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# School board selects new school site

## Teachers, employees of year nominees recognized

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**CHIPLEY** — The Washington County School Board approved the 22-plus acre site between South Boulevard and Brickyard Road as the future home of Kate M.

Smith Elementary School on Monday night. District Maintenance Director Mike Park reviewed the process the Site Selection Committee had gone through in choosing the new location for the school. "This has been an on-

going process of about 20 years," Park said, "and over the years, some of the names on the committee changed." In October the Department of Education visited the elementary school to determine the need for a new facility. Five days later, DOE issued the finding that there was a "critical need" for a new elementary school in Chipley, Park said.

With that information, the selection committee

met in late December and again on Jan. 3 to discuss the choice of school site, which came down to either stay at the current location, or move the school to the 22-plus acre tract of land the district owns that stretches between South Boulevard and Brickyard Road.

Not all of the committee members were able to attend the Jan. 3 meeting, so Park polled the committee last week at Superintendent

Joe Taylor's request, and the committee recommended relocating the elementary school to the new site.

"With the funding, this is likely to be a two-year or three-year funding cycle," Park said. "That was an important consideration, we really don't want to try and have construction going on while we are also having school."

# Lawmakers to review gambling

**TALLAHASSEE (AP)** — The chairman of the Senate Gaming Committee says the Florida Legislature will conduct a comprehensive review of all forms of gambling. Sen. Garrett Richter, a Naples Republican, said the objective over the next two years will be to determine how gambling regula-

tions and revenues benefit Floridians before changes are made. Richter said in the past, gambling legislation was passed without knowing the effect it would have. He said the House and Senate will jointly hire a consultant to conduct the review covering all

forms of gambling. That includes the state lottery, Indian casinos, cruises to nowhere, Internet cafes, horse and dog racing and jai alai, which already exist in the state. It also will cover potential new forms of gambling such as destination resorts.

# City council sets Vernon election date

## Governor to visit for bridge dedication

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**VERNON** — Vernon residents will return to the polls on March 12 to elect two city council members and a mayor.

Mayor Michelle Cook asked the Vernon City Council on Monday night to set the date of March 12 as the date of the city's next general election, in which town residents will vote on the mayor's office, as well as elect two city council members.

Longtime city councilman Byron Biddle's seat is up for election this year, and the seat left vacant after the death of councilman Oscar Ward is also up for election. The position of mayor is voted on each year, said City Clerk Dian Hendrix, so Mayor Cook will also be up for re-election.

Polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. at the city hall on March 12, and the qualifying period for the election will be from Jan. 28 to Jan. 31. The books on the election will close on Feb. 12.

The mayor also told the council that the Florida Department of Transportation is planning to hold a dedication ceremony for the completed bridge at 11 a.m. on Feb. 14, and it is expected that Gov. Rick Scott will be in attendance.

"The DOT is providing tents and everything we need for the dedication, and there may also be entertainment," Cook said. She asked the council to approve a \$500 expenditure by the city to provide food for the dedication ceremony.

The council voted to set the election date as requested and also approved the \$500 expense for the DOT ceremony.

Cook reported that the city's recreation committee would hold baseball, T-ball and softball registration from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. on Jan. 21 and that registration would continue until March 1. She also reported that a Dixie League umpire clinic would be held in February in Marianna.

Once the board had the recommendation, they voted unanimously to accept the suggestion. The district is trying to get all their ducks in a row so the elementary school is accepted into the DOE funding cycle beginning this coming August, Park said.

"That is why we are moving on this," he said. "It's not that we are trying to rush anything through, we are just trying to get everything ready for August."

Taylor said at the Jan. 3 meeting that if the district can get the project adopted by the DOE in August, then funding and construction could possibly come as soon as August 2014.

Vernon Elementary School parent and PTO member Tara Dockery addressed the board to ask for School Resource Officers and metal detectors at each campus. She presented a petition with 400 signatures asking the board members to give school security more consideration.

"We as parents and grandparents are highly concerned with safety in our schools," Dockery said, "and we would like to ask our elected school board officials to take a close

look at the situation."

Dockery said the PTO had been in contact with Sheriff Bobby Haddock and she would have more information from the sheriff as to what was

needed to fund an officer for each campus.

