House in Inglis a Total Loss after Fire



Firefighters from all around Levy County and even one from Marion County responded to a call from the owner of the home at 18353 SE 144 Street in Inglis that was engulfed in flames. About 4:45 p.m. the Levy County Department of Public Safety, Battalion 1, Station 6; Yankeetown, Station 2; Morriston, Medic 3; Inglis Fire Department; South Levy Fire Department; Marion County Rainbow Lakes Fire Department and the Levy County Sheriff's Office were dispatched to the home after the owner called 911 to try and save the home.

The first unit on scene was the LCDPS Medic 3 who reported that 50 percent of the home was already on fire. Medic 3 evaluated the situation and requested additional resources while they secured the utilities.

Fire crews attacked the fire defensively establishing a tanker shuttle for water since there are no water hydrants in that area of the county. There was a 200-gallon propane cylinder that was being protected from the fire exposure using water to avoid an explosion.

As of print time today, there is no report yet from Fire Investigators on the cause of the fire. There were no injuries.

Bronson Votes No to Early Voting Again and Honors Local Volunteer

The Council Meeting of the Town of Bronson started out with Edith Brown of The Children's Table Food Pantry Ministry thanking and honoring Alfreda Freeman for her work there volunteering over 20,000 hours in the past 17 years. And this is not the only service Ms. Freeman gives to the community, she also among other things, fosters children. The audience gave Ms. Freeman deserved accolades as she was awarded plaques and honors for her years of volunteerism and service to the residents of Levy County. Ms. Freeman humbly just said, "Thank you very much."

The Levy County Health Department requested a street closure on Main Street for Sat. Sept. 8 for their Health Fair. Councilwoman Beatrice Roberts made the motion to allow the closure and it was seconded and there was no opposition.

Councilman and Vice Mayor Berlon Weeks again approached the council concerning waste cans being placed at locations "without being paid for" as it was put by Weeks. No resolution was established except that Mr. Bob Niffeneggar of Building, Zoning and Code Enforcement stated that he would gladly draw up an accounting of what has or has not been paid for.

The next thing on the agenda was the continued request by Weeks that the Town of Bronson make the move to allow early voting for the residents of Bronson starting at the next election on September 10. Up for voting are the seats for Councilman Aaron Edmondson, Councilman Jason Kennedy and Councilwoman Beatrice Roberts. Qualifying for these seats starts on July 26 and continues until Aug. 2 at 4 p.m. Any Bronson resident can run for any seat on the council verified by a copy of their utility or water bill to prove residency of 6 months or more prior to qualifying.

Currently, and at previous meetings, the council has voted to stay with the one day voting from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Weeks again brought up the subject stating that many residents of Bronson who work out of town do not have the time to get back here to vote and need more time to do so.

The answer was also the same, they can vote by absentee ballot. The objection by some to the absentee ballot is that the voter feels they are not counted properly. Due to changes in signatures over time this can be an issue. Town Clerk Kelli Brettel said there were three in the last election whose signatures did not match the signature on file.

There were discussions for and against the issue as every person expressed their deeply held convictions on the subject of early voting. Those that leave Bronson early and come home late from work and don't like or believe in absentee voting feel disenfranchised from voting. Those that don't want the expense of early voting in such a small election do not see the need to push the issue right now or spend the extra money it will take to provide it.

In the future, it may be something to consider said Mayor Franklin Schuler but for now the answer is still "no" with the vote the same as the past: Weeks and Kennedy voting for the early voting; Roberts and Edmondson voting no with Mayor Schuler siding with the no vote to break the tie.



Yoho Votes for Healthcare Fairness

Congressman Ted Yoho (FL-03) voted in favor of H.R. 2667 and H.R. 2668, bills that delay both the employer mandate and the individual mandate for healthcare coverage as required in the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act, commonly called Obamacare.

H.R. 2667 corrects President Obama's recent overreach of power by legislating the delay of the employer mandate for businesses to provide coverage to their employees. H.R. 2668, a separate bill, gives American families the fairness and relief they deserve by delaying the requirement for them to purchase individual health insurance as well. Congressman Yoho said:

"By delaying parts of the Affordable Care Act at his choosing, President Obama's latest attempt at legislating from the Oval Office has resulted in blatant unfairness for the American people. It is a good thing the president has



heard the complaints of businesses, but we hear the fears of the people. From union members to tea party members to soccer moms, we hear the same thing: the Affordable Care Act is legislative malpractice.

"Obamacare repeal is quickly becoming the most bipartisan issue in the nation. We talk about the employer mandate and the individual mandate, but the clearest mandate is the one the people have given Congress to get rid of this law. Instead of continuing to discriminate against hardworking American families, the president should show leadership and agree to the full

repeal the people want. It's the only truly fair thing to do and it is the right thing to do for America."

