

Commissioner Corrects Contribution Report, Blames Computer Error

Levy County Commissioner Chad Johnson acknowledged Tuesday he made mistakes in his online campaign contributions report for the period of June 1-20, but he has filed corrections with the state.

The Florida Division of Elections requires accurate reporting of contributions by candidates and mandates corrections to the reports if mistakes are made by the

candidate.

Johnson's campaign contribution report showed four businesses with his first name (Chad) listed in front of the business name. Johnson said he would have never intentionally typed his first name in front of contributors.

"I know I did not individually type my name in that slot," he said.

He believes the software used for reporting contributions online accidentally inserted his first name in front of the businesses. He said his mistake was in not re-checking the

report to make certain it was accurate.

"To err is human, to really foul things up you need a computer," Johnson said.

Johnson said he initially believed the Levy County Journal's story was inaccurate when it listed contributions from Chiefland businesses with his first name directly in front of the business name, but after checking the report he realized the story was accurate and the mistakes were made by him.

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Chiefland Commissioners Settle Quickly on Mary Ellzey as Next City Manager

After conducting what amounted to a nationwide search for a new city manager, Chiefland City Commissioners decided on some home cooking.

They tentatively hired Deputy City Clerk Mary Ellzey as their tentative choice for city manager and agreed to negotiate with her on contract terms at the next regular commission meeting.

Ellzey has worked for the city for the past 31 years, first as a clerk for the police department and later as the deputy city clerk, serving as second in command to the city manager.

She has twice served as interim city manager and was a late applicant for the number one administrative job in the city. She was the 23rd of 23 applicants to file for the job.

"She's been here. We know how she works," said Commissioner Betty Walker, summing up the view that Ellzey was an obvious choice.

Commissioners briefly discussed the other 22 applicants but only one, Teena M. Trice of Rockwood, Tenn., received the three votes from commissioners to make it to the interview process.

Commissioner Chris Jones asked the commission and Mayor Teal Pomeroy if Ellzey could be sent to a back room while they discussed whether to go forward with the process of interviewing other candidates.

"I think we're wasting money to go through the interview process. We got someone here dedicated to the city," Jones said.

Jones noted that only a handful of the applicants had any experience as municipal managers.

City Attorney Norm Fugate said commissioners could scrap all the other candidates and go forward

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Gas Plant in Citrus County Looks Promising; Levy Nuclear Plant On Hold




Illustration is an artist's rendering of the planned Duke Energy natural gas power plant in Citrus County. Photo courtesy of Duke Energy.

Duke Energy hosted an open house event at Crystal River on July 10 to answer questions about its planned \$1.5 billion natural gas power plant, but officials were also willing to answer questions about the twin nuclear reactors for southwest Levy County that are currently on the back burner.

The combined-cycle natural gas plant in Citrus County will be constructed between U.S. 19 and the existing Crystal River Energy Complex, assuming the project wins approval from the Florida Public Service Commission. The plant would supply 1,640 megawatts of power to help serve Duke Energy's 1.7 million customers.

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Sentencings from the Bench

Circuit Judge William Davis issued a range of sentences on July 9 from probation to a half year of jail time.
 Warren Rashad Frazier, 24, Williston, was sentenced to 180 days in jail followed by 24 months of probation after pleading no contest to fleeing an attempting to elude, driving with a license suspended or revoked and leaving the scene of an accident with property damage. Davis gave him credit for 91 days served in jail.
 On April 4, 2014 a Levy County sheriff's deputy spotted Frazier driving a vehicle, knowing he didn't have a license. He turned around to follow Frazier, who drove away at high speed. He said Frazier ran a stop sign at one point and called off the chase, but found the car at the corner of NE 1st Ave. and NE 10th St.
 Frazier had hit the corner of a mobile home and abandoned the vehicle. He left a cell phone in the car. When the cell phone rang a deputy answered the call. A woman asked for Warren. The phone was used to track down Frazier and connect him to the high speed chase.
 Lloyd Aaron Roosa, 43, Chiefland was sentenced to 24 months of community control followed by 24 months of probation after pleading no contest to being a felon in possession of a firearm.
 The Levy County Sheriff's Office was contacted by the Crisis Center on June, 7, 2014 regarding Roosa and the

possibility he might be suicidal. He was in possession of several firearms, according to a court report.
 Roosa's wife said he left the home and fired one shot. Deputies told his wife to walk out to the road for her own safety and wait for their arrival. Deputies retrieved a .45 caliber handgun and a .38 caliber revolver from the home. Roosa had been convicted in 2008 of carrying a concealed firearm and aggravated assault with a weapon, which made him a felon. His civil rights had never been restored.
 Kristy Lynn Dean, 28, Bronson, was sentenced to 24 months of probation after pleading no contest to scheming to defraud.
 The victim said 26 checks had been stolen and cashed in the Bronson area and her daughter, Kristy Dean, admitted stealing and cashing the checks. The total amount of money taken from the victim's bank account was \$1,350.
 David Florence, 19, Chiefland, was sentenced to 18 months of probation and time served in the county jail (50 days) after pleading no contest to violating an injunction against repeat sexual or dating violence, battery of a law enforcement officer and tampering with a witness, victim or informant.
 The charges stemmed from an incident on May 21, 2014. The victim said Florence, her ex-boyfriend, had dove into the car and attacked her, slapping her and biting her on the neck while trying to take her phone. She got out of her car. He slammed her to the ground and threw her phone against her car, breaking it. She climbed in her car to leave and he dove into the car a second time, hitting and slapping her in the face and head area. After pushing him out of the car, she tried to drive away, but thinks she may have hit Florence.
 Florence told officers he was trying to walk away from the argument when his ex-girlfriend ran over him with the car. Florence was transported to Shands for