"As a board, we share your concerns," said school board chairman Terry Ellis. "There are many schools across the country looking at this very thing, trying to make sure they are doing all that is possible."

The board members also recognized the nominees for Teachers of the Year, Rookie Teachers of the Year and Employees of the Year.

My bus was the Caryville route and the last two years of school, the driver for that run was Tolbert Porter. Earlier drivers included Bob Sheffield, John Childress, and King Bush.

Aside from the two employees in Vernon City Hall, the massive old high

school also provides a Satellite Office for the Washington County Council on Aging on each Wednesday. This gives additional traffic in and out of the facility as well as hosting lunch for those senior citizen who desire to take advantage of the service. When in the building, I expected to see Orrie Dortch Simmons and Ocie Dortch Howell and to get an update report on their sister, Ollie Dortch Brock, who is experiencing some medical issues.

The sisters of my good friend, Jimmy Goodson, are also "regulars" for the Wednesday gathering. One is Judine Goodson Diaz and the other is Joann Goodson Cook. Also Pat Parrish and Chattie B. Wilson Childs (niece of Rev. Price Wilson) are the two ladies in charge of the program. The latter three have recently purchased a copy of the Heritage of Washington County Book. It is available at the Vernon Museum and by calling me at 638-1016.

The friendly ladies at the Council on Aging luncheon, with many others not named, always welcome me to their gathering for a short visit and a "sales pitch" for those who may still desire a Heritage Book. At the last visit, your writer was offered the meal packaged for this event and was my first opportunity to enjoy a hot lunch. I usually depend on a cold sandwich brought from home. The nutritious meal, at a bargain price, was just

what I needed to take me through the day and I may become a regular "customer" on my assigned day of duty.

Aside from the experience of an enjoyable lunch and visit, the Vernon High School graduate did his usual exploring of additional items continuing to flow in to the Historical Museum. The historic picture, which accompanies this week's column, was my newest "find."

The picture brings back many fond reflections of school days in Vernon. I recall that Vernon Café, as shown in the

background, was known as Coatney's Café in 1944 and was operated by the parents of Franklin, Bernice and Randall (Junior) Coatney. In previous years, it was owned by the Rev. Odom, the father of Edna Odom Kelley Casey, who passed away a few months ago. Her son, Roger Dale Kelley, and I discussed this café operation only a few days ago, which of course was long before his arrival in the world.

## There is a time and a place for all things

When I was a child, my Mama would say to me when I said or did something that was inappropriate, "There is a time and a place for all things." These admonitions came pretty frequently. In Ecclesiastes two, the Bible speaks about a time

for everything. Verse 7b was probably the verse, which she applied to me most often, "a time to be silent and a time to speak."

Though Mama isn't here to admonish me now, I often think of her and the Bible admonition,

which I try to heed, but of course I often fail.

With winter here and spring and summer-like temperatures abounding, we begin to think that its time to plant the garden. But experience tells us that by this time next week winter may have returned with a vengeance, so we know that it isn't time to plant, but a time to uproot. (V.2a) As a child on the farm, this was the time to clean out the fencerows, chop down or dig up sassafras and persimmon trees, which sprouted up in fallow

land. It was a time to get rid of cane stubble unless it was going to be allowed to reproduce, pile and burn dry corn and cotton stalks, check fence posts for rotten ones that needed replacement. Now, with modern equipment, not much corn and cotton stalks are burned, but are chopped or disked in and allowed to be used as mulch for next year's no-till crop. Winter was also a time to burn the woods so that the wire grass which grew abundantly among the long-leaf pine trees could sprout young green shoots that provided

grazing for livestock that fed on the open range. Burning also helped to control rattlesnakes or at least sent them into hiding.

Verse 3 of Ecclesiastes was also applicable on the farm, a time to kill and a time to heal. Now would have been the time to kill hogs as I've written about numerous times. While the weather is cold and the flies are fewer was the time to butcher and preserve meat for future use. (The only beef we ever had was from O.K. Williams grocery, the Suwannee Store,

the Andrews brothers' Jitney Jungle in Bonifay, or perhaps Mel Jenkins store in Caryville.) The time to kill a chicken was anytime one was needed for Sunday dinner or if company was coming any day.