Congressman Yoho cast these votes on the same day he became a cosponsor of H.R. 2682, the Defund Obamacare Act of 2013. This cosponsorship is consistent with Rep. Yoho's vote for the FY 2014 budget, which allocated no funds for the implementation of the Affordable Care Act.

Florida DCF Fighting Fraud and Winning

The Department of Children and Families Briefs Federal Government on First-in-the-Nation Fraud Fighting Technology

Leaders from the Department of Children and Families yesterday briefed Under Secretary for Food, Nutrition, and Consumer Services, Kevin Concannon, on the results of Florida's initiatives to combat public assistance fraud. Florida is the first state in the nation to implement customer authentication, a technology used to verify customer identity before benefits are delivered.

"In Florida, we are committed to protecting taxpayer dollars and ensuring that benefits only go to those in need," Secretary David Wilkins said. "We welcomed the opportunity to share our success with the federal government in an effort to encourage other states to implement more fraud fighting measures."

Earlier this year, DCF was granted the first-ever waiver from the federal government to

implement customer authentication into online applications. More than 90 percent of the five million annual benefits applications are received online through the DCF ACCESS system. The technology was piloted in Central Florida from March 4 to June 16 and resulted in three times the savings in fraud avoidance than originally projected. During the pilot, DCF only received four complaints out of 210,881 applications

Facebook Photos of Turkeys Lead to Charges

An anonymous complaint about Facebook photos showing multiple harvested wild turkeys ended with charges being filed against four men for various hunting violations.

Travis Clayton McFatter, 27, Blake Dalton King, 21, Zachary David Espenship, 20, all of Lake City, and Dustin Wayne Parrish, 26, of Lulu, were cited by Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) officers.

The photographs showed McFatter and King posing with several freshly harvested turkeys and McFatter also posing with a dead alligator.

FWC investigators interviewed the two men. McFatter admitted to investigators that he had killed five turkeys during the season, as well as taking two birds in one day. The legal daily bag limit is one turkey and the season bag limit is two birds. One of the photos McFatter had posted showed three harvested gobblers. He received that photo from his cousin, Parrish, but didn't know the details about the birds.

"Mr. McFatter also explained he picked up the road-killed alligator near his house," said FWC Investigator Todd Hoyle. "He took the gator home, snapped a few

photos and ate the meat."

McFatter was charged with taking over the daily bag limit for turkeys, three counts of taking over the season limit of two turkeys and possession of an untagged alligator. He was also given two noncriminal citations for no hunting license and no turkey stamp.

During his interview with investigators, King admitted to killing four turkeys.

"Mr. King gave permission to search his truck and investigators found fresh blood in the bed and on the tailgate of his pickup," Hoyle said. "He told us that he and his friend, Mr. Espenship, were headed home from their hunting club and saw a deer standing on the shoulder of the road. Mr. Espenship then shot the deer."

Espenship admitted to killing the deer while it stood blinded by the headlights of the truck. He gave investigators four bags of deer meat and the .22-caliber Winchester rifle he used to kill the animal.

King was charged with two counts of taking over the season limit of wild turkey, taking deer out of season and taking deer at night by use of gun and light.

When investigators interviewed Parrish, he admitted to taking three gobblers – two on the opening morning of spring turkey season and one bird on Easter morning. He was charged with taking over the daily bag limit and taking over the season bag limit.

In all, after a two-day investigation, a total of 13 misdemeanors and two infractions were issued by FWC officials.

"This is a great case and shows how our investigators and officers work together, as well as how important it is for us to follow up on complaints we receive," said Capt. Martin Redmond, FWC area supervisor.

Special Medicare Enrollment Periods

At age 65, and once you have worked and obtained 40 earnings credit quarters (approximately 10 years), you become eligible for premium-free Medicare Part A hospital coverage. If you chose to begin receiving Social Security benefits before age 65, then you will automatically receive your Medicare ID Card about three months before your 65th birthday. If you have waited for full retirement age to apply for Social Security benefits, then you will need to contact the Social Security Administration and apply for a Medicare ID Card about three months before your 65th birthday. You can easily complete this process by phone or online at www.socialsecurity.gov. It's a good idea to take a look at this website. You might be surprised what you can accomplish from the comfort of your home or office.

When your Medicare ID Card arrives, it will state "Part A (Hospital Coverage)" and "Part B (Medical Coverage),"

with an "Effective Date" for each type of insurance coverage. If you already have alternate medical coverage through your or your spouse's employer, then you may not need Part B (Medical Coverage) at this time. If this is the case, you can simply return the entire Medicare ID Card to the Social Security Administration and request a new Medicare ID Card with just Part A (Hospital Coverage). Be sure to double-check with your Social Security benefits administrator to make sure that you do not have to take Part B when you turn 65. In 2013, Part B coverage has a monthly premium cost of \$104.90. That premium amount can change, and even increase, because it is based upon your income. You are eligible to enroll three months before and up to three months after your birth month. Please note that there is a penalty for not enrolling once you are eligible. There are so many variables and exceptions to the rules and regulations of Medicare, that it will greatly benefit you to contact a SHINE counselor once you receive your Medicare ID Card (Florida

Elder Helpline at 1-800-963-5337).

