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Officer-involved shooting ruled 'justified'

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PANAMA CITY — A fatal officer-involved shooting that took place near the Holmes-Washington county line earlier this year has been ruled “legal, justified under the circumstances” according to the Office of the State Attorney.

The incident, which took place Tuesday, March 11, was investigated by the Florida Department of Law Enforcement at the request of the Washington County Sheriff’s Office in the wake of an officer shooting a suspect who reportedly failed to comply with requests to put down what appeared to be a rifle.

The WCSO, Holmes County

Sheriff’s Office and the Bonifay Police Department had responded to a report of an armed subject on U.S. Highway 90 at the Alligator Creek Bridge on in Washington County.

After officers encountered the subject, later identified as Michael Snyder, he was shot by HCSO Deputy Jason Stafford and BPD Officer Jim Hall.

The incident first unfolded when WCSO Deputy Duran Harrison responded to a suspicious person, described as an older white male, possibly armed, walking eastbound on Highway 90 in the area of Ray’s Place.

When Harrison reached the vicinity of the Alligator Creek Bridge,

‘RHYTHM’ SENIOR HOUSING PROJECT

‘Rhythm’ likely a ‘dead project’

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WASHINGTON COUNTY — The controversial Rhythm housing development could very well be a dead project.

The proposed 1,883-acre active adult age-restricted community received a green light from the Washington County Board of County Commissioners in February 2012. Commissioners and then-planning rep for the development Tallahassee-based Henderson Planning Group LLC agreed upon a three-year land preparation deadline. That original deadline for vertical construction was Feb. 16, 2015.

Since then, the project has encountered many obstacles, including the county parting ways with Henderson Planning Group.

In January, Rhythm (FKA Florida Landings) claimed their right to extend vertical construction deadlines by six months as provided in an October 2013 Executive Order issued by Gov. Rick Scott extending development orders in counties affected by Tropical Storm Karen.

At that time, developers predicted a revised construction schedule, including a new commencement date of Aug. 21, 2015,

for construction; July 5, 2024, for build-out; and Dec. 31, 2028, for the final expiration date.

Despite the new August 2015 deadline for construction commencement, local commercial real estate broker Jim Town said it’s not likely the project will come to fruition.

“The development order required that certain acts be completed by the end of the three-year term, as extended, in order for the developer to have actually commenced construction and be allowed to continue for the full 10-year build-out period,” Town said.

All permits for Phase I — about 250 homes and infrastructure — had to be obtained, in addition to establishing sewer and water systems and roadways.



Conflicts between developers and state agencies are said to have led Rhythm to terminate its deep well and environmental permitting earlier this year. Those permits can take up to a year for approval due to test wells and other procedures, which presumably doesn’t leave adequate time for developers to meet the new deadline, which is less than 11 months away.

“The sad part to this story is the development would have added \$11 million a year to our ad valorem tax base,” Town said. “This would have substantially changed the county’s financial base over the next decade.”

Currently, the county’s ad valorem base is around \$8 million.

Police: Foul play not a factor in Chipley man’s death

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PANAMA CITY BEACH — A Chipley man was killed in a work-related accident in Panama City Beach on Monday.

According to reports, area pool company employee Ryan Cook and a co-worker were rewiring pool lights at a North Lagoon Drive residence.

The co-worker said he was working at the breaker box, and Cook, 27, was in the pool when he advised Cook it was all right to pull the wires.

When the worker received no response, he checked on Cook and found him underwater. Despite the worker’s attempts to provide CPR, Cook was pronounced dead after being transported to an area hospital.

Members of the Vernon City Council canceled their Sept. 15 workshop in the wake of Cook’s death, as he was the stepson of Vernon Mayor Michelle Cook.

An autopsy was performed Tuesday to determine to official cause of death, and the family is awaiting the release of Cook’s body before making funeral arrangements. Foul play is not suspected.

Meanwhile, Cook’s stepmother said he will be remembered for his “laid-back, take-life-as-it-comes” approach to living.

he saw a subject matching the description of the suspicious person, later identified as Snyder.

