

Gov. Scott promotes tourism, Isaac recovery Washington County gets rain, tornado warning

PENSACOLA — Gov. Rick Scott has a message for tourists concerned that Hurricane Isaac washed out their Labor Day weekend plans — Come on down.

The governor was in Pensacola Thursday to promote travel to the Panhandle and to talk with hospitality and tourism leaders about economic recovery from the storm that lashed the coastline this week.

It was windy and rainy in the Panhandle Thursday morning, but tourism officials are hoping to rebound with a strong end-of-summer holiday weekend.

Scott had breakfast with tourism officials before

One South Bank was chartered in 2008, and Wilson believes it was organized for the right reasons. According to Wilson, "Community banks are vital to the health and

stopping by the Hilton on Pensacola Beach, where he chatted with hotel employees. Later, he toured the National Naval Aviation Museum.

Washington County was under a tornado warning early Thursday, and tornadoes were reported in Jackson County on Wednesday, but otherwise the region was unscathed by Hurricane Isaac.

According to Washington County Emergency Management officials, no action was needed in the county, and no power lines were downed by the storm. Although Hurricane Isaac made landfall to the West, bands of rain battered the Panhandle Wednesday and Thursday. The storm is expected to continue on to Arkansas and Missouri this weekend.

Other communities along the Gulf Coast were not so lucky. Residents of the storm-saturated Mississippi Gulf Coast ventured out Thursday to examine damage from Isaac as local governments lifted curfews. Some neighborhoods flooded as the tropical storm continued dumping heavy rains on its slow trek northward.

Even at its strongest, Hurricane Isaac was far weaker than Hurricane Katrina, which at its peak was a Category 5 and hit New Orleans as a Category 3. Isaac came ashore late Tuesday as a Category 1 hurricane, with 80 mph winds near the mouth of the Mississippi River. It drove a wall of water nearly 11 feet high inland. Some coastal businesses and roads reopened, but many people who had evacuated still couldn't make

it home because of standing water in low-lying areas and along rivers. Near the western end of Mississippi's coastline, beachside roads were covered in sand, and several dead nutria — large semiaquatic rodents — littered Beach Boulevard in Hancock County.

A tow truck driver, Gregory Alan Parker, 62, of Picayune, was killed early Thursday when Isaac's high winds and heavy rains knocked a tree onto his vehicle in his hometown, one county up from the coast and just across the state line from Louisiana.

Near the Alabama line, Jackson County Emergency Management Agency spokeswoman Monica Cooper said authorities evacuated people Thursday morning as water rose in the Kreole community in eastern Moss Point. She said some were also being rescued in areas of Pascagoula south of U.S. 90 and there were reports of rising waters in Escatawpa. Cooper said residents told authorities that some houses flooded, although it was not immediately clear how many.

Many people left the Kreole area when rumors circulated that flood gates would be opened at the Big Creek Lake on the western side of Mobile, Ala.

Mobile Water and Sewer System, which operates the dam on the drinking water reservoir, partially opened the flood gates, said Cooper. Local authorities were "not expecting any great impact from that opening," she said.

Hancock County Chief Deputy Don Bass said Isaac's storm surge left two-

to three-feet of sand on the road in spots on Beach Boulevard, which runs along the shore in Bay St. Louis and Waveland. He said a primary concern is flooding along rivers and creeks, which continue to rise from rain further north.

Bands of intermittent rain still pelted the soggy coast and there was gusting wind, but conditions had improved since the height of the storm Wednesday.

Forecasters also say as many as 11 inches of rain could fall by Monday in parts of Mississippi.

President Barack Obama declared federal emergencies in Louisiana and Mississippi. The declarations free up federal aid for affected areas.

In New Orleans, officials had to scramble to evacuate and rescue people as waters quickly rose. Inside the city, the fortified defenses held and life began to slowly get back to some sort of normalcy.

Along the shores of Lake Ponchartrain near New Orleans, officials sent scores of buses and dozens of high-water vehicles to help evacuate about 3,000 people as rising waters lapped against houses and left cars stranded. Floodwaters rose waist-high in some neighborhoods, and the Louisiana National Guard was working with sheriff's deputies to rescue people stranded in their homes.

