PETA eyes Possum Festival

Florida Statutes: Possums not protected by law

WAUSAU — An investigation into claims by People for the Ethical Treatment of Animals (PETA) that Wausau's annual Fun Day and Possum Festival violates state law isn't readily forthcoming.

The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) is expected to respond to PETA's demands for an investigation into the 45-year-old event by saying the event doesn't violate any statutes.

PETA called Fun Day "an annual event in which terrified opossums are captured, auctioned, and shaken by their tails" and alleged the practice of shaking a possum by its tail can result in permanent injuries such as spinal dislocation, nerve damage, a prolapsed anus, and the rupture of the animals' largest vein.

"Many opossums returned to the wild after the event likely die because

Graceville man sentenced in 2013 burglary

CHIPLEY — A Graceville man has been sentenced for his involvement in an April 2013 burglary.

Justin Matthew Ducker, 26, of Graceville was sentenced to serve 18 years at the Florida Department of Corrections and to pay

\$3,463 in fines as a result of the burglary, which took place at a Barber Road residence.

The Washington County Sheriff's Office reports multiple firearms, four wheelers, and electronic devices were taken from the residence during that burglary.

2 prison officers arrested in 2 years

GREENHEAD — While state law enforcement proceeds with investigations into brutality on inmates at a Washington County state prison, a review of court documents shows two corrections officers at the facility have been arrested in the past two years on other charges.

Alicia Candice Michelle Bell, 23, was charged with accepting a payment to sneak in contraband, and Nicole Lian Grun, 26, was charged with introducing contraband into the Northwest Florida Reception Center. Both were arrested and fired in December.

Grun was arrested Dec. 20 after officers caught her with 186 grams of "K-2 Spice," a synthetic marijuana.

According to her arrest affidavit, Grun arrived for duty and passed a routine staff search before she and three other female officers were instructed to report to the Visiting Park for a more thorough search. Investigators found a sealed package of sandwiches in Grun's lunch bag.

She hesitated before admitting to having the concealed synthetic marijuana, officers reported. Investigators found the missing sandwiches in Grun's car.

Grun then told investigators they brought the contraband at the request of an inmate. She said she received Western Union money transfers for \$100 and another for \$200 from the inmate's relatives. Grun revised her story after investigators found \$400 in her car's glove box, according to investigators.

Bell's arrest stemmed from an allegation by an inmate that she planned to introduce tobacco, synthetic marijuana, MDMA, crack cocaine and cellphones into the prison. Western Union records revealed Bell received \$300 from an inmate's relative, which she provided her ID to acquire, according to investigators.

Bell said she conspired with multiple inmates to bring in the contraband but only accepted the \$300 for cigarettes she never delivered.

"I kind of screwed myself," Bell told authorities.

"I shouldn't have took the money. Me taking the money and not bringing something in got me into this mess."

Both officers were fired after their arrests. Bell was sentenced to five years' probation this month for accepting a bribe. Grun was sentenced to 15 years' probation in August for possessing a controlled substance, introducing contraband to a state correctional facility and accepting a bribe, according to court records.

Six officers were arrested last week and fired in connection with the beating of an inmate at the prison.

1 charged with grand theft of semi

The Jackson County Sheriffs Office responded to the Love's Truck Stop, 2510 Highway 231, to a reported suspicious incident at 12:41 p.m. Tuesday, Sept. 16. Upon arrival, deputies learned that a truck driver had been approached twice in the back parking lot by a man who said he need-

ed money for fuel for his semi. The man, Danny Lee Gregory, 50, of Sarasota, offered to sell the trucker a dining room suite and a television for \$50. The trucker said he pretended to go along with Gregory, advising him that he would get the money. While stalling for time, the trucker checked the Internet for contact information on the truck-

ing company. Once he made contact, the man learned that the truck, a six-wheel, 24-foot box truck Freightliner, had been reported stolen from Sarasota. Contact was made with the truck's owner, and Gregory was taken into custody. According to deputies, Gregory said he was not the driver of the vehicle, nor was he the per-

son who sold the items the truck had been carrying. However, a hitchhiker who was riding with Gregory confirmed that they had been together since the previous day and that Gregory was, in fact, the driver. Gregory, who was also identified by the trucker who initially called law enforcement, was found behind the wheel of the truck with the keys in his

possession. Based on the value of the truck, Gregory was charged with grand theft over \$50,000, a second-degree felony. He also was charged with dealing in stolen property, which is also a second-degree felony. Gregory was lodged in the Jackson County Correctional Facility to await first appearance.

Lobbying becomes issue in congressional campaign

PANAMA CITY — A blast from Gwen Graham's past is raising questions about the way she has presented herself in her bid to regain Florida's 2nd Congressional District seat for Democrats.

Rep. Steve Southerland, the Panama City Republican incumbent Graham is challenging, released an advertisement last week alleging Graham worked as a lobbyist in Washington, D.C., more than 20 years ago.

