busted Russell Girdler and Sean Franzius for manufacturing meth in a room at the Bronson Motel with a child present in the room. Judith Gazdun was also arrested and charged with child abuse and possession.

Bronson officials later posted notices on the doors of rooms 20 and 21 stopping unprofessional clean up of the rooms to ensure a licensed contractor did the work and an inspection was made to make sure the toxic leftovers were removed, not just covered up with paint.

Now on Monday June 10 at 10 a.m. it was room 24 that was the target. Levy County K-9 Deputy Kevin Kinik knew that Johnny Lee Patterson, 21, of Bronson, had a warrant for arrest for Violation of Probation stemming from an earlier arrest for Dealing in Stolen Property and Burglary and was now at the Bronson Motel at 315 E. Hathaway Ave. Deputy Kinik learned that Patterson was in room 16 but upon talking to the occupants of that room the deputy was told that Patterson was not there.

Deputy Kinik contacted the manager of the motel and was told that room 24 was being occupied by an unregistered tenant. The manager opened room 24 to allow Deputy Kinik to conduct a trespass investigation.

Deputy Kinik assisted by Deputy Noel Ramirez discovered the room was occupied by Patterson and a female companion, Kiara Hicks, 20. While Deputy Kinik was in the room to take Patterson into custody he observed a clear plastic bag with a substance that appeared to be cocaine in it and some cash.

Deputy Kinik placed Patterson and Hicks into custody and requested the assistance of the Levy County Sheriff's Drug Task Force who prepared and executed a search warrant on room 24. The Drug Task Force recovered 4.6 grams of crack cocaine with a street value estimated at \$960 and \$154 in cash.

## Bronson Town Council Split on Early Voting with Tie Breaker Vote Saying No

Every vote counts – but how much time do you need to vote? That was the question at the last Bronson Town Council meeting.

Bronson elections are coming up soon on September 10. The qualifying time for candidates is from Monday July 26 through noon on Friday August 2. The books for registering close on August 12.

Councilman Berlon Weeks, longtime proponent of early voting, would like to see early voting by a municipality start with Bronson. Councilman Jason Kennedy agreed.

But there is the cost factor of an extra \$800+ dollars involved. There is also another way to vote early – by absentee ballot. Ballots can be picked up at the City Hall, filled out and mailed back making it easy for the

voter to have time to pick their candidate and be a part of the process.

Weeks said, "I think it would be great to lead the way in Levy County. It looks like the rest of the country has adopted this practice already in the general elections. It is not really a lot of money for allowing people who can't make it in come in and vote who work out of town."

Councilman Aaron Edmundson did not want to be the first municipality to have the early voting and Councilwoman Beatrice Roberts said that absentee voting should be enough.

Up for this election cycle are Seat 1 currently held by Edmundson, seat 3 held by Roberts and seat 5 now held by Kennedy.

Town Clerk Kelli Brettel gave the council the voting numbers with a roll over 800 and the highest voting

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## Commissioners Give a Raise to County Employees

Levy County Commissioners made the decision to ratify an agreement with Florida Public Employees Local 630 for a pay raise of 3 percent. The Local 630 is part of Laborers International Union of North America of AFL-CIO. The three commissioners present at the June 4 meeting were Chairman Ryan Bell, Commissioner Mike Joyner and Commissioner John Meeks who all voted for the raise.

This raise will also include all the employees of the constitutional officers of Levy County but even though the Local 630 employees will see their raise on June 20 it is up to the constitutional officers as to when the other employees will see their raise on a check. The tax collector, sheriff, property appraiser and supervisor of elections are all constitutional officers.

In December of 2012 the county decided to pay for increases in health care premiums for

county employees but there was no raise, just a bonus. County employees have not had a raise for five years.

According to County Coordinator Fred Moody the money will come from each department's budget.

Commissioners Chad Johnson and Danny Stevens were not at the meeting. The vote was unanimous 3-0.

Public Meeting June 19 in Rockville, Md.  
The Nuclear Regulatory Commission is seeking public comment on issues related to foreign ownership, control and domination of commercial nuclear power plants, and will hold a public meeting June 19 at agency headquarters in Rockville, Md., to discuss the topic.

