Commissioners to address substation

CHIPLEY — The Washington County Board of County Commissioners is expected to hear from both Washington County's E-911 Department and Five Points Volunteer Fire Department Chief Myron Pierce when they meet in regular session at 9 a.m. tomorrow, Sept. 25., to clarify what E-911 Director Major Randy Brown assures is a simple miscommunication about the fire station at Poplar Head's legitimacy.

Chief Pierce told commissioners in their Monday workshop that he's concerned about a map within the E-911 system that doesn't recognize Poplar Head as a substation of the Five Points VFD. The chief expressed concern that if the substation isn't recognized, it could result in the station's closure - and high insurance premiums for area residents.

That map is outdated, however, and superseded by a newer map, which is also in E-911's dispatch system, explains Major Brown. "We've been dispatching calls

appropriately in that area," said Brown. "We don't have Poplar Head listed separately because it's a substation of Five Points."

Ultimately, commissioners and whoever is hired as Fire Department Coordinator as planned in recent board action, will be responsible for map changes.

Former analyst's involvement prompts new trial

CHIPLEY — In fallout from the arrest earlier this year of a former Florida Department of Law Enforcement chemist, an appeals court Friday ordered a new trial for a man convicted of trafficking in hydrocodone.

A three-judge panel of the 1st District Court of Appeal reversed the conviction and sentence of Gary Kenyon in a Washington County case.

The two-page ruling said a witness in the case was an FDLE analyst who testified about the nature and quantity of the drugs involved. After Kenyon was convicted, he filed an appeal based on "newly discovered evidence" that the FDLE analyst had been arrested and faced multiple charges, including grand theft of a controlled substance, trafficking in illegal substances and tampering or fabricating physical evidence, according to Friday's ruling.

The appeals court did not identify the analyst, but FDLE spokeswoman Gretl Plessinger confirmed that Kenyon's case was processed by Joseph Graves, whose arrest earlier this year touched off a wide-ranging review of cases he had handled.

JCSO arrests 1 after pursuit from Alabama

Jackson County deputies responded to a call for assistance from Houston County, Ala., at 2:20 a.m. Saturday, Sept. 20, in reference to a fleeing vehicle.
 The initial report stated the pursuit was entering Jackson County on Alabama 109, which becomes State Road 77 in Florida. The actual entry was at the Alabama State line on Highway 231, north of Campbellton.
 Deputies responded to the area to assist in stopping the suspected vehicle, which was being pursued on traffic charges in Alabama, as well as fleeing and eluding. The chase had reported speeds in excess of 90 miles per hour.
 As the pursuit continued south on

231, it turned east on Highway 2 in Campbellton, continuing with multiple Houston County units and a Level Plains, Ala., police unit following.
 Upon approaching Old U.S. Road, a Jackson County deputy was able to join the pursuit, which then turned south on Old U.S. Road. The Jackson County deputy was able to overtake the fleeing vehicle and get it stopped, thereby ending the pursuit without further incident. The driver was taken into custody and lodged in the Jackson County Correctional Facility on local charges and a hold for Alabama authorities.
 Arrested was Dustin Kyle Winings, a 34-year-old male from Marianna, on charges of failure to yield to an emergency vehicle and felony fleeing and eluding.



Services held for man who died in suspected electrocution

PANAMA CITY BEACH — The family of a 27-year-old man who was found dead in a swimming pool earlier this week laid him to rest Friday.
 Ryan Cook, who worked for Cox Pools, and a co-worker were doing repairs at a home on North Lagoon Drive on Monday morning. While repairing the pool's lights, his co-worker discovered Cook at the bottom of the pool, according to law enforcement reports. The co-worker, who has not been named, pulled the unresponsive man from the water and told the homeowner to call 911.
 Bay County sheriff's deputies tried to revive Cook until Bay County Fire and EMS arrived to taken him to a hospital, where he was pronounced dead.
 Cox Pools released a statement on Cook's death

Thursday.
 "We at Cox Pools are grieved by the loss of Ryan Cook. Our hearts and prayers go out to Ryan's family and our family here at Cox Pools," owner Richard Cox said.
 Authorities suspect Cook was electrocuted because of exposed wires found in the pool, although the cause of death still is unclear.
 "The cause of death has not been determined at this time," Andrew Winkler, forensic investigator with the 14th Circuit Medical Examiner's Office, said Thursday. "It's still pending further investigation."
 The Sheriff's Office still is conducting an investigation but did rule out foul play Monday.
 "At this time no determination has been made as to the cause of Ryan's passing, but we are working closely with OSHA, law enforcement and all involved to determine a conclusion," Cox

said.
 Cook was the stepson of Vernon Mayor Michelle Cook. He leaves behind two young children, Gracie and Matthew Cook.
 "We will be forthcoming with any new information," Cox said. "Again, our thoughts and prayers go out

to the Cook family as they need all the support they can get, not only from us but from the entire community as a whole."
 Cook's funeral was at Abigail Freewill Baptist Church in Vernon, followed by interment at New Hope Cemetery.

Touchdowns can't erase bad behavior

Once again, Florida State's Heisman Trophy-winning and national champion quarterback, Jameis Winston, has gotten himself in trouble. This time he shouted a vulgar phrase (taken from an Internet meme) about a woman's body while his fellow students tried to go about their normal day. The phrase comes from a hoax video with millions of hits on YouTube and, apparently, a growing group of fans on college campuses who enjoy yelling the phrase to break up the monotony of college life.

This generation's parents thought Beavis and Butthead and South Park were funny so we will refrain from overreacting over a vulgar phrase that was shouted at no one in particular. However, we hope the college students of America move on to something a little less crude with the next meme.

Shouting something obscene on FSU's campus would probably result in a stern warning from the coach to any other player. But Winston is not any other player. He's supposed to be the leader of FSU's team both on and off the field. And while he is brilliant on the field, Winston has failed his team and his fans again and again when he wasn't playing football.

In December 2012 Winston was accused of sexual assault by a fellow FSU student. No matter how you perceive the details of that case (no charges were filed), the accusation — and circumstances that led to the accusation — will hang over

Winston for the rest of his days at FSU and likely for the rest of his life.

Earlier this year Winston got in hot water when he was charged with stealing crab legs from a Publix in Leon County. Those are the two most famous instances but there have been several other moments of questionable behavior that were allegedly tied to Winston, including shooting out windows with a BB gun and getting thrown out of a Burger King when he asked for a water cup and used it for soda.

One could almost believe that a young, famous, incredibly talented football player believes he can do anything he wants and get away with it. We can't imagine where he got that idea.

More troubling is that Winston has promised over and over again that he will stay out of trouble.

But, because he could not stay out of trouble, Winston will be staying out of the first half of a high-stakes game against Clemson. We don't believe this is an overreaction for someone who has repeatedly promised to shape up, but hasn't. For any athlete, and certainly one of Winston's caliber, there is very little that hits closer to home than playing time and the ability to do what they love most. If his attention is to be gained, one would hope this would do it.

As we write this we have no idea how the suspension affected Saturday's contest against Clemson.

Whatever the outcome we hope the suspension, finally, convinces Winston that it is time to grow up.

In preparing for this year's 70th anniversary, I have heard from even more people than usual about the importance of the rodeo to not only their families but the community. I learned how the rodeo brought jobs and unity to everyone. It brought a quality of life that became the heartbeat of this small town, a heartbeat that could be heard throughout the nation. It is that heartbeat that brought life to this city and it is the people who make live, thrive and grow.

There are steps in place to make the rodeo even bigger, better and more

of a branding for Bonifay. However, making it better isn't exactly accurate, it is more like a restoration to the way it was when it was big. There will be a new sound system, a Jumbotron video screen to watch instant replays and popular acts are returning and that's just the new features not including the special things they're doing just for the 70th anniversary. For the anniversary there's going to be special T-shirts, souvenir cups, belt buckles and so much more. The rodeo even has a new mascot and a contest for the local children to name him.

It feels so refreshing to see some of that old spirit come back into this city and the people. Even just a glimpse of that old excitement is so very refreshing. It seems we have far too much apathy saturating the culture around us. The darkest days come when the light of hope no longer shines. Even if it is just a glimmer for a few days out of the year it is enough to change the atmosphere.

I think what I really enjoy is the idea that something that me and my family have enjoyed for so many years is growing. I really love sharing what I love with others, it is almost addictive. Something about seeing someone else enjoy what you've enjoyed for so long has a sort of gratification with it.

