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# Vernon Council: Enough is enough

## City seeks better solution to broken utility lines

**VERNON** — Vernon is on its second boil water notice in the last week alone, and council member Trey Hawkins says enough is enough.

“We’ve got to do something about these contractors continually hitting our utility lines,” Hawkins said during the Vernon City Council’s regularly scheduled

meeting Oct. 24.

“This is the second time this week that we’ve got businesses and citizens to go without water.”

Hawkins asked Attorney Kerry Adkison if there was a billing policy they could come up with so every time contractors hit a utility line, they would have to pay.

“We can help them find these lines, but talking doesn’t seem to be working anymore,” Hawkins said. “Maybe if they had to pay each time they hit a line, they’d be a little more careful.”

Adkison agreed to look into what the city could arrange.

City Grant Writer Nolan Baker sought permission to continue to seek more energy grants needed to make city hall more

energy-efficient.

The council approved to use grant money to replace five of their heating and cooling units for more energy-efficient ones and to use the old ones to temporarily replace other, less functional units until more grant money can be secured to upgrade those as well.

The council also approved of a grant to repair some of the city hall’s roof and to use liquid latex to insulate it.

Hawkins requested that Baker look into splitting up the bids in an effort to save money: one bid for the roof work and the other for the latex coating. Baker said he would present his findings to the council during a special called workshop at 4:30 p.m. Nov. 1.

The council also approved of not including water meters in the water line replacement grant because the request was denied by the state.

The American Wrestling Federation requested a chance to return to Vernon for a fundraiser to benefit the city.


“They said they’ve got quite the fan base here and would love to put on a fundraiser event to help the city,” Hawkins said. “They would love to help the city, and they love doing what they do.”

The council approved of allowing the wrestling company to return. One possible project the money could go toward is

## United Way campaign reaches out

As United Way begins to wrap up the year’s campaign, Ron Sharpe, Regional Director of Resource Development for United Way, continues his efforts to communicate local agencies’ need for community involvement.

Each year, businesses in Bay, Calhoun, Holmes, Gulf, Jackson, and Washington counties participate in a workplace cam-

paign from September through November. During the workplace campaign, employees are asked to donate to their favorite non-profit organization through payroll deduction.

“As I travel about in our outer counties, I am asked many great questions about our agencies and their impact in those markets,” Sharpe said. “Last year, through the partnership from our 54 agencies, we have served over 155,000 citizens or over 55 percent of or total population in our six-county area.”

Washington County Council on Aging provided more than 21,200 hours of in-home services last

year, from respite to companion and personal care. They serve more than 170 seniors, with more than 24,650 meals served.

Catholic Charities assisted Holmes County with rent, utilities, water and gas through the Homeless Prevention and Rapid Re-Housing funds, totaling \$47,158.41 from Oct. 19, 2009, to June 14, 2011. This help went beyond just emergency assistance, involving comprehensive case management through a social worker who is local to Holmes and Washington counties. Many of the contacts with individuals

replacing Christmas decorations that go on the light poles every season.

Hal Kirk was present to discuss an injunction placed on him concerning Wayside Park. Adkison said there was an issue with a wire barrier being placed, preventing access to the park.

Kirk denied that there was a barrier and said if there is, it wasn't by his doing and he didn't approve of it.

Adkison said if they were in agreement that there shouldn't be a barrier, then the injunction would be lifted, and if there was a barrier, it would be removed by the city.

"If there was a barrier ever placed, it would've only been out of concern for those kids that go down there," Kirk said. "There's no telling when something's going to happen to one of them because of the horrible shape that park's in."

During the Oct. 11 meeting, Kirk had requested the council consider releasing the city's deed to Wayside Park so he could take ownership of the property. Kirk presented deeds to the property and discussed his plan for improving the park.

The council approved of the city putting out for bid to buy a floor buffer for no more than \$500, and if the buffer could be bought, then bidding out to buy buffer pads for no more than \$200 for an assortment of pads for buffing, cleaning, sanding, polishing, etc.

Also approved was the consent agenda, which includes CDG engineering contract for energy grant; Fred Fox Enterprise contract for administration of energy grant; funds \$25,000 from City Hall to Water Sewer Fund; payment of past due funds, \$18,644.22 to Waste Management; payment of past due funds, \$4,260.60, to CDG Engineering; \$700 for candy for Trick or Treat on Saturday, Oct. 29 from 5:30-7:30 p.m.; and Fire Chief's agreement.

and families were home visits. For just electric assistance, \$11,836.60 was provided to 37 Holmes County residents to turn or keep their lights on.

