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## School Board discusses new technology

**CHIPLEY** — The teacher's best friend these days is a board, but it's not made of wood. Chipley School District teachers sang the praises of their Promethean boards Monday at the School Board's regular April meeting.

"Every teacher I have talked

to has said they don't know how they functioned without it," said Chipley High School teacher Carol Schimpf. "It is a dynamic teaching tool that engages students as well as handles tasks for teachers."

Promethean boards are formally known as an ActivBoard and are produced by Promethean World, an interactive education company based in England. The boards work like touch-screen computers

and can be controlled by a teacher's laptop or iPad. Students also can interact with the boards either by writing on them with a stylus or using remote clicker devices.

The district has about 30 boards between the various Chipley and Vernon schools, and the boards cost about \$5,500 each.

"The boards help us save money in the classroom, because we don't have to print as many handouts,"

Schimpf said. "We have the information right there on the board."

With the clickers, students can answer questions and play games on the board from their seats. The board also can select students randomly for tasks, she said.

"Teachers with multiple classes can have multiple screens," Schimpf said, noting the feature


## James Guy eyes seat on county commission

## I Am Inn Ministries holds open house

**CHIPLEY** — Many gathered March 31 in an apartment complex to share food, fellowship, testimony and tears as I Am Inn Ministries held its open house.

I Am Inn Ministries is a Christian-based, nonprofit organization that takes in women who were released from prison and, at times, homeless women.

"We have a jail ministry, and in the ministry we found that the same women were coming back in because they only have one place to go back to — and then we realized something had to be done," said Becky Huskey, director of I

Am Inn Ministries. "That's when we started I Am Inn Ministries, and that was seven years ago."

Huskey said they started out with just one apartment on the bottom floor of their complex on South Railroad Avenue in Chipley.

"Not all of them were from the prisons, some were homeless women or women in transition from bad situations and in need of a temporary place to stay," Huskey said. "We run off of donations only."

Local thrift stores donate clothes and other items from time to time.

"One of the requirements is that they go to church at least three times

a week," Huskey said. "When they apply for jobs, we make sure they say they have to have Sundays off."

She said it was the only thing that made the program as effective as it has been.

"Jesus is our program," she said. "We're not a drug rehab facility, but a lot of the women here have been addicted to drugs. We all have the tendency to be addicted something in some form or another, we just choose to be addicted to Jesus."

The Serenity Prayer is something she said they use, not just for overcoming addictions but also to sort through life's issues.

"God grant me the serenity to accept the things I cannot change; courage to change the things I can; and wisdom to know the difference," Huskey said. "It's not what we've done in our past that defines who we are and sometimes its hard to except the things of our past and be able to move past it but with love and support we can do the best we can."

Huskey said they operate without grants and function on donations only and the support of local churches.

"If a church is interested in calling us, we'd be happy to come out and tell them about I Am Inn Ministries and give our testimonies," Huskey said. "We can only offer so much and what we can offer is Jesus."

Debbie Blaylock said she came to the ministry as a resident in 2006.

"I was a resident and then a house manager for a year," Blaylock said. "Before I was actually walking with the Lord for nine years before I fell because of some family matters. I fell out of the church first and then fell back into meth addiction."

She said it was that evening she called I Am Ministries that they came to pick her up.

"They not only let me back in, they came and got me," she said. "The only way to stay off drugs is through God. Through His love, His compassion and these ladies have strengthened me, plus it helps that we're all going through the same issues. Where I'm weak someone will be strong and where someone's weak I may be strong."

Sharon Booth said she came to the house in 2009.

"I was released from prison and was in a transition home in Greenhead," Booth said. "I got a job at The Salvation Army and needed to place to stay that was closer to work."

Booth said when she was called to the I Am Inn Ministries she thought it was to be a resident and it wasn't until after she arrived she found out that she was being asked to be a house manager.

"I was a team leader in the prison for seven years before coming here, and I've been here ever since," Booth said. "God has been good to me and has blessed me here. It's my calling, it's been overwhelming."

She said some women come in and they come to an understanding of what the purpose of the program is and then some come through temporarily.

"If they get it or not it's up to them, and that's what did it for me, knowing I needed to change something," Booth said. "I did drugs for over 30 years, prostituted, and lost my family— now it's all been restored."

She said recovering her life had recovered her relationship with her son and daughter.

"I know it can be tough, but I believe with all my heart that God will restore what is yours," Booth said. "I never thought I'd be helping in this way and I know this is where I belong."

Having to watch over six girls isn't an easy task, she said. Through the years they have had more than 80 women come through, whether for short term or long term stays.