Medicare Part D (Prescription Coverage) also has a penalty if you do not enroll during the same time frame required for Part B, even if you are not currently taking any prescriptions. However, if you already have "creditable drug insurance coverage," you may wait until you or your spouse stop working, at which time you then have 63 days to choose and enroll in a drug plan without a penalty. If you ever move out of the insurance coverage area of a Medicare Advantage Plan or Part D drug plan, you also have a special enrollment period.

Call the Florida Elder Helpline at 1-800-963-5337 if you have questions regarding Medicare, are experiencing problems with your insurance coverage or to schedule a SHINE presentation for your group so you will be well equipped for Medicare's Open Enrollment Period (October 15 until December 7).

and the majority of applicants completed the process successfully and applications were processed more quickly.

The next phase of the pilot began on July 1 in Northwest Florida and Miami, which ranks number one in the nation for consumer complaints related to identity theft. Preliminary results from Central Florida have found 371 cases of potential identity theft, representing cost avoidance as much as \$419,802. This figure is expected to grow as case analysis from the pilot continues.

"The data from our pilots shows that this technology is working," Wilkins said.

"Using this technology, we are moving from a pay and chase model to stopping fraudsters at the front door."

The Mindset of the Left: Part III

The fundamental problem of the political left seems to be that the real world does not fit their preconceptions. Therefore they see the real world as what is wrong, and what needs to be changed, since apparently their preconceptions cannot be wrong.

A never-ending source of grievances for the left is the fact that some groups are "over-represented" in desirable occupations, institutions and income brackets, while other groups are "under-represented."

From all the indignation and outrage about this expressed on the left, you might think that it was impossible that different groups are simply better at different things.

Yet runners from Kenya continue to win a disproportionate share of marathons in the United States, and children whose parents or grandparents came from India have won most of the American spelling bees in the past 15 years. And has anyone failed to notice that the leading professional basketball players have for years been black, in a country where most of the population is white?

Most of the leading photographic lenses in the world have -- for generations -- been designed by people who were either Japanese or German. Most of the leading diamond-cutters in the world have been either India's Jains or Jews from Israel or elsewhere.

Not only people but things have been grossly unequal. More than two-thirds of all the tornadoes in the entire world occur in the middle of the United States. Asia has more than 70 mountain peaks that are higher than 20,000 feet and Africa has none. Is it news that a disproportionate share of all the oil in the world is in the Middle East?

Whole books could be filled with the unequal behavior or performances of people, or the unequal geographic settings in which whole races, nations and civilizations have developed. Yet the preconceptions of the political left march on undaunted, loudly proclaiming sinister reasons why outcomes are not equal within nations or between nations.

All this moral melodrama has served as a background for the political agenda of the left, which has claimed to be able to lift the poor out of poverty and in general make the world a

better place. This claim has been made for centuries, and in countries around the world. And it has failed for centuries in countries around the world.

Some of the most sweeping and spectacular rhetoric of the left occurred in 18th century France, where the very concept of the left originated in the fact that people with certain views sat on the left side of the National Assembly.

The French Revolution was their chance to show what they could do when they got the power they sought. In contrast to what they promised -- "liberty, equality, fraternity" -- what they actually produced were food shortages, mob violence and dictatorial powers that included arbitrary executions, extending even to their own leaders, such as Robespierre, who died under the guillotine.

In the 20th century, the most sweeping vision of the left -- Communism -- spread over vast regions of the world and encompassed well over a billion human beings. Of these, millions died of starvation in the Soviet Union under Stalin and tens of millions in China under Mao.

Milder versions of socialism, with central planning of national economies, took root in India and in various European democracies.

If the preconceptions of the left were correct, central planning by educated elites with vast amounts of statistical data at their fingertips, expertise readily available, and backed by the power of government, should have been more successful than market economies where millions of individuals pursued their own individual interests willy-nilly.

But, by the end of the 20th century, even socialist and communist governments began abandoning central planning and allowing more market competition. Yet this quiet capitulation to inescapable realities did not end the noisy claims of the left.

In the United States, those claims and policies reached new heights, epitomized by government takeovers of whole sectors of the economy and unprecedented intrusions into the lives of Americans, of which ObamaCare has been only the most obvious example.

Eric Holder's Stand Your Ground Squirrel

Welcome to the Obama administration's cringe-inducing non sequitur of the week. On Tuesday, Attorney General Eric Holder continued stoking the fires of racial resentment over a Florida jury's acquittal of George Zimmerman. In an address to NAACP leaders, who are demanding federal intervention, Holder attacked Stand Your Ground self-defense laws.

