Friction Between County and Chiefland over Library Contract Dispute

Chiefland's public library is in no danger of being closed anytime soon, but that doesn't mean it couldn't happen if the county and the city fail to resolve their ongoing contract dispute.

At issue is an Aug. 21 letter from City Manager Kevin Gay requesting a revision in the contract that would allow the city to cancel its library contract with 30 days notice to the county.

The county wondered if 30 days notice meant the city was no longer serious about operating the Luther L. Callaway Public Library. They were worried the 30-day notice might

leave the county with little time to move out.

The city said closing the library was never a consideration. Gay is irritated that the county is raising the issue about the library closing.

But the controversy hasn't gone away.

The roots of the controversy started in the summer when the city commission discussed the possibility of no longer

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LCDPS Goes to the Air for Medical Emergency Transport

Levy County Department of Public Safety (LCDPS) has added a new resource to its arsenal of public safety equipment to serve the citizens and visitors of Levy County. On November 1, 2013 Air Methods began 24-hour-a-day air transport services based out of the Levy County Public Safety Complex located in Bronson, Florida. This partnership has provided the citizens and visitors in Levy County with an Emergency Medical Service aircraft based in the County that you typically would not see in a rural setting. This aircraft supports the rural counties of Levy, Dixie, and Gilchrist.

Levy County Department of Public Safety ground transport unit and crew transferred a critically ill medical patient to the awaiting helicopter for transport to North Florida Regional Medical Center. The air transport capability reduced the transport time to 18 minutes; it would have taken 42 minutes by a ground transport ambulance. This is only made possible by the quick patient assessment the First Responders provide prior to the arrival of an ambulance. The quick action and patient assessment by the First Responders allows the helicopter to begin a series of pre-flight safety checks and lift off from the Public Safety Complex arriving at a pre-designated landing zone prior to an ambulance. This sequence of events works well in the rural environment, reducing transport delays by having a helicopter waiting for the ambulance rather than waiting on scene for a helicopter.

U.S. Rep. Ted Yoho visited Chiefland last week as part of a town hall meeting with voters and took a hard line on immigration when asked whether he would support giving in-state tuition to the children born and raised by parents who live here illegally.

Yoho told Levy County school teacher Marihelen Wheeler he could not support the bad behavior of the parents by granting the children in-state tuition because they were born and raised in Florida.

He said neither Congress nor the president has had the backbone to act on legislation to secure the country's borders and prevent illegal immigration into the country.

Yoho, addressing a crowd of about 250 at Chiefland Middle School cafeteria, added that the country's laws are based on life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness "for those who are legally here".

"How many times are we going to hyphenate America," Yoho said.

Wheeler responded that "these are kids who were raised here and educated here."

Yoho responded that these are tough decisions. He likened the issue of illegal immigration to raising the debt ceiling. He said he wouldn't completely rule out in-state tuition for the American-born children of illegal immigrants. He said he would give it some thought. But he said he is inclined not to support any legislation easing restrictions on illegal

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Chiefland Commissioners Don't Want Firefighters Driving Ambulances

Acting on a request by Fire Chief James Harris, Chiefland city commissioners Tuesday instructed their attorney to write a letter to Levy County Public Safety Director David Knowles saying city firefighters will no longer drive

ambulances.

The commission also instructed Assistant City Attorney Blake Fugate, standing in for his father, City Attorney Norm Fugate, to research the legality of allowing firefighters to ride in the back of ambulances.

Harris doesn't want his firefighters riding in the back of ambulances, either.

"I'm saying this is a big legal liability," Harris said.

Deputy Fire Chief Gene Stockman said firefighters have been allowed to ride in the back of ambulances three or four times, and he doesn't want to totally rule out firefighters riding in ambulances as first responders.

Citrus County Detectives Bust Local Smoke Shops Selling Illegal Spice

After a yearlong investigation, detectives with the Citrus County Sheriff's Office Tactical Impact Unit along with agents from FDLE launched search warrants in three smoke shops which have been selling illegal synthetic cannabis (commonly known as Spice or K2). Happy Timez Tobacco Shop in Inverness, Blowin' Smoke in Hernando, and Funky Groove in Crystal River have been actively sell this drug, and previously warned and made aware of the legal ramifications if they continued to sell it.

As a result of the operation, 2,170 packages of synthetic cannabis were confiscated. The street value of these drugs ranges from \$32,500 to approximately \$42,500 when sold at regular retail price for \$15 to \$25 a package. Some of these illegal substances sell for \$35 - \$50 a package. \$10,718 was also seized from all three stores combined.

Vicki Macko, 54, owner of Blowin' Smoke in Hernando, was arrested on two counts of sale of a controlled substance. The Citrus County Sheriff's Office will continue to pursue charges on the store owners and clerks who sold the unlawful substances with knowledge that the sales were illegal. After conducting interviews arrests will follow when FDLE confirms the substances taken from the stores during the operation were truly outlawed substances.

