# Vernon Council OKs candidates' slate

## Canning Center future discussed

**VERNON** — Michelle Cook is unopposed in her bid for re-election as mayor of Vernon.

The Vernon City Council approved the list of certi-

fied candidates seeking the two open council seats. No one applied to run for the mayor's position, said City Clerk Dian Hendrix on Monday.

Council member Byron Biddle is stepping down from the council, and the seat left vacant by the death of Oscar Ward last year is also up for grabs. The election will be held March 12, with the polls being open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. at City Hall.

Eligible candidates for the election include Tina Sloan, John W. Hawkins III, Shawn Sanders and Gary Owens.

The council also approved moving the WIC office from the Vernon Library to the City Hall, and moving the Feb. 18 workshop to Feb. 19 at 7 p.m. since Feb. 18 is President's Day and the City Hall will be closed for the national holiday.

Vernon resident Annette

Lanham also approached the council about the possibility of reopening the Washington County Canning Center in a different building in Vernon.

"I took on this project because I felt that it would be a great public resource, not only for Vernon, but the neighboring areas as well," Lanham said of the canning center.

The canning center, once operated by the Tri-County Community

Council, was closed when the boiler became inoperable and the repairs were too expensive. The city has since sold the building and property to the DOT as right-of-way.

Lanham asked the council if they were not willing to reopen the canning center in Vernon, if the equipment from the canning center could be moved to a new location and used there.

# Chipley alum given service award at FSU

## Campbell chosen for honor named after Martin Luther King

**TALLAHASSEE** — Florida State's MLK Week celebration got much more personal for the College of Medicine on Jan. 16 when Associate Professor Kendall Campbell received the university's prestigious Dr. Martin Luther King Distinguished Service Award.

"I am deeply humbled to receive such an award honoring a man with such vision, compassion and sacrifice," Campbell, from the Department of Family Medicine and Rural Health, said of the surprise announcement. "His focus, peacefulness and tenacity for a cause are to be admired and emulated."

The award is given each year to a member of the FSU community who exemplifies King's ideals and the university's commitment to diversity. Only seven have been given out, and now two of them have gone to faculty members at the medical school. In 2008, Dr. José Rodriguez was honored.

# Police charge Chipley man with having child pornography

**CHIPLEY** — A Chipley man was arrested in connection with possession of child pornography charges, according to a Chipley Police Department news release issued Friday.

Christopher Cartee, 31, of Chipley was arrested on 22 counts of possession of obscene material — possess photograph of sexual performance by a child, according to the release.

"Child Pornography is

a serious crime with serious consequences," said Police Chief Kevin Crews. "Although Cartee did not take the photographs, he was in possession of them and in turn is enabling those individuals who use the most fragile and innocent of us, our children, to either gain a financial

profit or gratify their own personal needs."

In May 2012, Chipley Police began an investigation involving possession of child pornography. Officers with the Chipley Police Department received information that Cartee had a laptop computer on which there was child pornography, according to the release. Officers obtained a search warrant for the laptop computer, and with the assistance of the Florida Department of Law

Enforcement Computer Forensic Unit, found hundreds of obscene images contained on the laptop.

On May 23, Chipley Police, with assistance of the Florida Department of Law Enforcement, and the Washington County Sheriff's Office, executed a search warrant at Cartee's Chipley residence.

Officers collected computer and electronic media, which were sent to the FDLE computer forensics unit. More obscene images

were found on computers seized during the search warrant, according to police.

On Wednesday, Feb. 6, Cartee was arrested, charged and booked into the Washington County Jail on an \$110,000 dollar bond.

"Our officers along with the Florida Department of Law Enforcement Investigators and the Washington County Sheriff's Office spent many hours working this case to its conclusion," Crews said.

# School Board moves ahead with new school plans

**CHIPLEY** — Washington County School Board members voted to take the next step in the process of building a new Kate M. Smith Elementary School, approving the new site's spot survey, which is required by the state Department of Education.

"This is the next step," Superintendent Joe Taylor said Monday night at the February board meeting. "This survey is required by the DOE and once you approve it, we can get our architects working on the plans."

