EMS rates rising

County aims to reduce its costs

WASHINGTON COUNTY – With insurance companies only footing part of the bill, an ambulance ride can come at a high price for the customer.

County officials say the county, which operates the service, is in the same boat on the other side of the pond. Rising

costs in supplies means having to raise service costs to local residents, according to Washington County EMS Director Randy Truette.

"A bag of fluids that used to cost us one dollar now costs us seven dollars," said Truette. "We have no choice but to raise our fees. We don't charge nearly as much as some of the bigger counties, but there has been an increase."

Rates in the years 2013-2015 for Basic Life Support (BLS) for non emergencies were

at \$250 and emergencies at \$350. Advanced Life Support (ALS) Level 1 rates started at \$400 and Level 2 at \$600. In the years 2016-2018 BLS for non emergencies rates rose to \$475 and emergencies were at \$575. Rates for ALS Level 1 rose to \$650 and Level 2 to \$800.

ALS Level 1 covers setting the patient up with an IV and or oxygen and transporting to their destination.

Zimmerman's body found, multiple stab wounds

WASHINGTON COUNTY – The grave site of Deena Zimmerman has been located.

Her body sustained numerous stab wounds, officials stated.

"Late yesterday afternoon, a female body, matching the description of Deena Zimmerman was uncovered with numerous injuries which are consistent to stab wounds," a Washington County Sheriff's Office news release stated.

The WCSO reported in a news release Friday afternoon that Zimmerman's grave site was in the eastern portion of Washington County.

The Washington County News has requested additional information from WCSO about the assault and location of the grave site. A WCSO spokesperson responded that the investigation is ongoing and the details provided in the release are all that the sheriff's office is releasing at this time.

Sean and Greg Dowis, were arrested Thursday afternoon on charges relating to Zimmerman's murder.

Sean Dowis, the victim's former live-in boyfriend is currently being held without bond in the Washington County Jail on one open count of murder.

Judge Perry Wells, former PWF chairman, the first event was hosted in 1956 by Deal at his watermelon loading shed as a celebration of a success of the growing season and of those who helped make it possible.

Dunn keeps military, vets in focus

Local rep tapped to lead VA health subcommittee

PANAMA CITY — During Congressman Neal Dunn's first term, 40 percent of his constituents' complaints have been about the VA.

The frequency of those health care concerns, paired with Dunn's 11 years as an Army surgeon, have motivated the freshman U.S. Congressman to focus his political goals on veterans' issues.

Dunn recently was appointed by House Veterans' Affairs Committee Chairman Phil Roe to lead the subcommittee on health. He stopped by The News Herald office Thursday to talk about his new role and veteran-friendly legislation he's pushed through while in office.

On that list, Dunn pointed to the VA Mission Act of 2018, which would replace the Choice Program and allow veterans more private care options, as an example of overhaul efforts that have received mixed reaction from Bay County veterans. The Mission Act has been approved by Congress but still has to be signed by President Donald Trump before it officially becomes law.

"I'm trying not to just rush in and make a lot of changes," Dunn said of his role on the health subcommittee. "The first thing to do is take stock of what we've got. There's a lot of numbers. You're talking about the single largest hospital and health care system in the country."

Dunn's seat is up for election this November

in a district where the military and veterans are a focal point. He is being challenged by Democrats Bob Racleff of Tallahassee and Brandon Peters of Williston.

Legislation introduced by Dunn has become part of the Mission Act, including the Veterans Increased Choice for Transplanted Organs and Recovery (VICTOR) Act, which gives veterans in need of an organ or bone marrow transplant through the VA health care system the ability to seek care at a federally certified transplant center near their home.

Currently, veterans who seek care through the VA and are in need of an organ transplant must go to one of only 14 Veterans Affairs Transplant Centers (VATCs) in the country.

"Transplants are highly, highly time-sensitive operations. They have to be done, and they have to be done quickly," Dunn said. "If you have a guy in Florida who needs a liver transplant, he's got to get to Minneapolis to get to the liver. ... We literally have no VA transplant center in Florida."

The Veterans Opioid Abuse Prevention Act, which seeks to prevent opioid abuse by veterans by connecting VA health

providers to a national network of state-based prescription drug monitoring programs, also was incorporated into the Mission Act.

In addition to veterans' issues, Dunn has also focused on Tyndall Air Force Base, including pushing for upgrades to a F-22 training unit. Dunn included an amendment to "modernize [an] F-22 training wing" by making it combat-ready to the National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA) for Fiscal Year 2019 passed by the House. The NDAA still has to be passed by the Senate and signed by Trump.

