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Governor visits area leaders

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CHIPLEY — Gov. Rick Scott made a stop in Chipley Monday to meet with Washington and Holmes County officials and residents to answer questions.

“We work for you, this is your money we’re spending,” Scott said. “This is the kind of government accountability I want us to have. We’re spending your dollars, and you expect us to spend them well.”

Scott weighed in on questions about education and the state budget, frivolous lawsuits and tort reform.

“The Legislature wants to eliminate frivolous lawsuits, but we have to be able to show how the lawsuits are costing the taxpayer money,” the governor said. “You have to go to Tallahassee and explain how this affects the average taxpayer. Once you can show how your legislation can save money, then you can get the support.”

Scott said that if local officials find state employees or officials not being responsive to their needs, they should contact him at the governor’s office. “Call me, I will return your calls,” he said. “I spend most of my day on the phone.”

He gave getting a state permit as an example. “We have procedures and rules in place, and we have them for a reason. But if a process that should take 30 days takes two years, then something is wrong. The government isn’t there to

cause problems.”

Asked about unemployment benefits abuse, Scott noted that the long-term unemployment benefits are paid with federal funds, and since the state’s unemployment rate has dropped below 9 percent those long-term benefits are likely to be reduced.

“When I first took office, there were 568,000 people on unemployment in the state,” Scott said. “That number is down to 340,000.”

He also noted that there

are also 243,000 open jobs listed in the state workforce system.

On education, Scott said he prefers to spend tax dollars on college programs that lead to employment — an opinion that got him in trouble with his own daughter last year.

“Do we need to use your tax dollars to educate more people that can’t get jobs in anthropology?” Scott asked a group of business leaders last fall. His daughter,

Bed tax collectors turn down T.V. promotion

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CHIPLEY — There was little interest in “Road Trippin’” this week from Washington County bed tax collectors.

The Washington County Tourist Development Council met Friday, June 1, for a second time to consider an advertising promotion offered by a Pensacola television station.

“The bottom line is, bed tax collectors turned it down,” said TDC Secretary Jim Town.

WEAR Channel 13 in Pensacola is planning a series called “Road Trippin’” and is seeking sponsorships from 13 Panhandle communities to fund the TV segments. The TV station offered to include the Washington County Watermelon Festival in its series with a promotional segment which would have aired around the weekend of the festival.

The program is meant to “encourage viewers to travel to ‘border’ cities in the Channel 3 viewing area, to help promote their community/events going on in their locality,” according to an email from station representative Brian O’Sullivan.

The cost for the promotional spot, which is set to air around the time of the Watermelon Festival, is \$6,000.

Of that expense, \$2,000 is a city sponsorship, and five business sponsorships at \$800 each. The segment would feature categories such as “place to stay,” “place to eat,” “place to have fun,” “the secret place of interest” and “spotlight business.”

The promotion will also include online and on-the-road elements, according to O’Sullivan.

“At this point, with less than two weeks to follow up, it is impractical that we pursue it,” Town said. He added that the TDC did not want to “close any doors” and would like to keep the option open for next year, provided the council was given more time to drum up support for the promotion.

“They didn’t give us enough time to really work on it,” said Chairman Joel Pate.

For local bed tax collectors, which primarily means motels, the TDC was offering a 50/50 co-operative deal where the TDC would pay half of the \$800 business sponsorship.

“We were giving the bed tax collectors a very good deal,” said Member Mary Richmond, who joined the meeting via teleconference.

Jordan Kandah, has an anthropology degree. She called him up and said she was the top Google story on Yahoo News once the AP reported the story.

"I have an anthropology degree," she said. And I asked, "How's that working out for you?" the governor said.

She is currently pursuing an MBA degree, Scott added.

Scott said he wants colleges and universities to graduate more students from in-demand areas in STEM (science, technology, engineering and math) fields.

"Why spend your tax dollars on areas where graduates can't get work?" the governor asked. "Forty percent of University of Florida graduates are now graduating in debt. If they can't get a job, then they are in for a tough time."

Washington County School District Superintendent Sandra Cook pointed out that 75 percent of the students in her district were not planning on going to college. "I agree with the standards, and the academic rigor, but we also need a track for students who are not going to college." Cook said the STEM classes may discourage students who are not college-bound and result in them not finishing school.

When asked about STEM programs increasing tuition rates, Scott said "I don't believe we ought to be raising tuition."

In April, Scott vetoed House Bill 7129, which was

written to give universities the power to seek unlimited tuition increases from their board of trustees and the state Board of Governors, especially University of Florida and Florida State University.

Scott said universities should examine where they are spending money and balance their budgets rather than raising tuition.

Had Scott signed HB 7129, universities that met 11 of 14 performance-based benchmarks would have been allowed to ask the Florida Board of Governors for hikes beyond a current 15 percent cap, according to the Miami Herald. The criteria included high GPAs of incoming freshmen and a high amount of research activity, for example. Only the University of Florida and Florida State University would have qualified.

UF and FSU were hoping to use additional revenues to enhance academic

programs.

Scott called for further review of the state's universities and how they spend money.

Besides education, Medicaid funding is one of the biggest expenses the state faces, as well as one of the greatest challenges.

"Medicaid reform has to be a priority," the governor said. Medicaid costs have tripled, and counties throughout the state are having difficulty paying their Medicaid costs.