To the east, evacuations were ordered in a sparsely-populated area as a lake dam threatened to break near the Mississippi-Louisiana border. Officials in Tangipahoa Parish, La., feared the water

it would pour into the already swollen river would flood low-lying areas downstream.

Even as Isaac weakened on its slow trek inland, it continued to spin off life-threatening weather including storm surges, inland flooding from torrential rain and potential tornadoes. Nearly half of Louisiana electrical customers lost power and another 150,000 were out in neighboring Mississippi.

Isaac arrived seven years after Hurricane Katrina and passed slightly to the west of New Orleans, where the city's fortified levee system easily handled the assault.

"Unfortunately, that's not been the case for low-lying areas outside the federal system, in particular lower Jefferson and Plaquemines parishes," said Louisiana Democratic U.S. Sen. Mary Landrieu. "Hurricane Isaac has reinforced for us once again just how vulnerable these critical areas are. We must re-engage the Corps of Engineers on this."

Louisiana's Public Service Commission said 901,000 homes and businesses around the state — about 47 percent of all customers — were without power Thursday. Utility company Entergy said that included about 157,000 in New Orleans.

New Orleans' biggest problems seemed to be downed power lines, scattered tree limbs and minor flooding. One person was reported killed, compared with 1,800 deaths from Katrina in Louisiana and Mississippi. And police reported few problems with looting. New Orleans Mayor Mitch Landrieu ordered a dusk-to-dawn curfew.

But in Plaquemines Parish, a sparsely populated area south of the city that is outside the federal levee system, dozens of people were stranded in flooded coastal areas and had to be rescued. The storm pushed water over an 18-mile levee and put so much pressure on it that authorities planned to intentionally puncture the floodwall to relieve the strain.

Officials rushed to evacuate more than 100 nursing home residents from Plaquemines Parish, an area with a reputation for residents hunkering down to weather storms and perhaps the hardest hit by Isaac. In this hardscrabble, mostly rural parish, even the sick and elderly are hardened storm veterans.

"I don't think we had to evacuate to begin with," said Romaine Dahl, 59, as he sat in a wheelchair. "The weather was a hell of a lot worse last night than it is now. And I got an idea that after all this is said and done they're going to say everything is over with, go on back home."

Other residents in the Riverbend Nursing and Rehabilitation Center were loaded into ambulances and taken to a nearby naval station. Residents had their names and birth dates attached to their shirts.

Josephine King, 84, handled the move well, waiting in a wheelchair. "I'm feeling good," she said.

By midafternoon Wednesday, Isaac had been downgraded to a tropical storm. The Louisiana National Guard ceased rescue operations in Plaquemines Parish, saying it felt confident it had

gotten everyone out. There were no serious injuries. National Guard spokesman Capt. Lance Cagnolatti said guardsmen would stay in the area over the coming days to help.

Isaac's maximum sustained winds had decreased to 45 mph and the National Hurricane Center said it was expected to become a tropical depression by Thursday night, meaning its top sustained winds would drop below 39 mph. The storm's center was on track to cross Arkansas on Friday and southern Missouri on Friday night, spreading rain as it goes.

Forecasters expected Isaac to move farther inland over the next several days, dumping rain on drought-stricken states across the nation's midsection before finally breaking up over the weekend.

On Thursday, forecasters said another tropical depression has formed over the Atlantic Ocean, but it's still hundreds of miles away from land.

The U.S. National Hurricane Center in Miami said that the depression was still nearly 1,200 miles east of the Windward Islands. It had maximum sustained winds of 35 mph and was moving west at 20 mph.

It's expected to strengthen into Tropical Storm Leslie later in the day, once its winds reach at least 39 mph.

The depression currently poses no threat to land and is expected to gradually start moving to the northwest, well off the U.S. coast.

Armed robbery suspect killed by officers

MARIANNA — a suspect in an armed robbery was shot and killed by officers Tuesday after making threatening movements with a handgun, according to a statement from the Jackson County Sheriffs Office.