Harrison requested for and received assistance from various law enforcement agencies to assist in preventing any further vehicular traffic from crossing the Alligator Creek Bridge. Several of the responding agencies had patrol cars equipped with cameras, and video from those cameras was later submitted into evidence.

A review of evidence indicated seven shots were fired by two officers, with Snyder receiving a total of five gunshot wounds, which resulted in death.

A review of the video from Harrison's patrol car indicates the deputy saw Snyder with a long rifle and scope at the time he initially passed the suspect at the Alligator Creek Bridge. Harrison could see that the scope was pointed at him. During the first 25 minutes of the video, Harrison can be heard attempting to communicate with M.R.S. via a loudspeaker or P.A. system.

Reports state that during that

time, Harrison can be heard repeatedly giving verbal instruction to Snyder, including to put his weapon down, "come out with his hands up," that he "wasn't in any trouble" and that he "just wanted to talk with him."

Snyder didn't respond to any of those requests, despite being told to put down or drop his weapon on at least 20 separate occasions during the first 25 minutes of the video.

After 25 minutes, multiple officers can be heard yelling commands for the suspect to put his gun/weapon down and to show them his hands.

Snyder can later be seen walking into the camera view, toward the officers, holding what appears to be a long rifle with scope. The weapon was shouldered and leveled in the direction of officers, according to reports.

Again, officers can be heard shouting commands for Snyder to put the weapon down and to show his hands before shots are heard and Snyder is seen falling to the ground.

FDLE Special Agent Ronnie

Austin responded to the scene and noted Snyder's body was lying on the south shoulder of U.S. Highway 90, covered by a blue tarp.

Snyder was "fully clothed and handcuffed," according to the FDLE reports.

Austin's report stated he also observed what appeared to be a rifle on the ground to the west of the body, also covered with a tarp, and a rifle scope lying between the body and the suspected rifle.

FDLE special agents soon interviewed officers who responded to the scene, as well as civilian witnesses during the course of the six-month-long investigation.

Among those witnesses was Eddie Joe Byrd of Chipley, who stated he called WCSO to report Snyder "wasn't acting right," elaborating that Snyder was incoherent and he had a gun. Byrd also stated "it wasn't a real gun," but rather a pellet gun. Byrd alleged Snyder told him "if the law came to get him, they would have to kill him."

Washington County E-911 records show Byrd called dispatch-

ers twice, just six minutes apart at 6:04 p.m. and 6:10 p.m., stating he was calling to give WCSO "a heads up" because Snyder was sitting outside with a gun "waiting for them to come pick him up" and that he "wasn't going down without a fight." Byrd was told during each call that there was not a warrant for Snyder's arrest.

Snyder's sister, Angela Sills, was also interviewed by FDLE, telling investigators her brother had been her roommate since the previous month.

Sills said Snyder had recently been arrested in Slocomb, Ala., and felt that WCSO deputies would come get him. He also asked her to help him take care of some "last minute details," including making a will because he had been "mistreated by law enforcement," and "if they ever came after him again, they wouldn't take him alive."

In the final ruling, Assistant State Attorney Shalla Jefcoat stated evidence showed that Snyder was armed with a Winchester air rifle that appeared to be a real

firearm.

"Mr. Snyder leveled this weapon at officers while advancing towards their position," Jefcoat reported. "Mr. Snyder ignored repeated commands by law enforcement to drop the weapon. It appeared that Mr. Snyder was aiming the weapon at individual officers as they attempted to take cover behind their patrol vehicles" Florida law stipulates the danger facing law enforcement officers need not have been actual, but must have appeared so real that a reasonably cautious and prudent person under the same circumstances would have believed that the danger presented by the deceased could be avoided only through the use of force.

"The evidence clearly shows that the officers reasonably believed that Mr. Snyder was armed with an actual rifle, that he was committing an aggravated assault upon multiple officers, and the officers were in fear for their own safety as well as the safety of their fellow officers," Jefcoat said.

"Ryan was the type of man that grass never grew under his feet," Michelle Cook said. "In his short 27 years, he experienced more grief than any man should, including the loss of his mother, Shannon McDaniel Cook, five years ago and his grandfather Henry Cook last year."