Scott signed HB 5301 in March, which changed the way counties were billed for Medicaid costs. Under the new law, counties could be forced to pay the state an additional \$325.5 million in Medicaid costs, according to the Miami Herald.

Scott signed the bill over objections from county officials who had urged him to veto it.

County officials say it will require local taxpayers to pay for mistakes made by the state's electronic billing system, according to the Associated Press. Counties are required to pay a share of the Medicaid costs for their residents.

Florida Association of Counties president Doug Smith said the new law "represents the very worst in bureaucratic inefficiency."

All but seven of the state's 67 counties sent Scott letters urging him to veto the bill.

"Our goal is to work with the counties," Scott said.

KIWANIANS HEAR FROM WORLD WAR II VETERAN

CHIPLEY — The Chipley Kiwanis Club met for its weekly luncheon at Pattillo's Restaurant at the Washington — Holmes County Technical Center. Lunch was provided by the staff of the Washington-Holmes County Technical Center.

The day following Memorial Day, the Kiwanis Club was honored to hear from Mr. Paul Gordy, a World War II veteran. Gordy was a pilot of the B-17 Flying Fortress, the long range four-engine bomber used extensively to bomb Germany and its allies. The B-17 carried a crew of ten: pilot, copilot, bombardier, navigator, radio operator, and five turret gunners. Gordy was assigned to the U.S. 8th Air Force stationed in England. The 8th Air Force was organized into Groups consisting of 4 Squadrons of 9 aircraft each resulting in each group having 36 B-17 bombers.

The U.S. Air Force bombers flew day sorties while the British bombers flew night sorties. A bomber was much more accurate during daylight hours, but it was also much more dangerous. In 1943, neither the U.S. nor Great Britain had a fighter plane that could fly far enough to escort the bombers to their targets over Germany. Therefore, the bombers had to fend for themselves as they were attacked incessantly by German fighter planes. Gordy recounted that on April 17, 1943, 250 B-17 bombers participated in a bombing mission deep into Germany and of the 250 aircraft, 60 were shot down. This resulted in the death or capture of 600 U.S. airmen from just one mission.

On July 29, 1943, Gordy and his squadron mates were awakened at 4 a.m. to begin briefing for what proved to

be Gordy's last mission. Because so many of his group and squadron had been shot up, shot down, wounded, or captured in the preceding days, Gordy did not have his usual crew. The briefed target for that day was to be the German submarine pens in Kiel Denmark. Enroute to the target, his squadron was flying in the usual formation of ten planes: 3 planes in a "V" followed by 2 more 3-plane formations in a V and then a single bomber in the rear. Gordy's squadron was following other squadrons enroute to the target area. Gordy could see that there was a thick cloud layer that would make finding the target difficult. The U.S. planes were receiving a lot of Flak — anti-aircraft fire from German JU-88 gun emplacements. Gordy's copilot informed Gordy that he had been wounded and Gordy would need to fly the rest of the mission unassisted.

Because of the weather, the U.S. aircraft turned to bomb a secondary target, an airfield on the Elbe River. A German fighter plane attacked and killed the tail gunner in Gordy's aircraft. While in the vicinity of the target, suddenly Gordy's number 2 engine (left side) took a direct hit from the German AAA fire. Falling out of the protective formation of your group's bombers was deadly because you would be a sitting duck for German fighters. But, Gordy's and his plane had no choice when his number 3 engine was also hit. Struggling for control and losing altitude, the aircraft made it to the North Sea. At that point, the crew all parachuted into the sea. Floating down in his parachute, Gordy counted nine other parachutes (the tail gunner was dead). The crew all landed in the frigid North Sea about 9 a.m. with the water temperature about 55

degrees Fahrenheit. Gordy floated and shivered in his life jacket for about 12 hours. About 9:30 p.m., thinking he could not make it through the night, Gordy said a prayer and when he opened his eyes he saw what he thought was a buoy. Swimming towards the buoy, he discovered that it was a life raft from his aircraft and in it were the copilot and navigator. He was greeted with a "Hey boy, what are doing in this pond?"

The three survivors discovered a flare gun and three flares. The first two flares failed to fire because they were too wet. Just before dark, they fired the third flare and it worked. They were soon "rescued" by the German Air/Sea Rescue aircraft which saved 5 of the 9 who had parachuted from the plane.

Arriving ashore as a prisoner, the German pilot pulled his pistol and told Gordy that he had always wanted a flight jacket like the one Gordy was wearing. Gordy obliged and gave the jacket to the German officer.

Gordy promised the club that he would return and recount his experiences as a prisoner of the Germans.

It was a wonderful program for the Kiwanis Club for the day following Memorial Day. Everyone was reminded of the many men and women who have done so much to ensure our country's freedom.

Washington, Holmes FCAT scores drop slightly

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CHIPLEY — Although the test was tougher this year, reading and math scores for third-grade students in Washington and Holmes counties changed only slightly, according to FCAT results released by the State Board of Education recently.

Of the 256 children tested in Holmes County School District for the 2012 FCAT Reading results, 55 percent scored Level 3 or above, with Level 3 being Satisfactory, compared to 56 percent of 268 students in 2011.

In Washington County, 58 percent of the 252 third-graders tested scored Level 3 or above in reading, compared to 63 percent of 247 students tested in 2011.