The upgrade would cost \$1.5 billion over several years. Combat and non-combat F-22s differ in electronics, sensors and weapons bay features.

"This is easily the cheapest, quickest, most efficient way to increase America's air superiority," Dunn said. "We have had air superiority since World War II, and in order to keep that, we got to take our best air-to-air combat fighters and keep them ready. We're not changing the mission of the wing from training to combat. We're just making the plains utterly combat-ready, which is better training."

Vernon looks to update sewage treatment plant

VERNON — The City of Vernon's sewage treatment plant could see updates made in order to become in compliance with state mandates.

The plant was shut down due to outdated equipment, which left the only place area companies can dump their raw sewage in Port St. Joe, 90 miles away.

Washington County Board of County Commissioners Chairman Tray Hawkins addressed the council when they met in workshop June 4, about this issue saying if it could be reopened, the revenue could go to support it in the years to come.

"If we can get the plant back up and running, the revenue funds could go into an account to use for repairs and updates in the future," said Hawkins.

The approximately \$465,000 cost could come in the form of a Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) to fund the project. Hawkins said the county will also be looking to the state for possible funding for the project.

More discussion and possible action is expected at the next regular session council meeting.

Bids for the repaving of the Sportsplex were opened and are also expected to be voted on in regular session. Football and Cheerleading signups are underway as well. The baseball awards banquet is set for June 12 at 6 p.m. at the Sportsplex, council members are expected to be in attendance.

Vernon Fire Department Captain John Williamson addressed the council about ongoing issues that he says are a health hazard saying that they were supposed to come to a decision by June 4.

"We were told these issues would have a decision made by tonight," said Williamson.

President Gary Owens responded that a decision was not able to be made tonight and would be up again for discussion at the June 18 meeting.

"Two of our council members and the mayor will meet with you as soon as possible," he said.

At which point Williamson approached the council and laid his key on the table stating, "Here is my key to the office, I am out of the Vernon Fire Department," Williamson said. "The next conversation will be with lawyers. See ya."

Council members were unable to answer questions regarding the issues at hand but advised they would be addressed at the fire departments meeting on June 5.

Vernon City Council will meet again in regular session on June 18 at 6 p.m.

Unemployment down from March

WASHINGTON COUNTY - Washington County showed an improvement in unemployment rates over last month.

While Florida's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate for

April stayed the same as March this year, Washington County improved 0.3 percent for the same period. The county also improved 0.4 percent year over year, as was also reflected by the state's unemployment rates.

According to CareerSource Chipola, the region, which includes Calhoun, Holmes, Jackson, Liberty and

Washington, had an employment rate of 3.7 percent - 0.6 percent lower than the rate a year ago.

There were 1,519 unemployed residents in the region for the same period.

The labor force for the region also improved, adding 140 jobs over the year and bringing the force number to 41,592.

His brother, Greg Dowis, has a bond set in the amount of \$150,000 on the charge of accessory after the fact to murder,

the release stated. Both suspects confessed Greg Dowis assisted Sean Dowis with disposing Zimmerman's body.

"As relieved as we are that these guys are behind bars for this crime, our hearts are broken for Ms. Zimmerman's family,"

WCSO Sheriff Kevin Crews stated. "Our worst fears were realized in this case. No family should ever have to endure a loss such as this and we are grateful for a community that has rallied around this family and our agency throughout this investigation."

State stifling the voice of the voters

A constitutional amendment, in its purest form, allows the voice of the people to rise above — and override — the partisan bickering of politics and endless red tape of state bureaucracy. It's power to the people, pure and simple

So why doesn't it work?
Two full years ago, Floridians spoke both loud and clear on Amendment 2: Medical Marijuana. Pundits thought the issue was a toss-up on that 2016 ballot initiative. It takes 60 percent of registered voters to pass a constitutional amendment.

Pundits were wrong.
The amendment supporting the legalization of medical marijuana steamrolled the opposition statewide with 71.3 percent of the vote. Okaloosa, Santa Rosa and Walton counties were in line with that number at a combined 71.2 percent.

So why isn't it working?
Here is all we need to show exactly what the will of the voters was on that Tuesday in November 2016, the ballot summary:

"Allows medical use of marijuana for individuals with debilitating medical conditions as determined by a licensed Florida physician. Allows caregivers to assist patients' medical use of marijuana. The Department of Health shall register and regulate centers that produce and distribute marijuana for medical purposes and shall issue identification cards to patients and caregivers. Applies only to Florida law. Does not immunize violations of federal law or any non-medical use, possession or production of marijuana."
That's it.