"We are comforted by knowing his last few months were filled with a peaceful joy from restoring his family after reconciling with the mother of his children, Ashley. The contentment of having his precious children, Gracie and Matthew, and Ashley back in his life could have only brought that back to him," she added. "We are all at a loss for words at the outpouring of love and support from our family and friends in this difficult time."

Cook is survived by his father, Jimmy Cook (Michelle); brother David Myles Cook; stepbrother Benjamin Keown; and stepsisters Brittany Keown and Candy (Kevin) Day. His maternal grandparents were Jimmy and Cricket McDaniel, and paternal grandparents were Tom and Sherry Morris, and Vivan and the late Henry Cook.

An economic impact study also predicted the project's buying power to generate revenues of around \$49 million for businesses in Washington County and \$105 million for Bay County by the 11th year.

More impact was projected for the next phase as well.

"Over the 10-year build-out period, the money contributed to the economy for construction jobs, materials and new household expenses would have been a total of \$1.3 billion, with \$411 million for Washington County and \$908 million for Bay County," Town said.

If developers fail to push the permitting process through, the project's survival would depend on getting an extension approved for the project by the Board of County Commissioners, or if the order expires, beginning the development request from scratch — a process that took more than five years the first go-around, after several controversial and confrontational public hearings.

Local ham radio won't be the same without John Huckaby

John J. Huckaby passed away peacefully at home Monday, Sept. 8, after a long illness. And while many will simply remember him as a "nice guy" or a "true Southern gentleman,"

there's a sub-culture in Holmes, Washington, and Jackson counties that will remember Huckaby as the man who got so many started here locally in ham radio.

Amateur radio, commonly referred to as ham radio, is a hobby in which amateur radio operators (hams) transmit under "call signs" on radio frequencies reserved specifically for them by the Federal Communications Commission.

"WA4ZIM is ten-seven, ten-ninety-nine."

To the general public, those words translate to "Johnny Huckaby is out of service, leaving the air-mission completed."

Those words echoed over local ham radio airwaves Monday, Sept. 15, during the weekly ham radio "roll call."

The thick silence that followed spoke volumes as Huckaby's fellow ham radio enthusiasts said goodbye in their own way, recognizing that WA4ZIM is now a "silent key."

For more than four decades, Huckaby got others excited about ham radio because he knew it was more than a hobby: Operators play a key role in disaster communications. It was "hams" that helped keep emergency response agencies in touch with each other after some of our nation's most devastating hurricanes, including Andrew and Katrina.

Huckaby himself is said to have impressed members of the Florida National Guard in 1992 when he optimized the communication ability of military radios in the wake of Hurricane Andrew, allowing teams to achieve a greater range of communication.

My family was among those influenced by Huckaby's love for ham radio.

My dad, Burton Kent (KN4SV), quickly became friends with Huckaby, thanks to the shared interest. My brother, Jonathan Kent (KC4DMI) and I (KC4SUM) soon found ourselves operating under our own call signs at an early age.

My favorite memory is from

December 1990, in which Huckaby gave my brother, then a Chipley High School senior, and I, a CHS sophomore, the chance of a lifetime.

Always on the cutting edge of communications, Huckaby managed to collaborate with NASA in Project SAREX (Shuttle Amateur Radio Experiment) to test low-frequency communications with space shuttles.

We met in the radio room of Huckaby's Second Street home in Chipley in an attempt to reach the stars.

It worked.

In what can only be described as the "coolest seven minutes of my life," Astronaut Ron Parise of the Space Shuttle Columbia spoke directly to us, describing the difference between simulated and actual weightlessness.

After the success of SAREX, ham radio operators were put on the list of those standing by to help locate shuttles should communications become "lost" with NASA.

That milestone was captured on the front page of the Washington County News that week, something Huckaby mentioned just recently after I moved back home last February to assume my position as editor of the News and the Holmes County Times-Advertiser.

"How neat is that?" he asked me. "Who knew that you'd find yourself back here? You need to find that old article for me and send me a copy."

It's with much regret that I acknowledge I didn't take the time until now to find that article — and that I haven't spent any time with ham radio operations since that day nearly 24 years ago.