Graham, from Tallahassee, has tried to paint herself as a Washington outsider and has campaigned on a platform of putting solutions over partisanship while portraying Southerland as a D.C. insider who puts Tea Party ideals over meaningful legislation. But the ad, which relies on documents researchers found in former Gov. and Sen. Bob Graham's archive at the University of Florida, calls Graham's outsider persona into question, Southerland spokesman Matt McCullough said.

Not only has Graham worked on presidential campaigns for three Democrats — her father, Bob Graham, as well as Howard Dean and John Kerry, all in 2004 — but after she graduated from law school at American University in

Washington, D.C., in 1988, she worked as a lobbyist at a Washington law firm, according to Southerland's ad.

"These facts in black and white call into question the entire narrative she's based her campaign on: being a Washington outsider," McCullough said. "If voters can't trust Gwen Graham about her résumé, then how can they ever trust her to be honest in Congress?"

The documents behind the ad are legally required lobbying disclosures from 1989 when Gwen Graham was Gwen Logan, a first-year associate with the Washington, D.C., law firm Andrews and Kurth, which lobbied on behalf of the Secondary Lead Smelters Association. At least one disclosure had her name on it, and she is mentioned in a handwritten note about a bill that ended up in a committee of which then-Sen. Bob Graham was a member.

Gwen Graham has denied the allegations in the strongest terms, telling the Tampa Bay Times, "I

was never a lobbyist. Period." She also provided the Times with a letter from her supervisor at Andrews and Kurth in which he said Graham was not a lobbyist and the disclosure document should not be construed as evidence she was.

The Florida District 2 race is one of the most closely watched in the nation. Outside interests are spending big money for both candidates, and observers expect the outcome to be very close. Julia Woodward Gill, Graham's campaign manager, shrugged off the allegations as the desperate actions of a desperate incumbent.

"Congressman Southerland's campaign is flailing and resorting to lies because North Floridians are fed up with his Washington way that's out of touch with our values: shutting down the government, complaining that his taxpayer-funded salary isn't enough, and opposing the Violence Against Women Act," Gill said in a prepared statement.

Southerland's campaign has seized on Graham's Washington connections and created a political ad from a mock résumé for Graham with the stated objective: "To win a seat in Congress by deceiving the voters of Florida's 2nd Congressional District into believing I am a 'Washington outsider.'"

they can no longer use their tails to climb and engage in other behavior necessary for their survival or because they have succumbed to 'capture myopathy,' literally dying of fright," PETA wrote in a news release. "Florida's wildlife and anti-cruelty laws prohibit displaying wildlife in a manner that is cruel or otherwise poses a threat to them."

Meanwhile, there is nothing prohibiting the practices of the Wausau Fun Day in Florida Statutes, as possums are considered a "nuisance animal" and are therefore not protected by law.

FWC representative Katie Purcell acknowledged receiving the agency's complaint this week and said PETA's letter is "being reviewed."

Statute 68A-24.002 states nuisance animals — which includes possums — may be taken throughout the year by the use of guns, dogs, live traps or snares, and may be possessed or transported alive. The statute also states the

animals may be taken at night by the aid of a light and dogs, with .22 rimfire firearms other than .22 magnum, or with a single-shot .410 gauge shotgun using shot no larger than No. 6. Hunting under the provisions of the statute is only prohibited by display or use of a light from a moving vehicle, boat or animal.

Fun Day founder Dalton Carter stressed the event is intended reverse the possum.

"We didn't start (Fun Day) to abuse the possum; we did it to honor it," Carter said. "We are animal lovers, and even built (the animal) a palace. The possums that are bid on are released back in a specified area, so the bids are really donations we give to causes like the Shriners and for college scholarships."

Meanwhile, PETA stands by its claims, asserting "animals are not ours to use for entertainment or abuse in any other way."

Patronis appointed to Florida PSC

PANAMA CITY — State Rep. Jimmy Patronis has been appointed to the Florida Public Service Commission (PSC), Gov. Rick Scott's office announced Thursday.

The position pays \$131,036 annually.

The PSC is charged with regulating utilities, including electric rates to control profits for government-controlled monopolies — Gulf Power, Duke Energy, Tampa Electric Co. and Florida Power and Light, for example — and safety measures for those utilities, including those that are government owned. The PSC also has jurisdiction over rebates utility companies offer, many of which are meant to keep costs down.

"The role of the commission is basically that you're a judge," said Patronis, R-Panama City, who is term-limited from running for re-election.

Patronis, who has some experience with utility issues, said he will get ac-

quainted with the PSC's case docket. During his eight years in the Legislature, he served as the vice chairman of the State Affairs Committee, which reviews all utility bills. He also has served on the Florida Elections Commission, another quasijudicial board. He posited he probably has a unique experience to his PSC comrades in that he has been a large electric consumer with Capt. Anderson's restaurant.

