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'Stamp Out Hunger' is Saturday

National Association of Letter Carriers will collect food donations on Saturday routes.

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CHIPLEY — Doing a good deed this weekend can be as easy as lifting the flag on your mailbox.

National Association of Letter Carriers 26th annual Stamp Out Hunger Food Drive is Saturday. Participation is as simple as loading a sack with nonperishable items and hanging them on the mailbox or placing them inside or beside it.

The food collected is distributed to local food banks.

"It's definitely helping the local people need and it's the brotherly thing to do," said Gale Stacy, Supervisor of Customer Service at Chipley's branch of U.S. Postal Service. "We're blessed and if we can help others in this small way, it's a good opportunity and makes it convenient for people to donate."

Although Stacy couldn't immediately recall the amount of pounds collected last year, she said donations had dwindled over the years and hopes this year — with more advance advertising — the word would get out and more people will help "stamp out hunger."

Local woman is at awe at the sight of a towering century plant in her yard, lifetime

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CHIPLEY - At 77 years old, Jean Walton did not imagine seeing a century plant

bloom in her lifetime.

But in her yard today stands a 20-foot flowering stem.

"I'd always been fascinated about hearing about them," said Walton, who moved to the area from a northern state about 22 years ago. "And when that one started coming out, I thought 'what is that' — because I only saw a little stubble.

City addresses water line issue on SR 79

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VERNON — A water line problem on State Road 79 is threatening water quality for residents and businesses from Moss Hill Road to Roche Avenue.

The line, which was laid about two weeks ago by contracting company Gulf Coast Utility Contractors out of Panama City, was not connected to other lines properly, officials said, resulting in debris and other foreign materials entering the water line.

"It's got to be connected in," Public Works Director Ronald Wood told the council at Monday night's workshop. "They turn over water to the residents, we don't have no control over what they got going on out there."

City crews have been flushing lines and trying to resolve the problem ever since it was laid, officials said.

"We're working with the state now to get that fixed," said City Clerk Tracy Walker. "With the problems that we're having, we're trying to figure out what we can do to fix it."

Council member Gary Owens directed Wood to contact the Department of Environmental Protection in order to get a plan-of-action established.

The department took water samples Monday for testing, but results were not available by time of press early Tuesday.

According to a number of people who chimed-in on the issue, including council

3,500 pounds of food.

However, she too has noticed a need for more support.

"It seems like every year it kind of dwindles down," she said, noting about 1,500 pounds collected more recently.

"The further out we can get the word out, it seems to help - they'll leave food out," Erickson added.

Post Master Larry Fern, who has worked for the postal service for 12 years, said the small gesture of kindness has its reward. He said as a former carrier he had always associated it with Mother's Day - "my Mother's Day drive because

it's always done the day before Mother's Day."

His shoulders would be sore from lifting innumerable bags of food donations on his route. It was worth he said.

"Just to help others, people in need," Fern said. "It makes you feel good to help others."

All food donations for the drive are tax-deductible. As charities are the recipients, the charity - not the postal service - must be listed on your tax forms in order to receive credit.

The top requested nonperishable goods, according to NALC are: cereal, pasta, pasta sauce or spaghetti sauce, rice, canned fruits and vegetables, canned meals (such as soups, chili and pasta), 100% juice, peanut butter, macaroni & cheese, canned protein (tuna, chicken and turkey), beans (canned or dry). You also can donate healthy, low-sodium, low-sugar items such as beans, oatmeal and other whole grains, and canola or olive oil.

I thought 'don't tell me I'll get to see - in my time - I'll get to see one!'" The plant is found in Mexico and the most southern states scaling from coast to coast from California to Florida and is native to those areas, according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Walton has two century plants in her yard, only one preparing to bloom. The large aloe-like leaves on the rosette cast shadows on her head Monday morning and the plant's flowering stem rivaled the height of a cedar tree just a few feet away.

The plant blooms once in its lifetime. Although it does not live 100 years, as its name

suggests, it takes about 10 to 25 years for the plant to flower.

"I just feel it was meant for a blessing for me. I've been through so much sickness, surgeries and family deaths," Walton said. "And at 77 (years old), to be able to see this, to me, it's just a miracle."

With the help of a family member, Walton estimated the flowering stem is about 20 feet tall. She said the growth happened between April 3 and May 7. According to the USDA, the plant can grow as high as 40 feet.