The Atomic Energy Act and NRC regulations disqualify any applicant for a nuclear power plant operating license if the applicant is owned, controlled or dominated by a foreign national, a foreign corporation or a foreign government. In recent years, a number of licensing actions before the NRC have involved complex issues of foreign ownership, control and

## Stolen Pontoon-Boat Creation Results in Charges for Designers

It generated quite a bit of interest on the river, but a pontoon dock that was turned into a boat and retrofitted with a motor and Jeep cabin, was stolen.  
 Robert Lee Alvord, 31, and Kenneth W. Rehberg, 30, both of Branford, were charged with grand theft for stealing parts for their boat/dock Jeep special, which was created by installing a Jeep Cherokee chassis on a section of a pontoon dock, according to Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) officers.  
 An alert had been sent out to FWC officers about the stolen pontoon dock, which had gone missing from a residence on the Santa Fe River several weeks ago. If the stolen property was located, officers were asked to contact the Suwannee County Sheriff's Office because the sheriff's office

was investigating the theft.  
 FWC Investigator Terryne Bing realized he had conducted a boating safety inspection on the unique craft a few days prior to the alert being sent out. He had given a citation to the operator because the vessel was unregistered and was powered by an outboard motor. Bing checked out the description of the stolen dock in the alert and realized that the craft he had cited matched the distinguishing characteristics of the pilfered pontoon dock.  
 Bing contacted the two men, who admitted they had taken the dock. Alvord told Bing that his unique vessel was very popular on the river and had received plenty of comments.  
 The pontoon dock was valued between \$400 and \$600. The custom work was removed and the dock returned to the rightful owner in its original condition on June 1.

attendance being 267 voters.  
 With Weeks and Kennedy for the early voting and Roberts and Edmundson against it, the tie vote came down to Mayor Franklin Schuler who voted "no." According to Schuler the Town of Bronson has a very poor voting record and you might "get maybe 5 people" leaving him to vote against the proposition.  
 The Council also decided to

support the North Florida Broadband Authority with Councilman Kennedy motioning to pass the Resolution to approve the local agreement with the NFBA which was seconded by Councilman Weeks and no opposition. Councilwoman Roberts nominated Councilman Weeks to represent Bronson as the main representative and Town Clerk Kelli Brettel as the alternate for the seat at the NFBA

which was seconded by Councilman Edmundson.  
 The NFBA has been turned down for approval by Taylor, Suwannee, Columbia, Baker, Bradford, Lafayette, Dixie and Gilchrist counties with reasons like high salaries being paid, lack of support for monies spent and not enough answers to questions.

# Crabfest Shooter Indicted and Arrested



Devonte Tremaine Ocasio, 19, the shooter at the Crab Festival in Williston on April 27 where four people were wounded and one man died was formally arrested yesterday on the 6 count indictment delivered by the Levy County Grand Jury on Friday afternoon.

The true bill delivered last Friday listed the following charges: First Degree Homicide, Attempted First Degree Murder, 3 counts of Aggravated Battery with a Deadly Weapon and Aggravated Assault with a Deadly Weapon. A total bond of 3 million dollars was assigned for all

of the charges except the First Degree Homicide. NO BOND was assigned to that charge.

Ocasio will be held in the Levy County Detention Facility until his trial which has not yet been scheduled.

domination. This is likely due to the increased globalization of the electric power industry and complexity of corporate structures generally.

The Commission directed the staff in March to prepare a fresh assessment of foreign ownership issues and propose any changes to guidance or practice that may be warranted. The staff's assessment and proposals are due to the Commission by Dec. 31. At this time, no specific changes to guidance or regulation are under consideration. The staff requested public comment, with specific questions about the extent of indirect foreign ownership that should be allowed, in a notice published June 3 in the Federal Register.

The June 19 public meeting will be held in the Commission Hearing Room, One White Flint North, 11555 Rockville Pike, from 9 a.m. to noon. For more information, see the public meeting notice.

We're pleased to present to you this year's Annual Water Quality Report. This report is designed to inform you about the quality water and services we deliver to you every day. Our constant goal is to provide you with a safe and dependable supply of drinking water. We want you to understand the efforts we make to continually improve the water treatment process and protect our water resources. We are committed to ensuring the quality of your water. Our water source is **groundwater from two wells drawing from the Floridan Aquifer**. We treat our water using chlorination for disinfection and feeding a polyphosphate for iron control.

In 2012 the Department of Environmental Protection performed a Source Water Assessment on our system and a search of the data sources indicated no potential sources of contamination near our wells. The assessment results are available on the FDEP Source Water Assessment and Protection Program website at [www.dep.state.fl.us/swapp](http://www.dep.state.fl.us/swapp).

If you have any questions about this report or concerning your water utility, please contact **Kelli Brettel** at our office between the hours of **8:00 AM and 4:30 PM, Monday through Friday at (352) 486-2354**. We encourage our valued customers to be informed about their water utility. If you want to learn more, please attend any of our Town Council meetings. The **Town of Bronson** routinely monitors for contaminants in your drinking water according to Federal and State laws, rules, and regulations. Except where indicated otherwise, this report is based on the results of our monitoring for the period of January 1 to December 31, 2012. Data obtained before January 1, 2012, and presented in this report are from the most recent testing done in accordance with the laws, rules, and regulations.