"With the restaurant, I learned that everybody is a customer; everybody has something in mind. You have to be a proactive listener to find how to make them happy," Patronis said. "As a representative, I have spent a lot of time knocking on doors and learning what people want."

Patronis said he is the first person from the Panhandle appointed to the board in three years.

"Of course, I'm overwhelmed and incredibly humbled," Patronis said. "I couldn't be here without the support of my family, my colleagues and Gov. Scott."

2016 could bring a chance for revenge for Crist

TALLAHASSEE (AP) — If former Florida Gov. Charlie Crist wins his old job back as a Democrat, he could be in a position to seek political revenge against two Republicans whom he once counted as friends and now disdain him.

Crist used to call himself a "Jeb Bush Republican," and Bush campaigned to help Crist get elected governor in 2006. Sen. Marco Rubio was House speaker when Crist was governor, so the two relied on each other to pass legislative priorities.

Now, though, both men call Crist an opportunist whose political conversion was more about ambition than ideology. And Rubio ultimately helped chase Crist from the party when he forced Crist out of the 2010 GOP Senate primary. Crist lost that election running as an independent. Crist, who is in a tight race with Gov. Rick Scott, would likely relish the opportunity to try to derail a Bush or Rubio campaign.

"It would be fun. It would be a great show," said Dan Smith, a University of Florida political science professor.

Florida and its 29 electoral votes — more than 10 percent of the 270 needed to win the White House — are a coveted prize in presidential elections. It's the largest state that could go either way, as California and New York are solidly Democratic and Texas is solidly Republican. Of the last six presidential elections, Democrats and Republicans have each carried Florida three times, and in the last five, the candidate who won Florida became president.

Some observers downplay the impact any sitting governor can have in a presidential election, though they can play some role by raising money, helping with campaign infrastructure and public appearances.

For instance, Crist gave Sen. John Mc-

Cain a big boost in his 2008 presidential bid when he endorsed him days before the primary. McCain's Florida win helped him secure the nomination, though he ultimately lost to Barack Obama.

"It's a huge resource," said Brian Ballard, a lobbyist who served as McCain's Florida finance chairman. "It was certainly nice to have."

Scott played less of a role in helping Republican nominee Mitt Romney in 2012, largely because Scott was expecting a tough re-election fight and needed to save his fundraising requests for his current campaign, said Ballard, who worked for Romney that year. Crist is already paraphrasing Bush during some speeches from remarks Bush made about the GOP being perceived by some as anti-woman, anti-immigrant, anti-labor and anti-gay.

"Pretty soon there's not many people left," Crist said during one event.

And expect Crist to bring back his criticism of Rubio during the 2010 Senate race, when he called Rubio a "radical, right-wing extremist." But Crist may be better off on the sidelines if he suffers from low approval ratings, as Scott did.

"We've certainly seen that here in Florida with the Democrats painting the Republican nominee for president with the baggage of the sitting governor, most recently with Gov. Scott," Smith said.

Crist's opportunity may be limited because some Florida voters already are familiar with Bush and Rubio and have formed opinions about their records.

"Gov. Bush will not be viewed by Floridians through the lens of Charlie Crist, so this is a non-issue," said Karen Unger, who served as Bush's campaign manager during his 2002 re-election and was Rudy Giuliani's Florida adviser during his 2008 presidential run.

State reviewing prison deaths

GREENHEAD — The Florida Department of Corrections is investigating three deaths at a Washington County state prison and a fourth is being reviewed by the Florida Department of Law Enforcement.

The investigations come as part of a statewide probe of prison deaths requested by DOC Secretary Mike Crews.

The news comes a day after the DOC announced five prison guards at Northwest Florida Reception Center south of Chipley were arrested for allegedly stomping on a handcuffed and shackled inmate last month.

A sixth, a captain, also was charged with taking part in the attack and lying about it.

The guards allegedly knocked the prisoner, who had been gassed with chemical agents, to the ground face-first and jumped on him while he was handcuffed and his legs were restrained and then tried to cover it up, according to probable-cause affidavits accompanying arrest documents.

Wednesday's arrests came less than a month after Crews initiated a statewide house-cleaning prompted by news reports that officials had covered up deaths of at least two

inmates and amid accusations of widespread brutality within the prison system.

Sgts. William Finch, James Perkins, Robert Miller, Christopher Christmas and Dalton Riley were charged with felony battery on an inmate at the prison in southern Washington County. Capt. James Kirkland, accused of getting the sergeants to lie about what happened, was charged with official misconduct. Crews also fired the workers, according to a news release issued by his office late Thursday.

According to the affidavits about the Aug. 5 incident, the five prison workers were taking inmate Jeremiah Tatum, 31, to the cold-water shower after he had been gassed with chemical agents. It is unclear from the reports what prompted the gassing or who ordered the use of chemical agents.