"God is always faithful, and we've got nothing but love from the community," Booth said. "Every one of us has a background, things we have to work through, but through the grace of God we can overcome all things."

allows the teachers to prepare and save presentations then switch back and forth as needed.

"In my 30 years of teaching, this is the most useful item I ever had in the class-

room," she said.

Roulhac Middle School teacher LaJuana Malloy agreed with Schimpf.

"Technology is in every part of our children's lives now, with computers, cell

phones, iPads and iPods," she said. "With this technology we are able to get our children engaged in the classroom."

Vernon Elementary School teacher Jay Griffis

said he uses his Promethean board every day in his classroom.

"We feel like it is our best friend," he said.

Gary Clark with the Fitzhugh and Essie D. Carter Educational Foundation, also was on hand for the board meeting, and he presented grant checks for \$15,000 to Chipley High School and \$25,000 to Vernon High School from the foundation.

The trust was established by the Carters to supplement educational activities in local

high schools.

Some of the money from past Foundation grants was used in Chipley to purchase iPads for teachers, which are now used along with the Promethean boards, Schimpf said.

This year's grants were awarded to the schools' agriculture, English, library and sports programs.

In other business, the board approved hiring a new athletic director and head football coach, Thomas Chip Harris. His starting date is dependent

upon his completing the requirements to get his Florida teaching license, Dr. Sandra Cook, superintendent, told the board.

Before being hired by Chipley, Harris coached the Ashford, Ala., Yellow Jackets for three seasons. He is from Chipley, the superintendent said.

Former head coach Rob Armstrong has gone to Georgia, where he is the head coach at Berrien County High in Nashville, Tenn., according to varsitysportseast.com.

# 2 charged with felony probation violation

**CHIPLEY** — Chipley Police had a wanted man drop in on them for April Fools' Day.

Chipley police officers and Washington County sheriff's deputies went to 1209 Old Bonifay Road April 1 in search of two men wanted on felony violation of probation warrants.

They were searching for 21-year-

old Roy Lee Hardrick and a 17-year-old juvenile male. They were hiding in the attic of the home, which officers realized when one of them fell through the ceiling.

"They were hiding up in the attic," Police Chief Kevin Crews said Thursday at the City Council workshop, "and they fell through the ceiling. That was how we got them."

"It can happen. I know because 15 years ago I was in an attic looking for drugs and did the same thing," Crews said, laughing.

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



# 'A' not always for Alabama; Arkansas gets no respect

If you see me out and about when I am not working, there is a good chance you'll catch me in my favorite baseball cap, which is blue and red and has a big A on the front.

Whatever you do, don't say "Roll Tide!"

I've had at least three folks see the hat and make the Alabama assumption, and though I have no animosity toward Alabama (other than the usual SEC heckling when they are playing the Razorbacks), the hat's A stands for Arkansas, as in the Double-A Texas League team, the Arkansas Travelers. So here's a little minor league baseball trivia.

The Travelers, also known as "the Travs," are North Little Rock's minor league franchise. They used to reside in Little Rock, but those crafty North Little Rockians stole the team away by building a spanking new stadium about five years ago.

Ray Winder Stadium, where the Travs resided in Little Rock from 1932 until 2006, had seen better days. So a special election seeking a 1-percent sales tax bought the Travs a new home north of the Arkansas River called Dickey-Stephens Park. The park was built with a partnership between the city of North Little Rock, the Travs

and Little Rock financier Warren Stephens. It was named after Jack and Witt Stephens and Hall of Fame catcher Bill Dickey and his brother Skeeter, who also played in the major leagues. Coincidentally, the Dickey brothers also wound up working for the Stephens after their baseball careers ended.

The Travelers were founded in 1895 and were the first professional team to claim an entire state in 1957 when they became the Arkansas Travelers. About the time the Travs got their new stadium, Northwest

Arkansas got its own Texas League team, the Northwest Arkansas Naturals. They play at Arvest Stadium in Springdale and have done pretty well, considering their team mascot is a Sasquatch.

Both of the Travs' names, the Travelers and the Arkansas Travelers, were derived from the old folk song "The Arkansas Traveler."

Which brings us to the actual topic this week — the song, "The Arkansas Traveler," which is largely responsible for the state of Arkansas' image, which is to say that thanks to a song written 160 years ago, Arkansas remains the Rodney Dangerfield of United States.



Our beloved columnist Perry Wells seems to enjoy introducing me as an Arkansas traveler, so I am sure he would see the humor in people mistaking my Travelers hat for an Alabama one, although I suspect Alabama fans would take much more umbrage at such a faux pas than I do — it's not like anyone has mistaken the hat for a Texas A&M cap, for example.