Once it blooms, the flowering stem will fall and the plant will die. However, several century plants will remain present, seeded from the rosette. "I just feel blessed," Walton added. "I had to pray and thank God that he let me have the chance to see it while I was still here."

members, the water in the areas is murky with different debris and generally unsafe to consume. And, according to officials, the problem is getting worse. An out-of-county business owner who did not want to be named had brought up the water line and quality issue nearing the end of the meeting. He said he was spending about \$75 a day on bottled water at his restaurant located on the Vernon main street.

While the council told him the city will compensate him for the bottled water expense, the business owner said "I just want to press the issue so that they will understand."

In other business, City Clerk Tracy Walker notified the council the city would protest the \$1,375 bill the Department of Economic Opportunity sent to City of

Vernon for compensation after an unemployment claim filed by DEO and former City Clerk Michelle Cook was dropped after the city made a counter appeal. Council member Gary Owens told the council that he planned to schedule a meeting with Senator George Gainer and Representative Brad Drake to discuss the dying down of FEMA funds apparently awarded to the City for a 2013 flood. He said the money has been stalled.

Also, Walker informed the council the City would be moving its payday to reflect its Thursday to Friday payroll. Whereas the City is currently issuing paychecks on Wednesday, it will change the pay day to Friday. Walker announced via email Tuesday morning The City of Vernon will be conducting routine "smoke tests" throughout next week in order identify any issues in its water and sewer system.

Vernon City Council will meet in regular session on Monday, May 21 at 6 p.m. at City Hall, 2808 Yellow Jacket Drive.

Wrong message at journalists' dinner

The work journalists do is more important than ever. Our republic simply cannot endure without an informed electorate. Voters, who ultimately call the shots, need access to information that is accurate and presented as objectively as possible.

The struggle of newspapers in a digital age has made it more difficult for citizens to obtain accurate information. At the same time, some elements of our society have been striving to weaken the First Amendment.

Politicians, meanwhile, have taken to attacking — often in the most vituperative terms — those who disagree with them. Our president has adopted that corrosive practice, targeting journalists as among his political enemies.

These politicians seem to forget that our representative democracy relies on civility, mutual respect and a willingness to set aside fanatical hatreds, since one side or the other must be allowed to govern, according to the will of the people as expressed in elections.

All this makes the recent White House Correspondents Association dinner a particularly sad event. A performance by a comedian named Michelle Wolf was so vulgar and one-sided that it further debased our political culture and surely damaged the public's perception of journalists.

Some comics argued such attacks are the whole point of the correspondents' dinner and that no one should object. But several women journalists complained that Ms. Wolf's grossly insulting comments about White House press secretary Sarah Huckabee Sanders and aide Kellyanne Conway, delivered while they sat with pained expressions, seemed extraordinarily cruel. Ms. Wolf also used the p-word, mocked the president's supposed performance in bed, and joked crudely about abortion. Individual Republicans were overwhelmingly her target.

There was plenty of laughter in the room, but many people in the Heartland no doubt perceived the event as one more display of elites in Washington, clad in tuxedos and gowns, who harbor contempt for them and their values — snobs who employ the First Amendment to bully and trash anyone who disagrees with them.

That was hardly the message journalists should be sending.

Bloomberg's Margaret Talev, president of the correspondents association, expressed regret.

The "program was meant to offer a unifying message about our common commitment to a vigorous and free press while honoring civility, great reporting and scholarship winners, not to divide people," she said. "Unfortunately, the entertainer's monologue was not in the spirit of that mission."

As viciousness increasingly characterizes our public debate, Americans might do well to ponder Abraham Lincoln's advice about persuading people to change their minds.

[K]ind, unassuming persuasion, should ever be adopted. It is an old and a true maxim, that a 'drop of honey catches more flies than a gallon of gall.' ... If you would win a man to your cause, first convince him that you are his sincere friend," he said.

But "assume to dictate to his judgment ... or to mark him as one to be shunned and despised, and he will retreat within himself, close all the avenues to his head and his heart; and though your cause be naked truth itself, transformed to the heaviest lance, harder than steel, and sharper than steel can be made, and though you throw it with more than Herculean force and precision, you shall be no more able to pierce him, than to penetrate the hard shell of a tortoise with a rye straw."