treatment of his injuries. His ex-girlfriend also had injuries and bite marks, according to a court report describing the incident. The girl's mother had obtained a court injunction to prevent Florence from coming near her daughter. The injunction was in effect at the time of the argument. Florence violated the injunction by contacting the girl.
 Christopher Evan Fuerst, 24, who lists a Trenton area address, was resentenced to 36 months of probation after violating his probation by taking a drug.
 Fuerst was originally sentenced on July 7, 2013 to 36 months of probation on charges of burglary and grand theft. He was released to the Salvation Army non-secure residential drug treatment program in Jacksonville to complete an inpatient program previously ordered.
 Fuerst admitted on Oct. 8, 2013 to Resident Assistant Supervisor Shirley Way at the non-secure drug treatment that he purchased \$30 of heroin from another client in the program. He used a needle to inject the dissolved drug into his body in a male dorm bathroom. He was scheduled to be released from the program on Oct. 9.
 The original charge stemmed from the theft of tools from his father's home on May 5, 2013 while his father was out of town. Fuerst had called his father and told him he stole the tools and sold them.
 Robert E. Hall, 64, was sentenced to 1 year and 6 months of probation and given credit for 28 days of jail time after pleading no contest to improper exhibition of a dangerous weapon.
 Hall got into an argument with his son on Aug. 15, 2013 and threatened to shoot him. He went to the bedroom and retrieved a 9 mm handgun. He raised the gun and pointed it at his son. He was drunk at the time. His son ran from the house. The incident was witnessed by another family member.
 Jose Jeovanni Rivera, 46, was sentenced to 1 year of probation and given credit for 15 days served in jail after pleading no contest to contributing to the dependency of a

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Chiefland Budget Looks Rosier, But Expenses Keep Rising

Chiefland's municipal budget is looking up for the first time since the Great Recession forced the city to adopt a lean fiscal diet six years ago, although it's not a perfect scenario even now.

The city commission agreed Monday to tentatively keep the 6 mill property tax rate for the 2014-15 fiscal year. The city anticipates generating \$750,877 in property tax revenue for the coming budget.

The city commission set the tentative budget hearing for Sept. 8. The final millage rate for next year will be adopted at the hearing. The city can lower the millage on that date or keep it at 6 mills, but it can't be raised.

Mayor Teal Pomeroy and Commissioner Chris Jones said they would prefer to reduce the tax rate, but Jones said he doesn't think that will happen.

"I'm like everyone else, I'd like to cut it, but I don't think we can," he said.

Commissioners learned that their five-member board will see an increase of \$5,056.34 in the legislative budget, with most of the rise in costs attributed to a \$3,536.90 rise in commissioner health insurance costs.

Overall the city is looking at a 10-12 percent increase in health insurance for the coming year. City officials will know more next week when the city's health insurance carrier gives the city the final numbers.

Interim City Manager Mary Ellzey is asking commissioners to approve a 2 percent pay raise for city employees. The raise would be the first in six years. She said the city is losing valuable employees because it can't compete with wages.

Projects Coordinator Laurie Copeland said the state retirement system contributions for city employees will increase again.

Commissioners haven't talked about whether they will hire a deputy city clerk to replace Ellzey if she is moved up to city manager, but the money is already in the budget if the commission decides to fill the clerk's position.

The effects of the recession may be the most visible in a small number deep inside the budget. The cost of collecting garbage will decrease by \$10,200 next year due to the closing of the Family Dollar Store and Rent-A-Center in Chiefland Regional Shopping Center.

The city's taxable value is actually less than the year before, dropping \$116,697 to a citywide value of \$125,146,203. But the figure is deceiving. The city actually saw an increase in new taxable value of nearly \$1.2 million from new construction, additions and rehabs over the past year. But the state requires the city to deduct new construction from its taxable value numbers in the 2014-15 budget.

The city is planning to set aside \$50,000 to purchase a used dump truck, but Shane Keene, the city's water superintendent, said city staff will shop around and try to get the best buy.

Copeland said the plan is to add \$70,212 to the city's reserve funds in next year's budget. The city added \$84,514 to the reserve for contingency in the current budget.

Commissioners also voted to spend at least \$6,000 for a used Gator, a four-wheel drive all-terrain vehicle to be used by the sewer department.

The city is benefiting from the fact that several loans are being paid off in the current budget. Those loan payments won't be in next year's spending plan. The termination of those loan payments freed cash for the city.

Still No Arrest on the Murder of Williston Man

Levy County sheriff's investigators have yet to identify the killer of a 31-year-old Williston man who was shot and killed by an unknown assailant on the night of July 5th.

Leo Rives was found lying on the ground at the corner of NE 218th Ave. and NE 35th St. in East Williston.

Lt. Scott Tummond said the sheriff's office hasn't identified a motive for the killing nor found sufficient probable cause to make an arrest.

The sheriff's office is seeking the public's assistance with the investigation of the murder.

"The community is going to have the answers we need to

arrest and prosecute the guilty party," said Tummond.

Tummond said the sheriff's office has received a preliminary autopsy report but won't release information about where the victim was shot, how many times he was shot or what type of weapon was used because of the pending investigation.

The sheriff's office received an anonymous 911 call at about 10:20 p.m. reporting a suspicious vehicle and a possible shooting.

Responding deputies found a white Ford Crown Victoria parked on the roadway. Deputies discovered Rives on the ground beside the vehicle. He was dead of a gunshot wound.

Evidence recovered at the scene indicated that Rives was most likely shot by someone who had also been riding in the

car. An autopsy was set for Monday.

Levy County sheriff's investigators are working with various other agencies including the Florida Department of Law Enforcement, the Marion County Sheriff's Office and the Medical Examiner's Office to identify and arrest the unknown shooter.

Tummond said it is not unusual for law enforcement to be dispatched during a holiday to reports of gunshots being fired, particularly during the July 4th holiday.

Sex Offender Headed to State Prison in Strangulation Case

A Trenton area man who was originally convicted of hosting a sex and drug party for juveniles 11 years ago was sentenced to three years in state prison on July 9 for violating the conditions of his probation.

