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Vote could bring 150 jobs to county

CHIPLEY — The Washington County Board of County Commissioners, at a special meeting June 29, approved of selling 10 acres for \$7,500 per acre to The Concrete Company to be able to continue with Project Pipe.

Cliff Knauer, the county engineer, assured commissioners that the county was not using the prop-

erty, nor would it be used in the future.

After long discussion, the county approved of The Concrete Company's proposal with the stipulation that the county attorney, Jeff Goodman, could negotiate some of

the contract's wording.

"There's only a few tweaks that need to be made before I can be comfortable with the contract," Goodman said. "It's just some legal verbiage that I want to go over."

Project Pipe is a project six years in the making to build a rail spur to the pipe plant in the Washington County Industrial Park. The project is expected to create an estimated 150 new jobs for the county.

The total capital investment,

including the road and rail spur, is more than \$15 million, with the road being funded by a \$750,000 Community Development Block Grant written by Washington County grant writer Stacy Web and obtained through Enterprise Florida.

"It's going to create jobs for our county," Washington County Chamber of Commerce Executive Director Ted Everett said. "And

Correctional officer dies during shift

CHIPLEY — Correctional Officer Kevin Cook died of unknown causes Tuesday, June 28, while working at the Washington County Jail.

"The Washington County Sheriff's Office is saddened to report the passing of our beloved member of the sheriff's office family," Sheriff Bobby Haddock said. "Correctional Officer Kevin P. Cook passed away at work late in the evening on Tuesday, June 28, from an unknown medical condition causing him to go into cardiac arrest."

According to a sheriff's office report, a co-worker called emergency services at 11:50 p.m., and Washington County EMS was on the scene within minutes.

Cook was transported to Northwest Florida Community Hospital, where he died. He was 35.

"The sheriff's office family mourns the loss of Kevin, and our prayers are with his family, including (his) brother, investigator Jason Cook, who is also a member of the Washington County Sheriff's Office family," Haddock said. "Kevin has worked as a correctional officer at the Washington County Jail for the past two years."

Funeral services are pending.

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Defaulting on debt makes everything harder

When individuals default on loans, their credit scores drop, interest payments increase and it makes it harder to get financing in the future.

If the United States defaults on its financial obligations, the consequences are similar, but on a much bigger scale. And the effects are expected to extend to individuals and businesses.

Lawmakers are now grappling with whether to raise the nation's debt limit to avoid the economic consequences expected if the country can't meet its financial obligations. Treasury Secretary Timothy Geithner has said Congress has until August to raise the debt ceiling, or the country could enter technical default on its obligations.

"Failing to raise the debt limit would require the federal government to delay or renege on payments for obligations already entered into," Federal Reserve Chairman Ben Bernanke said in a speech on fiscal sustainability Tuesday. "In particular, even a short suspension of payments on principal or interest on the Treasury's debt obligations could cause severe disruptions in financial markets and the payments system, induce ratings downgrades of U.S. government debt, create fundamental doubts about the creditworthiness of the United States and

damage the special role of the dollar and Treasury securities in global markets in the longer term."

It's an important issue to consider, members of the Panhandle's Congressional delegation and the state's senators said, but most aren't willing to vote in favor of a debt ceiling increase unless it is accompanied by major fiscal reforms.

Sen. Bill Nelson, D-Fla., has said it's the "responsible course" for Congress to vote to raise the debt ceiling.

"Not to do so could cause widespread economic turmoil. So he's going to vote the responsible way," according to an email from Nelson's office.

Still, Nelson said he recognizes the need for economic reforms, including simplifying the tax code, closing tax loopholes for oil and gas companies, eliminating government duplication and reducing waste and fraud plaguing programs like Medicare. He said he also would like to give the president a line-item veto, which has been struck down as unconstitutional in the past.

"Nelson still feels Congress for years has taken a piecemeal approach to solving the country's budget woes. To really get our nation's debt under control, we need to look at more than blindly slashing programs," according to information from his office.

It's a course of action Bernanke advocated in

his speech.

"Recently, negotiations over our long-run fiscal policies have become tied to the issue of raising the statutory limit for federal debt. I fully understand the desire to use the debt limit deadline to force some necessary and difficult fiscal policy adjustments, but the debt limit is the wrong tool for the important job. Failing to raise the debt ceiling in a timely way would be self-defeating if the objective is to chart a course toward a better fiscal situation for our nation," he said.

He suggested the president and congressional leaders agree on a timetable for reaching decisions about shorter-term and longer-term changes to the budget.

Negotiating

A bipartisan group is negotiating a plan that would call for an increase in the debt ceiling accompanied by fiscal reforms. Vice President Joe Biden said he is optimistic a deal will be made.

But until details are announced, it's not clear if concessions will go far enough to secure the support of the area's Republican representatives, who said they see fiscal reforms as a necessary step. Some suggested raising the debt ceiling without implementing other reforms at the same time could have more serious consequences.

"It's irresponsible to continue to borrow \$1.6 trillion a year with no plan to end it anytime soon," said

Sen. Marco Rubio, R-Fla. "I marvel at how people in this town run around with their hair on fire because of the potential for a technical default because we don't raise the debt limit, but they don't seem that overly concerned about a real default, where we're not paying our debt obligations because we don't have the money."

He said projections indicate a debt crisis is coming if no action is taken, and he thinks it's now time to deal with it.