According to JCSCO, just before 11:30 a.m., authorities received a call from a female reporting that while sitting in her vehicle at a pharmacy on the east side of Marianna, she was approached by a Hispanic

male who displayed a handgun and demanded money, she told the man she did not have any money, so he reached into her vehicle and took her cell phone. He then fled on foot. K-9 tracking teams from Apalachee Correctional Institute and Jackson Correctional Institute tracked the man for more than two hours through dense vegetation behind the Crossroads Shopping Center.

During the mid-afternoon, the suspect was found and when confront-

ed by officers, he made, "aggressive moves with a handgun," prompting officers to fire several rounds at the suspect. The suspect was fatally wounded during the gunfire.

No officers or civilians were injured. As normal for officer involved shootings, the incident is being investigated by the Florida Department of Law Enforcement and the State Attorney's Office. Names are being withheld until the investigation is completed.

WASHINGTON COUNTY — a Panama City Beach man was killed in a single-car crash early Sunday morning, according to the Florida Highway Patrol report

released Tuesday.

Lance Olmstead, 27, was driving alone in a 2000 GMC Sierra south down State 77 around 2 a.m., Saturday when he lost control of the vehicle and was ejected as

it began to overturn. Emergency responders pronounced him dead at the scene. FHP reported that Olmstead was not wearing a seatbelt. Toxicology results are pending.

Spanish Trail Playhouse in 1964 as a Charter Member, a position they would hold for the next four years.

The Spanish Trail Playhouse ran for seven very successful years but after their final performance of "The Sound of Music," the playhouse closed its curtains for the last time in fall of 1968, according to the website.

In August of 2006, under the leadership of Kevin Russell, work began to bring the Spanish Trail Playhouse back to Washington County. The Playhouse became incorporated through the state of Florida on April 8, 2007. The first public organization meeting, held at the Washington County Public Library,

took place on Sept. 4, 2007.

On Sept. 5, 2008, merely one year since its reestablishment, the Spanish Trail Playhouse officially opened its curtain again, with a 3-day performance of "Steel Magnolias." This production was sponsored by the Washington County Tourist Development Council and the Washington County Arts Council, and took place at the Chipley High School Auditorium, as the playhouse did not have a permanent home. In July 2008, the Spanish Trail Playhouse took over the lease of the Historic Chipley High School Auditorium, where the Playhouse is still in residence.

who are invested in this community. We live here, work here, worship and play right here. This community is our home, but also the local economy that we depend upon for our livelihood," Wilson said.

Interestingly, the safest of the nation's more than 7,300 banks typically are local banks rather than banks

with a national presence.

We are a small business, and just like the local drug store or grocer, we know that our success depends on serving our customers well, investing in the growth and prosperity of our community, and managing our operations in a safe, sound, customer-focused manner."

Investing Answers, a publisher of financial news, originally published the research basing its "safest banks" ranking on those institutions with a perfect score on the Texas Ratio. One South Bank was one of 12 Florida-based banks with a perfect score.

"The 359 Safest Banks in America," published on MSN Money, based its listing on how banks scored on a measurement called the Texas Ratio, a tool that American Banker magazine said "is often used to measure the riskiness of a bank and its likelihood of failure." The ratio is "calculated by dividing a bank's bad debt by the amount of money available to absorb troubled assets."

Developed by a banking analyst during the state's recession in the 1980's, the

Texas Ratio was used then to accurately predict bank failures and again during a recession in New England in the 1990s. The ratio is still widely used throughout the banking industry.

While the ratio was developed to predict bank failures, the ratio can also be used to find the banks that are, conversely, furthest from failure according to the article. The closer the bank scores to zero, the lower its risk of failure. Of the 7,300 banks in America, One South Bank was one of 359 that scored 0.0 on that ratio.

"While we enjoy this ranking based on the Texas Ratio and will work to maintain it, there are many other reasons to make One South your bank," Wilson said. Looking for something to do this Labor Day weekend? Why not get out on the water and experience some of Florida's finest fishing? Saltwater recreational anglers can fish without a recreational fishing license on Sept. 1 as part of the state's license-free fishing days.

