

Objectivist Party

Dr. Tom Stevens is an educator, attorney and political activist, according to objectivistparty.us.

He has appeared as an expert or to discuss current events and/or topics on more than 200 national talk shows, and for 2½ years, he produced and hosted "In Focus," his own cable television show.

Stevens is a graduate of New York University, where he served as freshman representative, sophomore representative and as president of the student council, and Hofstra University School of Law, for which he twice served as president of the Hofstra University School of Law Alumni Association.

According to the website, Stevens lives his life in accordance with the philosophy of Ayn Rand. In her words, "the question isn't who is going to let me; it's who is going to stop me!"

**FYI** — The Objectivist Party is a political party that seeks to promote Ayn Rand's philosophy, objectivism, in the political realm. The party was founded by Stevens on Feb. 2, 2008, to coincide with Rand's birthday.

**GARY JOHNSON**  
Libertarian Party

Just off the bat, former Gov. Gary Johnson has the fanciest website of the also-rans — but then I am just on No. 2 in the Back Pack (get it? they're all behind Romney and Obama, and they're a group, so...).

According to his website, garyjohnson2012.com, Johnson has been referred to as the "most fiscally conservative governor" in the country. Johnson was the Republican Governor of New Mexico from 1995-2003.

A successful businessman before running for office in 1994, Johnson started a door-to-door handyman business to help pay his way through college. Twenty years later, he had grown the firm into

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# Holmes BOCC looks to fix Yancy Lane

**BONIFAY** — Holmes County Board of County Commissioners agreed with Commissioner Monty Merchant's request during their regularly scheduled meeting on Oct. 30 to allow County Engineer Cliff Knauer to look into means of fixing the erosion problem on Yancy Lane.

"There are serious problems on that road every time we have heavy rains," Merchant said. "Cliff should look into what can be done to fix the problem as well as look for funds to help pay for it."

The Board approved of the upcoming meeting arrangements — regular board meeting at 9 a.m. on Tuesday, Nov. 13; swearing in of new and/or re-elected board mem-

bers at 9 a.m. on Tuesday, Nov. 20; regular board meeting at 6 p.m. on Tuesday, Nov. 27; and the only regular board meeting in December at 9 a.m. on Dec. 11.

The board approved of adopting a supplemental budget after holding a Supplemental Budget Hearing to adjust their budget because the county paid off what they owed on the Holmes County Fair Grounds earlier than expected.

The Board approved of renewing their existing contract with Enterprise Florida and Holmes County Development Commission.

Bob Brioni, a representative from West Florida Regional Planning came before the board to report that the Holmes County BOCC Equal Opportunity Plan had been successfully updated.

"We revised the plan, gave it new verbiage, a new census, gave update recommendations and suggestions," Brioni said. "All in all, we're proud of how it came out."

During the meeting on Tuesday, Sept. 11, the Board approved of County Attorney Jeff Goodman's recommendation to allow West Florida Regional Planning to update the Holmes County BOCC Equal Opportunity Plan for \$770.

"The plan is several years old and is in need of updating," Goodman said. "It would be a lot cheaper for them to update it because they have all of the resources and knowledge of the present requirements at their fingertips then it would be for me to take the time to research it."

The board tabled appointing any Tri-County Community Council Board Directors until after the swearing-in ceremony on Nov. 20, agreeing that is should wait until the December meeting.

Residents and business owners Johnny and Sandra Johnson came before the board requesting to place a vending area on their business property on County Road 160 across from the Bethlehem School.

"It's just going to be a sheltered area with vending machines housed in it," Johnny Johnson said. "There's one just like it in Graceville."

He said their problem came with the Holmes County Health Department having issues with no bathrooms.

"It's not going to be a store,"

Johnny said. "It's just going to be a place where vending machines are going to be located. The one in Graceville doesn't have a bathroom either."

The Board agreed to allow County Attorney Jeff Goodman to look into the matter and report back to the board with his findings at the next meeting, on Nov. 13.

The Board also approved of Goodman's memorandum to the employees on using inmates for only county business and not personal; the renewed contract with Doctors Memorial Hospital for another year; the professional agreement with the company awarded the bid for cleaning services for the county; and a revised contract with the medical professionals providing inmate medical services.

one of the largest construction companies in New Mexico with more than 1,000 employees.