As approved by EPA, the State has reduced the monitoring requirements for certain contaminants to less often than once per year because the concentrations of these contaminants are not expected to vary significantly from year to year. Some of our data, though representative, is more than one year old.

In the table below, you may find unfamiliar terms and abbreviations. To help you better understand these terms we've provided the following definitions:

- Initial Distribution System Evaluation (IDSE): An important part of the Stage 2 Disinfection Byproducts Rule (DBPR). The IDSE is a one-time study conducted by water systems to identify distribution system locations with high concentrations of trihalomethanes (THMs) and haloacetic acids (HAAs). Water systems will use results from the IDSE, in conjunction with their Stage 1 DBPR compliance monitoring data, to select compliance monitoring locations for the Stage 2 DBPR.
- Maximum Contaminant Level or MCL: The highest level of a contaminant that is allowed in drinking water. MCLs are set as close to the MCLGs as feasible using the best available treatment technology.
- Maximum Contaminant Level Goal or MCLG: The level of a contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MCLGs allow for a margin of safety.
- Action Level (AL): The concentration of a contaminant which, if exceeded, triggers treatment or other requirements that a water system must follow.
- Maximum residual disinfectant level or MRDL: The highest level of a disinfectant allowed in drinking water. There is convincing evidence that addition of a disinfectant is necessary for control of microbial contaminants.
- Maximum residual disinfectant level goal or MRDLG: The level of a drinking water disinfectant below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MRDLGs do not reflect the benefits of the use of disinfectants to control microbial contaminants.
- Parts per million (ppm) or Milligrams per liter (mg/L) - one part by weight of analyte to 1 million parts by weight of the water sample.
- Parts per billion (ppb) or Micrograms per liter (µg/L) - one part by weight of analyte to 1 billion parts by weight of the water sample.
- Picocurie per liter (pCi/L) - measure of the radioactivity in water.

If present, elevated levels of lead can cause serious health problems, especially for pregnant women and young children. Lead in drinking water is primarily from materials and components associated with service lines and home plumbing. Town of Bronson is responsible for providing high quality drinking water, but cannot control the variety of materials used in plumbing components. When your water has been sitting for several hours, you can minimize the potential for lead exposure by flushing your tap for 30 seconds to 2 minutes before using water for drinking or cooking. If you are concerned about lead in your water, you may wish to have your water tested. Information on lead in drinking water, testing methods, and steps you can take to minimize exposure is available from the Safe Drinking Water Hotline or at <http://www.epa.gov/safewater/lead>.

The sources of drinking water (both tap water and bottled water) include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs, and wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity.

- Contaminants that may be present in source water include:
- Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations, and wildlife.
  - Inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, which can be naturally-occurring or result from urban stormwater runoff, industrial or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining, or farming.
  - Pesticides and herbicides, which may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture, urban stormwater runoff, and residential uses.
  - Organic chemical contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production, and can also come from gas stations, urban stormwater runoff, and septic systems.
  - Radioactive contaminants, which can be naturally occurring or be the result of oil and gas production and mining activities.

In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, the EPA prescribes regulations, which limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. The Food and Drug Administration (FDA) regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water, which must provide the same protection for public health.

Drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that the water poses a health risk. More information about contaminants and potential health effects can be obtained by calling the Environmental Protection Agency's Safe Drinking Water Hotline at 1-800-426-4791.

In order to maintain a safe and dependable water supply, we sometimes need to make improvements that will benefit all of our customers. **Sex and the Military**

The headline on the front page of the New York Times said it all: "Women in the Senate Confront the Military on Sex Assaults."

In a triumphalist article showcasing the growing numbers of women on the Senate Armed Services Committee, "one of the Senate's most testosterone-driven panels," the story line presents female Senators attacking male military officials over charges of sexual assaults against women in the armed forces.

Us-against-them stories are great for generating excitement in the media and in politics. But whether any of this political theater will actually reduce sexual assaults against women in the armed forces is a totally different question.

For thousands of years, people around the world had the common sense to realize that putting young men and young women together in military operations was asking for trouble, not only for these young people of both sexes, but for the effectiveness of military forces entrusted with the fate of nations.

Yet, in these politically correct times, civilian leaders who increasingly have no experience whatever in the armed forces are far more willing to try to micro-manage the military than back in the days when most members of Congress and most Presidents had served in the military.

There seems to be something liberating about ignorance and inexperience. You are free to believe whatever you want to, unencumbered by hard facts and, if you have political power, to impose your headstrong ignorance on those with first-hand knowledge.

If sexual assaults in the military are taking place in our own country, far from the scenes of battle, what do you suppose is going to happen when men and women are in the same tents or trenches at night on battlefields thousands of miles away?

We don't have to ask what will happen on warships at sea. The number of Navy women who already get pregnant in such places tells us more plainly than words.