The song dates back to the 1850s and has had a variety of lyrics. It is credited to Arkansas' own Col. Sanford C. Faulkner, a fiddle player, storyteller and former Confederate officer.

According to the encyclopedia of Arkansas website, the song has "shaped the image of Arkansas since the 1840s." That's probably not a compliment, unless you find barefoot, wiseacre hillbillies attractive. Think "The Beverly Hillbillies," "Tobacco Road" or even worse — "Evening Shade" — and you get the average person's image of Arkansas.

Anyway, the song was adopted as the Arkansas state song from 1949 to 1963 and since 1987 has been the state historical song. I think the official state song now is Phil Ochs' "Here's To The State Of Mississippi," and if it's not,

then it should be.

A visit to the Internet gives several versions of "The Arkansas Traveler" lyrics, and apparently there is even a Jerry Garcia version as well as traditional versions, official state lyrics written by a committee, and even children's versions of the song.

The song also was part of Laurel and Hardy's Academy Award-winning short "The Music Box" and inspired a Vaudeville circuit comedy routine, which is echoed in Garcia's song.

The song also is credited with inspiring the Edward Washburn 1858 painting of the same name.

By now you're probably thinking, "what has any of this got to do with Florida?"

Well, oddly enough, when I started searching online to hear "The Arkansas Traveler" played, the first version I found was Archie Lee performing at the 1956 Florida Folk Festival in White Springs. And what version is he singing? Why it's the vaudeville version, of course, which is very similar to Jerry Garcia's take — in fact, it's probably the same song. Apparently someone named Michelle Shocked also has done a version of the vaudeville lyrics on a children's album, to boot.

Arkansas gets no respect, I tell you — but I'm still going to root for the Travs.

# A creator of bluegrass music dies

It seems it has become the duty, responsibility and even a privilege for the "prattler" to inform readers of the passing of well known entertainers in the country and bluegrass genre of music.

Bluegrass legend Earl Scruggs died March 28 in a Nashville-area hospital.

He was a Country Music Hall of Fame inductee as part of pioneering duo Flatt and Scruggs. Earl was 88.

Earl Eugene Scruggs was born in Flint Hill, N.C., on Jan. 6, 1924. He, along with Lester Raymond Flatt, (born June 19, 1914, died May 11, 1979), did much to popularize bluegrass music. Their sound became widely recognized in the 1960s through their recording of "The Ballad of Jed Clampett," the theme for the network television show "The Beverly Hillbillies."

Both Flatt and Scruggs grew up in rural farm homes immersed in rich musical traditions. Both worked in textile mills before becoming full-time musicians. Flatt began his radio career in 1939 and worked in several bands, including that of Charlie Monroe and his Kentucky Partners with whom, in 1943, he sang tenor and played guitar and mandolin. In 1945, Flatt was hired as guitarist and lead singer in Bill Monroe's Blue Grass Boys.

Earl Scruggs, who remained close to home

during World War II years to help his widowed mother, was recognized from an early age as a banjo prodigy. By the time he was a teen, he had developed his own unique three-finger distinctive style of banjo picking. This enabled him to play a broad variety of music with speed and clarity.

Scruggs and Flatt met when Scruggs, too, joined Monroe's band, and both became part of what proved to be The Blue Grass Boys' most influential lineup. Flatt and Scruggs played a crucial role in the development of the sound that later came to be known as "bluegrass" — a name taken from the band's name.

Early in 1948, Flatt and Scruggs left Monroe. Later that spring, they formed their own band, the Foggy Mountain Boys. Early band members in that group included well known guitar/vocalists Jim Eanes and Mac Wiseman, along with fiddler Jim Shumate and bassist Cedric Rainwater (Howard Watts).

In 1949, Curly Seckler joined the band. He remained until 1962. The Flatt and Scruggs sound took its definitive form in 1955 with addition of the

Dobro resonator guitar of Buck "Uncle Josh" Graves. With this instrument, they departed significantly from Bill Monroe's sound, although, like him, they maintained a purely acoustic approach.

In 1953, Martha White Flour began sponsoring daily Flatt and Scruggs early morning radio shows over WSM-Nashville and continued to support them for the rest of their career. In 1955, they became members of the Grand Ole Opry, where the Martha White flour theme song is still heard with the familiar voice of Lester Flatt singing, "now you bake right with Martha White," concluding the jingle with "goodness gracious, it's good — Martha White."

During the late 1950s and early 1960s, their syndicated television shows were seen by millions of viewers. Their recordings, including gospel songs like "Cabin on the Hill," began hitting the charts. An appearance at Hollywood club The Ash Grove caught the ear of the producer of The Beverly Hillbillies and led to "The Ballad of Jed Clampett," their only single to reach No. 1 on the country charts.