In mathematics, 44 percent of the 256 children tested in Holmes County scored at Level 3 or above in 2012, the same percentage as was achieved in 2011, when 268 students were tested. Nineteen percent of the students were in the lowest category, Level 1. The 2012 percent was the same as the 2011 results for Level 3 scores and higher at 44 percent. The Level 1 results were down this year, however, from the 24 percent scoring Level 1 in 2011.

In Washington County, 47 percent of the 252 third-graders tested for mathematics scored a Level 3 or above, while 21 percent of students tested were Level 1. That was a slight increase over 2011 when 45 percent of 247 students scored Level 3 or above, but also an 1-percent increase in Level 1 performers over 2011's result of 20 percent.

The state Board of Education set higher achievement levels for the Florida Comprehensive Assessment Test, FCAT 2.0, reading and mathematics tests in December. The numbers show third-graders in the state and county fared slightly better in math but lower in reading.

Students in the third grade must achieve a Level 2 or higher on the FCAT 2.0 reading to be promoted to the fourth grade, and a Level 1 score means retention. Twenty percent of third-graders in Holmes County and 24 percent

of third-graders in Washington County scored a Level 1 and will have the option to put together a portfolio of the student's work or take summer classes.

"The future success of third-grade students depends on mastering essential reading skills," Education Commissioner Gerard Robinson said in a news release. "Today's results help us determine how and where we should focus our resources so students who are struggling with reading get the extra help they need to succeed."

In the ninth-grade level reading scores, both counties saw a slight drop in the Level 3 percentage and Washington County posted an increase in the percentage of students scoring at the Level 1, or inadequate level.

Of the 235 students tested in Holmes County, 49 percent scored at Level 3 or above, down from the 2011 results of 51 percent at Level 3 or higher, although only 218 students were tested in 2011. Both years, a reported 20 percent of the students scoring Level 1 on their reading scores.

In Washington County, 262 ninth-grade students took the reading test and 46 percent of them scored at Level 3 or higher, while 24 percent of the students scored at Level 1. In 2011, 248 Washington County students took the FCAT with 49 percent scoring Level 3 or better while 21 percent of the students were reported at Level 1.

Tenth grade Reading Scores showed a drop in Level 3 scorers for Holmes County while Washington County held steady.

Of the 205 students taking the FCAT in Holmes County, 45 percent scored at Level 3 or above, down from 2011's 51 percent at Level 3, based on 243 students taking the test.

Twenty-four percent of the Holmes County 10th-graders scored at Level 1, according to the report. In 2011 that number was 19 percent.

In Washington County, 47 percent of the 229 students taking the Reading test in 2012 scored at Level 3 or above, which was the same result as 2011, when 228 students were tested.

In 2012, 21 percent of the 10th-graders tested were ranked at Level 1 — down from 2011's 25 percent ranking.

Washington County Tourist Development Council (TDC)

Applicants needed to fill Seat # 5 for an unexpired term ending September 30, 2013, at which time the member would be eligible for appointment to a full 4-year term. All seats on the Washington County TDC are unpaid volunteer positions.

Florida Statute 125.014, Tourist Development Tax, creates the TDC with members appointed by action of the Board of County Commissioners. Subparagraph (4) (e) establishes that the TDC shall consist of nine (9) members with a minimum of 3 and a maximum of 4 being bed tax collectors within the county; 3 must be elected officials nominated by their respective boards with 1 representing the county commission, 1 representing the largest municipality, and 1 representing another municipality; and 3 members must be from industries involved with tourism and/or hospitality or some other direct connection to tourism. The normal term of appointment shall be four (4) years and terms are staggered so that no more than 3 seat terms expire in any year. All TDC members shall be electors (registered voters) within the county.

Seat #5 on the Washington County TDC is designated for Tourism Industry or a Bed Tax Collector.

Interested parties should send a resume and letter of application outlining their experience in activities related to the tourism, hospitality and/or related industries to the TDC office by June 18, 2012. Later, changes were made to include, and honor, all who fought and died, including troops from the Confederate States. Now the date is to honor all veterans of all wars, past and present.

Approximately 40 years ago, Memorial Day was changed from its original date, May 30, to the last Monday in May. The Panama City News Herald recently reported the Lynn Haven Garden Club still holds to the original May 30 day to meet and honor veterans of all wars. Their ceremony is held at Memorial Park in the town where the monument of a Union soldier was erected soon after the Civil War ended. It is reported to be the only such monument in the South, as Lynn Haven was known as a "haven of refuge" for many Union fighting men who survived the terrible war between the states.

On May 20 and 27, Mike Cazalas, editor of the News Herald, wrote interesting and informative articles in

his column, featured in the Sunday edition of the paper. Mike stated in his first of the two Memorial Day articles that between 8,000 and 10,000 World War II veterans, from all branches of military service, die daily in our great country. Obviously this staggering statistic is causing

a concerted effort each year by veteran organizations, and the populace in general, to stop and remember the sacrifices of all soldiers, sailors and airmen who make our continued freedom a reality each and every day.

My 1944 Vernon High School classmate, Shyne Bailey Marley, became a World War II death statistic on May 16, 2012, at the age of 86, when he passed away in his Wewahitchka home with family by his side after years of declining health.