Videos showed that Tatum — who was handcuffed with his hands behind his back and whose legs were restrained, "thus preventing the inmate from protecting himself" — was "slammed face first to the concrete floor" by Finch and Riley, according to the arrest documents. According to the affidavits, Christmas and Perkins jumped on the back of Tatum's legs while Miller pinned his head to the ground.

In sworn statements to inspectors, four of the guards said that Kirkland told them he "wanted Tatum taken to the ground" as the inmate was led to the decontamination shower shortly before 11 p.m.

"Captain Kirkland would make an audible noise and/or state that Inmate Tatum spit on him. The escorting officers were to then force Tatum to the ground," the complaint reads. All five later said Tatum never spit on anyone.

After the attack, Kirkland ordered Finch to write up accounts of the incident saying that Tatum had spit on him, according to the allegations. The other four officers said they did not write or sign the reports. The five underlings "aided in concealing and covering up Captain Kirkland's illegal order to commit a malicious battery," according to the arrest records.

But the latest firings don't go far enough, said Florida Justice Institute Executive Director Randall Berg, who represents prisoners in lawsuits against the corrections department.

"The culture hasn't changed," Berg said.

Department leaders have for too long ignored a multi-generational pattern of abuse, Berg said, and firing low-level workers won't fix that.

"Crews needs to make certain that everyone from the top down is going to be held accountable. It's not filtering down to the rank and file and it's being ignored," he said.

A week ago, Crews sent a memo to prison workers threatening to fire employees for wrongdoing. After a review, Crews said he found that his department has "not been applying a uniform standard" for abuse and that the inconsistency "has the potential of undermining the culture of professionalism that is necessary for running institutions with integrity."

Crews' reforms, announced Aug. 20, came on the heels of Miami Herald reports earlier this year that Darren Rainey, a mentally ill inmate at Dade Correctional Institution, died after guards allegedly forced him to shower in scalding hot water as punishment two years ago.

Crews fired the warden at the prison, cleaned house at other institutions where inmates have died under questionable circumstances, instituted new protocols for punishing wayward corrections workers and this week launched an inmate mortality website that includes limited information about more than 3,000 prisoner deaths since 2000.

Crews also has handed over

investigations into at least 85 unresolved prison deaths to the Florida Department of Law Enforcement, which was already delving into nine mysterious inmate deaths.

The FBI also is reportedly scrutinizing Suwannee Correctional Institution, where an inmate-led riot injured five prison guards in October.

The April 2 death of inmate Shawn Gooden at the facility is one of those being examined by FDLE.

Meanwhile, four Department of Corrections investigators are suing the agency, saying they've been punished for calling attention to a cover-up about an inmate's death. The whistleblowers claim they started an investigation into allegations of prison guard misconduct at Franklin Correctional Institution in 2013. That investigation revealed that an earlier probe into the 2010 death of an inmate "was false and misleading."

On Tuesday, the day before the Northwest Florida guards were arrested, Disability Rights Florida sued Crews and Wexford Health Systems, a private vendor that provides health care services to prisons in the southern part of the state, alleging that torture and abuse of prisoners, including Rainey, had been ignored for years.

Red tide off northwest Florida could hit economy

CLEARWATER (AP) — It's like Florida's version of The Blob. Slow moving globs of toxic algae in the northeast Gulf of Mexico are killing sea turtles, sharks and fish and threatening the waters and beaches that fuel the region's economy.

Known as "red tide," this particular strain called *Karenia brevis* is present almost every year off Florida, but large blooms can be particularly devastating. Right now, the algae is collecting in an area about 60 miles wide and 100 miles long, about 5-15 miles off St. Petersburg in the south and stretching north to Florida's Big Bend, where the peninsula ends and the Panhandle begins.

Fishermen who make a living off the state's northwest coast are reporting fish kills and reddish water.

"It boils up in the propeller wash like boiled red Georgia clay. It's spooky," Clearwater fisherman Brad Gorst said as he steered the charter fishing boat Gulfstream 2 in waters near Honeymoon Island, where dead fish recently washed ashore.

Red tide kills fish, manatees and other marine life by releasing a toxin that paralyzes their central nervous system. The algae also foul beaches and can be harmful to people who inhale the algae's toxins when winds blow onshore or by crashing waves, particularly those with asthma and other respiratory ailments.

In 2005, a strong red tide killed reefs, made beaches stinky and caused millions in economic damage. A weaker red tide in 2013 killed 276 manatees, state records show, after infecting the grasses eaten by the endangered creatures.

"This red tide ... will likely cause considerable damage to our local fisheries and our tourist economy over the next few months," said Heyward Mathews, an emeritus professor of oceanography at St. Petersburg College who has studied the issue for decades.

Despite years of study, there is nothing anyone has been able to do about

it. In the 1950s, wildlife officials tried killing the red tide algae by dumping copper sulfate on it, which made the problem worse in some ways. But some researchers are working to change that.