The sacred songs offered by Lester Flatt and Earl Scruggs are an inspiring and memorable testament to their religious faith. An early Columbia LP record featured such gospel greats as "Gone Home," "Joy Bells," "I'm Working On a Road" (to glory land) and "Give Mother My Crown."

Another 1951 Columbia LP recording gives us a sampling of some of the all time favorite secular songs

by Flatt and Scruggs, including "The Ballad of Jed Clampett," "Hard Traveling," "Coal Miner's Blues" and "Wreck of the Old 97."

The liner notes on the above album describe the music as "contemporary in every sense of the word," while acknowledging "that bluegrass has its antecedents in an older traditional music."

Earl Scruggs was sick off and on in recent years, including a September 2010 hospitalization in North Carolina for an undisclosed illness.

He was preceded in death by his son, Steve, and his wife, Louise Scruggs, who was a pioneering female in the music industry. She helped guide and build her husband's career after his departure from the Foggy Mountain Boys and established a folk-rock band, The Earl Scruggs Revue, with sons Randy and Gary Scruggs. In 1972, this group recorded on the Nitty Gritty Dirt Band's "Will The Circle Be Unbroken," a three-LP compilation of classic country and bluegrass songs.

Visitations for Earl Scruggs were held March 30-31 at the Spring Hill Funeral Home in Nashville. Funeral services were held in the Ryman Auditorium on April 1.

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# HCSB willing to relinquish ag center to PDL

**BONIFAY** — The Holmes County School Board agreed April 3 to relinquish all responsibility of the old county agriculture building to the town of Ponce de Leon, pending the acceptance of the Ponce de Leon Town Council during their next regularly scheduled meeting.

"I've done the title search and report that the deed is all ready to be signed over to the Town of Ponce de Leon if they are willing to accept it, which I haven't heard from them," said HCSB Attorney Lucas Taylor.

Holmes County Superintendent Gary Galloway said the building wasn't on school board property, but with an agreement from the landowner, the building was leased to the town of Ponce de Leon as a storage area in 1988.

"The school board no longer had any invested interest in the ag building but still had use for the gym," Galloway said. "I don't even know if we still have squatter's rights to the ag building because of the lack of necessity and use of the building by the school board."

Galloway said with it being on someone else's land and with the extent of repair needed to bring the building to satisfactory usability, it was too much of a liability to the school board to continue being attached to the building.

"With the recent interest of the town of Ponce de Leon to expand on the use of that building, we're more than willing to relinquish all ties to the building to the town of Ponce de Leon," Galloway said.

Present at the school board meeting were two parents concerned with the dress code enforced at the Holmes County High School Prom.

"We've got an issue with Principal Eddie Dixon singling girls out about the way they dress and not others," said parent Nikki Elmore. "There were girls at the dance that weren't able to dance or they were sent home because of the way they dressed, and there were others there who were dressed in less who got to enjoy their prom."

The second parent, Christian Mann, said more parents say they've had similar problems but never spoke up about it, and now that her daughter had missed out on enjoying her prom, she was there to speak to the school board.

"My daughter worked hard and saved up to go to prom on her own money, and she didn't even get to enjoy her prom," Mann said. "She didn't even get one step into prom when she was told that she could wear her date's jacket or she could leave."

Mann said she studied the dress code for prom and that she found it to be very confusing.

"It says that you can't have straps but you must have straps, you can't show your back, but you can and you see all these pictures of girls in the same dress or less, and they weren't told to leave or cover up," Mann said. "My daughter worked so hard to raise money for that dress and never even made it to the dance floor."

Galloway said he promised to look into the matter extensively.

Larry Zorn with the facilities division told the board they were being fined \$40,000 by the Florida Edu-

cation Finance Program from their last FEFP and transportation audit.

"It wasn't clear about the processing of the matrix, and there were places that needed initialing that weren't," Zorn said. "It was clearly just a clerical error, and we're asking permission to appeal the fine."

According to the report, "six of the 10 students in our ESE Support Levels 4 and 5 sample had exceptions involving reporting errors or records that were not properly or accurately prepared. Of the 131 students in our student transportation sample, 69 had exceptions involving their reported ridership classification or eligibility for state transportation."

"We've moved to new standards of documentation, and the adjustments to the new system have been less than smooth, but it's something that

will be worked out with time. It just so happened that the state decided to crack down hard on these issues," Galloway said. "We're not the only ones having to place appeals because of this matter, and we're looking at a possible long process of appeals."

The board approved to move forward with appealing the fine.

The board also approved of out-of-state travel requests from Bethlehem High School's Future Business Leaders of America to attend the FBLA State Leadership Conference, competitions and workshops from April 27 to May 1 in Orlando and Bethlehem's grade 9-12 math teams to attend the Enterprise Community College Math Tournament on May 4 in Newton, Ala.