Shyne came into Vernon School in the early 1940s when his father, Rev. J. W. Marley, was named pastor of Vernon Methodist Church. He also preached at other Methodist Churches in the area, including New Hope and Lakeview, and possibly others.

This classmate was an exceptional student with a high IQ. His special interest was mathematics, a subject he always excelled in. He was one of only a few

students who had already advanced in higher mathematics to the level that he was allowed to enroll in a course of study officially titled "Mathematics Essential To The War Effort," or simply "War Math." The course was taught in Vernon High School by a special teacher brought into the county from New York. Her name was Alfa Hubble and she signed her name with a "Miss" written first and insisted she be called by that title.

Shyne Marley breezed through her course with all A's. There were a few other students who made acceptable grades, but Shyne was Miss Hubble's all-time-favorite star student.

This outstanding teacher seems to have dropped out of sight just as quickly as she appeared on the scene in Vernon. Those who remember Miss Alfa Hubble have no knowledge of exactly when she departed Vernon School, nor what her destination was when she left.

Shyne Marley entered the U.S. Navy before graduation from Vernon High School. After separation from the military service in 1946, he resumed his courtship with Era Mitchell from Graceville, whom he married Dec. 21, 1947.

She accompanied him to Gainesville where he had enrolled in the University of Florida

where he obtained an Electronics Engineering degree. Their first son, Bruce, was born while Shyne still was a student. This was during the time your writer was enrolled in the university and I recall going on family picnics at Lake Wauberg, near Gainesville, along with the Marleys and other married students, specifically Arol and Carol McFatter Hudson, and young son, Al, Grant and Sarah Ross Simmons and son, Al, James F. We are a newspaper — fair and responsible

A reader recently asked why we publish "bad" news, referring, I suppose, to the recent travails of a couple of Chipley city officials, while other media in our area seem to avoid controversy.

To the question regarding "bad" news, I replied, "Because that is what a newspaper does. We publish news."

Every day of every year for the past century, the

staff of the Washington County and Holmes County newspapers attend meetings, take photos of pageants and ribbon cuttings and ball games, sell ads, then put it all together and produce a product — a weekly newspaper.

When you come into our offices, you can see the decades of work of dozens of individuals bound in the big books of newspapers.

The thousands of hours of effort by men and women over the years to preserve our local history is captured in those pages like a leaf in amber.

With that sense of duty to history, a newspaper, to me, is required to report everything it can as accurately as possible. That includes not only the happy news of weddings, birthdays, ribbon cuttings and graduations, but also crime, death, unemployment and especially misbehavior by public officials. It all is part of the story and it needs to be there in the record.

Why do non-newspaper media not publish the stories that newspapers publish? My answer also was simple, "A blog isn't a newspaper."

Websites are electronic bulletin boards where people can post pretty much whatever they want with out any repercussions. That is where websites and newspapers diverge — accountability.

Websites, such as Topix, have no professional standards on what can and cannot

be published, and libel law hasn't caught up with those sites — at least not yet.

Also, blogs tend to not have actual staffs (even the Drudge Report back in its heyday was pretty much just Matt Drudge working out of his apartment).

As a newspaper with a century's worth of history and community value established, we have not only a duty to be accurate and responsible, we are also accountable for what we publish. Our names are on everything we write. We live here in the community, and you see us pretty much at every community event.

A newspaper also generally has more financial resources available. That means it has more to lose if content is published irresponsibly. That is how journalistic ethics came to be defined over many years.

Come in to the office sometime and look through the back issues. Sometimes the best way to going is to look at where you've been.

The City of Chipley routinely monitors for contaminants in your drinking water according to Federal and State laws, rules, and regulations. Except where indicated otherwise, this report is based on the results of our monitoring for the period of January 1 to December 31, 2011. Data obtained before January 1, 2011, and presented in this report are from the most recent testing done in accordance with the laws, rules, and regulations.

In the table below, you may find unfamiliar terms and abbreviations. To help you better understand these terms we've provided the following definitions:

Maximum Contaminant Level or MCL: The highest level of a contaminant that is allowed in drinking water. MCLs are set as close to the MCLGs as feasible using the best available treatment technology.

Maximum Contaminant Level Goal or MCLG: The level of a contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MCLGs allow for a margin of safety.

Action Level (AL): The concentration of a contaminant which, if exceeded, triggers treatment or other requirements that a water system must follow.

Picocurie per liter (pCi/L) - measure of the radioactivity in water.

"ND" means not detected and indicates that the substance was not found by laboratory analysis.

Parts per million (ppm) or Milligrams per liter (mg/l) - one part by weight of analyte to 1 million parts by weight of the water sample.

Parts per billion (ppb) or Micrograms per liter (µg/l) - one part by weight of analyte to 1 billion parts by weight of the water sample.

Initial Distribution System Evaluation (IDSE) - An important part of the Stage 2 Disinfection Byproducts Rule (DBPR). The IDSE is a one-time study conducted by water systems to identify distribution system locations with high concentrations of trihalomethanes (THMs) and haloacetic acids (HAAs). Water systems will use results from the IDSE, in conjunction with their Stage 1 DBPR compliance monitoring data, to select compliance monitoring locations for the Stage 2 DBPR.

Maximum residual disinfection level (MRDL) - The highest level of a disinfectant allowed in drinking water. There is convincing evidence that addition of a disinfectant is necessary for control of microbial contaminants.