Taylor said that Gov. Rick Scott's proposed budget funds the school construction, which is expected to cost more than \$33 million, over a three-year period. Of that \$33 million, \$7.6 million is the cost of removing the old elementary school, Taylor said.

In January, the school board approved the 22-plus acre site between South Boulevard and Brickyard Road as the future home of Kate M. Smith Elementary School.

At the January meeting, District Maintenance Director Mike Park reviewed the process the Site Selection Committee had gone through in choosing the new location for the school.

"This has been an ongoing process of about 20 years," Park said, "and over the years, some of the names on the committee changed."

In October, the Department of Education visited the elementary school to determine the need for a new facility. Five days later, DOE issued the finding that there was a "critical need" for a new elementary school in Chipley, Park said.

With that information,

the selection committee met in late December and again on Jan. 3 to discuss the choice of school site, which came down to either stay at the current location, or move the school to the 22-plus acre tract of land the district owns that stretches between South Boulevard and Brickyard Road.

Taylor has said that the goal is to get the project ready for submission to the state in August.

Mayor Cook suggested the old high school cafeteria building could be transformed into a new canning center, but council member Gwen March balked at making any decision at that time.

"I think we should table this for a workshop," March said. "We would need to know how much it would cost to make that building fit to use."

Lanham asked if some of the money the city received for the sale of the old canning center could be used toward renovating the cafeteria.

Biddle said he was under the impression the canning center was required by the state Health Department to have a boiler to operate, but Lanham said that was the first she had heard of such a requirement.

Amanda Baker, environmental health specialist with the Washington County Health Department, said on Tuesday that the canning center would not be under the auspices of the health department, but said the Department of Agriculture would be the agency overseeing canning center operations.

The Department of Agriculture media office was not able to immediately answer the question of whether or not a boiler was required, but is now researching the subject at the request of the Washington County News.

College of Medicine Dean John P. Fogarty was delighted by Campbell's selection.


"As a physician and champion for the underserved, Dr. Campbell has walked the walk, serving as a clinician and director of clinics that serve the poor and underserved in both Gainesville and Tallahassee," he wrote in an email to the faculty, students and staff. "He has done the same within his local faith communities, providing weekly patient education conferences in local congregations."

Campbell graduated magna cum laude with a bachelor's in chemistry from Florida A&M University; got his first year of medical education at Florida State through PIMS (Program in Medical Sciences); and earned his M.D. at the University of Florida in 2001. He served as a faculty member at UF for several years before returning as a faculty member in the College of Medicine.

Campbell is a 1992 graduate of Chipley High School and founder of the Degree Seekers Program, an outreach program for minority youth in Washington County. He is the son of Marvin Campbell and the late Eva Harmon Campbell, a long-time educator for the Washington County School System.

Senior Associate Dean Myra Hurt has watched him blossom.

"Dr. Campbell embodied the principles and ideals of Dr. King from the day I met him in 1994,"

she wrote in a letter supporting his nomination. "In the intervening 18 years, he has matured from a young undergraduate dedicated to service into a man who lives for service, both in his profession and in his life."

"An examination of his curriculum vita demonstrates the range and the depth of his activities in service. Impressively, his dedication to the principles and ideals Dr. King embodied crosses all of the domains of an academic physician—scholarship, education, committee service and clinical service. And in his private life, this service ethic is apparent in his work in his community and in his church."

"From 1994 to 1996, Dr. Campbell was a role model for middle and high school students in our SSTRIDE program (Science Students Together Reaching Instructional Diversity and Excellence). He was a shining light for kids, showing them the way to achievement and daring them to

dream big, as he did. Today, among all of his inspiring activities, he is a mentor for graduate students from medically underserved backgrounds in our Bridge to Clinical Sciences M.S. program ... and a sterling example of the success that is ahead for them if they work hard towards their dream of becoming a physician. It is awe-inspiring to see his work come full circle here."

In addition to his faculty role, Campbell serves on the Student National Medical Association and the Christian Medical Association, while also serving on the Diversity and Inclusion Council at FSU. He has also published on topics ranging from hypertension and cardiovascular disease to health in minority populations to curriculum redesign. He participates in the Degree Seekers Outreach Program, where he talks with children about school and life success in Washington County.

elderly woman living on 8th Street in Chipley, said Police Chief Kevin Crews. "He ran from the house and we spent about an hour trying to catch him."