All together now: Squirrel!
"Separate and apart from the (Trayvon Martin) case that has drawn the nation's attention, it's time to question laws that senselessly expand the concept of self-defense and sow dangerous conflict in our neighborhoods," Holder opined. He then baselessly claimed that such laws are creating "more violence than they prevent" and used his platform to promote citizens' "duty to retreat."

So, what exactly do Stand Your Ground laws have to do with Zimmerman and Martin? Absolutely nothing, of course. Outside your own home, common principles of self-defense dictate that unless you have reasonable fear of deadly force or harm, you must flee if possible rather than use deadly force. But a "duty to retreat" rests on the ability to retreat. And "duty to retreat" was irrelevant in Zimmerman's case because -- pinned to the ground with Martin on top of him, bashing his head on the concrete -- he was unable to retreat.

This didn't stop the NAACP crowd from cheering their heads off when Holder tossed out his red meat. Holder's racial-grievance-mongering agenda has also been bolstered by media propaganda outlets, who've been dutifully bashing Stand Your Ground regardless of the facts.

The New York Times, for example, falsely claimed in an editorial preceding Holder's speech that the jury "reached its verdict after having been asked to consider Mr. Zimmerman's actions in light of the now-notorious Stand Your Ground provision in Florida's self-defense law." Rolling Stone made a similarly inflammatory claim, calling Martin a "victim of Florida's Stand Your Ground law."

All nonsense. The jury received standard instructions. Zimmerman did not invoke the Stand Your Ground provision. Zimmerman later waived his right to a pretrial immunity hearing under the Stand Your Ground procedures.

And as National Review's Sterling Beard points out, "The only time Stand Your Ground came up during the trial proper was when a prosecution witness stated that he'd taught a class Zimmerman had attended that covered Stand Your Ground."

Even the prosecution rejects the cynical attempt to tie Martin's death to Stand Your Ground. Prosecutor John Guy couldn't have made it clearer during the trial: "This case is not about standing your ground." During their post-trial press conference, as conservative talk show host Victoria Taft first noted, a Miami Herald reporter asked the prosecution team specifically whether Stand Your Ground "affected the facts in this case

and whether this case could have been won, perhaps, pre the changes in the law."

Prosecutor Bernie De La Rionda replied: "You know, self-defense has existed for a long time. And we've dealt with it in Jackson for a long time. We've tried a lot of self-defense cases; I've personally tried 10-15 self-defense cases. They're tough cases, but we accept it so ... the law really hasn't changed all that much. Stand Your Ground was a big thing, but really the law hasn't changed. We have a right to bear arms and a right to self-defense."

In short, Stand Your Ground did not kill Trayvon Martin. Stand Your Ground did not sway the jury. Stand Your Ground saboteurs don't have a leg to stand on. Columnist Jacob Sullum observed drily: "You might think that, given all we now know about Zimmerman's actual defense, critics of 'stand your ground' laws would have to find a different, more apposite case to illustrate their concerns. Instead they just barrel along, citing the same phony example again and again, without regard to the facts. It does not inspire confidence in their argument."

Nope, it inspires exasperation and contempt. Once again, Eric Holder's Department of Selective and Social Justice is grasping for straws. Holder now vows to "continue to fight for removal of Stand Your Ground laws" that had nothing to do with the Zimmerman trial. He promises to ban "racial profiling" in the aftermath of a local crime incident that -- according to Holder's own FBI employees -- had nothing to do with race.

This is all a transparent pretext, of course, for undermining a plethora of state laws enacted by pro-Second Amendment legislatures. (Never mind that eight of 15 states that adopted Stand Your Ground legislation were helmed by Democratic governors at the time of passage.) Even more insidiously, left-wing groups have exploited the Martin case to launch broader attacks on the political speech and activities of limited-government groups like the American Legislative Exchange Council, which supported Stand Your Ground.

The Obama administration's cynical campaign against Stand Your Ground laws is a racially charged weapon of mass distraction. The goal isn't public safety or community harmony. The goal is for conservative political opponents to Surrender Your Ground. Silence, as always, is complicity. Political self-defense, as with physical self-defense, begins with self-assertion.

Don't wait till disaster strikes - start your PC Backup now!

start your PC Backup now!

Backing up your computer data is not a new concept in the business world, but has been overlooked by many home users. Over the years a number of clients have called in a panic, saying "Help! My computer seems to be dying and I do not have a current backup in place. What do I do now?" Once you are at this point, the next step depends on the condition of the hard drive in your computer. For those of you who do not know what the hard drive is, it is usually the C Drive which is the main drive that houses all programs and data installed and stored in your computer. Data that you saved to the hard drive may be important items you want or need to keep, such as your pictures, music, documents or banking or accounting data. Once a drive dies it can be very costly to send off the drive to the hard drive manufacturer to see if they can get a copy of your data off the dead drive. And, even if you do recognize that your hard drive may in fact be dying, there is no guarantee that all or any of your data can be saved. So the condition of the drive is important if you need your data. And since we can't predict when a drive might go bad, "IT'S BETTER TO BE SAFE THAN SORRY!" and you should backup your data while you can, just in case.