Synthetic cannabis has been designated by the Legislature of the State of Florida, Senate Bill 294, as a Schedule I controlled substance effective December 11, 2012 and updated to include newly identified synthetic chemical substances on April 24, 2013. The Citrus County Sheriff's Office is working on a county ordinance to "outlaw" the sales of these chemicals in

Citrus County. Several surrounding counties have had success with the county ordinance, however, it may still be possibly sold underground.

The Citrus County Sheriff's Office will continue their partnership with the Anti-Drug Coalition of Citrus County in an effort to educate store owners and the public of the harmful effects of the synthetic products. Through our campaign which started in September 2012, we were able to convince the majority of convenience stores in our county to voluntarily stop selling the products.

Synthetic cannabinoids are derived from chemical compounds that are related to the basic structure of the THC (Tetrahydrocannabinol), which is the primary active chemical in cannabis (marijuana). The problem is that the manufacturers of these chemicals have changed the chemical compound to add a carbon molecule or other chemicals which alters the chemical structure. This change results in an unknown synthetic substance with similar properties to cannabis but other side effects such as hallucinations, anxiety, euphoria, and mind-altering episodes that have not yet been studied. The November 23rd Chiefland Library testing of children aged 1-6 is to provide an opportunity for parents of children who may have missed the screening at the preschool or were at home to have this vital early vision screening done for free.



Throw the Rascals Out?: Part II

The public's opinion of politicians of both parties seems to have reached a new low. But no matter how much the voters detest Congress -- or how justifiably -- that does not mean that there will be radical changes at the next election.

For one thing, "Congress" is not on the ballot. Only individual members of Congress are. Most voters like their own Senator or Representative, often because of special favors that these incumbents have done for their own constituency -- at the taxpayers' expense.

Add to this the so-called "campaign reform" laws that restrict the raising of money that challengers need, in order to counter the millions of dollars' worth of free advertising that incumbents get through ordinary media coverage, enhanced by the incumbents' sponsoring of ever more legislation, expanding the role of government.

The very longevity of incumbents in Congress makes it expedient for them to treat each other as "facts of life" -- people with whom you have to "go along to get along." One of their common interests as incumbents is reelection. This can lead to all sorts of bipartisan log-rolling legislation to hand out the taxpayers' money in ways that benefit incumbents of both parties.

In short, longevity in office can create more longevity in office. Moreover, this longevity can attract campaign contributions from special interests who expect something in return -- if only a lightening up on government restrictions and red tape.

Many among the intelligentsia prefer to think of special interests as corrupting our dedicated public servants with campaign contributions. But Peter Schweizer's new book, "Extortion," shows what happens as the extorting of tribute by politicians in a position to do a lot of harm to businesses that do not pay them protection money.

Campaign contributions are just one of the things that can be extorted. The number of spouses, children or other relatives or favorites of Congressional incumbents who get high-paying jobs in private businesses regulated by government can hardly be coincidental.

When Al Gore was Vice President during the Clinton administration, he simply phoned

various special interests and told them how much he wanted them to contribute. He did not have to spell out the reasons why they should -- or why they had better. They already knew from experience how the game is played.

If we are serious about countering this and other political games, at the country's expense in both money and confidence in our government, we have to oppose the creation of a permanent class of long-serving politicians in Washington.

A one-term limit would simultaneously limit how long special interests could expect a pay-off from their campaign contributions. It would also limit, indeed eliminate, the need for millions of dollars of campaign contributions to stay in office.

Congressional reform should also include expanding the range of people likely to serve in Congress. Today, a successful engineer, surgeon, business executive, or even a full professor of economics at a leading university, would have to take a pay cut to serve in Congress.

We need people in government who know something besides politics, and who have experienced what it is like to live under the kinds of laws that politicians pass. We are unlikely to get many of them if we insist that they sacrifice their families' standard of living in order to go to Washington.

How much would it cost to make Congressional salaries high enough to let successful professionals serve in Congress without financial sacrifice?

If we paid every member of Congress a million dollars a year -- for an entire century -- that would add up to less than the cost of running the Department of Agriculture for one year.

To pay less than required to get people of the caliber needed in Congress is the ultimate in being penny-wise and pound-foolish.

Without a financial sacrifice being required to serve a term in Congress, and no need for campaign contributions to get reelected, such a Congress might well get rid of the Department of Agriculture, among other counterproductive government agencies, repaying their own Congressional salaries many times over.

