## BOCC to purchase back industrial park

CHIPLEY – The Washington County Board of County Commissioners are taking advantage of a contingency clawback provision to purchase back one of the most marketable tracts of commercial property in the county.

Attorney Matt Fuqua advised commissioners at their workshop on May 16 that negotiations for the land

had concluded and the agreed upon price is set at \$750,000.

The approximately 70-acre site is located north of Highway 90 at the intersection of Highway 273 and North Boulevard in Chipley known as the Washington County Industrial Park.

The buy back comes years after Project Pipe failed to deliver on its promise to use \$12.75 million in capital investment to construct a full-service manufacturing site for large concrete pipe

and box culverts and bring more than 150 jobs with an estimated \$5.1 million annual payroll to the county. Additional monies were also proposed to build a rail spur and industrial-grade road.

The purchase of the land is a

boon for the county which will decide either to flip it or find a warehouse-type company to come in, make use of the land and help strengthen economic development in the county.

Washington County Economic Development Council Chair Ted Everett says once the site is back under the county's ownership, it will be ready to market.

(The site) has new water lines, a new road, natural gas, water, and sewer infrastructure, and two utility

companies ready to serve it," said Everett.

The county is looking at funding sources to purchase the land in order to not incur any more debt.

County Administrator Jeff Massey believes the county is moving in the right direction and is looking towards a bright future for the county.

"The key is that we are being proactive and not reactive," said Massey. "Good things are coming to Washington County."

## TDC seeks public safety officers for World Series

CHIPLEY – The Washington County Tourist Development Council is looking to public safety officers to assist with organizing a large group of baseball players.

"Have them stationed in the two hotels during breakfast time, so if the staff of the hotel sees that there's kids or family members there that shouldn't be, the public safety officer can step in," TDC Director Heather Lopez said following Monday's TDC workshop and regular meeting.

The solution comes after the 2014 Dixie Pre-Majors World Series experience, when some players sought after warm breakfast and cooling pools at hotels they were not lodging in. The TDC had spread the teams out across five hotels, some had the desired amenities and accommodations, while others didn't.

For the 2018 series, 60 rooms have been reserved and split between Comfort Inn & Suites and Quality Inn.

"We decided what we would do is take all the teams and coaches and put them in the hotels that have the hot breakfast and the pools – that way we wouldn't have to worry about that," Lopez said.

## FPL parent to buy gulf power in multibillion-dollar deal

TALLAHASSEE – In a major move in the state's utility industry, the parent company of Florida Power & Light said Monday it will buy Northwest Florida's Gulf Power as part of a \$6.475 billion deal.

NextEra Energy Inc. plans to buy Gulf Power, the Florida City Gas natural-gas company and ownership interests in two power plants from The Southern Company. The purchase of Gulf Power and the stakes in the power plants, which are subject to federal approval, are expected to close during the first half of 2019, while the Florida City Gas purchase is slated for the third quarter of 2018, according to a NextEra Energy announcement.

"This transaction was just announced today and with any transaction of this type, there will be many questions that will be answered as we as a company and our employees move through this process," said Rick Delahya, spokesperson at Gulf Power.

"We want our customers to know that our people will continue to be focused on serving our customers who

# Fla. school district bans backpacks, gets police presence for rest of year

WINTER HAVEN, Fla. — In light of Friday's school shooting in Texas, Polk County Sheriff Grady Judd announced Friday that law enforcement officers will be assigned this week to the 111 charter and public schools countywide that currently don't have full-time school resource officers.

The officers will remain on campus through Thursday, which is the last day of school for Polk County students, he said.

At the same time, Polk Schools Superintendent Jacqueline Byrd announced the district is banning backpacks in Polk County schools for the remainder of the school year.

Judd said the sheriff's office and police departments across the county are altering work schedules to ensure that all the schools are protected.

"What we want to do is make sure that during these last three and a half days that our students can focus on school, finishing their final exams and getting ready for an awesome, awesome

summer," Judd said during a news conference Friday afternoon.

"What we want to make sure is that we clearly send a message, whether it's adults that make any kind of threat, or students or kids that make any kind of threats toward the schools during this next three and a half days, they will be investigated and arrested," Judd said. "If you're a juvenile, there won't be any of this diversion business. You're going to be arrested, taken to the JAC (Juvenile Assessment Center) and locked up."

Byrd said during the news conference that the school district intends to ensure students will be safe for this last week of school.

"We're doing everything possible, parents, I assure you, to make sure that when you're dropping children off or you send them to us, they're going to be safe. That's why, yes, I have banned backpacks — to help us, as much as possible, make sure nothing is coming into the schools, by any means."

Students will be permitted to carry lunch

boxes and bags no larger than a small purse.


Haines City Police Chief Jim Elensky said his department, too, will continue to provide the law enforcement presence that has been there since the February shootings at Marjorie Stoneman Douglas High School in Parkland, Florida, which left 17 dead.

"There will be law enforcement on the ground each and every day to ensure the safety of our kids," he said during the news conference.

Assistant Chief Ruben Garcia said Lakeland Police will have all the city's campuses covered.

"We make a plea to the teachers and the parents to keep a sharp eye out for anything that looks out of the ordinary and to let us know as soon as possible," he said.

Judd said departments are having to juggle personnel to ensure that all the schools are covered each day next week, but all departments have expressed a willingness to do that. He said the staffing will be done without reducing patrols in the respective cities or unincorporated Polk County.