Backing up your data is SIMPLE to set up! Today we have several choices of what to store your data on, CDs, DVDs, flash drives or an external hard drive. Since CDs and DVDs can easily become physically damaged, they are not the preferred way of backing up your data; however, if it's all you have, something is better than nothing, and you can always upgrade later. Another way to securely store your data is to send a copy to a flash drive or memory stick. This could be an option to consider when you do not have a large amount of data and it would mainly be used for single backups.

One of the most recommended ways of doing your own backup is to copy your data to an external Hard Drive. External hard drives, such as the Toshiba Portable Hard Drive, which we carry, come with the software to set up and perform an initial complete back up of your hard drive,

and then the program will allow you to schedule the frequency and even day and time you would like the backup to reoccur, on an ongoing basis. Once you have a complete back up, the subsequent backups will capture any changed data, which it will overwrite on to the external hard drive, saving the most recent changes.


Once you decide to set up the backup yourself, remember you do not need to back up the Windows files, just your personal data such as your documents, pictures, favorites, etc. If you are currently using Windows XP Home Edition you must first install the backup program from the Installation CD. Windows XP Pro does not require this installation in order to perform the backup. Once the installation is complete then you can start your backup by clicking "Start," then going to "Programs," and then selecting "Accessories." Once you are in the Accessories folder, you should select "System Tools" then click "Backup." Once you are in the backup-options window you can select which folders and files you would like to back up.

If you have Windows 7, you Click on the Start Button, then "All Programs," "Maintenance" and then click on "Backup and Restore." You will then see a Backup section, and then the Restore section below it. In the Backup section (to the right) you will see and click a blue hot link that says "set up backup."


Windows Vista Home Premium actually does not offer a scheduled back up but you can still perform a backup using the same steps at the Windows 7.

If you would prefer not to do it yourself, there are other options, such as Cloud-based backup programs like Carbonite or Google Cloud. However, be sure you familiarize yourself with how to obtain a copy of your data, should you need it. For those of us who prefer someone to take care of it, and be able to give you a copy back when you need or ask for it, you may wish to contact a local computer company, such as ours, who offer both on and off site backup services. 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Why There's a Backlash against Common Core

Decisions about standards should be made at the state and local level.

The federal government has spent billions to move Common Core forward, and it has put billions more on the line. Unfortunately, parents, teachers, tea-party activists, and governors have every reason to believe Common Core represents major, unprecedented federal intervention into education.

In a speech to the National Governor's Association in 2010, President Obama stated: "I want to commend all of you for acting collectively through the National Governors Association to develop common standards that will better position our students for success. And today, I'm announcing steps to encourage and support all states to transition to college and career-ready standards on behalf of America's students. First, as a condition of receiving access to Title I funds, we will ask all states to put in place a plan to adopt and certify standards that are college and career-ready in reading and math."

In addition to the rhetorical support, Education Secretary Arne Duncan famously chastised South Carolinians for even considering withdrawing, calling the Palmetto State's concerns "a conspiracy theory in search of a conspiracy."

Washington is financing the two national testing consortia that are creating the Common Core assessments. Lawmakers have tied \$4.35 billion in Race to the Top grants to the adoption of standards similar to those found in a significant number of states, and they've made the adoption of Common Core a major factor in securing a No Child Left Behind waiver. And now, they have established a technical-review panel to work with the testing consortia on item design and validation.

For an undertaking that claims to be largely free of federal involvement, Common Core has quite a few federal fingerprints on it.

Concerns about nationalizing the content taught in every public school in America aren't limited to "tea-party activists," as Kathleen Porter-Magee and Sol Stern implied on NRO last week. Nor should the concerns of the Tea Party be dismissed. They express the understandable fear of many moms and dads and teachers that the federal government is on the brink of dictating the content taught in every school. Their concerns are echoed by a wide array of groups and citizens, including academics, members of state boards of education, residents of local school districts, and analysts at public-policy foundations.

Their sentiments mirror the concerns of the governors who have opposed Common Core national standards from the beginning. "I don't want to have a federal bureaucracy monitoring whether or not we are having the right programs in our schools," said Virginia governor Bob McDonnell recently. "The bottom line is, we don't need the federal government with the Common Core telling us how to run our schools in Virginia. We'll use our own system, which is very good. It's empirically tested."

Texas governor Rick Perry, never one to mince words, said, "The academic standards of Texas are not for sale." A bill introduced by the chair of the Senate Education Committee in Alabama to reverse the state's Common Core adoption failed by just one vote in committee last

month. Common Core opponents have vowed to keep fighting. Colorado recently held hearings taking a second look at Common Core adoption. "It's a discussion that had never occurred but needed to occur," said Bob Schaffer, former chairman of the state board of education.