World History Book in Brevard County Unsuitable for Classroom Use

"Dr. William Saxton Chairman of watchdog group Citizens for National Security (CFNS), a Boca Raton, Florida-based watchdog organization stated that the Brevard Florida School Board has independently confirmed CFNS's finding that the Pearson textbook, World History is flawed and Islam-biased. At its August 13 meeting, all five Board Members unanimously agreed that the textbook is unsuitable for the classroom.

"Agreed that this textbook is unsuitable for our children as is, validating what CFNS concluded over three years ago. One example of the textbook's bias and failure to meet educational standards: World History used 3 paragraphs to describe the origins of Judaism, 4 paragraphs to describe Christianity and 32 pages to gush over the beneficent growth of Islam.

"Working with school officials, the Board will create supplemental materials that correct the book's content, and be used by teachers in the classrooms. In April CFNS convinced the Palm Beach County School Board to take action against Pearson.

"As a result of CFNS efforts -- and for the first time as far as anyone related to these K-12 textbook issues knows -- a major publisher, Pearson Prentice Hall, had to correct the content of an already printed flawed textbook that it intended to sell to a huge

school district in Florida, and reprint it, before it could be purchased.

"The new 2013 high-school history book, "World History," was slated for delivery to Palm Beach County (PBC) students for use at the beginning of the current school year. After documenting its pro-Muslim slant many months earlier, CFNS participated in a marathon meeting with PBC curriculum specialists and a Pearson representative to delineate our concerns and recommend corrections. Following that, I personally testified about the book's bias before the PBC School Board. After further review, the Board concurred with the CFNS position, and determined that much of the textbook's contentious language be revised, consistent with CFNS's recommendations, as a condition for purchase.

"Because the textbook had to be reprinted, students didn't have a world history text until well into last fall. Clearly, their wait to get one with correct information was worth it!

Palm Beach County is the 11th largest school district in the country. Getting the agenda-driven content removed was undoubtedly a huge win. Of even greater significance, however, is the precedent that CFNS has now established for others in Florida, and nationwide, for dealing with these tainted textbooks.

"CFNS had previously spearheaded the rejection of another egregious textbook in PBC, "World History: Patterns of Interaction," published by

Their previous claim to fame: a "Thanks, Obamacare" social media movement to propagandize praise and gratitude for the federal mandate.

Modeled after the "Got Milk?" ads, the latest print and web promos pander to young people with pop-culture memes and entitlement-friendly appeals. The dumbed-down website address: doyougotinsurance.com. Last month, while federal and state Obamacare exchange sites 404'ed, the Colorado marketing buffoons LOL'ed. Their "Brosurance" ads featured frat boys with red solo cups guzzling beer, playing golf and celebrating government with a "Thanks, Obamacare!" smile.

ProgressNow's Alan Franklin boasted about his coverage. Media coverage, that is: "Within the first few weeks, 'Brosurance' has been featured by The Wall Street Journal, The Atlantic, CNN, MSNBC, Conan O'Brien, Bill Maher and Roll Call, as well as the front page of Buzzfeed and Jezebel, just to name a few. Just in the first 24 hours of the campaign's launch alone, #Brosurance was mentioned more than six million times on Twitter, and #GotInsurance more than 1.7 million times. Yes. The ads went viral." Priorities.

On Tuesday, the groups launched phase two of their Obamacare bread and circuses. Aimed at young women, the ads show party gals with shot glasses lined up on a ski; "Hey, Girl" gags involving a cutout of actor Ryan Gosling; and the Sandra Fluke-inspired promo featuring birth control-wielding "Susie" and her "hot to trot" date, Nate. The caption reads:

"Let's Get Physical. OMG, he's hot! Let's hope he's as easy to get as this birth control. My health insurance covers the pill, which

means all I have to worry about is getting him between the covers. I got insurance. Now you can, too."


It's bad enough that these idiocracy-targeted ads reduce young people to perpetually partying boozers and traffic-bait boobs. But what's truly toxic is the ad campaign's cynical feint to draw attention away from Obamacare's undeniable harm to responsible young people. Brosurance and Hosurance are trifling distractions from the federal law's Nosurance consequences. Insurers started dropping child-only plans in Colorado, California, Ohio and Missouri in 2010 thanks to Obamacare-induced premium increases. Colleges across the country have canceled low-cost plans for students because of Obamacare rules. Thanks to the Obamacare mandate, young, healthy Americans face higher insurance premiums, decreased work hours and perverse incentives to enroll in Medicaid instead of remaining independent and off the dole.

Meanwhile back in Colorado, the state Division of Insurance reports that 250,000 people here have lost their insurance policies in the past few months. And while the "bros and hos" circus masters urge young people to sign up "easily" on the state exchange, the overseers of the \$200 million program are singing a different tune. Last week, IT expert and Colorado health insurance exchange board member Nathan Wilkes blasted the process as "painful," "odious" and "embarrassing."