"Regarding Holmes County families helped through the HPRP program, the one that immediately comes to mind is Jane," said Jody Shafer, the social worker who provided HPRP assistance in Holmes County. "When Jane contacted Catholic Charities for assistance, she had relocated to Holmes County with her young children. Jane was in a domestically violent situation in south Florida and made the decision to leave her partner/father of her children and move to Holmes County to be near her family.

"Jane and her children were

living in the home with extended family for more than six months by the time she applied for assistance. Catholic Charities was able to assist Jane with deposits for her water, electricity and housing. Jane was working two jobs when she applied for assistance. Later, when one of the jobs ended, she found yet another job.

"After the initial financial assistance Catholic Charities provided Jane and her family, the social worker was able to assist her through case management. Jane remained in contact with her HPRP case manager on a regular basis. This comprehensive case management approach went further in linking Jane to additional resources and assistance within the community.

"Jane continues to live in the

same home, continues to work two jobs to make ends meet, and she has maintained the stability garnered through this assistance. She is very proud of her children who, through the crisis, kept their grades up at school and continue to be frequently on the honor roll.

"People have a common misconception that when they give money to United Way that it goes to a single entity," Sharpe said. "But with United Way, you choose not only the county you wish your money to impact, but you can also choose a specific agency in which to help."

Sharpe said a little money could go a long way with agencies.

"There are matching federal money for every dollar spent with

United Way, such as for every dollar given to Meals on Wheels, they can get \$9 in matching federal money; for every dollar given to PVK, there's \$16 in matching funds; and for every dollar given towards Life Management, there's \$40 in matching funds; that's just to name a few local agencies," Sharpe said. "Your little bit can go a long way."

A new service available through United Way is the discount prescription card.

"For those without medical insurance this will allow them 20 percent off brand name drugs and 40 percent off of generic," Sharpe said. "It's just another way for us to assist our community."

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# 8 Panhandle counties to meet for tourism summit

**BLOUNTSTOWN** — There's more to Florida than white sand and emerald green water, and RiverWay South Apalachicola Choc-tawhatchee is trying to bring attention to the great resources offered inland.

The 2011 Rural Tourism Development Summit will

bring together tourism experts and economic development players in Washington, Holmes, Calhoun, Franklin, Gadsden, Gulf, Jackson and Liberty counties this week with the hope of expanding the number of visitors to Florida's tucked-away gems along the Apalachicola and Choc-tawhatchee rivers.

There are three primary categories of rural tourism

— agratourism, ecotourism and cultural or heritage tourism — and all are available in the six-county region, said Jim Brooks, executive director of the Holmes County Development Commission.

The summit will include presentations on programming, public relations and promotion and is partially funded through a grant

from Visit Florida to promote sustainable economic development.

"Rural tourism is considered a sustainable economic development program because it depends on natural resources to raise per capita income," Brooks said.

Rural tourism is low-impact, meaning it does not require a heavy investment in infrastructure or the re-

liance on future sizable investments, RWSAC project manager Sharon Liggett said. It relies largely on businesses that already exist but need help marketing their services. Places like bed and breakfasts, small eateries, historic locations, natural attractions and ecological guides.

"Tourism in Florida has been a staple for economic

development for more than 100 years ... but there are still so many things in Florida's interior that people don't know about," Liggett said. The summit will begin at 8 a.m. Friday at the Panhandle Pioneer Settlement on State 20 in Blountstown. The cost is \$15 and guests can register at [www.rwsfl.org](http://www.rwsfl.org) up until the day of the event.

# Bay unemployment rises

**PANAMA CITY** — Sisyphus pushed the rock up the hill, and it rolled back down.

That myth, where every gain is followed by a loss, mirrors the unemployment rate for Bay County, which rose from 9.5 to 9.7 percent in September.

"I think we are in a holding pattern," said Kim Bodine, executive director of the Gulf Coast Workforce Board. "We're not doing any better, but we're not doing any worse."

Randall Holcombe, a Florida State University professor of economics, said factors keeping unemployment from dropping include policies at the federal level regarding taxes, the Obama administration's health care policy and costs of regulations on business.

"Unemployment benefits were increased from 26 weeks to 99 weeks, which keeps people from looking for jobs," Holcombe added.