"Florida's license-free fishing days are an excellent opportunity to share the fun, excitement and togetherness of a fishing trip with the entire family. This also is a great time for experienced anglers to introduce friends to the sport, even if they don't have a fishing license," said Nick Wiley, executive director of the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission.

"We hope Florida residents and visitors will experience the joy of saltwater fishing. We expect many will discover a healthy sport they can enjoy for a lifetime."

Gag grouper is open for harvest in most state and all federal waters in the Gulf and Atlantic. For those looking to get in the water, bay scallop and spiny lobster seasons are in full swing. Want to stick a little closer to shore? Try your hand at near-shore

species such as spotted seatrout or red drum.

Have questions? The FWC Division of Marine Fisheries Management will have staff working dockside at the St. Marks National Wildlife Refuge in Wakulla County and at the Cedar Key Public Pier and Marina from about 7 a.m. through midday. Staff will provide the public with fisheries publications, such as Saltwater Regulations and Fishing Lines magazines, and will be there to talk to the public and answer questions.

Fishing is a family-fun and wholesome form of entertainment, which is why the FWC offers four license-free fishing days each year. This year's freshwater license-free fishing days were April 7 and June 9, and the first saltwater day was June 2.

Come out and learn how the state's abundant resources, coupled with responsible saltwater and freshwater fish management, make Florida the "Fishing Capital of the World."

All other bag limit, season and size restrictions apply on these dates.

United Way director chosen to attend national tax credit seminar

PANAMA CITY — Ron Sharpe, director of resource development for United Way of Northwest Florida, was selected by the Center on Budget and Policy Priorities to attend a two-day Tax Credit

Seminar Sept. 19 and 20 in Washington, D.C.

This seminar will provide insight on how to recruit and raise community awareness regarding Earned Income Tax Credit and the Volunteer Income Tax Assistance Program.

United Way of Northwest Florida has been involved in the Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) Program for the past four years.

VITA is an IRS sanctioned program that trains volunteers to prepare simple tax returns for individuals

and families with a low-to-moderate income. In 2012, the local VITA program processed 2,281 tax returns, which brought approximately \$2.7 million in refunds back into Bay County. Many individuals who qualify for this service are unaware of

tax credits that are available to them, such as the Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC) or the Child Tax Credit (CTC), or lack the resources to file their own tax returns. The information gained at this seminar will enable United Way of Northwest Florida to

organize and conduct outreach training sessions in our community regarding basic EIC and CTC eligibility and filing rules, how to link workers with free tax filing assistance and how to launch effective outreach campaign activities.

Over the past week, I've experienced two different problems. I'm suddenly faced with a choice about how to deal with these situations. Everybody who has ever faced obstacles, meaning everyone on the entire planet, has choices about how to handle difficulties.

Some people settle into despair or resignation. Personally, I prefer not to pursue either of those options. Despair is a choice. It's a choice that I personally reject. You do have a choice about how to respond to life's nasty little surprises. Even a complete tragedy involves choices about how you're going to deal with it. I can assure you that anger

and negativity will do absolutely nothing to make the situation better. Whatever problems you may be facing, they're not going to be made better by worry, hostility, rage or bitterness.

Problems invite us to do one thing above all else, and that is to think. Every dilemma requires thinking of a solution. Sometimes, the solution doesn't come easily, so we must keep on thinking, planning and making strategies to overcome our problems.

There are a few problems in life, but only a few, that can't be fixed. I'm a big fan of positive thinking, but it won't undo the devastation caused by natural disasters or bring someone back from the dead. In such a case, when

the damage is done and can't be undone, we are still required to think. But now we have to think about how to piece our lives back together and move forward.

Even outright catastrophe, dreadful as it may be, can hold some hope for future generations. A person who's tired of dealing with floods or watching loved ones die from a certain disease might get outraged enough to start searching for answers that will spare others from such anguish. Hurricane Isaac is sufficient proof that we haven't tamed Mother Nature yet, but on a positive note, we have better weather prediction capabilities now than in any previous generation. It will only get better as people continue studying and developing more

effective ways of coping with problems thrown at us by forces that once seemed beyond the realm of human understanding. Some diseases that once struck terror into the hearts of our ancestors are rarely heard of today. That's because there are people who react to problems by advocating progress instead of pessimism.