That's an apt description of the ruinous policies, clown implementation and moronic marketing of all aspects of Obamacare. Sober up, young America. The "Affordable Care Act" is the progressives' wealth redistribution party from hell -- and you're paying for it.

funding its portion of the library operation as a cost-saving measure. The commission never discussed actually closing the library, according to Gay.

During those summer discussions, commissioners suggested the county continue to operate the library rent free in a city building, but the county would have to absorb the \$5,500 in costs the city spends annually for maintaining the library and paying utility bills.

The budget discussions never led to a formal proposal to the county. The library was never in danger of being closed. But the discussions led to a letter from Gay asking the county to reduce the required notice for cancelling the contract to 30 days.

"The city's not looking at closing it. We're not entertaining it. The budget is set," said Gay. "The city commission was talking back in the summer about not paying for services, but the county could remain there free of charge."

But the question of a library closing hasn't gone away completely.

When Gay sent the Aug. 21 letter saying city would like to change one paragraph in the contract to allow for a quicker way to cancel the contract if that ever became necessary, it raised eyebrows in county government.

Under the current contract, the city provides a building to house the Luther Callaway Public Library and pays the water and electric bills, mows the lawn and maintains the building. The county operates the library, providing books, computers, office staff and equipment.

The contract allows the city or county to cancel the contract with 60 days notice, but the notice can't be filed before Aug. 1. Any attempt to cancel earlier requires mutual consent from both parties.

Friction developed at last week's county commission meeting over the letter. The city viewed the letter as routine and didn't see it as a demand or a threat to close down the library. The county commission refused to act on the letter.

County Library Director Lisa Brasher expressed concern about Gay's letter in an Aug. 23 email. She would have the responsibility for removing all the books and equipment from the Chiefland library building if she had to move the library to a different location or place the books and equipment in storage.

"As I read the amendment to the Chiefland inter-local agreement, the major change is that the City of Chiefland is creating the right to cancel the agreement - unilaterally - on 30 days' notice, at any time," she wrote in an Aug. 23 email to County Coordinator Freddie Moody. "Doesn't this effectively put us in a position of being in a month-to-month lease? Is

that tenable for us? Does the proposed amendment reflect a change in the sentiment of CC (Chiefland City) leaders and their commitment to having a public library?"

County Attorney Anne Bast Brown, who was copied on the email to Moody, responded that the proposed change would indeed create a month-to-month lease, but she wasn't sure whether the letter reflected a change in the sentiments of Chiefland leaders regarding their commitment to operating a public library.

Brown agreed with Brasher that 30 days notice from the city would not give the county enough time to pack up library books and equipment and find a new location. She said that was the reason the current contract gives the county 60 days notice. Should the city desire to cancel the contract, the county would have more time to pack up and leave.

County Commission Chairman Ryan Bell last week said the board would not consider the city proposal for a change in the contract language unless the city commission itself sends an amended contract for review by the board. He said the board wouldn't settle for a letter from Gay.

Brown said cancelling the contract would mean the county would have no choice but to move library operations out of the building because the county library would be operating in a building it doesn't own. There are no provisions in the current contract allowing the county to continue using the building if the city, acting as the landlord, withdraws funding support for the library.

Gay told the Journal that the contract revision he sent to the county commission was not intended to change it to a month-to-month contract nor was it a veiled threat to close the library.

"It just shortened the time span to notify of cancellation," he said.

Gay said the city commission was firm about wanting 30 days notice to get out of the contract. Commissioners voted 4-0 on July 22 to notify the county of their intentions. One commissioner abstained from voting. But he said their intent was not to close the library.

The city manager questioned why the county commission would not accept a letter from him and why the county continues to raise the issue of closing the library. He said he was acting on behalf of the city commission when he requested the contract revision.

"Does it mean all future correspondence must come from the City Commission to be signed by the county commission? If that's the case, we can return the favor," Gay said.

Gay said he was following city commission orders when he

sent the letter to the county.

Brown said she would need to see an amended contract written by the city before she would take it to commissioners for consideration. She said the city manager sent a signed letter with the proposed language changes, but apparently he expected her to revise the contract using the language he provided.

"I don't know what they intended. They sent this demand letter, but there's no document for my board to approve," Brown said.

Brown said the county is not required by law to provide library services in Chiefland. She said the county can stop providing library services and allow the city to operate the library, as long as the city and county meet the current contract requirements for cancelling the contract.

One of the reasons Brasher was hired as county library director is because she holds a master's degree in library sciences. The county would not be eligible for State Aid to Libraries funding if it had no library director with a master's degree in library sciences, Brown said. Levy County depends on state aid to operate its municipal libraries like the one in Chiefland.