Verse 7 says there is a time to mend and a time to mend. Mending was an on-going chore as we lived by the slogan, "Use it up; Wear it out, Make it do, or do without." Elbows and knees always wore out on the men and boys work clothes, so good parts of

Dear Editor,  
My name is Sandra Miller. I've had four children who attended Bethlehem High School. The Miller family has been here over 100 years. And I can honestly say this is probably the first time that a Miller has stood up for a principal. I'm very disappointed that they removed Zeb mainly because there wasn't a legitimate reason. It was sudden without any warning. I could understand if he did something unethical. With this of course the suspicion is in the air that this was a political favor. Before the elections, my daughter who attends Bethlehem came home from school and said please don't vote for Mr. Dixon, because it was rumored that if he got elected Mr. Brown would be gone. My child should never have to be concerned about political deceitfulness in the beginning.

Mr. Brown and I didn't see eye to eye when he was a history teacher. There were quite a few times when I had scheduled conferences with him because of some

indifferences. However I gained a new found respect for him when he became principal of Bethlehem because he was not afraid of stepping on anyone's toes. If someone wasn't doing their job, he moved them. I have seen this school so abused by the staff and their favors. And the favoritism between faculty and their children, I wanted to move my children to a different school. So This was refreshing to me.

Zeb is one of the most thoughtful and involved principals I've ever seen at that school. When my daughter did a fundraiser for FCCLA they picked my granddaughter who has a rare disability. It was called a Walk For Kaylee. They raised over 13,000.00 in one day. Supporters came and walked five miles and Zeb participated in the walk and he genuinely cared enough to be there and support our family. It made me love this school for the first time and I actually had pride in this school and community that my children were being raised in.

For so many years I

was so bitter with the way this school was run. It only catered to a select few. A school should promote leaders not followers.

Zeb had approached my husband and I the night before the shootings in Connecticut and expressed his concerns for the safety of the children at the circle drive in front of the school. He was worried because cars would come in at any given time of the day and sometimes there were children walking for P E. He was thinking of how to protect them so he thought of installing some gates at the front. And asked if we would be interested in building gates for him. That has never been asked of any principals before him. What a coincidence that it was the day before the horrible incident in Connecticut. I met with him the day before he was removed, he was so excited as I showed him the drawings of the gates, and also was so worried what happened at the other school and was going to call a meeting with all the teachers and staff and go over plans for protecting his students.

This is truly a principle that cares for the welfare of his students and staff. Another reason for the gates was to direct all visitors to have to enter through the office and not have access through the school.

So with this I will close in saying that I truly believe the move is a totally political move and cannot be based on this man's job performance. But is the small town mentality about who you know. I hate the message that this new superintendent of schools has made. What are you teaching our children when you can't even give a legitimate reason for such an important move that has affected so many lives for your own advancements. The decision to remove Zeb Brown was your first wrong mistake as our Superintendent of schools. Even in the end he sent me a message to tell me that he has been removed but please do not give up on the gate project. The safety of the students is more important than what happens to me.

Vernon High School Graduate. Ken's mother married a Mr. Stanley from New Hope, bringing Ken, and older brother Allee and a younger sister, Gloria, into Vernon School. Allee was in the '44 class, married Mary Louise Tiller, served in the U. S. Marine Corp and died in a Pascagoula, Mississippi accident in 1964.

Ken, a graduate of the '45 class, married Bonnie Ellis and served in the Merchant Marines. He is the father of three sons and a daughter, who attended Chipley Schools. Ken has also passed away. The sister, Gloria, married Allen Cook and both are now deceased.

Russell Miller dropped out of school prior to graduation and probably

entered the military service. Archie Cook, a member of the 1944 class returned to the area after his U. S. Army service. He spent time in a German Prison of War camp. He died two years ago.

The next person is Perry Wells and may be the only one still living from the group. Doug Jones and Edna Jean Brock McFatter are the next two people. Both were members of the 1945 Vernon High School Class. Doug served in the U. S. Army. Doug and his wife, Jean, have both passed away. Edna Jean Brock, sister of Kelley Brock and Estelle Brock Clark, married William T. McFatter, Jr., also a decorated war hero. They had two sons, who had reached adulthood, prior

to Jean's untimely passing several years ago.