Rodney Allen Bouchard, 31, violated his sex offender probation by committing domestic battery by strangulation on May 11, 2014. Circuit Judge William Davis gave him credit for 60 days served in the Levy County Detention Center.

An arrest report said the victim in the May 11 case said she stayed the night at the home of her boyfriend (Bouchard). She woke up and wanted to go home but he refused to let her

leave.

They began arguing and she packed her clothes. While she was squatted down packing her clothes Bouchard came up behind her and wrapped his right arm around her neck, and grabbed her hair with his left hand.

She began to scream and he put his left hand over her mouth. He pulled her backwards causing her to fall back on him and hit a radio speaker on the floor. He held her down for several minutes causing injuries to her neck and back. She left the home on foot and was picked up by a friend.

The original charge 11 years ago that landed Bouchard in hot water resulted from Bouchard hosting a sex and drug party at his home on Feb. 2, 2003. Present for the party was a 13-year-old female and two 14-year-old males. An ounce of marijuana was smoked at the party and Bouchard had sex

with the girl.

The court sentenced Bouchard on Feb. 4, 2004 to 15 years of sex offender probation with credit given for 710 days served in jail. Bouchard violated his probation on May 5, 2005 by having contact with the victim who was still a minor.

His probation was revoked and he was resentenced on May 13, 2005 to probation, but he violated his probation when he was arrested again on May 11, 2014 in the strangulation case. He is headed for state prison.

Johnson's online report listed "Chad Beauchamp and Edwards" making a \$200 contribution. The report should have said Beauchamp and Edwards. His report listed "Chad Smith Law firm" instead of Smith Law Firm and "Chad Smith Asset Management" instead of Smith Asset Management giving \$1,000 donations for each business. The report also listed "Chad Wade Custom Homes" instead of Wade Custom Homes giving a \$300 donation.

He said he was in a hurry to record the contributions that day and didn't take the time to see what the computer had actually recorded.

"I was just blowing through to get it done," he said.

He said he contacted each of the contributors and none of them were upset about mistakes in reporting their contributions. They were made aware he was correcting the mistakes.

Supervisor of Elections Tammy Jones said her office does not check the accuracy of the candidate contribution reports.

She said her office is not permitted by law to correct errors if they see them.

"We just make sure it's complete, but not accurate. But when you think about it, we can't hunt down every contributor," she said.

When candidates sign onto the elections website to record contributions, they use their pin number as their signature to sign the campaign contributions form. Their signature says the candidate believes the information is accurate. The pin number is like a personal signature.

"I can verify we didn't change anything. What was submitted was done by use of his pin," she said.

The Journal first asked Johnson about the inaccuracies in his online campaign report immediately following the county commission meeting on July 8. He said at the time he believed the incorrect information on the report was a mistake, possibly due to computer error. He said Jones was investigating.

Jones said she never investigated. She said Johnson has the responsibility for filling out the campaign contributions report accurately. She said there would be nothing for her office to investigate.

Johnson said he doesn't remember saying Jones would investigate. He said he dropped by the elections office after the July 8 county commission meeting to notify staff in the front office that there were mistakes in his online contributions report. He said he knew he would have to amend the report, but he was flying out that night on a business trip and wouldn't be able to file the amended report until he got back.

Johnson returned from the business trip and mini-vacation with his wife and four children on Monday night. He went to the elections office Tuesday morning and filed an amended report correcting the errors, and then went immediately to the interview with the Journal at the courthouse.

minor.

Court records said Rivera was visiting his ex-wife's home on June 5, 2014 when they started to argue over his girlfriend. He became angry and said he was going to kill her and take their 8-year-old son. He grabbed his ex-wife by the throat and choked her. She bit his finger to force him to release his grip. He bit the child on the upper arm.

Gray Arthur Schapp, 69, Chiefland, was sentenced to two years of probation and given credit for 20 days in jail after pleading no contest to driving with his license permanently revoked and driving with a tag that was expired for more than six months.

There was no description of the arrest by Chiefland police in the court records. The police department prepared no report.

Giorgio Autumn Shaver Wilt, 33, Chiefland, was sentenced

to 12 months of probation and 10 days in jail after pleading no contest to driving under the influence. She was given credit for 7 days served in jail.

Her driver's license was suspended for six months.

Chiefland police responded to a vehicle crash on Old Fanning Springs Road on May 26, 2014. They found a car had crashed into the perimeter fence of Strickland Park. Wilt was the driver and her 4-year-old daughter was in the back seat.

Witnesses said they heard the crash and found Wilt passed out in the front seat with a cup of alcohol between her legs. They woke her and took the keys out of the ignition to prevent her from driving again.

Allen Timmons, 35, was sentenced to 43 days in the county jail to be followed by 18 months of probation after pleading no contest to felony battery and domestic battery by strangulation.

Court records said Timmons began arguing with his sister. He had lived with her a month since his release from incarceration. They had lived together as children. He became violent when she asked him to make one of the children's beds. He struck her in the head and face with his fist and kicked her in the body, then placed a shotgun to her head before leaving in her grandmother's car.

Tarius Roddrell, 32, Chiefland, was sentenced to 210 days in the county jail and given credit for 73 days served after pleading no contest to possession of a controlled substance and possession of not more than 20 grams of marijuana.

Roddrell was a passenger in a vehicle that was stopped by law enforcement officers on March 30, 2014. He claimed ownership of a cigarette pack found on the back seat containing marijuana and a white powdery substance.

Lawsuits and Impeachment

Whenever Democrats are in real trouble politically, the Republicans seem to come up with something new that distracts the public's attention from the Democrats' problems. Who says Republicans are not compassionate?

With public opinion polls showing President Obama's sinking approval rate, in the wake of his administration's multiple fiascos and scandals -- the disgraceful treatment of veterans who need medical care, the Internal Revenue Service coverups, the tens of thousands of children flooding across our open border -- Republicans have created two new distractions that may yet draw attention away from the Democrats' troubles.

From the Republican establishment, Speaker of the House John Boehner has announced plans to sue Barack Obama for exceeding his authority. And from the Tea Party wing of the Republicans, former Governor Sarah Palin has called for impeachment of the president.