The next Holmes County School Board meeting is scheduled for 6 p.m. April 24.

## Hooked on Outdoors

The fisherman paid the price of admission and walked to the end of the pier and hooked up his Sibiki bait rig. Everyone thinks Sibiki means something in Japanese, but I asked a lady of Japanese descent, and she said it meant nothing in her native tongue. The fisherman unraveled his king rod equipped with 30-pound test line, a swivel a length of wire of about two feet and two treble hooks, one

arranged one over the other to assure a hook-up if the first missed its mark.

they had their own ZIP code. The fisherman lowered the bait rig into the clouds of bait under the pier, hooking up several herring and cigar minnows.

Picking out the one he figured had the best chance of being eaten alive, he hooked the top treble hook through its tail, leaving the lower hook to swing free. Usually this free-swinging hook will be the one that foul hooks the king, thus catching a fish that would otherwise have gotten a meal and gone on its merry way.

The other baits that were not chosen to be fished with were placed into an ice chest to be used later. Dead bait sometimes can be as effective as live ones, especially on the days the bait is just not under the pier to be caught. Herring and cigar minnows seek the safety of the pilings of the pier hoping the Spanish and kings and bonito will not come under the pier to eat them. On some days there are so many under the pier, it is impossible to see the bottom.

Most fishermen, after tossing the cigar minnow out as far as possible, will not put their rods down and instead hold on for dear life. To lean a rod against the rail is an invitation to lose several hundred dollars of high-priced reel and rod. When a king hits, it usually is a violent affair and the fisherman had better be holding on with both hands.

Fighting a big fish off a pier requires the cooperation of all the fishermen on the pier. Those not hooked up need to get out of the way of the fisherman who is. After the fish is subdued to the point of exhaustion, another fisherman will assist with a gaff on a rope to hook the fish and drag it on board as the line is not sufficient to lift the fish from the water.

That's about all there is to it. Whether you are a fisherman or just a bystander, it is worth the price of admission to just walk out on one of our piers here in Bay County and watch the action.

# MACKEREL 2 WAYS

## Both species of macks come to Panhandle early

Except for the paint job and the size, you'd have a hard time telling Spanish mackerel from their larger cousins, the king mackerel. They look alike and act alike, and both are fast as greased lightning. Both also have arrived in Panhandle area waters early this year thanks to the incredibly warm winter and will provide action through mid-October. Here's a look at how to go about tangling with these toothy speedsters.

### FIT FOR A KING

Kings generally travel schooled by size. The "snakes" of 7 to 12 pounds swarm together in the largest masses, usually around reef lines or directly around the largest baitfish schools. It is the migration of the bait that brings the annual migration of the gamefish — threadfins and Spanish sardines are their primary targets. Sometimes these guys are only 1 or 2 miles off the beaches.

The larger kings, 15 pounds and on up to the maximum size of 40 and even 50 pounds, more often are found around wrecks and offshore ledges,



though a few jumbos also prowl the outfall of the major passes. They home in on larger baits, blue runners, cigar minnows, ladyfish, even young Spanish and bluefish.

The smaller kings usually are easy pickings, easily located because there often is a fleet of boats trolling around the larger schools. If you can get out there on a calm day in your 17-foot center console, you can catch them. Just join the trolling circle, put out a 5- to 6-inch chrome single-hook spoon like the Drone on a downrigger or No. 2 planer, and you soon will be in business. Remember to stay in the trolling pattern. Don't drive your boat through the baitfish, or you will ruin the action for everybody — and get a well-deserved cussing from the charterboat skippers for doing so.

Bigger kings can be more of a challenge. Most of the largest are caught by slow-trolling large live baits, with blue runners a favorite for their durability. Foot-long ladyfish, mullet and other inshore species also attract big bites at times. Most anglers use "stinger" rigs on these big baits; a dangling treble, size 6 in triple-x strong, is trailed back the side of the bait on a No. 6 wire — and sometimes a couple of trebles are used on larger baits. These extra hooks prevent kings from chopping off the tail of the bait — as they often do — without getting hooked.

Kings are not difficult to handle after the first run. But that first run of a really big one can clean a spool in seconds, so reels capable of handling plenty of line are a must. Most anglers like at least 300 yards on the spool — tests of 20 to 25 are common in spinning gear, 30 to 40 in conventional. Keep your drag light, even with heavy tests.