The last person pictured is Oakley Hightower. He and his older brother, Carl Hightower, were members of the class of 1944. Both experienced honorable military service, leaving school prior to graduation, a common occurrence during that era of World War II. Oakley married Lucille Lane and has one son, Scott. He, too, died at an early age just when he was advancing into a promising career in the Florida Department of Education.

Maybe further duty in the Chipley and Vernon Historical Museums will probably prompt further efforts for "prattle" topics. See you all next week.

# Gulf Power crews win utility assistance award

Gulf Power Company crews drove long hours, worked in high winds, rain and snow far away from home and their families in 2012. For their efforts, the company has been selected as a winner of the Edison Electric Institute 2012 Emergency Assistance Award.

The award recognizes the company for its restoration support in the recovery from the June storm in Virginia and Hurricanes Isaac and Sandy.

Paul Koonce, CEO of Dominion Virginia Power, said he made the nomination in honor of Jackie Green, a Line Tech II for Gulf Power, who died in a vehicle accident while working storm duty.

"The Gulf Power team demonstrated courage and professionalism in the face of adversity and left a profound impact on the Dominion Virginia Power organization

lasting far beyond the end of the successful restoration effort." Koonce wrote in the nomination. "Restoration and mutual assistance is about more than poles, wire and cross arms. It is about the extraordinary people who volunteer for restoration efforts and their families, and about helping the people on the other side of the meter regardless of whether they are in Florida, Virginia or points in between."

In 2012, Gulf Power storm teams assisted on six different events. The company sent 63 personnel to Virginia; 48 to Mississippi following Hurricane Isaac; and 70 to the Northeast following Hurricane Sandy. That team spent 17 days working in Pennsylvania and New Jersey.

Most recently, a storm team just returned from six days in Arkansas, following a snowstorm on Christmas Day.

other worn-out clothing were torn apart and used for mending wearable garments. Today, we see people paying high dollar for jeans that are pre-worn or full of holes. Some who can't afford the pre-aged ones use bleach to eat holes in what they have. We would have been mortified to have had to wear jeans or overalls with patches on the knees or seat to school and felt sorry for those who did.

Some industrious ladies would take a man's coat suit and cut it down

to make themselves a winter coat suit. They would rend the seams of the pants to make the skirt (.No woman ever wore pants unless it was on wash day or hog killing day.) Of course we are all familiar with Dolly's song, "Coat of Many Colors" which tells about her coat that was made from scraps of colored cloth kind of like a patchwork quilt. Quilt making was an ongoing activity for many ladies and they used scraps of leftover fabric from the clothing, which

the family wore. Bed covers were essential for houses with little or no heat and with large farm families, making quilts was more than a pass time. In a big family of men and boys, there were often more overall parts than were needed to mend the wearable clothing, and quilts would be sewn from the denim. These were not works of art as many quilters took pride in, but served to keep bodies warm.

Another verse in Ecclesiastes says there

is a time to keep and a time to throw away. We are in the process of replacing floor coverings. This entails cleaning out two walk-in closets. I asked my cleaning helper, Lawanna to begin the process last week when I wasn't there. She did as I asked her to, but left word with my husband that I needed to throw away some stuff. 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
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## Hooked on Outdoors

## FWC seeks public input on Panhandle deer management

The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission will host a series of public meetings in late January to help shape the future of deer management in the Florida Panhandle.

"We are working on an exciting project to establish deer management units throughout Florida," said Cory Morea, the FWC's Deer Management Program coordinator. "We are looking at the Panhandle first, but we are moving to a new model of deer management in the state in which hunters and other stakeholders will have a greater impact on deer management decisions."

DMUs will divide the state into smaller geographic areas where deer population characteristics are

similar. The state is divided into four management zones that are used to set hunting season dates based on deer breeding chronology. As proposed, DMUs will be smaller units within zones and allow the FWC to manage deer on a more local level based on the preferences of hunters, farmers and other interested stakeholders.

Two DMUs are proposed for Zone D, which encompasses much of the Florida Panhandle region (western portions of Gadsden, Leon and Wakulla counties and all counties west of them). One unit would cover the area south of Interstate 10 and the other north of Interstate 10.