Does President Obama deserve to be sued or impeached? Yes! Is there a snowball's chance in hell that either the lawsuit or an impeachment will succeed? No!

Barack Obama's repeated disregard of the laws that he is supposed to follow, and his blatantly changing these laws passed by Congress, are a threat to the whole Constitutional form of government, on which all our freedoms depend.

Once a president -- any president -- can create his own laws unilaterally, we are on our way to becoming a banana republic, where arbitrary rule from the top replaces representative government by "we the people."

Why not sue Barack Obama then, or impeach him?

For the simplest of all reasons: Neither of these actions is going to do anything to stop Obama, or even discredit him -- and both can create a distraction that draws attention away from the Democrats' disasters during an election year.

Either the lawsuit or an impeachment -- or both -- can hurt the Republicans, by making it look like they are playing Mickey Mouse politics during an election year. President Obama is already making a joke out of Speaker Boehner's threatened lawsuit by saying, "So sue me!"

Cases don't like to get involved in cases where one branch of government is suing another -- and the Supreme Court does not have to take any case that it does not want to take. Even a lower court can throw out Boehner's lawsuit as a political issue that does not belong in court. Then it will be the Republicans who will have egg on their faces.

As for impeachment, the House of Representatives can impeach any president they want to. But an impeachment is essentially just an indictment that leaves it up to the Senate to decide whether to vote to remove the president from office.

So long as the Democrats control the Senate, impeachment of Barack Obama is guaranteed to lose. And this too would leave the Republicans with egg on their faces during an election year.

The political fate of the Republican Party is not something that those of us who are not Republicans need to worry about. If they want to shoot themselves in the foot again, so be it.

All he needs to do is pack the federal courts with judges who share his contempt for the Constitution and his zeal to impose a far-left agenda at all costs.

This year's elections -- especially the Senate elections -- can decide the fate of this country for a long time to come. That is why Republicans' launching of foredoomed symbolic actions like lawsuits and impeachment is such an irresponsible self-indulgence.

When the country is at a historic crossroads is not the time for futile gestures like this, which can create bigger disasters than we already have.

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Nullification of Oppressive Federal Laws Is Catching On

Earlier in 2014, the Kansas state legislature enacted a law stating that some federal gun control regulations would not be obeyed in Kansas. U.S. Attorney General Eric Holder immediately notified Governor Sam Brownback that this new state law was unconstitutional. He cited Article VI of the U.S. Constitution, specifically its "Supremacy Clause," to support his stand.

As is customary among federal officials, Holder relied on only a portion of this clause, the part stating that laws of the United States "shall be the supreme law of the land" binding all the states. But a more complete look at this clause shows that federal laws are legitimate only if "made in pursuance thereof" of the Constitution. In other words, if a federal law is not in keeping with, or exceeds, the powers granted in the Constitution, it can rightly be declared illegitimate and not obeyed.

Though not employing the word, Kansas actually issued a decree of nullification regarding the pertinent gun control regulations issued by the federal government.

Is nullification of a federal law permissible? Thomas Jefferson thought so. In the 1798 Kentucky Resolutions he penned to help the Kentuckians gain statehood, he wrote:

That a nullification, by those sovereignties [states] of all unauthorized acts done under the color of that instrument [the Constitution] is a rightful remedy.

After he served as president, James Madison offered his view about a state's power to nullify a federal law in 1834:

Nullification of a law can ... belong rightfully to a single state as one of the parties of the Constitution; the state not ceasing to avow its adherence to the Constitution.

Though Attorney General Holder expressed his objection to the Kansas law, he hasn't taken any action.

But the Brady Campaign to Prevent Gun Violence, a private organization, has filed a lawsuit seeking to overturn what Kansas has done. In keeping with the Holder view, this anti-gun ownership group is relying on only a portion of the Supremacy Clause while ignoring the requirement that a federal law must be "in pursuance thereof" of the Constitution.

The actual Kansas law being challenged calls for prosecution of any law enforcement official (federal, state or even local) who seeks to enforce federal regulations over firearms made, sold and owned in Kansas. Attorney General Holder will surely watch this case from the sidelines. But so too will millions of Americans who value the private

ownership of weapons, a right protected by the Second Amendment.

A related matter may become an issue in this case. It is who shall determine the meaning of constitutional clauses. America has long relied on a belief that the federal judiciary alone has the power to state what any portion of the Constitution actually means. But nowhere in the document itself can any such attitude be found. Leaving such an important matter to the federal judiciary has resulted in judicial mischief.

State nullification of unconstitutional federal laws and regulations is based on the recognition that sovereign states created the national government and delegated to that government only those few powers enumerated in the Constitution. It would surely be helpful for the cause of liberty for this intent to be reinforced along with acceptance of a state's right to nullify a bad federal law. We can hope that the Brady Campaign's suit against Kansas will lead to a reaffirmation of state power and a diminution of federal overreach. Like Eric Holder, we shall be watching this very important case.

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Rubio, Casey Resolution Highlighting Importance of Freedom of the Press Passes Senate

Bipartisan Resolution Reaffirms Freedom of Press as Priority for U.S. Government

Washington, DC - U.S. Senators Marco Rubio (R-FL) and Bob Casey (D-PA) announced that the Senate passed their World Press Freedom Resolution, S. Res. 447.

“Every day in all corners of the world, independent journalists are under attack by repressive governments that don’t want the world to know what goes on in their countries,” said Rubio. “We should never take for granted the press freedom we have in the United States. It’s our responsibility to defend press freedom globally and highlight the repressive actions that many independent journalists abroad are themselves forbidden from reporting on. I’m proud to have led this effort in the Senate to send a message that the U.S. stands with independent journalists being persecuted around the world.”

“The Senate sent an important message today to those that seek to stifle the freedom of the press – the United States does not tolerate attacks against journalists and stands united against repressive governments,” said Casey. “I applaud my colleagues for coming together in support of journalists and freedom of the press worldwide.”