# Florida man arrested for walking naked in rain with a bottle of oil

GULF BREEZE, Fla. — A man was arrested Thursday night for allegedly walking naked through a residential neighborhood in the rain with a bottle of oil, according to the Santa Rosa County Sheriff's Office.

At approximately 8:30 p.m. Thursday, deputies were dispatched to a home on Woodlawn Way in reference to a naked man walking near a resident's front door.

While investigating the report, another resident

called reporting observing the naked male, who was reportedly aroused, standing in their driveway in heavy rain, holding a plastic bottle. The bottle contained cooking oil, according to his arrest report.

When a deputy approached the man, he ran around a truck in the driveway until the deputy caught up and took the bottle. While attempting to handcuff the man, he slipped away and began to run.

Ignoring commands to stop, the man was tased

by the deputy and fell on his back, the report said.

The man reportedly told deputies that he lives in the neighborhood and that he "receives sexual gratification by touching his penis and walking naked in the rain," according to the arrest report.

He also stated he carries around the cooking oil because he likes to rub it on his legs. He said he has previously walked naked around his neighborhood at least once before but prefers to walk naked on the beach, especially Pensacola Beach and Navarre

Beach.

He said he'd actually been walking around naked for an hour and a half and that his stroll included a visit to Woodlawn Beach Middle School.

The man was taken to the Santa Rosa County Jail on charges of loitering and prowling, lewd and lascivious behavior, resisting an officer without violence and exposure of sexual organs, all misdemeanors.

## Make education a bigger priority

**W**e love football here in the South. Really love it. And that's only fitting, because the "State of the South" dossier by MDC, a North Carolina-based nonprofit, is like reading an extensive scouting report on a football team. The areas of strength are noted:

- The South is more racially and ethnically diverse than ever before in history, and has "shifted from a biracial to a multi-ethnic region."
- The South has been able to reinvent itself as a region with "hubs of excellence and innovation in medicine, health and science, providing the benefits of modern medicine."
- The South "has more affluence, a more diverse economy with a potent corporate sector, a stronger middle class (blacks and Latinos as well as whites) ... than it did 50 years ago."
- Major Southern cities Charleston, South Carolina, Biloxi, Mississippi, and New Orleans have all "largely recovered" from massive weather-related devastation during the last 15 years; meanwhile, Houston has made strides rebuilding after Hurricane Harvey last fall.

But just as a football scouting report also focuses on a team's weaknesses, "State of the South" identifies the region's vulnerabilities, too. And this one clearly stands out in the MDC report: "Most Southern states still lag the national average in K-12 achievement. ..."

Ignoring it could have stark consequence for the South: "(The) pattern of increasing divestment in public institutions could affect long-term upward economic mobility prospects in the region."

This is no trivial area of vulnerability, but it's clear how we in the South should be addressing it:

- Southern states — including Florida — must make investing in education an equally high priority for all students, instead of pitting public schools against charters, urban districts vs. rural ones, etc., in some Hunger Games-style "survival of the fittest" battle for funding and resources.

- As the "State of the South" report suggests, our region will need the talents of all of our residents to achieve sustainable prosperity. That means all Southern states have to provide levels of funding that will enable all Southern students to flourish.


- Stop rewarding the buffoonish anti-intellectualism embraced by many of our lawmakers and power brokers to justify starving educational systems of needed money. They justify it by throwing around pander words and phrases like "elitist," "snowflakes," "failing urban schools," "so-called experts" and "powerful teachers' unions."

And they get away with it because we let them. Clearly, that's a big reason why there isn't a single state in the South where native residents have as many bachelor's degrees as fellow residents who were born elsewhere.

If we want tomorrow's South to keep moving the chains and putting up the points, we need to demand that our leaders make education a bigger part of the playbook.

## For a Builder, Trump Likes Wrecking Stuff

**F**or a man who likes to brag about what a big builder he is, President Donald Trump spends a lot of time burning stuff down.

From his pursuit of protectionist tariffs and withdrawal from the Paris climate accords, to his routine attacks on the norms of a liberal democracy, the developer from Queens has taken a wrecking ball to the United States' place in the world, isolating us on the world stage, and marginalizing our moral voice.

Even his cherished wall, the one he promised the United States would build and that someone else — the American taxpayer, as it turns out — would pay for, remains frustratingly out of his grasp.

So it wasn't a surprise Tuesday to find that Trump had taken a torch to the Iran nuclear deal, unraveling the signature foreign policy achievement of former President Barack Obama, and further straining relations with western European allies who had passionately lobbied

the White House to stay in it.

Writing in Slate, Fred Kaplan said Trump, driven either by rank ignorance, bald-faced malice, or some combination of the two, had dismantled the most significant arms-control deal in modern history.

Even worse, the administration premised its argument for withdrawal on at least two fraudulent claims.

First, that Iran is cheating on the deal. There's no evidence to support that. If anything, Iran was complying with the terms of the agreement and, as Vox reports, it was giving inspectors the room they needed to do their jobs.

Second, Trump claimed the agreement required the United States to "pay" Iran \$100 billion. Nope.

The United States froze that amount in Iranian assets, and the deal was conditional on returning them. That's the carrot in this carrot-and-stick arrangement.

Trump's move to kill the deal came despite the pleadings of French President Emmanuel Macron, British Foreign Secretary Boris Johnson, Defense Secretary James Mattis, dozens of past and former diplomats, and even House Armed Services Committee Chairman Mac Thornberry, R-Texas, who no one would confuse for a dove, Kaplan noted.