### SPANISH SURPRISE

Although Spanish mackerel never reach the maximum size of kings, it has become fairly common in recent years to catch them up to 7 pounds, unheard of 20 years ago when heavy commercial harvest made it rare for a Spanish every to reach it's third birthday. These days there are plenty of 5-year-old fish out there, and they run and fight just like the kingfish.

Spanish are great fish for kids and inexperienced anglers because they seem almost eager to take the hook at times, and if the first one misses the second or third does not.

Spanish average around 2 to 3 pounds so heavy gear is definitely not called for. A 7-foot medium action spinning rod, 2500-sized reel and a spool of 10-pound test microfiber is the ticket, allowing the fish to show their stuff and yet with enough capacity to handle the occasional 6 to 7 pounder. Again, pier tackle needs to be significantly heavier to ease control of the fish from the span, but even here be sure to set your drag light to avoid pull-outs.

Though Spanish have sharp teeth, they also have sharp eyes. You can catch them on live baits with No. 2 wire, but you will get a lot more hits on artificials if you go to clear fluorocarbon or hard mono in 25 to 30 pound test. Tie to the microfiber with a double uni-knot. Avoid snaps and swivels because macks sometimes home in on them, apparently thinking they are extra tiny glass minnows, and will cut you off.

### FROM HOOKING TO COOKING

Both kings and Spanish are good on the table with proper preparation. They have a more "fishy" taste than some species. But get them on ice immediately when caught and cook them without freezing, and they can make excellent eating. Fillet, skin and remove the red line and you have gotten rid of most of that fishy taste — the remaining fillets are good grilled, baked or broiled or in an Italian tomato and parmesan casserole, among many other recipes.

### SIZE AND BAG LIMITS

The limit on Spanish is a generous 15 fish daily, minimum size 12 inches to the fork. Note that small kingfish look very much like Spanish, but the limit on kings is two daily, 24 inches to the fork; you can differentiate the species because the Spanish has a black dorsal fin, while the king dorsal is blue-gray.

# TALLADEGA, HERE WE COME

### News to provide live coverage of Aaron's Dream Weekend

Ladies and gentlemen, we're going to Talladega. The one and only Cecilia Spears and I have gotten the go-ahead from our editor and the credentials from the speedway. There will be live updates from my Twitter account @catspitstop all weekend as we attend the Aaron's Dream Weekend at Talladega, Ala.

Because there were no races this weekend, I figured what better time to give my fellow NASCAR fans a brief history on the Talladega Superspeedway?

Known as NASCAR's most competitive track, not that long ago it was just farmland next to two abandoned airport runways the government had sold to the city of Talladega after World War II. One day, Anniston, Ala., insurance executive Bill Ward, a race car driver and fan, and William H.G. (Bill) France, who happens to be the founder of NASCAR and International Speedway Corporation, found the land in North Talladega County following a causal conversation in Daytona in the mid-1960s.

There was a meeting with then-mayor of Talladega James Hardwick and some of the other city officials in a restaurant in Anniston in 1966. France asked the group to think about putting the track at the site, and after a trip to the Firecracker 400 in Daytona, they agreed to the track, which was at first called the Alabama International Motor Speedway. In 1989, it was renamed Talladega Superspeedway after they saw the economic impact race fans had on Daytona. The track is 2.66 miles long, has banking of 33 degrees on each end, 18 degree banking in the tri-oval and is four lanes wide. Many of the cars have reached speeds above 220 miles per hour in the backstretch, which is nearly 4,000 feet long.

house for any future race at Daytona and Talladega. This action that France took broke up the PDA, and it dissolved two years later.

Talladega has been a place for many of the drivers to set and break many records over the years. It wasn't too long before the speedway became known for its speed and tough driving conditions. Being one of the fastest and most competitive tracks, it has played a very big role in the career of many of the top drivers of today. Pete Hamilton was the first driver to win two of the major events in 1970 driving Plymouths by Petty Enterprises. The first driver to win three years in a row was David Person. He won those three races in 1972, 1973 and 1974. Wining both races in 1975 and the spring event in 1976 and the race in 1980, Buddy Baker was the first four-time winner at Talladega. Drivers who have since joined Baker in that category are Jeff Gordon, Darrell Waltrip and Bobby Allison. In 1987, the world stock car record was made by Bill Elliott, when he clocked a speed of 212.809 miles per hour during qualifying. The record for a 500 mile stock car record was made in 1997 during a caution-free spring Winston Select 500 with a speed of 188.354 miles per hour by Mark Martin. He also won this race. The only person to win 10 NASCAR Sprint Cup races at Talladega was the late great Intimidator (Dale Earnhardt Sr.), he won those races in 1983, 1984, two races in 1990, 1991, two races in 1993, 1995 1999 and 2000.