How much of this country's military resources do you think should be diverted from

preparing for, and fighting, battles involving life and death to adjudicating conflicting stories about who did what to whom, and whether it was consensual or not?

Such issues have plagued college campuses with coed dormitories, where there are no bullets or bombs to complicate matters. Why would we imagine that "he said, she said" issues are going to be any easier to deal with in a military context?

People who can understand that "prevention" is better than "cure" in many other contexts seem not to understand that simple fact in a situation where cures are often either elusive or impossible. You cannot un-rape somebody after the fact. Nor can you restore the honor of someone unjustly accused and convicted to appease civilian politicians on a rampage.

Too much of the discussion of issues involving the role of women in the military is based on questions about whether women can do the same tasks as men with equal efficiency.

The real question is whether either sex functions as well with the other sex around. If you don't think either sex finds the other sex distracting, you are ignoring thousands of years of experience around the world.

Nobody needs to be distracted in life and death situations, where the difference between victory and defeat can be "a near run thing," as the Duke of Wellington said after the battle of Waterloo, which settled the fate of Europe for generations to come.

Even consensual sex among members of the same military unit opens a whole Pandora's box of complications that can undermine the morale of the unit as a whole -- and morale can be the difference between victory and defeat, between life and death.

A more insidious consequence of having ignorant civilians micro-managing the military is that the caliber of a nation's military leaders can be affected when generals have to pass through filters for political correctness to reach the top.

That means losing people whose only abilities are in winning wars with minimum casualties, or preventing wars by knowing the right deployment of the right forces. Top military talent is no more common than any other kind of top talent -- and the stakes are too high to filter out that talent with requirements that generals be able to pretend to do the impossible on sexual issues.

Sun, sun, sun, here it comes. Welcome to the Summer of Belated Epiphanies. Media lapdogs are finally, finally arriving at the conclusion that maybe this isn't the most transparent administration in world history, after all.

On Tuesday, the Associated Press reported on the Obama administration's use of secret email accounts, stonewalling on Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) requests and attempted shakedown of reporters seeking public information on just how widespread the disclosure evasion might be.

Take note: It wasn't the AP that originally uncovered Team Obama's penchant for email sock-puppetry. Chris Horner, Competitive Enterprise Institute fellow and author of "The Liberal War on Transparency," first exposed former EPA Chief Lisa Jackson's Internet alter ego, "Richard Windsor," last year. So did Donald Berwick, former head of the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services, and Gary Cohen, a top Obamacare operative.

According to the AP, a whopping 10 agencies have not yet turned over lists of email addresses, including EPA, the Pentagon, the departments of Veterans Affairs, Transportation, Treasury, Justice, Housing and Urban Development, Homeland Security, Commerce, and Agriculture.

And how's this for the audacity of opacity: Can you believe the Labor Department initially asked the AP to pay more than \$1 million for its email addresses?

In a classic Captain Obvious moment, the Associated Press points out that these hidden accounts "drive perceptions that government officials are trying to hide actions or decisions." You don't say!

Hostility to transparency, of course, has been a hallmark of this administration from top to bottom. As I reported from the very first days of the Obama regime's vampiric tenure:

--Former Secretary of State Hillary Clinton for years fought disclosure of massive donations from foreign governments and corporations who filled her husband's library and foundation coffers.

--Former Labor Secretary Hilda Solis failed to disclose that she was director and treasurer of a union-promoting lobbying group pushing legislation that she was co-sponsoring.

--Attorney General Eric Holder overruled his own lawyers in the Justice Department on the issue of D.C. voting rights (which he and Obama opposed) and refused to make public the staffers' opinion that a House bill on the matter was unconstitutional. His stone wall of obstruction extends from the New Black Panther Party voting rights case to the Fast and Furious gun-walking scandal to the Solyndra green boondoggle bankruptcy

and Gitmo closure plans and conflicts of interests -- all while touting a new "Open Plan for Government" from which he has conveniently exempted himself.

--Former No. 2 official

at the Department of Housing and Urban Development, former King County, Wash., Executive Ron Sims, had the distinction of being the most fined government official in his state's history for suppressing public records from taxpayers.

--Former green czar Carol Browner infamously bullied auto execs to "put nothing in writing, ever." She was singled out by the White House's own oil spill panel for misleading the public about the scientific evidence for the administration's draconian drilling moratorium. The Interior Department inspector general and federal courts blasted drilling-ban book-cooking by both Browner and former Interior Secretary Ken Salazar, who falsely rewrote the White House drilling-ban report to doctor the Obama-appointed panel's own overwhelming scientific objections to the job-killing edict, as a culture of contempt and "determined disregard" for the law.

