





City institutes burn ban through July

The City of Chipley has issued a burn ban within the city limits.

The city has made illegal the use and sale of all types of fireworks (sparklers, flares, any type of explosives). All such materials are included in this burn ban. The ban takes effect immediately, city officials said.

"This burn ban is due to the extreme dry condition that has increased the fire level hazard," read the city order. "There are 377 wild land fires burning across the state today involving 115,200 acres."

The burn ban prohibits campfires and all open burning, excluding attended and monitored barbecue and cooking equipment. The burn ban also prohibits the use, ignition or discharge of any type of explosive compounds, fireworks, flares or sparklers.

"Any individual violating the burn ban could face fines not to exceed \$500 and up to 60 days in jail," the order reads.

"We strongly rely on our community to help us prevent dangerous wild land fires from starting," city officials said. "Your efforts will help protect the lives and property of all citizens and visitors."

Unless lifted, the ban will remain in effect through July 13.

Vernon to buy Dixie baseball teams' uniforms

VERNON — Vernon City Council responded to the pleas of Vernon's Dixie Youth team coach Brian Brock during their regularly scheduled meeting June 13 with a vow to help Vernon's teams purchase uniforms and hats for the season.

"We get the uniforms from last year, and we change the names and sew and hem the uniforms, but you can do that only so many times," Brock said. "Going to All Star is a big honor, and these kids are representing the city of Vernon; if we don't have some decent uniforms, they shouldn't even be practicing."

Brock said it wasn't just so that the team will look good; there are also uniform regulations, and sometimes pants are handed down while the city gets new shirts, but the colors don't always match.

"We've got a chance to play in state," Brock said. "These boys have the chance to go to Lakeland and experience what true baseball is all about."

The city approved of council member Tina Sloan's proposal to buy the teams new shirts, pants and hats. The funding was approved to come from the city's recreation department.

"Be as frugal as possible," said council member Tray Hawkins. "That way if the kids go to state, we can help them with the expenses."

Fire Chief Matt Gothard reported that all of the fire department's new gear had come in except the gloves, which were on back order.

The council approved of the fire department buying new T-shirts for the Fourth of July celebration for \$200.

"We're also announcing that we're giving out smoke detectors to all those who need them," Gothard said. "They'll be available at the Vernon City Hall while supplies last."

Kiwanis gives 'BUGs' to third-graders at Kate Smith

Third grade students at Kate M. Smith Elementary School were recognized at a special presentation in the school cafeteria June 6. The ceremony was attended by students and parents.

Sponsor of the program, the Chipley Kiwanis Club, presented special graduation certificates and bookmarks to students who improved a subject by one grade or maintained current grade level in all subjects. The program continues from grade period to grade period to encourage constant improvement in school results. The presentations, made to 151 students, were in addition to the 130 students recognized at the end of the prior 9-week grading period.

The BUG program was created this year at Kate M. Smith Elementary through the coordination of Principal Jerry Register and the Kiwanis Young Children/Priority One Committee chaired by Kiwanian Patsy Justice. Further student recognition is provided by a school "BUG Honor Roll" for 3rd-graders that is distributed school-wide. Plans are to expand the program in future years to other 3rd grade classes and schools.

Third grade teachers with award recipients were Cecilia Grissett, Kelly Kunde, Kim Hartzog, Thomas Laney,

Jane Lively, Sammie Owens, Dee Stanton, Herbert Wiggins and Deborah Woods. Assistant Principal Bonnie Lindsey conducted the awards ceremony.

A key objective of the BUG program is to encourage students to focus on making one small accomplishment at a time. For this school year, the BUG challenge to students included the last two grading periods. A total of 30.1 percent of the 156 grade improvements were in reading, with 28 percent of students improving math, and 14 percent improving writing skills by at least one grade. Science (11.5 percent), language arts (10.3 percent) and social studies (7.7 percent) all showed recorded improvements.

Kiwanis International offers leadership opportunities to students at all grade levels through college through its local clubs, with the K-Kids Club for elementary students, Builders Club at the middle school level, Key Clubs for high school and college students working through the Circle K International programs.

All student clubs offer leadership development opportunities while instilling the value for community service to others. With the exception of the K-Kids, all clubs are operated by student elected officers and mentored by a faculty

advisor and Kiwanis club member as liaison from the adult Kiwanis organization. All clubs conduct community service projects and raise their own funding to support club activities. Kiwanis International is a global organization of volunteers dedicated to changing the world, one child and one community at a time. The Kiwanis Club of Chipley has been providing support to youth oriented events and programs for 70 years and last year supported 31 organizations throughout the county.