Holcombe did say he thought the economy was on the upswing, especially in Florida, where 23,000 jobs were created last month were in Florida.

The good news for Bay County is the unemployment rate has dipped from 10.4 percent in September 2010 to 9.7 percent a year later.

But Bodine cautioned about reading too much into the employment numbers.

"Comparing this season to last year's season is not a great indicator of a trend due to the effect of the oil spill on our tourism industry and the jobs that were in play due to

the cleanup efforts, but if we go back to the 2009 season, we are about 1 percent higher in unemployment year to year," Bodine said in a release. "Overall, Florida job growth appears to be trending in a positive way. We are hopeful that we will steadily move in that direction at the local level."

The unemployment rate in Florida has dropped to 10.6 percent, the lowest since May. Unemployment in Florida from June through August stood at 10.7 percent.

Earlier Friday morning, Gov. Rick Scott announced the state gained an estimated 110,300 private-sector jobs since January. Scott was positive about the job gains, touting that the unemployment numbers have dropped 1.3 percent since he took office in January. Since April, the state unemployment rate has dropped 0.2 percent.

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## CHS alum Zach Jadofsky receives championship ring

**PENSACOLA** — The 2011 NCAA Division II National Champion West Florida baseball team was recognized during the UWF annual alumni weekend Oct. 20-22.

Chipley High School graduate and pitcher Zach Jadofsky was an integral part of the UWF national championship team. Jadofsky finished with a 4-0 record but proved most valuable in numerous innings of relief in the postseason tournaments. Jadofsky pieced together three appearances in the postseason for 11.1 innings with no runs scored, but most impressive was the 3.2 shutout inning while surrendering just one hit and fanning two batters to earn the win in game three of the World Series.

"This past year has just been unbelievable," Jadofsky said. "Going to a great school, playing baseball with a great

bunch of guys and winning this championship, what more could you ask for? It's not every day that you win a national championship, and to be part of this is just amazing. ... I will wear this ring with pride."

After the UWF baseball season, Zach joined the Valley Baseball League in the Shenandoah Valley in Virginia, a collegiate summer baseball league with players from around the country. In his first game with the Woodstock River Bandits, he was spotted by an Atlanta Braves scout and signed as a free agent. For the rest of the summer, Zach pitched for the rookie-level Atlanta Braves team in Orlando. Currently, he is back home substitute teaching in Chipley and Vernon, taking classes online and conducting his off-season workout program in preparation for the upcoming season with the Braves.

## Harmony Primitive predates Bethel

For at least five years, your writer has wanted to write about Harmony Primitive Baptist Church of Christ, located in the city limits of Bonifay somewhere near the

former Blitch's Restaurant, the town's newest Mexican eatery.

Having been reared in the Primitive Baptist


Church Faith, along with parents and grandparents, the prattle had heard of the church and always assumed that it came into being before the founding of Bethel Primitive Baptist and had no idea of when it ceased to exist.

It is rather ironic that this column is being written on Harmony Church just three weeks short of the 99th celebration of its constitution. Old Minutes, presently in possession of Bethel Church, are still in fair condition, easy to read with much of the handwritten record presented in the interesting Old English style, consistent with other writings of that era.

Harmony Primitive Baptist Church was constituted on Nov. 16, 1912, with the record book expressly stating it as being located in Washington County.

Within three years, minutes of meetings were specific in reporting the meeting place as Holmes County, Fla. There was no mention that the boundaries of the two counties had been changed in 1915 with the county line set back southward approximately five miles.

It appears that four male members, J.J. Hicks, A.C. Hicks, W.C. Smothers and E.M. Smothers, along with three female members, Indiana Raley, Della Paul and Amy Sims, were the original founders

Strict discipline, known to be an attribute among primitive Baptist churches, was also observed and practiced at harmony church. Non-attendance by church members was not taken lightly, and a committee was usually appointed to determine the cause of those found to be consistently violating the scriptural commandment, "fail not the assembly of your selves together as the manner of some is." Usually the erring member acknowledged "the error of his ways," asking forgiveness of the church, which was accepted, and full fellowship continued.

The offense of denying the faith was regarded more seriously and usually involved a minister preaching a "heresy" or some lay member actually joining another order or denomination. The investigating committee almost always brought a recommendation of "testing fellowship" and, with a unanimous vote, brought exclusion from the body.