NAFTA 2.0 Poses Major Threats to U.S. Workers

The Mexican and Canadian governments are pushing the White House to step up the North American Free Trade Agreement's renegotiation pace and to conclude talks in May. Dubbed NAFTA 2.0, President Trump must proceed cautiously lest he open up the U.S. labor market to a new flood of employment-authorized visa holders.

NAFTA, which went into force on January 1, 1994, created the Treaty NAFTA (TN) visa, a non-immigrant temporary employment-based visa through which an unlimited inflow of allegedly high-skilled workers can legally enter the U.S. The TN is valid for a not-so-temporary three years, and renewable indefinitely.

TN visas are part of a much larger group of employment-based visas like the H-1B, J-1, L-1 and Optional Practical Training (OPT) that, in the aggregate, have paved the way for hundreds of thousands of overseas workers to displace Americans.

Since NAFTA is a congressionally approved treaty, the TN visa is beyond the Department of Homeland Security's purview, meaning U.S. officials have no vetting authority. The definition of high-skill is, as visa

critics point out, often liberally interpreted to the detriment of American workers. And Congress hasn't authorized an analysis that would review the TN's effect on American workers and industries.

The problem of the ever-increasing arrival of foreign-born workers on the TN and other visas poses important questions about national sovereignty. According to the Congressional Research Service, foreign nationals can enter the U.S. on 24 major nonimmigrant visa categories, and more than 70 specific types of nonimmigrant visas are currently issued. Many of these visa categories are employment-based. Others that don't provide legal work authorization, like the B-1 temporary business visitor visa, have been unscrupulously used by employers and their subcontractors for hiring purposes.

Senate Judiciary Chair Chuck Grassley has grave concerns about the effect more TN visas would have on American workers. In his letter to U.S. Representative Robert Lighthizer, President Trump's chief NAFTA 2.0 negotiator Grassley, citing a State Department report, wrote that in 2016, 14,768 TN visas were issued along with 9,762 TD visas for spouses and children. In 2015, another 13,093 were approved, and in 2014, yet another 11,207. For the three-year period, Grassley pointed out, a total of 39,068 TN visas had been issued, mostly to Mexican workers. While Canadian workers aren't required

to formally apply for a TN, an estimated 100,000 Canadian nationals work in the U.S.

Grassley asked that Lighthizer evaluate whether the admittance of unlimited temporary workers under a multinational trade agreement, as opposed to through existing statutory and regulatory frameworks that the State, Homeland Security and Labor Departments have established for other worker visa categories, serves America's best interests. But since Congress stubbornly refuses to evaluate the H-1B's consequences on the American labor force, Grassley is unlikely to have his wish for a TN review granted, especially since the pro-immigration lobby, big business and Wall Street endorse the TN.

At different times during the NAFTA 2.0 talks, President Trump has said that in exchange for any deal he might agree to, Mexico must help to stop drug trafficking and to stem illegal immigration. But the president said nothing about TN visas. Most Americans know that millions of illegal immigrants, either border crossers or visa overstays, live in the U.S. But only a microscopic percentage could talk knowledgeably about employment visa categories and the harm they do to the domestic labor market.

During the NAFTA 2.0 conversations, more critical focus should be put on excessive visa issuance and its consequences on U.S. workers.

The Starbucks stops here

Liberal rip-off business Starbucks, which made its money opening stores in only affluent neighborhoods (aka redlining), all but cried recently when one of its stores in Philadelphia had two African-American, non-paying customers arrested.

Now baristas at 8,000 Starbucks stores, who have nose-rings, ironic tattoos and \$50K in student loan debt from their Gender Studies degrees, get to be lectured on race so they can then lecture customers on race. That is the mission

statement of Starbucks: overcharge for coffee while lecturing customers that they are racist. It is called the "Insult to Injury" program.

Starbucks has always been leftist-politically active. Management said they were going to hire 10,000 refugees when Trump instigated his ban on travelers from terrorist countries. Imagine how they would misspell their names on their coffee cups. They have a hard time with American names. A friend of mine told his Starbucks barista his name was "Marc with a C." The guy promptly wrote "Cark" on his cup. The good news is, I have heard of guys who cannot remember a date's name and the next morning taking her to Starbucks so she has to say her name again as a reminder.