Predicting when red tides are going to be especially bad can help fishermen and beach businesses prepare.

Right now, much of the information comes from satellite images, which are often obscured by clouds.

"In this particular red tide, we got a good image on July 23 — then we went weeks without another image," University of South Florida ocean scientist Robert Weisberg said.

Weisberg is one among a team of researchers developing a prediction model based on ocean currents data, rather than satellite images.

The prediction model tracks the currents that bring natural nutrients like phytoplankton the red tide needs to gain a foothold. Unlike other red tide species, *Karenia brevis* is not believed to be caused by man-made pollution such as agricultural runoff, and historical accounts of what is believed to be the same red tide date back to the 1700s.

Using his method, Weisberg in March predicted the current late summer bloom that is now causing so much worry. It allowed state officials to issue a warning July 25.

While the project recently received "rapid response" money from the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration to send a data-collecting robotic glider into the bloom, future funding for this work is in doubt.

Weisberg said the team still is trying to develop a model that can look further into the future.

Fishermen say a better warning system could help save time and money.

"If we had more of a head's up, we could plan out where we would go fish," said Mike Colby, captain of the Double Hook fishing vessel in Clearwater.

STEM Scholars explore careers

Through the FloridaLearns STEM Scholars Project, talented and gifted high school students from small and rural districts across Florida participated in the 2014 STEM Immersion experience. This opportunity was made possible through a partnership with the University of Florida's Center for Precollegiate Education and Training.

In the PAEC-served area, 29 STEM Scholars and five teachers participated in a variety of experiences at the University of Florida and STEM Scholars were exposed to a variety of STEM career preparatory programs available at the university. For a realistic college experience, University officials assigned students to dorm rooms as well as their work groups for the week.

One of the STEM Scholars first experience included a STEM Health Science Professions forum. This took

place in the Health Science Center where STEM Scholars interacted with university faculty and students from the Colleges of Medicine, Dentistry, Veterinary Science, Occupational Therapy, Physical Therapy, Pharmacy and the Biology Department. The students then visited various Biomedical Research Laboratories housed in the center.

The Chemistry Department shared information about career options in their specific field and provided students hands-on activities working with nanotechnology. The students also visited the Computer Science Department where they "constructed" a Virtual Patient and practiced diagnosing that patient's illness.

The STEM Scholars' experiences included extracting DNA from plants, running a PCR and completing gel electrophoresis in the Interdisciplinary Center for Biotechnology Research. Data was used to construct morphological and

molecular phylogenies.

STEM Scholars also completed a scientific research activity at the Entomology and Nematology Department by collecting data from fruit flies (*Drosophila*) that were in a cold-induced coma. Students took advantage of this department's outside classroom as they waded through the Stormwater Ecological Enhancement Project Wetlands teaching laboratory and worked with university faculty and graduate students to explore the Florida Eco System.

Students finished their week of activities by exploring a cave at the Harvey Sharron Bat Cave Field Laboratory to get an authentic picture of the Floridian Aquifer and visiting Blue Springs to see on point where the water emerges from the aquifer.

The week was packed full of fun experiences and the students went home with new friends and an expanded outlook on their future careers.

Another tax-free 'holiday' arriving

TALLAHASSEE — State officials are promoting the potential for long-term savings on utility bills as they tout sales-tax breaks this weekend for shoppers who buy energy-saving and water-conserving appliances.

The discount period, which begins Friday, is the third sales tax "holiday" Florida lawmakers offered as part of an election-year package of tax cuts.

From Friday through Sunday, sales taxes won't be collected on the first \$1,500 of the purchase price of certain Environmental Protection Agency-designated Energy Star and WaterSense products, including new refrigerators, dishwashers, ceiling fans and even light bulbs.

"You don't have to spend a lot to save, but every little bit you save on your taxes this weekend will also save on your electric and water bill in the future," said Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services spokeswoman Erin Gillespie. "People that buy the appliances can save anywhere from \$1 to \$100, but more than that, you'll save on your electric bill every month that you have that appliance or product in your house."

The discount period isn't anticipated to drive as many shoppers to the stores as the more popular back-to-school tax "holiday," which was held in August, or even a tax-free period in June on certain hurricane supplies.

Many of the discount items this weekend are considered bigger-ticket items purchased more out of necessity than on a whim: refrigerators, clothes washers, dishwashers, swimming pool pumps, water heaters, weather-based irrigation controllers and high-efficiency toilets.

But not everything on

the exemption list is a costly purchase, as Energy Star and WaterSense-approved products include light bulbs, air purifiers, ceiling fans, shower heads and bathroom sink faucets.

State economists, sitting as the Revenue Estimating Conference, projected the overall savings for shoppers this weekend could dent the revenue of state and local governments between \$890,000 and \$2.67 million.