I would love to see the city explode with images of rodeo from street to street. I would love to see the windows painted again, signs and displays up again and everywhere you go is reminders that rodeo is coming. I remember seeing people stop to take pictures with going through downtown Bonifay. It really was something to look at.

I know a lot of it has to do with the economy and not being able to afford to decorate or take the time to decorate. It is almost

I'm excited to see what they come up with this year and being a sucker for souvenirs, I'll probably be taking home quite a few since they will be offered everywhere. Thank you for sitting with me and if I don't see you next week, maybe I'll see you at the rodeo.

Unknown angel was watching over me

I usually write about events and people in Holmes and Washington counties, but I chose this week to share a story about a man from Georgia who was living testimony that we often are blessed by acts of kindness without even knowing it.

There are certain people who find a way into our hearts and never find their way out. Losing those close to us is a pain that knows no equal. I felt an unusual loss while serving as editor of The Alma Times in Alma, Ga., however, with the passing of a man I barely knew.

Joe Jordan was known for being a long-time fixture at local business Davis Floor Covering, both as an employee and a relative of the Davis family. Gene Davis is a long-time Chipley fan and was a close friend of the late Representative Sam Mitchell.

Since the store was just across the street from The Alma Times, Davis and I would frequently chew the fat in that idle way for which we Southerners are known. Joe would frequently toss in a comment, either to wholeheartedly agree, or good-naturedly disagree, from his iconic armchair situated near the front counter.

No matter what his opinion about local politics or other issues, Joe never forgot to give a friendly smile or word of encouragement.

I once wrote a column about today's music not holding a candle to that of my parents' day and mentioned that my favorite song is "I'm So Lonesome I Could Cry" by Hank Williams Sr. The



day after that issue hit the newsstand, Joe called the office and asked me to step over to the flooring shop. Once there, he presented a CD he recorded that included a cover of that beloved tune.

"This is for you," he said. Although touched by his thoughtfulness, I didn't realize at the time exactly how much thought Joe gave others.

When Davis called to give me the sad news of Joe's passing, he revealed something I had no

way of knowing before. "Let me tell you something," Davis said. "Joe sure did worry about you girls. He didn't like you working late or coming in too early because he said 'there's just so much meanness in the world.'"

Davis also went on to solve something that had been a bit of a mystery. I had noticed over the years that Joe kept odd hours at the store, often leaving after I did, which can sometimes be rather late, depending on what is breaking around the county news-wise.

"He would always stay until you left, Carol Lee," Davis said. "He wanted to be sure your truck would crank and that you weren't out there alone."

Davis' words filled my eyes with

tears and my heart with sadness and bittersweet regret that I hadn't known sooner about my quiet guardian angel, that I hadn't taken the time to get to know him better.

I set out to learn more about Joe than what was already known — that he loved music, the Braves and his community, and that he kept a small gold cross in his pocket at all times.

Gene's son, Tommy, spoke at Joe's funeral and shed some light on the man their family knew.

One of the things about Joe that struck people was that he had an encyclopedic knowledge of sports history, as well as country music history. It would have surprised no one who knew him to hear Joe rattle off the 1952 batting average of Mickey Mantle or some such obscure fact. Part of Joe lived in another era, and I can imagine him watching, in a hermit's dream, when Patsy Cline and DeMaggio stroll by, hand in hand, and in the background Ernest Tubb singing 'Waltz Across Texas With You.'

Joe was a peaceful man, but I think you could have made him fight if you spoke ill of Mickey Mantle, Elvis Presley, Gene Davis or the Georgia Tech Yellow Jackets.

Joe was a quiet man and shy to talk about his personal beliefs. Perhaps the items he kept in his pocket give hints of his faith. They included a small gold cross with the words 'grace' and 'faith' imprinted thereon. In his wallet was found a small card printed with a phrase "God has due season for me."

His faith certainly affected mine, even after he was gone, and if I have taken one lesson from that impact, it's to be mindful of unknown angels.

No. 1 ENMIENDA CONSTITUCIONAL ARTÍCULO X, SECCIÓN 28 (Iniciativa)

Título de la boleta: Conservación de aguas y tierras: dedicar fondos para adquirir y restaurar tierras objeto de conservación y recreación en el Estado de Florida

Resumen de la boleta: Provee fondos para el Fondo Fiduciario de Adquisición de Tierras con el fin de adquirir, restaurar, mejorar y administrar tierras objeto de conservación, entre ellas pantanos y bosques; el hábitat de peces y vida silvestre; tierras que protegen los recursos hídricos y las fuentes de agua potable, incluidos los Everglades, y la calidad del agua en ríos, lagos y arroyos; playas y costas; tierras de recreación al aire libre; establecimientos agrícolas y ganaderos en actividad, y emplazamientos históricos o geológicos. Para ello se dedicará el 33% de los ingresos netos obtenidos del impuesto especial existente sobre documentos durante 20 años.

Declaración sobre impacto financiero: Esta enmienda no incrementa ni reduce los ingresos estatales. El ingreso estatal limitado para los propósitos especificados en la enmienda se estima en \$648 millones para el año fiscal 2015-16 y aumenta a \$1.268 mil millones hacia el vigésimo año. Si eso traerá como consecuencia gastos estatales adicionales depende de futuras acciones legislativas y no puede determinarse. De la misma manera, tampoco puede determinarse el impacto sobre los ingresos de gobiernos locales, si los hubiera. No se prevén costos de gobiernos locales.

ARTÍCULO X VARIOS

SECCIÓN 28. Fondo Fiduciario de Adquisición de Tierras.—

a) Con vigencia el 1° de julio del año posterior a la aprobación de esta enmienda por parte de los votantes y durante un periodo de 20 años a partir de esa fecha de entrada en vigor, el Fondo Fiduciario de Adquisición de Tierras recibirá no menos del 33% de los ingresos netos derivados del impuesto especial existente sobre documentos, tal como se define en los estatutos vigentes al 1° de enero de 2012, enmendados de tanto en tanto, o de cualquier impuesto sucesor o de reemplazo, después de que el Departamento de Hacienda deduzca primero un cargo de servicio con el fin de pagar los costos de recopilación y aplicación del impuesto especial sobre documentos.

b) El dinero del Fondo Fiduciario de Adquisición de Tierras se empleará únicamente con los siguientes propósitos:

1) Como lo establece la ley, para financiar o refinanciar: la adquisición o mejora de tierras, áreas de agua y derechos inmobiliarios relacionados, entre ellos las servidumbres de conservación y los recursos para tierras objeto de conservación, como, por ejemplo, pantanos, bosques y hábitat de peces y vida silvestre; áreas de administración de vida silvestre; tierras que protegen los recursos hídricos y las fuentes de agua potable, entre ellos las tierras que protegen la calidad y cantidad del agua en ríos, lagos, arroyos, manantiales, y tierras que brindan recarga de agua subterránea y sistemas acuíferos; tierras en el Área agrícola de los Everglades y el Área de protección de los Everglades, como están definidas en el Artículo II, Sección 7(b); playas y costas; tierras de recreación al aire libre, incluidos senderos recreativos, parques y espacios abiertos urbanos; paisajes rurales; establecimientos agrícolas y ganaderos en actividad, emplazamientos históricos o geológicos; junto con la administración, restauración de sistemas naturales y mejoramiento del acceso público o disfrute recreativo de las tierras objeto de conservación.

2) Para el pago del servicio de la deuda sobre los bonos emitidos conforme al Artículo VII, Sección 11(e).

No. 2 ENMIENDA CONSTITUCIONAL ARTÍCULO X, SECCIÓN 29 (Iniciativa)

Título de la boleta: Uso de marihuana para algunas enfermedades

Resumen de la boleta: Permite el uso médico de la marihuana a las personas con enfermedades debilitantes, según lo determine un médico autorizado por el Estado de Florida. Permite a los cuidadores asistir a los pacientes en el uso médico de marihuana. El Departamento de Salud deberá inscribir y regular los centros que producen y distribuyen marihuana con fines médicos y deberán extender tarjetas de identificación a pacientes y cuidadores. Se aplica únicamente a las leyes del Estado de Florida. No autoriza infracciones de la ley federal ni ningún uso, posesión o producción de marihuana con fines que no sean médicos.