Journalists the world over put their lives at risk to deliver news and information every day. According to the Committee to Protect Journalists, 211 journalists were jailed worldwide in

2013, the second worst year on record. Many more are missing or have been exiled from their home countries. Attacks and intimidation like this can stifle essential flows of information and limit the scope of our insight into events on the ground.

The World Press Freedom Resolution seeks to condemn restrictions on the freedom of the press around the globe and highlight the issue of impunity for perpetrators of attacks on journalists. Using statistics carefully collected by Reporters Without Borders and the Committee to Protect Journalists, the resolution condemns those countries that seek to crush the lawful dissemination of information by attacking, imprisoning, and in some cases, killing journalists. The resolution reaffirms the United States’ dedication to protecting press freedom to support democracy, mitigate conflict, and promote good governance. It also calls on the President and Secretary of State to improve the means by which the U.S. government identifies, publicizes, and responds to threats against freedom of the press, and urges foreign governments to transparently investigate and bring to justice the perpetrators of attacks against journalists.

Florida Police Chiefs Association Endorses Rick Scott for Governor

TALLAHASSEE, FL – The Florida Police Chiefs Association (FPCA) today announced its endorsement of Governor Rick Scott in the upcoming election for Governor of Florida. The FPCA cited the Governor’s history of supporting Florida’s law enforcement in its announcement, specifically the Governor’s commitment to law enforcement and public safety initiatives.

“Police Chiefs across the state of Florida are thankful for the support of Governor Scott regarding law enforcement and public safety,” said Jupiter Police Chief Frank Kitzerow, President of the Florida Police Chiefs Association.

Under Governor Scott’s leadership, Florida has the lowest crime rate in 43 years, based on the 2013 Uniform Crime Report. The report indicated 27,380 fewer crimes reported in 2013, a 3.8 percent improvement over the previous year. Florida’s crime rate has continued to drop since the Governor took office in 2011, due in part to his prioritization of law enforcement initiatives. Further evidence of his commitment to public safety is the April 2014 signing of four bills

targeting sexual predators, including legislation that will keep the most violent sexual offenders incarcerated for longer periods of time.

“The Florida Police Chiefs are fortunate to have such a strong advocate for law enforcement in Governor Scott,” said Springfield Police Chief Philip Thorne, Immediate Past President of the FPCA. “We look forward to continuing to work with him to protect our state and our citizens.”

In May, Governor Scott signed the 2014-2015 “It’s Your Money Tax Cut” Budget, providing essential funding for law enforcement training resources. The Governor approved the funding for the Criminal Justice Standards and Training Trust Fund, raising the per officer funding level to \$67 per year, nearly doubling the per officer amount from the previous year. These funds restored crucial training monies to improve law enforcement officer capabilities.

“The funding for these resources was a critical issue for Florida’s police chiefs this year, and we cannot thank Governor Scott enough for his continued support for law

enforcement over his term,” said Amy Mercer, Executive Director of the Florida Police Chiefs Association. “Governor Scott is the clear choice for Florida’s next Governor because he has proven he cares about our state and its citizens.”

The Governor also recently vetoed a bill that would have increased Florida’s highway speed limits to 75 miles per hour. The Governor, and the FPCA, were concerned that the higher speed limits could potentially increase the risk of dangerous accidents not only for motorists, but also for the law enforcement officers charged with patrolling Florida’s highways.

The FPCA is the fourth largest state police chiefs association in the nation and is composed of more than 750 of the state’s top law enforcement executives. FPCA serves municipal police departments, airport police, college and university police, private business and security firms, as well as federal, state and county law enforcement agencies. The FPCA has members representing every region of the state.

Gas Plant in Citrus County Looks Promising; Levy Nuclear Plant On Hold *continued from page 1A*

The plant’s first 820 megawatts are expected to come online in the spring of 2018 and the second 820 megawatts are expected to come online by December of 2018.

Duke Energy will purchase natural gas from the proposed Sabal Trail natural gas line. The plan is to connect the 24-inch line that will serve the plant to the main 36-inch natural gas transmission line at State Road 200 in the area of the Dunnellon Airport. The 24-inch line will follow existing power transmission lines to the Crystal River site.

Duke Energy selected the Citrus County site due to availability of water, fuel supply, access to transmission systems and the fact that the site is close to an existing railroad and the infrastructure associated with the Crystal River Energy Complex.

Heather Dannenhower, spokesperson for Duke Energy, said the company anticipates hiring 600 to 700 workers to construct the gas plant beginning in 2016, but only 40 to 75

people will be needed to operate the power plant.

She said the 5,000-acre site for the two nuclear reactors in southwest Levy County will remain vacant until the company decides whether to build the plant. Dannenhower said the combined operating license (COL) should be approved by the U.S. Nuclear Regulatory Commission by sometime next year, but that doesn’t mean construction will begin anytime soon.

“We continue to regard the Levy site as a viable option for the Levy plant,” she said.

She said factors such as cost, demand for electricity, the need for the plant and the future of a cost recovery program in Florida will bear on whether the plant is ever constructed.

Florida’s cost recovery program allows utilities to charge customers for the future cost of building a nuclear power plant. The law has been challenged. The sheer cost of building such a plant might be prohibitive if the company

can’t recover costs in advance of construction.

Nuclear energy has low fuel costs compared to other forms of energy, but construction costs are high. The estimated cost of building the two nuclear reactors in southwest Levy County and the 180 miles of associated transmission line would be in the range of \$24 billion. The majority of that expense would be in Levy County.

One Duke Energy official said the company doesn’t foresee the need for the Levy County nuclear power plant until the mid-2020’s time frame. The company will watch demand for electricity and growth patterns in the region, and other factors as it evaluates whether construction of the twin reactors can be done.

The cost recovery system that is being challenged before the Florida Public Service Commission could be big factor in determining whether the plant is ever built.




But in order to spend, they must first work. And that work is tax free – until the individual decides on their own to spend.

