

Greyhound owner pleads guilty

CHIPLEY — After a year in jail, Ronald "Ronnie" John Williams Jr. did not expect leniency from the court Thursday when he pleaded guilty to the starvation of 42 greyhounds in their kennels at Ebro Greyhound Park. He did not get any.

Williams offered a straight-up, non-negotiated guilty plea to 39 counts of felony animal cruelty, with the condition of retaining his right to appeal in order to dismiss the case on constitutional grounds. Circuit Court Judge Christopher Patterson accepted the plea and sentenced Williams to five years in prison for each count, the

maximum under state law, to be served concurrently, the same penalty as was recommended in Williams' plea. He did not ask for and was not granted credit for the almost one year he has spent behind bars at the Washington County Jail.

"This court finds you guilty on each and every count announced on the record here today," Patterson said.

Three counts were dismissed in

the courtroom Thursday because necropsies on three dogs showed they had been euthanized in accordance with track procedures. Their bodies were found in Williams' kennel by Florida Division of Pari-Mutuel Wagering officials on Oct. 29, 2010, along with the bodies of 34 other dead dogs and five that were alive but severely malnourished.

Scam callers offer computer support

Have you recently received a call from Windows Technical Support? Chances are scammers were trying to target you for what is commonly referred to as the "Windows Support Telephone Scam."

According to a report to the Washington county Sheriff's Office, people are being conned into letting scammers take control of their computers.

The first thing to remember is that the scammers are extremely convincing, play on fears of people

and hook even the most suspicious. There are a number of things you can do to safeguard yourself if you receive this call.

- Don't do anything they ask.
- Don't go to any website they request you access.
- Don't let them access your PC remotely (you will be prompted before this happens).
- Don't give them any money.

If you received this call and gave out personal information or control of your computer, don't panic. Unplug your router and reboot your computer immediately. Perform

a full and comprehensive virus scan on your PC. If you have more than one virus scanner, use both.

Run any anti-spyware or malware tools you have, and change all passwords.

Finally, place a stop on any credit or debit cards that have ever been used on the Internet on that machine.

If you believe your personal or financial information have been compromised, contact WCSO's fraud hotline, 638-8477, for additional information to prevent identity theft.

said State Attorney Glenn Hess, who stood before the judge as Williams entered his guilty plea.

Veterinarians who performed the necropsies found the remaining dogs died from denial of food and water beginning on or near Oct. 1, 2010, and lasting until they were found or had died. Three of the dogs also had duct tape around their necks, suggesting they might not have been able to breathe properly.

"The dogs perished through absolute starvation," Hess said.

Hess said he was satisfied with the conclusion of the case that has flooded his office with mail and brought nationwide scrutiny. Though many animal lovers will not be content with the punishment handed down, Hess said it was appropriate under the law.

"This is a sentence that is above the guidelines of 59 months, and it is proportionately more than double what Michael Vick got," Hess said, referring to the NFL quarterback.

Concurrent sentencing is standard practice when multiple crimes are committed simultaneously, Hess said. For instance, if someone steals a lawn mower and then takes it to the pawn shop and sells it, two separate incidents occurred and sentencing would be consecutive. However, if someone breaks into a house and steals a TV, only one incident occurred and sentencing on burglary and grand theft charges would be concurrent.

Mark Hess, who is not related to the state attorney, said he was disappointed in the sentencing and had expected the terms to run consecutively.

"We expected him to be found guilty, but we don't really feel that the punishment matched the crime," he said.

Negotiations had been ongoing between Williams and his attorney, Deputy Public Defender Floyd Griffith, and the State Attorney's Office for several months, said Glenn Hess, who learned of Williams' intent to plead guilty Wednesday.

Griffith declined to comment on the case.

A racing season has come and gone at Ebro Greyhound Park without incident, Mark Hess said, but new measures have

been put in place to ensure a lapse in oversight does not happen again. Although the kennels are routinely inspected by racing officials during the season, Mark Hess said previously there were no procedures for inspecting the kennels after racing season ended and before the deadline to have dogs removed from the property. Now the kennels are under 24/7 security and are inspected daily during that buffer period.

The five dogs that survived Williams' kennel have been kept as evidence at Ebro since they were released from the care of a veterinarian. Mark Hess said the park still has the dogs and they are doing well, but he suspects they will be released to waiting adoptive families in the near future.

World's Top Coin Collectors in Town Next Week to Purchase All Types of Coins!

ICCA will be placing ads in newspapers, radio and running television spots this week asking people to bring in any old silver and gold coins made before 1970. Those that bring in their coins will be able to speak with collectors one on one and have their coins looked at by a specialist. With the help of these ICCA members, offers will be made to those that have coins made before 1970. Offers will be made based on silver or gold content and the rarity of the coins. All coins made before 1970 will be examined and purchased including gold coins, silver coins, silver dollars, all types of nickels and pennies. Those that decide to sell their coins will be paid on the spot.