Declaración sobre impacto financiero: El aumento de costos generado por esta enmienda para el gobierno estatal y los gobiernos locales no puede determinarse. Habrá actividades adicionales de regulación y aplicación asociadas a la producción y venta de marihuana con fines médicos. Las tarifas compensarán al menos en parte los costos de regulación. Si bien el impuesto sobre la venta se aplica a las compras, los cambios fiscales no pueden determinarse de manera razonable, dado que, si no existe una acción legislativa o administrativa estatal, no está claro en qué medida la marihuana con fines médicos estará exenta de impuestos.

ARTÍCULO X VARIOS

SECCIÓN 29. Producción, posesión y uso de marihuana con fines médicos.—

(a) POLÍTICA PÚBLICA.

(1) El uso médico de marihuana por parte de un paciente calificado o un cuidador personal no está sujeto a responsabilidad ni a sanciones penales o civiles conforme a las leyes del Estado de Florida, excepto según se indica en esta sección.

(2) Un médico autorizado por el Estado de Florida no estará sujeto a responsabilidad penal o civil ni a sanciones, conforme a las leyes del Estado de Florida, por extender un certificado médico a una persona diagnosticada con una enfermedad debilitante de conformidad con esta sección.

(3) Las acciones y el comportamiento de un centro de tratamiento de marihuana con fines médicos inscrito ante el Departamento, o sus empleados, según se contempla en esta sección y en cumplimiento de las reglamentaciones del Departamento, no estarán sujetos a responsabilidad ni a sanciones penales o civiles conforme a las leyes del Estado de Florida, excepto según se indica en esta sección.

(b) DEFINICIONES. A los fines de esta sección, las siguientes palabras y términos tendrán los siguientes significados:

(1) «Enfermedad debilitante» significa cáncer, glaucoma, estado positivo del virus de inmunodeficiencia humana (VIH), síndrome de inmunodeficiencia adquirida (SIDA), hepatitis C, esclerosis lateral amiotrófica (ELA), enfermedad de Crohn, enfermedad de Parkinson, esclerosis múltiple u otras enfermedades para las cuales, a criterio del médico, los beneficios del uso médico de la marihuana probablemente serían superiores a los riesgos potenciales para la salud de un paciente.

(2) «Departamento» significa el Departamento de Salud o su

agencia sucesora.

(3) «Tarjeta de identificación» significa un documento emitido por el Departamento que identifica a una persona que tiene un certificado médico o a un cuidador personal de por lo menos veintiún (21) años de edad que ha aceptado asistir a un paciente calificado en el uso médico de marihuana.

(4) «Marihuana» tiene el significado otorgado al cannabis en la Sección 893.02(3) de los Estatutos de Florida (2013).

(5) «Centro de tratamiento de marihuana con fines médicos» significa una entidad que adquiere, cultiva, posee, procesa (incluido el desarrollo de productos relacionados tales como alimentos, tinturas, aerosoles, aceites o ungüentos), transfiere, transporta, vende, distribuye, despacha o administra marihuana, productos que contienen marihuana, suministros relacionados o material educativo a pacientes calificados o a sus cuidadores personales y que está inscrito ante el Departamento.

(6) «Uso médico» significa la adquisición, posesión, uso, entrega, transferencia o administración de marihuana o suministros relacionados por parte de un paciente calificado o un cuidador personal para ser usados por un paciente calificado para el tratamiento de una enfermedad debilitante.

(7) «Cuidador personal» significa una persona de por lo menos veintiún (21) años de edad que ha aceptado asistir a un paciente calificado en el uso médico de marihuana y tiene una tarjeta de identificación de cuidador emitida por el Departamento. Un cuidador personal no puede asistir a más de cinco (5) pacientes por vez. Un empleado de un proveedor de cuidados paliativos o de un centro médico o de un hogar de ancianos puede actuar como cuidador personal para más de cinco (5) pacientes calificados, según lo permite el Departamento. Está prohibido para los cuidadores personales consumir marihuana obtenida para el uso personal y médico del paciente calificado.

(8) «Médico» significa un médico autorizado por el Estado de Florida.

(9) «Certificado médico» significa un documento por escrito firmado por un médico, en el que se indica que, en la opinión profesional del médico, el paciente sufre de una enfermedad debilitante, que los beneficios potenciales del uso médico de la marihuana probablemente sean superiores a los riesgos para la salud del paciente, y se indica durante cuánto tiempo el médico recomienda el uso médico de marihuana para el paciente. Un certificado médico sólo puede extenderse después de que el médico haya realizado un examen físico del paciente y una evaluación completa del historial médico del paciente.

(10) «Paciente calificado» significa una persona a la que se le ha diagnosticado una enfermedad debilitante, que tiene un certificado médico y una tarjeta de identificación válida de paciente calificado. Si el Departamento no comienza a emitir tarjetas de identificación dentro de los nueve (9) meses posteriores a la fecha de entrada en vigor de esta sección, un certificado médico válido servirá como tarjeta de identificación de paciente para permitir que una persona se convierta en «paciente calificado» hasta tanto el Departamento comience a emitir tarjetas de identificación.

(c) LIMITACIONES.

(1) Nada de lo contenido en esta sección afectará a las leyes referidas al uso no médico, posesión, producción o venta de marihuana.

(2) Nada de lo contenido en esta sección autoriza el uso de marihuana con fines médicos a cualquier persona que no sea un paciente calificado.

(3) Nada de lo contenido en esta sección permite la operación de un vehículo de motor, embarcación o aeronave mientras se está bajo la influencia de la marihuana.

(4) Nada de lo contenido en esta sección requiere que se infrinjan las leyes federales o pretende otorgar inmunidad conforme a las leyes federales.

(5) Nada de lo contenido en esta sección requerirá adaptación alguna para el uso médico de marihuana en ningún lugar de educación o trabajo, ni para fumar marihuana con fines médicos en ningún sitio público.

(6) Nada de lo contenido en esta sección requerirá que ningún proveedor de seguros de salud u organismo o autoridad del gobierno reembolse a ninguna persona por los gastos relacionados con el uso médico de marihuana.

(d) OBLIGACIONES DEL DEPARTAMENTO. El Departamento deberá emitir reglamentaciones razonables y necesarias para la implementación y aplicación de esta sección. El propósito de las reglamentaciones es garantizar la disponibilidad y el uso seguro de marihuana con fines médicos por parte de los pacientes calificados. Es obligación del Departamento promulgar reglamentaciones de manera oportuna.

(1) Implementación de reglamentaciones. Con el objeto de otorgarle al Departamento tiempo suficiente después de la aprobación de esta sección, las siguientes reglamentaciones deberán promulgarse a más tardar seis (6) meses después de la fecha de entrada en vigor de esta sección:

a. Procedimientos para la emisión de tarjetas de identificación de paciente calificado a las personas portadoras de certificados médicos, y estándares para la renovación de dichas tarjetas de identificación.

b. Procedimientos para la emisión de tarjetas de identificación de cuidador personal a personas calificadas para asistir a un paciente calificado en el uso médico de marihuana, y estándares para la renovación de dichas tarjetas de identificación.

c. Procedimientos para la inscripción de Centros de Tratamiento de Marihuana Con Fines Médicos, que incluyan procedimientos para la emisión, renovación, suspensión y revocación de inscripciones, y estándares para garantizar la seguridad informática, el mantenimiento de registros, análisis, etiquetado, inspección y seguridad.

d. Una reglamentación que defina la cantidad de marihuana que podría considerarse un suministro adecuado y razonable para el uso médico de los pacientes calificados, sobre la base de las mejores pruebas disponibles. Esta presunción referida a la cantidad puede contrarrestarse con pruebas del uso médico apropiado por parte de un paciente calificado en particular.

(2) Emisión de tarjetas de identificación e inscripciones. El Departamento comenzará a emitir tarjetas de identificación de paciente calificado y cuidador personal, y también iniciará la inscripción de Centros de Tratamiento de Marihuana Con Fines Médicos a más tardar nueve (9) meses después de la fecha de entrada en vigor de esta sección.

(3) Si el Departamento no emite las reglamentaciones, o si el Departamento no comienza a emitir tarjetas de identificación y a inscribir a Centros de Tratamiento de Marihuana Con Fines Médicos dentro de los plazos establecidos en esta sección, cualquier ciudadano del Estado de Florida tendrá derecho a valerse de recursos judiciales para obligar al cumplimiento de las obligaciones constitucionales del Departamento.

(4) El Departamento deberá proteger la confidencialidad de todos los pacientes calificados. Todos los registros que contengan la identidad de los pacientes calificados deberán ser confidenciales y estar exentos de divulgación pública excepto con fines médicos o referidos al cumplimiento de la ley válidos.