Johnson is best known for his veto record, which includes more than 750 vetoes during his time in office, more than all other governors combined, and his use of the veto pen has since earned him the nickname "Governor Veto." He cut taxes 14 times while never raising them. When he left office, New Mexico was one of only four states in the country with a balanced budget.

Term-limited, Johnson retired from public office in 2003. An avid skier, adventurer and bicyclist, he has reached the highest peak on four of the seven continents, including Mt. Everest.

FYI — The Libertarian Party is the third largest political party in the U.S., and it is also identified by many as the fastest growing political party in the United States.

The Libertarian Party favors minimally regulated markets, a less powerful state, strong

civil liberties, the legalization of cannabis, separation of church and state, open immigration, non-interventionism and neutrality in diplomatic relations, freedom of trade and travel to all foreign countries, and a more responsive and direct democracy.

### VIRGIL H. GOODE JR.

Constitution Party of Florida

Here's the entirety of Virgil H. Goode's information from the website, goodeforpresident2012.com: Goode, a Baptist, was born in 1946 and is married to Lucy Goode. He holds a bachelor's degree from the University of Richmond (Phi Beta Kappa)

and a J.D. from the University of Virginia School of Law. He served in the Army National Guard from 1969-75 and in the Virginia State Senate from

December 1973 to January 1997. He also served in the U.S. House of Representatives from January 1997 to January 2009.

FYI — The Constitution Party is a conservative political party, founded as the U.S. Taxpayer's Party in 1991 by Howard Phillips.

The party's official name was changed to The Constitution Party in 1999; however, some state affiliate parties are known under different names — here, it is the Constitution Party of Florida. The party's platform defines itself as predicated on the principles of the nation's founding documents. The party puts a large focus on immigration, calling for stricter penalties toward illegal immigrants and a moratorium on legal immigration until all federal subsidies to immigrants are discontinued.

### DR. JILL STEIN

Green Party

Dr. Jill Stein is a mother, physician, longtime teacher

of internal medicine and pioneering environmental-health advocate, according to jillstein.org. She is the co-author of two widely-praised reports,

"In Harm's Way: Toxic Threats to Child Development," published in 2000, and "Environmental Threats to Healthy Aging," published in 2009. The first

of these has been translated into four languages and is used worldwide. The reports promote green local economies, sustainable agriculture, clean power and freedom from toxic threats.

Stein represented the Green-Rainbow Party in two additional races — one for State Representative in 2004 and one for Secretary of State in 2006.

In 2006 she won the votes of over 350,000 Massachusetts citizens — which represented

the greatest vote total ever for a Green-Rainbow candidate.

FYI — The Green Party is a national political party founded in 1991 as a voluntary association of state green parties. With its founding, the Green Party of the United States became the primary national Green organization in the country, eclipsing the Greens/Green Party USA, which emphasized non-electoral movement building, a forerunner organization, first gained widespread public attention during Ralph Nader's 1996 and 2000 presidential campaigns.

### ANDRE BARNETT

Reform Party

Andre Barnett of Poughkeepsie, N.Y., announced his candidacy for the Reform Party presidential nomination on May 6, 2011. He considers himself a conservative and has stated that he intends to considerably downsize the

Back at home, I open my new flour and continue the process: cream the shortening and sugar; add five eggs one at a time, add four cups of flour alternately with one cup buttermilk and one tablespoon vanilla. Then I taste the batter. Hmmm. It tastes a little salty. I look at the new flour bag, and "Oh, Shoot Me! I have bought more self-rising."

Knowing the cake will run all over the

oven, I salvage it by baking it in two tube pans, and I'm able to wind up with two imperfect but edible cakes.

A few months ago, I had my kitchen cabinets refinished with

new doors and new drawer fronts. This entailed taking things out of some of them. There are a few things I haven't found yet. A folder containing all of my appliance guarantees and instructions hasn't turned up yet. I finally found the ice pick, which I use only about once a year when we make homemade ice cream. I had the hanging rack removed from over the center island, and I only reach up there a few times a day, especially when I am making jelly and reach for my kitchen shears to open the sure jell package or the strainer to strain the juice. But I am getting used to looking elsewhere for the no-stick frying pan, the potato masher, the salad tongs, the long-handled spoon and several other often-used items.

One of the most troublesome things about aging for me is the inability to recall a name. I meet up with a lot of my former students, and sometimes I surprise myself when their name just pops right off my tongue. Last week working at the "Haunted Hospital" in a large group getting ready to buy

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## 'Report card' updates readers

When this column is being read, the election for 2012 is history!