The new DMUs are intended to allow the FWC more flexibility with deer management based upon the deer population, habitat conditions and public preference within each of the units.

"We surveyed hunters, farmers and other members of the general public to determine attitudes and opinions regarding deer management,



and we will be sharing the results of that survey at the public meetings. We will also present information on the DMU model and will be gathering public input on deer management preferences," Morea said.

For people who cannot attend any of the meetings, there will be other opportunities to learn about this project and provide input.

"We have information on our website, and we will be accepting comments online," Morea said, noting public input will determine what changes might be made and that "no changes" is an option. "This project is about managing deer based on public preference.

"Of course, we wouldn't do anything to risk the sustainability of this valuable public resource, but deer densities and other deer management preferences, such as antler regulations, can be better suited to public preferences using the DMU model."

A technical assistance group, composed of members of the public, will be established to review all available public comments and make recommendations to the FWC on the two DMUs within Zone D. The public meetings and the TAG will be facilitated by a third-party vendor, Normandeau Associates, which will develop a summary report to the

FWC. Up to 25 TAG members will be chosen based upon their expertise, their representation of an important interest group and their willingness to dedicate some time to better deer management in Zone D. Anyone interested will be able to apply for TAG membership at the public meetings or on the FWC's website.

## Deer hunting active during rut breeding period

If there's one thing hard-core deer hunters focus on, it's when bucks tend to be most visible as they search for does to breed, a time known as the rut.

What many hunters might not grasp is does, the female segment of the deer population, play as important a role in the rut as bucks.

"The rut is really the breeding period when bucks are searching for and breeding with does that have come into estrus or are 'in

heat,' as it is more commonly known," said James Kelly, assistant Deer Management Program coordinator for the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission. "With bucks, the rut begins with the decreasing photo period or periods of daylight, which triggers certain hormonal changes, including increased testosterone.

"In turn you see bucks developing hardened antlers, establishing dominance among themselves via behavioral cues or through signposts such as

scrapes and rubs. As things progress, they actively begin searching for does to breed."

Kelly said during the peak of the rut is when the large majority of does come into estrus. Bucks are able to pick up on behavioral and olfactory cues (or scents) from the does to sense when a doe is in estrus. During this time, bucks, particularly larger, older, dominant bucks that are seldom visible, do the unexpected and are apt to show up anywhere in their search for does to breed. It's also when many of the larger bucks are taken by hunters.

It also is when bucks are most responsive to vocalization calls that hunters use, including grunt calls and rattling antlers, which simulate a fight between mature bucks. One of the relatively newest calls on the market for deer hunters is the "snort wheeze," a sound that dominant bucks sometimes make during the rut.

"These are all sounds bucks hear from other deer or themselves when there is competition to breed a doe or for dominance status to breed estrous does in the near future,

and that's what makes them effective," Kelly said.

Unlike some states whose peak rutting period is within a short time span, that's not the case in Florida. Bucks begin rutting in south Florida in August and the peak rutting dates are later as you move up peninsular Florida, including the panhandle.

Kelly said FWC staff have spent considerable time over the past several years collecting and posting updated "peak of the rut" dates and information on the FWC website, MyFWC.com/Deer.

The duo put on a scoring showcase Jan. 8 inside the Jim Redfern Gymnasium with the Tigers eventually surging to a 106-87 victory. Sharpe led all scorers with 51 points and a high mark in his still young career. Dixon scored 42, but the Dolphins were unable to match scoring from other sources aside from the hot hand.

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

Bulls were delivered in late July and initiated their 112-day test Aug. 21. The last day of test was Dec. 12. In addition, a hallmark of the Florida Bull Test is that individual feed intake is assessed to establish feed efficiency.

The council approved Clerk Margaret Riley's request to pull the necessary permits for the annual Fun Day/Possum Day parade, to be Aug. 3, and the annual Christmas parade, to be Dec. 14. Both parades will be at 10 a.m.

The council also approved moving forward with establishing a Christmas decorations award program, to be judged by the Wausau Garden Club.

Paul Goulding of the Goulding Agency in Chipley also approached the council about extending the agency's contract to handle the city website for an additional two years.