CFO and State Fire Marshal Jimmy Patronis calls communities to Help Stop Arson

TALLAHASSEE – During National Arson Awareness Week, recognized May 6-12, Florida Chief Financial Officer (CFO) and State Fire Marshal Jimmy Patronis calls on all Floridians to report suspicious activity and be on the lookout for those who attempt to commit arson-related crimes.

“Arson-related crimes can destroy property, put lives at risk and arson-for-profit schemes are one of the factors that can drive up insurance rates,” said CFO and State Fire Marshal Jimmy Patronis. “In 2017 alone, 1,004 of

the 3,695 fires my office responded to were arson-related. These fires caused 62 injuries, 38 fatalities, and approximately \$23.4 million in property damage.

Community awareness and engagement is essential in our fight against this deadly and costly crime.”

To report arson, call 1-877-No-Arson (1-877-662-7766). Tips that lead directly to an arrest and conviction may be eligible for a \$5,000 reward.

Information can be provided anonymously.

The Bureau of Fire and Arson Investigations is a law enforcement branch of CFO Patronis' Division of Investigative and Forensic Services and conducts fire, arson, and explosives investigations as well as other related criminal investigations statewide.

Arson Awareness Week in Florida is part of a nationwide initiative to educate the public on the important role of community arson awareness and how it can and does play an important role in preventing this dangerous crime.

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

Putin vows to boost Russian economy


Russian president begins fourth term by pushing economical relief, development

MOSCOW — Vladimir Putin on Monday launched his fourth term as president with an ambitious call to vault Russia into the top five global economies by developing its technological products and agricultural exports.

Putin, who has sought to restore Russia's military and diplomatic prominence on the world stage, focused almost entirely on domestic issues in his speech after taking the oath of office in a vast, vaulted Kremlin hall glittering with gold leaf.

Improving the economy following a recession partly linked to international sanctions will be a primary goal of his next six-year term, Putin

said. "Russia should be modern and dynamic, it should be ready to accept the call of the times," he said in his inauguration speech to thousands of guests standing in three halls of the Grand Kremlin Palace.

Putin later issued an extensive decree calling for "acceleration of the technological development of the Russian Federation" and "creation of a high-performance export-oriented sector in the basic sectors of the economy,

primarily in manufacturing and the agro-industrial sector."

The 65-year-old former KGB agent, who has led Russia for all of the 21st century either as president or prime minister, has been criticized for inadequate efforts to diversify the economy from its dependence on oil and gas exports or develop the manufacturing sector.

Russia's economy was hit hard by low world oil prices and sanctions connected to Moscow's 2014 annexation of Crimea and military involvement in the separatist uprising in eastern Ukraine, with the ruble losing half its value between 2014 and 2016.

The country recorded an anemic improvement in 2017, with gross domestic product rising 1.5 percent and the ruble recovering some of its value. But the currency dropped about 8 percent again last month after new U.S.

sanctions.

In the decree, he foresaw Russia becoming one of the world's top five economies by the end of his term in 2024. That would require boosting GDP by some 50 percent; Russia currently places about 12th in rankings of world economies.

Putin made only a brief reference to global affairs in his speech, saying "Russia is a strong, active, influential participant in international life. The security and defense capability of the country is reliably ensured. We will give these matters the necessary constant attention."

He acknowledged that the challenges facing Russia were formidable "but we all remember well that, for more than 1,000 years of history, Russia has often faced epochs of turmoil and trials, and has always revived as a Phoenix, reached heights that others could not."



Players' union files grievance for Eric Reid

The NFL players' union has filed a non-injury grievance on behalf of free agent safety Eric Reid.

The NFLPA cites one team appearing "to have based its decision not to sign a player based on the player's statement that he would challenge the implementation of a club's policy prohibiting demonstration" during the national anthem.

League policy does not prohibit demonstrating during the anthem. Referring to the labor agreement with the league, the union notes that NFL rules supersede any conflicting club rules.

MADRID Rafael Nadal in middle of soccer controversy

Rafael Nadal has put himself in the middle of a soccer controversy in Madrid.

A longtime Real Madrid supporter, Nadal appeared with a Atletico Madrid jersey during the club's Europa League match against Arsenal last week, making headlines across Spain and attracting a wave of social media reactions from fans from both teams. Nadal couldn't avoid the issue when he arrived in the Spanish capital for this week's Madrid Open.