The Diehard 500 became the first 500-mile race at Talladega to have 1,000 official lead changes in 1993. This is a feat because the track was only 25 years old at the time, and the Diehard 500 was only 188 laps. The first sell-out in Talladega history was when they moved the second event of the year from the summer to October in 1997. When the race was moved to October, it was placed into the schedule for the 10 Championship Cup races, which Talladega has enjoyed since 1997.

The all-reserved 212-acre infield has room for thousands, and the grandstand seats an astonishing 143,231 people.

Construction began on the 2,000-acre speedway site on May 23, 1968. The first race was held on Saturday, Sept. 13, 1969, the Bama 400 Grand Touring, where Ken Rush drove his Chevrolet Camaro into Victory Lane. Then on Sunday, Sept. 14, 1969, the first Grand National race (now the NASCAR Sprint Cup), Richard Brickhouse became the first driver to win a major race at the Talladega 500 (now the Good Sams Club 500).

That first race didn't go off without some worries. At practice for that first major race, there were problems with the tires holding out for more than just a few laps. Talladega

is known as one of the fastest, most competitive superspeedways in the world for one reason: In that first practice, Charlie Glotzbach won the pole position with a speed of 199.466 miles per hour. The tires were declared unsafe by the Professional Drivers Association led by Richard Petty because the speeds the drivers were going weren't allowing the tires to hold out. But France knew there were thousands of fans who had traveled to Talladega to see the race, so it went on, using some of the drivers who raced the day before and the drivers who had decided not to race in the boycott. All 500 miles of that first race were run without any major accidents. France decided after that first race at Talladega to rain check the

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# Council discusses lawsuit against Georgia firm

**VERNON** — Vernon City Council decided two years was long enough to wait. The council voted Monday to start legal action against an Georgia firm which has been building a cascade trailer for the town's fire department for nearly two years.

Fluid Air Systems in Gainesville, Ga., is the

company that has yet to deliver the cascade trailer the city purchased two years ago. A cascade trailer is designed to hold tanks with oxygen and other emergency supplies needed by firefighters at the scene of a fire.

"We paid for it up front with FEMA grant money," said Fire Chief Matt Gothard. And for the past several months, every time Gothard contacted the company for

information about the trailer; he has been told to wait two more weeks.

"It's been 'two weeks' for the past several months," Gothard told the council.

Councilman Byron Biddle made the motion to sue over the trailer: "It's been way too long," he said.

In other business, the council heard that Saturday's Easter egg hunt was a big success. About 300 people

turned out for the city's first Easter egg hunt.

"It went really well, and we had beautiful weather," said Council Member Gwen March.

City Clerk Dian Hendrix also reported that the damage to the city hall bathroom, where the stucco ceiling had fallen in, would not be covered by insurance.

Biddle suggested she get three estimates for

the repairs and then the city could get the damage repaired. The cause of the damage is unknown.

The council also approved the placement of an antennae on top of the city's old VHS tower. City Attorney Kerry Adkison asked if the city needed to go before the County Planning Commission before granting permission for the antennae installation.

Biddle said the antennae is part of the High-speed, high capacity broadband program being planned for counties served by Opportunity Florida through the Florida Rural Broadband Alliance.

Opportunity Florida, along with its sister organization, the Florida Rural Heartland Economic Development Initiative, are co-owners of the Florida Rural Broadband Alliance.



William Thomas Jeffries, who served in Company K, 6th Florida Infantry Regiment, Confederate States Army during the War Between the States. A ceremonial epitaph, "We Drink From The Same Canteen," Taps and Cannon fire closed the ceremony.

In attendance were several representatives of various Sons of Confederate Veterans camps, the Mary Ann Harvey Black Confederate Rose Society and special guest and member of the United Daughters of the Confederacy, Mrs. Bernice Peacock. Mrs. Peacock is a real daughter of Confederate veteran Ponce Forehand from Holmes County. Mrs. Peacock,

91, participated in the ceremony by playing "Dixie" on her harmonica. "I had a wonderful time," she said.

Also attending the memorial dedication was Mrs. Michelle McMillan Kirby, great-granddaughter of another local veteran, Capt. Angus McMillan, and member of the R. Don McLeod Chapter 2469, United Daughters of the Confederacy. McMillan managed the David Porter Plantation on Orange Hill before the war and was instrumental in the founding of Chipley. He was commander of Company K, 6th Florida Infantry, which was organized during March 1862. McMillan was captured in December 1864 during the Battle of Nashville and imprisoned at Johnson's Island, Ill., until the end of the war. Some members, including the captain, survived to be mustered out on April 26, 1865. Some 80 or so other area men were also enlisted into Company K with many casualties among them.