"There is no charge for this service," Goulding said, noting that state requirements for towns to have websites were about to become law.

Goulding asked the council for an acknowledgement that they would like for him to continue the service, and the board voted to let the Goulding Agency continue to provide website services.





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# Federal electronic payment deadline nears

WASHINGTON, D.C. — The U.S. Department of the Treasury reported on Tuesday, Jan. 8, that 5 million checks continue to be mailed to federal beneficiaries each month. With just two months remaining until the March 1 electronic payment law goes into effect, the Treasury Department is urging Social Security and other federal benefit recipients to not delay and switch now to either direct deposit or the Direct Express Debit MasterCard® card.

“Choosing direct deposit or the Direct Express® card makes it easier, safer and

more convenient for beneficiaries to receive their payments. Switching to an electronic payment is not optional — it’s the law,” said David Lebyrk, commissioner of the Treasury Department’s Financial Management Service.

“If you or a loved one still receive paper checks for your benefit payments, now is the time to switch. It’s free and easy — just call 1-800-333-1795 or visit [www.GoDirect.org](http://www.GoDirect.org).”

Currently, approximately 93 percent of Social Security and Supplemental Security Income (SSI) payments are being made electronically. Converting the remaining

paper check recipients to electronic payments will save American taxpayers \$1 billion over the next 10 years.

The Treasury Department published a final rule in December 2010 to gradually phase out paper checks for federal benefit payments. Since May 1, 2011, all people newly applying for federal benefits, including Social Security, SSI, Veterans Affairs, Railroad Retirement Board, Office of Personnel Management benefits and other non-tax payments, have had to choose direct deposit or the Direct Express® card at the time they sign up for their benefits. March 1,

2013, is the final deadline by which all remaining federal benefit check recipients must receive their money electronically.


The Treasury Department’s Go Direct public education campaign is working with more than 1,800 partner organizations throughout the country to spread the message about the electronic payment rule and educate federal benefit recipients about their options. The campaign has developed and shared a variety of public service announcements, educational videos, check inserts and other materials to explain how electronic payments work and how to

make the switch from paper checks. The videos and materials are available on the Go Direct campaign website at [www.GoDirect.org](http://www.GoDirect.org).

“The Treasury Department has taken great strides to support and guide check recipients through the change to electronic payments, and we’re increasing our efforts significantly in the final two months before

the deadline,” Lebyrk said. “We have a team of friendly, helpful agents standing by at our call center, and many financial institutions, caregivers, senior services providers and advocates for people who are homeless or have disabilities have the necessary information and resources to help federal benefit recipients make the switch.”

# FWC kicks off 2013 ‘Python Challenge’

Almost 800 people are registered and ready to compete to see who can bring in the longest and the most Burmese pythons from designated public lands in south Florida, the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission announced Saturday at the 2013 Python Challenge Kickoff in Davie.

For competitors, the challenge is to harvest the well-camouflaged Burmese python, which can grow to more than 17 feet in the wild in Florida, with the chance of winning prizes of up to \$1,500. Registrants are coming from more than 30 other states. They will have until midnight on Sunday, Feb. 10 to find these nonvenomous constrictors.

For the FWC, the primary goals of the Python Challenge are to raise public awareness and increase the agency’s knowledge base regarding this invasive species and how to better

understand and address impacts on the Everglades ecosystem, including native wildlife.

“The 2013 Python Challenge is an unprecedented effort to focus public interest, support and direct involvement to help deal with Burmese pythons,” said FWC Chairman Kenneth Wright at the kickoff news conference. “The FWC is pleased that so many people are joining this earnest effort to limit the impact of this invasive species on Florida’s diverse native wildlife. Floridians and people from all across the United States truly care about the Florida Everglades, and they are clearly eager to help us better understand and solve this problem,” Wright added.

“When they harvest snakes, Python Challenge competitors will be collecting valuable data that will contribute to the current Burmese python research and management efforts of the FWC and its partners,”

Wright said. “We are grateful to Python Challenge participants, sponsors and partners for helping make this event happen.”

The kickoff is the first of two public awareness events. The Python Challenge concludes with an Awareness and Awards Event on Saturday, Feb. 16 from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. at Zoo Miami.