In honor of Johnny Huckaby, I'll be in attendance when the Chipola Amateur Radio Club meets at 7 p.m. the third Thursday of each month.

Honoring our elders

They are the links to our past, our story tellers, and in most cultures, there's a high regard to honoring our elders. Somewhere along the way, it seems like we forgot. As a society, we forgot to honor our elders. I say forgot because I believe that in most of the cases we, as a society, have literally forgotten how to take care of our elders.

I've wondered what the difference is between now and then and the United States compared to the rest of the world. I talked with my aunt, and how they do it in Mexico is the large families take turns taking care of the mother or father with some never leaving home. Our society isn't built like that; it's made for all family members to be contributors, and as my aunt put it, "it's built for at least a two-person income."

I felt bad because I couldn't take care of my father, who was struck down early in life with multiple sclerosis. I felt so helpless because there was nothing I could do. I was still in school, and my father needed special help. I was alone in my willingness to help, and yet he would not let me quit school and take care of him. Families are smaller now, and there's so much required to take care of someone. There's a level of guilt that comes from not being able to provide the level of care needed — more so when life happens and takes time away from visiting those

loved ones when we do.

There was a recent study showing that people are working more now than ever before, taking on two and three jobs to makes ends meet or working well beyond 40 hours. Some attribute these longer hours partly to the recession and partly to the advancement of technology that doesn't allow

us to stray too far from work at any given time.

What I'm wanting to discuss isn't the decline of society toward our elders but what we can possibly do to improve at least keeping them a part of society instead of most of them feeling as though they are institutionalized. I've seen that our local health care facilities are making amazing leaps in keeping the elderly involved with society. They take them out on day trips and keep them involved in volunteer work, crafts and activities. It's amazing how much it has changed. I don't know if it is because state standards or if they are finally getting funding they need, but it is becoming better.

I just wonder what we can do on a regular basis to help ease their loneliness, to help pass on their knowledge to the generation. Some of the most wonderful things I've ever learned are from elderly neighbors. Every place I lived, there was an older person who would teach me such neat things. In

Indiana, there was an older woman who got me interested in horror movies, which started my little interest in zombies. She introduced me to the original "Night of the Living Dead," Bela Lugosi and Vincent Price films. She also taught me so many crafts, how to sew, how to crochet, how to take things as they come and more importantly, how to look at things from another angle, to look outside the box.

One of my coworkers, Jessi Collins, has a toddler who was the first to sign up for the program that was established by the Washington Rehab and Nursing Center called "Adopt-a-Grandparent." My editor wrote a really good story on it if you are interested in reading it at www.chipleypaper.com/news/local/adopt-a-grandparent-brings-generations-together-1.320640. The idea is to "take time to share and learn from our community's elderly residents."

Or maybe it will come down to setting up a regular schedule to take time to see current relatives, even if it is at least a set day once a month. It doesn't take long for a routine to become a habit, and it makes the difference to that one person. If even every 20th person was to help one person, then there would be people to spare to keep in touch with our elderly. I'm going to try to do the same and try to write some stories based on those I meet.

Once again, thank you for sitting down with me, and I look forward to seeing you again next week.

Include pets when thinking about national preparedness month



With September being National Preparedness month, it is important to not only prepare the people in our family for when disaster strikes, but also our pets as well. When creating a proper evacuation plan, we must remember to include the needs of our pets along with our own.

An important step in preparing for disasters is to have an evacuation kit for your family and your pets ready at all times. Some things you might include in your pet's evacuation kit would be plenty of food and water, any medication that your pets are on, their medical records and a picture of your pet. There is also a preparedness plan available on the Texas A&M College of Veterinary Medicine & Biomedical Sciences website (<http://vetmed.tamu.edu/vet>) that may be used as a guide to help you plan exactly to bring.

"Depending on the disaster, families may be away from their homes from a few days to a few weeks," said Dr. Deb Zoran, professor in the Department of Small Animal Clinical Sciences and medical operations director for the Texas A&M Veterinary Emergency Team. "At a minimum, people should prepare to take at least three days worth of food from the pet's

current diet, water, and medications for their pets with them. Photos of the family with the pets and any veterinary records are important both for sheltering of the pet at an evacuation site as well as reunifying with pets when returning home."