Maximum residual disinfection level goal (MRDLG) - The level of drinking water disinfectant below which there is no known or expected risk of health. MRDLG's do not reflect the benefits of the use of disinfectants to control microbial contaminants.

Million Fibers per liter (MFL)-Measure of the presence of asbestos fibers that are longer than 7 micrometers.

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2011 Annual Drinking Water Quality Report

We are pleased to announce that our drinking water meets all federal and state requirements.

The sources of drinking water (both tap water and bottled water) include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs, and wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity.

Contaminants that may be present in source water include:

- (A) **Microbial contaminants**, such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations, and wildlife.
- (B) **Inorganic contaminants**, such as salts and metals, which can be naturally-occurring or result from urban stormwater runoff, industrial or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining, or farming.
- (C) **Pesticides and herbicides**, which may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture, urban stormwater runoff, and residential uses.
- (D) **Organic chemical contaminants**, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production, and can, also, come from gas stations, urban stormwater runoff, and septic systems.
- (E) **Radioactive contaminants**, which can be naturally occurring or be the result of oil and gas production and mining activities.

In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, the EPA prescribes regulations, which limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. The Food and Drug Administration (FDA) regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water, which must provide the same protection for public health. Drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that the water poses a health risk. More information about contaminants and potential health effects can be obtained by calling the Environmental Protection Agency’s Safe Drinking Water Hotline at 1-800-426-4791.

Thank you for allowing us to continue providing your family with clean, quality water this year. In order to maintain a safe and dependable water supply, we sometimes need to make improvements that will benefit all of our customers. These improvements are sometimes reflected as rate structure adjustments. Thank you for understanding.

Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Immuno-compromised persons such as persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune system disorders, some elderly, and infants can be particularly at risk from infections. These people should seek advice about drinking water from their health care providers. EPA/CDC guidelines on appropriate means to lessen the risk of infection by Cryptosporidium and other microbiological contaminants are available from the Safe Drinking Water Hotline (800-426-4791).

If present, elevated levels of lead can cause serious health problems, especially for pregnant women and young children. Lead in drinking water is primarily from materials and components associated with service lines and home plumbing. The City of Chipley is responsible for providing high quality drinking water, but cannot control the variety of materials used in plumbing components. When your water has been sitting for several hours, you can minimize the potential for lead exposure by flushing your tap for 30 seconds to 2 minutes before using water for drinking or cooking. If you are concerned about lead in your water, you may wish to have your water tested. Information on lead in drinking water, testing methods, and steps you can take to minimize exposure is available from the Safe Drinking Water Hotline or at <http://www.epa.gov/safewater/lead>.

In 2011 the Department of Environmental Protection performed a Source Water Assessment on our system. The assessment was conducted to provide information about any potential sources of contamination in the vicinity of our wells. There are 13 potential sources of contamination identified for this system with low to moderate susceptibility levels. Hooked on Outdoors

If you enjoy catching dolphin, now is your chance to do so without having to go very far offshore. Saragossa grass has started coming to shore and along with it come dolphins eating the small fish and crabs that live in the grass.

The next time you are out in the Gulf and come upon a stretch of this grass, drop a

handful on the deck of your boat and watch what comes out. Crabs and shrimp will be jumping around.

If you have an aquarium, they provide suitable specimens to keep alive and take home.

Some fine dolphins are being caught in this grass and around the buoys. The dolphins follow the weed patches all the way to the beach, where the grass dies as well as the small creatures that live in it.

Some people still are shocked when you tell them you caught a dolphin, because they think you mean a porpoise. We have fooled around with the names of animals and fish so much we really don't know what someone is talking about when they mention *dolphin*.

When I was growing up, I never heard that word used in reference to a porpoise. They have started calling porpoises, dolphins, and it is so confusing we now have to call dolphins mahi-mahi, the name Hawaiians use. I'm not from Hawaii, and I don't call dolphins mahi-mahi.

Dolphins are also called dorado, but I guess that name isn't as cute as mahi-mahi. It's just like the political correctness police who demand that the species we called jewfish forever now must be referred to as goliath grouper.

Whether you call them mahi-mahi, dorado or dolphin, this fish is within casting range of small boats. You should not have to go more than two or three miles offshore to catch them.

Be on the lookout for poisonous and non-poisonous snakes

Phil Manor remembers the day like it was yesterday. It was late spring in 1993 when he was working by himself on the Apalachicola River Wildlife and Environmental Area tearing out a beaver dam on a wetland.

Manor, who at the time had worked four years as a wildlife biologist with the Florida Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission, was almost through with his work when a 2.5- to 3-foot-long cottonmouth struck the index finger on his left hand. Almost immediately his finger and hand began to throb and burn.

Manor knew he had to get to a doctor. He cranked up his four-wheeler, drove himself to the Howard Creek compound and in a few minutes was at Gulf Pines Hospital in Port St. Joe. He was given five vials of antivenin to negate the effects of the poisonous bite, but it took weeks for the swelling to go down in his left hand.

Every year across the United States an estimated 7,000-8,000 people are bitten by poisonous snakes. About five people die from the bites,

according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

While most people see snakes around water and automatically assume they are cottonmouths, that's generally not the case, Dr. John Himes, a wildlife biologist with the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) said.