Right on schedule, Iranian officials announced that they'd negotiate with European leaders, the Chinese and Vladimir Putin's Russia about staying in the deal.

As was the case with Trump's announcement of the withdrawal from Syria, he opened another power vacuum that America's geopolitical rivals will be only too happy to fill.

On its face, Trump's announcement appeared to be less about securing any long-term foreign policy goal than it was about dominating the news cycle, proving to his base that he could deliver on campaign promise, and perhaps most importantly, sticking a finger in Obama's eye.

In a statement, Obama called the withdrawal a "serious mistake."

"Walking away from the [agreement] turns our back on America's closest allies, and an agreement that our country's leading diplomats, scientists, and intelligence professionals negotiated," Obama said. "In a democracy, there will always be changes in policies and priorities from one Administration to the next. But the consistent flouting of agreements that our country is a party to risks eroding America's credibility, and puts us at odds with the world's major powers."

## They Hate, Trump Wins

# 1 arrested, 1 at-large in task force investigation

CHIPLEY – One suspect was arrested and another remains at-large after a search warrant was issued at a local residence Friday.

Laticia Jones, 28, of Chipley, was arrested Friday after the Washington County Drug Task Force (WCDTF) served a search warrant of a property at 722 Peach St. According to a news release by Washington County Sheriff's Office, the WCDTF served the warrant as a result of an investigation into dealing narcotics in the Chipley area that had been ongoing for several weeks.

Jones was found to have an active arrest warrant from Washington County for aggravated assault, burglary and battery. A search of the residence resulted in the discovery of an undisclosed amount of crack cocaine packaged for sale, marijuana, paraphernalia, and prescription drugs, the release stated.


"Collaboration between agencies lead to the successful investigation removing drug dealers from the streets," stated WCSO Sheriff Kevin Crews in the release.

Another suspect in the case, Jacques Jett, 20, of Chipley, remains at large. Jett is wanted on the following charges: possession of cocaine with intent to distribute, possession of marijuana and possession of drug paraphernalia.

The Chipley Police Department is actively seeking Jett for the charges relating to this

incident, the release stated.

In addition to drug charges, both subjects have been charged with one count each of child neglect without great bodily harm.

These charges are based on the dangers to children in the home from the proximity and availability of narcotics found in the residence.

Chipley Police Chief Scott Thompson says the task force will remain aggressive to remove drugs and protect children.

"We continue to confront drug dealers through active and aggressive investigations to rid our communities of illegal narcotics," Thompson said. "The true victims are those who have no choice, the children."

Jones faces charges stemming from the search warrant which include: possession of cocaine with intent to distribute, possession of marijuana, possession of drug paraphernalia, possession of a controlled substance, and child neglect without great bodily harm.





# One arrested in connection to Panama City Mall bomb threat

PANAMA CITY — As K-9 units swept through the Panama City Mall looking for what would turn out to be a non-existent bomb, several dozen employees from various stores waited in patches of shade at the perimeter of the parking lot.

"They told us to get the hell out," said Isaac Loberger, an employee at Bennigans. "I hope they let us in soon, I left sandwich stuff on the counter."

"All my stuff is in there. I don't even have my cell phone," added co-worker Ashley Wilhite. "I don't even think there is a bomb."

Panama City Police later arrested Nicholas Whitehead, 31, in connection with the threat and charged him with making a hoax bomb threat, a second degree felony. At 10:40 a.m., an anonymous threat was called into the Bay County Emergency Operations Center about a bomb located in the Panama City Mall. The threat was vague, triggering a massive multi-agency search as law enforcement officials combed through one of the largest public buildings in the city.

The search — which was run by Panama City Police Department and included the Florida Highway Patrol, Bay County Sheriff's Department, Bay County EMS and Panama City Fire Department — took over

two hours. The entire mall parking lot, as well as Red Lobster and Best Buy, was cordoned off by police, but some employees worried about being late for work kept slipping in through the nearby Starbucks parking lot.

Most were shocked when they learned was going on. While they found it hard to believe there was a bomb in the mall, many were unsettled.

"This happens everywhere else, but you never expect it to happen here," said Katlyn Davis, an employee at Dillard's.

"I don't want to go in later," said Autumn Barlow. "What if it's in the one shoebox they didn't search?" While the search was going on, at a separate scene, police were working a different angle.

All calls to 911 are tracked by GPS, and the anonymous call traced back to 804 Detroit Avenue in Springfield, where officers located Whitehead. According

to the affidavit, officers were able to ascertain that Whitehead's phone was the one used to call 911, and arrested him. Police said Whitehead has not "been cooperating" or said why he allegedly called in the hoax. Springfield Police helped with Whitehead's arrest.

Whitehead has an active case in court for dealing drugs, and has been found guilty of misdemeanors in the past.

This is not the first time an explosive device, or the threat of one, has emptied the mall. In 1996, a pipe bomb was found in the JC Penny parking lot, zipped into a notebook. Two teenagers were later charged in connection and the device safely detonated in the woods.

and neighbors and serving our communities in Northwest Florida," he later added in a statement Monday.

The deal would expand NextEra Energy's already-massive footprint in the state. Its Florida Power & Light subsidiary is by far the largest electric utility in Florida, serving nearly 5 million customers. Gulf Power, with about 450,000 customers in eight counties, is the largest utility in the Panhandle.

Florida City Gas has about 110,000 residential and commercial natural-gas customers in Miami-Dade, Brevard, St. Lucie and Indian River counties.