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# Death of the Bees. Genetically Modified Crops and the Decline of Bee Colonies in North America

This article was originally published by Global Research in March 2008

Commercial beehives pollinate over a third of North America's crops and that web of nourishment encompasses everything from fruits like peaches, apples, cherries, strawberries and more, to nuts like California almonds, 90 percent of which are helped along by the honeybees. Without this pollination, you could kiss those crops goodbye, to say nothing of the honey bees produce or the flowers they also fertilize.

This essay will discuss the arguments and seriousness pertaining to the massive deaths and the decline of Bee colonies in North America. As well, it will shed light on a worldwide hunger issue that will have an economical and ecological impact in the very near future.

There are many reasons given to the decline in Bees, but one argument that matters most is the use of Genetically Modified Organisms (GMO) and "Terminator Seeds" that are presently being endorsed by governments and forcefully utilized as our primary agricultural needs of survival. I will argue what is publicized and covered by the media is in actuality masking the real forces at work, namely the impact of genetically modified seeds on the reproduction of bee colonies across North America

Genetically modified seeds are produced and distributed by powerful biotech conglomerates. The latter manipulate government agricultural policy with a view to supporting their agenda of dominance in the agricultural industry. American conglomerates such as Monsanto, Pioneer Hybrid and others, have created seeds that reproduce only under certain conditions, often linked to the use of their own brands of fertilizer and/or insecticide.

The genetic modification of the plant leads to the concurrent genetic modification of the flower pollen. When the flower pollen becomes genetically modified or sterile, the bees will potentially go malnourished and die of illness due to the lack of nutrients and the interruption of the digestive capacity of what they feed on through the summer and over the winter hibernation process.

I will argue that the media reports tend to distract public opinion from the true cause which underlies the destruction of bee colonies. As such, outlined are four major arguments which the biotech conglomerates (which produce and market GMO seeds) have used to mislead the public regarding the demise of the bees. These arguments include Varroa mites, parasites, cell phones, and terminator seeds

### Argument 1: Varroa mites

Firstly, "while there are some [people who] want to pin the blame on these mites"<sup>3</sup>, such views are unconvincing in that the argument does not make any sense because the main source of disease for these bees is intestinal disease. In fact, "many bee experts assumed Varroa mites were a major cause of the severe die-off in the winter of 2005. Yet when researchers from the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Bee Research Laboratory in Beltsville, Maryland, traveled to Oakdale, California, where Anderson and a number of his fellow beekeepers spend winter and spring, they could find no correlation between the level of Varroa mite infestation and the health of bee colonies. 'We couldn't pin the blame for the die-off on any single cause,' says Jeff Pettis, a research entomologist from the U.S.

Department of Agriculture (USDA) Bee Research Laboratory in Beltsville, Maryland. However, treatments against mites may be leaving hives open to the onslaught of powerful pathogens, much in the same way the overuse of antibiotics lead to super bugs" in society today. What does that say about our future? We have learned that in the 1960's and 1970's, among other human ailments, DDT was a major cause of cancer in humans and animals; however, the substitution of such pesticides was a closely guarded secret. Unfortunately, the long term effects on the human population has yet to be understood as the compromise of the immune system may be happening quicker than we are ready to accept, even regarding the advent of super bugs. One can see that even this medical implication has severe economical implications.

### Argument 2: Parasites

Secondly; "Crops and even hedges, verges, and woodlands, and even where bees remain are sprayed with pesticides or herbicides. These chemicals are the practical extension of an exasperating belief that nature is our enemy. Pouring poison on our food is a very simplistic way of dealing with our problems, however, it ignores the root causes. New genetically modified crops, designed to be immune to certain pesticides and herbicides, have resulted in the increased usage of these chemicals. Pesticides, particularly Bayer's imidacloprid, a nicotine-based product marketed under the names Admire, Provado, Merit, Marathon, and Gaucho have been concretely implicated in the destruction of bee populations before.

The fact that other bees and insects are not raiding deserted hives to feed on the honey as they normally would lends some credence to the theory of a toxic overload". The toxic overload is certainly a concern, but wouldn't it also need to be considered that this is systematic in the degeneration of the digestive process, such as in humans' inability to digest preservatives and not absorb the enzymes to break down the foods eaten for survival?

**Argument 3: cell phones**  
Thirdly, "there was also a misconstrued study on




cell phone radiation and its effects on the bee's ability to navigate which turned out to be an over-zealous unthinking reaction by an article in the Independent [news]. Some have also mentioned other navigational hindrances such as UV radiation, shifting magnetic fields and even quantum physics as a reason to the destruction of the bees".

There are certain implications to this theory, and it has been proven that electromagnetic radio wave lengths do affect the navigation of the bees. However, the sun emits radiation spurts all the time, yet this has not offered a hindrance to the bees.