Gay said any decision to close the library would rest with the county rather than the city, since it is a county library. He believes the county, with its \$66 million budget, could afford to operate the library on its own. He said other counties operate municipal libraries without city assistance.

He said the Aug. 21 letter doesn't mean the city isn't committed to operating a public library in Chiefland.

"We just want to change the wording in the contract," he said.

Gay said he wonders why the county backed away from approving the contract change.

"My thought is it takes a little of the county's power away," he said.

He said the county is making all the comments about closing the library. The city intends to keep it open.

As far as the city is concerned, he said the issue about the library is "off the radar."

Land for the city library was donated to the city by Mr. and Mrs. W.O. Beauchamp, Sr. and the library was named for her father, Luther Callaway, a well-known Chiefland school teacher.

The deed for the property states that the property will revert back to the family if at any time after 1984 the property is not used by the city for the Luther L. Callaway Library "or other municipal building named for and on which is prominently displayed the name of Luther L. Callaway."

Houghton-Mifflin. And we were a major player in correcting the content of a similarly flawed McGraw-Hill geography textbook, "World Geography and Cultures," intended for the district.

"The information about World History was shared with administration officials of St. Johns County where the textbook is still in use, but as of today, no action has been taken by the School District to remove the now notorious textbook."

In Volusia County hundreds of protestors planned to show up at the school board meeting last week to express their opinions and intense dislike of the Prentice Hall World History book condoned by Common Core in the classrooms. The Volusia County School Board cancelled the meeting for the safety of all concerned.

The organizer of the protest said: "An entire chapter is dedicated to Islam while that of Christianity, Judaism, Hinduism, Buddhism and other religions are not focused equally. I did acknowledge that other religions are included throughout the textbook but in snippets with no dedication of a chapter for easy reference as is the case with Islam in Chapter 10.

"Also, my statement about the tearing up of Islam sections in the textbook was simply a suggestion to counter any possible claims from officials of budgetary concerns regarding the issuance of new textbooks, supplements to the curriculum and so on. I then suggested that a simple remedy to correct the issue for the current school year would be for the school to ask for student volunteers who would be willing to take the textbook home and tear out the pages to the chapter so as to quell the controversy, all at a whopping tax payer cost of \$0.

"I agree that many of the comments from others may appear to be intolerant, but I as the organizer of the event have made it CRYSTAL CLEAR on the events page that such comments need to cease but cannot control the mindset of such individuals as I am NOT intolerant of minority religions here in the U.S." --Rick Sarmiento

"The Daily Caller reports that the textbook titled "World History" includes descriptions of the Koran, Islam's holy book, and lists the Five Pillars of Islam which are the basis of Islam and Sharia Law.

"The problem is there needs to be balance," said District 2 Deltona commissioner Webster Barnaby, in The Daily Caller. "In America today, Christianity is being relegated to the trash heap. Why relegate Christianity to a footnote in an entire history book, and you give an entire chapter on the teachings of Islam? To suggest that everybody knows about Christianity, that is total ignorance."

"CAIR, the Council on American-Islamic Relations, has sent out opposing statements regarding the protest and supports the teaching of Islam in the Florida school as well as around the U.S.

"This group is displaying an alarming level of intolerance and brazen disregard of minority religions," CAIR said, adding that the protesters' actions were "un-American."

"The Daily Caller said that the school has no plans to remove the textbook, adding that other religions like Christianity and Judaism are randomly represented in other pages.

"According to The Daily Caller, school district officials in Volusia County insist that there's no problem because other religions come up as a matter of course in the book. Thus, the argument goes, there's no need to have a single chapter dedicated to, say, the Gospels or the Pentateuch—or, for that matter, Hindu or Buddhist religious traditions. The book's supporters also argue that student already know about Christianity but need to learn more about Islam because of its crucial importance in international affairs."



in the cause of freedom, a belief "so strong they were willing to give their lives, if need be, in its defense."

"Sadly, nearly a million have made the ultimate sacrifice in combat or combat-related events," he said.

Mattioda said that Monday marked the 50th year Americans have gathered in November to mark Veterans Day, which has its origins in World War I. In 1918 at the 11th hour or the 11th day of the 11th month, the guns fell silent in Europe's muddy battlefields. President Woodrow Wilson, an idealist, called it "the war to end all wars" and ordered that the Armistice be commemorated in succeeding years. After the Korean War, President Dwight Eisenhower renamed the holiday Veterans Day to salute all veterans no matter when or where they served.

He added that Cedar Key has a strong veteran community. With a population of 924, the community has seen 300 military burials and has a many in active military service.

"I am honored to be here today in Cedar Key and take part in today's ceremony. God bless the veterans, their families, Cedar Key, the State of Florida and the United States of America," Mattioda concluded.