NextEra said it will buy a 100 percent ownership interest in a power plant near Cocoa known as Plant Oleander, which has contracts to sell electricity to the Florida Municipal Power Agency and Seminole Electric Cooperative. It also will buy a 65 percent stake in a generating unit, known as Stanton A, at the Stanton Energy Center complex near Orlando. The unit

is jointly owned by The Southern Company, the Orlando Utilities Commission, the Kissimmee Utility Authority and the Florida Municipal Power Agency, according to information on The Southern Company website.

"These transactions will provide meaningful benefits for the state of Florida, and Gulf Power and Florida City Gas customers, as well as NextEra Energy shareholders," Jim Robo, chairman and chief executive officer of NextEra Energy, said in a prepared statement. "Importantly, these transactions are consistent with our long-standing, disciplined approach of maintaining the strength of our balance sheet and credit ratings, both of which are among the strongest in the industry."

NextEra Energy plans to finance the deal through the issuance of new debt, according to the announcement. The \$6.475 billion total includes NextEra Energy assuming \$1.4 billion of Gulf Power debt.

Subsidiaries of The Southern Company, which is based in Atlanta, operate in numerous states. In addition to Gulf Power, the subsidiaries include Alabama

Power, Georgia Power and Mississippi Power. The Florida Public Service Commission last year approved a settlement agreement that set base rates for Gulf Power.

In the announcement, NextEra Energy said that with the addition of Gulf Power, Florida City Gas and the power plants, the Juno Beach-based company "will be even better positioned to generate long-term shareholder value through a more robust financial profile, greater scale and an expanded platform for growth."

But the Southern Alliance for Clean Energy, which frequently intervenes in utility cases in Florida, expressed concern Monday about the purchase.

"While Southern Alliance for Clean Energy is still reviewing this deal, it raises concerns that any one monopoly utility would control such a significant percentage of Florida's energy market," the Southern Alliance for Clean Energy said in a prepared statement. "Such consolidation of control may limit competition at a time when we need more and not less."

## US demands changes in Iran policies

**Secretary of State Pompeo threatens 'the strongest sanctions in history' if Iran does not stop 'malign activities'**

WASHINGTON — The Trump administration on Monday demanded that Iran make wholesale changes in its military and regional policies or face “the strongest sanctions in history,” as it sought to turn up heat on Tehran after President Donald Trump’s decision to withdraw from a landmark nuclear deal.

In speech that called Iran out for a wide range of “malign activities” apart from its nuclear program, Secretary of State Mike Pompeo called for the negotiation of a new deal that would go far beyond the single focus of the 2015 agreement and would have the status of a formal treaty. The 2015 deal concluded under the Obama administration dealt only with the nuclear program and was not a treaty but rather a U.N.-endorsed executive agreement between the parties.

Unless such a treaty can be reached, Pompeo warned that Iran would face tough sanctions that would leave it “battling to keep its economy alive.” But he laid out no strategy for convincing Iran, the other participants in the original deal — Britain, China, France, Germany, Russia and the European Union — or others to open such a negotiation.

by the time we are complete,” Pompeo said at the conservative Heritage Foundation in his first major policy speech since taking over as top diplomat.

Pompeo vowed Trump’s approach would ensure Iran would never develop a nuclear weapon. A new pact should require that Iran stop enrichment of uranium, which was allowed within strict limitations under the previous deal. Iran would also have to walk away from core pillars of its foreign policy, including its involvement in Syria, Yemen, Lebanon and Afghanistan, he said.

“This list may seem long to some, but it is simply a reflection of the massive scope of

Iranian malign behavior,” Pompeo said. “America did not create this need for changed behavior. Iran did.”

In response, Iranian President Hassan Rouhani described Pompeo’s speech as unacceptable and took issue with the fact that the secretary of state previously led the CIA, long demonized in Iran for its role in a 1953 coup.

“A guy who had been active in an espionage center for years now wants to make a decision for Iran and other countries from the position of a foreign minister. It is not acceptable under any circumstance,” Rouhani said to a group of university teachers in Tehran.

“Who are you to make a decision for Iran and the world and to tell Iran what to do and what not to do in the nuclear field?”

Pompeo did offer Iran a series of dramatic potential U.S. concessions if it agrees to make “major changes.” Under a new agreement, the U.S. would be willing to lift all sanctions, restore full diplomatic and commercial ties with Iran and even support the modernization of its economy, Pompeo said.

“It is America’s hope that our labors toward peace and security will bear fruit for the long-suffering people of Iran,” Pompeo said.

Still, Pompeo’s list of 12 requirements included many that Iran is highly unlikely to consider. He said Iran must allow nuclear inspectors “unqualified access to all sites throughout the country,” Pompeo said, alluding to military sites that were off-limits under the 2015 deal except under specific circumstances. To that end, he also said Iran must declare all previous efforts to build a nuclear weapon, reopening an issue that the U.N.’s International Atomic Energy Agency has already deemed a closed matter.

Pompeo also demanded that Iran cease from a range of activities throughout the Middle East that have long drawn the ire of the U.S. and its allies. He said Iran must end support for Shiite Houthi rebels in Yemen, “withdraw all forces” from Syria, halt support for its ally Hezbollah and stop threatening Israel. Iran must also “release all U.S. citizens” missing in Iran or being held on “spurious charges,” he said.

Taken together, the demands would require a complete transformation by Iran’s government, and they hardened the perception that the administration is really seeking regime change. A longtime Iran hawk, Pompeo has spoken positively about regime change in the past, but in his confirmation hearing last month he sought to soften that stance.