### Argument 4: Terminator Seeds

Lastly, "leaked documents seen by the Guardian show that Canada wants all governments to accept the testing and commercialization of "Terminator" crop varieties. These seeds are genetically engineered to produce only infertile seeds, which farmers cannot replant, not to mention that bees trying to collect pollen are found to have in their digestive tract, diseases such as amoeba and nosema disease." These diseases are mainly located in the digestive tract system. After studies of the autopsy, the most alarming trait is that the lower intestine and stinger have discolored to black vs. the normal opaque color, synonymous with colon cancer in humans.

'When thoracic discs were cut from sample Georgia A-2 the musculature of bees was notably soft and discolored (A) when compared to healthy thoracic cuts (B).

This discoloration suggests that the bees were dead upon collection. When questioned the beekeeper confirmed that the bees were alive at the time of collection. Further, the tracheal system of these bees did not show signs of desiccation usually associated with the collection of dead bees. Thoracic discs from this sample, after being placed in KOH for 24 hours, revealed peculiar white nodules."

As seen above, it is certain that the digestive shutdown is due to hard material in the digestive tract that compromises the immune system. Circulatory problems would occur without doubt. Could it be that humans are going through the same process with the rise of Colon Cancer? As seen below in the comparison of the healthy Bee and the unhealthy bee, it is obvious that the bees ingesting GMO pollen are having severe digestive problems, so severe that the disease is terminal.

excepting that the cube observed was ~10x too big for a virus particle. There were fragments of pollen grain husks in all samples examined. All PA samples were found to have nosema spores in their rectal contents while none of the GA samples did. In two samples, epithelial cells were packed with spores.

The North American reliance on bees for pollination is at minimum from 30 to 40%. Does it not seem obvious that the digestion of genetic material directly affects the digestive process of the bees? Could it also be that there are similarities in the human population's digestive process? It must also be noted that this increased epidemic of the bee colony collapse




Figure 1: Extreme discoloration of intestinal tracts of bees.






Figure 2: Digestive shutdown of the Honey Bee

The rectal contents of Georgia bees (A) were distinctly different then the contents of Pasadena bees (B). The rectal walls of GA bees were notably transparent revealing contents that looked like small stone packets (C). While Fyg (1964) describes similar stone like contents in poorly laying queens, the stones observed in the GA bees were not attached to the epithelium layer as Fyg (1964) describes. When these packets were ground and mounted, some unidentified floating objects (UFO's) were observed. A cubic particle that resembles the cubic bodies of polyhedrios viruses (this viruses attacks wax moths)



has risen significantly since the use of GMO in our foods. It is also suspect in the rise of new cases of medical ailments in humans such as colon cancer, obesity, heart disease, etc... In the writers' opinion, the inability of the bees to pass matter digestively is quite similar to the present-day problems in the human digestive system

Conclusion:  
The proof is obvious that one of the major reasons of the bees' decline is by the ingestion of GMO proteins. This is problematic, as there is such an increase of indigestible foods in humans and bees. The situation of colon cancer in humans is somewhat similar in occurrence. This is only a theory but leaves one to wonder what are we eating en mass. The external or complementary good of the bee is obviously a rise for a global concern. The long-term economical and environmental impact has yet to be completely understood.



The Ecological Impact of horizontal gene transfer and increase of rampant disease is not fully examined and if so, is kept silent by these Conglomerates. The Economic impact of the bee colony collapse would mean inflation, scarcity of agricultural commodities, and ultimately the collapse of North American agriculture.

The Environmental Impact of scarcity and increased demand for resources will beyond doubt have severe repercussions for our long-term food security. The bio-diversity of the bees causes positive economic and ecological externalities. The negative externalities have yet to be fully grasped or understood.

# Gov. Rick Scott Vetoes Bill Based Solely on DHS Policy Not Law

*Florida Governor Rick Scott vetoed HB 235 – Relating to Requirements for Driver Licenses:*

June 4, 2013  
Dear Secretary Detzner:

By the authority vested in me as Governor of the State of Florida, under the provisions of Article III, Section 8, of the Constitution of Florida, I do hereby veto and transmit my objections to House Bill 235 enacted during the 115th Session of the Legislature of Florida, during the Regular Session of 2013 and entitled:

An act relating to requirements for driver licenses...

Florida is home to immigrants of many nationalities, who add to the cultural fabric of our great state, and whose productivity and hard work have contributed to our economic turnaround. Still, our nation struggles with immigration issues every day, as Americans seek to reconcile the fact that at one point our families were immigrants who came, as many do today, to work and live the American dream with the fact that the federal government has failed at enforcing the nation's laws on this topic.