"Well, there is a problem with today's society, that to be a true supporter of one team, it seems that you have to be anti another team," Nadal said Monday. "I just support Real Madrid. I have a lot of friends that are from Atletico. They are playing in a competition in Europe against an English team. I just went there to support Atletico Madrid. They invited me. I just wanted to enjoy the day, to see a great football match."

HERNING, DENMARK US, Canada win at hockey worlds

The United States beat Germany 3-0 to stay unbeaten and Russia shut out a third straight opponent at the world ice hockey championship on Monday. Russia routed Belarus 6-0.

Canada allowed Denmark to score on the way to another big win, 7-1, and defending champion Sweden kept cruising with a 4-0 win against France.

U.S. captain Patrick Kane broke the deadlock against Germany and assisted on the other two goals in the hard-fought Group B game in Herning.

Joshua Bailey opened the scoring for Canada with a wrist on a power play, and defenseman Aaron Ekblad netted with a slap shot in the first period.

Buffalo abuzz over Bills' draft, Sabres' lottery win

BUFFALO, N.Y. — The Buffalo Bills were so dull during their lean years, comedian Nick Bakay feared his body would fuse to the couch while watching them play.

"It's an incredibly disturbing image," Bakay said of wasting away Sundays witnessing his hometown team sleepwalk through one loss after another during a 17-season playoff drought that ended last year.

"I never missed a Bills game. But I was always slumped on my couch. I was never sitting forward. I was never jumping to my feet," said Bakay, who wrote "Paul Blart: Mall Cop" and its sequel, and produced and appeared on the TV sitcom "King of Queens." "You sit on your couch, and your couch slowly eats you."

No different for fans of Buffalo's other pro sports franchise, the NHL's Sabres, who finished last for the third time in five years and extended their franchise-worst playoff drought to a seventh season.

In a shot-and-a-beer town where the winters are interminably long, Buffalo sports fans ride things out on the notion of renewal always being just around the corner.

And there's a new, palpable optimism for this hearty fan base, thanks to a three-day stretch which showed potential to alter the trajectory of both teams.

First, the Bills made a pair of splashes in the first round of the NFL draft on April 26 by trading up to select Wyoming quarterback Josh Allen and Virginia Tech linebacker Tremaine Edmonds.

Two days later, the Sabres won the NHL draft lottery — something Buffalo lost the previous two times it finished last — and the opportunity to select projected No. 1 pick, Swedish defenseman Rasmus Dahlin.

During the NFL draft, CBS

Evening News anchor Jeff Glor got dirty looks from his wife during a rare dinner date sneaking peeks at the Bills' picks. He then yelped with excitement upon learning the Sabres won the lottery while attending the White House Correspondents' Association dinner in Washington.

"I had just resigned myself to never winning it," Glor said. "But listen, I always have hope."

In Buffalo, there's a fine line between affection and affliction for hope.

"I always try to keep it in check a little bit," said Glor, who grew up in the Buffalo suburb of Tonawanda. "Unfortunately, you get conditioned to where there are times you can be defeatist. And you try not to be. But you just don't give up."

Fans have little choice but to persevere in a place where nickname-worthy moments are tied to losses.

For the Bills, it's "Wide Right," after kicker Scott Norwood missed a last-second field-goal attempt in a 20-19 loss to the New York Giants in the 1991 Super Bowl — the first of four consecutive Super Bowl losses.

For the Sabres, it's "No Goal," following a 2-1, triple-overtime loss to Dallas in Game 6 of the 1999 Stanley Cup Final. Brett Hull's Cup-clinching goal stood even though replays showed his skate in the crease.

Those were the so-called glory days. The Bills and Sabres have won five playoff games combined since 2008. By comparison, the NHL's expansion Vegas Golden Knights have already won eight in their first year of existence.

Buffalo joins Nashville and Charlotte, North Carolina, as the only North American markets with two or more major pro teams to not have won a title.

"I think it builds character in a way. I joke with my friends that one day my kids

will have to go through therapy because we are Sabres, Bills and Mets fans," said former VH1-cable TV chief Tom Calderone, who's based in New York City but maintains a home in his native Buffalo. "It's easy to be a Cowboys fan or a Patriots fan. But it takes true dedication to be a Bills or Sabres fan."