Laying out Trump’s new approach Monday, Pompeo said he couldn’t put a timeline on how long the strategy might take.

**Ukraine convicts Frenchman for plotting Euro 2016 attacks**

A Ukrainian court has convicted a Frenchman on charges of preparing a terror attack during the 2016 European Championship and buying illegal weapons.

Gregoire Moutaux was also sentenced Monday to six years in prison at the Liuboml District Court in the northwestern Volyn region, according to Ukrainian Prosecutor General’s office spokesman, Andriy Lysenko.

Moutaux was arrested in May 2016 as he tried to leave Ukraine with an arsenal of weapons weeks before the start of the tournament hosted by France. Ukrainian security services had followed the man and allowed him to buy weapons and explosives in a sting operation.

### TOKYO

**Japanese female journalists report sexual misconduct**

A survey of women working for Japanese newspapers and TV networks has found 150 cases of alleged sexual misconduct reported by 35 women, about one-third of it involving lawmakers, government officials and law enforcers, a researcher said Monday.

Osaka International University Professor Mayumi Taniguchi, a gender studies expert, said the survey was prompted by a recent and widely publicized case of alleged sexual mistreatment of a journalist by a senior finance ministry official.

She said 40 percent of the cases reportedly occurred at the journalists’ workplaces and the remainder involved their news sources and others.

**Honduran drug kingpin gets life in US prison**

A convicted Honduran drug kingpin whose cocaine supplied the Mexican cartel headed by the trafficker known as “El Chapo” has been sentenced to life in U.S. prison.

Court records show a Miami federal judge imposed the sentence Monday on 41-year-old Sergio Neftali Mejia-Duarte. He was convicted by a jury in January of cocaine trafficking charges involving tons of the drug.

Trial testimony showed that Mejia-Duarte used speedboats, helicopters and airplanes to smuggle cocaine into the U.S. Witnesses testified that much of the cocaine was supplied to the Sinaola Cartel headed by Joaquin Guzman Loera, also known as “El Chapo.”

### LONDON

**Markle nephew warned over knife at nightclub**

Meghan Markle’s nephew was given a warning by police after trying to take a knife into a London nightclub, hours after the royal wedding, the Sun newspaper reported Monday.

The tabloid said 25-year-old Tyler Dooley, nephew of the now Duchess of Sussex, admitted having the knife at the Bacchus nightclub in the London suburb of Kingston early Sunday.

The Sun reported, citing an anonymous source, that Dooley told club staff he brought the knife from the U.S. because President Donald Trump had warned London wasn’t safe.

Trump said this month that rising knife crime had left some London hospitals like a “war zone.”



The famed Barossa Valley wine region of Australia is about an hour's drive from the exotic and bustling city of Adelaide. As expected, I was captivated by the beauty of rolling hills covered in rows of green and yellowing grape leaves, telltale colors to signal the end of harvest season. But what I didn't expect was to see a kangaroo hopping through the vineyard at St. Hugo winery. Wow.

Kangaroo-spotting was not on my itinerary for another three days, pending a half-hour flight over to Kangaroo Island. Yet, there one was, right before my eyes. That's Australia. Now, on to Kangaroo Island.

In 1802, British explorer Matthew Flinders landed on this island 70 miles southwest of Adelaide and named it for its primary inhabitants, kangaroos. This third-largest island off the Australian coast attracted European seal hunters and whalers in the early 19th century. Back on land, these seamen were on a mission to prevent the extinction of an Australian icon, the koala. They introduced 18 koalas to the island and planted 100 species of eucalyptus trees.

Today, the koala population is a robust 30,000, and the

fuzzy creatures choose to dine on only five types of eucalyptus. I became so obsessed with koala-spotting that I almost forgot about seeing kangaroos, but that would soon change.

On this island, kangaroos far outnumber the human population of 4,500. This place is almost a zoo without cages.

I soon arrived at the remote and ultra-luxurious Southern Ocean Lodge, 21 modern rooms located "in the bush" and on the water's edge where the South Pacific and Indian oceans meet, with views (and amenities) to die for. I enjoyed a lunch of crisped local garfish with a caper and dill emulsion, accompanied by fried potatoes, while sipping a crisp Coriole Chenin Blanc from the McLaren Vale wine region.

As a post-lunch workout, I signed up for the hotel's afternoon exploration of the cliffs overlooking the beach. Spectacular crashing waves illustrate why the island has a long history of shipwrecks on this spot. I also got a lesson on bush plants surrounding and leading to the hotel's curved, panoramic lobby. I was fascinated with samphire, or sea bean, which grows as beaded shoots in shades of green, purple and red. This salty succulent is prized by southern Australian chefs, who add it as a topping to many dishes.

### Samphire Spaghetti

Serves 4

- 2/3 cup samphire (order online if you can't find in a local specialty store)
- 2 cups spaghetti
- Sea salt and freshly ground pepper, to taste
- Olive oil
- A few knobs of butter
- 2 salmon fillets
- 1/2 red pepper, finely chopped (more or less, to taste)
- 1-2 cloves garlic (to taste), crushed
- 1 lemon, juice and zest

Plunge your spaghetti into a pot of boiling water. Add a good pinch of salt and a splash of olive oil. Cook for 12 minutes or until al dente.

While it cooks, get a frying pan hot. Season your fish. Add a knob of butter. Lower heat to medium. Cook skin side down until you can see the fish starting to cook through a little, about 5 minutes. Flip. Cook for another 3-5 minutes. The flesh will easily flake away from the skin when it's done.