There are two separate Python Challenge competitions: the General Competition for the public and the Python Permit Holders Competition for people who have permits from the FWC and other agencies to regularly harvest these snakes. Both groups will be collecting data. When dropping off a harvested Burmese python, participants must submit data sheets providing information such as the snake’s size, GPS location and habitat where it was found.

Grand prizes of \$1,500 for harvesting the most Bur-

mese pythons will be awarded to winners of both the General Competition and the Python Permit Holders Competition, with an additional \$1,000 prize for the longest Burmese python harvested overall. Funding for the prizes is provided by sponsors and through registration fees.

People can sign up for the Python Challenge at any time during the Jan. 12 to Feb. 10 competition, even on the final day. Go to [PythonChallenge.org](http://PythonChallenge.org) for the required online training, official rules and registration, as well as information on the public events.

The key sponsors of the 2013 Python Challenge are the Felburn Foundation and Flowers Foundation. Many partners, including the University of Florida, The Nature Conservancy, The Future of Hunting in Florida, the Wildlife Foundation of Florida and Zoo Miami, are providing important support for the Python Challenge.

# Matters of the heart: Hypertension

One out of every three adults has high blood pressure or hypertension. As with humans, this health problem is seen in cats and dogs. Primary hypertension occurs when the blood pressure is higher than normal with no other cause. Secondary hypertension, however, occurs when the blood pressure is higher than normal as a result from a different disorder. Ordinarily, both a cat’s and dog’s blood pressure should be about 120/70, which is similar to the normal blood pressure of a human.

Different from humans, however, animals usually experience secondary hypertension as a result from another disorder instead of primary hypertension said Dr. Ashley Saunders, assistant professor at the Texas

A&M College of Veterinary & Biomedical Sciences said.

“People get hypertension, so they can relate to it,” Saunders said. “The thing that is different between people and pets, though, is high blood pressure in pets is usually caused by something else.”

High blood pressure can be a sign of kidney disease, diabetes, endocrine disease, cancer in the adrenal glands and central nervous system and brain disease. High blood pressure can also cause resinous problems such as blindness, seizures and depression. Other signs include fainting, anxiety and restlessness at night and loss of balance.

“Hypertension can result in blindness, fainting episodes, and can even contribute to kidney dis-

ease,” Saunders said.

Blood pressure on a pet is usually taken by shaving the underside of a paw and placing a cuff halfway down on the leg. Taking blood pressure on a pet is similar to that of a human, an ultrasound machine is used to listen to the pet’s blood flow while the cuff is inflated and then released. The animal’s blood pressure should be taken by a veterinarian. The main treatment for hypertension is medication.

“Hypertension in pets is totally different than people because it is normally caused by another disease and it needs to be medicated,” Saunders said. “People are used to hearing that they need to change their lifestyle, diet, and activity level when diagnosed with hypertension, but that does not work for pets— medication is needed.”

Since hypertension is

also a symptom for underlying problems, Saunders explained that it is important to get the pet’s blood pressure checked regularly. Middle aged pets and older, she added, are more susceptible to having diseases that would cause hypertension.

“Once the pet is middle aged or older, blood pressure should be taken regularly, at least once a year,” Saunders said. “This helps monitor their blood pressure and other possible disorders.”

## Hindus now have a fellow believer in Congress

**NEW YORK (AP)** — When Dr. Uma Mysorekar looks at the members of the new Congress, the Indian immigrant and practicing Hindu can see that, for the first time, there's someone who shares her ethnicity and someone who shares her faith.

To her surprise, they're two different people.

Democratic Rep. Tulsi Gabbard of Hawaii is the first Hindu elected to Congress. Rep. Ami Bera of California, also a Democrat, is the third Indian-American to serve in the House.

Gabbard, however, isn't from India, where Hinduism originated and to which the vast majority of its adherents have ethnic ties.

Bera is a Unitarian. His two Indian-American predecessors in Congress, Dalip Singh Saund and Bobby Jindal, also were not practicing Hindus. The late Saund, a California Democrat elected in 1956, was Sikh. Jindal, a Republican elected to the House in 2004 and now Louisiana's governor, is Catholic.