(e) LEGISLACIÓN. Nada de lo contenido en esta sección limitará a la legislación para promulgar leyes coherentes con esta disposición.

(f) DIVISIBILIDAD. Las disposiciones contenidas en esta sección son divisibles, y si cualquier tribunal competente declara la invalidez de cualquier cláusula, oración, párrafo o sección de esta medida, o su aplicación, las demás disposiciones continuarán vigentes en la mayor medida posible.

No. 3 ENMIENDA CONSTITUCIONAL

ARTÍCULO V, SECCIONES 10, 11 (Asamblea Legislativa)

Título de la boleta: Nombramiento Eventual para Ciertos Cargos Judiciales Vacantes

Resumen de la boleta: Proponer una enmienda a la Constitución del Estado en la que se establezca que el Gobernador debe cubrir las vacantes eventuales en los cargos judiciales que estén sujetos a elecciones de retención cuando los jueces o magistrados se encuentren por cumplir la edad legal para jubilarse o en el supuesto de que no califiquen para la elección de retención; y permitir los nombramientos eventuales si un juez o magistrado no se retiene en su cargo en una elección de retención. En la actualidad, el Gobernador no puede cubrir una vacante prevista hasta que termine el mandato del juez o magistrado actual.

Texto completo:

ARTÍCULO V PODER JUDICIAL

SECCIÓN 10. Retención; elección y mandatos.—

(a) Cualquier juez o magistrado puede calificar para la retención, la cual se produce mediante el voto de los electores en la próxima elección general que sea anterior a la conclusión del mandato del juez o magistrado por las causas establecidas por ley. Cuando si un juez o magistrado no esté habilitado para ser retenido o no cumple con los requisitos para la retención, se producirá una vacante eventual al finalizar el periodo de calificación de retención a fin de nombrar un juez o magistrado sucesor, y se producirá una vacante en ese cargo judicial a la finalización del mandato cumplido por el juez o magistrado. Cuando un juez o magistrado califique como tal para la retención, en la boleta se deberá leer claramente lo siguiente: “¿Deberá el Magistrado (o Juez) ... (nombre del juez o magistrado)... de la... (nombre de la corte)... ser retenido en el cargo judicial?” Si la mayoría de los electores calificados que votan dentro de la jurisdicción territorial de la corte eligen retenerlo, entonces, el juez o magistrado continuará ejerciendo sus funciones durante un periodo de seis años. Este mandato del juez o magistrado que ha sido retenido comenzará el primer martes luego del primer lunes de enero siguiente a la elección general. Si la mayoría de los electores calificados que votan dentro de la jurisdicción territorial de la corte eligen no retenerlo, una vacante eventual se producirá inmediatamente luego de la elección general con la finalidad de nombrar a un juez o magistrado sucesor, y se producirá una vacante en ese cargo judicial a la finalización del mandato cumplido por el juez o magistrado.

(b)(1) Se deberá mantener el método de elección de jueces de circuito sin perjuicio de las disposiciones de la sub-sección (a), excepto que la mayoría de los votantes en la jurisdicción de dicho circuito aprueben la opción local de elegir a los jueces de circuito mediante el sistema de selección por mérito y elecciones de retención en lugar de mediante una elección. La elección de los jueces de circuito deberá realizarse mediante el voto de electores calificados dentro de la jurisdicción territorial de la corte.

(2) Se deberá mantener el método de elección de los jueces de la corte del condado, sin perjuicio de las disposiciones de la sub-sección (a), excepto que la mayoría de los votantes en la jurisdicción de dicho condado aprueben la opción local de elegir a los jueces del condado mediante el sistema de selección por mérito y elecciones de retención en lugar de mediante una elección. La elección de los jueces del Condado deberá realizarse mediante el voto de electores calificados dentro de la jurisdicción territorial de la corte.

(3)a. En la elección general del año 2000 se deberá votar en cada jurisdicción territorial de circuito y de condado para decidir si el modo de elegir a los jueces de circuito y a los jueces del condado será mediante el sistema de selección por mérito y elecciones de retención en lugar de mediante una elección. Si los electores votan por no ejercer esta opción local, esta opción no podrá someterse a votación de los electores en esa jurisdicción hasta que hayan transcurrido al menos dos años.

b. A partir del año 2000, cada circuito puede presentar la opción local de elección por mérito y elecciones de retención o de la elección de jueces de circuito, según corresponda, al presentar una solicitud ante el encargado de los registros estatales. Dicha solicitud deberá estar firmada por un número de electores igual a por lo menos el diez por ciento de los votos emitidos en la jurisdicción de ese circuito en la última elección presidencial efectuada.

c. A partir del año 2000, cada condado puede presentar la opción local de elección por mérito y elecciones de retención o la elección de los jueces del condado, según corresponda, al presentar una solicitud ante el supervisor de las elecciones. Dicha solicitud deberá estar firmada por un número de electores igual a por lo menos el diez por ciento de los votos emitidos en el condado en la última elección presidencial efectuada. Los mandatos de los jueces de circuito y los jueces de condado serán de seis años.

SECCIÓN 11. Vacantes.—

(a)(1) Siempre que se produzca una vacante en un cargo judicial sujeto a la elección de retención, el gobernador deberá cubrir la vacante mediante el nombramiento de una persona entre al menos tres y no más de seis personas nominadas por la comisión judicial de nombramientos correspondiente, por un periodo que finalizará el primer martes luego del primer lunes de enero del año siguiente a las próximas elecciones generales que se efectúen al menos un año después de la fecha del nombramiento.

(2) Siempre que se produzca una vacante eventual en un cargo judicial sujeto a la elección de retención, el gobernador deberá cubrir esa vacante eventual mediante el nombramiento de un juez o un magistrado de entre al menos tres personas y no más de seis personas nominadas por la comisión judicial de nombramientos correspondiente. El plazo del nombramiento comienza cuando finaliza el plazo del cargo que quedó vacante y concluye el primer martes luego del primer lunes de enero del año siguiente a la próxima elección general.

(b) El gobernador deberá cubrir cada vacante de una corte de circuito o de una corte de condado, en donde los jueces sean elegidos por mayoría de votos de los electores, al nombrar a una persona entre no menos de tres y no más de seis personas nominadas por la comisión judicial de nombramientos correspondiente, por un periodo que concluye el primer martes luego del primer lunes de enero del año que sigue a elección primaria y general que se efectúe por lo menos un año después de la fecha del nombramiento. Ballot Title: WATER AND LAND CONSERVATION
Dedicates funds to acquire and restore Florida conservation and recreation lands

Ballot Summary: Funds the Land Acquisition Trust Fund to acquire, restore, improve, and manage conservation lands including wetlands and forests; fish and wildlife habitat; lands protecting water resources and drinking water sources, including the Everglades, and the water quality of rivers, lakes, and streams; beaches and shores; outdoor recreational lands; working farms and ranches; and historic or geologic sites, by dedicating 33 percent of net revenues from the existing excise tax on documents for 20 years.

Financial Impact Statement: This amendment does not increase or decrease state revenues. The state revenue restricted to the purposes specified in the amendment is estimated to be \$648 million in Fiscal Year 2015-16 and grows to \$1.268 billion by the twentieth year. Whether this results in any additional state expenditures depends upon future legislative actions and cannot be determined. Similarly, the impact on local government revenues, if any, cannot be determined. No additional local government costs are expected.

MISCELLANEOUS
SECTION 28. Land Acquisition Trust Fund.—

a) Effective on July 1 of the year following passage of this amendment by the voters, and for a period of 20 years after that effective date, the Land Acquisition Trust Fund shall receive no less than 33 percent of net revenues derived from the existing excise tax on documents, as defined in the statutes in effect on January 1, 2012, as amended from time to time, or any successor or replacement tax, after the Department of Revenue first deducts a service charge to pay the costs of the collection and enforcement of the excise tax on documents.

b) Funds in the Land Acquisition Trust Fund shall be expended only for the following purposes:

1) As provided by law, to finance or refinance: the acquisition and improvement of land, water areas, and related property interests, including conservation easements, and resources for conservation lands including wetlands, forests, and fish and wildlife habitat; wildlife management areas; lands that protect water resources and drinking water sources, including lands protecting the water quality and quantity of rivers, lakes, streams, springsheds, and lands providing recharge for groundwater and aquifer systems; lands in the Everglades Agricultural Area and the Everglades Protection Area, as defined in Article II, Section 7(b); beaches and shores; outdoor recreation lands, including recreational trails, parks, and urban open space; rural landscapes; working farms and ranches; historic or geologic sites; together with management, restoration of natural systems, and the enhancement of public access or recreational enjoyment of conservation lands.