By comparison, the same economists projected the "holiday" period for back-to-school items reduced state revenue by \$32.3 million and local revenue to the tune of \$7.3 million.

Agriculture Commissioner Adam Putnam, who pitched the energy-savings tax discount almost a year ago as part of his 2014 legislative agenda, put the consumer savings at about \$900,000. But he also sees the products as helping the state long-term.

"The sales-tax holiday will not only put money back in the pocket of hard-working Floridians, it will also help conserve water and energy for our future generations," Putnam said in a statement.

The Tallahassee-based Florida Retail Federation is looking at closer to the \$2 million number, expecting the sales-tax discount to be popular for shoppers who have been looking to replace aging appliances.

"This is a great opportunity for Floridians to upgrade those appliances and make those purchases that they've been waiting to make," said Samantha Stratton, a federation spokeswoman. "Previously, the economic downturn sort of inhibited those purchases, and now that consumers are feeling more confident, they're ready to go out and make these purchases that will last them longer."

Census: Floridians better educated in 2013

ORLANDO (AP) — Floridians became a little better educated last year, were middle-of-the-pack in having access to the Internet and had the nation's highest concentration of retail workers.

The U.S. Census Bureau released new figures Thursday that capture the lives of Floridians last year and how they changed from 2012.

Overall, 2013 wasn't much different from 2012. Many factors such as the poverty rate, income inequality, the rate of residents without health insurance and the home vacancy rate remained unchanged.

Florida was at or near the top of states with the nation's highest concentrations of vacant homes, retail workers in the labor force and rates of residents without health insurance.

Here is what the one-year 2013 American Community Survey tells us about the residents of the Sunshine State. The survey only includes counties with populations greater than 65,000 residents.

POVERTY: Florida's poverty rate in 2013 remained unchanged from the previous year at 17 percent. It was the

nation's 15th highest. The counties with the highest were Alachua, whose rate was inflated by a concentration of nonworking university students, and Putnam. Clay and St. Johns counties had the lowest poverty rates.

LABOR FORCE: More than 1 in 5 Floridians worked in the education and health care industries, the largest concentration by industry-category in the state. The next highest was retail sales. Florida tied Arkansas with having the nation's highest rate of retail workers at about 1 out of 7.5 employees in the labor force.

By occupation, a third of the workforce was in management, business, sciences or arts jobs, placing Florida in the bottom 40 percent compared to other states. A fifth of Florida workers were in service jobs. Florida trailed only Nevada, Hawaii and New Mexico in having the nation's highest rate of service workers in its labor force. Citrus and Collier counties had the highest rates of service workers, while Seminole and Santa Rosa counties had the lowest.

HEALTH INSURANCE: The rate of Floridians without health insurance stayed

the same in 2013 from the previous year — 20 percent. Florida ranked behind only Texas and Nevada in having the highest rate of uninsured residents in the nation. The counties with the highest rates of the uninsured were Miami-Dade and Osceola counties; the ones with the lowest rates were Sumter and St. Johns counties.

INCOME INEQUALITY: Florida's income inequality remained unchanged from the previous year, and the Sunshine State kept its status as the sixth most unequal place in the nation, trailing only the District of Columbia, New York, Connecticut, Mississippi and Louisiana. Monroe and Collier counties had the greatest inequality, while Sumter and Nassau had the smallest.

HOUSING: Florida had one of the nation's highest vacancy rates, with 1 out of 5 homes unoccupied; only Maine and Vermont had higher rates. But rates for those three states were inflated by the large numbers of second-homes and vacation rentals. Because of that vacation inflation, Monroe and Bay counties had the highest vacancy rates in Florida. Hillsborough and Santa Rosa counties had the lowest vacancy rates.

Your Digital Self

Be a Pro Online

As school gets started again, you may find yourself using the computer, tablet or cellphone more. Experts say that in the United States, more than 70 percent of kids under 8 years old have used mobile devices such as smartphones or tablets. Is your online self as well-behaved as the offline you?

This week, with the help of experts at the Internet Keep Safe Coalition (iKeepSafe), The Mini Page reminds you how to be safe, courteous and responsible when using the Internet.

Six important skills

Do you know what **competency** is? It means an ability to do something well.

When kids or adults spend time online, we need to remember six competencies. iKeepSafe calls these the **pillars of digital citizenship and wellness**.

The six pillars are:

- Balance
- Ethics
- Privacy
- Reputation
- Relationships
- Online security

You can remember them by their acronym, **BEaPRO™**.



Balance

Computers and cellphones have made it possible for people to talk with each other, find information and play games at any time of the day or night. Sometimes we get so excited about these possibilities that we spend too much time looking at a screen.

Kids can become emotionally connected with online activity. For instance, if you post something on Instagram or Facebook and many people "like" your post, it may make you feel great! But if others make fun of your post or don't respond at all, you may be sad.