Calderone sees more hope reflected in signs of resurgence for the city itself.

The former site of the Erie Canal has been transformed from vacant gravel lots to parkland, a water park that doubles as an ice rink in winter, and an entertainment/hockey complex built by Bills and Sabres owner Terry Pegula.

Housing prices have tripled and a medical corridor is newly bustling along Main Street, where shuttered and boarded-up buildings have been renovated or replaced by new steel and glass structures.

Buffalo still has its rust-belt blemishes as one of the nation's poorest cities. Racial inequities, failing schools and a crumbling infrastructure remain issues.

The Bills and Sabres aren't immune to troubling headlines. Last week, the two teams' president Russ Brandon resigned amid allegations of having inappropriate relationships with female employees.

Buffalo might never regain the industrial-age prominence it held in the late 19th and early 20th centuries, when the city became a Great Lakes shipping hub as the gateway to the Erie Canal.

Nor, however, should it become the punchline comedian Jon Stewart once delivered during a stop in Buffalo, calling the city the gateway to the Ontario border town of Fort Erie just across the Niagara River — population 30,000.

Watching a documentary on former Bills running back O.J. Simpson, Bakay was reminded of the gloomy times in the 1970s when the steel mills began closing and legions of people left to find jobs.

Group: NCAA reforms should go further

Knight Commission proposes additional regulations amid FBI probe

The Knight Commission on Intercollegiate Athletics supports recent reform proposals to the NCAA amid a federal corruption investigation into college basketball — but wants the NCAA to do more.

The commission suggests changing the NCAA's governance structure and additional financial regulations regarding coaches or school employees receiving outside income from apparel companies. The Knight Commission issued its proposals during its spring meeting Monday in Washington, roughly two weeks after the committee led by former U.S. Secretary of State Condoleezza Rice issued recommendations to overhaul the NCAA.

"It's an open question if the NCAA can restore public confidence in its ability to be stewards of big-money college sports," said Arne Duncan, the commission co-chairman and a former U.S. Secretary of Education. "To do so, it will need to embrace far more sweeping and deep-seated reform than ever before."

The Rice committee's recommendations included ending the "one-and-done" NBA rule, overhauling the enforcement process to handle complex cases of potential rules violations and creating a certification system to regulate agent conduct.

Rice's Commission on College Basketball formed in October, a few weeks after federal prosecutors announced they had charged 10 men — including assistant coaches at Arizona, Auburn, USC and Oklahoma State along with a top Adidas executive — in a fraud and bribery scandal.

The case involves hundreds of thousands of dollars in alleged bribes and kickbacks designed to influence recruits on choosing a school, agent or apparel company. It has entangled schools such as Kansas, North Carolina State, Louisville and Miami, among others, though prosecutors withdrew a criminal complaint in February against one of the defendants.

Nestle pays \$7B for Starbucks rights

Company will take over sales of coffee giant's products in grocery stores

SEATTLE — Nestle is paying more than \$7 billion to buy the rights to sell Starbucks coffee and tea in supermarkets and other stores outside its coffee shops.

The deal comes with a huge price tag for Nestle, but it could pay off big for the Swiss company. Its Nescafe and Nespresso don't carry anywhere near the heft in America that the Starbucks brand does, with its \$2 billion in annual sales. Nestle will also put Starbucks in grocery stores outside the U.S. and Canada.

The deal gives Nestle the rights to market, sell and distribute bags of Starbucks coffee beans, as well as its instant coffee. Nestle will also sell other brands owned by Starbucks, such as Seattle's Best Coffee, Teavana tea and Torrefazione Italia coffee, and will be allowed to put the Starbucks brand on Nestle single-serve capsules for coffee machines.

The agreement does not include bottled drinks like iced coffees and Frappuccinos that are sold in and

outside of Starbucks stores.

Nestle hinted last year that it was looking at focusing on higher-growth areas like pet care, coffee and infant nutrition. In January it announced it was selling its U.S. candy business to Italy's Ferrero for approximately \$2.8 billion. And last year, Nestle bought a majority stake in high-end coffee company Blue Bottle.

With the strength of the Starbucks brand, Nestle

will be able to better compete against JAB Holdings, an investment holding company that has gobbled up coffee businesses and brands associated with Peet's, Caribou, Stumptown and Krispy Kreme Doughnuts.