After about 14 years of faithful meetings and seemingly growing in membership and attendance, the old record book showed breaks in the church having their regular assigned weekend meeting. There were incidents where a few members met with some lay member conducting the service and no minister present.

On Aug. 10, 1926, Harmony Church agreed to dissolve the church, granting members "letters of dismission," and asked Bethel Primitive Baptist Church to allow this minutes as well as the full records of the church be placed with them. This action resulted in Bethel now having two complete histories of defunct churches in their files as High Hills Primitive Baptist Church made the same request in November of 1926.


## Bethlehem FFA chapter competes

# Holt helps it look a lot like Christmas

**PANAMA CITY BEACH** — Though the annual candy saturation isn't over just yet, it's already time to start planning for Christmas decorations, according to a prominent area floral designer.

Kirby Holt, owner of Blossoms in Chipley, is a member of the American Institute of Floral Designers (AIFD), which requires three years of testing and a thorough screening process for admission. AIFD members work on projects like the Rose Bowl, the Miss America pageant and presidential inaugurations.

Holt gave a decorating showcase demonstration at Woodlawn Methodist Church on Tuesday at the Holiday Decorator's Showcase put on by the Bay Point Women's Club. It is their first fundraiser of the club's new year, but last year they raised enough to donate more than \$37,000 to various Bay County charities.

Holt recommends beginning holiday decorating in mid-November so the view can be enjoyed the entire month of December. It's also beneficial to complete your decorating before all the parties and shopping start, which take up so much time.

"That's one of the things this show does; it gets people's motors revved up

about getting all their stuff pulled out and decorating the house again," he said. "I've done this show for 14 years. ... I've had people come every year because it helped them get motivated."

Holt said people can avoid a lot of the stress associated with holiday decorating by planning ahead and keeping the decorating fun because, other than the issue of storage, the most common challenge people have with decorating is getting started.

"One of the keys, I think, if people really want to decorate, start early. A lot of people put the tree up after the Thanksgiving meal," he said. "Why not put it up a week before that? Do it before the season gets so crazy."

In about an hour Tuesday, he decorated four Christmas trees, from lights to toppers, and gave tips and tricks on how to make the process easier and faster. Holt used some of the same ideas when he created the table and door arrangements during the showcase.

One of the best ways to speed up the tree-decorating process is using what Holt calls swag — pre-made arrangements of ribbons, leaves, birds or other items — and placing them around the tree before hanging ornaments.

"With permanent floral,

plant material and ribbons, the tree is full before you ever put ornaments on it. You almost don't have to have ornaments. If you

fill the tree up with those elements, it takes not nearly as many ornaments to get this look and it's a lot quicker," he said.

He also said using items such as ribbons, foliage and vines are one of the secrets to designer-style trees.

Holt plans similar demonstrations early next month during Deck the Palms at the Palms Conference Center.

## McCrary, Chipley overpower Bozeman, clinch regional berth

**CHIPLEY** — Bozeman couldn't keep up with Chipley on Friday night. More accurately, the Bucks couldn't keep up with Kobe McCrary.

The Chipley running back rarely had any resistance as he rushed for 310 yards, the majority coming in the first half, and scored five touchdowns in the Tigers' 62-25 rout on their Homecoming night. The victory pushed Chipley to 6-1 overall and 2-0 in District 1-3A, while Bozeman's playoff hopes are over after falling to 2-5, 0-2.

Chipley clinched a playoff berth with the win and Holmes County's victory over South Walton. The teams will play for the district title in Chipley Nov. 4.

"This is big, we haven't been in the playoffs since the seniors were in eighth grade," said McCrary, a sophomore. "We wanted to get there."

McCrary had plenty of room and few defenders in front on TD runs of 84, 26 and 38 yards in the first quarter. He added a 50-yard run midway through the second quarter to stake Chipley to a 35-12 lead. He rushed for 209 yards at that point and added a 49-yard score with less than three minutes to go in the half.

"I just trust in my line and when I see the hole I just go," said McCrary, who had 295 yards in the first half and finished with 17 carries. "I couldn't even imagine having that many yards."

Bozeman responded with scores following McCrary's first two TDs. Joey Brannen capped a 60-yard

drive with a 3-yard run with 5:24 left in the first quarter. Brannen added a 1-yard run on Bozeman's second possession to pull the Bucks within 14-12.

That was as close as they would get the rest of the way, as Chipley held a 42-18 lead at the half. The Tigers failed to score on only one of seven series, and that one ended inside the Bozeman 5 as time expired in the half.