Voters were not unleashing widespread abuse of devil weed. And there was clear, empirical evidence that marijuana helped ease symptoms of pain in a significant and suffering segment of society.

Since 2016, the issue has met with a fate too familiar to us all when Tallahassee sticks its snout into meaningful medicine. Caveats abound, driven by campaign contributions and backroom deals.

The main thrust of the smokescreen meant to talk the issue to death, is the difference between pot that's "taken" and pot that's "smoked."

What difference does it make? If marijuana is medically legal — and we said it was — who cares how it's delivered?

Just last week, a Leon County circuit judge ruled that smokable marijuana is allowed under wording of the 2016 amendment.

Not surprisingly, the Florida Department of Health immediately appealed the ruling. Plaintiffs in the original ruling are asking Judge Karen Gievers to clear the way for her ruling to take effect — now.


None of this would be necessary, had the Legislature not hedged its campaign finance bets, passing a law in the spring that barred patients from "smoking" medical marijuana. Read that, they passed a law overturning what Amendment 2 clearly stated and voters clearly upheld.

Their reasoning? Smoking can cause health problems. How seriously would the potential effects a decade down the road be to patients currently suffering with Lou Gehrig's Disease or HIV?

Isn't it time to drop the charade and let those who can benefit do so?

Sadly, Roseanne is a victim to some

Words matter. What we say to each other, how we treat each other matters.

There are basic norms of civilized behavior, outside the realm of politics, beyond the reach of cable network news, that we should all be able to agree upon.

One of them is that, if you call an African-American woman an "ape," that you are the worst kind of vile racist. And you deserve whatever scorn, whatever vitriol, whatever criticism that comes your way as a result of your actions.

It shouldn't be hard to call racist remarks racist. It shouldn't be hard to decry a viciously personal and apparently unprovoked attack.

But because of the remove of social media, because the forces at the very top of the American power structure have normalized the worst kind of offensive behavior, there's somehow a difference.

Because we live in the times that we do, those same disgusting words, uttered by the comedienne Roseanne Barr, about the former Obama administration adviser Valerie Jarrett, who is African-American, are being inevitably viewed through the filter of partisan politics.

And that means, to some, they are, as shockingly, mystifyingly, horrifyingly as it seems, entirely acceptable.

And to them, Barr - not Jarrett - is a victim.

That sadly unsurprising sentiment came through loud and clear on Wednesday morning when a reader decided to share his views on my office voicemail.

"Yes, I would like to show my support for Roseanne Barr," he began. "The Muslim Brotherhood, The Planet of the Apes. Yeah, you have a perfect Valerie Jarrett. I studied this picture last night. What's wrong with saying something like that? Oh, all the butt-hurt liberal media. You know what? I hope they all drop dead because Roseanne is right. And that lady ... woman is a b***h anyway."

That's one of your neighbors. One of your colleagues. The guy in front of you in

the supermarket check-out line. The person sitting next to you in church.

That's the hateful voice of racism here in central Pennsylvania. And if he were the only one, a lone whack-job crying out in the wilderness, that'd be one thing.

But he's not.

He's the torch-bearing, Nazi-flag waving white supremacist who marched in Charlottesville last year.

He's the extreme end of a spectrum that starts with the sort of ignorant prejudice that prompted Starbucks to close its shops on Tuesday to conduct sensitivity training for its employees.

But sometimes they don't march. Sometimes they wear suits. And they run for Congress.

Preparing for the 2018 hurricane season

WASHINGTON AND HOLMES COUNTIES - The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration predicts a 75-percent chance of a normal or close to normal hurricane season. And although that beats out last year's extremely active season - that brought us category 5 hurricanes Maria and Irma - local emergency management officials advise to take the 2018 hurricane season seriously.

"Anytime you're in the Gulf Coast region, then you take it seriously," said Washington County Fire Services Coordinator Rick Kerr, whose office in out of and coordinates with the county's emergency management. "For example, (subtropical storm Alberto) spun up before the hurricane season even started. If the Gulf waters were a bit hotter, it could have intensified to a category 1 hurricane."

"So, it can happen at any time," he said.

National public service website Ready.gov offers a few basic preparedness tips: have an evacuation plan and route, assemble go-bags that include flashlights, batteries, cash, first aid supplies, medications and copies of critical information, plan for adequate supplies (waters, nonperishable food, etc.) if you decide to stay home, and be sure to sign up for local emergency alerts.

"Everybody in their family needs to understand what

Supplies Kit

To assemble your kit, store items in airtight plastic bags and put your entire disaster supplies kit in one or two easy-to-carry containers such as plastic bins or a duffel bag.