For religious individuals, it's natural to seek spiritual solace. But that solace should never be accompanied by inactivity. As the Bible advises in Joshua 1:9, "Be strong and of a good courage; be not afraid, neither be thou dismayed: for the Lord thy God is with thee whithersoever thou goest." But there's nothing in that verse advising people to park on the sofa waiting for answers to mysteriously

drop down from heaven. We still have to work at improving our own lives.

As I mentioned, I've undergone some setbacks recently. One of them really caught me unexpectedly. After a brief period of panic, without a single clue about what to do next, I put myself to work. While trying to address the problem, I've admittedly had moments of feeling like an ant trying to climb Mount Everest. But even an ant, by putting one foot in front of the other, will eventually get to the top of the mountain.

Most inventions, from the can opener to modern aircraft, started with a problem. Whether the problem involved needing to open a can of green beans or wanting to fly to another continent, somebody finally decided to quit complaining and get

it done.

The next time you have a problem, try asking yourself a few questions. How did this happen? How can I prevent this from happening to me the future? How can I stop it from happening to others? What steps can I take right now to make the situation better? On the grand scale of things, how big a problem is this, anyway? Most importantly, ask yourself what choices you have.

Realizing that you have choices is the most important key to dealing with any problem in life.

Any solution that you arrive at, even a small one, is guaranteed to be better than whining and giving up. Never give up. Instead, become that person who finds solutions not just on a temporary basis, but with future generations in mind.

FSU law, medical schools among nation's best for Hispanics

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. — Florida State University's colleges of law and medicine are among the 10 best in the nation for Hispanics, according to Hispanic Business magazine.

The College of Law was ranked third among the nation's law schools, while the College of Medicine was ranked seventh among medical schools.

"We're pleased that Hispanic Business magazine has recognized Florida State University's colleges of law and medicine as among the nation's best for Hispanic students,"

said Provost and Executive Vice President for Academic Affairs Garnett S. Stokes. "The success we have had in recruiting and retaining Hispanic students reflects the university's commitment to excellence and our dedication to encouraging a diverse community where all of our students can thrive."

The magazine based its rankings on percentage of Hispanic student enrollment; percentage of Hispanic faculty members; percentage of degrees conferred upon Hispanics; and progressive programs aimed at increasing enrollment of Hispanic students.

Hispanics made up 10.2 percent of the law school's enrollment and received 13 of the 272 law degrees (4.8 percent) awarded to the class of 2011. Of the college's full-time faculty, 11.4 percent was Hispanic.

"We're proud of the wonderful environment for Hispanic students at our law school," said Nancy Benavides, the College of Law's associate dean for student affairs.

At the College of Medicine, Hispanics made up 14.1 percent of the college's student body and earned six of the 114 medical degrees (5.3 percent) awarded in 2011. Five percent of

the college's full-time faculty was Hispanic.

The College of Medicine strives to create a diverse physician work force for Florida's diverse population, including rural and inner-city residents, said College of Medicine Dean John P. Fogarty.

"It is critical that we recruit outstanding students from backgrounds and areas who are most likely to serve rural and inner-city communities," Fogarty said. "These rankings tell us that we are doing just that."

More than 20 percent of the College of Medicine's Class of 2016 was admit-

ted by way of outreach programs. As a result, 37 percent of the class is minority — including 12 percent who are Hispanic.

Also of note: The school's six regional campuses have nearly 200 Hispanic clinical faculty members. Many students participate in global medical trips to Central America, while others do rotations in high-density Hispanic migrant-worker areas such as Immokalee, Fla. The school offers conversational and medical Spanish classes as electives, and in 2010 the Association of Latino Medical Students was named FSU's graduate student or-

ganization of the year.

"Although Tallahassee seems far from other cities in Florida with higher concentrations of Hispanics, the FSU College of Medicine is not just Tallahassee," said Ricardo Gonzalez-Rothi, chair of the college's Department of Clinical Sciences. "We are omnipresent throughout the state in our regional campuses. Our students like the atmosphere because they are valued and respected and because we value and respect our patients. I anticipate that FSU will become the top choice for Hispanics around the state."