Toss the red pepper and the garlic in the pan to cook a little in the residual heat.

Add the samphire to the pasta water right before draining it. Toss drained pasta and samphire with a knob of butter. Flake the salmon away from the skin and toss the flesh and the garlic and red pepper in with the pasta.

Add a good hit of fresh pepper and the juice and zest of the lemon. Taste. Adjust seasoning as needed. Serve warm.

### Goodell details NFL's stance on sports gambling

NFL commissioner Roger Goodell says Congress should enact uniform standards for any states that plan to legislate sports betting. Goodell detailed the league's position in a statement Monday that reiterated the NFL's stance that legalized sports gambling in the United States should be governed by federal law rather than state law. The Supreme Court ruled last week to strike down a 1992 law that barred most state-authorized sports gambling.

In suggesting four core principles that should be maintained for any form of legalized sports betting, Goodell stressed that leagues can "protect our content and intellectual property from those who attempt to steal or misuse it." He also said guidelines must provide substantial consumer protections; ensure fans will have access to official, reliable league data; and that law enforcement will have the resources, monitoring and enforcement tools necessary "to protect our fans and penalize bad actors here at home and abroad."

### BATON ROUGE, LA. LSU lands former Ohio State QB as grad transfer

Former Ohio State quarterback Joe Burrow is transferring to LSU, where he will be eligible to play immediately and compete for the Tigers' starting job.

LSU on Monday announced the addition of Burrow, who recently graduated from Ohio State and has two years of eligibility remaining. He spent three seasons at Ohio State but was never able to work his way to the top of a crowded depth chart that included J.T. Barrett over the last four seasons.

Burrow, who went to high school in Athens, Ohio, redshirted in 2015 and then spent two seasons as a reserve. His 2017 season was disrupted by an injury to his throwing hand. In 10 games at Ohio State, he was 29 for 39 for 287 yards passing, with two touchdowns.

### WASHINGTON USOC hires FBI executive as its safety director

The U.S. Olympic Committee hired an FBI executive as senior director of athlete safety, marking its latest effort to strengthen sex-abuse policies that are being rewritten in the wake of cases involving Olympic athletes. Wendy Guthrie comes to the USOC after spending the past six years as senior executive of human resources at the FBI. Before that, she held high-ranking jobs at the Northwest and West Coast Conferences in college sports.

## 'Welcome to Impossible'

### Stanley Cup-bound Vegas turning impossible into possible

LAS VEGAS — Welcome to Impossible.

Those words have been projected onto the ice in big, bold letters at T-Mobile Arena before each game during the Stanley Cup Playoffs. Well, the Vegas Golden Knights are turning impossible into possible.

The stunningly successful expansion squad is headed to the Stanley Cup Final after beating the Winnipeg Jets 2-1 on Sunday to win the Western Conference final series in five games.

"I remember eight months ago, when we won against Dallas (in the season opener), we had that unbelievable feeling," Vegas center Pierre-Edouard Bellemare said. "Doesn't feel like we're satisfied. It's a good feeling when you know the guys are excited for the next one."

The Golden Knights are the third franchise in NHL history to clinch a berth in the Stanley Cup Final in its inaugural season, joining the Toronto Arenas in 1918 in the league's early days, and St. Louis Blues in 1968, when all six expansion teams were in the same division and one of them had to make the final round.

Vegas will play either Tampa Bay or Washington on hockey's biggest stage. The Lightning lead the Eastern Conference final 3-2, but the Capitals host Game 6 on Monday night.

"Either way, we're not going to be favorites," said Jonathan Marchessault, who leads Vegas with 18 points in the postseason. "That's been the case all year. Tampa has been the best team all year. Washington, (they're) playing great hockey right now. Either way, we're not going to be favorites, and that's fine with us. We went all year like that and we're going to keep going."

Hence, "The Golden Misfits"

Nobody could have scripted Vegas, a 500-1 long shot at the start of the season, making the playoffs — let alone earning a shot at Lord Stanley's Cup.

But the Golden Knights, who finished fifth in the league during the regular season, just knocked off the No. 2 team in the regular season in Winnipeg, which in the conference semifinals knocked off the No. 1 team in the regular season, Nashville.

Vegas clinched all three of its Western Conference series on the road, becoming the seventh team in NHL history to accomplish such a feat.

"Everybody on this team has something to prove," said Winnipeg native Ryan Reaves, who scored the winning goal Sunday in his hometown. "We call ourselves 'The Golden Misfits' for a reason. We're doing a good job of proving everybody wrong."

Just as they have all season, they are living in the moment. Vegas, which had just two

players under contract at this time last year, heads into the final round with a 12-3 playoff record after outscoring its Western Conference opponents 42-27.

It's a credit to coach Gerard Gallant's philosophy of having a well-conditioned, confident group of forwards who work well together, focus on short effective shifts, and exude confidence on the ice — all while, as he reiterates it daily, playing 200 feet of hockey.

And while the Golden Knights haven't necessarily been a high-scoring threat, scoring just three or fewer goals in 12 of their 15 playoff games, their defensemen have played exceptional to this point. Vegas has allowed the least amount of goals in the playoffs, among teams that have played 10 games. It was a stifling and disruptive defense that helped propel the Golden Knights past the Jets on Sunday, with their sixth win in eight road games during the postseason.

## After a year lost, Bowen seeks answers

Brian Bowen had the opportunity to spend a couple of days last week playing in real basketball games, replete with scoreboards and referees and with every courtside seat filled.