Simple and moral and Fair.


Last Week’s Crossword

Annual Conference to Teach Farming, Livestock, Local Foods, More

If you're thinking of starting a small farm or want to know about the latest in local foods, organic and hydroponic production, livestock production, farmers markets and more, you might consider attending the Florida Small Farms and Alternative Enterprises Conference.

Like last year, about 800 people are expected to attend the conference, Aug. 1-2, at Osceola Heritage Park, 1875 Silver Spur Lane in Kissimmee, said Jose Perez, small farms specialty crop statewide program coordinator and the event's publicity chairman.

Now in its sixth year, the conference is presented by the University of Florida's Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences and Florida A&M University.

Typically, those who attend include small family, transitional, beginning and experienced farmers; allied-industry representatives; educators; researchers; policy makers; small farm commodity associations; foundations and others dedicated to strengthening Florida's small farm community.

Ed Skvarch, commercial horticulture extension agent in St. Lucie County, said those pondering farming can learn much of its business side at the conference.

"If you're starting a small farm, I believe it is crucial to have passion, the technical knowledge on how to grow vegetables or raise livestock and a working plan on how to grow the business," Skvarch said. "Most beginning farmers I work with have the passion and possess some knowledge of growing vegetables; however, what they lack is a plan on how to grow their business. All three are important."

In addition to teaching participants how to start a farm, the conference raises awareness about Florida's small farms industry, Perez said.

Participants must register to attend the conference. A reduced fee is available to those who register by July 14.

This year, organizers are hosting three tours: urban farming (full), farm-to-chef (full) and livestock, Perez said. The urban farming and farm-to-chef tours are already full, but, the livestock tour remains open, he said. The conference features vendor exhibits, a signature luncheon featuring local food and about 20 breakout sessions. New sessions this year

include:

- Goat, poultry, beef and dairy production management and regulations.
- Management, trends and opportunities in hydroponic production.
- Transitioning to organic production and fertility management for organic farms.
- Weed identification and management, and soil management.
- Training for farmers' market managers and online farmers' markets.
- Practical sessions on identifying diseases and pests.
- An Extension Learning Zone, where farmers will work with urban and hydroponic production systems.

Johnson Says He Is Community Minded; Still Investigating ALS Truck Proposal for Chiefland *continued from page 1A*

Quincey Johnson, who comes from a Chiefland farm family. Johnson is a professional auctioneer and holds a real estate broker's license. He operates as a broker's associate with United Country Smith & Associates.

Johnson broke into county politics in 2009 when then Gov. Charlie Christ appointed him to serve as the District 1 commissioner. He later switched to District 2 and defeated the incumbent board member, Nancy Bell. He is up for re-election for the first time.

Reflecting back on the past 5 ½ years, Johnson said he is most proud of how the county commission managed the government during very challenging economic times.

During the economic boom years in 2006, 2007 and 2008 before he took office, he said revenue levels were increasing as property values rose, but when he took office in the recession, property values were dropping along with county revenues, but people still needed services.

"We cut expenses. We reduced the size of government. We reallocated resources and we've been frugal with the tax dollars," Johnson said.

He said there are "opportunities on the horizon" and the county is aware of businesses that have expressed an interest in Levy County. He said he is not at liberty to disclose information about the prospects.

"That's why I want to continue as a commissioner," he said.

He said bringing new businesses to the county is a slow process.

"Nothing happens fast in government," he said.

Johnson said he and his wife Angela are community minded people. She serves as the director of the Levy County Schools Foundation and was recently elected vice president of the National Auctioneers Association Auxiliary. Johnson himself is past president of the Florida Association of Auctioneers, past president of the Levy County Farm Bureau for three years and serves as a vice president member of the board of the Dixie, Gilchrist Levy Multi Listing Service.

"We're community focused. We spend a lot of time supporting youth activities," he said.

Should Chiefland be licensed for an ALS Non-Transport Truck?

On the subject of the proposed Advanced Life Support non-transport truck Chiefland is requesting, Johnson said he doesn't want to do anything that might jeopardize the county's special

assessment that supports the county's Emergency Medical Services department.

Johnson said if the county can provide an additional Advanced Life Support non-transport truck for Chiefland at no cost to the county and without jeopardizing the county's special assessment, "I'm okay with it."

The entire EMS department is supported by the special assessment. The county plans to consult with its attorneys in Tallahassee who wrote the assessment to determine if changes are needed to accommodate Chiefland's request. The scope of the work for those attorneys would probably reach beyond their current contract with the county and would result in additional expenses.

Johnson believes the city and the county should share the additional expenses for legal counsel to review the special assessment. City Attorney Norm Fugate takes the position that EMS is a county agency funded entirely by a county assessment and the county should shoulder the cost of having its Tallahassee attorneys review the assessment.

But Johnson said the city and the county are contributing to the cost, "so both parties should contribute to the cost of the study."

"It's not going to be a healthy partnership when one party is saying the other party should bear all the expenses," Johnson said. He said the city and county should bear an equal share of the cost for reviewing the assessment.

Johnson doesn't agree that the county should bear a higher share of the cost. Even though the county funds EMS entirely from the assessment, he was asked why the county couldn't share some of the \$2,548,000 in yearly revenue from the 1 cent sales tax the county imposes to help pay the expenses of the study.

The small county discretionary sales tax is imposed on every retail purchase made in Levy County. It is the seventh cent of the seven-cent sales tax. Every resident of the county pays the tax when they make a purchase. The county uses \$586,247 of the 1 cent sales tax annually to offset revenues that are committed to paying a bond issue, but the remaining money is available for general expenditures.

Johnson said the argument could also be made that the city should pay for everything since the city is the governmental entity that is triggering the need for a review of the special assessment. He said some of his fellow commissioners may feel the city should bear the entire cost.

"I guess that will be open for debate later," he said.