A basic emergency supply kit could include the following recommended items:


Water - one gallon of water per person per day for at least three days, for drinking and sanitation

- Food - at least a three-day supply of non-perishable food
- Battery-powered or hand crank radio and a NOAA

Weather Radio with tone alert

- Flashlight
- First aid kit
- Extra batteries
- Whistle to signal for help
- Dust mask to help filter contaminated air and plastic sheeting and duct tape to shelter-in-place
- Moist towelettes, garbage bags and plastic ties for personal sanitation
- Wrench or pliers to turn off utilities
- Manual can opener for food
- Local maps
- Cell phone with chargers and a backup battery

the evacuation plan is," said Wendy Mayor, Director of Emergency Management in Holmes County. "They need to know where they will evacuate to; their shelters that are located in their counties."

Mayo and Kerr recommend each family prepare per person three to seven days of food, water and medications. First aid kits and other supply kits should be prepared, as well, officials said.

NOAA predicts a 10 out of 16 named storms (winds of 39 miles per hour or higher), of which five to nine could become hurricanes (winds of 74 miles per hour or higher) and one to four major hurricanes (category 3, 4 or 5; with winds of 111 miles per hour or higher).

Both counties open emergency shelters when a state of emergency is communicated

or declared by state officials. Call the respective offices for more information.

Mark Mauldin, UF/IFAS Extension Agent for Washington County, reminds people to make preparations for their livestock and pets.

"We worry about water with pasture animals," Mauldin said. "Have a plan to get water to your animals in the event that power gives out for an extended period of time."

It is recommended that back-up generators be used to power water supply for the pastures; however, in an extreme emergency, it's okay to give livestock access to surface water, such as ponds.

"Animal identification is also important," he noted. "In the event that cows roaming, it helps to sort things out if the animals are tagged, at

least."

Clay roads become slick and dangerous after or during heavy rains. Staying off the road is one of the best ways to keep you and others safe, also, frees up roadways for emergency vehicles to get to downed power lines, trees or residents in need, officials said.

"You never know how quickly things can change in the storms, watch and pay attention to the watches and warnings issued," Mayo said. "I know it has been a while since we've had anything active -- Irma last year was the first in 10 years; (but) it only takes one storm."

From lists of local shelter location to storm tracking charts to special needs registry, which provides special

assistance to individuals with special needs, the local offices have a wealth of resources to help residence get prepared.

"We just want to encourage all of our residents to be prepared, don't be complacent. have a storm kit and remember that readiness is everybody's job," Mayo concluded.

Volcano death toll expected to rise

Guatemala's disaster agency says hot ash and mud have already killed 62 people

EL RODEO, Guatemala — Rescuers pulled survivors and bodies Monday from the charred aftermath of the powerful eruption of Guatemala's Volcano of Fire, as the death toll rose to 62 and was expected to go higher from a disaster that caught residents of remote mountain hamlets off guard, with little or no time to flee to safety.

Using shovels and backhoes, emergency workers dug through the debris and mud, perilous labor on smoldering terrain still hot enough to melt shoe soles a day after the volcano exploded in a hail of ash, smoke and molten rock.

Bodies were so thickly coated with ash that they looked like statues, and rescuers were forced to use sledgehammers to break through the roofs of houses buried in debris up to their rooflines to try to see if anyone was trapped inside.

Fanuel Garcia, director of the National Institute of Forensic Sciences, said 62 bodies had been recovered and 13 of those had been identified.

"It is very difficult for us to identify them because some of the dead

lost their features or their fingerprints" from the red-hot flows, Garcia said. "We are going to have to resort to other methods ... and if possible take DNA samples to identify them."

Hilda Lopez said her mother and sister were still missing after the slurry of hot gas, ash and rock roared into her village of San Miguel Los Lotes, just below the mountain's flanks.

"We were at a party, celebrating the birth of a baby, when one of the neighbors shouted at us to come out and see the lava that was coming," the distraught woman said.

"We didn't believe it, and when we went out the hot mud was already coming down the street."

"My mother was stuck there, she couldn't get out," said Lopez, weeping and holding her face in her hands.

Her husband, Joel Gonzalez, said his father had also been unable to escape and was believed to be "buried back there, at the house."

Guatemalan authorities say they had been closely monitoring the Volcano of Fire, one of Central America's most active, after activity picked up around 6 a.m. Sunday.

The volcano has registered a number of minor eruptions over the years, and no evacuations were ordered as scientific experts reported the

activity was decreasing.

