# Chamber discusses manufacturers council

## Workforce development may enhance economic development

**CHIPLEY** — The pool of qualified skilled employees needed to fill key manufacturing positions is shrinking, and that is a problem a regional manufacturing council is attempting to solve.

The Washington County Chamber of Commerce members heard a presentation from members of the Northwest Florida Manufacturers Council during Thursday's meeting at Northwest Florida Community Hospital.

"It is predicted that more than 3,400 people will be retiring from regional manufacturing positions in the near future," said Jennifer Grove, workforce development coordinator for Gulf Power. "After a survey of regional schools and technical centers, it was determined that there are about 860 workers being prepared to fill those 3,400

## Man sentenced to 25 years for selling hydrocodone

**CHIPLEY** — A Westville man has been sentenced to 25 years in the Department of Corrections, the Washington County Sheriff's Office reported on Tuesday. The sentence stems from an October 2012, arrest on narcotics charges.

Gary Michael Kenyon, 56, of Westville, was sentenced to 25 years minimum/mandatory (day for a day) in the state Department of Corrections with 120 days credit including a civil judgment of \$500,000.

Kenyon was the target of a narcotics investigation during which he sold undercover officers 40 hydrocodone pills, according to the sheriff's office report.

Kenyon was arrested on charges of sell of hydrocodone and trafficking in hydrocodone.

"We have assembled this narcotics task force with the singular purpose of aggressively targeting those who continually pursue a career in the illegal drug market in our county" said Sheriff Bobby Haddock. "Kenyon is a career criminal who has habitually pushed illegal narcotics for several years. This sentence reflects both the State Attorney's Office as well as our commitment to not settling for a band aid fix, but pursuing a permanent removal of this threat to our community."

## Contractor: Energy program saves district \$150,000

### WHTC upgrades continue to save energy, money

**CHIPLEY** — Improvements at Washington-Holmes Technical Center have saved the district \$150,351, the Washington County School Board was told during Monday's meeting in the district administration building in Chipley.

Brian Walker, measurement and verification manager for ABM Building and Energy Solutions of Florida, and Mark Hagerman, ABM vice president of sales, were on hand to update the board members with an energy review during the October board meeting.

"The reductions in electricity and gas usage for the construction and audit period reduced pollution by 1,218 barrels of oil not consumed," said Walker.

The renovations at WHTC, which began last year, included control renovations and upgrade, the replacement of 67 air conditioning systems, lighting replacements and upgrades,

water side renovations, weld shop exhaust fan system and the installation of a heavy equipment complete exhaust ventilation system, Walker said.

The district is expected to save \$2 million through the Bundled Energy Solutions Program which ABM installed last year, according to the website, [investor.abm.com](http://investor.abm.com).

The project was projected to reduce energy consumption on Washington-Holmes Technical Center's 26-acre campus by over 1 million kWh per year.

Along with significant utility and

**Local man killed after triglide strikes dog**

A Caryville man was killed and his wife was seriously injured when their triglide struck a dog on Oct. 13, officials said.

The incident happened at 7 p.m. on County 179 near the intersection of Orange Blossom Road. William Joseph Gehm, 67, of Caryville, was driving a 2013 Harley Davidson Triglide when he struck the dog, Florida Highway Patrol officials wrote in a news release. He had one passenger, Joan M. Gehm, 64, also of Caryville.

William Gehm was pronounced dead at the scene. Joan Gehm was taken to a local hospital and is in critical condition, officials wrote.

**Wausau man killed in traffic accident**

CHIPLEY — A Wausau man died on Oct. 11 when his 2002 Ford Mustang crossed the centerline and struck an oncoming vehicle, according to a report from the Florida Highway Patrol.

Ronald Chris Cook, 51, of Wausau was killed in the accident, which happened on County Road 279, 555 feet south of Swindle Road.

The passengers in the second vehicle, a 2012 Kia Sorento, were both injured.

The driver of the Kia, Helen J. Chambers, 68, of Caryville was taken to Bay Medical Center and was reported as being in critical condition. Her passenger, Noma Hartfield, 77, of DeFuniak Springs, was listed as seriously injured and was taken to Doctors Memorial Hospital in Bonifay.