"In essence, you can't solve this debt problem that America faces with one solution," Rubio said. "You've got to have a series of reforms that have to happen. What I'm saying and what I think others are beginning to say, including many in the (Democratic) Party, is now as part of the debt limit debate, let's not just talk about the debt limit, let's talk about how we're going to put this country on a fiscal path that is sustainable."

In a March 30 op-ed he wrote for the Wall Street Journal, Rubio said he would not vote in favor of a debt limit increase unless it is accompanied by a plan for tax reform, an overhaul of regulatory structure, cuts in discretionary spending, a balanced budget amendment and reforms to entitlement programs.

It's a similar stance to Rep. Steve Southerland, R-Panama City. Last week, Southerland sent a letter to leaders of the House that

called for a plan to "cut, cap, and balance our way to fiscal security," said his spokesman, Matt McCullough. The recommendations include cutting next year's deficit in half by instituting reductions in mandatory and discretionary spending; capping spending with revenues at 18 percent of gross domestic product; and implementation of a balanced budget amendment with protections against federal tax increases.

In order for Southerland to support an increase in the debt ceiling, "it's going to take a serious, concrete and long-term plan like this to solve our debt crisis," McCullough said.

"Rep. Southerland believes we must deal with our crushing burden of debt now and not wait until the 11th hour. However, Congress must do this right. While there would be consequences in delaying much-needed action on a long-term debt solution, the consequences would be much worse if Congress forces through a toothless and ineffective bill that continues kicking the can down the road without making the tough choices to cut spending and eliminate our debt."

Rep. Jeff Miller, R-Chumuckla, agreed that without fiscal changes, he won't vote in favor of an increase to the debt ceiling.

"Raising the debt ceiling is a non-starter, in my opinion, without a guarantee of dramatic spending cuts. For

too long we have continued down the path of borrowing and spending. It has to stop now," he said.

He advocated for spending caps, a balanced budget amendment with safeguards against tax increases and a spending limitation amendment.

"I think the biggest threat to the government's credit rating is not the question of whether the debt ceiling is raised or not; rather, the real threat is the more than \$14 trillion of debt we currently carry. I'm willing to fight hard for serious spending reduction," he said.

That certainly is a concern, Bernanke said in his speech Tuesday.

He pointed out the long-term fiscal imbalances occurred over decades. "Although we have been warned about such development for many years, the difference is that today those projections are becoming reality."

He said a large and increasing level of government debt compared to national income could have significant economic consequences.

"Over the longer term, the rising federal debt crowds out private capital formation and thus reduces productivity growth," he said. Unsustainable deficits have costs, too, he said, including the increased chance of a sudden financial crisis.

"... (W)e can be sure that, without corrective action, our fiscal trajectory is moving the nation ever closer to that point," Bernanke said.

Sometimes the most progress is quietly made

On June 29, all of the area was going about its business. For all the world, it looked like a typical sleepy Wednesday afternoon in a typically sleepy Southern town. But big progress was being made.

New jobs were created, and about five years of effort paid off in a single vote of the Washington County Commission.

Let's be absolutely clear: Each member of the Washington County Board of

County Commissioners is to be applauded. The vote to move forward with the project that, ultimately, could bring more than 150 new, important, tax-paying jobs and a new community business partner to Chipley was unanimous.

It was a courageous vote. And it was a vote that took vision. Well done!

The county has partnered with The Concrete Company out of Columbus, Ga., as well as state economic developers to make the deal come to pass. Washington County was called upon to make an investment in the future of the project, a difficult decision to make in tough economic times.

But I believe their courage will pay dividends for generations to come.

Consider: The Concrete Company is one of America's most important providers of ready-mix concrete, particularly to military and other governmental entities. Consider, too, that we stand near the beginning of a massive redevelopment project at Tyndall that will require quite literally miles of new concrete.

The project in Chipley should be well positioned to take advantage of this reality.

But this isn't some quick scheme. The company, county and state have been working toward this project for a long, long time.

Yes, the county is going to provide a property tax abatement. But the company is going to invest millions.

Anticipated is early creation of more than 20 jobs (good-paying, economy-building jobs). Ultimately, the plant is expected to employ around 150, and the Tyndall project could well add many more.

This is a long-term investment by all parties. This is an extraordinary, visionary vote by our Washington County Commission.

Yes, the afternoon was quiet. The commission chambers were populated by about a dozen people, mostly business leaders, and it was quiet.

But the action taken bespeaks a new, encouraging direction for this entire area. It was a decision for a future with a more diverse economy. It was a decision to invest in the future opportunities of our community and its young people.

It was progress. And, though quietly done, it was unmistakably right.

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that's our main goal at the chamber." With the purchase of the 10 acres, The Concrete Company can begin construction of its pit and conveyor system.

"This deal is still not something that I can say we're doing cartwheels over," Goodman said. "Negotiations have led to a fair offer for the land, and there's still some fine-tuning to the

agreement, but we should have all the details hammered out by next week for a special called meeting to wrap up negotiations."

According to Everett, if The Concrete Company has committed to break ground on or around July 31 on a pit and conveyor system to unload up to 90 railcars of aggregate, then the state Office of Tourism, Trade and Economic

Development will begin releasing \$2 million in funding for the rail spur.

Commissioner Donnie Strickland was noticed as the only board member who has been on the board since the project first began.

"It's been a long time coming," Strickland said. "But I'm going to trust in Ted and that he's got the best interest of the county in mind."

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