2) To pay the debt service on bonds issued pursuant to Article VII, Section 11(e).

c) The moneys deposited into the Land Acquisition Trust Fund, as defined by the statutes in effect on January 1, 2012, shall not be or become commingled with the General Revenue Fund of the state.

Ballot Title: USE OF MARIJUANA FOR CERTAIN MEDICAL CONDITIONS

Ballot Summary: Allows the medical use of marijuana for individuals with debilitating diseases as determined by a licensed Florida physician. Allows caregivers to assist patients' medical use of marijuana. The Department of Health shall register and regulate centers that produce and distribute marijuana for medical purposes and shall issue identification cards to patients and caregivers. Applies only to Florida law. Does not authorize violations of federal law or any non-medical use, possession or production of marijuana.

Financial Impact Statement: Increased costs from this amendment to state and local governments cannot be determined. There will be additional regulatory and enforcement activities associated with the production and sale of medical marijuana. Fees will offset at least a portion of the regulatory costs. While sales tax may apply to purchases, changes in revenue cannot reasonably be determined since the extent to which medical marijuana will be exempt from taxation is unclear without legislative or state administrative action.

MISCELLANEOUS
SECTION 29. Medical marijuana production, possession and use.—

(a) PUBLIC POLICY.

(1) The medical use of marijuana by a qualifying patient or personal caregiver is not subject to criminal or civil liability or sanctions under Florida law except as provided in this section.

(2) A physician licensed in Florida shall not be subject to criminal or civil liability or sanctions under Florida law for issuing a physician certification to a person diagnosed with a debilitating medical condition in a manner consistent with this section.

(3) Actions and conduct by a medical marijuana treatment center registered with the Department, or its employees, as permitted by this section and in compliance with Department regulations, shall not be subject to criminal or civil liability or sanctions under Florida law except as provided in this section.

(b) DEFINITIONS. For purposes of this section, the following words and terms shall have the following meanings:

(1) "Debilitating Medical Condition" means cancer, glaucoma, positive status for human immunodeficiency virus (HIV), acquired immune deficiency syndrome (AIDS), hepatitis C, amyotrophic lateral sclerosis (ALS), Crohn's disease, Parkinson's disease, multiple sclerosis or other conditions for which a physician believes that the medical use of marijuana would likely outweigh the

potential health risks for a patient.

(2) "Department" means the Department of Health or its successor agency.

(3) "Identification card" means a document issued by the Department that identifies a person who has a physician certification or a personal caregiver who is at least twenty-one (21) years old and has agreed to assist with a qualifying patient's medical use of marijuana.

(4) "Marijuana" has the meaning given cannabis in Section 893.02(3), Florida Statutes (2013).

(5) "Medical Marijuana Treatment Center" means an entity that acquires, cultivates, possesses, processes (including development of related products such as food, tinctures, aerosols, oils, or ointments), transfers, transports, sells, distributes, dispenses, or administers marijuana, products containing marijuana, related supplies, or educational materials to qualifying patients or their personal caregivers and is registered by the Department.

(6) "Medical use" means the acquisition, possession, use, delivery, transfer, or administration of marijuana or related supplies by a qualifying patient or personal caregiver for use by a qualifying patient for the treatment of a debilitating medical condition.

(7) "Personal caregiver" means a person who is at least twenty-one (21) years old who has agreed to assist with a qualifying patient's medical use of marijuana and has a caregiver identification card issued by the Department. A personal caregiver may assist no more than five (5) qualifying patients at one time. An employee of a hospice provider, nursing, or medical facility may serve as a personal caregiver to more than five (5) qualifying patients as permitted by the Department. Personal caregivers are prohibited from consuming marijuana obtained for the personal, medical use by the qualifying patient.

(8) "Physician" means a physician who is licensed in Florida.

(9) "Physician certification" means a written document signed by a physician, stating that in the physician's professional opinion, the patient suffers from a debilitating medical condition, that the potential benefits of the medical use of marijuana would likely outweigh the health risks for the patient, and for how long the physician recommends the medical use of marijuana for the patient. A physician certification may only be provided after the physician has conducted a physical examination of the patient and a full assessment of the patient's medical history.

(10) "Qualifying patient" means a person who has been diagnosed to have a debilitating medical condition, who has a physician certification and a valid qualifying patient identification card. If the Department does not begin issuing identification cards within nine (9) months after the effective date of this section, then a valid physician certification will serve as a patient identification card in order to allow a person to become a "qualifying patient" until the Department begins issuing identification cards.

(c) LIMITATIONS.

(1) Nothing in this section shall affect laws relating to non-medical use, possession, production or sale of marijuana.

(2) Nothing in this section authorizes the use of medical marijuana by anyone other than a qualifying patient.

(3) Nothing in this section allows the operation of a motor vehicle, boat, or aircraft while under the influence of marijuana.

(4) Nothing in this law section requires the violation of federal law or purports to give immunity under federal law.

(5) Nothing in this section shall require any accommodation of any on-site medical use of marijuana in any place of education or employment, or of smoking medical marijuana in any public place.

(6) Nothing in this section shall require any health insurance provider or any government agency or authority to reimburse any person for expenses related to the medical use of marijuana.

(d) DUTIES OF THE DEPARTMENT. The Department shall issue reasonable regulations necessary for the implementation and enforcement of this section. The purpose of the regulations is to ensure the availability and safe use of medical marijuana by qualifying patients. It is the duty of the Department to promulgate regulations in a timely fashion.

(1) Implementing Regulations. In order to allow the Department sufficient time after passage of this section, the following regulations shall be promulgated no later than six (6) months after the effective date of this section:

a. Procedures for the issuance of qualifying patient identification cards to people with physician certifications, and standards for the renewal of such identification cards.

b. Procedures for the issuance of personal caregiver identification cards to persons qualified to assist with a qualifying patient's medical use of marijuana, and standards for the renewal of such identification cards.

c. Procedures for the registration of Medical Marijuana Treatment Centers that include procedures for the issuance, renewal, suspension, and revocation of registration, and standards to ensure security, record keeping, testing, labeling, inspection, and safety.

d. A regulation that defines the amount of marijuana that could reasonably be presumed to be an adequate supply for qualifying patients' medical use, based on the best available evidence. This presumption as to quantity may be overcome with evidence of a particular qualifying patient's appropriate medical use.

(2) Issuance of identification cards and registrations. The Department shall begin issuing qualifying patient and personal caregiver identification cards, as well as begin registering Medical Marijuana Treatment Centers no later than nine months (9) after the effective date of this section.

(3) If the Department does not issue regulations, or if the Department does not begin issuing identification cards and registering Medical Marijuana Treatment Centers within the time limits set in this section, any Florida citizen shall have standing to seek judicial relief to compel compliance with the Department's constitutional duties.

(4) The Department shall protect the confidentiality of all qualifying patients. All records containing the identity of qualifying patients shall be confidential and kept from public disclosure other than for valid medical or law enforcement purposes.

(e) LEGISLATION. Nothing in this section shall limit the legislature from enacting laws consistent with this provision.

(f) SEVERABILITY. The provisions of this section are severable and if any clause, sentence, paragraph or section of this measure, or an application thereof, is adjudged invalid by any court of competent jurisdiction other provisions shall continue to be in effect to the fullest extent possible.

ARTICLE V, SECTIONS 10, 11**

(Legislature)

Ballot Title: PROSPECTIVE APPOINTMENT OF CERTAIN JUDICIAL VACANCIES

Ballot Summary: Proposing an amendment to the State Constitution requiring the Governor to prospectively fill vacancies in a judicial office to which election for retention applies resulting from the justice's or judge's reaching the mandatory retirement age or failure to qualify for a retention election; and allowing prospective appointments if a justice or judge is not retained at an election. Currently, the Governor may not fill an expected vacancy until the current justice's or judge's term expires.