Guatemala's disaster agency, Conred, issued a number of standard precautions, advising people to wear protective face masks, clean their rooftops of ash once the eruption was over and cover any food and water intended for human consumption.

It also said to heed any recommendations from authorities. Guatemala City's international airport was closed due to the danger to planes.

Conred spokesman David de Leon said that around 2 p.m. the volcano registered a new, more powerful explosion. Soon, searing flows of

lava, ash and rock mixed with water and debris were gushing down the volcano's flanks, blocking roads and burning homes.

"It traveled much faster. It arrived in communities right when the evacuation alerts were being sent out," de Leon said.

Authorities scrambled to issue an evacuation order. Some communities emptied out safely. But in places like Los Lotes and the village of El Rodeo, about eight miles downslope from the crater, it was too late for many.

The fast-moving flows overtook people in homes

and streets with temperatures reaching as high as 1,300 degrees Fahrenheit, and hot ash and volcanic gases that can cause rapid asphyxiation.

Rafael Letran, a resident of El Rodeo, criticized Conred for not evacuating communities earlier.

"When the lava was already here they passed by in their pickup trucks yelling at us to leave, but the cars did not stop to pick up the people," Letran said.

"The government is good at stealing, but when it comes to helping people they lack spark."

De Leon said the disaster agency followed protocol.

"As soon as we received the information around 6 a.m. that the volcano was in an eruptive phase, the protocol was initiated to verify with different sectors and also talk to the communities, to community leaders. ... We had the information from our scientific service, and they told us the trend was that the activity was diminishing," he said.

In El Rodeo on Monday, heavily armed soldiers wearing blue masks to avoid breathing in ash stood guard behind yellow tape cordoning off the disaster scene. Helmeted workers carried bodies away on stretchers, and smoke was still rising from some parts of the ashen landscape strewn with boulders and other debris.

President Jimmy Morales traveled to survey the disaster area.

Emergency crews in helicopters managed to pull at least 10 people alive from areas cut off by the flows. Conred said 3,265 people had been evacuated.







SACRAMENTO, CALIF. **Man agrees to 15-year term for plotting San Francisco attack**

A man who told undercover agents that he wanted to carry out a Christmas Day bombing and shooting attack at a popular San Francisco tourist attraction will receive a 15-year sentence after pleading guilty Monday in a federal case.

Everitt Aaron Jameson, 26, admitted under a plea deal that he attempted to aid a terrorist organization after he planned the attack during talks with undercover FBI agents, including one he thought was with the Islamic State group. Jameson, a former tow-truck driver from Modesto, told undercover federal agents that he planned to use pipe bombs to channel victims into part of Pier 39 so he could shoot them.

NAIROBI, KENYA **Kenya accounting officials to have anti-corruption vetting**

All procurement and accounting officers in Kenya's ministries and state-owned corporations are to leave their offices for fresh screening, an official announced Monday, as President Uhuru Kenyatta's government grapples with endemic corruption.

The officers are to submit personal information including their assets, liabilities and service by Friday, according to a statement signed by

Interior Ministry Spokesman Mwenda Njoka. He said he does not know how many officers will be affected, but some experts say that more than 500 officials will have to step away from their jobs and submit to new scrutiny.

MOGADISHU, SOMALIA **US says airstrike in Somalia kills 27 al-Shabab extremists**

The U.S. military says it has carried out an airstrike in northern Somalia that killed 27 al-Shabab extremists.

The statement issued Monday by the U.S. Africa command said it assesses that no civilians were killed in the attack on Sunday about 26 miles southwest of Bosasso, the commercial capital of the semiautonomous Puntland state. The area has recently seen attacks on local forces by extremists aligned with the Islamic State group.

The Trump administration approved expanded military operations against extremists in Somalia, including al-Shabab, which is linked to al-Qaida and was blamed for the truck bombing in October that killed more than 500 people.

BIDDEFORD, MAINE **George H.W. Bush released from Maine hospital**

Former President George H.W. Bush has left a Maine hospital after more than a week of treatment for low blood pressure and fatigue.

A Bush spokesman tweeted Monday that the president "deeply" appreciates the care and good wishes he has received. Spokesman Jim McGrath also said that Bush is "back to his old self" and looking forward to a summer with family and friends. The 93-year-old Bush was admitted to the hospital on May 27 and was released Monday.

The 41st president posted a picture of himself Friday reading the book "George & Barbara Bush: A Great American Love Story." Bush said the book is "a wonderful walk down memory lane."