Concerns about Common Core national standards have been voiced — repeatedly and often — by experts in mathematics and English.

"They may be higher than some state standards, but they are certainly lower than the best of them," wrote Ze'ev Wurman of the mathematics standards. Wurman is a former member of the California State Mathematics Curriculum Framework and Criteria Committee, and a former U.S. Department of Education official.

In testimony before the Texas legislature in May 2011, Stanford professor emeritus of mathematics James Milgram described the Common Core standards as "in large measure a political document that, in spite of a number of real strengths, is written at a very low level and does not adequately reflect our current understanding of why the math programs in the high achieving countries give dramatically better results."

Milgram — who sat on the Common Core mathematics validation committee and was the only mathematics content expert — refused to sign off on the standards. Porter-Magee and Stern claimed on NRO last week that Common Core gives "essential math skills" a "high priority" and that its "math standards . . . coherently build on one another over time." Milgram clearly disagrees.

University of Arkansas professor Sandra Stotsky developed Massachusetts's widely praised English Language Arts standards. "The fatal flaws in the Common Core English Language Arts (ELA) standards went unnoticed because over 45 state boards of education and/or their governors hastily adopted the standards in 2010, in some cases long before they were written or finalized," she wrote in an issue brief for the Heritage Foundation.

Like Milgram, Stotsky was a member of the Common Core validation committee. She likewise refused to sign off on the English Language Arts standards. "By reducing literary study," she said, "Common Core decreases students' opportunity to develop the analytical thinking once developed in just an elite group by the vocabulary, structure, style, ambiguity, point of view, figurative language, and irony in classic literary texts."

The Common Core standards "simply delineate what children should know at each grade level and describe the skills that they must acquire to stay on course toward college and career," Porter-Magee and Stern wrote. "They are not a curriculum; it's up to the school districts to choose curricula that comply with the standards."

But when the decision was made about "delineat[ing] what children should know at each grade level," parents were far removed from the discussion. And if Common Core national standards are implemented, parents will have to take any concerns they have to the federal Department of Education.

Those who are closest to the child, not national organizations or bureaucrats in Washington, are best equipped to improve educational outcomes. Decisions about standards and assessments should be made at the state level, or better still, at the local level, where parents, teachers, and business leaders, who understand the skills students need for success at work, can provide real input.

Thankfully, it's not too late to reverse course. Efforts in the 1990s to nationalize curricula, despite significant momentum, were ultimately rejected by governors. States and local school districts understood that Washington was overstepping its bounds to an unprecedented extent and chose instead to retain their educational sovereignty.

It's time once again to stand up for educational freedom, and reject this latest — and perhaps greatest — overreach.



Tarpon & Bonefish Catch-and-Release Only Sept. 1

The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) approved a proposal to make tarpon and bonefish catch-and-release-only fisheries and moved forward with a proposal to modify the types of gear used to target tarpon in Boca Grande Pass.

This catch-and-release proposal was adopted in recognition of the fact that the economic and fishing value of bonefish and tarpon greatly exceed their value as food fishes.

The following changes will go into effect Sept. 1 in state and federal waters off Florida:

- All harvest of tarpon will be eliminated, with the exception of the harvest or possession of a single tarpon when in pursuit of an IGFA record and in conjunction with a tarpon tag.
- Tarpon tags will be limited to one per person, per year (except for charter boat captains).
- Transport or shipment of tarpon becomes limited to one fish per person.
- One fish per vessel limit is created for tarpon.
- Gear used for tarpon will be limited to hook-and-line only.
- People will be allowed to temporarily possess a tarpon for photography, measurement of length and girth and scientific sampling, with the stipulation that tarpon more than 40 inches must remain in the water.
- Tarpon regulations will extend into federal waters.
- The bonefish tournament exemption

permit is eliminated. This exemption allows tournament anglers with the proper permit to temporarily possess bonefish for transport to a tournament sale.

The Commission also approved modifying the tarpon tag program by eliminating the current reporting requirements and shifting the start and end date for when the tarpon tag is valid from July through June to a calendar year, January through December. These rules will be changed in FWC code and will go into effect Sept. 1.

The Commission also moved forward with a two-part proposal that would include adding language to the current statewide snagging definition and modifying what types of gear could be used to target tarpon in Boca Grande Pass. The proposal would add language that prohibits catching or attempting to catch tarpon that have not been attracted or enticed by the angler's gear to the snagging definition that applies statewide. This change would apply to tarpon fishing statewide. The second part of the proposal would prohibit fishing with gear that has a weight attached to the bottom of a hook. This change would apply to fishing for all species year-round within Boca Grande Pass.

This proposal will be brought back for a final public hearing at the Sept. 4-6 meeting in Pensacola.