ARTICLE V
JUDICIARY

SECTION 10. Retention; election and terms.—

(a) Any justice or judge may qualify for retention by a vote of the electors in the general election next preceding the expiration of the justice's or judge's term in the manner prescribed by law. When a justice or judge is ineligible for retention or fails to qualify for retention, a prospective vacancy is deemed to occur at the conclusion of the qualifying period for retention for the purpose of appointing a successor justice or judge, and a vacancy shall exist in that office upon the expiration of the term being served by the justice or judge. When a justice or judge so qualifies, the ballot shall read substantially as follows: "Shall Justice (or Judge) ...(name of justice or judge)... of the ...(name of the court)... be retained in office?" If a majority of the qualified electors voting within the territorial jurisdiction of the court vote to retain, the justice or judge shall be retained for a term of six years. The term of the justice or judge retained shall commence on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in January following the general election. If a majority of the qualified electors voting within the territorial jurisdiction of the court vote to not retain, a prospective vacancy is deemed to occur immediately following the general election for the purpose of appointing a successor justice or judge, and a vacancy shall exist in that office upon the expiration of the term being served by the justice or judge.

(b)(1) The election of circuit judges shall be preserved notwithstanding the provisions of subsection (a) unless a majority of those voting in the jurisdiction of that circuit approves a local option to select circuit judges by merit selection and retention rather than by election. The election of circuit judges shall be by a vote of the qualified electors within the territorial jurisdiction of the court.

(2) The election of county court judges shall be preserved notwithstanding the provisions of subsection (a) unless a majority of those voting in the jurisdiction of that county approves a local option to select county judges by merit selection and retention rather than by election. The election of county court judges shall be by a vote of the qualified electors within the territorial jurisdiction of the court.

(3)a. A vote to exercise a local option to select circuit court judges and county court judges by merit selection and retention rather than by election shall be held in each circuit and county at the general election in the year 2000. If a vote to exercise this local option fails in a vote of the electors, such option shall not again be put to a vote of the electors of that jurisdiction until the expiration of at least two years.

b. After the year 2000, a circuit may initiate the local option for merit selection and retention or the election of circuit judges, whichever is applicable, by filing with the custodian of state records a petition signed by the number of electors equal to at least ten percent of the votes cast in the circuit in the last preceding election in which presidential electors were chosen.

c. After the year 2000, a county may initiate the local option for merit selection and retention or the election of county court judges, whichever is applicable, by filing with the supervisor of elections a petition signed by the number of electors equal to at least ten percent of the votes cast in the county in the last preceding election in which presidential electors were chosen. The terms of circuit judges and judges of county courts shall be for six years.

SECTION 11. Vacancies.—

(a)() Whenever a vacancy occurs in a judicial office to which election for retention applies, the governor shall fill the vacancy by appointing for a term ending on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in January of the year following the next general election occurring at least one year after the date of appointment, one of not fewer than three persons nor more than six persons nominated by the appropriate judicial nominating commission.

(2) Whenever a prospective vacancy occurs in a judicial office for which election for retention applies, the governor shall fill the prospective vacancy by appointing a justice or judge from among at least three persons but not more than six persons nominated by the appropriate judicial nominating commission. The term of the appointment commences upon the expiration of the term of the office being vacated and ends on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in January of the year following the next general election.

(b) The governor shall fill each vacancy on a circuit court or on a county court, wherein the judges are elected by a majority vote of the electors, by appointing for a term ending on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in January of the year following the next primary and general election occurring at least one year after the date of appointment, one of not fewer than three persons nor more than six persons nominated by the appropriate judicial nominating commission. An election shall be held to fill that judicial office for the term of the office beginning at the end of the appointed term.

(c) The nominations shall be made within thirty days from the occurrence of a vacancy or prospective vacancy unless the period is extended by the governor for a time not to exceed thirty days. The governor shall make the appointment within sixty days after the nominations have been certified to the governor.

(d) There shall be a separate judicial nominating commission as provided by general law for the supreme court, each district court of appeal, and each judicial circuit for all trial courts within the circuit. Uniform rules of procedure shall be established by the judicial nominating commissions at each level of the court system. Such rules, or any part thereof, may be repealed by general law enacted by a majority vote of the membership of each house of the legislature, or by the supreme court, five justices concurring. Except for deliberations of the judicial nominating commissions, the proceedings of the commissions and their records shall be open to the public.

Cooks build on tradition

PANAMA CITY — Getting to know the people who work in the local restaurants is as fun as trying the food they prepare.

Last month, I was hesitant to try Back Porch BBQ at 1316 Beck Ave. in St. Andrews after seeing the building change from MJ's BBQ to the short-lived Acme Burgers. But Carol McAdam, whose mother has owned the building for 30 years, has a way of making you feel welcome.

We realized we both had been taking notes from barbecue competitors at the Great American Blues Festival & BBQ Challenge on Aug. 16 in Aaron Bessant Park, just for different reasons.

"I learned some tricks for Mardi Gras, ribs or chicken on a stick with the little kiddies. I was seeing what the guys doing the competition were bringing," said McAdam, who said she has a great Cajun smoked sausage she can serve on a stick, too. "It's a good piece of sausage."

By the time I walked out of Back Porch — on a full stomach, I had a new friend.

Making friends is one of McAdam's favorite parts of the business.

"My face hurt so much from smiling and laughing the other night," she admitted.

Beginning this week, the restaurant no longer is open for breakfast, just lunch on Tuesdays and lunch and dinner Wednesday through Saturday. Breakfast business was too slow to justify 18-hour days.

"We will just be concentrating on our meats and sides everyone loves," McAdam said Friday.

I caught up with Executive Chef Konrad Jochum for Lobster Fest last week, the first time I had seen him since Boatyard closed in December. But he was still joking around as usual. His recipe instructions for Lobster Pastalaya first were "Just let your creative juices flow." But I asked if he could please expand on that for Wednesday's Food section for those of us who are less creative in kitchen. (I then double-checked on the recipe with the kitchen crew.)

Jochum said the weekend breakfast at Schooners has been good, especially since people caught

on it was a "scaled-down version" from Boatyard's menu. But today he is down at Schooners, 5121 Gulf Drive, serving up his lobster specialties.

Jochum admitted he even bought 200 ponchos just in case this weekend's weather was anything like last year's.

Just the Cook regulars braved the elements Sept. 13 with owner Ernie Hall at the St. Andrews Marina for a special viewing of the Cooking Channel's "Trending Bites," which featured the restaurant, crew and Hall's cuisine that focuses on fresh flavors and a few down-home comforts.

His Dan-D-Donut Burger uses doughnuts from Dan-D-Donuts & Deli as the buns, but Dan-D's Mike Pond has some plans of his own for stacking flavors.

"We are working on a Dan-D style doughnut cut in half like a biscuit with cinnamon and sugar on it to let it caramelize, then top it with sausage, egg, cheese and bacon and dust it with confectioners' sugar," Pond said. "Everything is done by hand — touched by clean hands; the same way since the place opened in the 1960s; there's more demand than we can produce."

Chef Amanda Sorenson at Somethin's Cookin' is still making pasta, which was a staple at her family's Italian restaurant, but she has updated the technique — trading a rolling pin for a pasta machine.

"My family opened their first restaurant when I was 4 on Route 66 in Joplin (Mo.)," she said. "They let me cut Parmesan. I would stand on a chair and stir the pasta sauce."

Now a grandmother, she recalls rushing to get ready for bed after her bath to look out over the rails to the Italian restaurant.

"It was called the Cellar, was run out of our basement," she said. "We converted our house. Stairs went up to the house and we would sit in our Winnie the Pooh pajamas and look out."

Sorenson graduated from Gulf Coast's culinary program in 1994 and has worked in area restaurants from Uncle Ernie's to Treasure Ship to Breakers and Angelina's. She taught a new generation of young chefs in the early 2000s, when she ran Bay High's culinary program.

3 Franklin prison guards fired in death investigation

CARRABELLE — In what has become a frequent exercise, Department of Corrections Secretary Mike Crews on Friday fired 32 workers accused of breaking the law, including three prison guards involved in the gassing death of an inmate at a Franklin County prison four years ago.

All of the workers fired were on administrative leave pending a review launched earlier this summer. The housecleaning is part of the secretary's attempt to salvage the reputation of the beleaguered agency in the wake of reports of widespread abuse and corruption, whistleblower complaints and federal investigations of prisoner deaths.

Among the axed workers are Rollin Austin, Randall Johnson and Kevin Hampton, three former prison guards at Franklin Correctional Institution in Carrabelle, where inmate Randall Jordan-Aparo died after allegedly being gassed repeatedly by guards and then left to die.

Dismissal letters say they are being let go because they "participated in a force incident that resulted in the death of an inmate." None of the fired workers has been arrested or charged with any crimes.