ROME **Italy mayor halts school lunch after suspect food poisoning**

The mayor of the Adriatic city of Pescara has suspended the public school lunch service as a precaution after some 80 children and half a dozen teachers were treated at hospital emergency rooms over the weekend for intestinal cramps, diarrhea and vomiting.

Public health officials said Monday they hadn't determined the cause, saying the suspected food poisoning could be from a toxin or bacteria, but not a virus. Most of the children were sent home but a few were admitted to the hospital.

Mayor Marco Alesandrini posted the city ordinance suspending the lunch program on his Facebook page.

1. 3-way fight

2. 14 and 40

Johnson, the seven-time NASCAR champion, led Laps 26 and 27 at Pocono to push away that embarrassing statistic. Now there is that little matter of the 40-race winless streak. He has back-to-back top-10

finishes. "We just need to keep improving, but we're slowly chipping away at it," Johnson said.

3. Better get to it

Don't look now, but the NASCAR Cup Series just passed the halfway point of the regular season, leaving only a dozen races for drivers to get qualified for the playoffs. Kevin Harvick,

Kyle Busch and Martin Truex Jr. have hogged Victory Lane, combining for 11 wins in 14 races. Drivers around the bubble area can hear the clock ticking. "When you are racing (Busch) and (Truex) you are splitting hairs," Harvick said.

It's easy to say no, to assume no one will ever venture away from the Cup Series enough to pile up those numbers. But 15 years ago, we never would've assumed Kyle's numbers being where they are. Remember, nearly 20 years ago we thought it was amazing when Mark Martin got beyond 40 wins in the Xfinity Series (or was it Busch?) as a mere moonlighter. Kyle has more than doubled that.

Chipola Head Coach Jeff Johnson, said, "What a run! This crew showed great resiliency and fortitude! I'm proud for the Chipola Nation!"


Chipola scored eight in the final four innings to secure its third national championship in program history. Along with the 2017 title, the Indians also claimed the 2007 championship.

After dropping its opening game of the World Series to Walters Saturday, May 26, the Indians availed elimination in six consecutive games to win the title, becoming just

the fourth program in tournament history to achieve the feat.

Both sides traded runs in the first inning before Walters built a 5-2 lead through four. A Max Guzman double in the sixth sparked a four-run frame for the Indians while a two-run double from Julio Carrion added to the lead in the seventh. Phillip Sanderson struck out four batters in two perfect relief innings to hold off a rally and complete the repeat championship run.

Chipola becomes the first program to win back-to-back NJCAA DI Baseball World Series championships since Grayson out of Texas in 1999-2000. Chipola Sophomore Morgan McCullough won three individual awards at the tournament - the Jay Tolman Most Outstanding Defensive Player, the Most Outstanding Hitter, and the Preston Walker Most

- Use hardwood coal if you've got it (but briquettes will work). Arrange the coals with the heat under half of the grill.

- Cook your meat gently, then sear at the end.

- Use a thermometer, but if you don't have one, poke or cut the steak.

- Let your meat rest for about a third of the cooking time to prevent moisture loss.

- 16 ounces sugar snap peas

- 1 cup very thinly sliced radishes

- 1 cup thinly sliced and quartered red onion

Dandelions are delicious, with a little prep

We are born into this world loving dandelions. We grow up playing with them, blowing seed heads and rubbing the yellow flowers on our faces.

Somewhere along most of our personal journeys, the grown-ups manage to convince us that dandelions are bad, because of what they do to the grass monocultures that most Americans cultivate instead of food. My wife is the outlier who would have me veer the lawnmower around a dandelion, which are like the sacred cows of our yard. But unlike most people who worship sacred cows, she eats the object of her reverence.

In fact, she's got the whole family doing it, which is no mean feat. Human beings may be born with an appreciation for the aesthetics of dandelions, but not so much for the flavor. You could say it takes work to overcome that bitter hump, but it's really a matter of appreciating the benefits and associating them with those bitter flavors, as I've managed to do with bitter foods like beer, chocolate and coffee.

I try to pay as much attention to how something makes me feel afterward as I do to how it tastes, and dandelions make me feel good. It wasn't surprising to learn they are full of nutrients including carotenes, antioxidants, calcium and vitamin A.

The secret to eating dandelions is a decadent sauce.

Fry it up

The entire plant is edible, from the tip of its tenacious taproot to the bright yellow pollen in the blossom. While bitter is the dominant flavor throughout, there is complexity as well. The flowers have an aromatic flavor that has been likened to banana or licorice.