# Excessive scratching could mean allergies

With the emergence of springtime, comes the arrival of allergies. Although the landscape is lush, many people experience the beauty that comes with the warmer weather as well as the bothersome allergy symptoms. Pets can also be affected by allergies and it is important to be mindful of any symptoms that your pet might be displaying.

"People sneeze and wheeze with allergies, while dogs tend to itch and scratch," says Dr. Adam Patterson, clinical assistant professor and a board certified dermatologist at the Texas A&M College of Veterinary Medicine & Biomedical Sciences. "The hallmark sign of allergic skin disease is itch that can be manifested as licking, chewing, rubbing, biting, scooting, head shaking, and/or scratching. Typically, the face, ears, paws, armpits, groin, and rump are the most affected sites."

Patterson explains that animals with allergic skin disease are highly prone to recurring skin and/or ear infections involving bacteria and yeast. Infections can cause increased itch, redness, pimples, blackheads,

scabs, dander, hair loss, skin thickening, and odor. Horses many times will break out in hives.

"Animals tend to be allergic to many of the same things people are hypersensitive to such as pollen, mold, dust, house dust mite, and foodstuffs," Patterson explains. "An exception would be fleas — the most common thing dogs and cats are allergic to. Despite this, many people are in 'fleanial' and refuse to believe just a few flea bites can be triggering the itch response in their pet." Likewise, horse owners may not be aware how just a few insect bites could be responsible for or contributing to itchy skin disease.

Allergic skin disease can be mistaken for many other forms of skin disease. A veterinary dermatologist is trained to work with primary care veterinarians to get down to the bottom of how to best diagnose and manage skin and ear disease, including allergies, in animals. See [www.acvd.org](http://www.acvd.org) for more information.

It is important to understand that allergies can be managed, but not cured, just as with humans. The goal is to reduce the extent and severity of signs, not completely eliminate them.

"Management regimens might include increased frequency

of bathing (washing pollens off the skin surface), antimicrobials or antibiotics, flea prevention, fatty acids, antihistamines, change in diet, steroids, and immunotherapy, also known as desensitization or hyposensitization. The use of the latter can be determined through a good step-wise diagnostic approach along with allergy skin testing and administered by way of allergy shots or oral allergy drops," says Patterson.

When it is time to take your pet in for allergy skin testing?

"Typically, dogs should have allergy symptoms for at least 5-6 months out of the year before considering skin testing for environmental allergies, which include reactivity to pollen, molds, house dust mite, and house dust, in order for the diagnostic tests and treatment to be cost effective over the long haul," Patterson recommends.

Patterson explains that rainfall cuts down on airborne pollen and may provide itch relief to pets, but at the same time rain may cause plants to produce more pollen over the next few

weeks. Indeed, rain fall might worsen flea and mold allergies because moisture and humidity are favorable to fleas and mold. Of course, rain has no effect on food-related allergic skin diseases.

"Given the mild winter and lack of national weather fronts during the 2011-2012 seasons, pollen is likely to be at an all-time high this year. Consequently, there likely will be many itchy pets this year," says Patterson.

# NEXT WEEK ONLY NATIONAL COIN COLLECTORS ASSOCIATION IS IN BONIFAY!

Need extra cash? Who doesn't! The National Coin Collectors Association will be in Bonifay from April 17th - 22nd. The NCCA is asking people to bring in any old silver and gold coins made before 1970. Those that do bring in their coins will be able to speak with specialists one-on-one and have their coins looked at with an expert set of eyes. Offers will be made based on silver or gold content, the rarity of the coins, and key dates. All coins made before 1970 will be examined, including gold coins, silver coins, nickels, pennies, proof sets and uncirculated mint sets. Those that decide to sell their coins will be paid on the spot.

If you are like a lot of people, you might have a few old coins or even a coffee can full of them lying around. If you have ever wondered what they are worth, now might be your chance to find out and even sell them if you choose. They could be worth a lot according to the NCCA. Collectors will pay a fortune for some coins and currency for their collections. According to Mark Cooper, coin collector and NCCA specialist, if they are rare enough, one coin could be worth over \$100,000. One ultra rare coin, an 1894 S Barber dime, sold for a record \$1.9 million to a collector in July of 2007. While that is an extreme example, many rare and valuable coins are stashed away in dresser drawers or lock boxes around the country. The NCCA has organized a traveling event in search of all types of coins and currency. Even common

coins can be worth a significant amount due to the high price of silver and gold. Cooper explains that, "even Washington quarters and Roosevelt dimes are worth many times their face value. Recent silver markets have driven the price up on even common coins made of silver. All half dollars, quarters and dimes made before 1965 contain 90% silver and are sought after any time silver prices rise. Right now it's a seller's market."