Scheduled for Thursday evening, Sept. 15, the event will be held at the Ag Center in Chipley with tickets priced at \$25 per person or \$45 per couple.

The amazing watermelon does it all

When I was 9, I attended a church picnic that featured a watermelon seed-spitting contest and was hooked on a life-long love affair with the watermelon.

But, until I came to Chipley, I gave little more thought to watermelon than how to fit one in the fridge for cooling, and what I knew about watermelon was limited to striped green skin and red pulp inside (OK, sometimes yellow, but I thought that was as exotic as it got).

Now, here we are in the midst of the 55th Annual Watermelon Festival, and I figured its time I knew more about the watermelon than my rather limited knowledge.

So, off to the Internet I went (more on that later).

In the meantime, it bears mentioning that events like this weekend's festival don't just happen. It takes work by Judge Colby Peel, the chairman, and his intrepid staff of volunteers over much of the year to produce a weekend such as the one to which

we are being treated. Just the country music concerts we enjoyed last night took hours of negotiations and much work, and that was only the beginning. Arranging a parade, pancake breakfast, 5K run, antique car show, arts and crafts show and sale and on and on all needed meticulous planning and almost miraculous organizational skills. So, when you see Judge Peel and the festival volunteers, join me in giving them a smile and a heartfelt thank you.

I've learned some interesting facts about watermelon on the Internet. I started with good ole' Wikipedia (which was great for the botanical information and much of the history), sciencedaily.com gave me the – uh – unusual Viagra-like medicinal value of watermelon, the nutritional facts come from nutritiondata.self.com and a variety of other sources were used as well. Among sites I found fascinating and useful were also www.watermelon.org, www.thecaloriecounter.com, www.foodasfood.com, www.foodterms.com, www.nationalwatermelonassociation.com. I even went to Facebook to see what information I could glean.

I thought I should become a bit of a watermelon expert in time for this year's Watermelon Festival. Little did I know what I was up against as I entered the information highway of the Internet!

Did you know the watermelon is really a "berry" with a very thick skin? Also, millions of words – including at least one novel – have been penned over hundreds of years about our festival honoree.

There is breaking international news about watermelon. Also a recent study shows watermelon so healthy it is a natural replacement for a well known drug (note: that part of the story comes with a "mature audiences only" warning, but don't worry, this is a G-rated article). And along the way I explored the amazing fruit's nutrition, calorie count and some unusual recipes for your Watermelon Festival party.

Pricey watermelon

The Densuke watermelon, a highly prized Japanese fruit, sold at auction for almost \$4,000 in Sapporo earlier last week. Isetan Department Store bought the fruit, which is grown exclusively in northern Japan's Hokkaido, for \$3,743 Tuesday morning. Densuke watermelons are prized for their solidly black, smooth gourd, crispy texture, and extra sweet juices, the Inquisitr reports. There are only about 100 available the first day it goes on sale each year. At peak season several years ago, the fruit sold for \$6,100, according to the Wall Street Journal.

Call me crazy, but I don't think any melon at the Watermelon Festival will bring in anything near that.

Watermelon's bonus (this section mature audiences)

Yep. A study at Texas A&M caused news in 2008. "A cold slice of watermelon has long been a Fourth of July holiday staple. But according to recent studies, the juicy fruit may be better suited for Valentine's Day," wrote Science Digest.

"That's because scientists say watermelon has ingredients that deliver Viagra-like effects to the body's blood vessels and may even increase libido." Who knew?

Watermelon nutrition.

First issue: calories. A serving of watermelon (about 10 medium-sized watermelon balls) equals 37 calories. In other words, you might explode before you could eat enough calories to equal a couple of candy bars.

While watermelon is exactly "rich" in nutrients, it holds its own. Here's a list of essential nutrients it contains (percentage is recommended daily allowance in a single serving): Vitamin A, 3 percent, Thiamine (Vitamin B1) 3 percent, Riboflavin (Vitamin B2) 1 percent, Niacin (Vitamin B3) 1 percent, Pantothenic acid (B5) 4 percent, Vitamin B6 3 percent, Folate (Vitamin B9) 1 percent, Vitamin C 14 percent, Calcium 1 percent, Iron 2 percent, Magnesium 3 percent, Phosphorus 2 percent, Potassium 2 percent and Zinc 1 percent.

Watermelon is also mildly diuretic and contains large amounts of beta carotene. Watermelon with red flesh is a significant source of lycopene and is, generally, about 6 percent sugar.

Watermelon recipes

Thousands of cookbooks, literally, have been written exploring every aspect of the culinary life of the watermelon. The National Watermelon Promotion Board has their own list of appetizers, entrees, sandwiches, salads, desserts.