"Probably 80 percent to 90 percent of the snakes people see in and around water are harmless water snakes," Himes said. "If you pick them up, they may bite because they don't like being handled, but they are not poisonous."

Himes said both cottonmouths and the five species of water snakes found in the Panhandle play an important ecological role by feeding on dead or dying fish, amphibians and small invertebrates.

All told, there are only six species of poisonous snakes and more than 40

non-poisonous species found in Florida. In addition to the cottonmouth, the list of poisonous snakes includes the canebrake rattlesnake, Eastern diamondback, pygmy rattlesnake, copperhead and coral snake.

The canebrake, also called a timber rattler, is the rarest of the group. Specimens are occasionally found in Northwest Florida from the Olustee area to Alachua County. Canebrakes are more common in Georgia and Alabama and Southeastern states.

The more common poisonous snakes in Florida include the cottonmouth, Eastern diamondback and pygmy rattlesnakes. The latter two are usually found in more rural settings where there's ample cover.

Himes said copperheads are usually found north of Highway 20 in the Panhandle and commonly in low-lying areas along creeks and rivers. He said they are expertly

camouflaged.

Coral snakes are the only species of the group whose venom affects the central nervous system. They have small fangs, in comparison with the other poisonous snakes, and coral snake bites are fairly rare.

"Coral snakes are inoffensive and almost secretive," Himes said. "You find them around yard litter or decaying leaves and such, but if a person wears gloves to do their yard work, they have nothing to fear from this snake."

Although many people are afraid of all snakes, Himes said it's important to remember poisonous and nonpoisonous species play an important role in the environment by preying on rats, mice, small reptiles and amphibians, rabbits and even each other in some cases.

Himes said people, particularly those new to Florida and who fear snakes, should consider obtaining a book or going online to look up the reptiles and amphibians of Florida.



Patton Park awarded FWC gopher tortoise grant

John David Patton Park in Carrabelle is the recipient of a \$5,000 Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) Gopher Tortoise Habitat Management Grant.

Patton Park is a 55-acre parcel consisting of pine flatwoods and planted slash pine with scattered wetlands. It was acquired by the city in 2004 with Florida Forever funds and is managed as a nature park with a picnic pavilion, trails, native plant gardens and restrooms.

The habitat management project to optimize the area for resident gopher tortoises began with an onsite meeting of FWC biologists and Division of Forestry (DOF) prescribed burn specialists, Carrabelle City Administrator Courtney Millender and Sea Oats Garden Club President Lesley Cox to prepare a scope of work plan for fall 2011 and spring 2012.

Health concerns for nearby residents from the 2007 prescribed burn led to a decision to mow instead of burn.

To ensure the safety of the gopher tortoises, the garden club surveyed and flagged six burrows and the city work crew hand-cleared around the entrances.

Approximately, 25 acres of uplands were mowed by DOF using a bush-hog in October 2011.

In May 2012, Odie Lazlo of Crowder Excavating rehabilitated the fire line separating the pine trees from the ti swamps.

Since mowing may be substituted for burning, these management tools are critical in the success of reducing fuel load and encouraging vegetative species that the gopher tortoises need to thrive.

Gopher tortoises are plant-eating scavengers. Their diets contains more than 300 species of plants.

They also eat mushrooms and fruits, including blackberries and paw paws. They usually get water from the food they eat, but

occasionally drink standing water in times of extreme drought.

The gopher tortoises can be found throughout Florida and southern areas of Georgia, South Carolina, Mississippi, Alabama and the tip of eastern Louisiana.

They dig burrows up to 50 feet long, tunneling three feet below the surface of the soil in dry habitats. These tunnels provide shelter and protection from weather and fire for hundreds of other species.

The gopher tortoise grows on average to be slightly less than one foot long and weighs about 29 pounds.

Since July 7, 1987, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service has listed the gopher tortoise as "threatened." Its status is listed as "under review" in Florida.

The University of Florida Conservation Clinic Center for Governmental Responsibility at Levin College of Law described the main threats to the tortoise population

as habitat loss through human development, use as a pet or for meat, relocation causing population disruption and disease caused by relocation.

The Sea Oats Garden Club will continue to monitor the gopher tortoise burrows and work to rehabilitate the native plants gardens. If you are interested in helping, contact Lesley Cox at 697-5555.

CHIPLEY — The 2011-12 school year will be remembered for many different things to different people. But to the Chipley High School Band, it forever will be known as a most distinctive milestone in their history: This school year marks the 75th anniversary of the CHS band.

The marching band celebrated by including a formation during its marching show in the shape of the No. 75. A part of the marching show that garnered superior ratings at each competition and assessment the band participated in this year.

Going back to the beginning, 1936 was an auspicious year in the history of the world. Civil war broke out in Spain, Jesse Owens won four gold medals at the Berlin Olympics in Germany and the Chipley High School band was founded. Back then, things were a little different. The band was made up of students from the fifth through the 12th grades. There were no trumpets in the band, but it did contain several cornets, mellophones and majorettes. Back then, the young ladies in the band wore dresses or skirts and the young men wore long pants as a part of their uniforms. Many in school today likely had grandparents and great-grandparents who were members of these early bands.

The band's first director was Annie Merle Benson, but the band always has been led by talented and imaginative directors.