Gabbard's presence in Congress creates an interesting moment for Hindus in the United States, a chance to celebrate a barrier broken but also a topic of discussion as they ponder how closely religion and nationality are entwined, or even should be.

Mysorekar is glad to see a practicing Hindu in the country's halls of political power, no matter her nationality.

Gabbard "is a Hindu representative, it doesn't matter where she came from," said Mysorekar, president of the Hindu Temple Society of North America, a temple in the New York borough of Queens that

is one of the country's oldest.

As a non-Indian Hindu, Gabbard is most definitely an outlier.

According to an analysis issued last month from the Pew Forum on Religion & Public Life, there are about 1 billion Hindus in the world. Of those, 94 percent are in India, and 99 percent in the larger South Asia region. The analysis, based on data from 2010, the latest available, estimated the population of Hindus in the United States at 1.79 million. Most are of Indian descent.

Hinduism encompasses a range of beliefs and practices, and there is no formal conversion practice. That acceptance of plurality in the faith, that Hindus come in many forms, would make it "hypocritical" for Indian Hindus to look askance at Gabbard for not sharing their ethnicity, said Smita Kothuri, 38, of McLean, Va.

"How can I hold it against her? I'd be untrue to my religion if I held it against her," she said.

Other Indian Hindus agreed

with the sentiment.

"I don't think it makes a difference that she's not Indian," said Kinjal Dave, 17, a high school senior in Hillsborough, N.J. "I think it's the faith that matters."

The press secretary for Gabbard, a 31-year-old Iraq war veteran, declined an Associated Press request to interview Gabbard for this story, but sent along a statement Gabbard had made upon being sworn into office, for which she used a copy of the Bhagavad Gita, a Hindu religious text.

"I chose to take the oath of office with my personal copy of the Bhagavad Gita because its teachings have inspired me to be a servant-leader, dedicating my life in the service of others and to my country," she said.

Gabbard has said she was introduced to Hinduism through her mother, and embraced it fully as a teenager. She also is the first member of Congress to be born in the U.S. territory of American Samoa.

The reception from Indians and Indian media to her electoral victory has been largely positive, although there has been at least one mistaken media report making a reference to Gabbard being Indian-American. (She and her siblings all have Indian first names.)

Having any Hindu representation in Congress breaks barriers in a country that, despite religious freedom being enshrined in the Constitution, has seen its elected officials overwhelmingly come from Christian backgrounds.

It can be an inspiration to other Hindus who are interested in public office, that their faith and most voters' unfamiliarity with it, won't prove insurmountable. "I think it instills confidence to say there's been a Hindu there," said Suhag Shukla, executive director of the Hindu American Foundation in Washington.

It's also an opportunity to introduce Hinduism as a faith to people who may have seen it as solely the purview of those who have a connection to India.

Dharmasetu Das knows all about that. Born in Massachusetts to a military family, the 55-year-old white man whose original first name was David has been practicing Hinduism for decades. Now living in San Diego, he performs weddings and other ceremonies as a Hindu pandit, or priest.

He was a teenager when he came across some books on the faith, and "I felt like this was it," he said.

He hasn't come across too many other non-Indian Hindus like himself over the years, and is happy to know he now has a compatriot in such a high-profile place like Congress.

"Just opening people's eyes," he said, "it's a great thing."

### Bear Wrongs Patiently

The fifth spiritual work of mercy is to bear wrongs patiently. Bearing wrongs patiently does not, however, mean being a doormat for others to walk on. It simply means that, regardless of the wrongs which we suffer, we should bear them all patiently. For example, if you have had something stolen from your unlocked car, this

virtue requires that you treat this with patience and equanimity, but not that you continue to keep your car unlocked. It is more about the attitude that you have concerning the wrong done to you. We might take a lesson from the ancient stoics, who counseled that every event has two handles, as it were, one by which it can be borne and one by which it is unbearable. Remember that everything here is temporary and that liars, thieves, and even murderers really have no power over our immortal souls. Finally, consider the example of Jesus in his last days. Faced with false charges and inhuman torture and suffering, he prayed for his accusers and tormentors. We should show patience by praying for those who wrong us, realizing that they are the ones who have truly been harmed by their misdeeds.

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