Starbucks already has a deal with JAB, creating single-serve coffee for its Keurig brewers. Starbucks CEO Kevin Johnson said that deal is unaffected

by the agreement with Nestle.

Nestle announced Monday that Starbucks Corp. will receive \$7.15 billion in an up-front cash payment. Approximately 500 Starbucks employees will join Nestle, and operations will continue to be located in Seattle.

The deal is subject to regulatory approval and is expected to close by the end of the year.

US stocks close modestly higher

U.S. stocks closed modestly higher Monday, extending the market's gains from last week.

Technology companies and banks accounted for much of the latest gains, outweighing losses among beverage makers and other consumer goods companies.

Energy stocks got a boost from U.S. crude oil prices, which closed above \$70 a barrel for the first time since November 2014.

"Geopolitical risk has cooled a little bit and economic data, even if it isn't accelerating as fast as it was a month ago, is still accelerating," said Karyn Cavanaugh, senior markets strategist at Voya Investment Management. "The last couple of days are showing that investors are getting their sea legs back."

The S&P 500 index rose 9.21 points, or 0.3 percent, to 2,672.63. The Dow Jones industrial average gained 94.81 points, or 0.4 percent, to 24,357.32. The Nasdaq added 55.60 points, or 0.8 percent, to 7,265.21. The Russell 2000 index of smaller-company stocks picked

up 13.34 points, or 0.9 percent, to 1,578.95.

Trading got off to a solid start early Monday, as investors weighed the big move in energy futures.

Crude oil prices have been rising as investors weigh heightened geopolitical risks in the Middle East, a push by OPEC to slash oil production and strong worldwide demand amid a global economic expansion.

On Monday, oil futures climbed to their highest level since November 2014 as a May 12 deadline approached for the U.S. to decide whether to remain in the nuclear agreement with Iran.

Benchmark U.S. crude rose \$1.01, or 1.4 percent, to settle at \$70.73 a barrel in New York. Brent crude, the international standard, gained \$1.30, or 1.7 percent, to close at \$76.17 a barrel in London.

The pickup in oil prices helped lift energy company shares. Range Resources rose 3.7 percent to \$14.12.

"Concern about Iran has oil up, taking energy stocks up and helping out the whole market," said Erik Davidson, chief investment officer at Wells Fargo Private Bank.

Big investor offers about \$6.5B for athenahealth

Prominent athenahealth investor Elliott Management Corp. is offering about \$6.5 billion to take the medical billing software maker private after saying it has grown frustrated with the company's performance.

Athenahealth stock soared Monday after the shareholder outlined its unsolicited bid.

The investor says it owns about a 9 percent stake in athenahealth, and the company has not made the changes it needs to grow and create value as a public company.

Elliott Management said in a letter to athenahealth's board that the company "despite all of its promise, has not worked for many years ... and will not work in the future." The letter, signed by Partner and Senior Portfolio Manager Jesse Cohn, adds that athenahealth has not made changes that would enable it to create "the kind of value its shareholders deserve."

Cohn noted that the company's leadership team lacks stability after going through five chief financial officers in the last four years. He also said the company has had problems with product execution and has missed guidance targets.

"Athenahealth's team has shown that it lacks visibility into its business performance," Cohn's letter stated.

Cohn wrote that Elliott Management had approached athenahealth about a deal last

November involving the hedge fund and other parties it did not name, but athenahealth "refused to engage."

Athenahealth said Monday its board plans to carefully review the proposal from Elliott Management, which was founded by billionaire investor Paul Singer. Watertown, Massachusetts-based athenahealth makes medical record, revenue cycle and care coordination products and delivers most of its offerings through cloud-based software.

Elliott Management plans to take over athenahealth for \$160 per share in cash. That's a 27 percent premium to the stock's Friday closing price of \$126.08. The hedge fund also said it might "substantially improve" that price if it is allowed to do additional private diligence.

Leerink analyst David Larsen sees the offer as a positive.

He noted that athenahealth recently reported good first-quarter results, but the company is still dealing with a slow-down in the electronic medical records market and increased competition. He said in a research note that the company is making progress on a push to cut costs and expand operating margin, but it will take "considerable time" for big changes.

"In our view, Elliott's offer presents a good path to unlock value for current shareholders and we view the proposal favorably," Larsen wrote.