The man was known to authorities to have a criminal record and a drug habit, Haddock said. The man was being sought by the Chipley

Police Department for questioning in a home invasion in the Brickyard Avenue area.

"We made contact with an individual who talked to him right before he done all this, and he said he was blitzed out of his mind on meth," Crews said.

After Payne fled the house on 8th Street, he was

spotted at Northwest Florida Community Hospital, where he allegedly stole some small items, the police chief said.

"He went to the hospital and took a lab coat, and we couldn't tell if he was armed or not," the sheriff said. The suspect also confronted some children on the school property, as well as having

been spotted near Tyndall Federal Credit Union and Javier's Restaurant.

The final sighting was at the credit union, and in was in the woods to the west of the credit union that the man was apprehended.

"We set the dogs on him and they got him," Crews said, "about 200 yards into

the woods."


Roulhac Middle School, Chipley High School and Washington County Christian School were on lockdown as a precaution during the search, but the lockdown was released shortly before 2 p.m.



He also explained that the official historian for the Griffin family was Lucille Griffin Collins, who is married to Tom Alex Collins, who grew up in the Bethel Primitive Baptist Church community, the very area that I still call home.

With all those familiar names, I knew that I would feel right at home and could see the potential for placing

## Bonifay Heading Company brought employment to Holmes County

In Holmes County's early development, the virgin pine forests were the incentive for many pioneer families coming to the area. Timber for lumber and the related naval stores industry were major contributors to the economy. But a later business boon in the 1930s was when Grief Brothers Cooperage Company brought its Heading Company to Bonifay. For my younger readers a cooper is one who makes containers of staves and metal bands and a cooperage is a place where such containers are made.

Wooden barrels and kegs had many uses. The turpentine industry and the whiskey industry as well as the shipping industry relied on wooden barrels to ship their products. I can remember when nails came in kegs. Other hardware items were also shipped in kegs. Though the Bonifay Heading Company didn't make the barrels and kegs, they were an important part of the process.

They made the barrel heads, the round piece with which the top of the barrel of gum or other product was sealed for shipment. They also made

the staves with which the kegs were made.

I don't know the number of employees the mill had, but through the years, many families were connected with the mill. I talked with Ray Brooks, Bruce Roberts, and Son Chance all of whom had contact with the mill. Both Ray's parents had worked there and they had lived in a house near where the mill was located.

Bruce Roberts is the son of the late John L. Roberts who was the mill Superintendent at the time of its closing in the mid 1950s. They also lived near the mill in what was known as the Sessoms house across from Jerkins Inc. Grace Donaldson worked there with Roberts as office receptionist/typist and Minter Seig was the mill boss.

Prior to Roberts as mill superintendent was Merrill Tucker. Son Chance said that he was in Mr. Tucker's boy's Sunday School class at First Baptist Church. During that time, King Sandusky was the mill boss. At some point during its history, Bonifay Heading Co. employed James Davis, a one-armed black man as night watchman. He

also cut the kudzu around the property with a sling blade. Bruce told me that Davis lived at "Happy Corner" on Oklahoma Street near the railroad track.

Son Chance's father Jim Chance and his crew logged and delivered the wood to the mill where it was green cut and put into the drying kilns. Using mule teams and oxen teams, the logs were felled and trimmed in the woods; then, loaded on trucks. Often, the load would be so heavy the team or teams of oxen would have to help move the truck to firm ground where it could proceed under its own power. Mr. Dave Leavins and others worked with Mr. Chance. Son's uncle Rufe Devon was a timber cruiser for the company. Henry Bruner, the father of the late George Henry Bruner hauled away the crooks and sold them for whatever he could get for them. Some helpers of Mr. Bruner's were Arthur D. And Hubert. Payne.

Crooks were pieces of wood left from the stave cutting. Since these required curved boards, there were the outside crooks which were considered waste after the cuts were finished.

