

Bronson Returns Two Incumbents to City Council

Bronson voters elected two veterans to the town council Tuesday when Aaron Edmundson and Beatrice Roberts easily won another term. Bruce Greenlee won without opposition.

The canvassing board headed by County Judge Tim Browning threw out two absentee ballots when the signatures did not appear to match the signature on record at the elections office. Results will be unofficial until Thursday when the canvassing board meets once again to audit the election results.


In the Seat 1, Edmundson defeated Paul T. Phillips 137 to 112. In the race for Seat 3, Roberts received 148 votes compared to 59 for former mayor Jamie Griffin, 27 for Sandra Mosley and 15 for Jason Kennedy. Greenlee won Seat 5 without opposition.

Edmundson, a pastor who oversees two Elohim Tabernacle of Praise Churches in Bronson and Chiefland, and Roberts, who works at the Bronson Post Office, were first elected 12 years ago. Both said their priorities include expanding the city's sewer system and improving the Bronson Sports Complex through grants.

"We're fixin' to move forward," Edmundson said.

Greenlee, who serves as the road department administrative

It has been a bit of a journey the last few years but step by step the Levy County Journal has fought to bring the news, minutes, legal notices, history and conservative viewpoint to our readers. As a paper of record in which we record events of Levy County in print we present 'happenings' with a little different approach when publishing such things as the minutes of local government meetings. But now, we will be presenting them also from the immediate perspective of an experienced eye on local politics, Terry Witt.

A few years back Terry Witt was the senior reporter for the Journal but we were hit hard by a bad economy and what we consider an inconsiderate and unwarranted decision to take the publishing of the delinquent tax list from the previously exclusive publishing in the Journal and 'share' it with others who never had published it. Since the early 1900s the Levy County Journal has been the paper for ALL of Levy County and the publisher of all things not so exciting such as legal notices, minutes and items of record. With that historical approach of one source availability the readers in the county could all count on the fact that one paper carried all things legal and they did not have to hunt up each year as to where the delinquent tax list was. They knew where it was - The Levy County Journal.

And with the delinquent tax list comes a once a year payment from the state to publish the list for three weeks. That payment made the difference in whether someone worked here or not. So when the decision to change the publishing from its past historical reputation in the Journal was made it changed the course for the Journal and a bad economy did not help. It is kind of like telling McDonalds or Tractor Supply or Ace Hardware that

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Chiefland in Early Talks about a City Fire Assessment

Years of intense debate about how much money the Levy County Commission should pay Chiefland to fight fires outside its city limits gave rise Monday night to the possibility of a first ever city fire assessment.

While the assessment remains in the discussion stages, commissioners agreed to a request by City Manager Kevin Gay to meet one-on-one with attorney Mark Lawson about the potential of hiring Lawson to draft a Chiefland Fire Assessment.

Commissioners Betty Walker and Chris Jones, who were sworn into office at the meeting, were reluctant to pay Lawson a \$20,000 retainer and additional "reasonable expenses" considering the city's tight budget, but Gay said it would cost nothing for commissioners to meet individually with Lawson to get some background on the proposal.

Chiefland funds its city fire services with \$231,655 of municipal property taxes. It will receive \$204,754 of county fire tax funding through the Levy County Commission's fire assessment in the 2013-14 city budget. The county money is used to fight fires outside the Chiefland city limits in the District 7 fire district.

From the city's perspective, the county commission has not provided enough funds to fight fires outside the city limits on mutual aid calls. Fire Chief James Harris said his department often leaves the city unprotected when its firefighters respond to rural fire calls outside District 7, leaving no one at the city fire station to respond to city fires.

Chiefland City Commissioner Teresa Barron and Harris asked county commissioners last week for additional money to fund a firefighting-position that was lost last year when the county realigned fire districts and gave the firefighting funds and responsibilities for fires outside Otter Creek to the Levy County Fire Department. Those funds had previously gone to Chiefland. They asked for \$35,000 of additional funds from the county commission, but were given \$4,000 plus a one-time allocation of \$12,262 for equipment and supplies.

Chiefland City Attorney Norm Fugate said the city does not want to face the legal consequences of failing to respond to mutual aid calls in rural areas around Chiefland, but at the same time, he believes both the county and Chiefland should be operating in good faith when it comes to county fire funding issues. 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Chiefland Gives Tentative Approval to City Tax Hike

Raising property taxes in Chiefland is never an easy decision for city commissioners, but board members on Monday tentatively approved an increase of more than a mill-and-a-half to balance the city's proposed 2013-14 budget.

Commissioners raised the old rate from 4.7500 mills to 6.723 mills to generate additional property tax revenue. The city has been using reserve funds during the economic recession to avoid raising the millage, but the existing cash reserves were depleted.