When you drop a dandelion in butter, some magical stuff happens. The flower waves its petals for a few minutes like a dying creature, and slowly browns, absorbing butter, shrinking down to a crispy nub that tastes like artichoke with a faint, intriguing note of bitterness.

There are two basic approaches to dandelion eating: bury the bitter flavor, or work with it. Either way, a rich sauce is involved. Most examples of burying involve cooking, while the more daring approaches leave the plant raw. We consume bitter greens with a salad dressing of olive oil (2 part), soy sauce (1 part) and mixed vinegars (balsamic, cider, white, lime) (1 part).

But for many of us, the right sauce may be that into which we dip our batter-fried dandelion blossoms. I hit the supermarket for a box of Tony Chachere's seasoned Creole fish fry mix, which contains a mix of corn flour and corn meal, in addition to seasonings. The check-out guys were excited about my dandelion plans.

At home, I made an egg wash so the batter would stick to the dandelion flowers. It contains one beaten egg with a splash of cream, a shake of garlic powder, a few drops of fish sauce and a teaspoon of oyster sauce. Oil from a jar of anchovies would work, too. I dumped the Creole corn coating in a pan, and went outside for some dandelions.

It was sunset, and the sky was beautiful. My wife was in the garden, and all of the dandelion flowers were gone. Every single one. I assumed she was responsible, but she informed me that dandelion flowers close

up at night, so I needed to look a little more closely.

To deep-fry open or closed flowers, first wash them and let them dry. Drop the blossoms in the egg wash, pull them out one at a time, and roll each flower in the breading.

Heat an inch of olive oil to 300 degrees, and drop the flowers in. Cook until they are golden brown all around. Remove and drain.

Going raw

Another approach to eating dandelions is to just eat the yellow petals. If you pinch and squeeze the sepal area behind the petals, you can work them out. They can be added raw to anything, from salad to sushi to pancakes. They make a striking garnish for a soup, and they way they dress up rice is perhaps my favorite way to eat dandelion flowers.

Tossing those bright stamen into the grains of jasmine or basmati rice is kind of like a poor man's saffron rice, with a similar pollen-y glow. Whole dandelion buds can be added too, raw or cooked, to any dish at virtually any point, as can the leaves, typically chopped. Topped with some crumbled nori sheets, soy sauce, sesame oil and hot sauce, the bitter dandelion flavors disappear into a symphony of other strong, wonderful notes.

The bitter power of the dandelion can give pizzazz to the bland and balance any strong flavor, be it spicy, sweet, salty or fatty, and even more bitter.



Trump: US farmers will be treated fairly in trade talks

WASHINGTON — President Donald Trump defended his tough trade negotiations with China, Canada and Mexico on Monday, saying that U.S. farmers have been treated “unfairly.” The president vowed to turn the tide and break down large trade barriers with top trading partners.

Trump opened the week with a series of tweets pointing to his ongoing trade talks with China and a slew of U.S. allies, pointing to his work to help the nation’s agriculture industry. He tweeted that farmers hadn’t been “doing well for 15 years,” blaming the policies of Mexico, Canada and China.

“By the time I finish trade talks, that will change. Big trade barriers against U.S. farmers, and other businesses, will finally be broken. Massive trade deficits no longer!” Trump tweeted. In a separate tweet, he wrote that China “already charges a tax of 16% on soybeans. Canada has all sorts of trade barriers on our Agricultural products. Not acceptable!”

The president last week imposed tariffs on steel and aluminum imports

from top U.S. trading partners, including Canada, Mexico and the European Union. And he has threatened tariffs on up to \$200 billion in Chinese imports, raising the potential for retaliation in a dispute involving the globe’s two largest economies.

Senate Republicans have warned that the tariffs could dampen the economic gains from the GOP tax cuts and sour the mood among voters as lawmakers are campaigning to protect the

Republican majority in Congress.

Many farm-belt lawmakers worry that the trade disputes could make American farmers the target of retaliation. Mexico, for example, has said it will penalize U.S. imports including pork, apples, grapes and cheeses.

Groups backed by the influential Koch brothers’ network announced they were launching a new multimillion dollar campaign to oppose tariffs and highlight the benefits of free

trade. The groups — Freedom Partners Chamber of Commerce, Americans for Prosperity and The LIBRE Initiative — called on Congress to exert oversight by requiring House and Senate votes on any new tariffs and urged the lifting of the recent steel and aluminum tariffs as well as those being proposed on goods from China.

Freedom Partners’ James Davis said they wanted to confront “protectionist ideas” they say would hold back the economy.