According to the report, Cook's Mustang was southbound when it entered the northbound lane, striking the left front of the Kia.

Both vehicles spun in a counterclockwise direction, with the Mustang coming to rest facing north on the southbound lane of County Road 279. The Kia came to rest facing south on the northbound grass shoulder of County Road 279.

All the people involved were wearing their seatbelts, according to the report. No charges were reported.

**Two Chipley men arrested on drug charges**

CHIPLEY — Two Chipley men were arrested in connection with drug charges, according to a report from the Chipley Police Department.

Demond Levar Johnson, of Chipley, was arrested on four counts of selling cocaine, possession of marijuana and possession of cocaine with intent to distribute, according to police. Also arrested was Johnathan Jerone Pryor, of Chipley, in connection with five counts of selling cocaine.

Members of the Washington County Drug Task Force, consisting of the Chipley Police Department and Washington County Sheriff's Office, were involved in an operation on Sept. 18 that led to information that Johnson was in possession of crack

cocaine, according to police.

During the operation, Johnson discovered the presence of task force members and fled on foot. Officers gave chase and apprehended Johnson moments later. Johnson was found to be in possession of crack cocaine and marijuana, according to the police.

Johnson was placed under arrest and taken to the Washington County Jail.

Pryor was also served with five warrants on charges of selling cocaine on Sept. 18.

Both arrests concluded a five-

jobs. Clearly we have got some work to do there.”

Grove, of Panama City, is working with the manufacturer's council on loan from Gulf Power to help with workforce development, spoke on the importance of manufacturing jobs to the regional economy, and the potential for good careers for students with industrial certifications.

“We all get to live in a place where millions of people wish they could live, and we want to provide jobs so our children and grandchildren can stay close to home, if not in the same city, then at least in the region,” Grove said. “Close enough they can visit but not so close you have to do all their laundry,” she added, joking.

While there is not a lack of applicants for jobs at Gulf Power, there is often a lack of qualified applicants applying for the jobs — which is a problem for manufacturers across the country as well as across the region.

“In my job, I focus on workforce development for the energy industry, and it is a struggle to find employees who have not only the job skills, but the soft skills as well, such as the habit of showing up for work every day on time,”

Grove said. The manufacturers council is looking at the same challenges as they apply to industrial jobs across the 12-county region. The region, which stretches from Escambia to Franklin counties, is expected to receive \$2.6 billion in total 2013 Gross Domestic Product from manufacturing.

Manufacturing provides 14,518 jobs within the regional economy, and generates \$985 million in total earnings. The leisure and hospitality industry, on the other hand, employs 63,053 workers in the region and generates \$1.3 billion in earnings.

“We looked at the manufacturing jobs in Northwest Florida, and found there are 14,000 jobs with an average annual salary of \$67,872,” Grove said. “On the other hand, the tourism industry is paying annual salaries of \$20,600.”

For every job in manufacturing, an additional 1.7 jobs are generated in the region.

Getting parents and legislators on board with the idea that manufacturing careers are lucrative has been a challenge, but the state of Florida is ahead of the game, Grove said.

“Adam Putnam, commissioner

of agriculture, said recently he would rather be involved in the government of Florida rather than any other state in the country,” Grove said. “While our legislators are debating how much we should be investing in getting our high school and middle school students on track to get industrial certifications, other states are still debating whether or not it should even be an issue.”

Regional manufacturers councils are also found across the country and throughout Florida, but until the forming of the Northwest Florida Manufacturers Council, there was not one in this region, Grove said.

As an example of one benefit of having a manufacturers council, local businesses are now eligible for grants to reimburse them for training expenses up to \$3,500 for each new job added, Grove said. “Normally, you have to add 10 jobs to be eligible for this reimbursement, but through the council, you can now be eligible for even one job due to this grant,” she said.

Nationally, 70 percent of Americans think manufacturing is the most important industry as far as impact to the national economy,

yet only 30 percent of those polled would want their children to work in manufacturing.