The board also raised water and sewer rates.

The millage rate increase is expected to hit businesses hardest, since businesses cannot claim the same exemptions as homeowners. Chiefland businesses pay the lion's share of city property taxes.

Chiefland's financial condition remains stable. The new city budget, which takes effect Oct. 1, will have \$329,909 in reserve funds scattered around the various departments.

Mayor Teal Pomeroy said the city will be out of debt by the end of next year. Recently elected Commissioner Betty Walker commended commissioners on making tough budget cuts to balance the budget. She took office Monday and has not been part of the budget process.

The final city budget hearing is set for 6 p.m. on Sept. 23. The budget will be adopted at that hearing.

Health insurance and state retirement contributions have risen significantly, forcing the city to find additional revenues. Executive and regular salaries were down from last year due in part to the retirement of former City Manager Grady Hartzog and the loss of one city job.

The total city budget for next year is about

\$4.7 million, including the general operating fund, water and sewer, fire and police and the industrial park.

In other city business, commissioners instructed staff to advertise for bids for contractors who could harvest 30 acres of pine timber on the city's well field site north of Chiefland. The estimated value of the timber is \$39,141.

The city is searching for a maintenance worker to fill the position created when a member of the maintenance crew was promoted to inmate supervisor.

John Ruggles, who developed Chiefland Regional Shopping Center, donated four concrete benches to the city that had been used at the shopping center. He is installing new benches. The city has placed the donated benches at the train depot park.

Chiefland City Manager Upset by Hospital Official's Comments

An official with Ameris Health Care notified a Chiefland city commissioner last week by letter that the company may try to secure a new certificate of need (CON) in 2014, but Franklin Schupp's comments later in the letter upset the Chiefland city manager.

Schupp wrote to Commissioner Betty Walker and thanked her and Mayor Teal Pomeroy as well as the entire city commission for supporting the hospital project, but his statement about City

Manager Kevin Gay wasn't well received by Gay.

The Ameris official quoted Gay as making a statement in a Chamber of Commerce meeting that a handful of Chiefland community members had donated \$10,000 for Gay to get a certificate of need, but there is now some question "as to the money was spent for nothing."

Schupp, quoting from an Aug. 29 Chiefland newspaper story, quoted Gay as saying "We in Chiefland would like to know what they did with the money that was donated for the hospital. Shouldn't it go back to who gave it,

since we're not getting what it was meant for?"

Walker read the letter at Monday's city commission meeting at the request of Schupp, who wasn't present.

Gay said he made no such statement.

"I'm not going to put up with that," Gay said. "I'll call him a liar to his face."

Gay said he knows nothing about the hospital money Schupp referred to in his letter.

In the letter, Schupp said Ameris has invested \$3.7 million since the hospital project was first conceived.

Levy County investigators responded to the Emergency Room at a Marion County Hospital on Sunday, September 1 after it was reported that a Citra resident arrived at the ER in a personal vehicle and checked himself in for treatment for a gunshot wound. When investigators arrived they spoke with the gunshot victim, Michael Sumpter, 31, of Citra, who said he was at a party on NE 212 Court in East Williston when he got into an argument with another male, James Wilkerson, 36, also of Citra. Wilkerson was armed with a small handgun and during the argument fired one shot striking Sumpter in the left foot. Investigators secured an arrest warrant for Wilkerson late Sunday afternoon. Wilkerson was later located in Alachua County early Thursday morning, September 5, and taken into custody without incident. It was the FRFTF (Florida Regional Fugitive Task Force) comprised of agents from the United States Marshals Service and local Law Enforcement that located Wilkerson.

Wilkerson was transferred to the Levy County Detention Facility and held on a \$200,000 bond.

No Seatbelt Allows Fatal Injuries to Speeding Driver in Dixie County Accident

FHP reported that Forlepay Lee Jenkins, 49, of Cross City, was speeding in his 2011 Chevy Impala LT and died early Thursday morning at 1 a.m. when he crashed the vehicle on CR 351, 10 miles north of Cross City. Jenkins was reported by the Florida Highway Patrol as traveling south on CR 351 at approximately 81 mph in a posted 45 mph zone when he drove right through a left curve in the road and then overcompensated, veering off the road and over a private driveway. Jenkins travelled for 114 feet and overturned to go another 116 feet before stopping. Jenkins did not have a seatbelt on and showed evidence of being tossed around within the interior of the vehicle sustaining critically fatal injuries.