Tips to Avoid Being Food to the Mosquitoes from Levy County Mosquito Control

With all the recent rain, mosquitoes are going to be hatching out and we all need to remember a few tips to avoid being bitten.

The five D's are:

Dusk & Dawn – are when mosquitoes are most active so you should avoid being outside at those times. And if you must be outdoors then--

Dress – so your skin is covered with clothing. Wear shoes, socks, long pants, and a long sleeved shirt.

Drain – any empty containers and stagnant water so mosquito wrigglers can't grow up to become biters.

Deet – mosquito repellent is best to protect bare skin and clothing. It is important to remember that DEET is not recommended for children younger than two months old. Instead, avoid exposing your baby to mosquitoes.

Levy County is the home for 40 known species of mosquitoes. They are as different in their feeding and breeding habits as humans are different in their lifestyles.

All mosquitoes must have water to develop. Most prefer slow-moving or stagnant water in which to lay their eggs.

One tablespoon of water will breed over 200 mosquitoes. During warm weather, mosquitoes can complete their life cycle in four days.

While there are dozens of mosquito control devices on the market today, the most effective method is to destroy mosquito breeding places. This means getting rid of any standing water conditions around your home.

Practice good "mosquito hygiene" around your home.

- Check clogged gutters and flat roofs that may have poor drainage.
- Remove standing water in old tires, buckets, drums, toys, or other containers
- Cover barrels and trash containers tightly with a lid or 16-mesh screen
- Empty plastic wading pools at least once a week. Store them indoors when not using.
- Change the water in bird baths, pet's water bowls and plant pots or drip trays at least once each week.
- Store boats covered or upside down.

- Level the ground around your home so water can run off.

- Fill in holes or depressions near your home that collect water.

- Fill in tree holes and hollow stumps that hold water with sand or mortar.
- Stock your ornamental water garden with mosquito eating fish (e.g., minnows, guppies, goldfish or guppies).
- Repair screening on windows, doors, porches and patios.

The Department will issue the permit with the attached conditions unless a timely petition for an administrative hearing is filed under Sections 120.569 and 120.57, Florida Statutes, within fourteen days of receipt of notice. The procedures for petitioning for a hearing are set forth below.

A person whose substantial interests are affected by the Department's proposed permitting decision may petition for an administrative proceeding (hearing) under Sections 120.569 and 120.57, Florida Statutes. The petition must contain the information set forth below and must be filed (received by the Clerk) in the Office of General Counsel of the Department at 3900 Commonwealth Boulevard, Mail Station 35, Tallahassee, Florida 32399-3000.

Under Rule 62-110.106(4), Florida Administrative Code, a person may request an extension of the time for filing a petition for an administrative hearing. The request must be filed (received by the Clerk) in the Office of General Counsel before the end of the time period for filing a petition for an administrative hearing.

Petitions filed by any persons other than those entitled to written notice under Section 120.60(3), Florida Statutes, must be filed within

fourteen days of publication of the notice or within fourteen days of receipt of the written notice, whichever occurs first. Section 120.60(3), Florida Statutes, however, also allows that any person who has asked the Department for notice of agency action may file a petition within fourteen days of receipt of such notice, regardless of the date of publication.

The petitioner shall mail a copy of the petition to the applicant at the address indicated above at the time of filing. The failure of any person to file a petition or request for an extension of time within fourteen days of receipt of notice shall constitute a waiver of that person's right to request an administrative determination (hearing) under Sections 120.569 and 120.57, Florida Statutes. Any subsequent intervention (in a proceeding initiated by another party) will be only at the discretion of the presiding officer upon the filing of a motion in compliance with Rule 28-106.205, Florida Administrative Code.

A petition that disputes the material facts on which the Department's action is based must contain the following information, as indicated in Rule 28-106.201, Florida Administrative Code:

- (a). The name and address of each agency affected and each agency's file or identification number, if known;
- (b). The name, address, and telephone number of the petitioner; the name, address, and telephone number of the petitioner's representative, if any, which shall be the address for service purposes during the course of the proceeding; and an explanation of how the petitioner's substantial interests will be affected by the determination;
- (c). A statement of when and how the petitioner received notice of the Department's decision;
- (d). A statement of all disputed issues of material fact. If there are none, the petition must so indicate;
- (e). A concise statement of the ultimate facts alleged, including the specific facts the petitioner contends warrant reversal or modification of the Department's proposed action;
- (f). A statement of the specific rules or statutes the petitioner contends require reversal or modification of the Department's proposed action; and
- (g). A statement of the re-

fact sought by the petitioner, stating precisely the action petitioner wishes the Department to take with respect to the Department's proposed action.

Because the administrative hearing process is designed to formulate final agency action, the filing of a petition means that the Department's final action may be different from the position taken by it in this notice. Persons whose substantial interests will be affected by any such final decision of the Department have the right to petition to become a party to the proceeding, in accordance with the requirements set forth above.