The Veterans Day Parade rotates among the different communities in Levy County each year. The parade will be held in a different city next year.

shores illegally. They sank the boat and returned the people to their native country.

"Our policies are so messed up, people are willing to risk their lives to get here," he said.

Carolyn Land complimented Yoho for "bringing common sense to Washington D.C."

She suggested cutting up the credit cards in the nation's capital.

"We don't need to raise the national debt, we need to cut spending," Land said.

She wondered why the current laws on immigration were not being enforced.

Yoho, a horse veterinarian, said he was working on a horse one day when his client mentioned that she was a liberal Democrat who couldn't support him. Yoho said he responded that he was a person who favored limited government, free enterprise and protecting the freedoms guaranteed by the U.S. Constitution. He asked her why she

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Holidays Bring Fishing Bonuses

Thanksgiving is a uniquely American holiday and for many people represents their only four-day holiday. So what better time to offer license-free fishing days? Friday, Nov. 29, will be a license-free freshwater fishing day, followed by a saltwater license-free day on Nov. 30.

To round out the gift-giving, Saturday, Dec. 28, was also designated as a license-free freshwater fishing day.

In 2013, the Legislature authorized the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) to offer four additional license-free fishing days annually. FWC Commissioners subsequently implemented a long-term strategy to encourage introducing new anglers to recreational fishing, and to give those who haven't been fishing recently another incentive to enjoy time on the water. Since the dates for some of these long-term options had already passed in 2013, they also picked the one-time-only dates mentioned above to make sure anglers got all the free-days the Legislature authorized.

For 2014 and beyond, the eight days will fall on the same weekend days from year to year, allowing anglers to plan in advance and businesses and nonprofit groups to schedule events around these fishing license holidays. Recurring days for freshwater will be the first Saturday and Sunday in April and the second Saturday and Sunday in June. For saltwater, the dates will be the first Saturday and Sunday in June, the first Saturday in September, and the Saturday following Thanksgiving.

These dates were planned around holiday weekends and events, such as National Fishing and Boating Week (www.TakeMeFishing.org/NFBW), which gets significant media coverage by promoting boating and fishing nationwide. The website is available to cross-promote local fishing or boating events as well.

In addition, VISIT FLORIDA, which promotes Florida as the "Fishing Capital of the World" (www.FishingCapital.org), designates June as Fishing Month.

April is among the best freshwater fishing months and the weather tends to be comfortable. It is a great time to host educational and outreach events that promote recreational fishing and conservation stewardship.

Florida's license-free fishing days are the perfect opportunity for people to try, or introduce a friend to, some of the finest fishing in the world. Florida's recreational freshwater and saltwater fishing industry has an \$8.9 billion economic impact and supports nearly 80,000 jobs. Events like these help grow the industry even more.

Businesses with fishing ties such as outdoor retailers, fishing guides, marinas and outfitters; nonprofits that work with youth and conservation groups; and local governments promoting fishing in local waters will all benefit. The FWC encourages them to sponsor events on these free days. To learn more about promoting your freshwater fishing events, contact Bob Wattendorf

A great way to cross-promote is to encourage anglers to participate in angler recognition programs. For freshwater programs, go to TrophyCatchFlorida.com and register. Registering enters the angler into an October 2014 drawing for a Phoenix bass boat powered by Mercury. Anglers may submit photos of their catches for recognition. Big Catch certificates are available to those who post a photo of any of 33 different freshwater fishes that simply exceed a specified quality length or weight standard (see website for details). There are special certificates for youth who catch slightly smaller fish to encourage them. For aficionados, there are Master, Elite and Specialist certificates, or Slams for catching a variety of fish within a specified time frame.

However, the big prizes are reserved for anglers who catch, document and release largemouth bass over 8 pounds. To join the TrophyCatch clubs and claim prizes, anglers should photograph the entire fish (head to tail) on a scale with the weight legible, then release the bass and post the photo and information on the website. Not only do anglers acquire bragging rights and prizes, but they help conserve the resource by recycling these older trophy bass. Documenting these catches helps the FWC refine management strategies for trophy bass and provides support for promoting Florida as the premier bass-fishing destination.

Prizes start with a \$50 Bass Pro Shops gift card and Bass King custom T-shirt, and go up from there. For bass over 13 pounds that are properly documented and released, the prize package is worth over \$1,000. Registration is free, and claiming your bragging rights is fun with either of these great programs.

Plan your fishing experience today, but don't forget to check the rules (MyFWC.com/Fishing). Regulations such as seasons, size limits and bag limits still apply, even on license-free days or if you are exempt from a license. Meanwhile, if you can't wait for a license-free day or decide fishing is for you, licenses are affordable. An annual resident license is just \$17 for either freshwater or saltwater fishing, and a combination to do both is \$32.50. Since a typical angler fishes an average of 17 days per year and more than four hours per trip, that comes out to about a quarter per hour for healthy fun and doesn't even include the value of any fish you take home, or rewards you earn.