Regional LEO Cooperation Nets Arrest of Branford Man for Possession of Child Porn

The Florida Department of Law Enforcement Tallahassee Regional Operations Center Cyber Crime Unit, with assistance from the Lafayette County Sheriff's Office, arrested Jose Socoy, 27, of Branford for 10 counts of possession of child pornography. After receiving a tip from a detective in Alachua County, a search warrant was conducted on September 5 at Socoy's home at 1343 NE Mandarin Road, Branford, Fla., revealing at least 11 videos of child pornography depicting children under the age of 18 engaged in sexual conduct. The videos were on a computer located at the residence. After being read his Miranda Rights in Spanish, Socoy admitted to downloading the videos of child pornography. Socoy was booked into the Lafayette County Jail and will be prosecuted by the Office of the State Attorney, 3rd Judicial Circuit. Fatal Accident Takes Life of Young Bronson Woman

Cacie Leigh Morgan, 23, of Bronson, was driving a 2007 Ford Focus east on NE 30 Street in Levy County at a high rate of speed. According to the Florida Highway Patrol when Morgan came to the intersection at CR 103 and NE 30 Street she failed to stop for the stop sign there. This intersection is a dog-leg turn to the south and after applying the brakes Morgan skidded onto the east grassy shoulder on CR 103. The front end of the Ford Fusion collided with a warning sign and two large fence posts which caused the vehicle to go airborne colliding with several more smaller fence posts before landing and overturning. Morgan was ejected from the vehicle as she did not have a seatbelt on and came to rest east of the vehicle. The Ford Fusion stopped in an upright position 122 feet east of the initial collision. Morgan was pronounced deceased by Paramedic Cribbs at 11:35 PM and the vehicle towed by Bronson Lube.

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A History of Levy County

Excerpts

Published by the Levy County Archives Committee
Sponsored by the Levy County Board of Commissioners
Bronson, Florida

Excerpts are from the records of the Levy County Commission, called minutes. Although the county was organized in 1845, the minutes of the first five years are lost, probably destroyed in the Civil War burn-out at Levyville. The book of minutes started in 1850 was still in use during the Civil War and survived, probably because it was not at the Courthouse, but at the Clerk's residence. This book was found by Norwood Ishie in 1958. Ernest Stephens, Circuit Clerk at the time, had it rebound and carefully preserved.

These are not the entire records.

Point of understanding: for some years, the Commission was also known as the Probate Court and the Commission Chairman was called the Probate Judge. These titles were used concurrently until the Probate Court designation gradually disappeared.

Levy County began its existence in 1845 with Thomas E. Barrow as Probate Judge. He was followed by J. B. Blanton, Hezekiah E. O'Steen, and Simeon Harvey. Starting in 1850, here are the minutes:

Minutes of County Commissioners of Levy County, Book A
April 1850 - December 1878
By Jean Cooper

The minutes of the first session of the Board of Levy County Commissioners available to us make it clear this was not the first meeting of that body. Because we found the wording of the records so different from the wording of today's minutes of that board, we thought it might be interesting to you to quote the entire entry for the first meeting we have record of. It reads thus:

"Order book of the court of County Commissioners of Levy County, Florida. 1st session, 5th April 1850.

1st the board of County Commissioners in pursuance of an act of the general assembly, met in session at the house of P. H. Davis for the purpose of examining the state tax book, and it was found correct with the exception of four cents in favor of the state.

John R. Hatcher Pres-t of the Board of C.C.

2nd moved and ordered by the court that Robert Watterson collect 25 pct. On the state tax to raise a fund to defray the Expenses of the County of Levy.

John R. Hatcher Pres-t of this Board of C.C.

3rd ordered by the court that there be an order given to Robert Watterson to call on

George H. Tresper to pay over him as County treasurer Six dollars and 02 cents remaining in his hands of the County funds last year.

John R. Hatcher Pres-t of the Board of C.Com.

4th ordered by the court that there be a public road cut the most direct way from fort fanning to Mary V. Andrews' plantation and that the said Thomas E. Barrow be one of said commissioners of said road or roads in the County to act with A. Mooney and P.H. Davis, road Commissioners of said County.

John R. Hatcher Pres-t of the Board of Com.

5th The Court held by Joseph Wilkerson, James C. Barco, Isaac Highsmith and John R. Hatcher, who they elected as president of said board do vote themselves \$2.00 per day for their services on the 5th day April 1856.

John R. Hatcher Pres-t of the Board"

The above entry appears on the first page of Book A, Minutes of the County Commission, Levy County. This page, along with several others had been carefully cut from the bound book, and replaced carefully inside the front cover, where they seem to be no worse for the abuse. The script is smooth, flowing and easily read, though the entire book is yellowed with age. Discrepancies appear now and then, one of which is very noticeable in the first entry made by this Board, that is in the dates 5th of April 1850, which appears in the introduction at the beginning of the record and the closing entry "This 5th day of April, 1856." Both dates are distinctly legible so we can only surmise this may have been a copy of the original or an overlooked human error in the original. One thing is certain: subsequent entries assure the actual date was April 5, 1850.