If you are like a lot of people you might have a few old coins or even a coffee can full lying around. If you have ever wondered what they are worth now might be your chance to find out and even sell them if you choose. They could be worth a lot according to the International Coin Collectors Association also known as ICCA. Collectors will pay a fortune for some coins and currency for their collections. If it is rare enough, one coin could be worth over \$100,000 according to Eric Helms, coin collector and ICCA member. One ultra rare dime, an 1894S Barber, sold for a record \$1.9 million to a collector in July of 2007. While that is an extreme example, many rare and valuable coins are stashed away in dresser drawers or lock boxes around the country. The ICCA and its collector members have organized a traveling event in search of all types of coins and currency. Even common coins can be worth a significant amount due to the high price of silver and gold, says Helms. Washington quarters and Roosevelt dimes can be worth many times their face value. Recent silver markets have driven the price up on common coins made of silver. Helms explains that all half dollars, quarters and dimes made before 1965 contain 90% silver and are sought after any time silver prices rise. Right now it's a sellers market he said.

The rarest coins these collectors are looking for include \$20, \$10, \$5 and \$2 1/2 gold coins and any coin made before 1850. These coins

always bring big premiums according to the ICCA. Silver dollars are also very sought after nowadays.

Other types of items the ICCA will be purchasing during this event include U.S. currency, gold bullion, investment gold, silver bars, silver rounds, proof sets, etc. Even foreign coins are sought after and will be purchased.

Also at this event anyone can sell their gold jewelry, dental gold or anything made of gold on the spot. Gold is currently trading at Record Highs. Bring anything you think might be gold and the collectors will examine, test and price it for free. If you decide to sell, you will be paid on the spot – it has been an unknown fact that coin dealers have always paid more for jewelry and scrap gold than other jewelers and pawn brokers.

So whether you have one coin you think might be valuable or a large collection you recently inherited, you can talk to these collectors for free. If you're lucky you may have a rarity worth thousands. Either way there is nothing to lose and it sounds like fun!

Corrections, law enforcement classes coming to WHTC

CHIPLEY — The Criminal Justice Program at the Washington-Holmes Technical Center will be offering open enrollment to its day and night Basic Recruit Corrections Academy. Students who successfully complete the training program will be eligible to become Florida-certified law enforcement officers.

Daytime, full-time classes will meet from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday through Thursday. The course is an average starting salary of approximately \$30,000 a year.

In order to spread the cost of the academy, WHTC offers a pay-by-the-course option. The night academy meets four days a week (Monday through Thursday) instead of the traditional five-day academies. This allows students more flexibility to work, conduct business and spend time with their families.

The Criminal Justice Program will offer a full-time and part-time law enforcement academy. Students who successfully complete the training program will be eligible to become Florida-certified law enforcement officers.

Full-time classes begin Nov. 2 with a registration deadline of Nov. 1. Part-time classes begin Nov. 1 with a registration deadline of Oct. 31.



Kiwanis updated on economic conditions

At its weekly luncheon, the Kiwanis Club of Chipley was provided an update on evolving economic conditions regionally and nationally by Kiwanian Jim Town, who presented slides from a conference in Atlanta in late September.

Town reported that while there are some encouraging trends such as the decline in initial unemployment claims and increased production and shipping of products in the primary manufacturing industries, across the board economic recovery has not yet started occurring throughout the Southeast region.

Unemployment remains a major factor delaying economic recovery, with a recent report by the Atlanta Federal Reserve District Bank showing projected unemployment at about 8.7 percent on Dec. 31, 2012, or

some 14 months from now. Long-term unemployment is a continuing concern as in August 2011 almost 43 percent of those unemployed in the Southeast have been unemployed more than 27 weeks. The previous highest long-term unemployment high had been in 1984 at 26 percent of the unemployed past 27 weeks.

Businesses are reporting that they are hiring short-term temporary workers for specific projects rather than adding full-time employees. Production per employee (productivity index) still continues to improve as businesses maintain sales with fewer employees, which has been possible in some cases due to improved technology applications and more intensive management attention. A disturbing trend confirmed by recent

surveys by the Federal Reserve is that businesses are actively recruiting currently employed workers with certain skills, rather than recruiting the already unemployed. Employers are also reporting that lower wage positions are not being filled because applicants are unable to pass basic aptitude, criminal, credit, and drug tests.

A recent study by the Atlanta Federal Reserve bank indicates that the gap in unemployment has widened between people with less than a high school education and those who graduated high school or obtained further degrees. As an example, in June 1992, the rate of unemployment by college graduates was 3.5 percent while in June 2010, it was 4.5 percent. Among those with less than a high school diploma, the 1992 survey showed 11.5 percent

unemployed, but in June of 2010, that had increased to 14.5 percent. There is a direct relationship between education level achieved and the possibility of unemployment with those with more education showing a significantly lower unemployment rate through economic cycles in the last 20 years.

Of the states in the Atlanta Federal Reserve Region, Florida has the highest unemployment rate at 10.7 percent while the U.S. Average is 9.1 percent. Due to the energy industries, Louisiana has the lowest unemployment in the region at 7.3 percent. While the Florida trend is down from a peak in December 2010 of 12 percent unemployed, the rate at which unemployment is declining is very slow.