Congratulations to both winners and those who did not make it into the finals.

The Prattler refuses to use the word "losers," as there are none when it comes to offering one's self for public service. It has been a long, hard-fought endurance test for all those who sought public office. This writer will admit that, as a bystander and observer, he has found himself weary of the battle.

Telephone solicitations, roadside political signs and the general deluge of mail outs, plus a host of other campaign techniques has seemed to take its toll on this 85-year-old's emotional well-being. But, with all its pitfalls and shortcomings, our system has functioned well throughout our long history, and I find myself unable to offer any real suggested change to the established methods of the past.

In this time of reflections, the Prattler will use today's narrative to review omissions and shortcomings in recent writings and to acknowledge new readers and comments from long-established supporters of "Perry's Prattle." In the past, I have referred to this as my "report card."

No mention was made of the 60th wedding anniversary of Perry and Hester Wells' marriage of Oct. 4, 1952. Both of us were content to allow this important landmark in our lives to slip by relatively unnoticed. Instead, we remembered the gigantic and enjoyable celebration of our 50th anniversary planned and carried out by our extended family only a short 10 years ago.

On Thursday, Oct. 4, we found ourselves at Mt. Zion Independent Baptist Church in Holmes

County for a concert by the popular gospel singing group, the Gold City Quartet. Their hour-long, spirited performance was delivered to a "packed house" of enthusiastic

listeners, who responded to the music with resounding applause, "amens" and other expressions of full approval. Steve Burroughs, pastor of the congregation, plans more gospel singing groups for Mt. Zion as he continues to minister to those who worship in this long-established church.

Hester regards Mt. Zion as her home church during her upbringing. It was in 1951, prior to our marriage, when she presented herself for membership with that body. She was received for baptism, and the ordinance was administered by the Rev. Noblin in the running stream of Ten Mile Creek, located nearby on Highway 2.

The building housing the congregation at that time has been replaced with a new sanctuary, complete with ample Sunday School rooms and a spacious dining room and fellowship hall.

Hester did find a few offspring of those of yesteryear when we visited the old landmark church on our 60th anniversary day. We were welcomed by all the newcomers to the assembly and invited to for a return visit.

In late September, Hester and I attended her Lucas Family Reunion, held at the home of relatives in Eufaula, Ala. This has been our established tradition since we began attending the annual event about 25 years ago after becoming aware of the get-together. This has proven highly enjoyable to her as very little contact was made with the family after her grandparents departed that area for Holmes County

My experience was parallel to that of Hester, knowing practically nothing of my Alabama kin until recent years. I share the same enjoyable and happy visit with my newfound family as does Hester.

October presented the experience for Hester and me to ride in the annual Bonifay Rodeo Parades for both Friday and Saturday. That, too, proved an unbelievable pleasure for each of us. It confirmed what we already knew: We will do almost anything for the benefit of our children and grandchildren.

During the busy month of October, it was my joy to accompany three of our four sons to Cove Elementary School for a 75th anniversary reunion on Oct. 14. Tim, Emory and Gordon were able to make the trip, visiting the former classrooms, viewing an array of old pictures of the past and searching to see if a former classmate or former teacher could be recognized. Son, Grant, who has made Houston, Texas, his home for 30 years, was unable to make the joyful reunion.

Cove School, established in 1937, was purchased by

the Episcopal Church in Panama City after it was closed as a Bay County Elementary School soon after our departure from the city in 1970. It is now in full use as an educational facility and known as Holy Nativity Episcopal School with the preservation and financial support coming from the Holy Nativity School Foundation.

Your writer spent his time in awe while seated outside observing and recognizing former Panama City associates of long ago and getting to meet many new people.

She later married the school's principal, Richard "Dick" Locher, who was serving in that capacity when the Wellses departed for Chipley in early 1970. 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


He has been described as a "conservative with a conscience," and his candidacy is endorsed by the Frederick Douglass Foundation.

At the Reform Party of New Jersey's state convention on April 14, Barnett defeated former Governor of Louisiana Buddy Roemer in the party's presidential straw poll by a 50 percent margin. Barnett was nominated for president of the United States by the Reform Party on Aug. 12 at the party's National Convention in Philadelphia.