In addition to requesting an administrative hearing, any petitioner may elect to pursue mediation. The election may be accomplished by filing with the Department a mediation agreement with all parties to the proceeding (i.e., the applicant, the Department, and any person who has filed a timely and sufficient petition for a hearing). The agreement must contain all the information required by Rule 28-106.404, Florida Administrative Code. The agreement must be received by the Clerk in the Office of General Counsel of the Department at 3900 Commonwealth Boulevard, Mail Station 35, Tallahassee, Florida 32399-3000, within ten days after the deadline for filing a petition, as set forth above. Choosing mediation will not adversely af-

fect the right to a hearing if mediation does not result in a settlement.

As provided in Section 120.573, Florida Statutes, the timely agreement of all parties to mediate will toll the time limitations imposed by Sections 120.569 and 120.57, Florida Statutes, for holding an administrative hearing and issuing a final order. Unless otherwise agreed by the parties, the mediation must be concluded within sixty days of the execution of the agreement. If mediation results in settlement of the administrative dispute, the Department must enter a final order incorporating the agreement of the parties. Persons seeking to protect their substantial interests that would be affected by such a modified final decision must file their petitions within fourteen days of receipt of this notice, or they shall be deemed to have waived their right to a proceeding under Sections 120.569 and 120.57, Florida Statutes. 


Moral of the Story: Thank the Lord and Homerlite!

BEEF STUFFED GREEN PEPPERS

6 medium green peppers
1 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon pepper
1 Tablespoon Worcestershire sauce
2 cups cooked rice
1 teaspoon chili powder
1 teaspoon basil
1 teaspoon oregano
1 egg, beaten
1 can (16 oz) stewed tomatoes
1/4 cup chopped onion
1 1/2 lb. ground chuck, browned
1/2 cup shredded cheddar cheese, or your cheese of choice

Preheat oven to 375* degrees.
Cut each pepper in half and remove the seeds and membrane. Bring a pan of water to boil making sure water covers peppers. Place peppers in boiling water for 3 minutes. Remove the peppers from pot and place open side up on paper towel. Lightly sprinkle salt on peppers. Let peppers sit for 3 minutes then turn them over on paper towel to allow for drying.
Combine salt, pepper, Worcestershire sauce, rice, chili powder, basil, oregano, egg, 1/2 of can of tomatoes, onion and ground beef. Stir lightly to mix.
Pack each pepper with this mixture. Place peppers in ovenproof pan ensuring that peppers fit snugly. Pour remaining tomatoes over the filled peppers. Bake at 375* degrees for 15 minutes. Remove pan and sprinkle peppers with cheese. Return to oven for 1-2 minutes or until cheese melts.

2/3 cup (5 fluid ounce can) evaporated milk
2 Tablespoons cornstarch
4 Tablespoons orange juice - divided use
1 pkg. (8 oz.) Cream Cheese, softened to room temperature
1 1/4 cup powdered sugar
1 tub (8 oz.) whipped topping, thawed

Preheat oven to 350°F. Grease two 8 or 9-inch round cake pans.
Beat cake mix, 1 1/2 cups pumpkin pie mix, eggs and oil in large mixer bowl for 2 minutes. Spoon into prepared pans. Bake for 25 to 30 minutes or until wooden pick inserted in center of cakes comes out clean. Cool in pans on wire racks for 10 minutes; remove to wire racks to cool completely.
Meanwhile, whisk together evaporated milk and cornstarch in medium, heavy-duty saucepan. Stir in remaining pumpkin pie mix and 1 tablespoon orange juice. Heat to boiling over medium heat, stirring constantly. Boil for 1 minute or until thickened; remove from heat. Remove 1/4 cup of torte mixture in separate dish. Cover; cool to room temperature.
Combine 1/4 cup light corn syrup and the remaining 3 tablespoons orange juice. Heat in microwave until syrup thins and mixture can be stirred (approx. 13-15 secs.) Poke holes in the cakes with a toothpick. Dribble the orange/syrup mixture over the tops of cakes. Let cake sit, covered until ready to continue.
Beat the cream cheese until creamy. Add the powdered sugar and continue beating. Add the reserved 1/4 cup torte mixture. Fold in the whipped topping.
Cut cake layers in half horizontally. Begin by spreading about 1/4 of the torte mixture on first layer filling between layers. Next spread 1/4 of the cream cheese mixture. Do the same with each layer. At the top, spread remaining torte mixture and pipe the remaining cream cheese mixture as decoration. Store in refrigerator until ready to serve.

PUMPKIN CREAM TORTE

1 (18.25-ounce) package yellow cake mix
1 (30-ounce) can pumpkin pie MIX - divided use (NOT Pure Pumpkin Puree!!)
3 large eggs
1/4 cup vegetable oil

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