The most unusual recipe has got to be the BLWT sandwich! A twist on the traditional bacon, lettuce and tomato sandwich, this one includes a slice of watermelon. Cool, huh?

Watermelon history

Watermelon is, officially *Citrullus lanatus* of the family Cucurbitaceae botanists. It is defined as a vine-like (scrambler and trailer) flowering plant originally from southern Africa. Its fruit, which is known as a watermelon is a special kind of fruit known by botanists as a pepo, a berry which has a thick rind (exocarp) and fleshy center (mesocarp and endocarp); pepos are derived from an inferior ovary, and are characteristic of the Cucurbitaceae. The watermelon fruit, loosely considered a type of melon (although not in the genus *Cucumis*), has a smooth exterior rind (green, yellow and sometimes white) and a juicy, sweet interior flesh (usually pink, but sometimes orange, yellow, red and sometimes green if not ripe). It is also commonly used to make a variety of salads, most notably fruit salad.

Watermelon is thought to have originated in southern Africa, where it is found growing wild, because it reaches maximum genetic diversity there, resulting in sweet, bland and bitter forms. Alphonse de Candolle, in 1882, already considered the evidence sufficient to prove that watermelon was indigenous to tropical Africa. Though *Citrullus colocynthis* is often considered to be a wild ancestor of watermelon and is now found native in north and west Africa, Fenny Dane and Jiarong Liu suggest on the basis of chloroplast DNA investigations that the cultivated and wild watermelon appear to have diverged independently from a common ancestor, possibly *C. ecirrhosus* from Namibia.

It is not known when the plant was first grown as a crop, but there is evidence of its cultivation in the Nile Valley from at least as early as the second millennium BC. Although watermelon is not depicted in any Egyptian hieroglyphic text nor does any ancient writer mention it, finds of the characteristically large seed are reported in Twelfth dynasty sites; numerous watermelon seeds were recovered from the tomb of Pharaoh Tutankhamun. By the 10th century AD, watermelons were being cultivated in China, which is today the world's single largest watermelon producer. By the 13th century, Moorish invaders had introduced the fruit to Europe; according to John Mariani's *The Dictionary of American Food and Drink*, "watermelon" made its first appearance in an English dictionary in 1615.

Museums Online South Africa list watermelons as having been introduced to Native Americans in the 16th century. Early French explorers found Native Americans cultivating the fruit in the Mississippi Valley.

Many sources list the watermelon as being introduced in

Massachusetts as early as 1629. Southern food historian John Egerton has said he believes African slaves helped introduce the watermelon to the United States. Texas Agricultural Extension horticulturalist Jerry Parsons lists African slaves and European colonists as having distributed watermelons to many areas of the world. Parsons also mentions the crop being farmed by Native Americans in Florida (by 1664) and the Colorado River area (by 1799). Other early watermelon sightings include the Midwestern states (1673), Connecticut (1747) and the Illiana region (1822).

Charles Fredric Andrus, a horticulturist at the USDA Vegetable Breeding Laboratory in Charleston, South Carolina, set out to produce a disease-resistant and wilt-resistant watermelon. The result was "that gray melon from Charleston." Its oblong shape and hard rind made it easy to stack and ship. Its adaptability meant it could be grown over a wide geographical area. It produced high yields and was resistant to the most serious watermelon diseases: anthracnose and fusarium wilt.

Today, farmers in 44 states in the U.S. grow watermelon commercially, and almost all these varieties have some Charleston Gray in their lineage. Georgia, Florida, Texas, California and Arizona are the U.S.'s largest watermelon producers.

This now-common watermelon is often large enough that groceries often sell half or quarter melons. There are also some smaller, spherical varieties of watermelon, both red- and yellow-fleshed, sometimes called "icebox melons."

In Japan, farmers of the Zentsuji region found a way to grow cubic watermelons, by growing the fruits in glass boxes and letting them naturally assume the shape of the receptacle. The square shape is designed to make the melons easier to stack and store, but the square watermelons are often more than double the price of normal ones. Pyramid shaped watermelons have also been developed and any polyhedral shape may potentially also be used.

Watermelon growing

For commercial plantings, one beehive per acre is the minimum recommendation by the U.S. Department of Agriculture for pollination of conventional, seeded varieties. Because seedless hybrids have sterile pollen, pollinizer rows of varieties with viable pollen must also be planted.

Since the supply of viable pollen is reduced and pollination is much more critical in producing the seedless variety, the recommended number of hives per acre, or pollinator density, increases to three hives per acre.