Tech drives Nasdaq to record highs

NEW YORK — U.S. stocks rose for the second consecutive day Monday with technology companies, retailers and household goods companies in the lead. Indexes of technology companies and smaller, more U.S.-focused companies both hit all-time highs.

Major technology companies including Google’s parent company, Alphabet, made big gains, while Apple rose as it previewed new features and software updates at its Worldwide Developers Conference. Microsoft edged higher after it said it will buy the coder platform GitHub, while new privacy concerns weighed on shares of Facebook.

Retailers including Target, Walmart and Under Armour rallied, as did Amazon. Energy companies fell as the price of oil continued to slide.

After an up and down week last week, the S&P 500 index, a market benchmark used by many index funds, is on its first winning streak in three weeks. The technology-heavy Nasdaq composite finished at a record high, above a mark it set March 12,

while the smaller Russell 2000 surpassed a record it set last week.

Last week investors reacted to political turmoil in Italy and rising trade tensions as the U.S. continued to hold talks with Chinese officials and placed tariffs on steel and aluminum imported from Europe, Mexico and Canada.

Stocks have wobbled in the last few months as investors worried that tariffs and other barriers to trade will reduce economic growth and corporate profits. But Wall Street has mostly treated the tough talk and proposed tariffs as a negotiating tactic. Invesco Chief Global Market Strategist Kristina Hooper said the U.S. crossed an important dividing line last week when, after months of talks, its aluminum and steel import duties went into effect.

“It appears that will lead to some significant retaliatory tariffs,” she said. “Markets seem to treat it as if it’s just rhetoric and it’s just a bargaining tool, and my view is that that is foolhardy.”

The S&P 500 climbed 12.25 points, or 0.4 percent, to 2,746.87. The index rose 1.1 percent Friday after a strong jobs report.

New iPhone to include methods to use it less

SAN JOSE, Calif. — Apple introduced new controls for limiting how much time customers spend on their devices as the company tackles criticism that its devices are becoming increasingly addictive and distracting.

The controls allow users to set “Do Not Disturb” modes on their phones, such as at night or during trips to the playground with their kids. During that time, app notifications will be blocked from showing up on the home screen. The phone’s screen can also be set to dim automatically just before bedtime.

Apple also will give users reports on how much time they spend on apps and what gets them to check them constantly. They can set time limits on specific apps — and set controls for kids.

Last month, Google revealed plans to have Android phones go into “shush” mode when placed face down on a table and have the screen show only greyscale colors late at night.

Both companies’ efforts come as experts worry that all the flashy colors and beeps give users short-term, feel-good rewards while increasing stress in the long run.

The new Apple features previewed Monday won’t reach users for a few months. Rather, they were shown to let software developers start building apps to make iPhones and other Apple devices more useful.

And that underscores a paradox: Apple is introducing features to limit iPhone use at the same time it’s encouraging more use by building in more useful features.

Other highlights from the show include:

Better browsing privacy

Apple is taking a swipe at ubiquitous “share” buttons created by Facebook and others to track your behavior online regardless of whether you click on them.

The company says it’s shutting down that tracking through its Safari browser in an update to Mac and iOS devices, including iPhones and iPads. Apple senior vice president Craig Federighi said such tracking would be blocked by default. Even if users click to share an item, they will get a prompt with an option to prevent subsequent tracking.

He also said Apple would crack down on so-called “fingerprinting,” in which data companies identify specific devices by creating a unique fingerprint based on a device’s particular configuration settings, installed fonts and plug-ins.

Apple plans to instead send out generic data to such collectors, making a user’s device look just like any other Apple device. Federighi said the changes will make it “dramatically more difficult for data companies to identify you and track you.”

Last year, Apple added “intelligent tracking

prevention” that imposes time limits on tracking cookies and takes other measures to try to prevent advertising tech companies from following users around the web.

Augmented reality gets augmented

Apple rolled out new support for augmented reality applications as it unveiled a new format for digital objects that appear to live in the real world.

The update comes as Apple tries to extend AR experiences to a broader population, rather than just hard-core, tech-savvy users. The company started that effort last year when it built AR tools into most iPhones and iPads; by contrast, Google had limited that to niche Android phone models.

Digital objects created with the new format, called USDZ, will work in Apple’s Safari browser, Messages and Mail apps, meaning AR isn’t limited to stand-alone apps that people choose to download separately. The format will also get support in Adobe’s Creative Cloud suite of apps for professional photographers, videographers and designers. What remains to be seen is whether there is enough of a compelling reason for someone to use AR, even if it’s built-in to everyday apps.

Apple also unveiled an app called “Measure” that measures boxes and other objects in the real world by pointing the camera at them.