It's unclear when he'll be able to do that again.

Bowen might have been one of the most talked-about players in NCAA basketball over the last year, without so much as playing a single second of a game. He's the one-time Louisville commit who left amid massive scandal — the federal probe into the college game, including allegations that his father took money during the recruiting process — and subsequently transferred to South Carolina.

But the NCAA hasn't cleared him yet. It might not. So he's taking a long look at the NBA, and Bowen's invitation to the draft combine last week was a fact-finding mission that will help him decide whether to formally turn pro or return to school with hopes that his collegiate eligibility will be restored so he can play with the Gamecocks.

"It's the biggest thing I've ever been through in my life," Bowen said after one of his 5-on-5 games at the combine. "They took the game away from me, a game I truly love. It made me realize how much passion and love I do have for the game. I put that into my workouts every day and I go as hard as I can."

The 6-foot-7 Bowen of Saginaw, Michigan has until the end of the month to decide whether to keep his name in the draft or not. The draft itself is June 21. And there's been no indication if the NCAA will offer him any clarity before he has not make his stay-or-go choice.

"My lawyer and the school are dealing with it," Bowen said.

His is a most curious case, even in a draft that has a handful of players who have been tainted on some level by the ongoing mess that reverberated through the college game last season and probably will continue having a ripple effect for the foreseeable future.

## Data confirmation

**From airlines to pizza parlors, EU businesses adopt info retention law**

LONDON — Lisa Meyer's hair salon is a cozy place where her mother serves homemade macaroons, children climb on chairs and customers chat above the whirr of hairdryers.

Most of the time Meyer is focused on hairstyles, color trends and keeping up with appointments. But now she's worried about how the European Union's new data protection law will affect her business as she contacts customers to seek permission to store their details. Even though she supports the law, Meyer fears it may cut her mailing list by 90 percent as people choose to withhold their data or simply overlook her emails.

"It will be difficult to market upcoming events," she said at her shop, Lisa Hauck Hair & Beauty in London.

Businesses from pizza parlors to airlines across the EU's 28 countries are bombarding customers with emails seeking consent to use personal data as they rush to comply with the bloc's General Data Protection Regulation, which takes effect Friday.

The new rules, called GDPR for short, are

designed to make it easier for EU residents to give and withdraw permission for companies to use personal information, requiring consent forms that are written in simple language and no more than one page long. Companies that already hold such data have to reach out to customers and ask for permission to retain it. Authorities can fine companies up to 4 percent of annual revenue or 20 million euros (\$23.6 million), whichever is higher, for breaching the rules.

Regulators say the law applies to anyone who collects, uses or stores personal data. That can be a burden for small businesses that are forced to hire outside lawyers or consultants

because they don't have the staff or expertise to deal with the law.

The EU's one-size-fits-all approach is one of the flaws in the law, according to Max Schrems, an Austrian privacy advocate who has formed a non-profit to take action against big companies that deliberately violate the new rules.

When the rules were being discussed, industry lobbyists sought to weaken the law by creating uncertainty, and as a result there are no clear guidelines that exempt small companies, Schrems told the BBC recently.

"GDPR is a prime example of corporate law gone wrong, because it's helpful for big companies," he said. "They have to do all of

this anyways and they can use the uncertainty in the law to kind of get around things. But it leaves small companies that don't ... have a law department, or something like that, in a situation with a lot of uncertainty."

Meyer falls under the new rules' jurisdiction because she keeps data. Like many hair colorists, she keeps a card on each of her clients that notes whether they are allergic to any chemicals used in the dyes. That's considered personal medical information that must be protected.

"I find it actually quite scary how data is being used so carelessly," Meyer said. "It's a good wake-up call. It's made me more aware."

## Zuckerberg meeting with EU parliament leaders to be webcast

BRUSSELS — Facebook CEO Mark Zuckerberg has agreed to have his meeting Tuesday with the leaders of the European parliament about data privacy be broadcast publicly through web streaming.

The evening meeting with leaders of the political groups and a justice and civil rights expert was long expected to be private.

But many in the European Parliament had been calling for

an on-air grilling for Zuckerberg to explain his company's role in a scandal about the misuse of customer data.

European Parliament President Antonio Tajani said in a statement Monday that after discussing the issue with Zuckerberg "I am glad to announce that he has accepted this new request."

Tajani called it "great news for EU citizens. I thank him for the respect" shown for the EU legislature.

## Hope for US-China progress boosts stocks

NEW YORK — Industrial and technology companies led stocks to solid gains Monday after the U.S. and China appeared to make significant progress in trade talks. That helped ease concerns among investors that the world's two biggest economies might be headed for a trade war.

After another round of talks, the two countries agreed not to place tariffs on goods imported from the other. The Chinese government said it will buy more U.S. goods, including energy and agricultural products, while Treasury Secretary Steven Mnuchin said the U.S. postponed its proposal to put tariffs on up to \$150 billion in goods from China. The two sides gave no indication of how much progress they had made toward ending their dispute entirely and both said hostilities could increase again.

Mark Hackett, chief of investment research at Nationwide Investment Management, said investors overreacted to the possibility of a trade war and they may be slowly learning to take a more patient approach with statements by the Trump administration and other nations, which is a good thing, Hackett says, because future administrations may borrow from Trump's aggressive style.

"Treating Trump literally is destructive for investors," he said. "There's a lot of these issues where there are going to be hyperbolic statements made in the public sphere by both sides."