Despite the federal government's inability to enforce the nation's current immigration laws or to find common ground on how to change them, the United States Department of

Homeland Security (DHS) announced in a June 2012 memo the immediate establishment of a "Deferred Action Process for Childhood Arrivals." Through this process DHS provides that a young person illegally brought to the United States as a child will not be subject to removal if the individual meets certain criteria. Qualifying for deferred action status does not confer substantive rights or lawful status upon an individual; it does not create a pathway to a green card or citizenship; nor does it extend to any family members of the person granted the status either. **Deferred action status is simply a policy of the Obama Administration, absent Congressional direction, designed to dictate removal action decisions using DHS agency discretion. It was never passed by Congress, nor is it a promulgated rule.**

Given that deferred action status does not confer substantive rights or lawful status upon an individual, Florida is best served by relying on current state law. Already, Florida law allows those with a federal employment authorization card, without regard to their deferred action status, to obtain a temporary Florida driver license.

Although the Legislature may have been well intentioned in seeking to expedite the process to obtain a temporary driver license, it should not have been done by relying on a federal government policy adopted without legal basis.

For the reasons stated above, I withhold my approval of House Bill 235, and do hereby veto the same.

And just recently, they are now including wheat and here is what the world thinks of that.

A Kansas wheat farmer filed suit Monday against biotech giant Monsanto alleging that he and other wheat farmers have been hurt financially by the company's unapproved biotech wheat. "Monsanto has released GE (genetically engineered) wheat



into the non-genetically modified wheat population," the petition states.

The "plaintiff has been harmed by any and all Monsanto GE wheat because it has impacted wheat exports and the price of wheat," the petition also states.

It is not known how widespread the unapproved wheat is, or if it has contaminated food supplies. But some buyers of U.S. wheat have backed away from purchases. South Korea and Japan immediately suspended their U.S. wheat purchases and European Union officials have said they want to test all incoming shipments and block any containing genetically modified wheat.

## Applications Available for Southern Pine Beetle Assistance and Prevention Program

*Help available for non-industrial, private forest landowners*

Florida Commissioner of Agriculture Adam H. Putnam and the Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services' Florida Forest Service announced today that the Southern Pine Beetle Assistance and Prevention Program will accept applications from non-industrial, private forest landowners from June 14 through July 31.

The southern pine beetle is one of the most destructive forest pests in the southeast, and periodic outbreaks can rapidly kill millions of pine trees on tens of thousands of acres. The last major outbreaks in Florida occurred from 1999

to 2002, resulting in an estimated \$59 million in timber losses.

"This program promotes forest management activities that increase the natural resistance of pine forests to southern pine beetle infestations," said Jim Karels, Director of the Florida Forest Service. "Conducting these activities now will reduce the likelihood of losses from future outbreaks."

The program, supported through a grant by the U.S. Department of Agriculture Forest Service, offers an incentive payment for landowners who conduct a first pulpwood thinning and partial cost reimbursement for prescribed burning, mechanical underbrush treatments and planting longleaf or slash pine. Since it was first offered in 2005, the program has supported these practices on more than 120,000 acres.

The program is limited to 44 northern Florida counties located within the range of the southern pine beetle. Qualified landowners may apply for no more than two approved practices

per year. Funding requests may not exceed \$10,000. All qualifying applications received during the submission period will be evaluated and ranked for approval.

## Who's Training Who?

People used to come from miles around to watch me train my black lab Leroy. Not because he was so smart, it's just nobody had ever seen a dog swim the back-stroke.

Like all labs, Leroy loved to fetch. He just happened to be deathly afraid of water! It was sure something to see when those two driving forces collided. If I'd have had any business sense I'd have charged people admission to watch him go. I'd have gotten richer than whoever owns that talking Gecko.

Most folks were a might skeptical after hearing the tales of the backstroking dog. I'd see them shaking their heads as I warmed him up with a few runs on the dry land. Then, to my shame, I'd throw that training dummy way out across the bayou. Leroy wouldn't hesitate. He'd tear off at full speed and lay out across that water, landing with a tremendous splash. There'd always be that split second of silence as Leroy disappeared under the surface. (I knew from experience he was under there contemplating his big mistake.) Once he realized what he'd done, he'd shoot up from there like a school of piranhas was snacking on his tail.

I'm not sure how long you actually have to walk on water to qualify for sainthood, but I'm sure Leroy would've at least deserved honorable mention. He'd be whooping those gangly front legs like a nuclear powered paddle boat. It sounded like an angry beaver tail-slapping symposium. The poor bayou had never taken such a beating, and it'd cough him up every time. His head would be riding two or three feet off the surface, and just when you thought he was sure to drown, he'd lay back and start that famous Leroy back-stroke.

Over on the bank, you never heard such cackling in all your life, and it was all at my little buddy's expense. It was downright shameful, but I took some comfort in knowing everybody else was laughing too.