Johnson was asked if saving lives should figure into the debate about the ALS truck for Chiefland. The city says it can save lives with an ALS non-transport truck by giving its paramedics the ability to treat critically ill patients or critically injured patients with ALS drugs and equipment when they arrive at the scene before the county ambulance. Chiefland paramedics currently can't use ALS drugs or equipment because the city fire rescue is licensed only for Basic Life Support (BLS). The county commission would have to grant a license to the city to operate an ALS truck.

Johnson responded that when it comes to saving lives, the county has spent considerable sums of money to save lives. But he said the county could spend 100 percent of the money it has in its coffers and it won't change the fact that when the Good Lord calls you home, you will be taken. He said it is far from the truth that the county has placed money ahead of saving lives.

He added that EMS is working on developing better services every day and it works very hard each day to save lives.

Johnson was reminded of statements made by Commission Chairman Ryan Bell and County Coordinator Freddie Moody that if Chiefland gets an ALS non-transport truck, then every city in the county should get one.

Johnson said that may not be practical because not every city can afford to staff an ALS truck with a paramedic.

"That's why we look at ALS as a county issue," he said.

Johnson said he in no way is trying to stall the decision on whether Chiefland gets an ALS truck until after the election. He said he realizes other counties are allowing ALS trucks to be used by cities. But he said there are different financial structures in the various counties.

"I could care less about the election," he said.

He said his main concern is to avoid going down the road and approving an ALS truck for Chiefland and later getting sidetracked by some issue the county and city didn't foresee. He said he would rather take a more methodical approach to studying the issue and reviewing all available options.

Johnson was asked about the conflicts that have occurred in the past between Chiefland and the county. He said there is baggage out there, but he said the county commission is willing to work with the city.

"But there is a history you have to get past," he said.

Rock Meeks Started Politics Early in Life; Wants to be Public Servant *continued from page 1A*

"I've always had an interest in politics. My Dad served for many years. I used to go as a kid with my Dad to council meetings," Meeks said.

Meeks said he is related to County Commissioner John Meeks, who is a third or fourth cousin. He describes him as a "distant cousin."

Meeks, who is 35, said when he was younger there wasn't much reason to leave Otter Creek. He went with his family once a week to pick up groceries in Chiefland, but that was about the extent of the family's travels.

Today he is the father of five and works for the Levy County Department of Parks and Recreation.

Otter Creek is a small town. It has no police department of its own. It's one of those towns you might miss if you didn't see the reduction in speed sign and the blinking light at U.S. 19 and State Road 24. But Meeks said it's a beautiful little town with wonderful people.

His love of politics and Levy County prompted him to run for public office.

"Levy County is a great place to live. I would like to be part

of it as far as government goes. I want to be a servant to Levy County," he said.

Meeks said people who run for public office often say they want to bring big industry. He is not opposed to the concept, but he says it has to be the right fit for the county.

"It would be nice to generate jobs for the working class people coming up now, so they had something," he said. "I got a string of taxpayers coming along behind me."

Meeks is an avid hunter and fisherman. His wife likes to hunt and fish and they bring their children along with them into the woods.

Meeks is a member of the Baptist faith. For many years he attended Otter Creek Baptist Church, but later Countryside Baptist, and now First Baptist Church in Chiefland. When he attended Countryside School in Gainesville, he rode with Pastor Billy Keith to the church and school in Gainesville.

He refuses to criticize incumbent County Commissioner Chad Johnson, one of his opponents.

"If I have to do that to get there, I don't need to be there," he said. "I don't agree with that."

He said he has had a lot of encouragement to run for public office. He said there are a lot of people disgruntled about politics across the board, "and that has an effect on small politics."

Meeks favors giving Chiefland an Advanced Life Support non-transport unit, if it will save lives.

"I think it would be great for Chiefland to have," he said. "I know they are haggling about the funds. It's great if it doesn't break the county. I think it will be done. Everyone needs to put their heads together and set aside their differences."

As for the Levy County Department of Public Safety, Meeks said he knows the department has become "really big." He said he knows there has been a lot of talk about the department but he hasn't gotten deep enough into the issue to comment on it.

"There are a lot of concerns, most definitely," he said.

But Meeks said he wants to take office with a clean slate and start to understand the issues more deeply and look at the entire picture in county government.

He said he inquired about the county's 1 cent sales tax, and he wants to know more about how the money is spent.

"Nobody ever sees it and no one talks about it," he said.

Josh works for UF recreation and sports in the maintenance division and David works for IFAS at UF.

They were taught their father's work ethic and values.

"I believe in keeping strong family values," he said.

Studstill has worked many trades in his life. He has grown vegetables and watermelons. He was a subcontractor for cabinet installation. He worked at UF for 18 years and retired in December.

He said he worked at UF during the day and grew watermelons when he got home. He was a watermelon farmer from 1983-98.

Studstill was also a building inspector for Levy County government in 1978.

He was raised in Gulf Hammock as a child, but when his father inherited the family farm in Gilchrist County, they moved to Gilchrist and he lived there for four or five years until he graduated from Trenton High School.

But Levy County has always been home.

He has remained a member of Ebenezer Baptist Church for many years.

Studstill refuses to criticize incumbent County Commissioner Chad Johnson. He said he was brought up to believe in the Golden Rule.

He said he was encouraged by many people to run for the District 2 county commission seat.

"People were not happy with the way things are going, plus I had the ability to do it, and I can serve 100 percent full-time," he said.

Studstill said he would like to see clean businesses brought into Levy County to provide jobs to young people so they can have work.

He said a high percentage of people work in local government in Levy County or drive across the county line to work.

"There's nothing here. I'd like to bring something in, and then give tax breaks," he said.

Studstill said he would like to pull in a lot of grants to repair bridges and guard rails, and he wants to resurface the badly deteriorating paved road to Shell Mound. The road was built by the late Luther White in the early 1950s through swamps. The 3-mile long road leads to a first rate county campground, he said.

"It hasn't been resurfaced since it was built. I wouldn't want to pull a boat and trailer down it," he said.

