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
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# County unemployment rises

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Bucking the statewide trend, where the unemployment rate remained unchanged from May through June, Washington County unemployment grew by 0.7 percent to total 11.2 percent. However, unemployment in Florida as a whole is 10.6

percent. Nevertheless, Gov. Rick Scott touted the numbers as a success.

"Today I learned that since January, Florida has added 85,500 new jobs, 4,300 of which were added in June," Scott said. "This is great news for Floridians."

"I am encouraged that Florida is still bucking the national trend in unemployment. We maintained a

steady unemployment rate from May to June while the national unemployment rate continued to climb.

"Ultimately, my goal is to make sure every Floridian has the opportunity for a job. This won't happen overnight, but we're off to a great start. We've begun transitioning our workforce to the private sector, streamlining government functions

and leading our state in the right direction."

The month-to-month increase from May to June this year continues the county's trend, the June 2011 figure represents a year-to-year increase from June 2010 when the rate was 10.8 percent.

From May to June, the number of people employed in Washington County slid by 87, from 8,935 to 8,848.

The number of people in the labor force (those ready, willing and able to work) in Washington County slipped by 23 from 9,982 to 9,959.

In comparison, Washington ranked 20 among the 67 counties in rate of unemployment and the highest in the area while Holmes was at 8.4 percent, Jackson at 8.2 percent and Bay at 9.5 percent.

## Malloy honored with Crestview road

CRESTVIEW — Col. Greg Malloy will never be forgotten if his former co-workers at Okaloosa Correctional Institution have any say.

Dozens of people gathered July 21 under the hot sun for the dedication of Colonel Greg Malloy Road, which heads east from State 85 to the state prison south of Crestview.

"We care and we'll continue to

care about Col. Malloy. We're proud of why we're here," said Maj. Jon Brown, who works at the prison. "He worked here for 19 years. He started here at the lowest rank and worked his way up. Everybody knew him. "This was his home."

Malloy, the senior officer at Holmes Correctional Institution, was killed Feb. 2 after he was shot by Wade Williams, who authorities were pursuing in a wooded area near the Gritney community after Williams killed his parents in Jackson County. Malloy was 44.

In addition to his years in Okaloosa and Holmes counties, Malloy also worked for the Washington Correctional Institution — now called the Northwest Florida Reception Center — and the Tomoka Correctional Institution in Volusia County. He was promoted to colonel, the highest designation for an officer, on July 23, 2010.

In his 23 years with the

## Officials issue mosquito-borne disease alert

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A mosquito-borne disease alert has been issued in Holmes County after two horses tested positive for Eastern equine encephalitis (EEE).

EEE is one of a number of diseases and illnesses that can be passed either directly to humans or from animals to humans following mosquito bite.

The alert statement was issued late Monday by the Holmes County Health Department and Holmes County Mosquito Control officials.

The "Holmes County Health Department reminds residents and visitors to avoid being bitten by mosquitoes that may cause encephalitis disease," read the alert. "Holmes County Mosquito Control and the health department continue surveillance and prevention efforts and encourage everyone to take basic precautions to help limit exposure by following the department of health recommendations."

The alert included a number of steps residents should take to protect themselves, children and animals.

"Drain standing water to stop mosquitoes from multiplying," officials said. "Drain water from garbage cans, house gutters, buckets, pool covers, coolers, toys, flower pots or any other containers where sprinkler or rain water has collected. Discard old tires, drums, bottles, cans, pots and pans, broken appliances and other items that aren't being used. Empty and clean birdbaths and pets' water bowls at least once a week. Protect boats and vehicles from rain with tarps that don't accumulate water. Maintain swimming pools in good condition and appropriately chlorinated. Empty plastic swimming pools when not in use."

Health professionals also recommended that those in affected areas cover skin with clothing or repellent, wear shoes, socks, long pants and long sleeves. This type of protection might be necessary for people who must work in areas where mosquitoes are present.

The alert recommended application of mosquito repellent to bare skin and clothing.

"Repellents with DEET,

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# Hilton Meadows honored for his leadership

Hilton T. Meadows, RLA, has been given the first-ever Jeffrey Seigel Statewide Outstanding Leadership Award by the Florida Chapter of the American Society of Landscape Architects.

Dunes of Panama and the West Florida Girl Scout's Camp in Walton County.

His brother, Terry Meadows, and wife, Therisa, own and operate the family farm on which Hilton grew up.

He trained as a fighter pilot but served in the area of military intelligence. He served two tours in the

Korean Conflict.


He attended Auburn University and graduated Magna Cum Laude with bachelor's and master's as well as post graduate work at the University of Florida where he later served as an assistant professor.

He is the first North Floridian to serve as State President of the Florida Chapter of the American Society of Landscape Architects. He has one daughter, two sons, two step-sons and seven grandchildren.

## Birds monitored for avian flu to protect public health

The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC), the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Wildlife Services and partner agencies are finishing a five-year avian influenza monitoring project.

The project was designed to determine if migratory birds carried the Asian strain of the highly pathogenic avian influenza (H5N1) virus to the U.S. All samples collected by

the FWC and other state partners tested negative for any highly pathogenic strains.

Biologists started the project in 2006 to rapidly detect and quickly respond should a highly pathogenic strain reach the U.S. There have been no reported cases of avian influenza in humans in the United States, but a number of people in other countries became sick or died from that virus after extensive, direct contact with infected poultry. The USDA and its partners

collected more than 450,000 samples nationwide, including 5,200 plus samples from Florida.

In Florida, much of the success of this project came from the voluntary participation of duck hunters who allowed biologists to sample the birds they harvested. Biologists collected almost 3,000 samples at hunter check stations in several of Florida's wildlife management areas. Biologists sampled a wide variety of duck species, including the northern shoveler,

gadwall, mottled, mallard and green and blue winged teal.

The remaining Florida samples came from bird die-off investigations from marine, freshwater and terrestrial habitats as well as from live birds, which were captured and released.

## Car crash on Dogwood Lakes Road leaves 1 in critical condition

**BONIFAY** — Bonifay Fire-Rescue reports that a vehicle crash on Highway 177A (Dogwood Lakes Road) and Holmes County Road 65 resulted in one injury.

Later identified by friends Jonathan Brunson of Geneva, Ala., he is listed in critical but stable condition at Tallahassee

Memorial Regional Medical Center.

Reports state that Bonifay Fire-Rescue received a call at 9 a.m. of the wreck, and the dispatcher was informed one person still was trapped in the vehicle.

Holmes County EMS Rescue 1 and 3, Pittman Fire Department, Holmes County Sheriff's Office and Florida Highway Patrol also responded.

Holmes County EMS

Rescue 3 arrived and advised of a single vehicle, rollover type crash where the vehicle had hit a tree and the victim was trapped inside.

Bonifay Fire-Rescue Squad arrived at 9:10 a.m. and with the aid of Holmes County EMS extracted the victim using the HURST Jaws of Life tools by removing the driver's door and roof from the vehicle.

The victim was then

treated and transported by Rescue 1 to a nearby open field to be airlifted by Air-Heart Air Ambulance and be transported to the Tallahassee hospital.

It was friends who identified the victim to be Jonathan Brunson of Geneva, Ala., son of Donnie and Angie Brunson, official reports show.

Florida Highway Patrol is further investigating the crash.

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

picaridin, oil of lemon eucalyptus and IR3535 are effective," the alert reads, saying mosquito netting can be used to protect children younger than 2 months old.

The Florida Department of Health continues to conduct statewide surveillance for mosquito-borne illnesses, including West Nile virus infections, EEE, St. Louis encephalitis, malaria and dengue. Residents of Florida are asked to report dead birds via [www.myfwc.com/bird/](http://www.myfwc.com/bird/). Florida Department of Corrections, the DeFuniak Springs resident became close with many of his co-workers, including Sgt. Bruce Boughman, who led the effort to rename Little Silver Road in honor of Malloy.

Boughman began seeking community support in March to change the road's name. He contacted residents on Little Silver Road and Okaloosa County commissioners, and then raised funds to make the sign a reality.

"I wondered what I could do to help. I wanted to do something,"

Boughman said. "If you would have known (Greg), you would know why this was something we should do. If you knew him, you would understand.

"He was a swell individual."

Malloy's daughter, Payton, unveiled the street sign. When the 12-year-old removed the cover, applause broke out around her.

As Payton and her mother, Donna Malloy, looked at the bright green sign, tears rolled down their cheeks.

"We take it day by day," Donna said after the ceremony. "We are

very, very honored by everything they've done for us. It just gets very emotional."

"We have our days. This is one of our days," Payton said as she wiped her eyes and held a miniature version of the sign given to her by his former co-workers. "This is where all his friends are, so it means a lot."

After the ceremony, Boughman stared up at the sign and knew his friend would not be forgotten.

"Now, anytime a corrections officer goes down this road, Greg Malloy will be with him," he said.




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## Back to school Don't roll your eyes like that!

## Search for grandfather leads to Bethel

When the Heritage Books for Washington and Holmes Counties went to press in 2006, no history of the writer's great-grandfather, John Coleman Wells, was printed in either book.

A token effort was made by this writer to find his tombstone in one of the surrounding cemeteries where he was known to have lived, but to no avail.

Soon after the valued books were released, my sister, Hazel Wells Tison, and I were discussing the absence of some our ancestors not included in either book. Hazel then informed me that our granddaddy was buried in Bethel Primitive Church Cemetery. She recalled seeing his grave down through the years during cemetery cleaning time and remembered hearing "talk" among the ladies as to why his wife, and the mother of his four sons and three daughters, Lucinda Speigner Wells Levins, was buried next to her second husband, Joseph Richmond (Joe)

Levins, Jr., rather than by the first husband.

According to the aged and almost illegible tombstone for our loved one, it was learned that John C. Wells was born Oct. 1, 1850 in Butler County, Ala. He died Feb. 3, 1894, six months short of his 44th birthday. His grave lies between Nancy O. Wells, date of birth Feb. 17, 1892 and died July 12, 1892 and Willie Erie Wells, born Feb. 1, 1900 and died Aug. 6, 1900. The parents of these young children are unknown to the writer.

Research reveals that John Coleman Wells was the son of William Jesse Wells and possibly his second wife, Judy Elizabeth Wells. William Jesse Wells also had

children by his first wife, Lucinda Elizabeth Wells, with very little information known about the directions these offspring took in life.

It is known that James H. Wells, born to the above couple, married Francis E. Mathiny on Aug. 2, 1868, with the marriage recorded on Page 2 of the Marriage Records of Butler County, Ala. James H. Wells went to Santa Rosa County in his early life and is the patriarch of the Wells lineage there.

Daughter, Eliza Ann Wells, married John Elbert Wells, reportedly from a totally different Wells Family. Their only surviving offspring, John Henry Wells, who married Nancy Eliza Odom Wells, remained in the

Oakey Streak region of Butler County and is the progenitor of the Wells kin presently residing in the area of Andalusia and Red Level, Ala.

It is established that before departing Butler County, Ala., in the early 1880s, John Coleman Wells had married Lucinda Speigner Wells, date of birth July 30, 1857 and died Sept. 1, 1947, although no marriage date is known by me. The couple, along with their two children, James Thomas Wells (my grandfather), date of birth Dec. 14, 1873 and Mary Elizabeth Wells Peters, date of birth Aug. 30, 1876 and died Oct. 16, 1972, accompanied the parents on the move

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# The debt limit: It's a mess

The U.S. government has run up a debt of more than \$14 trillion, nearly the size of the economy's annual output — and it's not enough! So the politicians want to borrow \$2.4 trillion more. But the need congressional authorization. That's what Washington is in a tangle about these days.

For 94 years Congress has set a limit for the government's borrowing. But raising the limit was usually a mere formality. In other words, it was no limit at all, and government felt free to borrow at will. Among the effects of borrowing is bigger government. The U.S. budget is \$3.8 trillion. The government is borrowing 40 cents of every dollar it spends. Now imagine its having to raise the full \$3.8 trillion in taxes. Borrowing permits a growth in government that would be virtually impossible otherwise because some portion of government spending — the portion borrowed — appears free.

Of course it is not free. Borrowing brings several kinds of costs, but they lie in the future or are difficult to discern. One cost is interest, which last year came to more than \$400 billion. A second cost is higher interest rates. When the government is in the international capital markets looking for money, it adds to the demand for limited lendable funds and bids up interest rates for everyone else. A third cost is related to the last. When the government borrows money,

no one else can borrow that money. Thus, private projects, which ultimately would have aimed at satisfying consumers, must go unfunded. That is a real loss in welfare, but it is unseen. We are poorer as a result.

To most pundits and politicians, the "grown-up" position is to favor increasing the debt ceiling, which is \$14.294 trillion. Paying Mastercard with Visa is considered responsible, and anyone who says otherwise will be branded an extremist, if not a nihilist who wants to bring down the economy. We are in a pretty sorry state if thinking the debt is big enough gets that reaction. It can be chalked up only to an ethos — fostered by the government's own schools, of course — that regards the state as the first claimant on all income.

So the debate in Washington is not whether the ceiling should be lifted but under what conditions. Republicans generally favor raising the limit as long as some spending cuts are promised. The Democrats want increased tax revenue along with spending cuts. Thus the impasse as the Aug. 2 deadline approaches.

What should they do? What they should not do is raise revenue in any way. Taxation is the forced extraction of money, an immoral practice. If you and I can't morally demand money from our neighbors with a threat of force, neither can the politicians. If I max out a credit card, I cannot legally steal money to make my payment. Why can the government? Of course the legal rules are different

for the government, but that is what we should be objecting to. The government is a group of people, so the rules should be no different.

Over many years, the policymakers have dug the hole that they are now trying to climb out of. The hole, let's be clear, is the result of government spending, not insufficient taxation. Federal spending is close to 25 percent of GDP. Those who want to raise taxes complain that revenues are at a historical low of 16 percent of GDP, but they have conveniently forgotten that the economy has not recovered from a deep recession, in which unemployment depressed revenues. Typically tax revenues are close to 20 percent of GDP regardless of tax rates.

The problem is not on the revenue side. Indeed, the government shouldn't be taking any money by force. But in the short term, if the self-proclaimed wise men and women in Washington feel they have to pay the bills they have incurred in our names, let them reallocate spending without borrowing new money. They can start by liquidating the empire and cutting the military-industrial complex off from the public trough. All spending, including Social Security, Medicare, and Medicaid, should be on the chopping block. But then, instead of paying the bondholders, let the taxpayers keep their money.

to Holmes County. The newcomers acquired land and settled in the new home just West of Bonifay in an area which become known as Wells Hill. Later it became Boswell Hill, and the present road leading to the home site is so named. My great-grandfather found employment in cutting cross ties for the railroad that was under construction across the northern border of Florida at that time.

History reveals that this couple added three sons, Jasper Green Wells, Joseph Lafayette (Fate) Wells and John Smith Wells, along with daughters, Martha Lula Wells Chitty and Emma J. Wells Bryant, to this marriage.

All the children remained in this general area, where they reared families. Only two of the offspring, James Thomas and John Smith Wells, have full stories contained in the Heritage of

Washington Book, printed in June 2006.

The "prattler" and his family have had new headstones erected for John Coleman Wells, and the two unknown babies. This was accomplished on March 11, 2011. The new markers carry the exact inscriptions as the old ones, with the former ones now buried at the grave sites.

Also nearing completion is an attempt to write a further history on my departed loved one who died approximately 117 years ago, leaving little background information and no personal items such as writings and pictures.

It is the prattler's plan to expound in more detail the history of John Coleman Wells, his early life, and as much history as possible on his brothers and sisters in both families of his father.

It has been my distinct privilege to get acquainted with my kinsmen in

Covington County, Ala., and Santa Rosa County in the past 15 years. It has been the delight of my life to attend their annual family reunions and come to know them better. We have been received lovingly and kindly by the new found kin and many have added bits and pieces to the puzzle of our interesting family.

My commitment is to not confuse, nor include unfounded background information, in the project now underway. Once my writing is complete, I plan to print it as an addendum to the Washington County Heritage Book and make it available to all those in the Wells Family who purchased the book and to others who the updated information may be of value to.

I am indebted to many individuals for assistance in this undertaking and plan to give credit to them in the finished product for their efforts.

## 'Band of Brothers' subject turns 90

**SANTA ROSA BEACH** — On Monday, Roy Gates wore his Easy Company cap commemorating his role with the 101st Airborne Division during World War II.

He also wore a T-shirt made for him by the staff of Grand Boulevard Health and Rehab, with his name on the front in lime green paint and the number 90 ironed onto the back.

Gates, a former Seagrave resident, celebrated his 90th birthday Monday with a party at his new home.

The humble World War II veteran was one of 20 contributors to historian Steven Ambrose's now-famous book, "Band of Brothers." The book was turned into an HBO miniseries in 2001.

He has stories to tell but doesn't share them often. And he doesn't say much at all about the book or the miniseries.

"It's a bunch of hokey," says his close friend Tom McGee of Seagrave, adding that Gates was not mentioned prominently enough in either.

But, he adds, Gates has stories, if he can be prodded into telling them.

For example, the second lieutenant was there when Easy Company freed a number of concentration camp survivors at the end of the war.

"It was terrible," Gates said. "Pretty dramatic to see the prisoners running from the camp. So emaciated that some of them died."

"We caught the general who was commandant of that place, and we shot him after a firefight," he added.

On a more upbeat note, Gates was with the 101st when they went to Eagle's

While the German leader was spending his last days underground in Berlin, Gates and his fellow paratroopers were joyriding in Hitler's touring car. And Gates, who liked to drink, was put in charge of Hitler's stash of exotic champagnes and

whiskeys. "What did I do with it?" Gates asked, smiling. "Drank it."

He also made sure that officers' clubs and NCO clubs all the way back to France were well-supplied with the expensive liquor. And he helped them make sure nothing was wasted.

"Top of the line," Gates reminisced, smiling. "Top grade."

For his 90th birthday, friends and family came from across the country.

Among them was his son-in-law, R.D. Martin of Texas, who has read "Band of Brothers" and said he learned a lot about the devotion of men like Gates.

"He was quite a leader," he said. "And the people that he was leading, according to the book, really trusted him."

"He was just a part of the Band of Brothers — a very important part of the war."

## Hooked on Outdoors

Unless you were out of town last weekend, you know how much rain we had. I heard a man who works at Eglin Air Force Base say they had 15 inches of rain in two days. I have a 12-inch rain gauge at my house, and it was overflowing after two days. It started on Friday night and rained until mid-day Sunday.

This foot or foot-and-a-half of rain is what pushed Philips Inlet over the brink, and it finally made its way to the Gulf. When we have large amounts of rain coming in such a short period of time, it also does something to saltwater bays and freshwater ponds — it turns them red.

If you notice the Gulf after a heavy rain and rough seas, it also causes more foam than usual. In the bays, it causes extra amounts of foam. The real problem with extensive rain in the bay is it turns the water so red it is very hard to sight fish for redfish.

I have heard several guides complaining about seeing fish the week before the rain, and now they can't be sure if the fish are still where they were.

The red water might or might not affect the biting habits of redfish, but it doesn't seem to bother speckled trout. All of a sudden, it seems the bay has come alive with speckled trout, and I attribute it to all the schools of menhaden. If you stand on a dock and peer into the water, you will see thousands of menhaden as they come swimming by.

If fished correctly, menhaden will catch more trout than all the shrimp you can keep alive on your boat. The first thing you have to do is know how to throw a cast net. The next thing you will need is a good livewell. Not one of the kinds that recirculate the water; they will not keep a bag of menhaden alive for long. What you need is a livewell pumping freshwater from the bay to the livewell and returning it back to the bay at the same rate.

Take a handful of menhaden and squeeze them, almost killing them, and throw them back into the water. This can be done in the area you caught the menhaden in the first place. The specks will start popping them like bread will pop crickets thrown into a lake.

Without using a cork or lead, hook on a live menhaden and cast it into the fray and hold on. About 80 percent of the trout you will catch will be undersized, but every now and then a big one will come along.

Give it a try while the bay still is full of bait.

# RISKY BUSINESS

## Spearfishermen must be aware of surroundings

As if bull sharks didn't evoke enough fear, now there's one swimming in the Gulf of Mexico armed with a spear gun.

Emmett Yancey, who owns and operates Aqua Adventures, a dive shop in Mexico Beach, had taken out a group of anglers for some offshore fishing. Sneaking in a little dive time for himself near the end of their trip, Yancey was asked by a boy on the boat to spear a barracuda.

"The young boy said he'd never seen a barracuda," Yancey said, "and I said, 'All right, I'll shoot one.' They're good to eat, and we eat them all the time. ... I swam over and shot one, and when I shot one, the visibility (underwater) was probably 60, 70 feet. I hadn't seen a shark all day. I shot that barracuda, and it took off. Out of nowhere, four sharks appear. A 10-foot bull shark came in and took the back half of the barracuda in one bite, turned around and came back for a second. It had my spear shaft in its mouth. I held on for 10 seconds going straight to the bottom. It didn't take long to realize I was going 80 feet deep. I watched him swim away with my spear gun."

"I've been spearfishing about 10 years now. That's the first time ever I've had that happen to me. It's a very



rare thing. Of course, when you're spearfishing, sharks kind of get curious, but I'd never had one bother me. That one there was never any danger. He was at the end of the line 20 feet out. I was never in any danger. I just lost my spear gun I'd had forever."

Unlike fishing from a cozy deck chair on a boat or from the shore of a lazy river, there is the element of hunting in spear fishing that is difficult to duplicate above the water's surface. SCUBA tanks strapped to their backs 120 feet underwater, spear fishermen stalk their prey and have to wait for the ideal moment to fire the spear at their target. A shot slightly

off target could leave the fish injured but lively enough to put up a fight. And when that fish is a 100-pound amberjack with nothing but survival on its primitive mind, that fight can be a titanic struggle.

"The key to this is the placement of the shot," said Ron Childs, a founding member of the Mexico Beach Artificial Reef Association. "You're not just shooting them. You want to shoot them right behind the eye (where the spine is located). You want to stone that fish. If you get a big fish and don't kill him, it could be hell."

The waters off the coast of Bay County are home to hundreds of artificial reefs, as well as sunken boats of

different sizes resting on the seafloor at various depths. Each of those sites serve as sanctuaries for fish such as grouper, red snapper, flounder and all kinds of reef fish. Of course, lobster, rays, moray eels and the occasional octopus are down there, too. The variety of life makes almost any dive a rewarding one, whether a fish is reeled in or not.

Unfortunately, a considerable investment of time and money is required before a diver can start spearfishing at those depths. A diver has to be SCUBA certified, but also must learn the intricacies of moving underwater with air tanks, spearing a moving target and then getting the fish up to the boat.

"Most of the spearfishermen I dive with are super-advanced divers," Childs said. "These guys and ladies I dive with are like the best divers you'd want to dive with your entire life. There's so much to learn. I don't think you can go take a class, be certified and go spearfishing."

"In spearfishing, you need some time under your belt. I'd say two years of diving to get familiar with the equipment. Your mask gets knocked off constantly when you're wrestling a big fish. You've got to be able to handle that situation. You're dealing with crazy situations you can't predict sometimes."

Such as running into a bull shark carrying a weapon.



## Cottondale man to compete in Wheelchair Olympics — again

**COTTONDALE** — Many athletes who suffer life-changing injuries talk about how learning a new sport helped them accept a new reality. Melvin Henderson isn't one of them.

He had a positive outlook long before he started to compete in the Wheelchair Olympics, but through the games, he has found an outlet and parlayed his success into a source of inspiration for others.

This year's competition will be Aug. 1-6 in Pittsburgh.

In its 31st year, the National Veterans Wheelchair Games are sponsored by the Paralyzed Veterans of America and the Department of Veterans Affairs. Henderson is hoping for donations to cover the final \$1,500 of the \$3,500 to \$4,000 cost of attending this year's games.

For more than 24 years, Henderson has used a wheelchair, the result of a vehicle accident on U.S. 231.

Henderson has always been an athlete, from the days he played Little League baseball to high school basketball and track, and in the Army he played

all the sports he could.

He learned about the games through a VA nurse in 1983, the first year he participated. That year, expenses were covered, but subsequent events — he has competed in 12 competitions winning 34 medals — he has had to pay for himself.

Athletic competition didn't serve as inspiration to come to terms with his paralysis, but it has given him something to strive for and is a way for him to meet others in similar positions.

## Two-day spiny lobster sport season starts today


Recreational and commercial harvest seasons for spiny lobster in Florida are set to reopen. The special two-day spiny lobster sport season comes first, July 27-28 this year, followed by the regular lobster season Aug. 6 through March 31. The special two-day sport season occurs on the last consecutive Wednesday and Thursday in July each year to let recreational harvesters collect spiny lobsters before commercial lobster traps are placed in the water on Aug. 1.

Recreational fishers must have a saltwater fishing license and a spiny lobster permit to harvest spiny lobsters, unless they are exempt from the recreational license

requirements. Harvesters also must make sure their spiny lobsters have a carapace length greater than 3 inches to take them, and divers must possess a measuring device and measure all lobsters while in the water.

During the two-day spiny lobster sport season, divers and snorkelers are allowed to take up to six lobsters per person daily in Monroe County and Biscayne National Park waters and 12 lobsters per person daily in other Florida waters. Lobster

fishermen may possess no more than the daily bag limit of lobsters when on the water. When lobster fishers are off the water, they may possess the daily bag limit on the first day and double the daily bag limit on the second day. Possession limits are enforced on and off the water during the two-day sport season. During the regular season, the daily recreational bag and on-the-water possession limit is six spiny lobsters per person.

### FWC again allowing campfires in managed areas

Because recent rains improved dry conditions across the state, the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC), in cooperation with the Florida Division of Forestry, has rescinded an executive order issued last month that prohibited campfires in wildlife management areas, wildlife and environmental areas and all other lands it manages.

Campfires are again allowed in designated areas. For rules and regulations pertaining to individual wildlife management areas, campers are asked to visit [MyFWC.com/Hunting](http://MyFWC.com/Hunting) and click on "WMA

brochures."

Though campfires are allowed, the FWC has issued an advisory to remind everyone how important it is to properly manage any campfire to ensure it is under control and completely extinguished when done.

### FWC adds Internet hunter safety course

As a result of public demand, the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) has added a free hunter safety Internet-completion course.

The course will be 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Saturday, July 30, at the Shooting Range at 955 Smith Road in DeFuniak Springs. Students must complete the Internet course before coming to class and

should bring a copy of the final report from the online portion of the course. The final report form does not have to be notarized.

An adult must accompany children under age 16 at all times. Students should bring a pencil and paper with them to take notes.

The hunter safety course is required before anyone born on or after June 1, 1975, can purchase a Florida hunting license. The FWC course satisfies hunter-safety training requirements for all other states and Canadian provinces.

He was out of the military when he was hurt in the accident. Doctors thought he wouldn't survive, and Henderson said he is thankful to be alive.

"As long as you've got some life in you, you've got to work with what God left you, work with what you've got," he said. "You're still here. God left you here for a reason. God left something for you to accomplish in this world."

This year he plans to compete in a nine-ball pool game, bowling, wheelchair relay, wheelchair slalom and a 200-meter wheelchair race.

Henderson said he tries to reach people as a motivational speaker and through peer counseling, and he said those who are facing difficult times and need someone to talk to for motivation can call him.

He also tries to set an example to children he teaches at his church.

"I always try to show a positive influence, so they will never stop ... there is always a way around the obstacle in life."

Henderson said he understands life isn't always easy. "You're going to have your ups and down. You're going to get knocked down, but don't let yourself get knocked out," he said.

About four years ago his wife died, and about two years ago his son was killed while serving in Afghanistan.

Being in the presence of so many veterans during the competition last year was overwhelming, he said, and some days are harder than others.

"It's a hard fight now ... I hurt every day. It's part of my life. I can't let it get me down."


What could be better than fresh produce from your garden, your neighbor or the Farmers Market?



# Minutes count, even in pet emergencies

Minutes can mean the difference between life and death when an emergency arises, and a walk around the block or a hike through the woods could be dangerous or even prove fatal if you lack the right knowledge to care for a pet in an emergency.

Dr. Sonya Gordon, associate professor at Texas A&M University's College of Veterinary Medicine & Biomedical Sciences gives pet owners some tips on taking care of an animal when time is limited.

Anytime a pet is hit by a motorized vehicle, it should be taken immediately to a veterinarian.

"Dogs and cats do not have the ability to tell us where it hurts, and there may be internal problems that cannot be noticed by the owner," Gordon said.

When the damage caused by an accident leaves the pet immobile, Gordon suggests using a large towel or heavy blanket held tightly to simulate a stretcher to carry the animal. Never pick up an injured animal and hold it unless it is very small and can be sufficiently restrained.

It is important to be careful when working around injured animals that are in pain, because they might accidentally bite or become aggressive, even toward their owner.

Remember to keep the pet warm and use clean fabric, like a towel,

bandage or T-shirt, to cover any open wounds. This will help keep the wound clean and allow the blood to clot to help limit bleeding.

If there is profuse bleeding from a wound, firmly apply a clean towel or other fabric to the area and apply continuous pressure.

"It is best not to use a tourniquet, but if one is applied, release it every 10 minutes," Gordon said.

Danger can also occur on hiking and camping trips, and immediate veterinary care might not be available. If a pet receives an open wound during the journey, use clean tepid water to cleanse the area. Dishwashing liquid, detergents, astringents and alcohol are too abrasive for use on open wounds and can cause additional damage to the tissue.

A veterinarian should treat any infections that arise. Gordon advises against administering any human pain relievers or other medications to an animal unless directed by a veterinarian, because many human drugs are not safe for animals.

While exploring the great outdoors, be wary of snakes. If an owner suspects a pet has been bitten by a venomous snake, try to identify the location of the bite. If possible, identify the type of snake (take a picture with your phone if possible).

Face and neck bites are by far the

most serious and require immediate veterinary care because severe swelling in this area can cause difficulty breathing.

"Ice packs will help control the swelling and blood vessel dilation that allows the venom to spread," Gordon said.

Lakes and the ocean can present problems if a pet falls in and is not a strong swimmer. It is best to buy a lifejacket for your pet to wear when participating in water activities such as boating.

If traveling to a natural setting, it is best to bring a lot of water as well as a leash, even if the pet is well trained to follow verbal commands.

"Pets and humans both require a lot of water, and leashes provide important restraint in case an owner needs to control their pet in a dangerous situation," Gordon said.

Gordon said dangerous situations can also arise inside a house. Hazardous chemicals and all medications should be kept out of reach at all times.

"Pets are like young children, and the same precautions should be taken with both," Gordon said.

# Heat around 100? What's the big deal?

Residents of the South are used to hot weather, so the reaction down here about people in other parts of the U.S. suffering under 90- and 100-degree weather might be akin to our having to endure mocking about the trouble we have dealing with cold winter days.

But extreme weather is no laughing matter. The human body is resilient, but without the right precautions, there are limits to what we can handle. So while we

might find it odd that temperatures in the high 80s and 90s prove fatal to residents in northern states, it happens more often than many of us think.

The National Oceanographic and Atmospheric Administration, the federal agency that runs the National Weather Service, reports that more people die of heat exposure, about 1,500 a year, than any other weather-related cause.

The deaths should remind us that not to take higher temperatures lightly.

It doesn't hurt to brush up on tips for dealing with heat.

For example, keep fluid intake high, but eat less meat and other proteins. NOAA notes that metabolism raises body temperature.

The agency also reminds us that obese people are more susceptible to heat-related problems, as are older people, children and people with certain medical conditions or taking certain medications.

A pharmacist can help people if the medicine

they taking could create problems dealing with the heat. Alcohol also affects the body's ability to stay cool. Even a cool beer could create problems, so drinking should be reduced.

Restrict activities during the hottest parts of the day. And stay in the coolest places possible. That might not be inside the house. People without cooling units at home should get out; they can go to a mall or other store where they can window shop while waiting for the sun and temperatures to go down.

Well, it got me to thinking about our

interactions with God and man. How often I buck (I DO refrain from kicking and spitting, though) when faced with a chore or challenge I don't want to do. And it reminded me how often we just want our own way – you know, like two year olds.

What brings this story to this week's Editor's Life is my quirky thought process that made me ask if there were parallels in Scripture. And, of course, there are! My favorite, because I can really identify both with the emotion and with the stubbornness and pure cussedness of the whole situation is Moses getting water from the rock during the Exodus. Now, I would imagine in 40 years of desert travel, Moses got water from rocks hundreds of times, but I think you know the one I mean.

Faced with a congregation of whining Israelites insisting on their terrible thirst, Moses loses his temper.

Truth is, we would be happier if we took God's directive seriously from the beginning and approached every situation with love. We would get better results and expend a lot less energy than in kicking and bucking, wouldn't we?

And, lest we think God is not serious in urging us to this approach, consider the consequences for Moses. We're told it is this episode of tantrum that barred him from setting foot in the Promised Land. Wow.

Think about it. Pray about it.

## Devil damn! Learning to control your speech

While sitting around the breakfast table at a local restaurant with my weekly breakfast buddies, the subject of our life before Christ came up.

Someone shared how their speech changed when Christ came in, and they became a new creation in Christ (2 Corinthians 5:17). So I thought, what would happen if when we hear someone use a derogatory word such as "damn" with "God" as a prefix, if we would just say "Devil damn!" and just act normal, like that was part of our normal vocabulary?

I have this very strong feeling that the one who had abused the name of God would say, "What did you just say?" To which I would say, "You just cursed my Father, so I cursed yours."

Then they will get all offended and say, "Are you calling me a child of the devil?"

To which I can then say, "No you just did, that would be the only reason you would have cursed God, according to the scriptures. 1 John 3:10 declares, 'In this the children of God and the children of the devil are manifest: Whoever does not practice righteousness is not of God, nor is he who does not love his brother.'" 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## Acceptance of gays splits Lutheran sects

**NEW YORK (AP)** — The latest casualty of the long-running Protestant conflicts over the Bible and homosexuality is a massive network of social service agencies that work in areas ranging from adoption to disaster relief.

The theologically conservative Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod announced this week that direct work with its larger and more liberal counterpart, the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, has become "difficult if not impossible," because of doctrinal differences, including the 2009 decision by liberal Lutherans to lift barriers for ordaining gays and lesbians.

Neither denomination would discuss the potential financial impact Wednesday. Many Lutheran-affiliated agencies receive substantial state and federal money through contracts and grants that would not be directly affected by any split. However, similar to Catholic Charities, Lutheran agencies are some of the biggest service providers in their communities and have been struggling to meet increased demand for help during the recession.

Just one of the joint

Lutheran agencies, Lutheran Services in America, said on its website that it encompasses more than 300 health and human services organizations with a combined annual budget of more than \$16 billion.

"We recognize that this is a difficult issue. It's complicated," said the Rev. Herb Mueller, first vice president of the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod, based in St. Louis. "We're trying to take a nuanced and caring approach to all of these situations that's also faithful to what the Bible teaches on these issues."

The Rev. Donald McCoid, an ecumenical officer for the Chicago-based Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, said, "We are deeply concerned about the ministries of care that may be challenged by the recent action of The Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod."

The Lutherans are among several church groups facing fallout over recent steps toward accepting same-sex relationships. The Episcopal Church caused an uproar among fellow Anglicans worldwide in 2003 by consecrating the first openly gay bishop, V. Gene Robinson of New

Hampshire. Just this month, the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) formally lifted the celibacy requirement for unmarried clergy, striking down an obstacle to gay and lesbian ordination.

The situation for Lutherans differed in that decades of splits and mergers had already largely divided the religious community along theological lines. The Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, with about 4.5 million members, was formed from church bodies with Danish, Finnish, German and Swedish backgrounds. The merger that led to its latest incarnation occurred in 1988.

Yet, even with separate denominations, Lutherans continued to work together in a wide range of joint ministries such as Lutheran Disaster Response, Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Service and Lutheran World Relief. Among the cooperative agencies are organizations that offer health care to senior citizens, support for the disabled, job training, tutoring and housing, along with finding homes for foster children. Mueller said in an interview that

81 of the 120 recognized service organizations of the Missouri Synod cooperate in some way with the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America. Twenty-two of the agencies offer adoption services or foster care, he said.

The 2.3 million-member Missouri Synod has been studying the issue for more than a year through its Committee on Theology and Church Relations. This week, the panel issued a 15-page document of guidelines for churches, congregants and ministries on how they should decide whether to continue direct joint work with the Chicago-based Lutherans.

The Missouri Synod theology committee said members of its denomination should examine whether joint cooperative agencies:

- Adopt operational principles "alien or contrary" to Scripture.

- Hire staff or a leader "whose lifestyle is scandalous or openly and unrepentantly sinful."

- Have board members overseeing an agency who "become conflicted because of differing beliefs."

- Have leaders or staff who advocate policies "contrary to the Christian faith."

# State sets tax 'holiday' August 12 through 14

Florida has once again established a tax holiday aimed specifically at helping with back-to-school purchases. This year, the holiday is set from August 12 through August 14.

Florida law directs that no sales tax or local option taxes (also known as discretionary sales surtax) will be collected on sales of clothing, footwear, and certain

accessories selling for \$75 or less, or on certain school supplies selling for \$15 or less during the three-day tax exemption.

The exemption does not apply to any item of clothing selling for more than \$75, or to any school supply item selling for more than \$15.

Books are not exempt from tax during the 2011 Sales Tax Holiday.

"Clothing" means any

article of wearing apparel, including all footwear (except skis, swim fins, roller blades, and skates) intended to be worn on or about the human body. However, "clothing" does not include watches, watchbands, jewelry, umbrellas, handkerchiefs, or sporting equipment. A representative list of items is included in this publication.

"School supplies"

means pens, pencils, erasers, crayons, notebooks, notebook filler paper, legal pads, binders, lunch boxes, construction paper, markers, folders, poster board, composition books, poster paper, scissors, cellophane tape, glue, paste, rulers, computer disks, protractors, compasses, and calculators.

Items normally sold as a unit must continue to be sold in that manner. They cannot be a unit separately priced and sold as individual items in order to obtain the sales tax exemption. Example 1: A pair of shoes normally sells for \$80. The pair of shoes cannot be split up in order to sell each shoe for \$40 to qualify for the exemption. Example 2: A suit is normally priced at \$150 on a single price tag. The suit cannot be split into two separate

articles so that each piece may be sold for \$75 or less in order to qualify for the exemption. However, items that are normally priced as separate items may continue to be sold as separate items and qualify for the exemption if the price of the item is \$75 or less. Example 3: A pen and pencil set is normally priced at \$18 on a single price tag. The set cannot be split into separate items so that either of the items may be sold for \$15 or less in

order to qualify for the exemption.

The total price of items advertised as "buy one, get one free," or "buy one, get one for a reduced price," cannot be averaged in order for both items to qualify for the exemption.

For this exemption layaway items will qualify if items are bought using the retailer's layaway policy and the final payment is made during or after the exemption period.

## Washington/Holmes County District Student dress codes

Dresses skirts, shorts and skorts must be mid-thigh or longer.

Baggy clothes, extremely tight clothes, tank tops, cut out sleeves, or spaghetti straps, and clothes that expose the midriff are prohibited. Tops must be capable of being tucked in when and must be shoulder width.

Body piercing jewelry other than earrings may not be worn.

Personal appearance of attire that interferes with or distracts from instructional programs or creates a health hazard is not acceptable.

The practice of wearing jeans or any other clothing with holes in them above the knee will not be permitted.

The wearing of a blouse that exposes the students cleavage is inappropriate for the school environment.

The practice of wearing pajamas and household slippers will not be permitted.



# State health officials issue needed immunizations

According to public health officials, immunization requirements are as follows:

The last dose in the inactivated poliovirus Vaccine (IPV) series should be administered on or after the fourth birthday, and at least six months after the previous dose. If a child received all 4 doses prior to their fourth birthday, an additional dose should **be administered** at age 4 through 6 years. This applies only to kindergarten entry.

Do not invalidate existing DH 680's on file at schools or recall children who are already attending school.

Tdap should be administered, when indicated to meet the 7th grade requirement, regardless of interval since last tetanus or diphtheria toxoid containing vaccine. Medical exemptions for students who received a dose of Td prior to age 11 are no longer required.

Students entering Kindergarten through Grade 3 should have

documentation of two doses of varicella vaccine

Students entering Grade 4 through Grade 10 should have documentation of one dose of Tdap.

Students entering a Florida school for the first time should have documentation of two MMR's

All parents and children should visit their pediatrician or local health department to make sure required immunizations are up to date before school being in August.

## Tips for School Bus Riders

### At the bus stop:

Be responsible for your behavior while going to and waiting at the bus stop.

Stand off the roadway while waiting for the bus.

Respect others property.

Do not push shove or engage in horseplay.

An adult should supervise children at bus stop whenever possible.

Be at the bus stop at least five minutes before the bus is scheduled to arrive.

Wait for the bus at approved locations only.

Get off the bus at an approved location only.

### During Loading and Unloading:

Stay away from the 12 foot "danger zone" around the bus except when the driver tells you to get on or off the bus.

Ask the driver for help if you drop something under or near the bus.

Be sure the driver can see you at all times.

Be sure that clothing

and backpacks have no loose strings or straps that can get caught in the handrails or doors.

Never walk behind the bus.

### During the ride:

Always listen to the driver.

Don't distract the driver unless there is an emergency.


Stay in your seat and keep the aisles clear.