Four Department of Corrections investigators say they have been retaliated against for exposing a cover-up about Jordan-Aparo's death in September 2010. The investigators claim Gov. Rick Scott's chief inspector general Melinda Miguel — who refused to grant them whistleblower protection — was aware of the cover-up for at least three years. The DOC investigators, who found that Jordan-Aparo was too ill to warrant being treated as a threat, are now the subjects of internal reviews.

According to a whistleblower lawsuit, Austin gave the order to gas Jordan-Aparo, who died five hours later after being gassed twice more and left to die. The 27-year-old, coated in yellow residue from the noxious chemicals, was found dead in solitary confinement with a Bible beside his head. He was serving an 18-month sentence for fraud and drug charges.

Also fired Friday were nine Charlotte Correctional Institution guards involved in the April 11 death of inmate Matthew Walker, who was allegedly beaten to death while handcuffed. Walker's death — and that of another inmate who died at the Punta Gorda facility a month later — are among more than 80 inmate deaths being probed by the Florida Department of Law Enforcement.

Fifteen prison guards at Union Correctional Institution, all under investigation for use-of-force incidents against prisoners over the past two years, were also pink-slipped Friday.

Crews' review also resulted in three employees being sent back to work, including the assistant warden at the Raiford prison, Nan Jeffcoat has been on leave with pay since the death of an inmate two years ago.

"I have made it clear that there is zero tolerance for corruption or abuse at the Department of Corrections, and we continue to root out any and all bad actors who do not live up to our expectations. Our standards are high and we will accept nothing less to ensure the safety of our staff and those in our custody, as well as Florida families," Crews said.

Libertarian an alternative in Florida governor's race

JACKSONVILLE BEACH (AP) — Beer containers aren't usually a topic in Florida gubernatorial races, but for Libertarian candidate Adrian Wyllie the state's ban on small brewers filling half-gallon jugs illustrates how regulations reward campaign contributors and stifle competitors.

Sipping a pint of Count Shakula chocolate oatmeal stout, Wyllie chatted with a Green Room Brewing customer about how the Republican-led Legislature blocked the legalization of half-gallon growlers — or refillable beer jugs — when quart and gallon growlers can be filled and sold in limitless amounts at Florida breweries. Behind the defeat was one of the state's Budweiser distributors, who is a longtime supporter of Senate President Don Gaetz and could lose business if craft brewers gain customers.

"Tallahassee shouldn't be setting up road blocks for small businesses, they should be clearing them out of the way," said Wyllie, who visited the Jack-

sonville Beach pub during a month-long tour of Florida craft breweries to promote his campaign.

Wyllie, 44, of Palm Harbor, is a longshot, but he is gaining support as voters are turned off by their choices in what's become one of the most negative campaigns waged in Florida. Republican Gov. Rick Scott still struggles with his approval rating and polls show many voters also don't trust Republican-turned-Democrat former Gov. Charlie Crist.

Recent polls show Wyllie getting about 5 percent of the vote, which would be a Florida record for a statewide Libertarian candidate. Wyllie is the first Libertarian to run for

governor in Florida, but the party's presidential and Senate candidates have never topped a half-percent. Wyllie has raised about \$80,000, a fraction of the \$24 million Crist has raised and the \$45 million Scott has received.

"Voters are so frustrated by both parties that I wouldn't be surprised if the third-party candidate did better than they usually do," said Matthew Corrigan, a University of North Florida political science professor. "If Wyllie gets 5 to 10 percent, that could have a major impact on our governor's race depending on which way voters go."

As a Libertarian, Wyllie believes government

should stay out of most personal and business affairs as long as no one is harmed. He wants to cut state spending, taxes and regulations but he also supports gay marriage, the legalization of marijuana and abortion rights. It's a philosophy that appeals to some Democrats and some Republicans.

Wyllie, who owns a small information technology consulting firm, believes the Legislature's treatment of craft brewers shows what's wrong with government. Instead of helping a rapidly growing industry, Republicans agreed to lift the ban on half-gallon growlers but only if the small brewers agreed to additional regu-

lations that would have restricted their growth. The bill died.

"Some of these brewers would actually have to sell their beer to a distributor and buy it back at an increased cost before they could sell it in their own establishment. That's ridiculous," Wyllie said.

Further on down the bar at Green Room, Wyllie approached Joseph Adazzio, a 42-year-old Republican from Volusia County who was visiting Jacksonville for the day.

"What issues are important to you? Pick my brain," Wyllie said. As the two talked, Wyllie turned to a campaign aide and exclaimed, "Sounds like a Libertarian!"

Afterward, Adazzio said he knew nothing about Wyllie before the encounter, but said he would consider voting for him.

"He seemed to listen. He seemed to agree," said Adazzio, who hadn't been won over by Crist or Scott. "Some people say voting for a third option is a wasted vote; I don't think it is."

Florida court holds testy hearing on secret evidence

TALLAHASSEE (AP) — A bitter dispute pitting Republican political consultants against groups who challenged Florida's congressional map spilled out in front of the state's highest court on Friday.

The Supreme Court has been asked to decide whether or not secret evidence should have been used during a landmark redistricting trial. The evidence, which included 31 pages of emails and documents, was reviewed by the judge but has not been made public.

The documents belong to employees of a Gainesville-based GOP political consulting firm who were not directly named in the lawsuit that challenged Florida's 27 congressional districts. But the groups

that sued, which included the League of Women Voters of Florida, contend the documents proved that the consultants worked in concert with Republican legislators to violate the state's Fair Districts amendments.

Those amendments say legislators cannot draw up districts to favor incumbents or a political party. A circuit judge in July ruled that two congressional districts were improperly drawn to aid Republicans so legislators changed them during an August special session. Judge Terry Lewis cited the secret evidence as crucial in helping him reach his verdict.

Justices, who have no timetable to rule on the evidence dispute, held an hour-long hearing during

which attorney Kent Safriet argued that his clients have First Amendment rights that allow them to keep their political activities private.

He said the evidence never should have been used by Lewis and should remain under seal. The hearing even turned testy at the end where Safriet began arguing that redistricting amendments were possibly unconstitutional if they eclipsed his client's free speech rights.

Pat Bainter, president and owner of Data Targeting, went even further in a statement, calling the ongoing tussle over the evidence "the culmination of a legal assault and press sensationalism as to whether or not I, a private citizen, have the right to petition

my government without fear of a political inquisition into my private matters." Bainter said that the "very institutional integrity of the Florida Supreme Court is at stake in this matter."

Justice Barbara Pariente, however, was skeptical with those arguments.

She pointed out that his clients did not assert a First Amendment privilege on the documents until after a judge had held his client in contempt for failing to turn them over as initially requested. She said she was concerned that Bainter and his employees had engaged in an "obfuscation of legitimate discovery requests."

Justice Ricky Polston pointed out that the requested documents were included in the original

subpoena to Bainter and his company and suggested that he had waived his right to contest the request when he did not initially object to it.

John Mills, an attorney representing the coalition groups that sued the Legislature, said Bainter initially insisted to the groups that that he was following the redistricting process for "fun" while the documents show he was helping circumvent the restrictions put in place.

Mills also said there were "zero reasons" for any of the documents to remain private. Media organizations, including The Associated Press, also have asked in a friend of the court brief for the documents to be released.

The hearing did show the intense partisan nature of the ongoing battle over redistricting as Safriet quoted comments made by Democratic consultants about trying to get more Jewish voters into districts. Those comments were included in documents that the Republican-controlled Legislature had obtained during the course of the lawsuit. Bainter in his statement lashed out at Democrats since a national Democratic group has helped pay the legal bills of one of the groups suing.

State campaign finance records show that Bainter's law firm has been paid almost \$500,000 in the past two years by the Republican Part of Florida to work on the case.

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

BONIFAY — Neither rain nor Thor's mighty hammer could keep Holmes County from its first win on Friday.

The god of thunder provided a 40-minute lightning delay, but Chad Leavins struck twice for the Blue Devils in a 27-20 win over visiting Bozeman. Holmes County rode Leavins' 139 yards and a late comeback to a 1-2 mark and more importantly a 1-0 start in District 3-1A. Bozeman still seeks a victory and fell to 0-4, 0-1.

Justice Bice dived across the pylon to complete a 12-yard pass connection with Shane Sellers for the winning score with

33 seconds left in the game. Bice also grabbed two key first-down catches where he outjumped a Bozeman defender to extend the drive. His 2-point conversion capped the scoring.