McCrary made short work of a Bozeman run defense that had previously played well in close defeats against Holmes County and Liberty County, both heavy ground offenses.

Ryan McIntyre and Jordan McKinnie also scored twice to further gash the Bucks, who gave up 435 yards on the ground. McIntyre added 150 yards on eight carries.

"They're really good and I think some of our bumps and bruises caught up to us," Bozeman coach Loren Tillman said. "Plus we have to put shoulders on those guys. We can't be arm tackling because that's what happens."

Jacob Martinez paced Bozeman with 83 yards rushing and two second-half TDs. He was 7 for 20 passing for 128 yards and two interceptions.

His output wasn't nearly as dominant as what McCrary displayed. On a night that grew colder by the minute, McCrary was anything but.

"My legs feel like they could run for another 310 yards," he said.

Chipley is at Freeport next week. Bozeman is at Wewahitchka, another team with a potent running attack.

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## Hooked on Outdoors

About this time of the year, most of us receive catalogs from every gun, rod, clothes and bullet manufacturer imaginable. If we bought all the stuff they say we need to hunt and fish, we would have to own at least two pickup trucks and a trailer to haul it to the woods.

The state already expects us to own at least an 18-foot boat to haul all its requirements around. You need a fire extinguisher, a life jacket for everyone in the boat, a throw cushion, some flares, a noise maker, a tag on the boat, a tag on the trailer — and the last two items have to be purchased every year. Let's not forget the boat registration, which must be kept on board along with a fishing license.

After you buy all that, you don't have money to put gas in the boat. Of course, you don't need a fire extinguisher if you are on a boat of less than 26 feet. It seems those boats never catch fire, but if the boat is less than 26 feet and has a double hull, outboard motor and customers for hire, now you need one. The idea behind this is that fuel can become trapped between the double hull and catch on fire. In a 16-foot boat, you don't need a throw cushion either. I guess no one has ever fallen out of such a small boat.

Let me clue you in on something. If gas is trapped between a double-hulled boat, by the time you know you are on fire and find the fire extinguisher, you will be blown halfway to Cuba. And if you are fishing by yourself and fall overboard, just who is going to throw you the throw cushion? But if you are fishing alone and don't have one it's a \$50 fine. Go figure.

It seems the most important thing you can have on a boat of any size is an anchor, but this is never mentioned in what you have to have and what you don't have to have onboard. If you break down, you want to stay exactly where you are on the water. That way someone looking for you will have a reference point to start looking.

If you are broken down in the Gulf and the wind is out of the south and blowing you to the beach, an anchor could save the day and keep you out of the surf. I would say you might need a paddle, but in most boats, this would be useless unless you are trying to kill a snake.

When they say make a checklist before you leave, they really mean it. Whatever happened to the good old days when we just jumped into the boat and went fishing? Be careful: Big Brother is watching.



## Cold weather means more peaceful fishing

If you are looking to flavor your fishing experience with a touch of peace and quiet, cold weather is the time to take to the water.

With hunters readying their rifles for game and the bustling tourist season ebbing away, fall and winter offer an opportune time to enjoy the serenity of Panhandle rivers and bays.

Rex Pennycuff, owner of Fisherman's Choice in Eastpoint, said colder weather eventually drives the trout and redfish deeper in the river, while catfish, pompano and mackerel begin moving farther offshore and into less shallow waters.

Until water temperatures drop off strongly, there's plenty of good fishing to be had, in a less frenetic atmosphere to boot.

Scott Krause, a staffer at Bluewater Outriggers in Port St. Joe, said trout and redfish will continue to be biting through November, right around the time whiting begins to show up in the surf.

"That's what the snowbirds love to fish for down here," Krause said. "They're real good eating."

Pennycuff said sheephead can be found more abundantly around pilings this time of year.

"With sheephead and whiting you pretty much have to use shrimp," said Chris Robinson, who runs Robinson Brothers Guide Service, an inshore fishing charter in Apalachicola.

When fishing around structures like bridge pilings and rock jetties, he recommends a 1-0 circle hook, which he said is good for catching both flounder and sheephead.

Pennycuff said live shrimp don't give fishermen an advantage unless it's harsh weather, with fresh and frozen usually doing the job. And the colder the weather gets, the more likely it will be that these baits will be all that is available.

Krause said whiting and pompano love what some call "fish bites," an artificial bait.