But Harris said he is concerned about the liability as well as leaving the city fire station unattended because firefighters are aboard an ambulance en route to Gainesville when a home begins burning in Chiefland.

Harris said Knowles is using veiled allegations to suggest Chiefland Fire and Rescue doesn't respond to EMS calls. He said his department investigated and found no documentation that supports the allegation. He said the department responds to EMS calls as first responders to help on the scene, but he doesn't want his firefighters riding county ambulances to hospitals in Gainesville. He said that's not their job. He said their job is to fight fires.

The city is also concerned about liability if the county's insurance doesn't cover city firefighters driving ambulances or riding in the back of the vehicles. Those are some of the issues Fugate will research.

Knowles, who was not present at the meeting, was contacted by phone for comment. He said the Levy County Department of Public Safety relies on assistance from every

fire department in the county when an extra set of hands is needed to assist with critically ill patients.

"Chiefland is the only department that doesn't help my EMS crews," he said.

In cases involving a cardiac arrest or a blocked airway, as examples, Knowles said an extra set of hands is needed. He said he sometimes has to call Fanning Springs or Bronson to ride in the ambulance when Chiefland Fire and Rescue refuses to ride in the back of the ambulance.

"We will continue to rely on the City of Bronson and the City of Fanning Springs. They said they would be happy to help," Knowles said.

In other business, commissioners instructed City Manager Kevin Gay to investigate methods the city might use to prevent stray and roaming dogs from becoming an even bigger problem in the city.

Gay said he doesn't want to see another incident like the one in October where a dog wandered into a neighbor's yard and was killed by the homeowner with a machete.

The city manager recommended starting a program to require dog owners in the city to place a computer chip in their dog that would identify the owner of the animal, but the idea wasn't well received by commissioners.

Commissioner Chris Jones said he has two small dogs that never leave his property. He doesn't want the expense of having to hire a veterinarian to install the chips on dogs that never leave his property.

Gay was instructed to check with the Florida League of Cities on ordinances that might address the issues of stray and roaming dogs as well as investigate insurance issues that might arise if the city does nothing.

The city manager was instructed to return at the next meeting to reveal what he has learned.

In a final matter, commissioners voted to purchase color signs for the U.S. 19 entrance to the city's industrial park. The cost will be \$751.50. Municipal Sign Company will do the work. The funding will come from the industrial park budget.

Rubio: Protect Americans from Obamacare Con Artists

We are now entering the seventh week since ObamaCare's exchanges went live, and several big problems remain clear.

- First, the website where people are supposed to buy insurance — or be penalized by the IRS for not doing so — is still plagued by technical problems and security concerns.
- Second, despite hundreds of millions of dollars devoted to a Spanish-language ObamaCare propaganda campaign, the Spanish-language ObamaCare website hasn't even been launched yet.
- And, most troubling, is that millions of Americans are now being notified that they will lose the health plans they were happy with, along with the doctors they know and trust — something President Obama promised would never happen under ObamaCare, although recent revelations show his administration has known for at least three years this was inevitable.

All this means millions of Americans now have to

shop for new health-insurance plans, but the websites they are supposed to buy insurance don't work. In response, President Obama and his administration have steered people toward a 1-800 help line and in-person enrollment through ObamaCare's network of so-called "navigators."

This is a troubling proposition for the American people who are now being forced into other ObamaCare enrollment options that could make them more susceptible to fraud and personal identity theft. As Health and Human Services Secretary Kathleen Sebelius admitted last week, there is no uniform standard of background checks conducted on navigators, and nothing to prevent convicted felons from becoming navigators.

Americans know all too well the high personal and economic costs of fraud in our healthcare industry. For example, each year in Florida, we see hundreds of billions of taxpayer dollars vanish into the hands of Medicare and Medicaid fraudsters, many of whom have found refuge

from the American justice system in places like Cuba. And Hispanics in particular should be wary of entrusting just anyone to help them fill out government applications, as so many in our community have been victimized by so-called notarios, who take immigrants' money and immigration paperwork, and then do nothing for them.

As ObamaCare's website failures push more people toward non-web enrollment options, the same kind of con artists who have been defrauding Medicare, Medicaid and immigrants will be inclined to do the same through ObamaCare's navigator network.

And as time goes on, we will inevitably see more cases of people fraudulently posing as navigators, collecting personal information and then exploiting innocent victims. And while some states like Florida have taken proactive steps to raise standards for aspiring navigators and tougher consumer protection safeguards, many states have not.

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Williston Honors Veterans with Annual Veterans Day Ceremony

Williston's annual Veteran's Day Celebration at Heritage Park included a visit from the oldest World War II veteran in Levy County – 103-year-old Dogan Cobb.