The S&P 500 index climbed 20.04 points, or 0.7 percent, to 2,733.01. The Dow Jones industrial average rose as much as

371 points during the morning and finished with a gain of 298.20 points, or 1.2 percent, to 25,013.29. The Nasdaq composite gained 39.70 points, or 0.5 percent, to 7,394.04. The Russell 2000 index of smaller-company stocks set another record close as it jumped 10.81 points, or 0.7 percent, to 1,637.44.

All 11 sectors in the S&P 500 index finished higher. Among industrials, Boeing gained 3.6 percent to \$363.92 and construction equipment maker Caterpillar rose 2.1 percent to \$158.92. In the financial sector, Bank of New York Mellon added 1.3 percent to \$57.72 and JPMorgan Chase rose 0.9 percent to \$112.15.

Trade disputes have occupied a lot of investors' attention for the last two months. Stocks have rallied on signs progress was being made, only to fall back when the situation appeared to worsen. Hackett said Wall Street could get over its trade worries relatively quickly if talks go well.

If that happens, he said stocks could be set for further gains because they are still below their early 2018 highs and analysts expect stronger earnings growth, which makes stock prices seem less expensive.

General Electric rose 1.9 percent to \$15.26 after announcing that its train engine division will combine with railroad equipment maker Westinghouse Air Brake Technologies in deal worth \$11.1 billion. It's the latest step by GE's CEO, John Flannery, to break off parts of the conglomerate. GE will get \$2.9 billion in cash and will own 50.1 percent of the combined company, and the deal will help it narrow its business down to the aviation, health care and energy industries.

General Electric announces \$11B rail deal

General Electric will tie its train engine division to the railroad equipment maker Wabtec in deal worth about \$11 billion as GE CEO John Flannery continues to break off parts of the conglomerate.

Wabtec CEO Raymond Betler will lead the combined company and its chairman, Albert Neupaver, will be executive chairman.

Under the deal announced Monday and approved by the boards of both companies, General Electric Co. will get \$2.9 billion in cash. The deal is expected to close early next year.

Ameren Missouri plans 400-megawatt wind farm

Ameren Missouri announced plans Monday for a 400-megawatt wind farm in rural northeast Missouri, creating enough power to serve 120,000 homes within two years.

St. Louis-based Ameren said its High Prairie Wind Farm near Kirksville will be the largest in the state. Ajay Arora, vice president of power operations and energy management at Ameren Missouri, called it a significant step toward Ameren's goal of reducing carbon emissions 80 percent by 2050.

"What's most important for our customers is to have a balanced energy mix," Arora said in an interview. "That would be a combination of hydro, nuclear, natural gas, coal, wind, solar. Our portfolio has it all. And that provides the affordability and reliability that our customers expect."



## Fighting the heart

As I have taken the first few steps on my journey of parenting an adult, I have realized that my spirit and my heart are fighting a constant battle. The heart wants to make it all better. I tend to lead with my heart which I'm learning is not necessarily in alignment with what the Bible tells me.

Mercy and grace are some things that I want in my everyday life. I have in my everyday life. God's mercy and grace is upon us. That said, I struggle with smoothing everything over in the name of mercy and grace.

An episode of "That 70 s Show" comes to mind. In it, the parents finally catch the kids behaving inappropriately and the father brings down the hammer.

Nailing windows shut, doing bed checks, sitting guard over curfew at the doors. The whole process brings about absolute misery in the house. Finally the mother announces that she wants her house back, her life back, and to do that they are going to pretend like nothing wrong happened and everyone is going back to normal. Then within a few seconds, everything goes back to normal and the credits run.

How I wish my life was like a television show.

Except you can't pretend like nothing happened. You can't parent with your eyes closed and you certainly can't force everything to go back the way it was.

In Jesus' parable of The Prodigal Son, we are reminded that it is always possible to come home. The father held his arms open wide and with such devotion

and love announced a feast to celebrate the homecoming of his wayward child. A true testimony to God's love for us and his grace.

Notice however that when the father addressed his other son, who was upset and concerned, the father assured him that he remembered that he was always with him. That he had never left him and that all the father had was his. While the father welcomed home his wayward son, he wasn't ignoring the consequences of the son's actions.

This is a reminder that regardless of what choices we make, we can always go home, we can always get a fresh start, but we aren't free from the consequences of our actions.

When I dig into the subject, it's hard as a parent. Having one child come to you and demand their

inheritance, which is given upon one's death typically, must hurt. I can't imagine standing before my parent and basically wishing they were dead so that I could have money to do as I wanted. But this is the reality that the father had.

Instead of saying, "no, go clean out the camel shed and think twice about being rude," the father gave his son what he asked for. Again I can't imagine that father watching as his son left — my heart breaks just thinking of it.

Yet we are all that son in one way or another. We have all stood before God, our Father, and shamed him. We have asked for things that aren't ours, done things that we knew better than to do... and yet his arms are wide open and his grace is good.

We will constantly find ourselves on the wrong side

of this parable. Because while God gave us free will and forgiveness... he does not protect us from the consequences of our actions. We reap what we sow.

These are the battles we face in life. So as a parent, I have to base my approach on how our Father deals with us when we are wayward and disobedient... I need to follow what my spirit tells me versus what my heart says. My spirit says to hold strong to the Lord in my time of need. That everyone has to learn their own path. That you can love someone and not approve or accept their current path. Just like the father in the parable, you can send one out with love and know that one day, they will repent and return to the fold.

My spirit says that one day we come to our senses and return to our Father's fold... just like the Prodigal Son.