The most dangerous jobs were for the sawyers who pushed the log pieces through the saws,

particularly the jointer which had projections. Many of these workers lost a finger or fingers in this work as they guided the short pieces of timber with which the barrel heads were made.

The saws and other equipment were run by steam produced by burning the debris from the barrel heads and nail keg staves.

Numerous families came to and went from Bonifay to work at the mill. Many will remember the Hackneys and their large family of children who attended Bonifay schools. Other locals whom Son could recall were several Davis boys, Wesley and Joel Gardner's father, Mila Steverson, Claud Redman, Jasper Evans, King Roan, Brown Burnham and his boys, Carl Braxton, and Mancil Newsome. These are just some of those who contributed to Bonifay and Holmes County's economic development while finding gainful employment at home. The days of the timber and related industry are past, but it would be great if some other industry would discover the attributes of our community and bring some much needed jobs to our county. Our Chamber of Commerce continually strives to make that happen.

# Esto told why town was denied grant

**ESTO** — A representative from Summit Professional Services, Dennis Dingman, came before the Esto Town Council to explain to them why they did not receive the Community Development Block Grant to update their water system during their regularly scheduled meeting on Feb. 5.

"There were 260 communities applying for that grant, and all of them scored higher points than you, to be blunt," Dingman said. "I assure you though, there was nothing you could do to score any higher than you did. I must say that the time and effort that you did as a town was impressive to raise your scores, it just wasn't enough."

Dingman explained that scoring was based aspects such as the income of the population, number of minorities

employed by the town, health and safety of the water supply and so on.

"For the income of the population, it is still based on the census done in 2000, and I have a feeling that the residents exaggerated on their income on that census," Dingman said. "The 2010 census results won't be used until September of this year, however I don't think the trend will have changed."

The minority employment rate for the town would have to be above a certain percentage in comparison to the county's for the points to make a significant difference, he said.

"Another way to increase

your points was to get a letter from the Department of Environmental Protection stating that you'd have to update your water system for the health and well being of your residents," he said. "However, since your water is still at safe drinking levels and you're only replacing existing pipes, that was not an option."

Dingman said that it was still at the town's advantage to continue applying for the grant, especially since the engineering plans have already completed and would be valid for a couple of years.

Council member Darlene Madden told Dingman that

the town was recently able to make contact with their legislative representatives, Rep. Marti Coley and Sen. Don Gaetz, when they came to visit Holmes County.

Dingman praised them on knowing their representatives and to continue an open line of communication with them.

"They are such down-to-earth people," Madden said. "They seemed to know us and remembered all of our issues and all of our activities. They really seem to care about us."

Madden also informed the council there was a concerned parent about the playground equipment and

order for the town to use the plates to have more "This is the Place" books printed; the letter to property owners who have not started cleaning up their properties per their clean-up ordinances; and the town's mobile home ordinance to be ready for signing at next month's town council meeting.

"What I need to know is what do you want me to do about this garbage collection ordinance," Goodman said. After much discussion, the town council explained they want a unified collection agency in Esto that the town could make money on with minimal risks.

Goodman asked the town give him time to research ways of doing this and he would try to get a proposal to the council at the next town council meeting.

The next regularly scheduled Esto Town Council meeting is scheduled for 7 p.m. on Tuesday, March 5 at the Esto Town Hall.

## 'My lucky day'

### First time Gulf fishermen strike it big in Destin

Whether it was beginners luck or skill, they got their fish.

On Wednesday, a couple of Destin's party boats went out for a day of fishing and brought back quite a haul.

The *Swoop*, at HarborWalk Marina, with Capt. Chad Mott at the helm came in with 38 people and several stringers loaded with triggerfish, mingo, white snapper and lane snapper.

And for some it was their first trip out on the Gulf of Mexico.

"This was my lucky day," said first-timer Ron Scott of Ontario.

Scott landed a humongous triggerfish that weighed more than 7 pounds.

"I caught it on my first cast," he said. "It was excellent fishing."

Steve Cormany of Fort Wayne, Ind., another first-timer, hauled in a big lane snapper.

"I had a good time," Cormany said. "I even baited my own hook."