"I say the best thing for winter fishing in general would be to use an artificial lure," Robinson said.

When fishing grass flats and oyster beds with lures close to the surface, Robinson recommends using a mullet imitation lure. He likes the brand MirrOlure. He also recommends using a quarter-ounce Johnson's weedless gold spoon.

For deeper fishing, in waters about 2 to 10 feet deep, Robinson recommends using a jighead from 3/4 ounce to 1/2 ounce in weight and using shrimp imitation lures.

His favorite is the Berkley Gulp. "No matter how many different ones I try, I always go back to that," he said.

In addition to the weather, fishing in colder weather is much more dependent on the tides than at other times of the year, Pennycuff said. "It's best around high tide, where it's warmer and they feed," he said.

Pennycuff said among the best times to fish are when it's a high tide in the morning hours, from 7 to 10 a.m., or from 6 p.m. to dusk.

It's best to fish in the morning in low light, since low light equals early morning bite, Robinson said. Plus it's important to make sure the water is moving while fishing, and to be on the lookout for current flow.

"A lot of people don't understand, but you should always make sure the water is moving," he said. "Check the water flow."

To go after kingfish offshore, Krause suggests lots of bait on a buoy line. "This is just a really good time to fish right now when the weather starts to get cool," he said.

175 yards and a touchdown. Jacky Miles picked up 88 yards on nine carries, including a touchdown.

In the second quarter, South Walton attempted a 47-yard field goal that fell short. Holmes County came back with another strike from Ethan Russ to

Ty Russ for a touchdown and 20-7 lead.

Just before halftime, South Walton put together a seven-play drive with Joe Kopald, who had 82 yards rushing, capping it with a 3-yard plunge. The extra point kick was good for a 20-14 game at the half.

In the third quarter, the Seahawks sputtered on their first possession

and had to punt. Holmes County scored on a catch and run with Jonathan Williams zigzagging for a 36-yard score.

They scored twice more, once on a 4-yard run by Miles and the other on a 9-yard run by Kodi Russ. The Seahawks put up another touchdown midway through the fourth quarter on a 7-yard run by Kopald.

## McCrary, Chipley overpower Bozeman, clinch regional berth

**CHIPLEY** — Bozeman couldn't keep up with Chipley on Friday night. More accurately, the Bucks couldn't keep up with Kobe McCrary.

The Chipley running back rarely had any resistance as he rushed for 310 yards, the majority coming in the first half, and scored five touchdowns in the Tigers' 62-25 rout on their Homecoming night. The victory pushed Chipley to 6-1 overall and 2-0 in District 1-3A, while Bozeman's playoff hopes are over after falling to 2-5, 0-2.

Chipley clinched a playoff berth with the win and Holmes County's victory over South Walton. The teams will play for the district title in Chipley Nov. 4.

"This is big, we haven't been in the playoffs since the seniors were in eighth grade," said McCrary, a sophomore. "We wanted to get there."

McCrary had plenty of room and few defenders in front on TD runs of 84, 26 and 38 yards in the first quarter. He added a 50-yard run midway through the second quarter to stake Chipley to a 35-12 lead. He rushed for 209 yards at that point and added a 49-yard score with less than three minutes to go in the half.

"I just trust in my line and when I see the hole I just go," said McCrary, who had 295 yards in the first half and finished with 17 carries. "I couldn't even imagine having that many yards."

Bozeman responded with scores following McCrary's first two TDs. Joey Brannen capped a 60-yard

drive with a 3-yard run with 5:24 left in the first quarter. Brannen added a 1-yard run on Bozeman's second possession to pull the Bucks within 14-12.

That was as close as they would get the rest of the way, as Chipley held a 42-18 lead at the half. The Tigers failed to score on only one of seven series, and that one ended inside the Bozeman 5 as time expired in the half.

McCrary made short work of a Bozeman run defense that had previously played well in close defeats against Holmes County and Liberty County, both heavy ground offenses.

Ryan McIntyre and Jordan McKinnie also scored twice to further gash the Bucks, who gave up 435 yards on the ground. McIntyre added 150 yards on eight carries.

"They're really good and I think some of our bumps and bruises caught up to us," Bozeman coach Loren Tillman said. "Plus we have to put shoulders on those guys. We can't be arm tackling because that's what happens."

Jacob Martinez paced Bozeman with 83 yards rushing and two second-half TDs. He was 7 for 20 passing for 128 yards and two interceptions.