FYI — The Reform Party of the United States, also known as RPUSA, was founded in 1995 by Ross Perot, who said Americans

were disillusioned with the state of politics, as being corrupt and unable to deal with vital issues and desired a viable alternative to the Republican and Democratic Parties. The party has nominated different candidates over the years, such as founder Ross Perot, Pat Buchanan and Ralph Nader. The party's most significant victory came when Jesse Ventura was elected governor of Minnesota in 1998.

**STEWART ALEXANDER**  
Socialist Party USA



Stewart Alexander of Los Angeles is a car dealer who went looking at other political groups outside of the Democratic and Republican Parties, according to stewartalexanderforpresident2012.org. At an event in Orange County, where Ross Perot spoke to 5,000 people, it was clear that the people wanted more than the American two-party system. Alexander

joined the Peace and Freedom party, realizing that socialism could offer the social solutions for America's working class people. He declared his candidacy for president on July 16, 2010, with the Socialist Party. He received the presidential nomination from the Socialist Party USA on Oct. 15, 2011, at the party's national convention in Los Angeles.

FYI — The Socialist Party USA is a multi-tendency democratic-socialist party in the United States. The party claims to be the successor to the tradition of the Socialist Party of America, which had lasted from 1901 to 1972. The party is officially committed to left-wing democratic socialism. The Socialist Party USA, along with its predecessors, has received varying degrees of support, when its candidates have competed against those from the Republican and Democratic parties. The party supports third-party candidates, particularly socialists, and opposes the candidates of the two major parties. The Socialist Party is against both capitalism

and "authoritarian Communism," and the party advocates bringing big business under public ownership and democratic workers' self-management, according to the website. The party opposes unaccountable bureaucratic control of Soviet communism.

**PETA LINDSAY**  
Party for Socialism and Liberation



Peta Lindsay is the 2012 presidential candidate of the Party for Socialism and Liberation, according to pslweb.org. She is a founding member of the Party for Socialism and Liberation and a member of the PSL's Central Committee.

Lindsay was born in Virginia and grew up in Philadelphia. She became an activist as a middle school student with the Philadelphia Student Union, a non-profit organization of students demanding a high-quality education. She was a high school senior in

Washington D.C. when the Sept. 11, 2001, attacks occurred.

While an undergraduate organizer at Howard University, she chaired and spoke at every national anti-war rally organized by the ANSWER Coalition, including the historic anti-war rally on Jan. 18, 2003, which drew over 500,000 people into the streets to stop the Iraq war before it started.

FYI — Party for Socialism and Liberation is a Marxist-Leninist political party. It was created as the result of a split within the ranks of Workers World Party. The San Francisco branch and several other members left WWP in 2004, according to Wikipedia. The PSL has since established two national offices in Washington, D.C. and in San Francisco alongside 23 local branches across the country.

**ROSEANNE BARR**  
Peace and Freedom Party

TV personality Roseanne Barr announced her intention to run for president on "The Tonight Show" with

Jay Leno on Aug. 5, 2011. She had intended to run for the Green Party, but got beat out for the nomination

by Jill Stein. Barr is running on the Peace and Freedom ticket with Cindy Sheehan, a strong anti-war advocate known for leading a protest outside of George W. Bush's Texas ranch, according to roseanneforpresident2012.us. Barr said she is using her candidacy to tap into the frustrations voters have with both parties.

FYI — The Peace and Freedom Party is a nationally organized political party with affiliates in more than a dozen states, including California, Florida, Colorado and Hawaii. Its first candidates appeared on the ballot in 1966, but the Peace and Freedom Party of California was founded on June 23, 1967, after the riot in the wealthy Century City section of Los Angeles, and qualified for the ballot in January 1968. The Peace and Freedom Party went national in 1968 as a left-wing organization opposed to the Vietnam War.

**TOM HOEFLING**  
American Independent Party

Tom Hoefling was raised in Ralston, Neb., and attended public schools there. According to tomhoepling.com, Hoefling is a long-time conservative political activist, organizer, and consultant. He has worked on campaigns at all levels of American politics,

most parts of the country, during the past 20 years.

He is known primarily for his pro-life work and his defense of the natural family and traditional marriage. He has also been a long-time advocate for the Second Amendment right to keep and bear arms, private property rights,

fundamental tax reform, secure borders and the maintenance of American sovereignty and security through a Reaganite Peace Through Strength foreign policy.