He said nine business leaders in Chiefland had donated \$61,000 with the understanding that the money could be used only for certificate of need costs. Ameris wanted the donation as evidence of how much the hospital would mean to Chiefland. He said the money was placed in a bank account that was not under Ameris's control.

"Under no circumstances did Ameris receive any of the donated money. What Ameris has done over the course of these years - invested \$3,700,000 on this project. I hope this clarifies and puts to rest the erroneous information," Schupp wrote.

The Tri-County Hospital project lost its certificate of need earlier this year along with a state economic development grant of \$887,000 to extend water and sewer lines to the hospital.

City Financial Projects Coordinator Laurie Copeland said the city had been awarded the grant in February with the understanding Ameris had 60 days to submit documentation that it had the money to build the hospital. The documentation was never submitted.

"It is a big loss," Copeland said.

The city put a great deal of work into the grant, as did Ameris, which produced the necessary documentation to qualify for the grant, she said. Ameris will have to start from scratch to obtain the grant a second time.

Some people say that some military response is necessary, not to spare Obama a personal humiliation, but to spare the American presidency from losing all credibility -- and therefore losing the ability to deter future threats to the United States without bloodshed.

There is no question that the credibility of the presidency -- regardless of who holds that office -- is a major asset of this country. Another way of saying the same thing is that Barack Obama has recklessly risked the credibility of future presidents, and the future safety of this country, by his glib words and weak actions.

Some people who disagree with Obama's issuance of a public ultimatum to the Assad regime in the first place, and who also disagree with his recent threat of military action against Syria, nevertheless say that we must back up that threat now, simply to forestall future dangers from a loss of American credibility in the eyes of other countries, including both our enemies and our allies.

But will a transparently token military action preserve American credibility? And dare we risk an unintended escalation, such as began both World Wars in the 20th century?

Since so little real history is taught in even our prestigious colleges and universities, it may be worth noting how World War II -- the most catastrophic war in human history -- began.

When a weak and vacillating leader, Britain's Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain, belatedly saw Hitler for what he was, after years of trying to appease him, he issued a public ultimatum that if Germany carried out its impending invasion of Poland, Britain would declare war.

By this time, Hitler had only contempt for Chamberlain, as Putin today has only contempt



for Obama. Hitler went ahead with his invasion of Poland. Chamberlain then felt he had to declare war. That is how World War II began. Britain's action did not save Poland, but only jeopardized its own survival.

Unintended consequences are at least as common in military actions on the world stage as they are in domestic policies that start out with lofty words and end with sordid and even catastrophic consequences.

Assurances from either President Barack Obama or Senator John McCain as to the limited nature of the military actions they advocate mean nothing. As someone said, long ago, once the shooting starts all plans go out the window.

If a purely token military strike will do little or nothing more to preserve our national credibility than will a failure to act at all, why get people killed to spare Barack Obama a personal humiliation?

This man's runaway ego has already produced too many disasters at home and abroad, and nowhere more so than in the Middle East. A personal humiliation may be all that can make him stop and think before shooting off his mouth in the future, without thinking through the consequences beforehand -- as he clearly has not done in this case, as shown by his recent delays and vacillations.

Nor is it at all clear that his previous policies and actions in the Middle East were well thought out, unless he was deliberately trying to weaken the position of the Western world, including Israel.

Whatever the Obama rhetoric, the reality is that his policies in Egypt and Libya have led to replacing stable regimes, at peace with Israel and the West, and tolerant of their own Christian minorities, with chaotic regimes in which fanatical anti-Western terrorists have played a large and growing role, with hostility to Israel and murderous attacks on Christians in their own country.

Barack Obama will try to salvage his policy and his presidency with a speech to the nation. Rhetoric is his strong suit. The big question is: How many Americans have learned to distinguish between his soaring words and his sorry record? Matters of life and death can hinge on the answer to that question.

Letter to the Editor Eminent Domain Needed to Build Natural Gas Pipeline thru Florida

On July 26th, Florida Power and Light (FPL) announced it will build a natural gas pipeline in two (2) segments. The first leg, which is being built by Sabal Trail Transmission, LLC, will originate in southwestern Alabama and cross Florida, affecting approximately one dozen counties including Levy County. The first segment will terminate at a new hub in Central Florida just south of Orlando. The second segment, which will be built by Florida Southeast Connection, LLC, will start at the Central Florida hub and connect to an existing FPL utility plant in Martin County. FPL has requested that the project begin to deliver natural gas by a May 2017 in-service date. This would require the acquisition of land easements well in advance of that date, which could begin as early as 2014.