His output wasn't nearly as dominant as what McCrary displayed. On a night that grew colder by the minute, McCrary was anything but.

"My legs feel like they could run for another 310 yards," he said.

Chipley is at Freeport next week. Bozeman is at Wewahitchka, another team with a potent running attack.

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## JEREMY FREE BRINGS IN NO. 3 FLORIDA BUCK OF THE YEAR

The No. 3 Florida Buck of the Year featured in the September 2011 issue of "Woods 'N Water" was taken this past year by Jeremy Free, of Ponce de Leon, while hunting on private property in Western Holmes County. The buck weighed 170 lbs. toting a 150-inch rack. The huge buck had 23-4/8-inch main beams, seven-4/8-inch G2s, nine-7/8-inch G3s, seven-inch G4s and a single G5 on the right antler. The total for both antlers added up to exactly 68-5/8 inches and the 18-1/8-inch inside spread helped the rack score 155-3/8 inches gross. With only four inches in deductions, Jeremy's Florida trophy buck netted 151-3/8.

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



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

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## Blessed Trinity Catholic Church joins 7,515 in 2011 National Rosary Rally

**BONIFAY** — Blessed Trinity Catholic Church and Knights of the Columbus sponsored this year's National Rosary Rally at Veteran's Park in Bonifay on Oct. 15.

As the world situation becomes increasingly threatening, the idea of holding a Rosary in a public place has become more popular. As human efforts fail to solve our growing economic, social, moral and spiritual troubles, more

people are turning the supernatural solutions: The Fatima message of prayer and penance, and the Holy Rosary of the Blessed Virgin Mary.

The Public Square Rosary Crusade has grown ever since 2007, when there were 2,107 rallies; in 2008, 3,500; in 2009, 4,337; and in 2010, 5,963.

In 2011, there were 7,515 Public Square Rosary Rallies held across the United States as well as in 22 other countries across the globe.

## Pagan church: An oxymoron

If you understand the meaning of these two words, "pagan" and "church", then you know they do not, or should not, be words that appear together, because they are opposites. Even though a lot of buildings have signs on them proclaiming they are a church, it is not the proper use of the word, even though it can be the place where the "church" assembles. For, in my humble opinion, the word "church" represents individuals who have become slave servants to the Lord Jesus Christ, thus living according to His Word, and allowing Him to direct their lives (Romans 1:1, Jude 1, John 14:15; 23-24). But on the other hand, the word "pagan" represents that which is opposed to the Lordship of Christ and His Word, the Bible.

Yet, in the book of The Revelation of Jesus Christ, God describes for us what can be interpreted as a pagan church. As one begins to study the book of The Revelation of Jesus Christ, we soon discover that it was written for the purpose of revealing Christ. The first chapter tells of the things that Christ has done, as He came to the earth. Chapters two and three tells of things that are now taking place, in what is called the age of grace or the church age. Chapters four through the remainder of the book tell us of things that are yet to take place, things that will take place after the church has been removed.

The churches that are named in chapters two and three are actual churches that existed in the time of Paul, in what we now call Turkey. The problems that Paul makes reference to in each church actually existed. But as you study history, you can see how that these churches represent the church as it has played

its part in history, and you can see the influence that each of these have had on the church as we know it today. And since the Bible tells us that each believer is the Temple of the Lord (2 Corinthians 6:14-16, Ephesians 2:21), we can also examine ourselves to see which of these seven churches you and I are as an individual, to hear the

warning and blessings from the Lord that the Lord had for us.

With the holidays soon approaching, especially Halloween and Santa Claus (Christmas), it seems that we should look at the church that many have called the pagan church, the church in Thyatira, found in Revelation 2:18-29. This church had followed the church of Smyrna of Revelation 2:8-11, which was the persecuted church of A.D. 100-313. Satan thought he would destroy the church through great persecution, but the church grew stronger, in spite of his efforts. So, Satan decided he would join the church, which he did at the church of Pergamos of Revelation 2:12-17, a time in history around A.D. 313, when Constantine began to patronize the church. In 378 A.D., Theodosius, the Roman Emperor went as far as to declare that everybody was now a Christian. Even today you can ask people if they are a Christian, and they will answer, "for sure, I'm an American aren't I?" Of course, I know that those reading this know you are not a Christian because you are born in America, or born into a Christian home. Salvation is a personal relationship between you and the Lord Jesus Christ, after one has repented their sins and received Him as their Lord and Master (Acts 3:19; 26:20, Romans 10:9-10).