The group was fishing about 17 miles out in 160- to 180-foot of water.

Capt. Reid Phillips and his crew on the *Destin Princess*, which docks at Fishing Fleet Marina, went out about 20 miles and pulled in their share of fish.

"It was a little slow at first," Phillips said. "We caught a lot of red snapper that we had to let go."

But the fishing picked up and they hauled in about 500-plus pounds of fish. In the mix were mingo, white snapper, lane snapper, triggerfish and amberine.

"We wound up with 10 to 12 lane snapper," Phillips said. "It taste just like a red snapper." The difference is, anglers can keep a lane snapper as opposed to a red snapper. The fate of the red snapper season is in limbo right now.

But the lane snapper, "It's a bonus fish," Phillips said.

Pulling in one of those bonus fish was Jim Strebral of Iowa.

Strebral was a first-timer on the *Destin Princess*.

"This is what you call beginners luck," he said. He was fishing along with his buddies

Wayne Laing and Jim Steinbrech, also from Iowa.

It was also Bob Cooper of Kentucky's first time on the *Princess*.

"It was a great trip," he said. He filled his stringer with mingo, white snapper and triggerfish.

There was another threesome that was quite proud of their catch. First-time fishermen Wendell Wray and Steve Myers along with Terry Lovelace — all from Illinois — had quite the stringer. The group tried to go last year when they were in Destin, but they got stormed out.

However, on Wednesday, they had a "great time. I think I'll do it again," Myers said.

So call it luck or skill — the only thing that matters at the end of the day for these fishermen is they got their fish.

## Fourth-grade teacher downs huge buck with a bow

By her own account, 24-year-old Marissa Ballard is a "girlie girl." The Grand Ridge native says she likes to wear nice clothes and go on dates with her husband, Dusty.

Nevertheless, Marissa, who stands 5-feet, 5-inches, weighs 105 pounds and is a fourth-grade teacher at Sneads Elementary School, is an accomplished archery hunter.

This season she showed she can hold her own with her male counterparts when she downed a huge typical 10-pointer in Jackson County that scored 130-2/8 Boone and Crockett (B&C) inches. It was her fourth deer in four years of hunting.

She killed the big buck Oct. 27 while hunting with her father, Allen Chason, on property they lease for bow hunting. Ironically, husband Dusty, who normally is in the hunting mix most Saturdays, was in Jacksonville with relatives attending the Georgia-Florida football game.

For Marissa, that day was a day of lows and highs.

"Dad and I got into our stands that

afternoon and we hadn't been there too long before I looked and this really big buck came in about five or six yards from the base of my ladder stand and started eating acorns," she said. "I drew back and he turned his head and looked right at me and I froze.

"He just stared and stared, and then he turned and ran off. I felt awful 'cause I knew I had blown my chance."

With acorns falling from several nearby oaks it wasn't long before Marissa had a chance at redemption when a group of "bachelor bucks" came in, the largest offering a perfect 14-yard broadside shot.

"I was so determined after letting the first buck get away. I wasn't going to make another mistake," she said.

And she didn't. The 190-pound buck ran 70 yards after a perfect shot.

Allen, who was hunting several hundred yards away, said his cell phone rang about 5:30 and he could hear the excitement in Marissa's voice as she whispered, "I just shot a monster."

As word spread about Marissa's exceptional deer, she has gotten lots of comments.

"Most of the people who know me from school can't believe that I even hunt. But it's the boys, especially the ones who hunt, who can't believe one of their teachers did this," she said.

"They think that's pretty special." Marissa's buck has been entered into the Florida Buck Registry, a measuring program for the bigger bucks taken in Florida. The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission maintains the registry.

Sometime this spring the rack will be re-measured for the Pope and Young (P&Y) Club, which is the yardstick for all bow-killed big game animals in North America. There are several qualifications to make the P&Y registry for typical whitetails, including scoring 125 B&C inches or above.

Assuming Marissa's Jackson County buck is accepted by P&Y, and there's no apparent reason it shouldn't be, she will be only the 22nd Florida hunter to have accomplished this feat in Florida.

And that is a big deal.