FPL, Sabal Trail and Florida Southeast Connection, which are subsidiaries of NextEra Energy Capital Holdings, Inc., are multi-billion dollar entities that possess the power of eminent domain. Eminent domain allows these utility companies to condemn private property for easements. These utility

companies are represented in Florida by two law firms. These utility companies also have their own appraisers, engineers and other experts as deem necessary working on their behalf to acquire the property for the pipeline.

Property owners in Florida have certain rights when their property is taken by eminent domain to ensure they receive full compensation. Full compensation includes having the condemning authority, in this case, the utility companies, pay for the property owner's reasonable attorneys fees and expert costs. An attorney representing an owner can hire an appraiser, engineer and other experts well versed in the area of eminent domain to analyze the taking and the effect the taking may have on the property owner's remainder property including future development plans, and then advise the property owner as to an appropriate amount of compensation to seek from the condemning authority through negotiation or litigation.

Syria and Obama: Part II

Chickens are coming home to roost for Barack Obama, both at home and overseas. When he first entered the White house, to worldwide acclaim, and backed by huge majorities in both the Senate and the House of Representatives, he could do whatever he wanted -- and could do no wrong, in the eyes of the mainstream media.

People believed whatever he said, whether about how he would cut the federal deficit in half during his first term or how people could keep their current insurance and their current doctor under ObamaCare, which would also insure millions more people and yet somehow lower the costs at the same time.

If he could have done these things, it is hard to know what he could have done for an encore. Walking on water would have been an anticlimax.

Of course he did none of these things. The Obama administration added more to the national debt in his first term than President Bush had in both his terms put together. As for ObamaCare, which has not yet fully taken effect, health care costs have already gone up, and many people's hours of work have already gone down, as employers seek to escape the huge costs of ObamaCare by hiring part-time workers, who are exempt. As for foreign policy, President Obama began by betraying a pre-existing American commitment to allies in Eastern Europe, to supply them with an anti-missile defense system. These nations had risked the wrath of Russia by allying themselves with the United States, but Obama blithely talked about pressing the "reset button," as he flew off to Moscow to try to cut a deal with the Russians behind their back.

His boorish behavior toward one of our oldest and most important allies (Britain) and his insulting behavior toward the Prime Minister of our staunchest ally in the Middle East (Israel) were more of the same.

Meanwhile, Obama fawned over the rulers of other nations, bowing deeply from the waist before the king of Saudi Arabia and the emperor of Japan, in a gesture of subservience that no other President of the United States had ever stooped to. But the adoring media never asked the most obvious question: "What kind of man is this, who feels a need to lower his own country?"

President Obama was caught by a microphone that he did not know was on,

telling Russian President Medvedev to assure "Vladimir" that he could be more "flexible" with him after he was past the 2012 elections, and was no longer constrained by the American voters.

Far from getting Putin's respect, he deservedly earned Putin's contempt. When Obama's new Secretary of State, John Kerry, went to Moscow for the first time in that official capacity, Putin kept him waiting for hours before bothering to see him.

At home, when Republicans in Congress tried to suggest some changes in the ObamaCare legislation, back when it was being rushed through Congress too fast for the Congressmen to read it, Obama's response was to remind the Republicans that he had won the election.

Now these and other chickens are coming home to roost.

Today, President Obama needs Republican votes in Congress to get a majority that will put Congress on record as backing his planned military actions against Syria. And he is by no means certain to get all the Democrats' votes.

Obama also wants international political cover for his planned military action against Syria. But our old ally, Britain, failed to give us even political backing, much less troops. British Prime Minister David Cameron lost the vote on that issue in Parliament -- the first time a British Prime Minister has lost such a vote in Parliament since the 18th century.

Some other nations have given us verbal support -- and only verbal support. When it comes to actual military action, some of the Europeans will fight to the last American.

Finally, Barack Obama will try to drum up support from the American people whom he has lied to and deceived, time and time again. On Tuesday night, will he be able to rekindle the old magic again with his rhetoric? Or have those chickens come home to roost as well?