That brings us to the church at

Thyatira, the pagan church of the dark years of 590 through 1517, a time in history when the state had begun to pay the bills of the church. So in order to please the state, they brought certain pagan practices from the pagan Roman temples right into the churches and all kinds of off-the-wall doctrines entered the church. They even began to deny the finished work of Jesus Christ on the cross of Calvary. The church became filled with paganism and with sin and shame. It had very little resemblance to what the Bible teaches. Actually the church began to look more like the world than a people dedicated to serving Christ. And because the church no longer resembled that which Christ had died for, many of the cults of our day were formed as a revolt against pagan Christianity.

One of the places to see paganism in the church is to look at what you celebrate.

Yes, some holiday observances we have might be good, especially as people become grateful for the many blessings we enjoy here in America, and the opportunity that Christians have to remind the world that God sent His Son to this world to redeem it. As the holidays approach, may this be a time that the world will see a Christ like church, not a pagan church.

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### PET TALK: GUINEA PIGS

You see them frequently in the pet store: interesting, oblong-shaped creatures, generally larger than the other rodents they are grouped with. Housed in the same location as smaller rodents,

many people think that their care is similar to that of a hamster or rat. However, guinea pigs have their own special requirements that differ vastly from those of the other small animals around them. Guinea pigs, or cavies, are not actually related to pigs, nor are they from

Guinea. According to Dr. J. Jill Heatley, associate professor at the Texas A&M College of Veterinary Medicine & Biomedical Sciences, they are actually native to South America.

"Guinea pigs were domesticated by the ancient South American people as a source of food," states Heatley. "The 'pig' part in their name likely refers to their appearance, as they have shorter legs and large heads."

Generally docile and inquisitive, guinea pigs can make great pets. Most seem to enjoy human interaction. They are usually fairly quiet, but if they hear the sound of their food being prepared, they can respond with shrill squeaks and boisterous leaps around their cage.

"There is quite a range of sounds in a guinea pig's vocabulary," says Heatley. "Wheeking" is a vocalization that is generally heard when a guinea pig thinks it is about to receive food.

It may have heard the refrigerator door open and close, and this is its way of begging you to bring its food quickly. A 'rumble' is a purring sound that usually happens when a male is courting a female. Purring can also happen if your guinea pig is enjoying being stroked. A quick, short purr, followed by the guinea pig going still, means that it just heard a noise that it is afraid of. A 'shriek' is a very high-pitched wheek that usually is a call of alarm or a cry of pain or fear. If a guinea pig chatters its teeth, it is very angry. This is a warning to other guinea pigs or humans that the guinea pig wants to be left alone."

Guinea pigs can weigh up to two and a half pounds and can reach a length of under a foot. Their size makes them easier to handle than other smaller rodents. Their average life span is four to eight years, so acquiring a new pig should not be done on impulse.

"As they are social animals, guinea pigs enjoy having at least one companion," says Heatley. "A guinea pig living by itself will be lonely and can become depressed. Therefore, it is a good idea to have a large cage that can house two compatible guinea pigs together."

Female pairs and male/female pairs work well, although males need to be neutered before being housed with females to prevent reproduction. Two males can also be cage mates, but extra caution needs to be taken when introducing them. Guinea pigs occasionally like to have some alone time, so they will appreciate the largest size cage you can manage. A minimum size of seven and a half square feet is recommended for up to two guinea pigs.

"A healthy diet is instrumental in maintaining your guinea pig's health," asserts Heatley. "They require a mixture of fruits and vegetables, along with

a high quality pellet. They should also have continual access to hay. Additionally, guinea pigs cannot manufacture vitamin C, and store-bought pellets will not supply an adequate amount to meet their needs. This is because vitamin C is very heat sensitive and will rapidly degrade in less than a month of shelf storage at a controlled room temperature. Therefore, sufficient supplementation is required."

This can be achieved by feeding your pigs fruits and vegetables that are high in vitamin C, such as parsley, bell peppers (remove seeds first), kale, kiwi, and strawberries. Feed fruit sparingly, as it is high in sugar and can cause obesity if fed too frequently. Offering a mixture of three to five different vegetables per day gives your guinea pigs a good variety. Always introduce new foods gradually, as sudden changes in diet can lead to gastrointestinal upset.