How you can be balanced

1. Use your electronics away from your bedroom.
2. Don't use electronics at the dinner table. Talk with your family instead.
3. Charge phones and other devices away from bedsides. Beeps or whistles can disturb sleep, which can be unhealthy.
4. Put electronics away one hour before bedtime.



Ethics

Do you know what "ethics" means? **Ethics** are rules that guide people's behavior. You use ethics to decide whether something you do or say will hurt someone else. You also use ethics every time you decide not to cheat on a test, or shoplift a candy bar from a store.

When you are online, it's important to remember that everything you post or any comment you make will live on forever. Your online self is a reflection of your "normal" self.

How you can be ethical

1. Think about your audience. Who will see what you post?
2. Even if you think you are posting anonymously, you may not be.
3. Work that other people have done cannot ethically be copied and presented as your work.
4. If you see that someone has been bullied or attacked online, you can reach out to that person with support. Be just as kind to others online as you would be in person.

Work together with your family members to build good online habits.

Research has proven that kids who have positive online experiences:

- feel better about themselves,
- have healthier relationships with others and
- are more successful as adults.

In most families, parents and children are working together to create healthy and safe habits for using electronics.

Cut out this chart and post it somewhere in your house where everyone can see it and be reminded of good practices.

- ✓ Our dinner table is a media-free zone: We talk with each other and share news from our day.
- ✓ When we are using electronic devices, we use only one at a time.
- ✓ We talk regularly about how to be ethical online. We have specific rules about what can and can't be shared online.
- ✓ Adults in our family help kids understand how to respect others and ourselves online.
- ✓ Parents or other adults help kids adjust privacy settings on devices and social media sites.
- ✓ Kids in our family know they can reach out to a parent or other adult if we feel threatened or bullied online.
- ✓ We know not to share private information about ourselves, our families or our friends online.
- ✓ With adults' help, we "Google" ourselves periodically to find out what information about us is online.
- ✓ Before we post something online, we remind ourselves that once it's posted, it never goes away.
- ✓ We use the rule, "Never post anything that you wouldn't say in person."
- ✓ When we see inappropriate posts, we "flag" the post for the website managers.
- ✓ We create strong passwords for websites and use different passwords for each website we visit.

Are You an Internet Pro?



Privacy

Did you know that your cellphone can help someone else see where you are? Many families are choosing to turn off the location services on their phones.

It's also important that you keep private information, such as your birthdate, address and phone number, off the Internet.

How to protect your privacy

1. Ask your parents before downloading an app to any device.
2. Don't share passwords or login names with anyone except your parents.
3. Don't download any software without permission from your parents.
4. Don't take photos of other people without their permission. Doing so can be a violation of their privacy.



Online Security

Adults and kids should always make sure their information is secure.

How to be secure

1. Back up your computer frequently so you won't lose work you've done.
2. Install protection against viruses and **malware** (damaging software).
3. Use a wireless network password.



Reputation

In just a few years, you may be applying to college or trying to get a job. Colleges and companies have started looking at Facebook and other social media to find out more about possible students or employees.

Kids and parents are learning how to protect their online **reputations**, or what other people think about them.

How to protect your reputation

1. Ask parents to review posts to Snapchat, YouTube or other social media before you post.
2. Don't "pile on" when others are commenting on someone's post. Use that opportunity to be kind, positive and supportive.

Stay positive online

Experts with iKeepSafe say that 80 percent of kids will experience or see cruelty in social media. Remember, just as kids on the playground can be mean sometimes, so can online "friends."

The important thing is to react in a positive way: Provide support for the target. Most social media have a way to "flag" people who are not following the rules; look for a box you can click that will alert the company about inappropriate behavior.



Relationships

Cellphones and social media keep us in touch with friends. But friends can have difficult times when they don't agree or someone is angry.

"When you can't see someone's face, it's harder to work out emotional issues," says an expert from iKeepSafe. Texts and emoticons may not express very well what people are really feeling.

How to protect relationships

1. Before you reply to a post or text from someone you know, ask yourself if that person would really say that. Hackers can post items that look as if they're from one person, but they're really not.
2. If someone does post something mean or hurtful to you, take some time to think about it before responding. Talk to an adult about how or whether you should respond at all.
3. If you're having a hard time with a friend, talk on the phone or in person, or Skype so that you can see each other.



I said "few disagreements," and I need to explain what I meant by that. The major disagreements my wife and I have had throughout the years can

be boiled down into one phrase: "It's a mess." Usually — actually all the time — this phrase is being used, it is coming from the lips of my wife.

Our disagreement is in the definition of "mess." She has one definition and I have another definition, and the twain shall never meet. Mark my words on that.

If you would come into our home, you will discover that every room in the house is well organized and very neat. Well, not every room. The one room that does not come up to that criterion is the room in which I occupy. It is my space. My well-organized wife will walk by my room, pause, look in and say, "It's a mess."