Studstill said he won't accept contributions from road builders if he is elected to the county commission.

"I think it would be too questionable to do something like that," he said.

He personally would like the county commission to obtain three bids for any truck or piece of equipment it purchases.

"My main concern is to save the working people's tax

dollars," he said.

He noted that many people are having problems paying property taxes with the high cost of living.

"I want to bring honesty and integrity to the board," he added.

He promised to carry a public cell phone with him if elected to the county commission. He wants residents to have the ability to call him when they have questions or issues they want him to address as a commissioner.

Studstill said he believes the City of Chiefland should be allowed to operate an Advanced Life Support non-transport truck.

"Why shouldn't they have it? I think they should have it, as populated as Chiefland is," he said.

He said the city may be able to use the ALS truck to help patients in Fanning Springs or Cedar Key.

While he no longer farms as a profession, Studstill keeps about 10 head of cattle on his farm. It's part of his life.

He will be on the Nov. 4 ballot as a candidate with no affiliation with a party.

"It truly is a blessing to live in America and in Levy County with the freedom to vote," he said in a written release. "Please do me the favor of going out on Election Day to make that vote."

with contract negotiations with Ellzey. He said the commission has full control of the process and has the legal right to terminate the process.

Commissioners agreed to Jones' suggestion to write a letter to the unsuccessful applicants telling them that the position had been filed and to thank them for applying.

But it was clear that commissioners were not enthused about most of the candidates, many of whom had no managerial experience in city government, much less experience in Florida government.

Teena M. Trice, city manager of Oliver Springs, Tenn. for the past year-and-a-half, came closest to filling the bill. Before that, she had been an independent contractor for municipal finance matters for Rockwood, Tenn. for seven months in 2012.

Ashley Bryant of Gainesville, of Tower Hill Insurance, a Florida commercial underwriter, received a vote from Mayor Teal Pomeroy. Amanda Nichole Rowland, of Albertville, Ala., a courts' clerk who works part-time as a parts manager in a private business, received no votes.

Robert Christman, a facilities manager from

Fort Myers, received no votes, as did Eddie L. Edwards, a police investigator for major crimes with the Detroit Police Department. Mary Simmons, a family counselor from Chiefland, also received no votes.

There were many others with varying business and government backgrounds from Texas to Tennessee.

More than 50 applicants applied for the job after former Chiefland City Manager Grady Hartzog retired. This time, despite a slow economy, only 23 applied and most lacked solid credentials to be a city manager.

There had been some concern that the constant turnover of city managers in Chiefland might impact who might apply. Whether that fact reduced the number and quality of applicants will never be known.

Starting in 2003, City Manager Ed Smith lasted two years; City Manager Rod Russ lasted six months; Hartzog lasted six years; Kevin Gay lasted a year. Ellzey, who has the most city managerial experience of any of the 23 applicants, and all of it in Chiefland, will likely take the job when they finalize her contract.







The access center is urging the Bronson Town Council to move forward with plans to build a new community center and gymnasium at the James H. Cobb Park. Thomas said the center has plans to provide afterschool activities for children and the elderly.

She said the access center is grateful for the Church of God's decision to charge only a modest fee for use of the old gymnasium. She said the center had been leasing the new Bronson Middle High School gym, but the school district raised the fees so high that it costs as much to rent the new gym for one hour as it did for an entire day at the old gym. In the beginning days of the access center, she said the district gave the center free use of the new gym. But she said Superintendent Bob Hastings said the schools need money to operate too.

Pastor Chris Tucker of the Church of God said the church has a five-year lease on the gymnasium. He said it took a considerable amount of elbow grease, varnish and paint to clean up the old gym to make it useable. The floor had to be re-varnished before it could be used.

Tucker said the Church of God is growing and the gymnasium and the locker-room area behind it offer additional space for youth activities. The youth group, Chainless Ministries, meets Wednesday night in the former locker-room area.

He said the primary goal is to use the gym for community events. He said the church is part of the community and the gym is part of the church's ministry.

"We're all about ministering to the community," he said.

Tucker said the church heard about the gym being available for lease. The Levy County School District was debating what to do with the gym. There was an offer to lease it for storage, but the district didn't want to lease it out for that purpose.

That's when the church stepped in.

"It was definitely a big undertaking for our little church," he said.

BREAKFAST CASSEROLE

- one dozen eggs
- 4.5 oz. real bacon bits or pieces
- 16 oz. small curd cottage cheese
- 8 oz. shredded cheddar cheese
- one pkg. Simply Potatoes (shredded)
- large mixing bowl
- mixing whisk
- large metal spoon
- 2- 9x12 baking dish/pan
- 2 sheets of foil that can cover the baking dishes

Pre-heat the oven to 350 degrees. Crack eggs into the large mixing bowl. Use the whisk to beat them. Add the bacon and quickly whisk to mix in the pieces. (BE SURE TO PULL OUT THE LITTLE BLUE AND WHITE FRESHNESS PACK THAT SAYS "DO NOT EAT") Add the cottage cheese and whisk again. Add a handful of cheddar cheese and whisk again. Add the shredded potatoes and stir in with a large metal spoon to separate the potatoes and evenly cover them with the mixture. Divide mixture between two baking dish/pans. Cover with remainder of cheddar cheese and top with foil. Put into the oven for one hour. Remove foil and check the center to see if it is completely cooked. You can either fluff mixture with a fork to spoon out or cut mixture into portioned squares.

MARBLE CREAM CAKE

- 1 pkg. (2-layer size) marble cake mix
- 1 pkg. (8 oz.) PHILADELPHIA

- Cream Cheese, softened
 - 1 cup Powdered sugar
 - 1 tub (8 oz.) COOL WHIP Whipped Topping, thawed
 - 1 individual cup Jello Chocolate Pudding Snack Cup
- Glaze:
2 1/2 TBLS. light cream
1/4 tsp. vanilla extract
1 1/2 cups sifted powdered sugar
Pinch salt

HEAT oven to 350°F.

GLAZE:
