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County to target \$6 million grant

CHIPLEY — The Washington County Board of County Commissioners reviewed and approved applying for a \$6 million Tiger 3 grant to pave the rest of Washington Boulevard/Hartford Boulevard during their regularly scheduled meeting Monday, August 22.

County Engineer Cliff Knauer said this year's Tiger 3 grant

program is worth \$570 million statewide with only counties, not municipalities, able to apply. The state's pre-application deadline is Oct. 3.

"Last year there wasn't a match required, but this year there's a 20 percent match," Knauer said. "We've got a company willing to provide the necessary match as an escrow."

The company willing to take up the 20 percent is the Florida Landings LLC.

"We are willing to provide the 20 percent no matter how that amount may change," said Scott Henderson, planning team leader for Florida Landings. "The 20 percent would include any railroad work that needs to be done."

County Attorney Jeff Goodman reminded the commission that the county's dog ordinance will be coming up for approval at the September meeting.

In other news, Washington County resident Julius Sheffield asked why Monroe/Sheffield Road wasn't completely paved when the county was repaving the road.

Knauer said the grant they received was only enough to resurface the road where it was paved, and Commissioner Todd Abbott said the board approved to pave the road if they could come up

TIGERS ON THE HUNT

CHIPLEY — Coaches usually bristle at being called favorites to win a district championship, but Rob Armstrong is using it as motivation.

The Tigers enter a new season looking to take the next step in Armstrong's rebuilding of the program. Chipley was 0-10 the season before Armstrong took over and has gone 5-5 and 6-4

since. Optimism is high with an offense ready to explode and experience throughout the lineup.

Preseason talk from other coaches in the division was to "watch out for Chipley," Armstrong, ever the wary coach, said there's potential, but that it only takes you so far.

"We do feel good about where we are and with the kids we have returning," Armstrong said. "I feel good about our chances and we're

Former state attorney announces candidacy

PANAMA CITY — With a group of supporters gathered at the foot of the steps of the Bay County Courthouse, former 14th Judicial Circuit State Attorney Jim Appelman announced

Tuesday what many observers already knew: He wants his office back.

Over the past several months, Appelman made no secret of his intention to run for election for state attorney, an office he held between 1980 and 2004. Nor did he make any secret of his dissatisfaction with the current officeholder, State Attorney Glenn Hess, who was elected in 2008.

Appelman was critical of Hess' leadership, noting that seven prosecutors have left the office since January and saying the State Attorney's Office is led through intimidation and manipulation. He said turnover rates among prosecutors in Hess' office are among the highest in the state.

"Success in the courtroom is essential in lowering our crime rate and increasing our conviction rate," Appelman said during a brief speech. He gave a similar speech Tuesday morning in Jackson County.

Hess, Appelman said, has held the highest law enforcement position in six counties during a time when crime has risen and conviction rates have declined. Conviction rates are considered by some observers to be a measure of a prosecutor's effectiveness. If elected, his primary goals would be to improve the circuit's conviction rate and decrease the crime rate, Appelman said.

Washington County teacher evaluations evolve

CHIPLEY — The Washington County School District's Pat Collins gave a presentation on Race to the Top during the School Board's regularly scheduled meeting Aug. 8.

"The Profound Performance Appraisal System Requirements are going to be focused on student

growth and achievement, address job specificity, correlate to professional standards and promote individual growth. The standards are planned using a year-long system based on the premise of no surprises," Collins said.

"The reason for this change is because of Senate Bill 736 (Student Success Act), Florida Statute 1012.34, aligned with the new Florida Educator Accomplishment Practices (FEAPS) and performance appraisal results

to be reported to the Department of Education on July 1, 2012 and then to the Commissioner, Legislative Leadership and then the Governor on December 1, 2012."

The teacher rating system has changed to Highly Effective, Effective, Needs Improvement/Developing and Unsatisfactory.

"If I were to explain it, Effective would mean their doing their job

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and they're doing it well, which in a grade would be an A, and if they were Highly Effective, (it) means they were going above and beyond the call of duty and an A+ would be their grade," Collins said. "Before, when a teacher received an Unsatisfactory, it was grounds for termination, but now there are procedures put in place to first help these teachers improve."

Collins said the largest number of teachers to receive Unsatisfactory on their evaluations was beginning teachers.

Collins said if a teacher was to receive an Unsatisfactory, "there must be written support regarding how performance is to be improved. The rating of Unsatisfactory indicates performance that is not acceptable for continued employment provided that level of service continues. An employee receiving this rating should be notified that future performance as-

essments will be conducted according to the Department of Education Professional Practices Services Section NEAT procedures. Continued performance at this level should result in notice of termination when the rights of due process and just cause are evident. School districts should remain particularly sensitive to the appeal rights of employees identified in 1012.34, F.S.