Will President Obama be able to convince the people of the urgency of what he wants to do, when he has already delayed so long that the Assad regime has had ample time to hide the chemical weapons and otherwise prepare to minimize whatever Obama does?

doesn't think the county is operating in good faith. Walker said she wants to make one last effort to meet with the county to find out whether the city and the county can come to an agreement on fire funding. Commissioners agreed to let her meet with county officials and report back on her findings. Walker said good communication could improve the city's chances of securing the needed funding, but other commissioners were doubtful she could succeed, given the city's inability to persuade the county to change its position. Despite criticism of the county, Mayor Teal Pomeroy commended the county commission on increasing the city's fire funding to \$204,754 and giving the city a one-time allocation of \$12,262 for equipment and supplies at last week's county commission meeting. But Harris said he is of the opinion that Knowles' plan is to establish county-funded fire stations throughout Levy County by gradually increasing the county fire tax. He believes the county will eventually take away the fire funding for all the county's major cities. He wants to prepare for that day by having the city adopt its own fire assessment tax. Last week, the city asked the county commission to bring back one of the ambulances that had been reassigned several years ago from Chiefland to Bronson, but the commissioners said Knowles would have to decide that issue. The city is concerned about waiting time before ambulances arrive at the scene of emergencies. The city also wanted a certificate of need to allow its firefighters to perform advanced life support procedures at the scene of emergencies using its own non-transport vehicle, but that request was denied. Local doctors supported the request and the fire department had circulated petitions signed by citizens asking for the ALS designation. County commissioners stated last week that the new medical director has not yet sent the protocol to follow for ALS. Commissioner Chad Johnson went on to remind those in attendance at the county commission meeting that we are now a very litigious society. City officials also wanted to change the way it receives quarterly payments from the county for fire taxes. As it stands now, the city has to fund three months of services before the county will reimburse the expenses. The city wanted the county to pay the money up front, but the county denied that request also. County Public Safety Director David Knowles said it is standard county business practice

to have vendors perform their duties first and receive reimbursement after providing the county with documentation. Chiefland is no exception. "The vendor does the work and submits a report, and the county reimburses them," Knowles said. Knowles said he has no plan to establish county-funded fire stations throughout the county's rural areas nor does he plan to dry up county fire funding to major cities in the county. He said the county plans to continue using cities to fight fires outside their city limits and there are no plans to change funding arrangements with Chiefland or other cities. "There are no thought process changes," Knowles said. As for Chief Harris's request for a certificate of need that would allow Chiefland to convert one of its own vehicles to an Advanced Life Support response vehicle that could attend to patients in emergencies without transporting them, Knowles said the county has two such vehicles of its own that can be moved around the county as needed. He said the county is in the process of enhancing ambulance services and is looking at ways to improve the response times of ambulances. Concerning Harris's allegation that Chiefland is sometimes unprotected while its firefighters respond to mutual aid calls outside District 7, Knowles said that mutual aid calls are a part of firefighting. He said every fire department responds to mutual aid calls to help other departments, and sometimes they respond to calls outside their boundaries. Knowles said he could not comment on the county commission's decision not to give Harris the full \$35,000 he requested last week. Knowles said the decision was made by commissioners, not by him, and each board member has his own reasons for voting the way they did. As for Harris's request to move an ambulance back to Chiefland, Knowles said he has to evaluate the entire county and the needs of the various cities and rural areas. Knowles said he has no idea why the county has so much controversy with Chiefland. He said he doesn't hear these types of complaints from other cities or fire departments. He said as far as he knows the county is operating in good faith when dealing with issues presented by Chiefland. "We address them as they arise," he said.

Hard Drive Life Expectancy
Everything has a life expectancy, even computers! Even though it seems that computers can do just about anything, lasting forever is definitely not one of them. After all they are still just machines. The best way to get the most out of your computer is to take good physical care of the hardware. By taking good care of your computer, you can ensure all the working parts continue to work properly. That's important because many of us store important information on our computers. And because it is human nature to procrastinate, we also may not back up our information as regularly as we should, which makes it all the more important to take good care of your computer. As many of you already know, the hard drive is the working part of your computer that stores your data and personal information. Hard drives have become more and more durable over the years to prevent issues. But under the right circumstances they can still become damaged and cause possible data loss. There are a few different things that can play a role in hard drive damage that most people would not consider to be a factor. Generally, laptop users encounter more hardware damage than desktop users because laptops are used on the go and desktops are stationary and less prone to bumping, jarring or getting dropped (oh nooo!). A physical bump to the laptop while it is on can definitely cause the components on the inside of the hard drive to become scratched or even damaged beyond repair. Environmental hazards can also play a role in causing damage to your hard drive, such as storing your computer in a hot or humid room. The fans can suck in the heat or moisture, which can contribute to overheating or cause rust or corrosion in the working parts. As an example of how quickly and easily damage can occur, compare this to taking a cell phone into the bathroom and setting it on the counter during a hot shower. Even with such a short time of exposure as the time it takes to shower, the water damage sticker will indicate that moisture got into the device causing damage. You can detect initial warnings of hard drive damage by noticing unusual sounds, such as strange ticking or swirling noises from the inside of your computer. Also, your computer may perform unwarranted system reboots, may freeze while trying to boot up, or give you error messages such as one indicating missing files. Some more direct alerts may come in the form of error messages that state your hard drive is damaged and may need immediate attention. Some occur during the boot up process and may say something such as "unmountable boot device" or "Operating system not found" and will not allow you to fully boot up your computer. Others can occur, such as a "Smart Error" message you might receive while using your computer. So, what can you do about hard drive damage? Remember, an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure (which in our case is repair)! If you are not experiencing this issue just yet, great! Take a moment and evaluate your computer. How old is your computer? Is it still covered under any warranty? Where do I usually use my computer? Is there a better location for it? Make sure there is plenty of air flow around it, and that the cat doesn't sleep on the air vent! If your computer is over a year old and you do not already have a backup in place, you may want to set one up at this time. Most computers come with just the one-year manufacturer warranty, although we have clients whose computer hard drives have lasted many years. However, as with "Murphy's Law" - disaster can strike at any time; it's important to do some of these preventative measures sooner, rather than later. If you start to get these error messages, you may need to bring your computer in to your local computer repair shop to check it out, especially if you don't have your data backed up. You should not wait, because a hard drive in need of repair can quickly become one in need of replacement without the necessary repairs. If you are unsure, just ask us, or your local repair shop to check out your hard drive, and let you know what's needed.