In January 2011, the CHS band was invited to march in the inaugural parade of newly elected Gov. Rick Scott in Tallahassee. However, this was not the first time such a distinction had been bestowed on our musicians. In 1949, the band marched in the inaugural parade of Gov. Fuller Warren. Throughout the years, the various bands have marched in a plethora of parades. They have participated in the Peanut Festival, Armistice Day Parade, Christmas Parades and the

Several different collections of band members have come together to form orchestras, symphonic bands, jazz ensembles and The Footlighters, a group of members who formed an assemblage reminiscent of those "big bands" one might see in an old movie starring Fred Astaire and Ginger Rogers. The Footlighters would play for various organizations and club dances.

By the time the 1950s came along, the bands were beginning to dress a bit more uniformly, with both the young men and the young ladies wearing long pants. The majorettes, however, still had their trademark short skirts.

In 1969, long time Director Dan Jensen retired. When the 1970s came along, the band had updated its uniforms, and the majorettes had graduated to wearing much more daring costumes covered with shiny spangles. They still were up to their old tricks, though, marching at football games and parades throughout the

area. The 1978-79 school year saw a new band director, Mr. Dell. The band that year once again was busy showing its expertise in several venues including football games, marching contests and perhaps its first appearance on national television. They traveled to Phoenix City, Ala., to perform during the half-time of a bowl game there.

The band also continued to regale music lovers with concerts throughout the years. They even have performed joint concerts with the chorus in past years.

The "Blue Crew" continued a busy schedule with many other public appearances through the 1980s. The band performed during half-time at Tiger football games, pep rallies, basketball games, parades, concerts and an FSU homecoming parade. It also received a Superior rating at the Florida Bandmasters Association District Marching Contest.

In 1985, the band had another new director, one who many former Roulhac Mid-

dle School band members know well: Allan Williams. The band that year received more Superior ratings at various district marching competitions and performed at the National Peanut Festival Parade in Dothan, Ala., and the Christmas Parade in Panama City.

In 1986, the band got new uniforms and music building in which to hold classes and many dedicated practice sessions. And the 1990s saw the CHS "Spirit of the Tiger" band continue to receive more Superiors at area competitions and assessments. They even took home a Best In Class trophy in 1994 at a competition in Wewahatchka. The uniforms the band wears to this day came in 1995. Once again, the band traveled to the FBA District Marching Festival in Panama City and received yet another Superior rating.

The CHS band welcomed present-day band Director Richard Davenport in 2000. The band kept to the tradition of receiving the highest ratings possible by scoring

at Northview High School that ended up earning the team a berth in Orlando at the state playoffs. On the ride to Northview, the football team's bus caught fire and ended up completely burning. The band's bus was then used to transport the football players to the game. While the band cooled their heels in a parking lot in Crestview, the football team made it just in time to Northview to forestall a forfeit. The band arrived at the game just before half time in a substitute bus. They immediately unloaded their instruments, lined up and marched onto the field to present a spectacular half-time show. They then proceeded to bring some life to the fans and incite the players on to win the game with their spirited playing and cheering. A couple of weeks later, the band then presented a rousing halftime show at the playoff game held in the Citrus Bowl in Orlando.

The CHS band continues its tradition of excellence to this very day. The 2011-12 school year has seen them receive Superiors for each of their performances at various competitions and assessments; in Dothan at the Southern Showcase Marching Contest, in Troy at the Southeastern States Marching Band Festival and in Panama City at the FBA Marching Band Assessment. The band works hard for the kudos bestowed on them by the judges and adjudicators. Their summer vacations end a couple of weeks before school starts as they being practicing for a new show designed to thrill and enchant audiences. During the school year, they play at Veterans Day remembrances, Christmas and Spring Concerts, community events and at the CHS graduation ceremony.

Chipley High School is indeed lucky to sport not only a talented and dedicated band director in Richard Davenport but also a group of talented and hard-working students that will go far in their lives as they put the lessons learned in band to work in their lives after high school.



Protect horses from increasing fly problem

If you are around horses or a stable lately, you may notice an increase in flies, such as stable flies, house flies, horn flies and horse flies.

Dr. Leslie Easterwood, clinical assistant professor for the large animal clinical sciences department at Texas A&M University College of Veterinary Medicine and Biomedical Sciences, said flies are worse in the summertime, and this year they are particularly bad.

"Last year it was dry and hot so it didn't seem quite as bad, but this year we've had rain and the temperatures haven't been as high, so there seems to be an increase," Easterwood said.

Flies can be a nuisance to a horse because the horse tries to swat and get away from them. Other than annoying the horse, the biting flies can cause physical irritations. Often, the flies congregate around the horse's face trying to drink the fluid at the corner of the horse's eyes. Because flies carry bacteria on their feet, they deposit bacteria, larvae and parasites on the horse's face and around the eyes when they are looking for moisture.

"The biggest thing is the transfer [of bacteria], and all flies can be both-

ersome," Easterwood said.

Flies often deposit habronema larvae on open wounds or horse's eyes.

"As the larvae migrate through the tissue, they cause open sores, and that is very common in horses this time of year," Easterwood said.

Horse flies are even worse than normal house and stable flies. Easterwood said these flies are at least 10 times the size of a house fly, have big mouths and transfer more diseases than a house or stable fly.

"They can transfer diseases, such as equine infectious anemia, a very fatal disease that we don't have a cure for," she said.