Along with proper medication and plenty of food and water, it is also a good idea to include blankets and other comforting items to put your pet at ease in the case of an emergency situation. Also include litter boxes for cats with litter, cleaning supplies and paper towels, and collars with their tags, or some other form of identification.

Pets can't communicate the anxiety and fear they feel during a disaster, so it's important to watch your pets for signs of anxiety in order to help calm them. When evacuating with your pets, have a secure carrier, leash, or harness to keep them from running off in panic. "Small toys and appropriate sized carriers and crates may help to reduce the anxiety and stress that pets may feel during an evacuation," Zoran said. "Adding these few items to a 'go bag' or 'go box' that you have ready to take in the event of an evacuation makes sure nothing important is left behind."

The most important rule of thumb is never to leave your pets behind. They most likely will not be able to survive on their

own, and it will be difficult to find them when you return. To make evacuating with your pet easier, checklists and informational brochures also can be found at <http://www.ready.gov/caring-animals>, or ask your local veterinarian for suggestions. "The important thing to remember is if at all possible, take your pets with you if you have to evacuate," Zoran said. "If it's not possible, plan ahead and make arrangements to get them out of harm's way. Taking a little bit of time in advance to create an appropriate plan for your family and your pets can save lives."

Although it might seem unnecessary right now, you will be thankful your family and pets are well prepared for if disaster does strike.





Elizabeth (Pat) Green Peacock honored

Throughout the history of "Perry's Prattle", several contributing correspondents have been permitted to write the complete column to feature a person, or subject, in their words.

In this tribute honoring Mrs. Pat Peacock, formerly Mrs. Pat Green, the person responsible for almost the complete effort, has asked not to be identified. An attempt to honor the person's sincere request will be the Prattler's purpose as we spotlight a very special lady.

The idea for writing on this subject developed when one ardent reader, accompanied by a second person, made a visit to Grandview Assisted Living, located on Highway 280, in Washington County. Right now, I feel that a second article on that visit will be required in order to cover the subject adequately, while maintaining the anonymity of the person who initiated the idea. The unidentified informant told me in person, and then put it into a written note: "Judge, don't mention my name in any way. The newspaper article you write is YOURS, and people appreciate your weekly writings." I will warn this well meaning reader at the outset, and predict that before the subject is finished, the mystery of the contributor may be inadvertently disclosed.

Verbally, the secret person told the writer that the intention and the thrust of the article, or articles, are to be a tribute to Pat Green Peacock.

Personally, I recall that one or more of our four sons, had Mrs. Green as a teacher at Chipley High School and had a high respect for her teaching qualities. I know that she came to Chipley as the wife of Mr. Wick Green, who was employed with Gulf Power Company. I remember when her 100th birthday celebration was scheduled; she gave me a personal invitation to attend the reception. For some cause, I did not get to attend.

This lady being honored today wrote her own story for the Heritage of Washington Book, issued in 2006. It deserves to be reprinted verbatim today just as she wrote it.

"Elizabeth (Pat) Anthony Green Peacock was born Nov. 15, 1911 in Muskogee, Okla., to John and Wesley Anthony and Amy Dates Anthony. Her father was a lawyer and school principal and her mother was an English teacher. Elizabeth graduated from high school

in Portage, Wisconsin in 1928, attended Florida State College for Women (Now Florida State University) and she received her Bachelor of Arts Degree in 1933. She was employed as an instructor at Chipley High School where she taught for thirty-five years."

The story continues: "In 1937 she married William Wickliffe (Wick) Green. He was employed by Gulf Power Company and later managed the Falling Waters Country Club where he and other volunteers built the Clubhouse. He passed away in 1973."

"Elizabeth is a member of the Chipley First Methodist Church, and was a member of and taught the Philathea Sunday School Class for forty-five years. She is also a member of the United Methodist Women Administrative Council and has chaired various committees. She was a former member of Delta Kappa Gamma International, Chipley Woman's Club, Chipley Garden Club; Florida's Retired Educators and is a member of Friend of the Library. In 1977, she was selected as Washington County Teacher."