FYI — The American Independent Party is a right-wing political party that was established in 1967 by Bill and Eileen Shearer. It is most notable for its nomination for president of George Wallace, former governor of Alabama. Wallace carried five states in the 1968 election running on a segregationist platform. The party split in 1976 into the modern American Independent Party and the American Party. From 1992 to 2008 the party was the California affiliate of the national Constitution Party, with its exit from the Constitution Party leading to a leadership dispute during the 2008 election.

**ROSS C. "ROCKY" ANDERSON**  
Justice Party USA

Former mayor of Salt Lake City Ross "Rocky" Anderson founded High Road for Human Rights, a non-profit organization devoted to achieving major

reform of US human rights policies and practices through unique, coordinated and sustained grassroots activism, complementing the work of other human rights organizations, according to the website voterrocky.org.

For his work on human rights matters during his tenure as executive director of high road for human rights, Rocky received the Morehouse University Gandhi, King, Ikeda Award and the Bill of Rights Defense Committee's Patriot Award. On Jan. 13, Anderson accepted the presidential nomination of the Justice Party, a new national political party.

Utah State Senator Chris Buttars of West Jordan, Utah, publicly denounced Anderson for having "attracted the entire gay community to come and live in Salt Lake County" after a Dan Jones poll indicated strong support for allowing domestic partnerships. In the 2004 election, 63 percent of the city population voted against banning same-sex marriage, in agreement with Anderson.

FYI — The Justice Party USA was first organized in November 2011 to place Anderson on the ballot as a presidential candidate. In December 2011, it became a qualified party in Mississippi, the first state to recognize the party. From a small beginning, 30 persons at the launching event with no TV crew covering it, the party has been able to put its founder, Anderson, on the ballot in 15 states and secure official write-in status in 15 additional states. It is now the fifth largest party in terms of presidential ballot access in the 2012 presidential election.

The party is working for campaign finance reforms and does not accept corporate funding. It wants to abolish corporate personhood. The party and its founder are in favor of a financial transaction tax and want to end the Bush tax cuts.

## Holmes County tops Chipley for 3-1A title

**BONIFAY** — Turnovers were the bane of the Chipley Tigers as they fell 38-16 to the Blue Devils in District 3-1A action Friday night at Memorial Field in Bonifay.

Holmes County (7-1, 3-0) won its second straight district title. Chipley fell to 4-4, 1-2.

When the Blue Devils bobbed the return of the opening kick, turning the ball over to the Tigers inside the Holmes County 10-yard line, Chipley took control of the game when junior Kobe McCrary scored from three yards out. The Tigers added two more points and Chipley was ahead 8-0 less than two minutes into the game. That was the only time a turnover would be a

good thing for the Tigers. Jacky Miles Jr. scored on a 29-yard run. Senior Franklin Russ added the two-points after to tie things up 8-8 with five minutes left in the

opening quarter.

In the final minutes of the half, Chipley took possession at the Holmes County 37-yard line thanks to junior Dallas Oliver's quick punt return. A pass interference call against the Blue Devils moved the Tigers closer to the goal line with an automatic first down, then McCrary scrambled up the middle from 20-yards out to hit paydirt. McCrary then added another two in the PAT and the Tigers went into half time with a 16-8 lead.

The third quarter is where the turnover tide turned in the Blue Devils' favor.

Holmes County's Franklin Russ ran the Chipley punt back to the 50 yard line, then junior Britt Bailey, senior Kodi Russ and Miles combined to drive to the end zone, with Kodi Russ taking

it in from the 3-yard line. Junior Ty Russ added the PAT and the game was tied 16-16.

Two plays later, a Tigers fumble at their own 22-yard line put the Blue Devils back in the end zone less than one minute later, with Ty Russ scoring on a 20-yard run. The PAT was good for two and the Blue Devils had a 24-16 lead.

Chipley was able to drive for 17 yards on their next possession before Holmes County's Franklin Russ picked off a Jordan Finch pass deep in the Blue Devils' territory.

Miles carried the ball 24 yards on the first play, then Kodi Russ scrambled 20 more yards to put the Blue Devils at the Tigers' 31-yardline. Miles' sweep left was good for 15 more yards, then Kodi Russ was able to

finish the drive with a 16-yard run. The two-point attempt failed, but the Blue Devils were up 30-16 and the weren't looking back.

On their next possession, the Tigers earned 45 yards on five tries before another fumble gave the Blue Devils the ball, which they were able to drive back into the end zone, moving 46 yards on 8 plays before Miles scored with 7:39 left to play in the game. Kodi Russ broke up the middle to add the final two points of the night.