David Elmore's last shots to give Bozeman a win fell incomplete. However, he led the Bucks to a 20-19 lead late in the fourth quarter.

Elmore's 1-yard scoring run, his second touchdown of the game, capped a 10-play drive to pull Bozeman within 20-14. He later hit Daniel Kirkland on the right side, and two missed tackles later the Bucks

were ahead by one with 4:53 to go. Elmore passed for 228 yards with receiver Logan Foster sharing 100 of them.

Bozeman squandered opportunities as well. The first came when the Bucks were forced to punt after recovering the second-half inside kick. The second was highlighted by a dropped pass in the end zone on a drive that ended on on downs.

Bozeman recorded the game's first score on the strength of a 63-yard connection between Elmore and Foster. It set up Elmore's 1-yard plunge five plays later. It was Bozeman's initial touchdown in the first half this season.

Leavins and Holmes County started a healthy

march to Bozeman's 35 before officials pulled the teams off the field with 4:43 left in the first quarter. The weather delay lasted until 7:55 p.m.

Cole Marell tied the game on a 20-yard reception from Sellers that capped a 15-play drive shortly after the game resumed. The teams swapped punts on three straight possessions, with Bozeman downing the ball at the 1 to set up Holmes County's final drive of the half.

Any hope of forcing another punt withered with a 16-yard Leavins' run and a personal foul against Bozeman. Sellers found Marell for 30 yards on third-and-9 to set up the Blue Devils at the 13. Leavins took it the rest of the way for a 13-7 lead as the skies opened

again with a harder deluge of rain.

Bozeman bled the final minutes off the first-half clock and the teams went to the locker room more than 90 minutes after the game started.

Bozeman hosts Vernon next week, while Holmes County is at Walton in nondistrict games.

"I thought our defense played their tails off, and we scored like we needed to," South Walton coach Phil Tisa said. "It was a good ball game."





The first article has gone to print with the request honored. The challenge to keep the identity of the contributing person anonymous is

first and foremost in mind on this further tribute, stemming from the Grandview Assisted Living visit.

The two friends who made the recent visit to the Senior Living Home were surprised to learn that three of the residents at Grandview were in high school at the same time as one of the visitors. In this context, high school means Washington County High School, located in Chipley, as that was the name at the time. The residents receiving the visit were John Curtis, Flo Chase and Maggie Kittrell. These residents acknowledge that they enjoy reminiscence of former days of youth. As they were talking on this particular day with the two visitors about their school days, the conversation turned to former teachers, thus the full article last week on Pat Green Peacock.

Other teachers of their era remembered by the group include Mrs. Addie Wyatt, Miss Clara Bright, who taught Latin, Mrs. Gussie Glen Wilson, whose mother, Laura Owens of the Wausau community, married Mr. John Glen, native of Scotland. Others

recalled were Miss Frankie McGeachy, Mrs. Georgia McGraw, who taught Mathematics, Mrs. Ophelia Wells, an English teacher and Mrs. Susie Williams, who was the home economics teacher.

One of the group commented that Mrs. Addie Wyatt always gave students a reason to smile before she started teaching. Whoever was relating the humorous story told by the teacher to the class on this particular day, gave this rendition: "Mrs. Wyatt roomed with the Richards family, who had a dry cleaning business in their yard where the old gymnasium still stands." The story continues: "Mrs. Wyatt also had a parrot and the teacher told the class that one day a farmer was in town with a load of wood for sale. He was hollering 'wood for sale' as his mule and wagon went up and down the streets. Mrs. Wyatt's parrot answered and told the man to carry it to the back yard." When Mrs. Richards saw the man throwing the wood into the backyard, she inquired as to why he was doing it. His answer was: "Somebody told me to bring it to the back yard." Mrs. Richards then

knew who the culprit was, but bought the wood anyway.

Since Washington County High School in Chipley was the only high school in the county during that era, students came by school bus from Caryville and other surrounding communities to attend and graduate here. The school was a starting point for good opportunities, seeking to learn and recognize their potential for further educational possibilities.

Some of the group came up with the listing of Honor Roll students for January 1928: 12th grade; none; 11th grade, Alma Butler, Melba Hutchinson, Bernice Malloy, Effie Register, Annie Merle Tharp and Mildred Yates; 10th grade, Catherine Hutchinson and Rex Yates; 9th grade, Hugh Brock, Elaine Davis, Harold Kelly, Ava Grace Vickers and Evelyn Wright.

After designs by architects Hirsch and Jones of Montgomery in 1931, the Washington County School Board contracted with M. R. Coggin Construction Company of Chipley to build a high school in Vernon. The contract price was \$21,250. Records indicate that the first school was held in the building in 1933 with Mercer Cox as first principal.

The Prattler has alluded to our "mystery person" as having made complimentary responses to the column since its beginning. Recently these comments came after my sister, Minnie Lee Wells Russ, was mentioned: "I read your memories of Minnie Lee, and it brought back such good times of when she and I were both working at DOT. I had many good moments of talking with her, and I think of the friendship we shared."

A more recent comment came after the Thomas Ray Harrell picture appeared: "I want to mention how happy I was to see Thomas Ray Harrell's picture, along with his wife's in your recent column. He was such a nice guy, and I will always remember him as a friend of all of DOT employees. He was the type of man that you didn't have to ask if he was a good person, for his actions always proved he was."

Your writer has enjoyed assimilating these articles for the past two weeks on the information furnished by our phantom friend. I trust that the wishes have been fulfilled and no secrets divulged. No promises are being made as we pursue a new approach next week.





From a gourd to a basket

Washington County Historical Society's September Basket Class was held at Falling Waters State Park on Saturday, Sept. 20. The weather was perfect and, under the direction of Master Weaver Sharon Hynes, 15 students spent the morning converting plain ol' gourds into beautifully decorated gourd baskets using dried materials as embellishments.

"There is not a lot of 'weaving' with this type of basket, however it is quite involved. First, dried gourds are scrubbed clean and an opening is made in the top. After the inside is scraped out and sanded, the outside is waxed. Small holes are drilled along the opening to carry a wire or waxed cord which is used to hold a variety of embellishments in place. Reed and raffia are used to hide or replace the wire. Just like a woven reed basket, no two baskets are ever alike," Hynes said.

"The Historical Society is pleased to offer another type of handicraft, especially one using the gourd. The Native Americans in our area, as well as the early settlers, had countless uses for the dried gourd. Historically gourds have been used to care water, toys, store food, homes for Purple Martins, dishes, bowls, drinking containers, boat floats, drums, stringed instruments and the list goes on. The creations made here today will be purely decorative, however I'm sure many people can still remember the gourd dipper that hung on Grandma's back porch by the water bucket," Dorothy Odom, museum director, said.

AAA: gas prices slide for 7th consecutive week

Motorists continue to enjoy a discount at the pump, as gas prices fall to their lowest point since February. Nationally, the price of gas fell six cents in the past week, marking a seven week decline in gasoline prices.

"Last week refineries switched from producing summer to winter-blend fuel," said Josh Carrasco, spokesman, AAA, The Auto Club Group. "Winter-blend gas is cheaper to produce, because it does not require the additives necessary in summer-blend. Also, here in the U.S. we continue benefiting from historic domestic oil production. Both of these factors continue placing downward pressure on gas prices." The price for a barrel of

WTI oil rose 14 cents this week on the NYMEX to close at \$92.41. Oil supply reductions from the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries placed upward pressure on oil prices. Libya shut down its largest oil field due to escalating tensions in the area, while Saudi Arabia announced their largest reduction in oil exports in 18 months. OPEC supplies about 40 percent of the

world's oil. "Right now, domestic oil supply is outpacing demand," Carrasco said. "Geo-political tensions and supply cuts caused oil to increase this week, but looking ahead it will be challenging for OPEC to cut production to the point that it has significant impact, due to high crude production in the U.S. Some markets could even see gas prices dip below the \$3

a gallon mark by the end of the fourth quarter." The current national average for a gallon of regular unleaded gasoline is \$3.34, 6 cents less than a week ago and 10 cents cheaper than a month ago. Prices fell four cents this week in Tennessee, to \$3.14 a gallon. While in Florida and Georgia the average price of gas sits at \$3.29 a gallon, three cents cheaper than last week.


The presentation of their own white coats, used to recognize health care professionals throughout the world, represents the next crucial stage of their education in which they will actively engage with patients and other professionals.