Dixie County Accident Fatal to Trenton Man

On Monday September 8 in the early afternoon Harlyn A. Pfaffenberger, 77, of Trenton, was driving a 1995 GMC SUV north on SR 55, according to a Florida Highway Patrol report. Also northbound was 56-year-old Benjamin Robert Barber Jr. of Old Town in a 1995 International Pickup. Barber was in the lead and slowed down to make a right turn into a private driveway on SE Hwy 19. Pfaffenberger failed to slow down in time to avoid hitting Barber's pickup and struck it in the rear. The collision forced Pfaffenberger's GMC off SR 55 to the grassy median where it rotated and again re-entered SR 55 and overturned finally resting on the right side. Barber was able to control his pickup to a stop on SR 55.

Mr. Pfaffenberger died as a result of the accident. Mr. Barber had serious injuries. Both men were taken to Shands at UF. Both men had their seatbelts on and there are no pending breath alcohol tests.

Haven Hospice's 'Fall at the Ranch'



a great time. It was a wonderful day for our first ride of the season. Anticipation fills the air on this gorgeous day.


The woods are thick with greenery of every kind. I'm certainly not a person who can name off a lot of the various types of plants and trees. But I know the woods here are full of huge oak trees

Florida National Guard Celebrates 448th Anniversary of 'First Muster' Sept. 13

The Florida National Guard will celebrate the 448th anniversary of the first known muster of Citizen-Soldiers in the continental U.S. at a Celebration in St. Augustine. Re-enactors from Florida Living History will be present to help tell the story of the Citizen-Soldier in Florida.

Re-enactors and Guardsmen will also participate in a ceremony to spread packets of soil collected from worldwide battlefields on the St. Francis Barracks parade field in front of the Florida National Guard headquarters on Friday, Sept. 13 at 9 a.m. at 82 Marine Street, St. Augustine.

Over the past two years the Florida National Guard has collected soil samples from battlefields around the world where the Florida National Guard - or its militia

predecessors - served and fought. These 19 different soil samples represent National Guard militia traditions dating back to the 1560s, continuing through the wars in the 19th and 20th Centuries, and ending with recent deployments to Southwest Asia.

Officer and enlisted platoons will form at 9 a.m. for the ceremony, and members of Florida Living History will demonstrate a traditional Spanish firing detail.

The "first muster" took place on Sept. 16, 1565, when Pedro Menendez de Aviles gathered around him the soldiers of his small Spanish army, as well as the civilian settlers who accompanied him to the newly established presidio town of St. Augustine. Menendez was about to march north to the French settlement of Fort Caroline near the mouth of the St. Johns River. Because his plan called for the use of the majority of his regular soldiers, Menendez drew upon Spanish laws governing the militia, or militia, in an imperial province. As both the civil governor and the commander-in-chief of the military establishment, he had the authority to call all free male settlers in the presidio province to active service.

The exact location of this "first muster" is unknown, but historians and archeologists believe it lies a few miles north of the Florida National Guard headquarters, most likely near the present site of the Fountain of Youth and the Mission of Nombre de Dios.





Four More License-Free Fishing Days Added to Florida Calendar

Governor Rick Scott and the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission announced four additional license-free fishing days.