In their final drive of the night, Chipley was able to march from midfield to the 3-yard line before a final fumble ended their play for the evening.

Holmes County hosts Marianna Friday for the Blue Devils' homecoming, while Chipley travels to Graceville. Kickoff is at 7 p.m.



# Bozeman earns playoff berth

**SANTA ROSA BEACH** — Bozeman held back a South Walton rally and earned the program's second postseason berth with a 46-27 victory over the Seahawks in a District 3-1A prep football game on Friday.

Bozeman built a 40-6 lead in the third quarter, prompting Bucks coach Loren Tillman to replace

starters. However, South Walton scored on a fumble, a run and a pass to narrow the gap to 40-27 early in the fourth quarter and Tillman put his starters back in to stop the surge.

"It's huge for our program and these kids haven't experienced the playoffs," Tillman said. "The last guys who were on a playoff team (2008) graduated last year."

"I told the kids that a sign of a good football team is they can win a ballgame when they play poorly. We didn't play our best, but we still got into the dance and that's all you're looking for, a ticket in."

Jacob Martinez rushed for two touchdowns and passed for another to Bell, and Chandler Burkett re-

turned a blocked punt for a score to give Bozeman a 27-0 halftime lead. South Walton (0-9, 0-3) scored a few plays after a long kickoff return to narrow the gap to 27-6 early in the third quarter. Martinez responded with a 95-yard kickoff return and Bell's score made it 40-7 before Tillman's blood pressure began to rise.

"At halftime they told me Chipley was up so I thought there was a good chance we were playing Monday" in a tiebreaker, Tillman said. "Then we heard Holmes County was ahead and pulling away, but we didn't want to waste our opportunity."

Bozeman ends the regular season at home against Cottontale, which also will be headed to the playoffs. Bozeman will play at Liberty County in the regional semifinal in two weeks.

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# Tips for buying dog toys

Tennis balls, Frisbees, rawhides, and Kongs. Dog toys line the shelves of multiple aisles at pet stores. With all of the choices, which toys should or shouldn't you buy for man's best friend?

**Dr. Mark Stickney**, Clinical Associate Professor and Director of General Surgery Services at Texas A&M University College of Veterinary Medicine & Biomedical Sciences, said that when first giving your dog toys, buy a variety of toys to see what the animal prefers.

"They are going to have a toy preference the same way that children have toy preferences," he said. "Once you determine their favorites, you can adjust your selection and your budget accordingly for the toys that entertain your pet."

To help guide your purchases, Stickney said it's important to make

sure the toy is made of nontoxic material and the appropriate size toy for the animal. A five-pound Yorkie, for example, will not be able to use an extra-large Kong toy made for a Rottweiler. Kong toys, he added, are one of his favorite brands because it keeps the pets busy by challenging them to get a treat out of the small hole of the toy.

"Kong toys are fantastic because the animal has to work, but they are also rewarded for their hard effort," Stickney said. He explained that they are virtually indestructible because they are made of a durable rubber.

For most Kongs, an edible treat is placed inside the toy. For treats, Stickney said, it is important to consider the amount of calories in the snack. He advised that treats should encompass no more than five percent of the animal's total diet. It is important to limit the

number of treats given so the animal does not put on extra weight.

Another edible toy for dogs is rawhides. Stickney said rawhides are great for the animal to chew on because it will not damage their teeth. He advises buying rawhides the animal can chew on for a few hours instead of a few days.

"When rawhides sit around for too long, they grow bacteria and can potentially make your pet sick," Stickney said.

Ropes are a common toy that pet owners should avoid. String can get caught in the animal's intestinal track and cause a "linear foreign body." Stickney explained that when the animal continues to pass it, the string could end up "sawing" a hole through their intestines.

"This is similar to them getting a rope burn on the inside of their intestines," he said. "It can kill them. Nothing with string of any sort is good for them."

After giving the toys to

the animal, Stickney said it is important to monitor the pet for a few hours.

"You need to watch them to make sure they are not going to end up hurting themselves on it by tearing it into pieces, swallowing it, or cutting themselves on it," Stickney said.

Once you know your pets can't get into trouble with their new toys, it is fine to leave them alone with the toys.

"That is the beauty of having things that enrich their lives," Stickney said. "This way, they have something to do when the fun people are out of the house for a while. It keeps them busy."