## Anderson, Welch chosen to lead East boys

You could call Matt Anderson the Dean of Panhandle basketball coaching, and while that could be construed as another word for “old” he’s not feeling a day past 30.

The current Graceville mentor has spent half of his 50 years in the profession, one in which he said keeps him feeling younger than what the biological clock dictates. Anderson has been chosen along with Malone coach Steve Welch to lead the East boys basketball team in the ninth annual Halifax All-Star Classic on April 6 at Gulf Coast State College.

Anderson was an assistant coach at Malone when Welch played his junior and senior high school seasons in the early 1990s. It’s the second time both coaches will head an East team. Anderson joined then-Apalachicola coach Joe Hayes in the inaugural game

in 2005 in pacing the East to a 102-82 win, while Welch coached the team to a 96-76 victory last year.

Anderson and Welch remained friends long after Welch departed Malone. Upon his return, Welch has been the head coach for six seasons and has the Tigers primed for a run at the Class 1A state championship. Anderson is no stranger to titles at Malone, as he secured four straight championships from 1995-98. Anderson since has had stops at his alma mater, Ponce de Leon, as well as Bay, Chipola College and now Graceville.

Anderson remembers Welch as a tenacious player with a willingness to learn.

“He listened well and tried to do what you said exactly like you said,” Anderson said. “He was very much a coach’s player and he could really, really shoot the basketball.”

Anderson admitted Welch had limitations on the defensive end.



He said Welch was aware of the shortcomings as well and coaches aided him by setting up the appropriate matchups for his skill set on the other end of the court. Anderson is well known for his defensive teachings and Welch has taken on the mantra with the Tigers, who cause havoc for opposing offenses.

“He was never my head coach, but he was always there to pull me aside and encourage me,” Welch said. “He still helps me today, if I need advice he’s still there to give me advice.”

This will be the first time Anderson and Welch have coached together. That’s a remarkable feat considering Anderson has

a large rolodex of former assistants across the Panhandle. Two of them, Michael Grady and Mike Memmen, are head coaches at Bay and Bozeman, respectively, and also have coached in the all-star game.

Welch said he would defer to Anderson if he wanted to be labeled the “head coach” of the East. There typically isn’t an official designation between head coach and assistant in the Halifax Classic. In fact, both admitted there’s little to be done in coaching up some of the area’s best senior basketball players.

“You didn’t have to win to please anybody, there wasn’t a lot of pressure,” Welch said. “The biggest thing I took from it was how much fun the kids had in the short amount of time they were together. They really bonded.”

Anderson enjoys not only coaching with good friends, but bringing together rivals with a combined goal. And while there

was little pressure, it still felt good to win and earn bragging rights, he said.

“It was really good to coach the players you coached against during the season,” Anderson said. “The kids all knew how to play and they played for each other.”

Anderson and Graceville bowed out in the District 3-1A semifinals. He will have a few months of relaxing and traveling to watch games, likely Malone during its run, before leading the East. And if the next two months are anything like his 50 years they will crawl by slowly rather than whiz past.

“I’m 50 going on 29 and to be honest with you, between teaching and coaching and working out and things like that I don’t feel much different than when I was coaching at 27,” Anderson said. “If someone didn’t keep up with it (his age) and tell me I’m 50 I wouldn’t know it.”

## RAMS’ TRIFECTA

### Rutherford tops Bay to win third straight district crown

Rutherford basketball coach Rhondie Ross was told Bay went more than 14 minutes with only a handful of baskets in Saturday’s District 1-5A championship game.

His response was quick. “They went how long?” Ross said with surprise.

In truth, there has been little surprising with the Rams’ recent show of defensive dominance spanning more than a month. The latest display was on Saturday, when they defeated the Tornadoes 54-28 to secure Ross’ third straight district title. Rutherford ran its winning streak to 13 games since a Jan. 4 loss while holding the past 12 opponents to fewer than 50 points.

It was the third time in the span the Rams (25-3) held a team to fewer than 30, including both foes in the 1-5A tournament. Rutherford had more offensive intensity on Saturday than in a turnover-plagued 44-23 win over Pensacola West Florida Tech a day earlier. The Rams also forced 20 turnovers for the second straight night.