“The days when you graduated high school, went to college, then lived happily ever after are over,” Grove said. “If you look at the state unemployment statistics, and see the number of baccalaureate degree holders who are unemployed, you realize just having a college degree isn't enough any more.”

Grove said parents need to be talking to children about what type of career they want to have and begin learning skills as early

as middle school. “You have to know what you want to do, and then you have to develop those skills needed for that career to be successful,” Grove said.

“This is why manufacturing is so important to our rural counties,” said Terry Ellis, who manages WestPoint Home in Chipley and also serves on the board of directors for the manufacturers council. “So many of our young people are having to go find work somewhere else, it's important we create an atmosphere where they can stay close to home.”

operating savings, ABM also offered students in the school's Building Trades Program hands-on experience with the project.

Improvements to the 15 buildings on campus include retrofitting light fixtures with new high-efficiency T-8 fluorescent lamps and ballasts; renovating exhaust systems in certain buildings for improved air circulation; installation of a campus-wide, web-based HVAC control system, allowing the school to better manage energy use as well as notify appropriate staff should any problems arise with the equipment; and 63 HVAC units will be replaced with high-efficiency equipment that exceeds a Seasonal Energy Efficiency Ratio (SEER) of 15, according to the website.

From the period of March 2012 to June 2013, the district saw utility savings of \$116,723, Walker told the board, saying the district would have spent \$251,904 in utilities but actually only spent \$135,181, for the savings of \$116,723.

Contractually, the district was guaranteed savings of \$149,314 (\$30,000 in

maintenance and operation savings and \$119,314 in energy savings), Walker said. However, the total savings for the period was actually \$150,351 (\$30,000 in maintenance and operation savings, \$18207 in construction period energy savings, \$98,516 in audit period savings July 2012-June 2013, \$1090 in reconciled energy savings and \$2,538 in operational water savings.)

The saved energy amounts to 1,218 barrels of oil not consumed, or 4.0 acres of forest preserved, Walker said.

“We're right where we said we'd be with the energy savings,” Board President Terry Ellis said.

The board also discussed the bus schedule at Kate Smith Elementary School.

On Sept. 30, teacher Marla Whitaker told the school board of her concerns about elementary students who are forced to wait 30 or more minutes after school for their bus to arrive, some times with little supervision.

Transportation and Maintenance Director Mike Park told the board on Monday that the buses were

running the best schedule they could.

“I went to Kate Smith and noted the bus arrival times,” Park said. “After the first couple of weeks of school, the schedule settled down.”

“They are delivering the students who live nearby to make room for the elementary students,” Park said. “We're doing the best we can, but the schedule is set. Right now, this is the most efficient schedule we can come up with.”

“The children are still staying out there waiting,” Board Member Susan

Roberts said.

“We want to stay on top of this,” Ellis said. “We are going to have to address different fixes, other than just buses.”

My husband occasionally watches a religious TV program called "The Journey Home." Each episode highlights someone who converted to Catholicism, including several Protestant ministers. Conversion stories are interesting, regardless of what faith a person has converted to. As I've often

noted, religion is like a revolving door, with people constantly moving in and out. It's interesting to know what causes people to convert to a certain faith (or, in some cases, to reject religion altogether.) The title of the program, "The Journey Home," underscores the perception of one's chosen faith as a "home." Home is where we feel most comfortable. It's warm and familiar. I've met many Christians who refer to their house of worship as their "church home."

But even in our actual homes, not everyone will hold the same viewpoints. Personally, I've never found a spiritual group that shares my beliefs exactly, and that's okay. Just as family members can't be expected to think exactly alike, neither can those who share our spiritual homes. A classic example would be Unitarian Universalist congregations, in which people can hold very different beliefs and opinions while still being united as a strong, thriving community.

People often change homes. A place that once felt comfortable may no longer be adequate. Just as people change physical locations, they may likewise change spiritual homes. Unanticipated events in life can sometimes alter the structure of our homes and families. Spiritual changes are also among life's little