DOT urges drivers to take care of faulty air bags now

The U.S. Department of Transportation is again urging owners of vehicles with defective Takata air bags to seek repairs immediately.

The agency singled out Ford Rangers and Mazda B-Series trucks from 2006, which are under a "do not drive" warning.

The agency said Monday that it is "deeply concerned" that they are not being returned for repairs quickly enough.

Chemicals used to inflate the air bags can deteriorate in some conditions, causing them to explode with too much force and blow apart a metal canister that can lead to hurling shrapnel.

Monsanto CEO, others to leave after Bayer takeover

Monsanto Chairman and CEO Hugh Grant will leave the company after it's acquired by Germany's Bayer AG.

The St. Louis company said Monday that Grant will work to see the \$57 billion deal through and oversee operations before it closes.

Bayer expects the deal to close in the second quarter.

A number of Monsanto's top executives will depart with Grant as well.

Monsanto shareholders approved a bid from the pharmaceutical and chemical business in December.





Be proactive

Women should be informed about these common medical issues

Women disproportionately suffer from some health problems that the other half of the population rarely has to consider.

Here are a few conditions for females of all ages to watch:

Thyroid disorders

The thyroid, a gland at the front of the neck that produces hormones that regulate metabolism, affects lots of other body parts. It can be a miserable experience when something goes haywire.

When it doesn't release enough endocrine, a sufferer can experience fatigue, weight gain, dry skin, sluggish thinking, muscle weakness, constipation and depression.

When it releases too much of the hormone, it causes weight loss, diarrhea, trouble concentrating and a racing heart. The telltale signs are bulging eyes and swelling in the neck resulting from an enlarged thyroid gland.

Unfortunately for women, they are five to eight times more likely to have a malfunctioning thyroid than

men, said Dr. Laura Ryan, an endocrinologist at the Center for Women's Health at Ohio State University.

"There's not a whole lot you can do to head it off," Ryan said. But it's relatively easy to treat, she said, by replacing the hormones that the body would make naturally.

Osteoporosis


Once women reach menopause, at an average age of 51, estrogen drops off precipitously. Sometimes that leads to the loss of bone density, called osteoporosis.

It's a silent disorder, Ryan said. You might not know it until you fall and inexplicably break a bone.

The time for real prevention is decades earlier, in the preteen and teenage years, when the skeleton is being set up. The calcium from dairy products and leafy green vegetables are vital then.

Acid-blocking medications such as Nexium and Prilosec for people with digestive issues have been implicated in increased risk of osteoporosis.

Resistance training and walking are good exercises to keep the bones strong. Not smoking makes a big difference. And osteoporosis medications, which got a bad rap in the past, actually can do wonders for stopping that bone loss and even reestablishing the

bone structure, Ryan said.

Alzheimer's disease

About 5.2 million people in the United States and 44 million worldwide have Alzheimer's disease. Women make up two-thirds of those cases.

"I think for a long time, the reason was (thought to be) that women live longer," said Dr. Meredith Mucha, an OhioHealth geriatrician. "Now, more research has shown that there's more to it than that."

There could be hormonal causes, such as the use of or lack of hormone replacement therapy. There's also a genetic tie to the APOE4 (Apolipoprotein E) gene, often called

the Alzheimer's gene, but that isn't a guarantee.

Overall, only 1 in 4 people is diagnosed. "So many people just brush it off as old age and never get evaluated," she said.

But that's a problem because it ends up being the sixth-leading cause of death in the United States. People die from complications of no longer being able to function. They can't eat, bathe or even sit properly. They also get more infections.

Multiple sclerosis

Multiple sclerosis, in which the body's immune system turns on the nervous system, can be a scary diagnosis, but treatment has come a long way. A sufferer

can live a nearly normal, active life, unlike 30 years ago or longer, when they might have been relegated to a bed or wheelchair.

About 70 percent to 80 percent of cases afflict women, said Dr. DeRen Huang, a Mount Carmel Health neurologist.

"We don't exactly know the reason," Huang said.

Evidence suggests that vitamin D, which the body manufactures from sun exposure, is vitally important, both to warding it off and mitigating damage after onset. Sometimes an over-the-counter supplement isn't enough to make up for that, Huang said, and patients need to get a prescription for heavy-duty vitamin D.

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

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


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