Cobb wasn't the only aging veteran in the crowd. Mayor Gerald Hethcoat handed out special veterans' caps near the end of the celebration, with one going to Cobb. Two other caps were given to unidentified veterans who were more than 85 years old.

Hethcoat said Veterans Day gives Americans time to pause and think about the men and women who served this country in the past and those who serve today.

"They are all heroes," Hethcoat said.

He said Veterans Day presents the community with a great opportunity to call attention to the contributions of local veterans in preserving the country's freedoms.

"We have so much to be thankful for, but mainly we need to be thankful for our freedom. We have the freedom to be here tonight," Hethcoat noted.

Hethcoat said his own father was a World War II veteran. He enlisted in the Marine Corps on Sept. 11, 1940. He was a rifle sharpshooter and a mechanic. Documents Hethcoat found relating to his father's service indicate he fought on Iwo Jima and was lost for 14 days

on the Japanese Island. He was paid \$100 per month to fight in the war and received \$312.61 when he was discharged from the military.

"You know, these men and women, we need to appreciate what they did," Hethcoat said.

IMPORTANT INFORMATION ABOUT YOUR DRINKING WATER Otter Creek WTP Has Levels of Disinfection By-Products Above Drinking Water Standards

What happened? Our water system recently violated a drinking water standard. Although this is not an emergency, as our customers, you have a right to know what happened, what you should do, and what we are doing to correct this situation.

We routinely monitor for the presence of drinking water contaminants. Testing results we received from samples taken August 28 2013, when averaged with the quarterly results from the past year, show that our system exceeds the standards, or maximum contaminant levels (MCL), for Disinfection By-Products (DBPs), which includes Total Trihalomethanes (TTHMs) and Haloacetic Acids [Five] (HAA5s). The standard for TTHMs is 80 micrograms per liter (µg/L) and the average level of TTHMs over the last year was 159.55 µg/L. The standard for HAA5s is 60 µg/L, the average level of HAA5s over the last year was 107.35 µg/L.

What should I do? Some people who drink water containing TTHMs in excess of the MCL over many years may experience problems with their liver, kidneys, or central nervous system, and may have an increased risk of getting cancer.

Some people who drink water containing HAA5s in excess of the MCL over many years may have an increased risk of getting

cancer. Any customers who are concerned about their exposure to DBPs may choose alternative sources of water for ingestion.

What does this mean? This is not an immediate risk. If it had been, you would have been notified immediately.


What is being done? This is what we are doing to lower our DBPs levels: We are flushing the system. We are reducing the chlorine residual to help reduce DBPs. We are increasing sampling for DBPs. We will inform you when additional samples show levels of DBPs below the MCLs. We have an engineer evaluating the situation. He will be making a recommendation in the coming weeks. There are several options available to us.

Moral of the Story: Watch out for lost cowboys in the middle of a Bass Pro Shop!


Ko Ko

Slow Cooker Beef Stroganoff

2-3 pounds stew meat (or a 3-pound chuck roast, cubed)
1 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon black pepper
1 medium yellow onion, diced
1/4 teaspoon garlic salt
1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce
1 1/2 cups beef broth or stock
1 tablespoon ketchup
1/3 cup flour
6-7 tablespoons apple juice or water
4-8 ounces sliced mushrooms
1/2 cup light or regular sour cream

Place the stew meat, salt, pepper and onion in the slow cooker. Stir to distribute the seasonings and onion. In a small bowl, combine the garlic salt, Worcestershire sauce, beef broth and ketchup. Pour over the meat. Cook for 7-9 hours on low or 4-5 hours on high. About 30 minutes before serving, combine the flour and apple juice in a small bowl, whisking vigorously to combine well. The roux should be thick but still pourable so add a tablespoon of apple juice or water at a time to thin, if needed. Pour the flour mixture into the

slow cooker, whisking quickly to mix in the roux with the stew meat and juices and to avoid lumps. Add the mushrooms and stir. Cook on high for 30 minutes. Stir in 1/2 cup sour cream right before serving. Serve over pasta, rice or baked potatoes.

Winter Strawberry Shortcake Cake

1 box, White Cake mix
3 large eggs
Strawberry Pie Filling
Strawberry Jam or Preserves
Refrigerated whipped topping

In bowl, dump dry cake mix, eggs and pie filling. Stir together until well mixed. Bake in greased 9x13, 350° degrees for 35 minutes or test with toothpick for doneness. When cake has cooled, completely ice the cake with the strawberry jam or preserves. Be sure to get the corners! Refrigerate. Prior to serving, top with refrigerated whipped topping.

*Refrigerating the cake is a preference. I think it is better that way, but you can try it either way!