It took me a long time to realize what she was talking about. Eventually, I got to the point where I understood that what she was referring to was "my space." Unfortunately, we did not share the same vision of my space. I am of the mindset that if I am working I need to have organized messes all around me.

I have tried explaining to my wife I am a messologist. I had to explain to her a messologist is someone who specializes in organizing intentional messes. I am not sure I have convinced her yet of this.

I really think one person's mess is another person's workspace. I cannot really work efficiently unless there are intentional messes around me, protecting me, giving me the incentive I need to pursue the job at hand. My basic philosophy is simply this, if I cannot find what I need when I need it, I probably do not really need it. It has worked for me most marvelously.

The real trick of a messologist is they know where to find what you need when you need it. My wife can walk into my space, look

around and be utterly confused by what she calls "a mess." Of course, it looks like a mess to her. But it is not her mess. If it was her mess she would understand it and be comforted by it.

My wife is of the idea that organizing has to do with numerical or alphabetical order. Now that works for some people, I suppose. But, as I keep telling her, that is not the only circus in town. I cannot tell how many times something new has developed in my thinking while I was searching for something I could not really find. That is the genius of a messologist.

Some people, such as my wife, like to go from 1 to 2 to 3 to 4; or, A to B to C to D all the way to Z. To a normal person, and I am guessing my wife is normal, that makes a lot of sense. But to a messologist, that kind of thinking is rather confusing.

What I want to know is, what do you do when you come to the end of the alphabet? Where do you go from there? Then, it is rather important that you have the alphabet in alphabetical order. If I would ever try to do that, I

would end up being so confused, they would have to admit me in some rehab facility to clean my mind out.

So, the thing that makes our marriage so blissful is that we have an agreement: she does things her way, and I do things my way. This has been the recipe for blissfulness in our marriage. I do not make her do it my way, and she cannot make me do it her way. We both have brains, but they tick after a different tock.

I then thought of a verse of Scripture that rather fit my situation. "There is a way which seemeth right unto a man, but the end thereof are the ways of death." (Proverbs 14:12)

My way has to be in complete harmony with His way or my life will be completely destroyed.

Is Brad Keselowski officially the Chase favorite now?

GODSPEAK: "Bad Brad" sits atop the Keselowski-Gordon-Harvick triangle at the moment.

KEN'S CALL: Many had him there a week ago; most have him there now. It's not Aric Almirola, by the way.

What will you remember most about the "Marcos Ambrose Era"?

GODSPEAK: His anecdotes about panning for gold in North Carolina creeks.

KEN'S CALL: That he had the coolest NAS-CAR accent this side of Ward Burton.

The first race of the Chase was a microcosm of the regular season and likely a preview of the remaining playoff races.

Brad Keselowski, driving a Team Penske Ford, pulled away from Jeff Gordon, wheeling a Hendrick Motorsports Chevrolet, as the two top-seeded drivers finished first and second at Chicagoland Speedway.

While there is no rest for Chase competitors, Keselowski can go to the second race of the playoffs without worrying about advancing to the next round of competition. Race winners get a pass to the next round.

On the other hand, he doesn't want to lose momentum. He's won the past two Cup races.

"I want to enjoy the moment, but I still know there's nine weeks to go," said Keselowski, the 2012 Cup champ. "We have a bit of a hall pass for the next two ... I'm very appreciative."

"But those other seven, nobody cares that we won Chicago, nobody cares that we won Richmond or the other three races. It keeps resetting. You have to reset yourself. You have to keep developing the car and pushing as a team."

Gordon was happy with second place, knowing that top-five finishes will take him to the Championship Round at Homestead-Miami Speedway in November.

Gordon, a four-time Cup champ, didn't back away from his comment about being happy with nine consecutive second-place finishes going into Homestead.

"Eight more and I'll be really happy," he said with a laugh. "You want to get the win. While you can move to the next level with that hap-

pening, you almost kind of have to win after that.

"I think this is a great time for us to come out of here really solid and with a great second-place finish. We've got to get a little bit better. No doubt about it."

Even with their combined success at Chicago, both drivers are looking over their shoulders.

TOYOTA'S TROUBLES

If it seems like it's been a long time since you've seen Denny Hamlin or Kyle Busch in Victory Lane, you are right. Team Toyota has gone 17 races without a victory. The last Toyota win was by Hamlin on May 4 at Talladega. That was springtime, and the calendar now has a toe in autumn. Matt Kenseth, winless this season, said he was disappointed with 10th place Sunday and Toyota needs to "figure that out and how we can be better."

THE REAL DEAL

Jeff Gordon, 43, sees a little of his young self in 22-year-old Kyle Larson. They raced side by side for second-place honors Sunday. Gordon nabbed the position, and the two had a chat after the race. "I think this kid is the real deal," Gordon said. The "Wonder Boy" torch has been passed.