The honored teacher's narrative continues: "Elizabeth married Otis L. Peacock in 1980. Otis was born in Altha in 1909. He received his B. S. Degree from the University of Florida in 1931 and an M. A. Degree from George Peabody College in 1937. His professional and community service include being a Math Teacher in Cottdale, Supervising Principal at Chipley Public Schools and Leon County Public Schools in Tallahassee, Vice Principal for Administrative Affairs at the University of North Alabama, Member of Florida's Education Association and Who's Who in Florida. He also was in Delta Epsilon, Life Emeritus Phi Kappa Phi, Kiwanis Club, was president of Washington County Retired Teacher's, was a Ten Gallon Donor to Red Cross and was named Muscle Shoals Citizen of the year for 1972."

The story concludes: Otis Peacock's Religious Services at Chipley First Methodist Church where he was a member, include member of Administrative Council, Men's Bible Class President, Pastoral Relations Committee, Lay Leader, Usher and Mass Communications Chairman."

Your writer and Otis Peacock became friends when we learned that we had a

mutual acquaintance in Dr. Bill Foster, who was head of the English and History Department at the University of North Alabama, located in Florence, Bill, a traditional music enthusiast, was leader of a bluegrass band named The Foster Family String Band with members of the group being all part of his family. His wife, Anne, played guitar, his daughter, Melissa, played mandolin and son, Will, played the upright bass. Bill Foster played the banjo and all family members joined in the vocals. When the group performed in Chipley at the 1982 Railroad Centennial Celebration, Otis and Pat Peacock occupied front row seats and became the unofficial "cheering section" for the band. Bill Foster passed away two years ago and Otis Peacock has also died in recent years.

Our yet to be identified supplier of this information on the honored teacher further reports: "Mrs. Pat Peacock, at age 103, still lives in her home with good help for her safety and welfare. A kind-hearted tutor, who considered her students as sincere learners who merited the best of a teacher's help. She encouraged her students to become good citizens with peace of mind for their future.

Next week's column will continue with more gleaned from the Grandview Assisted Living visit from our mystery informant.



Chipola environmental science students learn at Caverns

Chipola College's first class of Environmental Science students recently hiked to the Florida Caverns State Park to learn about a rare and unique ecosystem, the upland limestone glade.

The expedition was hosted by Billy Bailey, park service specialist. Ann Johnson, community ecologist for FSU/Florida Natural Areas Inventory (FNAI) led the excursion, accompanied by Wilson Baker, an independent botanical consultant and butterfly expert. The three environmentalists helped students identify new species and evaluate the status of endemic species.

Students learned that a glade is a pristine section of a natural meadow about 2 feet above limestone and surrounded by red cedar trees. The glade is second only to the Florida coral reefs in rarity and uniqueness. An upland chalky glade is a rare natural community that occurs in two panhandle counties. They contain a specific and unique set of plants of-

ten not occurring elsewhere. Currently the Florida Caverns contains the only state protected chalky glade with about a fourth of an acre.

The Chipola student's field trip is part of the curriculum for a new Environmental Science class that will also include tree identification and invasive plant species removal. The Caverns will continue to be a vital part of the course curriculum through tree identification walks, botany lectures, invasive plant workshops, and wildlife exhibits, for education in the conservation, preservation, protection and appreciation of natural resources.

Other trips which are planned during the semester include: Sept. 11 - Billy Bailey - "Tree Identification Walks" Bluff Trail, Florida Caverns; Sept. 23 - Loran Anderson - "Botany 101" Chipola College; Oct. 14 - Billy Bailey, Jeffrey Johnson, Heath Beasley - Invasive Plant Workshop at Chipola; Nov. 4 - Billy Bailey, Diane Sue Bryant, Florida Caverns Volunteers - "Wildlife Conservation" at Chipola.



I hear, of course, of many couples who do nothing but bicker and fight from morning till night. I have always wondered what the purpose of all that was and what it ever accomplished. I think there is a better way to live together.

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