"The probationary contract has been extended from 90 days to a year. The annual contract is a period of no longer than one school year and may be awarded or not awarded without cause and advanced degrees, as of July 1, 2011, will not be paid unless the degree is held in the area of certification," she said.

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Appleman said that to mask a declining conviction rate, Hess has engaged in manipulation of statistical data and his office is being investigated by the Office of State Court Administrators (OSCA).

OSCA performed an audit of case disposition reporting earlier this year to the Clerk of Courts. The audit was in response to Appleman's inquiries about the way prosecutors were coding cases.

Several cases prosecutors had lost were filed with the clerk using codes that wouldn't have a negative effect on the office's conviction rate. The results of the audit are expected later this year. Hess released a statement Tuesday saying he was not worried the results of audit would affect his conviction rate.

Appleman said he would be a better

steward of taxpayer money and criticized Hess' spending, which he said included \$1 million annually for administrative purposes, money that goes to "individuals who are not doing anything to assist us in lowering crime."

He criticized Hess for spending \$70,000 on public relations and for giving his secretary a raise in July that increased her wage to a level higher than all but 10 prosecutors.

Hess couldn't be reached Tuesday to respond to Appleman's comments but addressed the campaign in his statement.

"The issue in this race is going to be whether we go back to the Appleman years. I promised to build a better prosecutor's office. I'm proud of what we have accomplished," Hess said in the statement.

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very optimistic. It's on us now to get it done."

Armstrong has reason for confidence when he looks at his Wing-T offense. It begins up front for the Tigers, who return four players on the offensive line with starting experience in each of Armstrong's two seasons.

The line is bolstered by big tackles Taylor Smelcer and Cole Western, who each stand 6-foot-4. Smelcer, a senior, weighs 300 pounds, and Western, a junior, is closing in at 290. They convene with senior Garrett Enfinger and junior Hunter Brock at guard, with each listed at 250. Sophomore center Tyler Daniels is the lone player without measurable experience.

"That's our strength right there," Armstrong said.

The group will block for new starting running back Jordan McKinnie and fullback James Voorhees. The seniors split time last season behind Johnny Watford and will carry the load. Depth behind them is an issue.

Armstrong isn't overly concerned how they will flourish as primary ball carriers given the return of three-year starting quarterback Josh Myers to orchestrate the unit. Now a senior, the 6-1, 215-pounder adds to the optimism.

"He's a good athlete, a big, strong kid," Armstrong said. "He's a complete athlete, plays baseball and basketball and has scored a lot of touchdowns for us."

Myers also will play at linebacker, along with Voorhees and McKinnie. Voorhees could be used at defensive back.

"We're still hunting linebackers and safeties," Armstrong said. "We have a lot of kids who got a lot of downs. I wouldn't say it's a weakness necessarily, we just have some holes to fill."

Chipley's schedule will aid in that regard, giving the Tigers plenty of time to see what works and what doesn't on defense to match what is expected to be a high-scoring offense. The Tigers don't play their first district game until Oct. 7, which is six weeks into the season.

"We don't have to be as good as we need to be in Week 1," Armstrong said. "We want to win them all, but we have the stars on the ones we got to win. It's about what we do tomorrow, the next day, a week from now and how we (improve) from here until then."

with \$30,000 to do so, but the money was unavailable.

The board approved Commissioner Hulan Carter's recommendation to address the Sunny Hills Municipal Services Benefits Unit (MSBU) by appointing Sal Zurica and Chuck Ward to appoint two more members each, dissolve Roger Hagan's involvement and advertise for a meeting in September.

The board approved of Abbott's recommendation to save the county an average of \$297.02 per month and an average of \$3,564.24 per year by switching from Sprint to Verizon phones.

The board agreed to allow County Manager Steve Joyner, Supervisor of Elections Carol Griffin and Commissioner Charles Brock to look into possible property in New Hope to build a voting precinct.

Joyner requested that he and Goodman get together with Bay Medical to go into negotiations about the medical bill of more than \$210,000 for one inmate.

Deputy Clerk Dianne Glasgow said the current health insurance provider usually reimburses the county for in-

mate health expenses, but in this case, they're wanting a \$35,000 deductible before they'll even look at the case.

Brock was approved to pave in front of Campbell Park from Sugar Dollar Road to State Road 79 for \$17,000 from his district's funds.

Abbott said he needed to be replaced on the Tri-County Board.

"I will not attend any more of those meetings," Abbott said. "I understand someone needs to replace me because I have attended the last meeting I'm going to attend."

Abbott said he also needed to be replaced as Chair of the Transportation for the Disadvantaged.

"I didn't even know I was a member of that board, let alone their chair," Abbott said. "I just received a package one day from them and it said 'to the Chair of the Transportation of the Disadvantaged,' and it had my name on it."

The next Board of County Commissioners workshop is scheduled for 9 a.m. Sept. 12, and the next regularly scheduled meeting is set for 9 a.m. Sept. 26.