Florida currently offers the public four license-free fishing days per year, where the requirement to have a recreational fishing license is waived for residents and visitors. Saltwater license-free fishing days this year were on June 1 and Sept. 1 and freshwater's were April 6 and June 8.

During its Sept. 5 meeting, the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) added four more license-free fishing days to the calendar, and the Florida Legislature approved this increase earlier this year.

The additional saltwater license-free fishing days will be Oct. 12 and Nov. 30 and additional freshwater license-free days will be Nov. 29 and Dec. 28.

The Commission also set dates for 2014 and beyond. All eight days will now fall on the same day of the week from year to year, allowing potential anglers to plan fishing trips in advance.

For 2014 and beyond, the following dates will be license-free fishing days:

Saltwater
First Saturday and Sunday in June
First Saturday in September
Saturday following Thanksgiving
Freshwater
First Saturday and Sunday in April
Second Saturday and Sunday in June

To make these events accessible to as many people as possible, the FWC planned these dates around holiday weekends and national events and National Fishing and Boating Week. Highlighted by significant national media coverage and public events, National Fishing and Boating Week promotes boating and fishing across the country as fun and healthy outdoor activities.



COMPANY ROAST & VEGETABLES

Round Roast (2-8 lbs.)
1 tsp kosher salt
1 tsp black pepper (coarse-ground is best)
½ tsp dried thyme
¼ tsp dried rosemary
4-6 cloves garlic, finely chopped (or use refrigerated minced garlic per jar directions)
3 Tablespoons oil
5-6 medium potatoes
5-6 carrots
3 beef bouillon cubes, melted in water
1 Tablespoon dried celery (or 2 chopped stalks)
2 onions, peeled and chopped
Water to slightly cover
Salt and pepper to taste

Mix together your seasonings and set them aside. Take out the roast, rinse it and pat dry with paper towels. Rub the seasonings all over the roast, and let it sit out on the kitchen counter for 30 minutes. This allows the roast to reach room temperature, plus it lets the seasonings settle onto the meat.

While your roast is absorbing the spices, peel and quarter the potatoes and carrots (as many to your liking). Peel and chop onions. Place the bouillon cubes in a large glass measuring cup with 1 cup water. Microwave for 3-5 minutes or until cubes are melted or softened.

Once the meat is ready to go, quickly add the oil to a skillet and seal the meat so the juices won't escape during the cooking process. Be sure to sear all sides. Place meat in slow cooker, top with vegetables, celery, and onions. Add bouillon-water mixture then more water to slightly cover. Salt and pepper as desired.

Cook on low 7-8 hours (preferred) or on high for 4 hours.

You can make gravy out of the drippings by removing meat and veggies. In a large measuring cup, put 2 cups water. Add approx. 1/4-1/3 cup flour to water while whisking quickly. Dump flour mixture into drippings and stir on high until gravy develops. If gravy is too thick, add more flour (using above method); if too thick add water, a little at a time.

ORANGE MADNESS DESSERT

Cake:
1 box Orange Supreme Cake Mix (water, vegetable oil and eggs as per box instructions)
4 cups milk
4 teaspoons grated orange peel (zest)
2 boxes vanilla instant pudding (4-serving size)
1 1/2 cup orange syrup (recipe below)
2 cans (15 oz each) mandarin orange segments, drained
1 container (8oz) frozen whipped topping, thawed

Orange Syrup:
1 cup white granulated sugar
1/2 cup orange juice frozen concentrate
1/2 cup butter
1/2 cup light corn syrup

If desired, cut up the orange pulp from the orange used for zest and add to syrup for extra bonus.
Mix together all ingredients and bring to a boil.

Heat oven to 350°F (325°F for dark or nonstick pan). Grease bottom only of 13x9-inch pan with shortening or cooking spray.

Make and bake cake mix as directed on box, using water, oil and eggs. Run knife around side of pan to loosen cake. Cool completely, about 1 hour.

Meanwhile, in large bowl, mix milk and orange peel zest. With wire whisk, beat pudding mix into milk mixture about 2 minutes or until blended and thick.

Cut cooled cake into 1-inch pieces. Arrange one-half of cake squares in 3 1/2-quart glass serving bowl. Drizzle 1/2 cup of the orange syrup over cake; spread 2 cups of the pudding over cakes. Arrange 1 can of mandarin orange segments over pudding. (Reserve 1/2 cup orange segments for garnish.) Add remaining cake pieces. Top with remaining orange syrup, remaining pudding and the whipped topping and garnish with mandarin orange segments. Cover; refrigerate at least 2 hours until chilled.

Garnish dessert with reserved orange segments. Store covered in refrigerator up to 8 hours.