But anyway- A lot of folks may have misjudged Leroy on the basis of his one little shortcoming, but the fear of water was such a small part of his life. Thankfully, ole' Leroy never took it all to heart. He never let his faults define him. He

just kept on plugging along, wagging that tail, loving, and living life to the fullest. You'd have thought he'd wrote the Scripture: (I will give thanks to You, for I am fearfully and wonderfully made; Wonderful are Your works, And my soul knows it very well. Psalms 139:14 NASB) For example, one day I brought Leroy on a real hunting trip. My dad scoffed, "Leave him home son. He just ain't gon' make no hunting dog." Boy was dad surprised. Leroy didn't lose a single bird that day in chest high Johnson grass. That dog had a nose that could trail a gnat poot through a fertilizer farm. Leroy also turned out to be quite the fisherman. One summer, when the bayou dried up, he sloshed around out in there in the shallows until he wrestled his jaws around a nice mess of big catfish.

One day Leroy got lost several miles from home. Mom took me back to look for him for two days. The third day I was sitting out on the front step with my head down praying, trying not to let anybody see me cry, when suddenly I felt a big wet tongue rake across my face. I looked up and there he was, home again, wagging his big happy tail!

I was blessed to have Leroy as my friend in those formative years of my life. He was the best dog a fellow could ever have. He taught me to not let my shortcomings define me, to just keep wagging my tail when I'm laughed at, and to not let anybody keep me from giving life my best shot. It makes me wonder, "Who was training who?"



Moral of the Story: When you act stupid you got to be tough.


## The New Cow Whip

### FRENCH ONION SOUP CASSEROLE WITH GARLIC SAUCE

A casserole version of traditional French Onion Soup topped with a luscious creamy sauce!

5 medium onions, thinly sliced  
2 Tablespoon light butter  
1 ½ cup fat free beef broth  
½ cup red wine  
3 garlic cloves  
1/3 loaf French baguette  
4 slices light Swiss cheese  
1 Tablespoon Worcestershire sauce  
1 Tablespoon balsamic vinegar  
1 tsp paprika  
1 tsp dried thyme  
1 tsp salt  
½ tsp black pepper  
½ (18oz) can of Progresso Recipe Starters Creamy Roasted Garlic (save the other half for upcoming recipe!)

Set a large pot or Dutch oven medium high heat, melt butter and add in onions, garlic and salt.

Cook, stirring frequently, until onions become caramelized, about 30-40 minutes.

If onions start to stick to pan, just stir a tbsp or two of the broth as needed.

Once onions are caramelized, add in the broth, wine, Worcestershire sauce, paprika, pepper and thyme. Simmer over medium heat for 20 minutes, stirring occasionally.

Turn heat to low and add in vinegar and season with additional salt and pepper if desired. Cover and keep over low heat to stay hot while you prepare the bread.

Preheat oven broiler. Slice 1/3 of a loaf of French baguette into about 12 slices.

Spray a baking sheet with nonfat cooking spray, and arrange baguette slices evenly on sheet. Lightly mist again with an olive oil mister or the nonfat cooking spray and then place in oven for 3 minutes on each side, or until bread is well toasted on both sides.

Remove bread from oven and set it to bake on 375 degrees.

Pour onion mixture into an 8X8 casserole dish. Top evenly with bread slices and then cover evenly with Swiss cheese slices.

Place casserole dish into oven and let bake until cheese is melted and bubbly and beginning to brown, about 10-15 minutes. Serve immediately.

### CREAM CHEESE- BOURBON-PECAN POUND CAKE

1 ½ cups butter, softened  
1 (8-ounce) package cream cheese, softened  
3 cups sugar  
6 large eggs  
3 cups all-purpose flour  
½ teaspoon salt  
¼ cup bourbon  
1 ½ teaspoons vanilla extract  
1 cup chopped pecans, toasted  
½ shredded coconut

Beat butter and cream cheese at medium speed with an electric mixer until creamy. Gradually add sugar, beating at medium speed until light and fluffy. Add eggs, 1 at a time, beating just until the yellow yolk disappears.

Sift together flour and salt; add to butter mixture alternately with bourbon, beginning and ending with flour mixture. Beat batter at low speed just until blended after each addition. Stir in vanilla, pecans and coconut. Pour batter into a greased and floured 12-cup tube pan.

Bake at 325° for 1 hour and 30 minutes to 1 hour and 35 minutes or until a long wooden pick inserted in center of cake comes out clean. Cool in pan on a wire rack 10 to 15 minutes. Remove from pan; cool completely on wire rack.

### SPECIAL WHISKEY SAUCE

¼ cup margarine or butter  
½ cup sugar  
1 beaten egg YOLK  
2 TBLS water  
2 TBLS bourbon

Melt butter. Stir in sugar, egg yolk and water. Cook and stir constantly over medium heat, 5 to 6 minutes. Remove from heat; stir in bourbon.

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