Easterwood said these irritations, sores, diseases and transfer of bacteria are the main reason it is important to have proper fly control.

"Good fly control extends to the face, not just spraying the body, but using stuff safe to use by their eyes," she said.

Easterwood recommended using sprays and ointments to repel flies. Ointment can be applied to a cloth and used to wipe the horse's eyes. The repellent can be bought over the counter

or through a veterinarian. Different environmental factors determine which product should be used for individual needs.

"If there is a bad fly problem, you would be better off to use a product every day that you can reapply frequently to keep the population down. As opposed to if you have a very good environmental program, you can apply the longer lasting product," Easterwood said. She added that most people reapply fly products daily.

She warned, however, that many products claim the repellent lasts longer than others.

"We have found that very few [products] last as long as they say they will," Easterwood said.

She explained that all fly repellent works on the various types of flies.

"It repels all of [the flies] and mosquitoes," Easterwood said.

She also suggested covering the horse with fly sheets for their bodies and fly masks for their faces.

Other options include an automatic fly spray system in barns, moving manure and trash piles away from the horses or drying out the manure pile.


according to the report.

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Snake, rattle and roll in the aisles

I would agree with the idea that religion comes in all shapes, sizes and temperaments. It is quite obvious that sanity is not a prerequisite of religion. If it were, most religions would go out of business within the 30-day money back guarantee period.

Every religion has some sort of litmus test for faith. It is in this area of religion that smacks so loudly of insanity. Superstition, regardless of the basis, is one great common denominator of all religion. It is not that I mind superstition. I just do not want it associated with my religion.

I read in the newspaper headlines just this week a pastor was killed by a rattlesnake bite. I had almost forgotten this sort of thing went on in our sophisticated, "enlightened" world.

As a young preacher, I was visiting a congregation in Kentucky as the guest speaker for that Sunday. Never mind the town or the church, that is beside the point.

I got to the church a little early and was escorted around the church looking at the facilities. Then they took me into the sanctuary where I could look at the pulpit and the sanctuary where I would be preaching.

Being the observant person that I am, I noticed a basket next to the pulpit.

I had never seen such a basket before him all my life. I really did not know too much about the church, and now I cannot remember exactly why I was invited to preach there. Be that as it may, I was greatly curious about the basket next to the pulpit. I did not know if it was a wastebasket or if perhaps it was the offering basket and the congregation would fill it up before the service was over.

So, I asked my host what the basket was next to the pulpit.

"That's where we keep the rattlesnake," he said rather passively.

"Say what!"

"That basket there is where we keep the rattlesnake that we use in our service."

I can take a joke and give it back with the best of them. I responded with a hearty laugh.

"Ha, ha, ha," I said good-naturedly. "Really, what is that basket for?"

I could see my host was not the least bit amused with my persistent inquiry.

He said rather sternly, "that's where we keep our rattlesnake for our church service."

He then stared at me for a few moments and then said, "I don't think we'll need it in our service today. You don't look like you have enough faith."

Inside me, I sighed a deep sigh of relief. There is a time when I want to bolster my faith, but in

the circumstance before me, I did not want enough faith to handle some rattlesnake. One of the tenants of my religion is to run as fast as I can away from any and all rattlesnakes. It is one part of my religion I take rather seriously.

My host tried explaining to me what was going on. He pointed to a passage in Mark 16:17-18 (KJV), "And these signs shall follow them that believe; In my name shall they cast out devils; they shall speak with new tongues; They shall take up serpents; and if they drink any deadly thing, it shall not hurt them; they shall lay hands on the sick, and they shall recover."

My first reaction was to think he was pulling the wool over my eyes, so to speak, and I almost laughed out loud. I caught myself in time when I realized this man was serious. According to him, he could have enough faith in God to pick up the poisonous rattlesnake and if it bit him, it would not hurt him at all.

According to their religion, when they are truly "in the Spirit," they have the power to pick up a poisonous rattlesnake, and if it bites you, it will not hurt you. They keep the basket containing a rattlesnake in the front of the church for when such an occasion arises. I was hoping it would not arise during my time in the pulpit.

All during my sermon, I could not help casting a wistful eye in the general direction of the basket next

to the pulpit.

At one point, I thought I did see the basket move.

I yelled at this point, which excited the congregation thinking I had gotten "in the spirit," and then everybody cast a wistful eye in the direction of the basket.

I respect other people's views on everything, I suppose. However, there are some things I have difficulty wrapping my tired brain around. This has to be one of them. How you can pull the bit about the rattlesnake out of that verse of scripture and ignore the rest of it is really beyond me.

Religion will make you do many silly things that have no sanity behind it. Many people just go through the motions not really knowing why they are doing what they are doing.

At least the snake handlers have a little bit of excitement in their services. Nothing I want to experience, but then who am I to criticize?

I rest my faith upon the Scripture. Particularly, "So then faith cometh by hearing, and hearing by the word of God" (Romans 10:17 KJV).

My faith keeps me away from poisonous rattlesnakes.

Words are concrete, audible and visible expressions of abstract concepts. A word is a materialized idea and thus the concept of "Logos" or "Word" was a natural idea to express and explain the second person of the trinity, i.e. Jesus. Understanding this gives one a sense of the sublime power of language to both create and to make the world intelligible.