Ross pointed to the regular-season finale against Fort Walton Beach as the lynchpin in the streak. The Rams won 55-49 against a formidable foe and it showed how well they can shut down a potent

offense.

“It was the perfect game to go into the tournament,” Ross said. “We had beaten so many teams by a large margin that I think we got bored and complacent. Good teams will help with that.”

That’s not taking anything away from West Florida Tech or Bay, he said, but he reiterated how it was important to maintain focus even with blow-out victories in two prior meetings with the Tornadoes. Rutherford’s defense weathered what was a potential momentum swing

after one quarter and changed the complexion of the contest through the next 16 minutes.

Bay (16-11) narrowed the gap to 18-12 at the end of the first quarter with two baskets in the final 30 seconds. The second and final shot was a buzzer-beating 3-pointer by Markeis Goodman. However, rather than challenge more the Tornadoes withered.

Goodman scored Bay’s only basket of the second quarter, as Rutherford moved ahead 33-16 at halftime. The Tornadoes didn’t score another field

goal until a Ryan Norwood 3-pointer with 1:30 left to play in the third quarter. By then the game was 42-20 and comfortably in Rutherford’s favor.

“When you have momentum you have to score,” Bay coach Michael Grady said. “We missed some easy put backs, and against a team like Rutherford you need all the points you can get. We had intensity, we just didn’t do anything with it.”

Rutherford matched Bay with a buzzer beater by Keith Arts to end the first half. The Rams went on to limit Bay to less than 10 points in each of the final two quarters for the victory.

Khaliel Spearman led the Rams with 13 points, while senior Kiki Williamson added 10 and Gabriel Steele and Alex Banks eight each.

“I’m so happy and proud for our seniors,” Ross said. “People don’t realize how much work they put in. They don’t realize how much work goes into a basketball game. I call it a production and it takes everyone.”

Demetrius Rivers was Bay’s lone double-figure scorer with 11 points. The Tornadoes will travel to Tallahassee Rickards in the Region 1-5A opener on Thursday.

Rutherford earned the right to host at least one regional game. It will do so against Live Oak Suwannee on Thursday.

## DAMAGE PREVENTION "CALL BEFORE YOU DIG"

The Sunshine One-Call of Florida advises that many damages to buried utility lines can be avoided when everyone participates in a four-step process that begins with a "call before you dig." Follow these four steps designed to help you avoid hitting buried utility lines during any project that involves digging.

### Step 1: Call before you dig.

Florida law says homeowners must call 811 or (800)432-4770 two full business days before digging in any easement, right-of-way, or permitted use area. Contractors are required to call in every job that involves digging or disturbing the earth's surface. After you call, a locate ticket will be generated and buried utility lines will be located and marked with color-coded paint, flags or stakes, making it easy for you to avoid them. Hitting a buried utility could result in anything from no cable tv service to serious injury or loss of life when electrical or gas lines are involved. Visit [www.callsunshine.com](http://www.callsunshine.com) for more information.

### Step 2: Wait the required time.

After you call, utility companies have two full business days to locate and mark the approximate location of buried utility lines. Refrain from digging until all utilities on your locate ticket have responded or the allowed time has expired. You can easily find out when the color-coded locate marks have been placed, whether the site is clear of a particular utility or if the locate has been delayed by calling (800)852-8057 and entering your locate ticket number. This can also be done at [www.callsunshine.com](http://www.callsunshine.com).

### Step 3: Protect the locate marks.

Keep the locate marks visible until the project is complete. When marks are destroyed or removed, the excavator must stop any digging and place another call for locate marks. Locate marks are valid for 20 days. Removal of valid locate marks is a misdemeanor.

### Step 4: Dig safely.

Use extreme caution when digging within 24 inches on either side of the marks to avoid hitting the buried utility lines. If you are using machinery to dig, someone other than the person operating the machine must supervise the activity, watching carefully to avoid damaging the buried utility.

Failure to call Sunshine State One-Call of Florida before digging is punishable by a minimum fine of \$250 and the job site being shut down.

If damage occurs, please notify.






